Ross holds tight, wins its opener

TOLEDO — It's always nice to get the season started off on the right foot.

That's just what Fremont Ross did in its opener Saturday with a 53-41 win over Toledo Waite.

After playing the Indians to a 10-all tie in the first quarter, the Little Giants took the lead for good early in the second quarter and pushed the advantage to seven points at halftime for a 23-16 margin.

Ross (1-0) harnessed that

momentum heading into the third quarter, going on a 9-0 run to push the lead to 32-16. In fact, Waite (0-2) didn't score until Jordan Dumas connected on a putback with 4:22 remaining in the period.

Throughout the rest of the second half, Ross' lead fluctuated between six and 16 points as it held off several Indians rallies. A layup by Tyler Wolf gave the Little Giants a 47-37 advantage with 1:46 remaining and put the game out of reach.

"We weathered the storm," Little Giants coach Mark Ge-

deon said.

"(Waite) got it down to six there. I've got a couple of experienced seniors, in terms of the Stark twins and Alex Metcalf, that understand the game of basketball really well. They understood that it wasn't time to push the panic button."

Ross was anxious to get the season underway.

"Waite is a team that plays with a lot of energy and a lot of enthusiasm and they feed off that," Gedeon said. "They can shoot the ball well from the outside, which is what we were worried about, and they

did a nice job on the offensive glass. That's something we're going to have to do a better job of and that's defensive rebounding.

"There were some first-game jitters in some aspects. We know there (are) a lot of things to work on, but I was very pleased with our team."

Ross had a balanced scoring attack that was led by Metcalf, who finished with 11 points. Wolf had nine points, Dylan Jagodzinski finished with seven and Jack Gedeon, Jarvis Jones and Drew Solander added six points apiece.

"That's a good sign," Coach Gedeon said. "We know we need to play team basketball and that's something these guys have accepted. We know we don't have any superstars on the floor (and) we're going to need everybody to be successful this year. They're a very unselfish team."

"They want to go out and compete to win, that is their No. 1 goal, and they don't care who gets the credit. And that's why I think they're going to be a very, very fun team to watch

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this year."

Waite guard Taywyn Mason led all scorers with 14 points and Kenyatta Bowen added eight.

"We missed too many layups and we turned the ball over," Waite coach Adam Rodriguez said. "Our inexperienced showed. We're try-

ing to get better, we're learning every day and (Saturday) was a lot better than yesterday."

The Indians left a lot of points on the floor as they missed a number of shots in the paint.

"We missed too many layups to win a close game," Rodriguez said. "We got offensive rebounds, but when we got the offensive rebounds, we weren't making the putbacks."

Ross routs Clay in TRAC opener

Little Giants start fast in conference victory

OREGON — Just about everything that could go wrong for the Clay boys basketball team did go wrong, and Fremont Ross was there to capitalize, defeating the Eagles in convincing fashion, 68-41, to improve to 2-0 on the season and 1-0 in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference.

The Little Giants never trailed as they raced out to an 11-2 lead and held a 19-9 advantage after one quarter. In the second quarter, Ross began to pull away, outscoring the Eagles 26-12 in the period to take a 45-21 lead into the half. After Clay guard Patricc Booth hit a 3-pointer to cut the deficit to 25-16, Ross went on an 8-0 run and never looked back.

The Little Giants played good, stout defense that featured a lot of trapping, making it hard for the Eagles (0-1, 0-1 TRAC) to get the ball inside and score. Offensively, Ross worked the ball around the perimeter and broke down the defense to get a number of high-percentage shots.

"I loved the intensity and the passion the kids played with," said Ross head coach Mark Gedeon. "I loved our defensive rotations; we forced 15 first-half turnovers. I loved how much (the players) were willing to share the basketball with each other. We never lost our intensity."

The Little Giants featured a balanced scoring attack that saw 10 players score. Dylan Starks, Jack Gedeon and Tyler Wolf led the way with 11 points apiece, and Grant McConnell and Alex Metcalf each had six.

Mark Gedeon talked about the unselfishness of his team and how working together as a unit has helped Ross to a 2-0 start this season.

"We need all five players to go for the rebounds and score it,"

Gedeon said. "We don't have that one go-to player that some teams have. And these guys have already bought into it."

Drew Starks scored all of his 11 points in the first half when the Little Giants built their lead.

