Ross wrestlers figure in BC chase

The Buckeye Conference wrestling race will be a wide open affair and Ross will be right among the teams making it wide open if Coach Al Voggenthaler's forecast is correct.

Last season, the veteran of 14 coaching seasons, the last five at Ross, hit nearly all his predictions when he said Ross would be in the running for the conference title and finish high in sectional and district wrestling tournaments.

The Little Giants were second in the conference, won the Class AAA sectional, and sent four wrestlers to the state meet in Columbus. So, you have to take stock in what the crystal ball gazing coach says.

Coming back for Ross this season are Jesse Heidelberg and Jim Smith, half of the Ross foursome that made the state show. Gone are state competitors Tony Munoz and Pete Werling.

Heidelberg, a senior, will wrestle for the third consecutive year at

105. He is the defending conference champ.

"He stays at about 108 or 109 all the time," Voggie said, "and it is not difficult for him to make weight."

Smith, a senior heavyweight, is the reigning BC champ in his division.

While strong at 105, the Ross coach admits that some of the lighter weight classes are a bit weak. "For the first time since I have been here," he hastened to point out, "we are strong in the upper weights."

With Smith at heavyweight, Voggenthaler will have either Tim Guzman, senior, or junior Karl Schabel at 185. The 175-pound slot will be handled by veteran Ray Long while junior Charlie Clark will likely get the call at 167 but John Giedeman, a senior, will get a chance at this weight division.

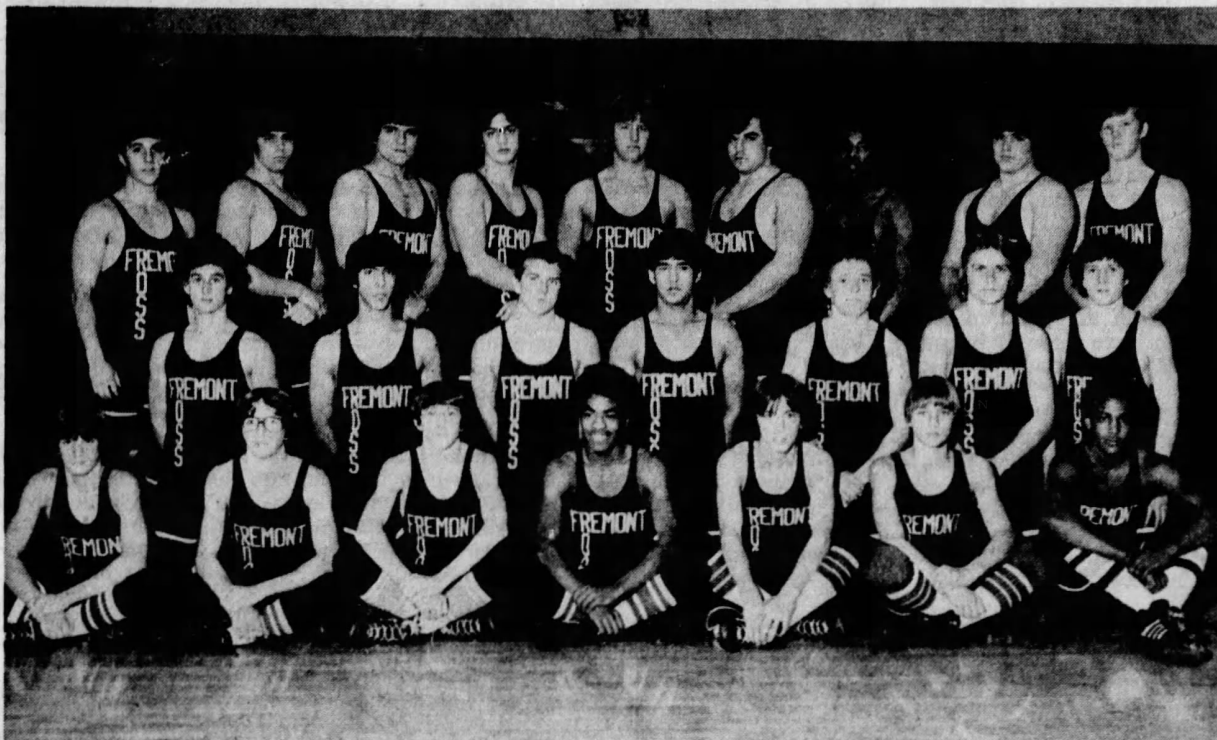
Clarence Parks, a junior, and second in the conference meet a season ago, will return in the 155-

