

Local High School Quintets Open Cage Campaign Tonight

Riddled by injuries but well-stocked with lettermen, Coach Ed Gabel's Little Giant quintet treks to Toledo tonight for the 1946-47 local high school basketball inaugural.

Meanwhile, the Crimson Streaks of St. Joseph's will also be on the road, journeying to Townsend where they are heavily favored over that township's hapless crew which has already dropped a 25-53 decision to Bettsville; and a 22-89 verdict to Clyde.

Little is known of Andy Kandik's Scott quintet but Ross appears seriously handicapped offensively with Dick Baron, runner-up for the Buckeye League scoring honors last year, sidelined for another month due to a broken hand

received in the football finale against Lima Central, and Bob Beck, sophomore forward prospect benched with a torn knee received in an auto-motor scooter collision. Beck is not expected to be ready to start before the December 10 tilt with Toledo Woodward.

The Purple will take the floor with Sam Sims and Walter Weinhardt at the forwards, Dick Porczak at center and Lloyd Bischoff and either Tex Frey or Don Hulka at the guards.

Bob Smith's St. Joe cagers, operating from a zone defense with a fast-breaking offense will be bulked up by lettermen Gene Hipp at center, and Vince Swint at one forward with Glenn Saller, up from the reserve quintet at the other forward and sophomore Tom Yeager and Vic Schickle at the guards.

Both quintets swing into action locally Friday with Ross hosting Port Clinton (victors over Lakeside, 34-33, in their only outing) and the Crimson Streaks entertaining Toledo Central Catholic, coached by Smith's brother, Don.

Scott Cagers Unable To Solve Giants' Zone Defense

Featuring an air-tight zone defense and a five-point rally in the final 45 seconds of play, Eddie Gabel's Little Giants of Ross high edged Toledo Scott, 35 to 36, in the opening basketball game of the season for both schools at Toledo Tuesday evening.

The Purple, with first-stringers Dick Baron and Bob Beck riding the bench with injuries, registered a three-point first quarter lead which they maintained intact through the third period. Scott rallied for a 30-29 lead, their first of the game, with 55 seconds remaining but two baskets by Walter Weinhardt and another by Sam Sims in quick succession netted the margin of victory.

Using a fast-break, interspersed with set plays, the Giants had little difficulty solving the Scott defense and would have cinched the outcome much earlier if able to convert a fair percentage of their scoring attempts.

Scott, on the other hand, not only failed to penetrate the Ross zone, but also persisted in a passing and waiting game at mid-court until they either lost the ball at an intercepted pass or a futile attempt at a goal from far out on the floor. Inability to hit from the free throw lane likewise hindered the Maroons and White as they missed on 12 of 18 attempts.

Bischoff Tops

Lloyd Bischoff paced the individual scorers with four fielders and a pair of charity tosses for 10 points while Dick Porczak collected nine markers and Weinhardt and Sims netted eight and seven points respectively. Forward Bill Wakefield was the lone Scott cager able to score consistently, checking in with five field goals and 10 points.

The Fremonters alternated at dropping in goals which protected their narrow margin through the first three quarters with the widest lead being a 22-14 advantage mid-way through the third period.

Leading 23-20 at the start of the final stanza, Bischoff dropped in a fielder which was matched by Chuck Cottrell's effort. Sims then netted a two-pointer and Erv Wittenberg followed suit for the Toledoans. Weinhardt dropped a foul and Scott knotted the count as Ed Elliott and Wakefield connected in short order. Porczak's foul made it 29-28 but Wakefield put Scott in front for the only time in the tilt with a push-shot from the foul line. With 50 seconds remaining, Weinhardt sank one from the side and then Elliott missed on two free throw attempts which would probably have sent the game into an overtime. Weinhardt and Sims hit in rapid order just before the gun.

The Ross reserves likewise posted a triumph, routing the Scott second-stringers, 36 to 16, as Johnny Auxter accounted for 11 points.

LOCAL CAGERS START "HOME" TILTS FRIDAY

Central Catholic Gets Nod Over Streaks; Ross Favored

Both handicapped by injuries and sickness to key players, Coaches Eddie Gabel of Ross and Bob Smith of St. Joseph's prepared their squads for the initial home tilts of the youthful basketball campaign slated for Friday night.

The Little Giants entertain Port Clinton in what may be the final competitive meeting of the two schools while the Crimson Streaks host a powerful Toledo Central Catholic quintet to start a heavy seven-day period in which time they meet four foes.

All four of the teams slated for the local inaugural are undefeated with Ross and Central Catholic rated the nod in pre-game favoritism.

Ross opened its campaign Tuesday with a surprise 35-30 win over a weak Toledo Scott five, featuring a strong zone defense and persistent offensive efforts which paid full dividends in the final 45 seconds of play. Dick Baron, runner-up for Buckeye League scoring laurels last year, will again be on the sidelines along with Bob Beck sophomore forward prospect who was expected to furnish the balance of offensive power between Baron and the remainder of the squad.

