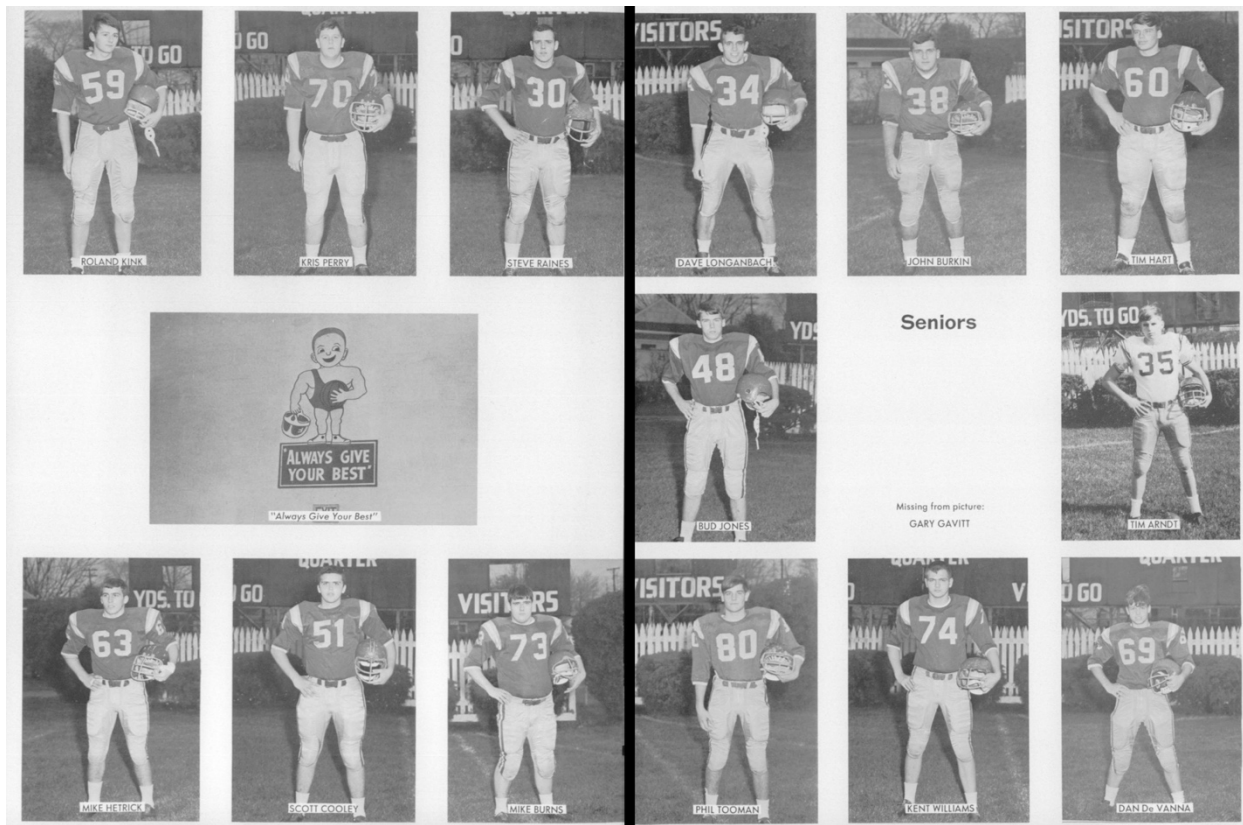
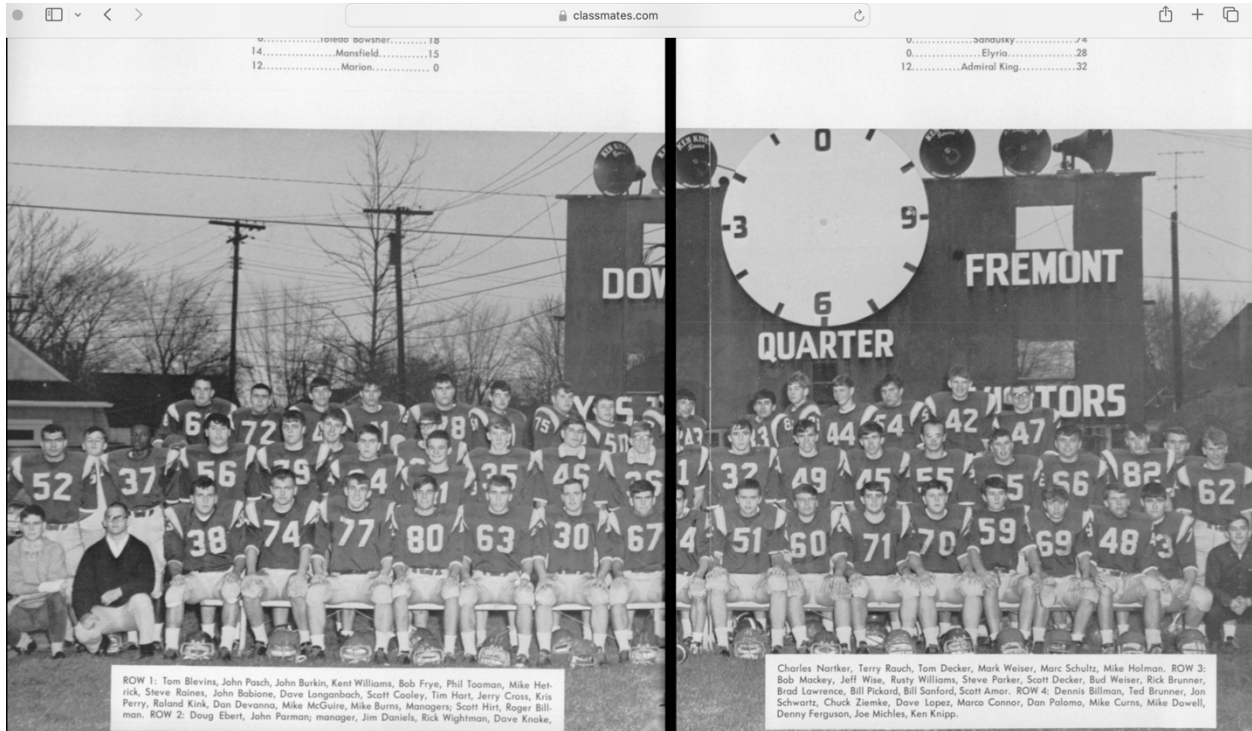
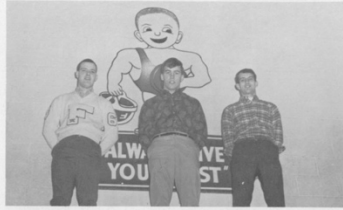

Prep Gridders Getting Ready

It's that time of the year again.

Officially, football practice starts Friday in Ohio.

Mal Mackey, Ross high's veteran grid mentor, says his squad will be given physical examinations Wednesday at 1:30 p.m. at Harmon field, Dr. Edwin Swint being in charge.

Two-a-Day practice sessions will get under way Friday at 8:30 and equipment will be issued at the same time.

Mackey's opening comes in the first week of school, Toledo Rogers coming to Harmon field Friday, September 9.

Bob Smith, returning for another year at St. Joseph's and without the services of Assistant Ed Dorohek, who is no longer in the coaching business, said he will issue uniforms to his seniors and invited juniors Monday at 7 p.m. at the Varsity room in the high school building. Tuesday at 1 o'clock and again at 6 he will issue equipment to all other juniors and sophomores.

Practice, also on a two-a-day basis, starts Friday for the first game of the year when the Streaks entertain Lorain St. Marys at Harmon field September 11. This game will be the only Sunday encounter on the schedule.

Smith said physicals are not yet scheduled, because no physician has been obtained to conduct them, Dr. W. J. Martin no longer being available.

Little Giants On Preseason Display For Ross Boosters

The 1966 edition of the Ross Little Giants went on public display for the first time Tuesday night at Harmon field. The display was not actual combat but a preview before the Ross Booster meeting. Head Coach Mal Mackey and his assistants introduced to the Boosters the team which will be on the firing line Friday night in the home opener against Toledo Rogers.

After all members of the team were introduced a possible starting lineup was brought forth, including both offensive and defensive units. The starters showed a complete new de-

fensive front wall, two veteran linebackers in Tim Arndt and Mike Hetrick and four brand new defensive backs.

The offense showed two line returnees from the late 1965 team, Phil Tooman at end and Mike Hetrick at guard, Jerry Cross who was moved from an end to a tackle, and John Pasch, who saw considerable action a year ago.

Experience sparkled in the offensive backfield which is the most certain thing on the Ross football team. Four lettermen, Craig Swartz, Tim Arndt, Dave Longanbach and Steve Raines

man the offensive backfield. All were starters last year except Raines, who understudied Terry Bork as a junior after being a starter his sophomore year.

Following the meeting Mackey in a brief interview looked back on the preseason practices. "I really don't know," stated the veteran coach, who added, "I think we are going to be alright." It is a young Little Giant team with strong reliance on sophomores and reserves from a year ago.

In the three scrimmages Ross came out on the long end of clashes with Toledo Start,

Parma Padua and Toledo Libbey. In the final scrimmage Libbey was definitely no match for the Little Giants.

Mackey points confidently to one thing, "With that backfield we ought to be able to move the ball."

During the Booster meeting it was announced the club will once more operate the parking lot behind the east side bleachers. This operation was initiated midseason a year ago.