pound weight class. At 145, a spot that Werling finished third in the state last season, Voggenthaler feels he may have a surprise for opponents.

"Lipstraw (John) will surprise some people this season and the Ross coach is confident that Sewell can win the BC title at that weight after finishing second last season.

Rex Mason, a junior, will be at 119 while another junior, Greg Orndorff should wrestle in the 112-pound slot. With Heidelberg at 105, taking over for Munoz is sophomore Mark Mills. Twin brothers Fred and Ted Merrill, Voggenthaler said, could go at either 112 or 98 for backup strength.

The Little Giants will open the season Friday evening in the annual Purple-White intrasquad meet. The match, which is used as one of the final "wrestle-offs" for the varsity divisions, will begin at 7 p.m. in the Ross High School Gym.

Pins by Merrill and Smith pace White win over Purple

The White rolled over the Purple 30-20 in the annual Ross "Purple-White" intrasquad match.

Heavyweight Jim Smith pinned Troy Amor of the Purple to preserve the White win in a match that is used mainly by Coach Al Voggenthaler as a preseason "wrestle-off." Smith, the defending Buckeye Conference champ, pinned Amor, a sophomore, in 2:21.

"The best match of the evening," Voggenthaler pointed out, "was between Parks (Clarence) and Lipstraw (John). They really put on a show."

Parks edged Lipstraw 1-0 on an escape in the second period. During the regular season, Parks, a junior, will be Ross's 155-pounder while Lipstraw, a senior, will wrestle at 145.

Ted Merrill started the White on the path toward the win with a pin over Mark Mills in the 98-pound skirmish. Merrill tacked Mills' back to the mat in 2:47.

The only pins of the match came in the first and last matches of the evening.

Ross will open the regular season next Friday with a trip to Mansfield Senior.