Both Injured

Baron has a broken hand, received in the football finale, while Beck is still limping as a result of a motor-scooter-auto collision which resulted in a torn knee and six stitches. The latter were to be removed today and the tow-head is expected to rejoin his mates for the Fostoria clash here next Friday.

St. Joe opened with a strong 69-39 rout of a weak Townsend township outfit gained minus the services of little Vince Swint who will again be on the bench due to an attack of flu.

Opposing the Streaks will be an Irish crew which posted an 11-point victory over a strong Gibsonburg squad Tuesday. The tilt also smacks of a family feud as Don Smith, Bob's brother, is assistant coach of the Toledo parochials.

It will be a very heavy evening for all teams in this area, including the Buckeye League which swings into action with every member pitted against outside competition.

Novel Ohio State To Review Seven

COLUMBUS, O., Dec. 5.—UP—High school basketball coaches will have a chance here Saturday to fulfill a secret longing—they will be allowed to blow the whistle on the whistle-blowers without fear of punishment.

This novel approach to basketball will be part of the two-day cage clinic co-sponsored by the Ohio High School Athletic Association and Ohio State university.

Saturday afternoon, Coach William H. H. (Tippy) Dye of Ohio State will devide his varsity squad into two teams and play a regulation game for the high school coaches—with a few exceptions.

A different set of officials will work each quarter of the game, to represent the various sectors of the state. And any of the "visiting firemen" will be allowed to call a loud halt at any point in the game and ask the man in the striped shirt why he called a foul or made a decision.

Seven Changes

Seven changes in the rules this year should provide much of the discussion.

LITTLE GIANTS CLOSE STRONG FOR SECOND WIN; IRISH ROUT WEAKENED CRIMSON STREAK 5

Fremont's 1946-47 basketball debut was completed today with the only surprise being in the margin of victory recorded by Toledo Central Catholic over St. Joseph's while Ross was downing a stubborn Port Clinton outfit.

The Crimson Streak-Irish tilt was played before an overflow crowd and failed to reveal the true strength of Coach Bob Smith's Fremont team, handicapped by illness. In much the same fashion, Ross looked unimpressive in posting its second straight win of the season although two of the starting lineup, Bob Beck and Dick Baron, are still riding the bench with injuries.

Purple Cinches Contest With Last Quarter Scoring Spree

A fourth quarter scoring spree which netted 13 points enabled an injury-riddled Ross high quintet to defeat Port Clinton, 34-24, here Friday evening, before approximately 1,000 fans.

It was the second victory in as many starts for the Little Giants who had previously edged Toledo Scott, 35-30, and the first defeat in two outings for the Porters.

The game was marred throughout by exceptionally poor passing of both quintets and equal inability to cash in on numerous scoring attempts.

The Porters broke on top when Chalon Short dropped in a free throw after four and a half minutes of play while the first field goal of the contest came a minute later when Walter Weinhardt connected to give the Purple a 2-1 advantage. However, the Redmen rallied for an 8-4 margin at the end of the first quarter which they maintained until the final two seconds of the half when Lloyd Bischoff sent the Little Giants to the fore again, 16-15, with a fielder from mid-court.

Tied Three Times

The score was tied three times in the third period with Ross gaining a 22-20 margin at the start of the final stanza on Weinhardt's crippe. The final eight minutes of play was all Ross as the hosts racked up 12 points to the Redmen's four.

Weinhardt and Sam Sims paced the individual scorers with nine markers apiece while Jack Bradock collected eight for the Porters.

Ross' reserved edged the Redmen, 29-27, in an evenly fought game in which the lead see-sawed.

The Little Giants return to action Tuesday night when Toledo Woodward's powerhouse journeys to the Croghan street gym.

Completely outclassed in all departments of play and their lineup seriously impaired because of illness to two key players, the Crimson Streaks of St. Joseph's dropped a lopsided 55-26 verdict to Toledo Central Catholic Friday evening at Fritsby.

The Toledoans boasting a sharp breaking quintet with virtually every member dead set-shot rushed into an 18-0 first period lead and was never threatened thereafter as Coach Larry Bondy of the Irish literally flooded the game with substitutes.

JACKSON-LIBERTY IN CAGE VICTORY

Purple Cagers Seek Third Straight Win In Woodward Clash

Seeking their third successive victory of the campaign, the Little Giant basketballers of Ross high entertain a powerful Toledo Woodward quintet Tuesday evening with the visitors rated a heavy favorite to cop the decision.

Bob Beck, sophomore prospect, who has been out of the lineup for 10 days with a torn knee, is expected to rejoin the Purple leaving only Dick Baron, the team's offensive ace, still sidelined with a broken hand received in the final game of the football season.

Woodward, coached by Wilson Weis, lost its inaugural to a strong Bryan outfit, 43 to 42, and then trounced Toledo Scott by a 53 to 29 margin. Scott had previously been dumped by Ross in the final 45 seconds of play by a 35-30 count.

The tilt will be the last "warm-up" for the Little Giants prior to their Buckeye League opener with Fostoria's Redmen Friday night.