The membership drive aimed at 2,500 members has passed the 500 mark it was noted. The door-to-door canvass by mem-

bers of the Ross team brought in an additional 190 members.

Richard Sherman, athletic director, has issued a warning to those who have ordered season tickets. Pick them up by Friday afternoon or they will be resold, was the Sherman ultimatum. He said the advance season ticket sale has already filled all of sections C, D and E except the first four rows. Section B is being held for single game reserve seat sales.

The season tickets remain on sale at Tremper's. Student tickets are also on sale at Tremper's and the high school.

Sadecki Disappointment Ends For Giants

Herman Franks drew an ace from the bottom of the deck but Harry Walker's best cards all were trumped.

Ray Sadecki and Joe Torre divided the pot.

The stakes were high Tuesday night when Sadecki backed up Franks with a three-hit shutout, leading San Francisco to a 6-0 victory over Los Angeles, and Torre crossed up Walker with a three-run homer, powering Atlanta past Pittsburgh 4-1.

The Giants' victory boosted them into a virtual tie for second place with the Dodgers, 1½ games behind the National

League-leading Pirates.

The Braves reached the .500 mark for the first time since May 9 and tied Cincinnati for sixth place, 12 games off the pace.

Franks, the Giants' manager, cashed his bet on Sadecki when the 25-year-old left-hander scattered three singles and recorded his first victory in two months.

Sadecki had been a major disappointment to the Giants since they acquired him in an early-season trade that sent Orlando Cepeda to St. Louis. He went into Tuesday night's game with a 5.00 earned run average and only three complete games in 18 starts.

"Control has been his main trouble," catcher Tom Haller said. "But this time he had good control of his fast ball and his curve. He made only a couple of mistakes."

Asked when he had last pitched a shutout, Sadecki replied: "That's a good question. You'll have to look it up in an old record book."

Walker, the Pirates' pilot, gambled against Torre in the eighth inning of a 1-1 deadlock. Felipe Alou drew a lead-off walk against southpaw Bob Veale and Denis Menke sacrificed. Walker then ordered an intentional walk to Hank Aaron, bringing Torre to the plate.

"I know Torre's a tough out," Walker said afterward, "but I was hoping for the double play."

Instead, Torre cleared the left field wall for his 33rd homer.

In other NL games, New York edged Cincinnati 3-2, Houston nipped St. Louis 4-3 and Chicago upended Philadelphia 7-2.

Baltimore trimmed New York 4-1, Cleveland beat Boston 6-2, Detroit slugged Washington 3-2, Minnesota shaded Chicago 4-3 in 12 innings and California topped Kansas City 4-3 in American League action.

Sadecki pitched perfect ball against the Dodgers for four innings, did not issue a walk and was never in trouble while improving his season record to 5-7.

The Giants raked loser Don Drysdale and two successors for 15 hits, including a two-run homer by Willie Mays and a three-run double by Tito Fuentes.

After Torre's three-run shot sent Atlanta ahead, Walker lost another strategy match in the Pirates' eighth.

FIRST LOOK AT ROSS' NEW LOOK

Little Giants Have Rapid-Fire Offense Ready For Opener

Local fans will get their first look at the new look in Fremont Ross high school football Friday night at Harmon field. The new look could be an eye-opener not only to the Little Giant rosters but to the opposition.

Coach Mal Mackey has employed some innovations to put together a rapid-fire offense for the local grid entry. Not the least of these innovations is the no-huddle attack which will have all signals called as audibles at

the line of scrimmage.

With Steve Raines barking the signals from his quarterback spot over the line of scrimmage, the Ross team has showed the ability in practice and scrimmages to reel off a continuous attack without hesitation. The maneuver has had the defense scrambling for position to counter the quick-developing attack.

Many Losses

With the loss of the entire defensive line and four deep backs, all but two offensive line starters and a quarterback due to graduation, Mackey has

come up with a massive juggling act. The team on the field for Ross Friday night will not be a young one, but an inexperienced unit.

On the offensive Mike Hetrick will be at his familiar guard location and Phil Tooman at the end spot he won at the end of last year. Behind this will be an all-senior backfield with experience, good size and speed.

Quarterback will be Steve Raines who was prematurely pressed into the starting quarterback slot two years ago by

injury. Raines came back as a senior to letter as backup quarterback to Terry Bork. Now the stocky and ready operator is back to run the show his senior year. In his youthen duties he has developed a threatening passing arm to add to his skills.

Behind Raines are the trio of runners who started a year ago. All-Conference fullback Tim Arndt has speed to go with his 180 pounds. Dave Longanbach at the wing or flank post has both speed and elusiveness in his bag of tricks. Craig Swartz has added weight and carries 180 pounds

with what is likely the greatest speed on the team.

All-Senior Backfield

Above all, the starting backfield has maturity. It has been a good many years since Ross could boast an all-senior backfield, all of which had been starters in the past.

Juggling of Mackey and his coaching staff becomes evident in a look at the new offensive line. Jerry Cross, a letterman end, has been switched to tackle and John Pasch, used mainly as a defensive linebacker in 1965 will be at guard beside Cross.

Kris Perry, who missed last season as a foreign exchange student, is back to add his 210 pounds to tackle. Perry is the largest player on the starting line and will go both ways at tackle.

Mackey has dipped into his sophomore grab bag for the starting offensive center, 190-pound Doug Ebert. Moving in at the right end spot will be the lightest of the Ross line starters, Jeff Wise, 165.

Two-Way Players

Perry is one of only three players who will have to go both

ways in the initial Little Giant plans. Hetrick will double as a defensive linebacker, where he will operate with Arndt.

Defensively, only Hetrick and Arndt return to familiar positions. The Ross coaches have put together a defense of seven seniors, three juniors and a sophomore.

Behind Ross in the preseason drills are three scrimmages. In all three against Toledo Start, Parma Padua and Toledo Libbey, Ross came out on the long end. Mackey is reluctant to say this means Ross is ready to

give a serious challenge to its regular season foes. He notes scrimmage opponents is unknown.

The Ross coaches have molded the current version of the Little Giants from a squad of 65 griders. This group includes 20 seniors, 25 juniors and 20 sophomores. Mackey looks to a few giant sophomores for help later in the season. The biggest boys on the squad are sophomores and with added maturity could be help, particularly to the defensive units, according to Mackey.

Yankees Dip To Low Mark Since 1913

Now Ralph Houk knows how Frank Chance felt 53 years ago. Chance, a Hall of Famer who starred at first base for the Chicago Cubs, managed the New York Yankees in 1913 when they were in last place on the next-to-last day of the season.

Today, Houk's Yankees occupy the American League cellar for the first time in September since that day in 1913.

Houk undoubtedly hopes things turn out as well for him as they did for Chance — the 1913 Yankees came on to win on the final day and finish seventh in an eight-team league.

New York hasn't finished last since 1912.

The Yankees, winners of 29 pennants and 20 World Series, plunged into the basement Wednesday night by losing 3-2 to league-leading Baltimore while Boston was edging Cleveland 5-4 and Kansas City was beating California 6-3.

The loss left the Yankees 25½ games off the pace, a game back of Kansas City and one-half game behind ninth-place Boston.

In other AL games Wednesday, Minnesota nipped Chicago 6-4 and Detroit downed Washington 4-0.

Boston erupted for four runs in the sixth in beating Cleveland. Jose Tartabull's bases-loaded single brought home the first run and broke a 1-1 tie.

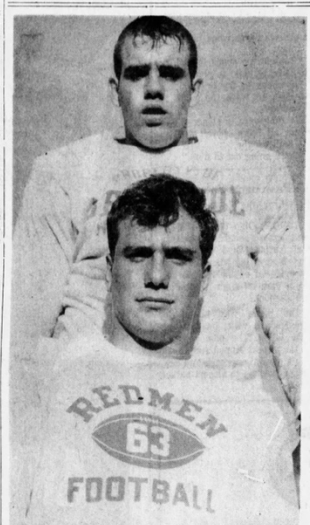
Danny Cater was the big man

in Kansas City's victory. He doubled home a run in the first and singled home a pair in the seventh. Jack Aker picked up his 24th save for the Athletics, stopping a threat after California loaded the bases in the sixth.

Earl Wilson gained his ninth straight victory and 18th of the season against nine losses for Detroit by limiting Washington

to three hits. The Tigers got three of their runs in the opening inning when the first four batters got hits.

Minnesota came up with four runs in the eighth to beat Chicago. Rich Rollins singled home the tying run, and the winning run scored when outfielder Ken Berry scooped up the ball hit by Rollins and threw it into the Chicago dugout.

Toledo Rogers Is Team With Great Lakes Chance

They say that Rogers could well be the team to overcome a favored Toledo Whitmer in the Great Lakes League this year. The Rogers team of Coach Tom Lyons will best this pre-season estimate Friday night under the lights at Fremont's Harmon field.

They step out of their conference to tackle with the young Fremont Ross entry from the Buckeye Conference.

Lyons is building his 1966 edition around 10 lettermen and good size. He is hoping to improve on last season's overall mark of six wins, four losses. The Rogers record of 1966 was a strange one. In only one game all season did both teams score. Rogers lost three games by shutout and held its foes scoreless in all victorious outings. Only in the 26-14 loss to Devilbiss did both teams score.

There were four key losses from the Rogers team of a year ago and all four are now playing

ing Freshman College football. In the line Lyons must replace a pair of tackles, Paul Schmidlin, 220, and Don DeSalle, 240. Schmidlin is now at Ohio State and DeSalle at Indiana. Other key losses were that of Mark Larson, 195, end, now at Minnesota and Mike McDermott, 205, fullback, enrolled at Muskegon.

