## DISCUS RECORD SET AS PURPLE WINS IN WALK

Bob Thomson Hurts Plat-  
ter 128 Feet, 1 Inch;  
Bob Shaw Stars

Coach Harold (Whitney) Al-  
hoff Thursday had his first con-  
ception of his 1939 Fremont Ross  
team and held his first meet  
following an 88-2 to 51-1-3  
Little Giant triumph over the  
thin-clad squad of Oak Harbor  
high in a practice dual at Har-  
mon field Wednesday afternoon.

With both Alhoff and Coach  
Sam Owens of Oak Harbor con-  
sidering the season-opening meet  
primarily a conditioning affair, ex-  
cept for a condition rating, the competi-  
tion key-note was the vice, held on a  
chill, windswept course with many  
of the tracksters performing under  
wraps.

The Fremont mentor used his

entire squad which walked off with  
first places in 11 of the 14 events.  
Featuring the meet were the record  
breaking performance of Bob  
Thomson in the high jump and con-  
tinued power collecting of Bob  
Shaw, Dick Manahan and Clar-  
ence Chestnutwood.

**Lightweight Platter.**  
Thomson's Little Giant weight  
veteran, sailed the discus 128 feet,  
1 inch to shatter the old school  
record of 109 feet, 9 inches, estab-  
lished by Lee Moore in 1933, and  
easily won the discus with marks of  
130 feet, 11 inches. In no way at-  
tempting to discredit Thomson,  
however, Coach Alhoff pointed out  
that the iron platter being used in  
high school competition this year  
is seven ounces lighter than the  
one previously used.

Shaw, Ross high's stellar all-  
around athlete, showed remarkable  
versatility in coping with the  
shotput and 100-yard high hurdles  
and taking seconds in the discus  
and high jump. Shaw's 112 feet, 11  
inch discus toss also broke the  
school record.

Chesnutwood, brilliant Purple

sophomore prospect, romped home

first in the century and anchored

the winning Ross half-mile and

mile relay teams. Manahan, seen  
some fine holding, won the

broad jump, took third in the low

hurdles and left off the sprint re-  
lay.

### Hornacek Stars

Star for the Oak Harbor team  
was Hornacek, who snared two of  
his squad's three firsts, coping the  
pole-vault and high jump. Jack  
Chestnutwood, brother of Clarence  
who attended the Oak Harbor com-  
mon school, accounted for Oak Harbor's  
only other first, edging Gale Berger  
of Ross in a thrilling half-mile  
duel. Chestnutwood finished in  
2:18.4, inches ahead of the tall Ross  
runner who staged a sizzling  
stretch drive.

Except for Thompson's effort in

the discus, the meet was typical of  
the season's first and perhaps  
was only average. The Little  
Giants scored a slam in only one

event, the quarter mile, won by

Burdette Ballard, rangy veteran,

with Carl Huddie, his anchoring

Bud Goodwin of Ross and Chuck  
Immer of Oak Harbor both ran to a  
close finish in the 100-yard high

Shaw won the shotput with a  
toss of 44 feet, 2 inches and coped  
the high hurdles in 10.3 seconds.

Clarence Chestnutwood was  
clocked in 11.3 as he won the 100.

Henry Sevell, Fremont's district  
cross-country champion and home  
boy in the mile in 5:21, finished  
easily by Burdette Khuwittier, a  
teammate. The Ross 880-yard relay  
team of Manahan, Clark, Jackson  
and Chestnutwood, walked away  
with the race in 1:54.2. Hornacek's  
two bests in the high jump were  
5 feet, 2 inches, while Manahan  
took the broad jump, clearing 17  
feet, 10 inches. Will Clark of  
Ross moved his heels to the field  
in taking the 220 in 25.4 seconds.

Fremont's victorious mile relay  
team, comprised of Huddie, Huf-

# Little Giant Thinlies Face Dual Vie With Little Drill

Coach Althoff to Use Entire Roster in Meet at Harmon Field; Cold Weather Slows Practice of Purple Since Taking to Outdoors

With scarcely a single good workout to their credit since taking to the outdoors several weeks ago, the thin-clads of Fremont Ross face their first real test of the season Friday afternoon, meeting Bowling Green high in a dual encounter at Harmon field. The opening event is scheduled for 4 p. m.

While the Little Giant charges of Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff romped over Oak Harbor in a practice meet here last week, the performance of virtually the entire team was far below par and showed need of strenuous conditioning.

#### Will be Stronger

Since that time, weather has made impossible any stiff drills and consequently Coach Althoff will still be experimenting when his team takes the track against the Bee Gees. Little is known of the Bowling Green cinder squad, although the Wood county school undoubtedly will prove stronger than Oak Harbor.