"We played hard, we played as a team (and) executed fairly well," he said. "Anybody can score on the court at any time. We had a little too many turnovers but we still kept pushing the ball and they couldn't keep up. We made them go faster and we were in the right place at

right time and got steals."

Clay got 16 points from their starting backcourt duo of Jack Nagy and Patricc Booth, but was never able to get anything going consistently on the offensive end.

"It's hard to blend right now (as a team)," said Nagy. "I've been learning the system for 3-4 years and it's still hard for me sometimes. We're working with new guys that are stepping into roles that they're probably not ready for yet. We've

just got to work the kinks out.

"They were pressuring us the whole game. We knew that if we broke the pressure, we'd be in the game, but, obviously, we didn't handle the pressure well. We run our stuff in practice hard all the time but it's different when you get in a varsity-game situation and you've got the crowd going and people in your face. It's different for people that don't get a whole lot of varsity experience."

TOLEDO — Ross had four guys reach double-figures in scoring on Saturday, as the Little Giants remained unbeaten with a 66-60 win in non-league play at Toledo Start.

Alex Metcalf led the way with 14 points for Ross (3-0). Jarvis Jones contributed 13 points, while Drew Solander had 12 and Tyler Wolf tallied 11. Solander added nine rebounds. Jack Gedeon provided seven boards and seven assists.

“We’re getting a lot of contributions right now,” Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon said. “There’s not really a go-to guy on this team right now. The kids are sharing the ball very well and they’re working well together.”

The game was tied at 60 all with 46 seconds remaining. Metcalf proceeded to sink two foul shots to give Ross the lead, Gedeon then canned two more, before Dylan Stark’s steal led to two more charity stripe makes.

The Little Giants will return to Three Rivers Athletic Conference action Friday when they host St. John’s Jesuit.

“For us, we’ll have to bring our A game,” coach Gedeon said. “I know our kids are going to play with a lot of energy. Hopefully there will be a lot of energy in the energy in the gym as well.”

St. John's hands Fremont Ross its first loss

FREMONT — One of Ohio's best basketball players entered "The Purple Pit" on Friday evening looking to show that his team is one of the best in the area.

And St. John's Jesuit forward Marc Loving, who has committed to playing basketball at Ohio State next season, was a force to be reckoned with inside, leading all scorers with 21 points, a few thunderous dunks as he led the Titans to a 67-40 victory over Fremont Ross.

After the Little Giants kept the score relatively close after one quarter at 17-9, St. John's took control in the second period, outscoring Ross 16-6 to take a 33-15 lead into the half. From there, the Titans (4-0, 2-0 TRAC) pulled away, outscoring the Little Giants, 34-25, in the second half.

In addition to Loving's 21 points, St. John's got 10 points apiece from guards Anthony Glover, Austin Gardner and Tyler Thompson.

"It was very physical defensively," said St. John's head coach Ed Heintschel. "Both teams really played hard. Mark's guys played very, very hard. We were able to get the ball inside more in the second half. We wanted to get the ball inside a little bit more. (But) they don't let you (into the paint) very easily. We were able to get the ball inside and finish a little bit. That was the difference in the game."

While Ross was able to play good defense at times and force some missed shot, Loving and his teammates were often there to clean up the offensive glass and score a number of second-chance points.

"Marc, he's special," Heintschel said. "He has such body control for his height - he can draw contact and not charge and split guys, sidestep them, which most 6-8 guys can't do. He's gifted, and he's got a lot of talent."

At times, Ross' big men were able to cause trouble for Loving, but he ultimately overcame, scoring inside and grabbing a number of key rebounds. When Loving and the rest of his team

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got their defense going, they were able to speed up the game and create opportunities on the other end for themselves.

"Our defense picked up which created more offense for us and we put points on the board," said Loving. "When we picked the defense up, it got the game speed going like we wanted."

With the loss, the Little Giants drop to 3-1 overall and 1-1 in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference.

"We were playing an outstanding St. John's team," said Ross head coach Mark Gedeon. "They're not only one of the top teams in our league but one of the top teams in the state. They can hurt you in so many ways, whether it's with the defensive pressure that they displayed tonight or it's with the rebounding or outside shooting."

"Obviously, when you've got a go-to player like Loving, it that makes (them) difficult to defend and gives them options."