Size departed but size remains with four of the lettermen above 200. Lyons points to Chuck Estes, 188, linebacker; Bob Jones, 208, tackle and linebacker, and quarterback Rick Gockerman as key men in his hopes.

Other big returnees are Ted Whalen, tackle, 210; Steve Hines, 220, center; Robin Espard, 215, tackle, and Jeff Johns, 195, end.

Big City Team Brings Size, Experienced Backfield Combination To Harmon Field

One year ago Fremont Ross Little Giants turned in their defensive gem of the season and handed Coach Mal Mackey his 100th victory at the local school. The victim of that display was Cleveland West, held to a net ground gain of 15 yards.

Cleveland West returns to town Friday but brings a veteran team of good size with intentions of avenging the 36-0 humiliation of a year ago. Graduation seriously depleted the Ross legions and Coach Mackey's staff is struggling in the early season to fill numerous gaps.

Last Friday in the second half the inexperienced Little Giants seemed to outgrow the first game jitters and fell into a team. They showed marked offensive and defensive improvement as the game progressed.

West comes to town with a team reputed for its size, ability to run sweeps and 12 lettermen. They should field a larger line to test the Little Giants.

Experienced Team

The Cleveland team fell last Friday to Cleveland Shaw, but scouts warn that Shaw had exceptional speed and this ability was the difference.

The starting West lineup against Shaw showed experience at most positions. Nine of the 11 offensive starters and eight on defense were lettermen. If there is a weakness, it could be depth since coach Bob Liebold used seven players offensively and defensively. This included the entire starting backfield of Fred and Funsie Herman, John Sand and Terry Mathis.

Fred Herman is believed to be a key man offensively and defensively. He operates with his twin brother at the offensive halfbacks and at corner linebacker on defense.

West will be out this year to improve on its 3-5-1 record of last season the first at the school for Coach Liebold.

Work On Conditioning

In its opening game Ross showed the effectiveness of the new 'rapid fire' offense. The Little Giants with the no-huddle attack ran off 70 plays. This week has been a heavy work one with emphasis on conditioning. Mackey staged 'full go' scrimmages Tuesday and Wednesday, giving heavy work to the first two units both offensively and defensively.

The coaching staff seemed determined that if anyone is going to be worn down by the go-go approach to football it won't be the Little Giants.

Mackey expressed some pessimism about certain portions of the drills, pointing to dissatisfaction with development of the defensive backfield. He noted that the offense would take care of itself and there had been improvement this week in work of the offensive line.

This was shown in the Wednesday drills as backs were sprung loose repeatedly for long gainers.

To Use Sophomores

It is possible the Ross staff will dip into the sophomore corps this week in hopes of adding a little weight to the defensive rush. Dave Rhodes, largest man on the team at 240 pounds, was pressed into duty in the drills as a defensive end. The bulky sophomore has been out of action due to a leg in-

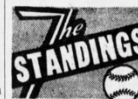

Lone Mansfield Pass Of Contest Puts Ball In Position For Clincher

MANFIELD — Fremont Little Giants walked off a rain-soaked field here Friday night defeated, but not beaten. As they strided to their dressing room the heads were high. They had fallen before Mansfield, 15-14, but there was nothing of which to be ashamed.

The foot was back in football and a 32-yard field goal and three big plays had allowed the Mansfield Tygers to hang on for victory. The claws were all in the club of the Little Giant as the visiting team refuted pregame claims that it was just a matter of how big Mansfield wanted to make the score.

A Mansfield assistant coach dismounted from his spotting post high in the press box and shook his head. Like most of the Mansfield fans, he was glad to survive a night when his team was outfought and still managed to nip the opposition.

On the heels of holding mighty Massillon to a 0-0 tie the Tygers were prohibitive favorites going into the contest. The oddsmakers overlooked the fact this could be the night the Little Giants would come of age. They kept coming at the home team all night.

Haggard from a night of rain-soaked battle they will not soon forget the Tygers were glad to settle for fourth quarter field goal that allowed them to nip Ross. The hero's mantle, which already should have been on his shoulders, finally settled permanently on Mike Swain. With slightly less than six minutes remaining in the game the sure toe of Swain drove a field goal through the uprights on an angle from the hash mark at the 22-yard line. A 32-yard field goal had won a high school football game.

Ross Dies Fighting

Even after the winning points were recorded on the scoreboard the Little Giants refused to give up. After the kickoff they drove 54-yards in nine plays before being stalled by a fumble on the Mansfield 20-yard line. The fumble was on second down. An incomplete pass and a rush fell short of first down.

"What more can you ask," commented Fremont Coach Mal Mackey in the lockerroom after the game. He shook his head and exclaimed, "The kids played a hellava a game — one lousy pass."

The one lousy pass was the play that set the stage for the dramatic conclusion of the contest. The Ross defense had stiffened and had Mansfield in trouble. The Tygers had the ball with third down and 16 yards to go on their 17 yard line. Trailing 14-12, the Tygers went to the airways with their first pass of the night. Quarterback Dave Hallabrin lofted a long aerial to end Larry Pruett. A Ross defender was near Pruett but lost on a gamble of going for the football. Defensive back Bob Mackey caught the speeding Pruett from behind after a 52-yard gain on the pass.

Mansfield moved the ball to the Fremont 16 with the aid of first down. The Ross defense then stiffened and the Tygers faced a fourth down and five yards to go situation.

Four big plays, two in which Swain played a major role, paved the way for Mansfield scoring. Only for the first touchdown did the Tygers mount a sustained drive.

Punt Is Difference

Even this drive needed to carry only 37 yards thanks to a phenomenal punt by quarterback Dave Hallabrin. Mansfield gained 20 yards in an exchange of punts. The first time Mansfield had the ball Hallabrin sailed a fourth down punt 48 yards from scrimmage to where it skidded dead on the Fremont

two-yard line. After three plays gained seven yards for Ross, John Pasch flew a punt 28 yards from scrimmage to where it was fair — caught by a Mansfield back.

A 12-yard drive, including three first downs and nine carries by fullback Floyd Davis, tallied the first Mansfield six points on the second play of the second quarter. Long-gainer of the drive had been a 12-yard gain by Swain.

With 5:47 to go in the half Ross pulled even on a one-yard plunge by Tim Arndt. The scoring play capped a 55-yard drive in 12 plays immediately after the Mansfield score.

Swain then came though with his first big play of the night, a 34-yard kick return. He added a 38-yard rushing gain which carried the ball to the Fremont 14. Three rushes and a five-yard offside penalty against Ross put Mansfield in the end zone with 1:58 remaining in the half.

Quarterback Hallabrin completely fooled the Ross defense on a fake give to fullback Davis and then a rollout keeper to the left side. The extra point for the second time failed.

Longanbach Sprints

Late in the third quarter Little ylen-HRD LUN DL NN LLU Giant fullback Dave Longanbach broke loose for 57 yards moving the ball to the Mansfield 15. Six plays later Arndt powered into the end zone on a fourthdown and one-yard to go play. Arndt was hit behind the line of scrimmage on the play but broke the tackle and dove into the end zone. The tally was the second play of the fourth quarter.

Steve Raines hit Jeff Wise deep in the end zone for a completed pass and the two extra-points.

The 14-12 lead lasted only 10 plays until Swain put his big foot into the Little Giants Hopes.

Swain was the core of the Mansfield attack with 156 yards in 16 carries, an average of 9.7 yards. He had long runs of 38, 22 and 59 yards, in addition to the 34-yard kick return. All this for a player listed as a second team tailback replacement for the injured Walden Jefferson.

Ross defense was as strong as it has been any time this year. Blocked kicks buoyed the Little Giant Chances. Tim Arndt crashed from his 'monster' line-backer spot to block a Swain kick attempt for extra points after the first touchdown.

Defensive end Jon Zink blocked a Hallabrin punt in the third quarter and then recovered the ball for Ross on the Mansfield 18. Ross failed to capitalize and surrendered the ball four plays later on the 14-yard line.

Redskins Record First Win, 28-21

PORT CLINTON —Port Clinton with Todd Finke scoring three touchdowns exploded in the first and third quarters Friday to notch their first win. Cleveland University School was the 28-21 victim of Port Clinton.

Finke ran 10 yards for the first score of the game and later added two more on two-yard plunges from his fullback spot.

Ross which surprised most of its followers by coming within one point of upsetting Mansfield, a team ranked seventh in the state, travels to Marion. They will meet a band of Presidents with an identical record to that of the Little Giants.

Elsewhere in the Buckeye

Conference the two current unbeaten, untied powers from Sandusky and Lorain will clash head - on at Lorain. The two teams both are unbeaten in four games overall and have won their first two in the conference.

In other conferences the two powers of the Sandusky Bay, both unbeaten in two league outings, St. Mary and St. Joseph, clash Saturday night at Sandusky. Northern Ohio League perennial powers, Bellevue and Shelby, both unbeaten in two league games, meet at Shelby. Galion, the only other unbeaten in the NOL, will be at home against Norwalk.

Showed Spark

Fremont showed a spark last Friday night on a soggy Mansfield field, which fostered a spar of hope in the Little Giant fans. They showed a desire to hit hard and strong pursuit in holding the Tigers in check. It took a 32 - yard field goal, a rarity in high school football to nip Ross, 15-14.