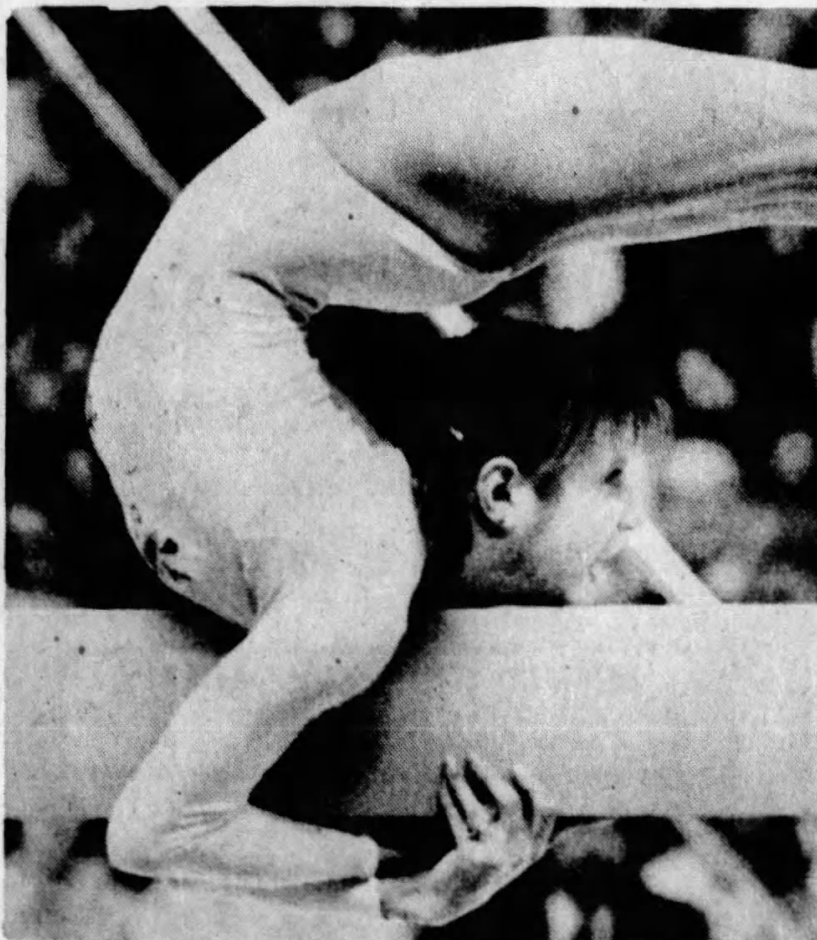

Tyger wrestlers trip Ross 31-28

MANSFIELD — Ross learned a bitter lesson the hard way Friday in a dual wrestling meet against Mansfield Senior.

The Little Giants found out that "he who laughs last, doesn't always laugh best." Mansfield won seven of the first eight matches while building up a 31-3 lead before the Little Giants swept the final five clashes. The late surge, however, only got Ross close — the Tygers wound up with a 31-28 win in the first dual meet of the season for both teams.

"They were ready to wrestle and we weren't" a dejected Al Voggenthaler, Ross coach, said after the match. "It was the poorest job (of wrestling) that we have done in two years."

Aaron Sewell of Ross scored the only points in that run of eight matches. The Ross senior came from behind to down Dwane Owens 11-8 in the 132-pound match.

Ross's chances were stunned early when Jessie Heidelberg lost to John Selman 5-4 in the 105-pound match. Heidelberg was 27-2 a year ago at that weight.

Clarence Parks of Ross stopped the Mansfield string with a 3:33 pin on Paul Twyman in the 155-pound battle. Ross 167-pounder Charlie Clark followed with a 4-0 decision over Dennis Ferguson and Ray Long outpointed Mansfield's Oscar Adlay 11-3 in the 175-pound clash.

Karl Schabel, a junior 185-pounder, won his first varsity match for Ross by pinning Ken Black in 2:29. Little Giants heavyweight Jim Smith finished up for Ross with a 46-second pin on Rich Gibson but the final effort was still too late for the Little Giants.

Ross is fourth at Bedford

BEDFORD, Mich. — Fremont Ross finished fourth in what was supposed to have been the Toledo Rogers Invitational Wrestling Tournament here Saturday.

The tourney was originally scheduled for the Toledo high but was changed when the Toledo schools were forced to close for the month of December because an operating levy was voted down in November.

Held in Bedford High School, Bedford rolled up 176 points to win the nine-team competition. Second was Adrian (Mich.) with 161½, third went to Ross's Buckeye Conference rival Sandusky with 121½, and Ross had 111 points.

The Little Giants claimed individual titles at 105 and 155 while taking seconds at 132 and heavyweight. Ross also had a third at 126 and fourths in the 138 and 175-pound weight divisions.

Jessie Heidelberg won

the 105 division by stopping Terry Walker of Adrian 7-2 in the finals. The Ross senior had advanced to the finals by pinning Tim Coates of Flushing (Mich.) and decisioning Steve Klock of Bedford 8-3.

Clarence Parks rolled to the 155-pound title by pinning Duane Koons of Flushing in 5:21. Parks had won by default in the first round and pinned Ken Olender of Trenton (Mich.) in 4:53 of the semifinal match.