Jack Gedeon led the Little Giants with 10 points. Alex Metcalf chipped in with seven points and Grant McConnell and Dylan Jagodzinski finished with five points apiece.

"Offensively, we got a little tentative there and we need to make sure that we have our five players moving whether it's with or without the ball than we did in the first half," Coach Gedeon said. "We did a little bit better job (of that) in the second half. It just shows what the level is that we have to get to if we want to compete against not only St. John's but in this league, too. Hopefully our kids have a little better understanding of the bar and how important each little detail is for us to be successful."

Whitmer vacates wins from 2011-12

TOLEDO — More than a year after the fact, Findlay has become the first Three Rivers Athletic Conference football champion -- and the Ross football and boys basketball teams have accumulated a couple more wins.

In a joint news conference Thursday morning, Washington Local Schools Superintendent Patrick Hickey and Ohio High School Athletic Association Commissioner Dan Ross announced that Whitmer would vacate all their wins from the 2011 football season and 2011-12 boys basketball season for using an ineligible player.

At issue was senior LeRoy Alexander, now a freshman on the football team at the University of Nebraska. Alexander had transferred to the district from Springfield, and Lucas County Common Pleas Judge Frederick McDonald ordered the school district to allow Alexander to be on the football and boys basketball teams. The OHSAA ruled that he was an improper transfer and thus not eligible, leading to the forfeiture of games by the football team, which went 10-0 to win the inaugural TRAC title and advanced to the Division I state semifinal, and the basketball team, which went 23-3 and was TRAC champions and state runner-up. Ross said the players will be allowed to keep their runner-up medals.

"We disagree, but we will comply," Hickey said.

The district has also agreed to share the cost of the investigation, paying \$50,000 to the OHSAA out of its general fund money. Ross, who couldn't put a dollar amount on the total cost of the investigation but said it was close to six figures, said there has been no discussion about any tournament revenue in basketball or football going back to the OHSAA. Hickey took pains to point out that it wasn't a fine, and said they paid the money rather than go into a court battle that could cost more.

"I believe a fine indicates wrongdoing," Hickey said. "There's no wrongdoing. There has been a lack of full due diligence, which we have corrected."

The investigation into Washington Local Schools started 17 months ago, with the OHSAA looking into allegations of improper certification for coaches and residency checks by the district. Hickey estimated that 1,000 students a year transfer into the district. Ross said steps have been taken to address those concerns, and the district will not be put on any further probation.

TRAC Commissioner Ken Myers of Fremont said the forfeiture means that Findlay is retroactively the first champion for football, and the Trojans finish as co-champions in boys basketball with St.

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Whitmer

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John's Jesuit and Toledo Central Catholic.

Alexander had four carries for 104 yards against Ross in 2011, with two going for touchdowns in a 58-20 Panthers win. The forfeit might have helped the Little Giants into the football playoffs last year. Ross finished 5-5, but going into its final game against Findlay, could have won and gotten into the playoffs. But coach Derek Kidwell said it was unfortunate to see any athletes work hard and have their accomplishments vacated through no fault of their own.

"Those are the kids you feel sorry for," he said.

Hickey, himself a father of one of the Whitmer basketball players, said that's why the decision wasn't reached lightly.

"These forfeits are extremely painful," he said. "All the kids who weren't involved are being punished, and that's a harsh life lesson."

Alexander scored 11 points against Ross at Whitmer, a 59-43 Panthers win, and didn't play in the game at Ross, a one-point Little Giants loss, because he was on an official visit to the University of Nebraska.

"They had a tremendous season last year," Ross basketball coach Mark Gedeon said of Whitmer. "They were a pretty darn good team."

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Little Giants downs rival Streaks

Ross escapes Sandusky with 60-50 victory

SANDUSKY—Despite a dominant effort by Sandusky in the third quarter, Ross managed to escape with a 60-50 win on the road in non-conference play Thursday.

Consistent play for 32 minutes and a 39-17 rebounding advantage for the contest proved to be crucial factors in the Little

Giants' effort.

Ross' Drew Solander, who tied for a team-high 16 points to compliment eight rebounds, said that the unselfishness of his team allowed the team to come away with the win.

"I think (point guard) Jack Gideon does a great job," Solander said. "He doesn't have the most points, but he always leads us in the assist column and Dylan (Jagodzinski) had a great

game, too.