Coach Mal Mackey will give his revamped defense a second test against Marion. In the switches prior to the Mansfield game he moved 200 - pound senior Tim Arndt to the 'Monster' linebacking spot. Rick Brunner, a 195 - pound junior, worked into Arndt's regular linebacking spot and Steve Parker's speed was used in the deep defensive secondary.

Before the game was half over Jon Zink, a 180 - pound junior, was back at the defensive end spot he occupied at the start of the season. The combination worked and with the exception of four costly breakdowns, three long runs by Mike Swann and a 52 - yard pass, the defense clicked and held Mansfield in check.

Ross also produced a ground game which defied the Tiger defensive efforts. They proved the ability to control the ball in sustained drives.

The question mark now rests on the question "Was this just a one - game phenomena?" It is possible the Giants were high for that one game and won't

get this high again.

Scouts Issue Warning

Scouts warn that a less than full effort game will mean defeat at Marion. The presidents rolled by their first two opponents this year, 34-6, over Cleveland Rhodes, and 7-0, over Cleveland East Tech. In their final tuneup for the Buckeye Conference the Presidents stayed in the game for three periods with state - ranked Lima Senior, but faded to a 27-0 loss. Lima's extreme size was a telling factor in this contest. In the opening Buckeye game they fell before a rampaging Sandusky, 46-6.

An all-veteran backfield with good size is the backbone of the Marion team. It is supported by a green line. The case is similar to Ross where coaches are experimenting to build a line in front of an all senior, all letterman backfield. The two offensive backfields of Ross and Marion each average 175 pounds per man.

Ross will have a decided size advantage, but nothing like that

enjoyed by either Lima or Sandusky against Marion. The Little Giants probable lineup has a 189 pound offensive line average and 100 pound front wall on defense, Marion will front its attack with a 179-pound line and the front five on defense average 180 pounds. Overall offensive team average for Ross is 185 pounds while the Marion offense averages 179 pounds.

Two Good Backs

Scouts point to a good quarterback in Jon Williamson and fullback in Roger Beery as mainsprings of the President attack. Beery has scored three of Marion's seven touchdowns to date.

The Presidents are similar in both offense and defense to Ross. One defensive difference is the Ross use of a 'monster' roving to the strong side of the opposing offense.

For the second week in a row Ross will have to contend with good team speed in its opponent. Mansfield last week displayed that this speed can compensate for a lack of size.

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BLOCKED KICK SELTS GAME POINT THAW

Ross Wins First In Buckeye, Stops Marion 12-0

MARION — With the thud of a blocked kick against pads, the squirt of the ball skyward, quick hands and dashing feet, Marion broke open a tight battle here Friday night. A blocked punt provided Ross with the spark which broke open a half-time scoreless tie

and ended in a 12-0 Fremont victory. The Marion punt attempt turned out to be the leading Ross offensive weapon. The Little Giants blocked two hard punts and forced the punter to fumble a third time on fourth down.

The first of the blocked punts initiated a drive which moved to the Marion five - yard line until stalled in the first minutes of play.

Parker Hits Paydirt
After 6:41 of the third period Tim Arndt broke through for a second blocked Marion punt.

The ball squirted in the air and Steve Parker gathered it in at the Marion 30 - yard line. The speedy Parker raced unopposed into the end zone for the first score of the game. A run attempt failed to net the extra points.

Ross scored a second time

with 5:08 left in the game. Run-back of a short Marion punt gave the Little Giants the ball on the Marion 39. On first down Arndt found a hole over tackle, sidestepped into the open and raced for the touchdown.

It was just another chapter in a remarkable night for Arndt.

The fullback and 'monster' line-backer tallied the touchdown, his seventh of the season, and gained 94 yards in 18 carries for a 5.2 average on offense. Defensively he blocked the one punt and shared with Bob Frye the honor of blocking the other punt as part of his strong line-

backing job. Arndt quickly digressed and broke to two Marion screen pass attempts, clearing out the blockers with shoulder blocks. Bob Mackey and Kris Perry combined to wipe out another Marion screen setup try.

Marion Ground Danger
The slashing runs of Roger Beery and rollouts of Jon Williamson gave Marion a dangerous ground attack. Despite this fact they gained only 119 yards on the ground and penetrated Ross territory only once.

The lone time Marion managed to cross the 50 - yard line offensively came in the first series of downs of the second period. With an 11 - yard Williamson to Mike Honaker pass and a 19 - yard Williamson run key plays Marion drove 54 yards in 11 plays. On a third down and seven situation on the Fremont 20 Williamson went back to pass. The aerial seemed destined to float into halfback Jim Hughes arms in the end zone until Dave Longbach made a leaping save from his defensive halfback post. A fourth down pass bounced off the pads of halfback Mike Milligan incomplete.

While Marion was having trouble getting across the 50 - yard line, Ross slipped inside the Marion 25 four times, twice inside the five-yard line in addition to the two scoring plays.

A total of six yards kept Ross from going to the dressing room with a two touchdown lead instead of in a scoreless deadlock. The initial drive was stalled on the five - yard - line. The final play of the half, a 13 - yard Steve Raines to Phil Tooman pass put the ball inside the one-yard line as the gun ended the first half.

Strong Ross Finish
Fremont coaches, led by head coach Mal Mackey, were not particularly impressed with their team's work in the Marion victory. Mackey analyzed the team played the final three minutes of the first half and the last 15 of the second as they are capable. The coach told his team after the game that those brief times represented the type of ball he thought they were capable of playing — the type they will need to win.

In those periods at the end of each half the Little Giants showed a relish for body contact and displayed alertness, particularly on defense. The action were reminiscent of last Friday at Mansfield.

Game statistics showed the effectiveness of the Little Giants in the final quarter. In that 12 minute period Marion was held to seven yards rushing, minus one yard on one complete pass of four attempts. In addition Parker intercepted a Williamson pass and Ross scored his second touchdown. Net Marion yardage in the fourth period was actually a minus 24 yards as the Presidents were assessed two 15 - yard plays while in possession of the ball. Ross refused a third 15 - yard penalty to force a Marion kick. Mike Hetrick, middle linebacker, continued his strong defensive work in the period, putting pressure on the passer by shooting the gaps.

The victory was Ross' third in five games, one win and one loss in Buckeye Conference. Marion has not lost its last three games after two initial wins. They are 2 - 0 in Buckeye play. To add to the Presidents' dismay the Little Giant victory ruined homecoming at Marion. Queen Cheryl Smith and her court was crowned at a half-time band show.

Defensive Maturity Of Ross To Get Stern Lorain Tests

ROSS' FRIDAY FOE:

Lorain Blasts Balanced Backfield Corps

A pair of fleet halfbacks, a crunching fullback and a quarterback with strong running ability and deadly passing accuracy provide the offensive combination Fremont Ross will have to counter Friday night. These are the assets available in the backfield of Lorain Steel-

ers. The Steelers helped silence the skeptics last Friday when they extended Sandusky before falling 20-12. This was the first defeat of the season for Lorain. Prior to the Sandusky contest, Lorain had stopped Cleveland South, 31-6; Canton Lincoln, 16-3; Barberton, 8-6, and Findlay, 20-19.

Speed comes into the Lorain attack in the person of the two halfbacks, Dan Willoughby and Darrell Emerick. Willoughby is the team's leading scorer with five touchdowns and two extra points for 32 points. Emerick is the leading ground-gainer for the Steelers with 329 yards in 39 carries, an average of 8.3 yards per carry. Effectiveness of the Emerick running ability is shown in the fact he has been thrown for only two yards in losses in five games. Emerick had a 34-yard touchdown run against Sandusky.

Power Fullback

At fullback is a power runner deluxe, Bernie Wolak, a 215-pound battering ram. Wolak has been a four-yard a carry man for Lorain with 224 yards in 56 carries.

Keystone in the Steeler offensive structure is junior quarterback Terry King, a 215-pounder who has averaged 3.9 yards a carry rushing. The burly quarterback has gained 239 net yards in 61 carries. His running ability is misleading and to assume King is only a ground-attack quarterback is incorrect. At the same time he has shown ability to tuck the ball under his arm and run. King has completed 41 per cent of his passes, 19 of 44 for 253 yards. King has had only three of 44 passes intercepted. As a sophomore in

1965 King led the Buckeye Conference in passing.

Willoughby, who scored four touchdowns in one game against Cleveland South, is one of two favorite pass targets for King. He has gathered in five passes for 88 yards and one touchdown. Roger Schultz, 195-pound right end, has also caught five King passes for 84 yards.

King actually spreads his targets around with seven different receivers for his 19 pass completions. Jim Krase, 185-pound end, and Emerick have each caught three passes.

Lorain Weight

In the line Lorain will have size at least equal to Ross and

Coach Doug Thompson in a pre-season estimate feared only lack of line speed as a team deficit. On offense the Steelers will have a 186.4 pound line average and 187.5 pound backfield. Overall offensive team size average will be 185.8.

In Lorain they are labeling this an 'In-Between Week' — in between the loss to Sandusky and the meeting with Admiral King. Coach Thompson indicates he is having to fight a complacent outlook at the Ross game which is in the valley between two emotional peaks for Lorain players. A year ago Fremont stopped Lorain 26-14 for its fifth win of the season.

Get First View Of New Look

When the lights go on Friday night at Harmon field the local followers of the Fremont Ross football fortunes are in for a surprise. The erection of 96 15-watt iodine quartz lights on 100-foot towers and removal of the old poles from in front of the grandstands makes Harmon field look like a new stadium.