Sewell lost to Bedford's Rich Joseph at 132 by a 10-2 count in the finals while Jim Smith was stopped by Sandusky's Luther Henson 4-1 in the heavyweight finals.

Paul "Tex" Miller was third at 126 while Rick Hinkle (138) and Ray Long (175) recorded the fourth place finishes.

Heidelberg, Smith advance at Medina

MEDINA — Fremont Ross's Jesse Heidelberg and Jim Smith forged into the semifinal round of the Medina Invitational Wrestling Tournament here today after the first day of competition on Tuesday.

Smith, a heavyweight, pinned his first two opponents in the opening rounds to reach the finals. In the first round, the Ross senior pinned Jim Ott of Marlinton in 1:24 while in the second round of wrestling, Smith stopped Keith Hutchinson of Barberton in just 28 seconds.

Today, Smith was to wrestle Terry Reeves of Cardinal Stritch in the semis.

Heidelberg, 105, used a bye in the first round and an easy 15-3 romp over Ray Kowatch of John Marshall in the second round to reach the semis. Heidelberg faced Mike Gercak of Norton in his semifinal match.

The Little Giants, seventh of 18 teams after one round, had nine wrestlers still alive in the consolations.

Heidelberg 1st; Ross finishes 8th

MEDINA — Jessie Heidelberg of Fremont Ross captured the 105-pound championship in the Medina High School Invitational Wrestling Tournament, a tourney that is billed as a 'mini-state' tournament.

Maple Heights, a fixture at the top of the heap in Ohio high school wrestling, won the second annual 18-team tournament by rolling up 200 points, 58 more than second place Oregon Cardinal Stritch. Fairview was third with 119 and Ross was eighth with 82. Maple Heights was also the winner a year ago.

"This is the toughest tournament that I have every been in," Ross Coach Al Voggenthaler said after the two day affair.

In addition to Heidelberg's championship, Ross heavyweight Jim Smith was third and 155-pound Clarence Parks was also third.

Heidelberg, a senior, survived a final period scare to win his title. The Ross lightweight, 27-2 a year ago, outpointed Rusty Lenehan of Elyria Catholic 16-8 in the finals. He had led 9-1 going into the final two minutes.

"He really looked good," Voggenthaler said about Heidelberg. "He was tearing people up. We had people coming up to us asking where we got him."

Along the way, Heidelberg had beaten three unbeaten wrestlers but he had his hands full with Lenehan, especially in the last period.

"He almost got pinned," Voggenthaler said.

Heidelberg started in the "up" position in the final period, quickly scored on a three-point nearfall for a 12-1 lead but Lenehan scored on a reversal. Heidelberg returned the favor and scored on a two-point nearfall before Lenehan managed his second reversal of the period.

The Elyria Catholic wrestler flipped Heidelberg on his back in his sequence and scored on a three-point nearfall but Heidelberg held on for the win.

Smith, in addition to his third place, won the tournament's award for the most pins in the least amount of time. The Ross 250-pounder pinned four opponents in 3:43 in winning four of five matches.

Terry Reeves of Cardinal Stritch was the only wrestler to beat Smith and that was by a pin nine seconds from the end of the semifinal match.

Up until that time, Smith had been controlling Reeves with a 9-1 lead. In the final period, Reeves scored on an escape and takedown before catching Smith in a "roll through" for the pin.

"I don't think Smitty knew he was in that much trouble," the Ross coach said. "It was just one of those things — only this sort of made your stomach turn."

Parks, after a loss in the second round to eventual champ Bill Kovach of Maple Heights, won three straight matches for the third spot at 155.

Parks is now 8-1 for the season.

LIMA — Ross won its first dual wrestling meet of the season on the strength of four pins Wednesday over Lima Shawnee.

Charlie Clark stopped Shawnee's Pat Keller in 24 seconds of the 167-pound match to lead the Little Giants to a 36-18 victory. The win evened the Little Giants dual meet record at 1-1.