Fremont's entries in the century dash will include Clarence Chestnutwood, Willie Clark, Dick Frantz and LaMar Seibert. Frantz and Clark, as well as Bob Jackson and Charles Foster will compete in the 220. Coach Althoff stated that three berths on the sprint relay were filled, but that a fourth member would be decided in time trials Thursday. The three certain to run are Dick Manahan, Clark and Chestnutwood, while the other will be selected from among Jackson, Frantz, Foster and Paul Huddle.

#### Sewel in Distances

Burdette Ballard, Carl Hufford and Huddle will step off the 440, while half-mile entries include Gale Berger, Jack Arnold, Henry Sewell and Jim Filson. Sewell also will run in the mile, as will Burdette Klawitter, Melvin Jacobs and Vernon Bray.

Assigned to skim the low hurdles are Bud Goodwin, Manahan and Charles Robertson, while entries in the high timber event are Mana-

han, Goodwin and Bob Shaw. Jack Carroll, Delbert Little and Jim Vaffis are entered in the pole vault.

#### Reserve Meet

Although Manahan is the only veteran in the broad jump, Hufford, Carl Erchenbrecher and Bill Jenkins also are entered in this event. High jump entries include Shaw, Seibert and Jenkins. The "strong man trio" of Shaw, Bob Thomson and Al Koebel will participate in both the shotput and discus. Both Thomson and Shaw last week cracked the old school record in the discus.

Coach Althoff stated an attempt would be made to use his entire squad, with extra events being staged to accommodate those officially entered in the meet. He also announced that a Ross reserve team would trek to Elmore Thursday afternoon, April 20, to meet Harris-Elmore high.

## Bob Shaw Tosses Shot 49½ Feet For New Field Record

Bob Thomson Also Cracks Mark in Discus Throw as Purple Thinlies Romp Away with 11 Firsts in Second Dual Win Here; Triangular Next

With two easy dual victories under its belt, the Fremont Ross track and field team Tuesday started work in preparation for its first stiff competition of the season—a triangular meet with Woodward and DeVilbiss high schools of Toledo at 2 p. m., Saturday at Harmon field.

The Little Giant thunders on. Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff annexed their second straight dual triumph Monday afternoon here, crushing Bowing Green high. The meet was stung in the teeth of a stiff southwest wind, making all finishes difficult.

Displaying improved form in almost all departments, the Rossman set the first and 11 second places, cracking two old field records in the mashes.

### Smashes Two Marks

Bob Shaw, husky junior, winged the shotput 49 feet ½ inch to beat the old record of 48 feet, 2½ inches, set by Wigham of Findlay in 1937. The toss also smashed Shaw's old school standard of 47 feet, 1½ inches established in 1938.

Bob Thomson continued the record-breaking pace he started two weeks ago in the meet against Oak Harbor, by sailing the discus 132 feet, 2½ inches, shattering the nine-year-old school mark of 128 feet, 11 inches run up by Blum of Tiffin in 1930. Subtracting to an extent from the feat, however, is the fact that Thomson hurled a discus seven inches shorter than the 139 feet in interscholastic competition until this season. But the effort bettered Thomson's old school record of 128 feet, 1 inch, set with the lighter platter in the Oak Harbor meet.

### Double Winner

Setting the pace in the Purple triumph were Henry Sewell, who scored firsts in the mile and half-mile, while Ross' third, Foster, was 220 yards in the 100-yard member of the victorious 880-yard relay team; Clarence Chestnutwood, victor in the century and sprinter, and William Ross sprinter and miler, combined. Shaw won first in the shotput and seconds in the high jump and discus; and Dick Manahan first in the broad jump, second in the 120-yard low hurdles, and member of the sprint relay.

Glen Miller's triumph in the high jump and Hugh Lambert's winning performance in the pole vault gave Bowing Green its only first places.

Each coach, however, thought the two places would go to his team in any event although each coach entered as many men as he wished. Ross lost several possible slams.

### Second Marks

Chestnutwood won the 100 by a scant margin over Clark in 11.4 seconds. Emerson Avery of Bowing Green, was third. A special Ross 100 was copped by Schneider, with Robertson second, Foster third and Emerson Avery fourth. Winning time was 11.6 seconds.

Sewell romped home first in the mile after trailing Burdette Klawitter for a lap. Klawitter was second and Somers of Bowing Green, third. Sewell was clocked in 5:10.3.

The Ross quartet of Manahan, Huddle, Clark and Chestnutwood won the sprint relay in 1:40.9, after Huddle made a brilliant sprint, following a falter in the first baton exchange.

Other Fremont sprint relay teams competing, but failing to figure in the scoring were Bower, Edwards, Frantz and Jackson, and Stevens, Lytle, R. Clark and Williams.

Al Koebel placed second to Shaw in the shotput and Harold Rader of Bowing Green third. Both of them took the 490 in 7.3, warding off the challenges of Carl Hufford and John Cottler, both teammates. Hufford finished second and V. Chamberlain of Bowing Green, after taking the fading Cottler in the stretch.