Ohio Power crews and volunteer help this week is racing the Friday deadline and it is assured the new \$15,000 lighting system will be in operation for the contest with Lorain Senior high school.

After two road games the fans are also hoping the Little Giants have adopted a new look from that seen in their last home appearance. In that last appearance September 23 the Ross team felt to Toledo Bowsher, 18-6.

Since then they have played the initial two games of the Buckeye Conference season on the road, winning over Marion 12-0 and looking good while being nipped by state power Mansfield, 15-14.

In the last two road games there has been evidence that the young Little Giant team is maturing. Defensive maturity will get its most severe test of the season Friday night.

Lorain Steelmen come to town with a veteran backfield which features, power, speed and a dangerous passing threat. The Little Giant defenders will be faced with the best offensive balance of the season.

Personnel Shifts

Since the Bowsher game there has been considerable personnel shifting on defense by Coach Mal Mackey and his assistants. The shifts have now had two games of testing and the acid test should be against the Steelmen, who have lost only to Sandusky, 20-12.

Major shift has been the moving of 200-pound Tim Arndt from a regular linebacking slot to the 'monster' on the Ross defense, a roving cornerback who is always to the strong side of the opponents offense. Rick Brunner, a 195-pounder, moved into the vacant linebacker spot to team with Mike Hetrick, 185. Bob Frye, a 195-pound senior, and Brad Lawrence, 200-pound junior, have established themselves as the defensive tacklers. John Babione, 185, remains at one defensive end while a battle continues to determine the starter at the other terminal between 240-pound sophomore Dave Rhodes and 180-pound junior Jon Zink.

One result of the shifts has been a closer approach to two-platoon football. On the line, which the exception of Hetrick at guard and linebacker, there are no Little Giants having to go both ways.

In the backfield Arndt still works both ways including offensive fullback, and Dave Longanbach has added another speedster to the defensive backfield. Longanbach is a starting offensive halfback. The Ross coaches have settled in the last two games on a defensive secondary comprised of Longanbach, Bob Mackey, Steve Parker and Arndt.

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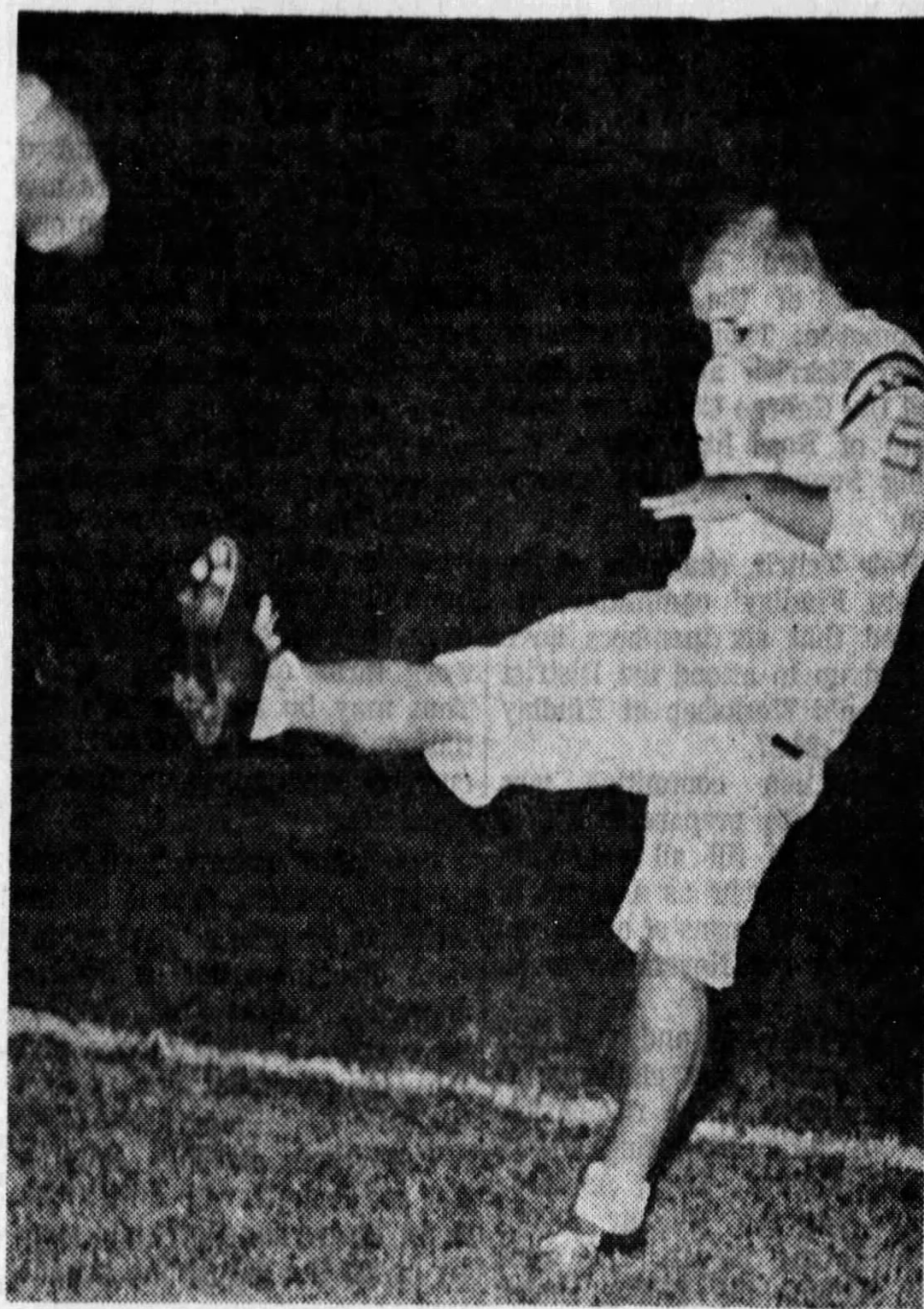

Unbeaten Dallas, Cards Clash In NFL

The St. Louis Cardinals, who insist they're a 60-minute club but keep doing the job in half an hour, should have little time to spare when they tackle supercharged Dallas Sunday in a National Football League showdown.

A capacity crowd of 50,000 — largest ever for a pro football game in St. Louis — is expected to watch the Cardinals and Cowboys, only unbeaten NFL teams, tangle in a pivotal Eastern Conference test.

St. Louis leads the East with a 5-0 record, with Dallas one-half game back at 4-0. But, while the Cardinals have come from behind four times in the second half, the Cowboys, led by quarterback Don Meredith, have breezed along, rolling up an average of just under 46 points per game.

"We're a 60-minute ball club," Larry Wilson, the Cardinals' aggressive defensive back, said before last Sunday's game against New York. Then the Cardinals, behind 13-0 at half-time, staged a furious second half rally for a 24-19 nod over the winless Giants. St. Louis outscored its opponents 10-16 after intermission.

"Things happen to us in the first half, but we keep coming," said Charlie Winner, St. Louis' first-year coach. "We will have to be consistent to beat the Cowboys. They're the finest football team I've seen in a long time."

Meredith leads the NFL in passing, has thrown for 14 touchdowns and has not been intercepted in his last 12 games. Bob Hayes, his swiftest receiver, has caught seven touchdowns passes, and halfback Dan Reeves is the league's top scorer with eight TDs — five via passes.

Charlie Johnson, the Cardinals' passer, also has excellent receivers in Jackie Smith, Bob by Joe Conrad, Billy Gambrell and Sonny Randle. Rookie Johnny Roland adds punch to the St. Louis running game and leads the league in punt returns.

Sunday's key game at the St. Western Conference pits defending champion Green Bay, upset by San Francisco last weekend, 6-0 against the resurgent Chicago Bears at Chicago. The Packers share the Western lead with the Los Angeles Rams at 4-1. Chicago dropped its first two starts but has rebounded with victories over Minnesota and Baltimore.

Elsewhere, the Rams invade Minnesota, 9-3-1; the Colts, 2-2, entertain Detroit, 2-3; San Francisco, 1-3-1, at Atlanta, 0-5; Philadelphia, 2-3, at Pittsburgh,

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When the Steelers set their sights on the goal line they wasted little time. The scoring play was a two-yard plunge by Tim Arndt from fullback, but Jim Daniels turned in the most spectacular play of the game. Surrounded by double coverage, Daniels stopped short and leaped between four outstretched hands of defenders to pull down a 25-yard Raines pass. The reception came on a third down and 10 yards to go play, giving Ross first down on the Lorain 11-yard line. An offside play against Lorain a d two plays later Arndt scored.

In the first 19 minutes and 25 seconds of the second half Lorain had the ball only for two series, failed to get a first down and ran only eight plays including two punts.

Even with the touchdown drive in the final four minutes Lorain ran only 17 plays from scrimmage to 34 for Ross.

The difference in the contest had to be quarterback Terry King, who carried the ball 11 times for 65 yards and completed six of 14 passes for 133 yards and two touchdowns.

In the locker room even the lights were against the Ross coaching staff. The lights kept going off after the game as the coaching staff pondered what had gone wrong. Head Coach Mal Mackey muttered, "We can't put one ball game together. . . . Just a couple mistakes, that's the way it is every week."

jans, Coach Hal Paul in Findlay was telling listeners, "If we can hold up physically, I think we have a pretty good chance of winning."

Findlay appraisal of the Fremont team is that it is a step slower than the Trojans and not either as fast or big as the three teams which have beaten Findlay.