Jesse Heidelberg (105), Aaron Sewell (132), and Jim Smith (heavyweight) scored the other pins for the Little Giants.

Heidelberg ran his record to 7-1 with a fall in 1:35 of the first period over Shawnee's Blaine Bice. Sewell

needed just 12 seconds of the second period to pin Kevin Walsh.

Smith roared back from a 3-2 deficit after the first two minutes to stop Brad Comer in 3:07.

In another bout that broke a 6-6 match deadlock, Ross's Mike Albright scored on a reversal in the final period to trip Shawnee's Ken Shaw in the 119-pound match. "Tex" Miller followed with a 4-0 shutout over Mike Soo and Sewell tacked Walsh to the mat to get the Little Giants' purple machine on the way to the convincing win.

Sandusky smothers Ross 42-18

Fortune telling coach

Terry Wilson ought to bill himself as a fortune teller — not a wrestling coach.

"I predicted before the match that we would win 41-18," the mustacioed

Sandusky High School head man of the mats said confidently after watching his team shackle Ross.

He was off by only one with his call — Sandusky pasted the Little Giants 42-18 and it sent Ross Coach

Al Voggenthaler into old sports cliches.

"Well," Voggle said, "wait till next year. They won't have all of their super stars."

Next year wasn't exactly what the Ross honcho wanted but it was what he had to settle for after four pins and five decisions went against his team.

"It was those pins that really hurt us," he admitted and then added, "but they juggled their lineup and it worked — we lost all four of the last matches."

Wilson rearranged his wrestlers at 169 and 177. Tony Jones, who normally goes at 169 was moved up a notch while Kirk Wyatt, normally the 177-pounder, went down one notch. The last minute switch produced two wins.

"Both of them (Jones and Wyatt) are certified at 169," Wilson said as he explained his hijinks. "I had a couple of reasons in mind — first I wanted to help Jones with his record. I wanted him to get one more win and Long (Ross's Ray) another loss."

"I'm thinking of seeding in tournaments and in the conference when it comes to that. I figured that Wyatt could beat his man."

Howard Carr, Sandusky's 100-pounder, pinned Mark Mills in 3:15 to start the Blue Streaks

over Paul "Tex" Miller had Sandusky on top 15-9. Aaron Sewell, Ross's 134-pounder, brought the Little Giants back even by pinning Phil Keeghan in 2:35.

Sewell survived a gash over his right eye in picking up the match six-pointer.

After Sewell's win, it was all downhill for Ross. The only bright spark was Clarence's Parks' 2-1 win over Leonard Ferguson at 157. Parks scored on a two-point nearfall in the final period for the win.

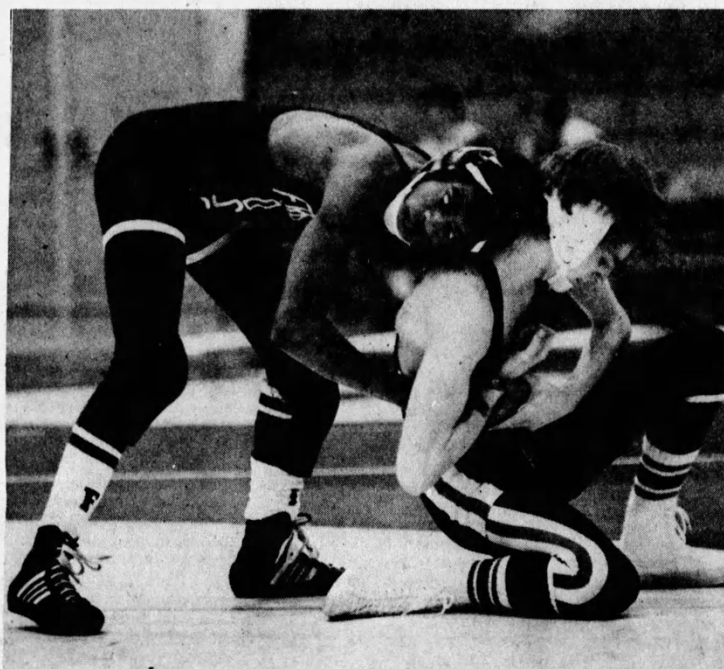
Parks' win narrowed the Ross deficit to 24-18 but Wyatt pinned Charlie Clark of Ross in 3:18 of the 169-pound battle and when Jones stopped Long 17-1, Ross was closed out 35-18.