### Goodwin Cope

Bud Goodwin fished on in top in the 120-yard low hurdles in 15.4, defeating by three yards, Charles H. Miller of Ross, fourth, whose performance did not count.

Manahan was third and Avery of Bowing Green, fourth. Carroll, clearing nine feet, seven inches, placed second. Lambert of Bowing Green in the pole vault, Bates of Bowing Green was third.

Sewell won the half-mile by three yards over Jack Arnold, also of Ross, and third, Fred Gale. Both of Ross was third, and Somers of the visitors, was awarded the points. Sewell's time was 2:17.6. Clark copped the 220 in 25.2 seconds, finishing five yards ahead of the Ross' second, Foster, of 2.6. G. was awarded third place.

Jim Vaffis copped in the high

Their "home work" finished for the season, Fremont Ross high's track and field team Monday pointed for competition on foreign strands and specifically the first annual Toledo DeVilbiss night relays Friday night.

Saturday morning, the Little Giant thinlies of Coach Harold Althoff squelched Toledo Waite, 76-42, at Harmon field in their last home vie and final dual meet. Later in the day, a Ross trio of Bob Shaw, Bob Thomson and George Kish competed in the shot-put and discus events in the Ohio Wesleyan Relays at Delaware, but failed to place. Shaw came through with the second longest toss of the meet, 47 feet, 6 inches, but Fremont's combined yardage missed placing by a wide margin. The same was true in the discus with Thomson making the best Little Giant cast, 119 feet.

Coach Althoff announced Monday he would enter men in every event but the 100 yard dash in the DeVilbiss Relays. Only four individual races are on the program, including the century, high hurdles, pole vault and high jump. Team events listed are: 400-yard relay, 800-yard relay, 1600-yard relay, 400-yard shuttle relay, sprint medley, and distance medley.

#### Squad of 15

The Purple mentors stated he would take a squad of 15 athletes to Toledo for the arclight affair. He also revealed that Al Koebel, husky weight man, was suspended from the team in a disciplinary action.

Highlighting Saturday's victory over Waite were the school and field record breaking performance of Bob Shaw in the shot-put as he heaved the iron pellet 49 feet, 1½ inches to top his former two-week old mark by one inch and the pole-vaulting of Jack Carroll, who cleared 10 feet, five inches. It was the first time this season Carroll had made better than 10 feet. The Ross vaulter missed at 10 feet, 9 inches.

Henry Sewell, Ross high's district cross country champion, again showed well in the distance events, but more than ever impressed Coach Althoff that he must develop a finish sprint. He ran a beautiful final lap in the mile against Elmer McDonall of Waite, the two matching stride for stride to the final turn. Then McDonall stepped out and left the colored lad 10 yards behind. The half mile was almost a repetition with Sewell running things his own way until the last curve when Teammate Gale Berger turned on the steam to cap going away.

#### Only Slam

The 120-yard high hurdle race afforded the Little Giants their only slam of the meet. Shaw and Bud Goodwin went at it hammer and tongs all the way, but the former had too much at the finish. Dick Manahan came in a comfortable third.

A ding dong battle developed in the half mile relay as Paul Huddle, Manahan and Willie Clark had to step fast to keep abreast of the Toledoans in the first three laps. But Chestnutwood fattened a slight lead into a substantial eight yard margin to bring home the baton in 1:37.5.

Burdette Ballard and Carl Huford of Ross finished one-two in a comparatively fast 440, the former in front by nine yards at the judges' stand. Willie Clark again showed his fleet-footedness in the furlong, whipping Ken McDonald, Waite's ace sprinter by three yards in 23.7 seconds. Bob Thomson whirled the discus 120 feet, 12 feet under his best distance for the season, but good enough to win. Ross high's mile relay of Huddle, Huford, Chestnutwood and Ballard breezed through an easy workout in that event against a make-shift Waite team.

Coach Whitey Althoff of the Fremont Ross thinclads reports that Bob Shaw, star weightman, copped third in the recent Mansfield relays, but owing to a miscue by the judges, he was not credited in the final meet standings. . . . This undoubtedly resulted because Shaw only competed in the preliminaries, leaving Mansfield before noon for the Ross triangular with DeVilbiss and Woodward. . . . The judges had been instructed to enter Shaw's best mark of 47 feet, 4 inches in the finals which they neglected to do. . . . Harry Mehock, Mansfield track mentor and director of the Relays, stated a third-place medal would be sent to Shaw. . . . Put Jackie Carroll, Ross high sophomore, on your future star list. . . . He nearly made the grade in basketball last winter, he's doing better than 10 feet in the pole vault right now, and he should catch Coach Fred McClintock's eye on the grid next fall. . . . Another year and he'll be cutting the buck in all departments. . . . The same goes for Paul Huddle, likewise a soph, who does things on the grid and track in great competitive style. . . .