Veteran Backfield

Coach Paul has a veteran backfield with which to work,

including the fullback, 225-pound Roger Beery. At halfbacks will be Raul Martinez, 165, who played quarterback some last year, and Steve Traucht, 175. At quarterback is Steve Woodruff, 170, who lettered at that position a year ago.

Ross' Mackey noted that playing Findlay presents special defensive problems. "They use funny formations, something different every week. They change formations a lot and never try the same thing."

To date Findlay has shown a preference to off tackle and sweeps on the ground, plus the quarterback's like to pass. On the line offensively they will use both a balanced line with a split end and then flop the end to give an unbalanced line.

So far this season Findlay has stopped Fostoria, 20-6; Toledo Start, 28-15, and Toledo Whitmer, 22-0, before falling to Lorain, 20-19; Elyria, 35-8, and Sandusky, 36-6.

One Common Foe

The only common foe of Ross and Findlay would seem to indicate a tight game Friday night. Findlay was edged by Lorain, 20-19, and the Steelmen last week nipped Ross, 16-14.

In the backfield Findlay for the most part is overbalanced to give a power formation. Coach Paul likes to send a back in motion, throw on tackle eligible play and the Findlay favorite is the quarterback power sweep. Woodruff has been the team's second leading gainer behind this offensive style.

Leading ground-gainer is the speedy Martinez, while Beery is short yardage insurance with his bulk.

It will be homecoming for Findlay.

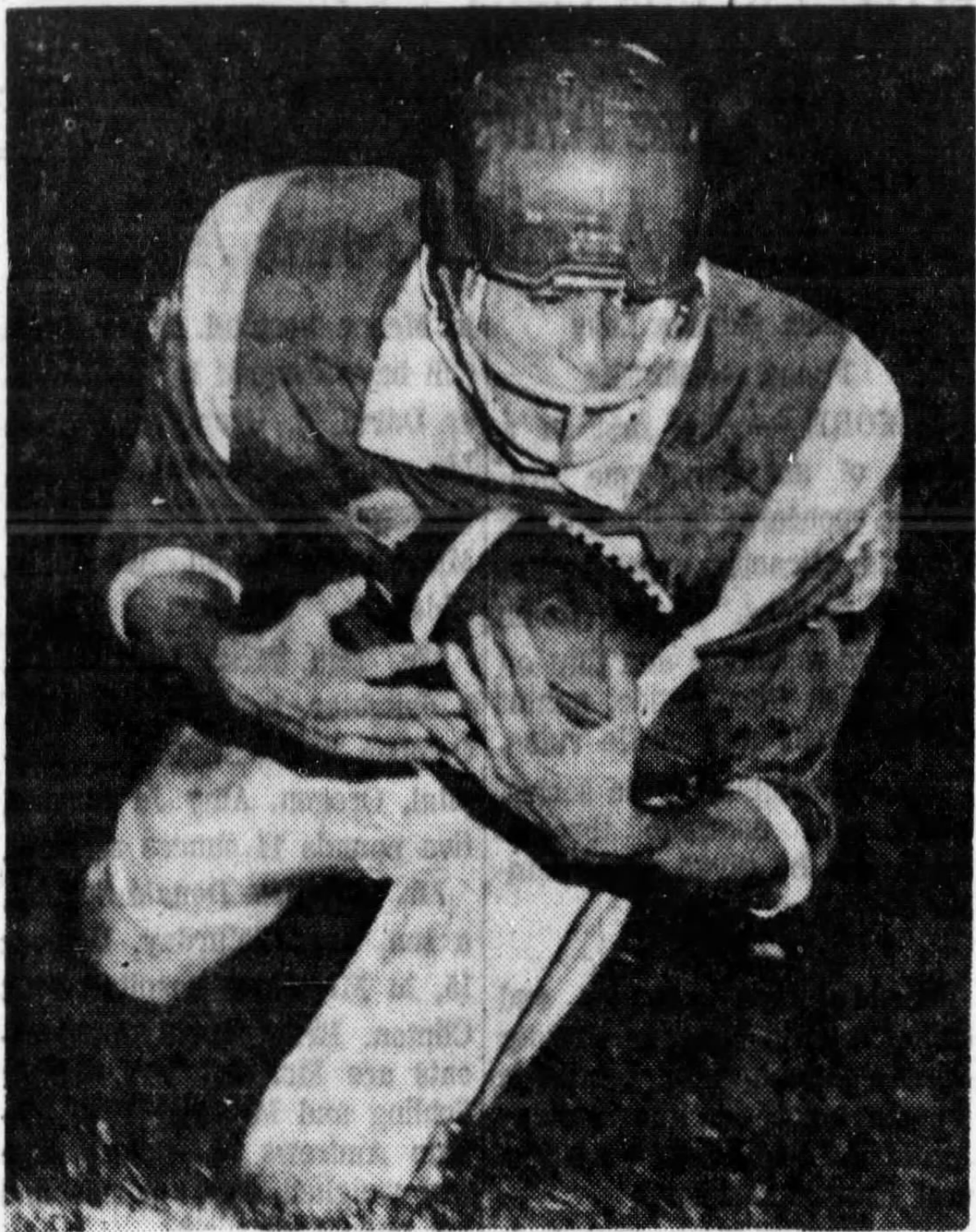

Ross Leads Statistics, Trojans Capitalize On Breaks For Victory

FINDLAY — Fremont Ross outgained the home town Trojans Friday night, but fell victim of a poor first half, falling 29-20. It was the first Buckeye Conference victory for Findlay.

Inability to handle the roll-outs of quarterback Steve Woodruff in the first quarter, two breaks which gave Findlay the ball deep in Ross territory, a pass interception at the goal line and a 62-yard run called back by a penalty were the difference in the game.

Before the game Findlay coach Hal Paul had estimated his team was a half - step faster than the visiting Little Giants. That estimate might have been accurate and the difference in the game. The Little Giants were a trifle slow reacting when quarterback Steve Woodruff rolled out in the first quarter.

Woodruff raced to gains of 22, 9 and six yards on the initial Findlay drive. This drive which was the only sustained Findlay march of the game carried 58 yards in nine plays with Woodruff's six - yard gainer the scoring play.

Better Second Half

Ross picked up its defensive reactions in the second half and added a strong offense. The result was a second half of good Ross football but the Little Giants couldn't overcome the 15-point hole they had dug for themselves in the first 12 minutes of play.

The visiting team dominated the statistics but still came up short on the all important scoreboard. Ross led in first downs, yards gained rushing and passing. Steve Raines had his finest passing night at quarterback. From scrimmage Raines completed 10 of 13 passes and had only one intercepted. Three of Raines' completions were for touchdowns.

Coach Mal Mackey rhetorically questioned his players in the locker room after the game, "You played a great second half, but why do you have to wait so long."

The play which well could have been the difference was a 62-yard run to the Findlay two-yard line by Arndt, which was nullified by a penalty call. Officials claimed a Ross blocker was guilty of an illegal clip. The run would have put Ross in position to tie the score at 22-22 with nearly 10 minutes to play in the game.

Surrender Football

Instead, Ross was forced to give up the ball at the Findlay 46-yard line on a fourth down fumble. Four plays later, including a 35-yard run by Raul Martinez, Woodruff hit Steve Traucht for a 19-yard touchdown pass. This and an extra point kick gave Findlay an unsurmountable 28-14 lead with 1:47 to play. In that final minute and 47 seconds Ross came back to score.

After scoring on the sustained drive the first time they had the ball, Findlay Trojans had to drive only 22 and 21 yards for their second and third touchdowns.

The first time Ross had the ball a John Pasch punt was blocked by Vern Preston, Findlay end. The Trojans recovered on the Ross 22 and on third down Woodruff hit Joe Goodart with a 22-yard scoring pass.

Next Findlay touchdown was set up by a Ross fumble. Halfback Jim Daniels was hit hard and the ball was shook from his grasp with Findlay recovering at the 21-yard line. Again it took only three plays with the tally on a 14 - yard offensive dash by Martinez.

Grind Out Touchdown

Ross scored the first time in grind it out fashion, led by full-back Tim Arndt. It took the Little Giants 16 plays to drive 65 yards. Long gainer of the drive was a 19 rollout by Raines, but Arndt eight of the 16 plays for 7 yards in the drive.

Raines spotted the defense tightening down the middle on first and goal at the two-yard line. He had end Jeff Wise flare

out to the right and Raines hit him for the touchdown. The pair collaborated for the identical play to add the extra points.

A 49-yard punt by John Pasch put Findlay in a hole in the opening minutes of the second half. Failing to get a first down, Trojans punted with Woodruff under a heavy rush getting off only a 27-yard kick.

Ross again had Arndt and Dave Longanbach pounding between the tackles behind good blocks until the Little Giants moved to the Findlay five-yard line. There Raines hit Longanbach with a touchdown pass.

Ross' final tally was a six-yard Raines to Phil Tooman pass. Ross moved 66 yards with four pass completions to score, including a 39-yard gain on a screen pass to Tim Arndt.

The Little Giants were on the verge of a touchdown in the second quarter when Woodruff intercepted a pass at the goal line. Raines threw toward Dave Longanbach with second down and the line of scrimmage on the Findlay 17-yard line. The pass was high and it went off the tips of Longanbach's fingers into Woodruff's arms.

Arndt was the workhorse of the game with 23 carries and 115 yards gained. The victory could have been costly since both Arndt and Pasch were injured. Arndt continued despite the second quarter shoulder injury. Doctors after the game believed it was a pulled ligament, but will order x-rays today to determine extent of injury.