The probable starting lineup for the Rossmen will see Sam Sims and Beck at the forwards, Dick Porczak at center, and Walter Weinhardt and Lloyd Bischoff at the guards.

LITTLE GIANTS HOST STRONG TOLEDO CREW

Injury Jinx Continues To Plague Both Local Quints

Scholastic basketball returns to the local scene tonight when Toledo Woodward visits Ross gymnasium and the Crimson Streaks of St. Joseph's trek to Gibsonburg with both Fremont quintets rated to wind-up on the short end of the count.

Ross will be seeking its third successive victory but the odds appear too great in favor of this Polar Bear outfit which is classed among the tops in Northwest Ohio. On comparative scores, Woodward rates an 18-point choice, since the Little Giants edged Toledo Scott, 35-30, in the final 45 seconds of play while Coach Wilson Weis' crew registered a 53 to 29 win over Scott.

The Purple will again be handicapped by injuries with Bob Beck, sophomore forward prospect not expected to break into the starting lineup despite rumors to the contrary Monday. Coach Eddie Gabel said he didn't believe Beck would be ready to go prior to the Fostoria tilt here Friday.

Jinx Hits Streaks

Meanwhile, the story is much the same at St. Joe where Bob Smith's crew continued in the grip of an injury and illness jinx which has taken at least one key player from his starting lineup for each of his three games thus far.

Gene Hipp came out of a rebound scramble with a bad ankle sprain which will sideline him for two weeks, leaving the Streaks with only Vince Swint as an experienced starter. Against this array, Bob Krotzer has his entire Gibsonburg lineup which won the district title last year (with the exception of Whitey Crispen) returning.

The Bears have won two of their three outings, dropping Elmore, 37 to 26 and Genoa, 62 to 35, while losing to Toledo Central Catholic, 42 to 31. The latter quintet smothered the Streaks, 55 to 26, in their clash here Friday giving Gibsonburg an 18 point "drag" off comparative scores.

It will be the third game in five days for the Streaks who collide with Lakeside here Friday night.

POLAR BEARS HAND GIANTS FIRST DEFEAT

Toledoans Capitalize On Height, Power For Second Win

Capitalizing on a decided advantage in height and offensive power, Toledo Woodward, defending district champions, knocked a stubborn but outclassed Fremont Ross quintet from among the unbeaten ranks Tuesday night by a 42 to 31 score on the Little Giants' floor.

The Toledoans took the lead in the first minute of play when Johnny Kornowa dropped in a fielder from the side court and moved into a 3-0 margin a few seconds later as Chuck Allen converted on a charity toss. Dick Porczak countered with a free throw for the Purple and Sam Sims followed with a pivot shot to deadlock the count at 3-3. Wilson Weis' Polar Bears then moved to the fore again on Jack Kennedy's two-pointer from the foul circle and were never headed thereafter.

Woodward led at the quarter, 12 to 5; at the half by a 20-13 margin and had a comfortable 32 to 22 advantage at the start of the final period.

Missing From Floor

Ross was very inept from the floor, missing on numerous shots of all types from every angle while Woodward's Allen and Kornowa dominated the rebounds.

The Bears had little difficulty solving the Little Giants defense, scoring on set plays throughout the tilt.

Kornowa topped the individual scorers with six baskets and four free throws for 16 points while Porczak paced the Fremonters with 13 counters. It was the first loss in three outings for Ross and the second victory in three starts for Woodward.

The Little Giant reserves copped the preliminary from the Woodward Reserves by a 29 to 26 margin for their third successive win.

ROSS TO HOST FOSTORIA IN LOOP OPENER

Lima St. John Treks To St. Joe Lair

Both teams still riddled by injuries, the Little Giants of Ross and the Crimson Streaks of St. Joseph's entertain highly-regarded opponents tonight as the scholastic basketball season hits the customary pre-Christmas increased tempo.

LEAGUE LEAD ON BLOCK IN TOP CONTEST

TROJANS ROUT LITTLE GIANTS IN NEAR-RIOT

Fremonters Unable To Solve Tough Findlay Defenses

CHICAGO, Jan. 4.—UP—The Big Nine's 1947 basketball race moves into high gear tonight as Wisconsin's once-victorious Badgers take on the undefeated Iowa Hawkeyes in the headline attraction of a three-game slate.

LARGE CROWD SEES PURPLE COP 11TH VICTORY; ST. JOE WINS IN FINAL 30 SECONDS

Lead Changes 10 Times In Renewal Of Hot Cage Rivalry

Playing their finest game of the year, the Little Giants of Fremont Ross rose to the heights Friday evening to upset a stubborn quintet of Sandusky cagers by a 50-43 margin.

Approximately 1,200 fans witnessed the clash which threatened to develop into a general free-for-all among the spectators during an intensely torrid second and third periods in which the lead changed hands on five successive plays.

Failure of the Blue Streaks to switch from their standard 2-1-2 zone defense which the Rossmen penetrated with comparative ease during most of the affair led directly to the downfall of the Sanduskians although only their uncanny accuracy from the free throw line where they converted 13 of 17 attempts kept the game from becoming a rout.