It was merely a mopup situation for Sandusky from that point.

Ross wrestlers rip Findlay

FINDLAY — Ross returned to the winning circle on the wrestling mats by bouncing Findlay 42-11 here Monday. The win came on the heels of Ross's stunning 42-18 loss at the hands of Sandusky last Thursday.

The Little Giants picked up three pins plus the season's first win at 147 and a victory at 169 by a wrestler moved up from the junior varsity. Ross is now 382 in dual meets.

Big Jim Smith stopped mammoth Al LaForrest of Findlay in 1:38 of the first round of the heavyweight battle. That was the quickest pin of the match.

Aaron Sewell pinned Findlay's Tim Geoghegan in 3:04 of the 134-pound match and Ray Long polished off Findlay's Steve Chando at the 5:15 mark of the 177-pound clash.

John Lipstraw of Ross scored his first win of the season at 147. The Ross senior scored on a takedown in the first period and a reversal in the second while surviving a stalling warning in the final period for a 4-2 win over Larry Weisenberger.

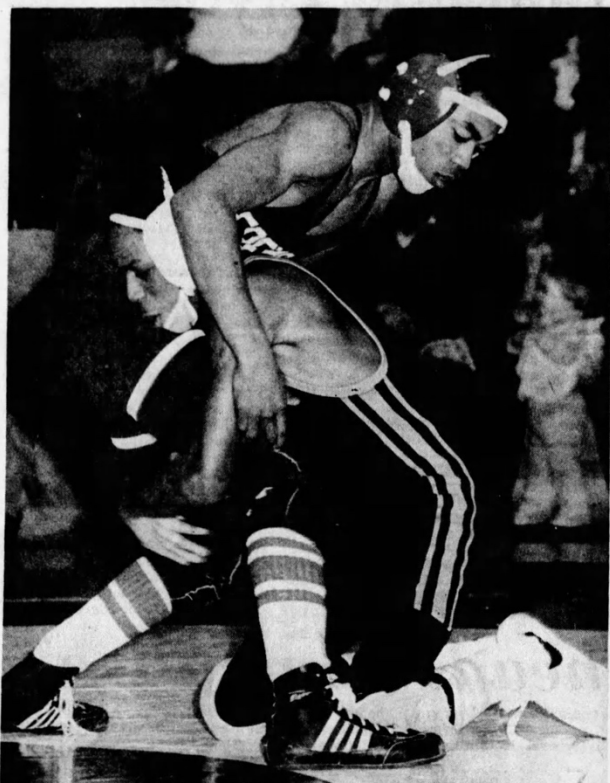

Lipstraw 'balances' attack

John Lipstraw is a peaceful kid; just a normal high school senior . . . until someone kicks him in the head.

"I think we are going to kick him in the head all the time," Ross wrestling Coach Al Voggenthaler chuckled as he slapped the Ross 148-pounder on the backside.

That kick in the head, early in the first period between Lipstraw and Lorain Senior's Mark Minnich served as a mental "reversal" for the Little Giants in the hard fought match at Ross High School Thursday.

After Lipstraw shook the cobwebs from his head, he handed Minnich (now 5-1-1) his first loss of the season and keyed Ross to seven straight wins in a 42-15 romp over the Steelmen.