Pasch with an apparent concussion was taken to Findlay hospital and then home with his parents. Dr. E. C. Swint, team physician, reported x-rays showed no skull fracture. Pasch also will be further examined today.

Eighty - six of the Sandusky points have come in the first period and only twice this year has Sandusky failed to score the first time they held the ball.

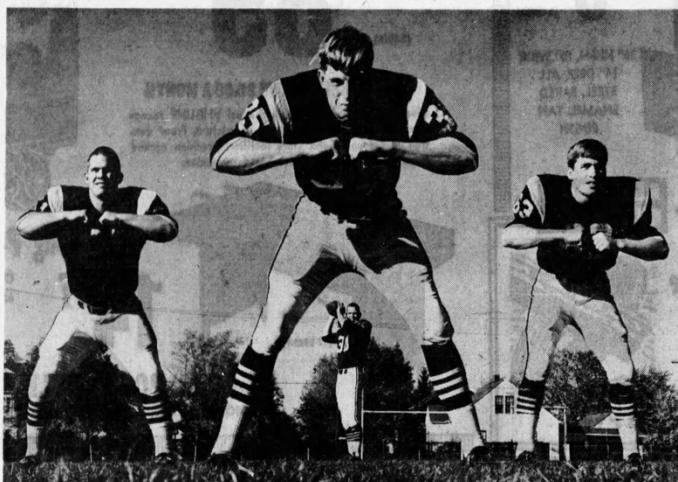
The Blue Streaks boast size, but are not as big as the 1965 state championship team. The probable starting lineup for Sandusky will boast a 196-pound line and 182-pound backfield on offense for an overall average of 192. Defensively, Sandusky will have a front five averaging 203.5 pounds.

Offensively the Blue Streaks have the constant threat of breakaway speed in any one of four running backs. Fastest and most shifty is likely Arny Keys, who has been hampered some this season by an ankle injury. When Keys is not able to go, Isavelt Amison moves into the lineup and has averaged 7.4 yards per carry. All four main running backs for the Blue Streaks have averaged more than six yards per carry.

Keys, Isavelt Amison and Willie Amison, state hurdles champion, are the main speed threats.

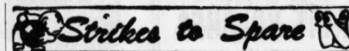

QUESTION MARKS MANY FOR ROSS

Limping Little Giants Face Elyria In Final Home Game

Can a team bounce back from a 74-0 whipping? Will the wet, snowy weather be a help or a hindrance? Will two injured backs be able to play? These are all questionmarks which hang over the Fremont Ross practice field this week.

All the answers will be supplied Friday night when Ross plays its final home game of the year against Elyria. Elyria, 6-1-1, is currently in second place in the Buckeye Conference. The only Pioneer loss was 26-12 to unbeaten Sandusky.

Ross Coach Mal Mackey and his staff are faced with a morale building task, as well as

a mending job on the Little Giants to fill vacancies left by injuries. The loss to Sandusky was a costly one with fullback Tim Arndt and halfback Dave Longanbach on the extremely doubtful list.

Return To Practice

Both Arndt and Longanbach were back on the practice field for the first time Wednesday, according to Mackey. Loss of Arndt and Longanbach would take the top two rushers and scorers out of the lineup. It would also erase two first teamers from the defense, the top backfield blocker and the top

pass receiver on the Little Giants.

With Arndt erased on a high, hard but clean block by Ed Williams on the fifth play of the Sandusky game, the Ross offense was hapless. Arndt's substitute John Burkin did a commendable job and was the leading Ross ground - gainer, but the threat was not the same as with the speedy Arndt. The senior's elimination also left a defensive gap against the end run, a main forte of Sandusky's attack. Arndt plays the defensive 'Monster' a roving back that protects the strong side. If Arndt and Longanbach are

out of action Fremont will go with Burkin at fullback. Jim Daniels and Jon Swartz, a pair of juniors, will then run at the halfbacks. Swartz or Daniels will be in the lineup to pair with Longanbach if the team co-captain is ready for action.

Parents' Night

In looking forward to the Friday game, which will be parents' night, Mackey pointed to Jack Beidleman, halfback, and Al Robinson, fullback, as the men to stop. 'Beidleman seems to be able to go anywhere,' noted Mackey. Scouts warn that the 180 - pound Robinson and

halfback Tim Johnson, 165, are both quick and powerful.

Like Sandusky, which humiliated Ross a week ago, speed is the main Elyria danger. The two teams are similar with breakaway speed around the ends. Elyria, despite its 116 size, has good speed all over, according to Ross scouting reports.

The effects of the whipping by Sandusky didn't seem to show Wednesday as Coach Mackey worked his team outsize in the wet snow. The Little Giants might have to face this kind of weather Friday and Mackey wanted them to get a

taste of it. When asked about the session in the foul weather, Mackey stated, "Attitude was real good. It (the Sandusky defeat) didn't seem to bother them. I think they can snap back from it. . . . We have to have one good game some time."

Wet Field Promise

There is question whether the good Wednesday practice session in the cold, wet weather is a good or bad omen. The Wednesday scrimmage before the Sandusky game was rated by Ross coaches as the 'most spirited in years'.

The forecast wet field could help neutralize the superior Elyria speed, but also could be an advantage to a heavier Pioneer line.

Norm Weiser, Booster Club chairman of the Parents' Night program, has requested all parents of varsity players to meet at 7:15 p.m. Friday. They will gather initially at the rear of the stadium south ramp. Both Mothers and Fathers of the players will be introduced prior to the game. Fathers will wear a placard with their son's jersey number and mothers will be presented flowers.

BEST SINCE TILLER:

Elyria Features Beidleman Scampers

Most exciting runner in the Buckeye Conference will lead Elyria into Fremont for Friday night's encounter with Ross Little Giants. Jack Beidleman is the man to watch in a Pioneer attack which like Sandusky is built on speed.

The acrobatic Beidleman is the key runner, but far from being the lone threat. He is joined in the backfield by two other running backs with speedy credentials, Al Robinson at Fullback and Tim Johnson at the other halfback.

Cementing it all together is the quarterbacking of Rick Bishop, a 170 - pounder.

"I think he is the best half-

back in the conference since Tiller," stated Marion Harding Coach Jed Middleton last Friday. Middleton was comparing Beidleman to All-Ohio Jim Tiller, former Fremont Ross star. Middleton had good reason to heap praise on Beidleman, because the 140 - pound speedster had just scored five times against Harding.

Leads Conference

The 30 - point outburst made Beidleman the leading scorer in the Buckeye Conference with 76 points. He is eight points ahead of Sandusky's Ed Williams. In all games Beidleman has tallied 100 points.

Unless the Little Giants can

do what only one other team has accomplished this season, Beidleman will top the 1,000 yards gained mark Friday night. Beidleman has 943 yards going into the Ross game. Only team to effectively box Beidleman has been Sandusky, which held him to 21 yards in nine carries.

Robinson and Johnson are both closing in on the 300 - yard rushing mark.

With this trio of runners leading the way Elyria has gained 1,781 yards in eight games. The Pioneers of Coach Bill Barton have scored 187 points while limiting the opposition to 37. An opening game with Barberton, 6-6, and a loss to Sandusky, 20-12, are the only bad marks on the Elyria schedule. The Pioneers have stopped West Tech, 31-0; Cuyahoga Falls, 25-12; Admiral King, 18-8; Findlay, 35-8; Mansfield, 28-0, and Marion, 32-3.

Barion Gentleman

In the Marion game, Coach Middleton frankly admitted the score could have been much worse. Beidleman scored his five touchdowns although play-

'PRO SET' OFFENSE PLANNED BY MACKEY

Wide Open Attack To Be Ross Theme At Admiral King Finale

The air will be full of football Friday night in Lorain. That is the promise of Coach Mal Mackey as his Ross Little Giants prepare an attempt to salvage some respectability in the final game of the football season.

Early season predictions would have indicated a wide-open game, but the team throwing the safety valve to the winds would have been Admiral King, the Friday host to Ross. As the season progressed, injuries have changed the outlook of both teams involved in the season finale.

Willie Rice, 175-pound speedster for King, has been used in only token appearances since the third game of the season due to injury. Injury and suspension have left Ross without

two of its three running backs who were expected to be the core of a strong power ground game. The third of these backs, Dave Longanbach, will be in uniform, but a leg injury could limit his use.

Definitely out of uniform are Craig Swartz, who was dropped from the team prior to mid-season, and Tim Arndt, injured against Findlay and Sandusky and then re-injured against Elyria last Friday. Arndt is done for the year with a knee injury of yet undetermined seriousness.

Now Power Team

The hand of fate has turned Admiral King into a power team with big fullback John Milam cutting big hunks of yardage behind a line led by a pair of 220-pound tackles.

Mackey has said his Little Giants will work mainly from a pro-set offense Friday night. The passing of quarterback Steve Raines and catching ability of an end and halfback corps will be key to this type of attack. The pro set will employ both flankers and split ends.

With development of Longanbach, Jeff Wise, Phil Tooman and Jim Daniels as downfield pass reception threats, Ross has had good accuracy in the aerial game. Offsetting this has been long losses when Raines elected to eat the ball.

As a passer Raines has completed 41 of 75 passes, nearly 52 per cent of those thrown. Six of nine Ross passes in the first nine games have been on aials.

Mackey has come up with more lineup juggling, caused by injuries and surprising performances last week against Elyria. Sophomore Mark Weiser, 150, and junior Mike Holman, 160, despite relatively small size found themselves homes at defensive end in the Pioneer game. As an award for their performances Mackey has tabbed the two boys as defensive starters Friday.

Arndt was not the only knee victim last week and the coaching staff has had to fill in for John Pasch at offensive guard. John Babione, originally a guard who played all this year as a defensive end, filled in for Pasch the second half against Elyria. He will again be at offensive guard for Admiral King.

Pick a card, any card, might be the halfback selection method. Longanbach, if his sore leg will allow, is slated at one halfback. Jim Daniels and John Schwartz, a junior and a sophomore, will be the other halfbacks. Any two of this trio could be in the starting lineup. John Burkin, who did a strong job in two appearances for the injured Arndt, will be a fixture at fullback.

Milam Near Record

In the Admiral King attack fullback John Milam will be taking aim at the career rushing record of the Lorain school. He needs 71 more yards to overtake Joe Payne's record. The King power back has 1,486 yards gained in his three-year career while Payne has logged 1,586.

Last week in the 44-6 King loss to Sandusky Milam topped the single season rushing mark of Joe Kozar, now fullback at University of Miami, O., with his 969th yard.

A pair of fleet halfbacks, Fred Montgomery and Gordon Taylor, and quarterback Fred Stittak fill out the King backfield. Montgomery and Taylor have been near twins in the Admiral attack. Montgomery has gained 230 yards and averaged 4.0 yards per carry. Taylor has run for 220 yards and averaged 4.1 per carry. Milam has juggled the ball 200 times, compared to 57 for Montgomery and 54 for Taylor. He has a 4.8 yard per carry average.

King so far this season has won five and lost four games.

They are 3-3 in Buckeye Conference play. In the Buckeye Sandusky needs only to get past Mansfield, 5-3-1, 3-3, to preserve an unbeaten year and win the conference title. Only team with a chance at a tie is Elyria which is at home against Lorain, 7-2, 4-2. Elyria is 5-1 in the league.

In other area action all games are independent on this final weekend of the season, except one in Sandusky Bay Conference and three in the Great Lakes. Toledo Rogers of Great Lakes and Sandusky St. Mary's of Sandusky Bay have already clinched league ties and need only final game wins for undisputed titles. Sandusky St. Mary's is unbeaten and Rogers has not lost since his opening game defeat by Fremont Ross.

Ohio High School Football Supremacy Shows Signs Of Slipping From Northeast

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Football supremacy enjoyed the last two decades by northeast Ohio scholastic teams may be shifting to other sections of the state.

At least a trio of Columbus area schools and others in southwest Ohio could make that claim.

Such schools as Columbus Wattersen (9-0), Columbus

Eastmoor (9-0), Upper Arlington (9-0), Hamilton Garfield (8-0) and Cincinnati Elder (8-1) undoubtedly would support that contention.

But Marv Moorehead, coach at No. 1 ranked Upper Arlington, has another theory.

"I've never been convinced that any one section has a monopoly on good players or good teams. Cincinnati has had good teams for years but you never hear much from that area," Moorehead said.

"I think the northeast emphasizes football more than other locales and perhaps they're a bit more vociferous than schools in the south."

Moorehead, 39, another in a long line of Miami (Ohio) products, faces the biggest challenge of his 16-year coaching career Friday.

The top-ranked Golden Bears collide with unbeaten Wattersen, ranked fifth, in a conflict that could determine the mythical state championship.

"Rankings are nice but Friday night is the only thing that counts," Moorehead said.

"The only poll we're interested in comes out next week." The Associated Press final rankings will be announced

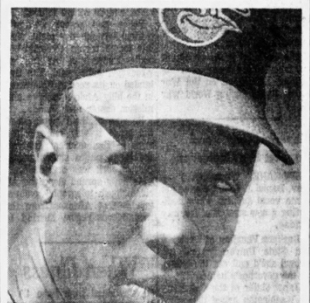
In the American League, Oakland visits Denver, Miami plays at New York, Buffalo is at Houston and Boston is in Kansas City.

ROBINSON ON BATTING — 3:

Fear At Bat Must Be Conquered

BALTIMORE (AP) — All the physical attributes in the world can't help a baseball batter if he's shy at the plate.

There's no doubt that fear is a problem that must be conquered. You can't tell a kid not to be afraid of the ball and make him stand at the plate. It's got to come from within.

But shyness isn't confined to youngsters. It takes continuing courage for a major leaguer to hold his ground in the batter's box with the ball zipping in from 60 feet away at 90 or more miles an hour.

Pitchers have found it doesn't pay to knock down certain batters because it doesn't accom-

plish anything. But some batters get back on their heels after being brushed back or knocked down, and the pitcher slips a breaking ball over the outside corner.

That's the purpose of the duster — to make the batter think. Naturally, a batter should do some thinking. But there is some truth to the old joke about thinking too much. Especially when it results in fear.

On the way to the plate I review the game situation and try to remember how the pitcher has worked on me in the past and which pitch he relies on when he's in trouble.

Those are the only three things a batter should think about. Then he should be prepared to hit what he sees.

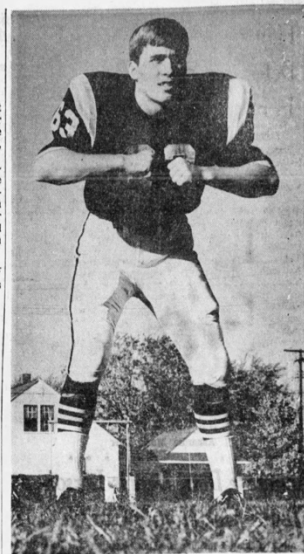
Even when I'm hitting well, I look for the pitcher to throw the same stuff that he has thrown me out with before.

Baseball is a constant battle between the pitcher and batter. Both change strategy, and it's a question of which is the quicker to adjust.

Arndt, still on crutches from the leg injury which put him out of action, was the major trophy winner at the annual Fall Sports Banquet Monday night in the Ross cafeteria.

At the same time Mike Hetrick, All Buckeye Conference linebacker named this week to play in the Ohio North-South All-Star game, was named out-

standing defensive player. Trophy for the outstanding offensive player went to quarterback and co-captain Steve Raines.

Arndt was the workhorse of the Ross offense and also the "Monster" in the Little Giant defense. Arndt was first injured in the first three minutes of the Sandusky game. He came back in the Elyria game and played little over one quarter before re-injuring the leg. He missed all of the final game with Admiral King.

In presenting the MVP trophy to Arndt, head coach Mal Mackey stated, "Without this boy we couldn't go." Mackey said there was no doubt among the coaches concerning who was the most valuable of the Little Giants.

Hetrick, most frequently spotted by opposing coaches as the man you had to get past, has received several honors since the end of the season. The linebacker was named all-conference, all-district on two wire service polls and to the North-South game.

Raines during the season completed 46 of 94 passes for 570 yards and six touchdowns. He had 10 passes intercepted during the season. In addition to the six touchdowns passes, he scored two touchdowns and six extra points.

The trophy awards were the highlight of player introductions for football and cross country teams honored at the banquet. They were immediately prior to the main address by Al Parker, freshman football coach at Purdue university.

Veterans Mentor Still To Teach, Head Wrestling, Future Indefinite

An era of football which brought four Buckeye Conference championships to Fremont ended Thursday night when Mal Mackey resigned as head football coach. Mackey, dean of the Buckeye Conference coaches, ended 17 years at the Ross high school.

The resignation as football coach was presented to the Fremont Board of Education at its regular December meeting in the Gusdorf building. It was accepted by the board with no discussion and by unanimous vote.

The one-sentence letter of resignation from Mackey was addressed to President Davis Sunderland and was presented to the board by Dr. Robert B. Oldfather. Oldfather said he had not received the resignation until 4:30 p.m. Thursday.

Text of the resignation was simply: "I hereby submit my resignation as football coach." Board members asked Dr. Oldfather to send Mackey a letter expressing appreciation of all board members for his service as football coach here for the past 17 years.

The superintendent was asked by a newsman if Mr. Mackey had been requested to resign. In reply, he stated he had no comment to make.

Dr. Oldfather said his resignation as football coach is effective as of now, but the resignation did not affect his contracts as physical education teacher and as head wrestling coach. Mackey in a telephone conversation Thursday night expressed an intention to remain as teacher and wrestling coach until at least the end of the year.

He admitted his future plans were somewhat indefinite, but stated he definitely would like to continue in coaching. There have been hints of Mackey's return to college coaching ranks. In addition to his fine high school record, he has assisted

on coaching staffs at his alma mater, Purdue, and at Western Reserve.

Coach Mackey has been both head football and head wrestling coach for the past 17 years. For 11 years he was also track coach, seven years as head coach and four years as assistant. While he teaches physical education now, he formerly taught history, geography and economics.

All together, Mackey has been in coaching 24 years. His record at Ross was 112 wins in 170 games. Mackey coached Little Giant teams had four undefeated seasons, four Buckeye Conference championships or co-championships and posted a 30 game win streak. On one wire service poll a Ross team under Mackey was named top team in Ohio in the mid 1960s.

Until this season when it was broken by Sandusky Mackey teams had the record of 15 consecutive Buckeye Conference victories.

Prior to coming to Fremont Coach Mackey had three undefeated years and two mythical Indiana State Champions at West Lafayette, Ind. He coached previously at West Lafayette and Rensselaer in Indiana and Leyton, Ill.

Ross teams have won only 14 games in the last four seasons after an 8-2 record in 1962.