"I did not expect 42-15," the Ross coach said as he eyed the scoreboard, "but I did feel that if we wrestled well, we would win all the matches that we did win. The only thing is I did not expect Sewell (Aaron) to lose — he beat that kid last year."

"I guess it balanced out," Voggenthaler pointed out, "after Sewell lost and Lipstraw won."

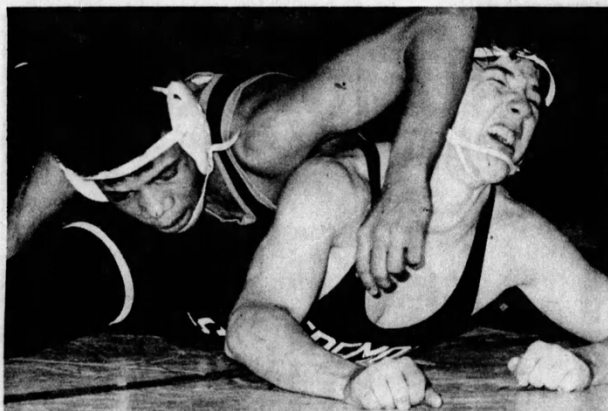

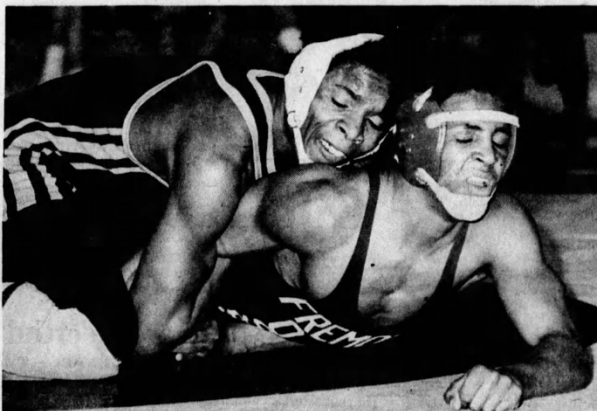

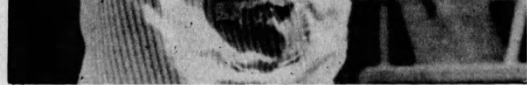

Cavs rout Celtics 110

RICHFIELD, Ohio (AP) — The Boston Celtics seem to bring out the best in the Cleveland Cavaliers, and Boston Coach Tom Heinsohn doesn't like that.

Cleveland's 110-82 rout of the Celtics Tuesday night gave the Cavaliers a 3-0 edge over Boston this season and their first season series victory over the defending National Basketball Association champions in Cleveland's seven years in the league.

"My team is getting into the bad habit of playing any kind of basketball and thinking we can get back in the second half," growled Heinsohn. "I don't like my team's attitude right now."

"There's no excuse," he added. "We had 'em 27-27 and they (the Cavaliers) just wanted it more. We played a bumner last week (against Washington), too, and that's why I'm perturbed."

Cleveland broke out of the 27-27 tie with 10 straight points, ran off a 29-12 edge the rest of the first half and put it away with a 31-21 third-period.

The victory, combined with Kansas City's triumph over the New York Knicks, cut Cleveland's magic number to two. Any combination of Cleveland victories and Knicks losses totaling two will assure the Cavaliers a spot in the playoffs.

The victory also moved the Cavaliers one game ahead of the Celtics in their battle for the fifth playoff position in the NBA Eastern Conference.

"We shot very well tonight, but the key to the game was our defense," explained Cleveland Coach Bill Fitch. "We were just swarming over 'em most of the time out there. They didn't get any easy baskets until that last quarter."

"I'm sure that Heinsohn peeled the paint in their locker room at halftime," Fitch said, "and they really came out running. But we got back well most of the time and they didn't get that many shots."

Austin Carr led the Cavaliers with 14 in the decisive fourth quarter, 12 in the first half. When Heinsohn was asked how he felt about the rout, he said darkly, "I want us to get ready to play basketball."