"It was definately more a post game and they played a lot of zone."

Gedeon totaled six points, eight assists and nine rebounds. Jagodzinski added 16 points and nine rebounds at center.

"We don't have anybody averaging double digits (in scoring)," Little Giants coach Mark Gideon said. "We do need to share the basketball and work together to have any chance of success."

Ross (5-2) out-totaled Sandusky (1-7) in the assist column

at 14-8 for the game and jumped out to 15-4 lead in the first quarter with all the scoring coming in the paint, with the exception of two free throws from Jarvis Jones.

"We gave up too many easy baskets in the first half," Blue Streaks coach Bobby Langdon said. "We didn't box out and weren't playing in front of their man like we teach them to do."

The deficit grew for the Blue Streaks in the second quarter to 36-13.

"We were sleep walking in the first half," Langdon said.

"We had (more than a) a 20-point deficit going into the third quarter and I told our kids we are going to cut it to 10 in the third quarter."

With a devastating full court press, Ross contributed six turnovers in the third period and Sandusky trailed 46-36 heading into the fourth quarter.

Streaks guard Michael Delk was the catalyst in the comeback, providing 12 points, two 3-pointers and four rebounds.

Gedeon reflects on 200

FREMONT—Not many people have the opportunity to coach in one place for 23 years and become a staple among the community.

Count Mark Gedeon as one of the lucky ones.

After graduating from Bowling Green State University in 1989, Gedeon has worked for 23 years at Fremont City Schools. And during that time, he has had the opportunity to influence countless young people through his coaching and teaching, something he continues to do.

Gedeon, a Bowling Green native, got into coaching at an early age. While a student at BGSU, he coached 7th grade basketball at Bowling Green Junior High for three years and 9th grade basketball for a year. Today, he's married with a daughter and three sons, one of whom, Jack, a junior, plays for the basketball team which currently stands at 5-2 overall and 2-2 in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference.

the fact that it has been the work of many men who have helped to build such a fine program at Ross.

"I've been fortunate to coach many wonderful people and coach with some outstanding people. There are too many to list on the players' side. There were great assistants like Chuck Lindsey, Scott McVeigh and Bill Beaston. Those are some of the people that have worked closely with me during my time at Ross and have contributed greatly to our pro-

gram's success."

McVeigh, now in his 11th season as head coach at Perkins, led the Pirates to the Division II regional final last year. Beaston is in his sixth year as head coach at Tiffin Columbian.

Through the years, the Little Giants have been members of several conferences, among them the the Buckeye Conference (1954-87), the Buckeye Central Conference (1987-93), the Great Lakes League (1993-2003), the Greater Buckeye Conference (2003-11) and now the TRAC. During that span, Gedeon's teams have faced great players such as Ben Roethlisberger, C.J. Bear, Ben Tobias and DeSean Nix.

Gedeon recalls as a first-year coach boarding a charter bus and traveling 3.5 hours to face Zanesville High School, a conference foe, once a year. The Buckeye Central Conference broke up because of travel distances. The league

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included Zanesville, Lancaster and Newark, as well as Fremont Ross.

"It was like being at a small college — we had a charter bus, it was a unique experience," said Gedeon, who coached the JV team for five seasons before taking over as coach before the 1995-96 campaign. "Going to BGHS, the farthest trip for me (as a kid) was to Sylvania. Traveling was part of the game, that's how it was, being a Div. I school on an island (around smaller schools)."

He speaks highly of many players and teams he's coached over the years, but the '97 district Championship team, which featured Derek Hershey, Kurt Snyder and Edmond Peters, among others, stands out.

"That was my second year as the varsity head coach," Gedeon recalls. "Most of those guys had played JV for me as sophomores, so we already had that respect factor back and forth and it carried over. We substituted on the clock and played 10 guys regularly. Out of those 10 players, nine averaged more than 5.1 points and each player averaged at least 12 minutes per game. We only had one kid average in double digits.

"They very competitive and they bought into what we were doing. They had a 'Refuse To Lose' mentality. Five of them graduated in the top-17 academically. I knew at the time

what a special group that would."

That unit won 16 games and captured the program's first district title since 1930.

The Little Giants defeated Tiffin Columbian in the sectional final and then one of their rivals, Findlay, to advance to the district final at Bowling Green State University, where they faced Mansfield Senior, who was ranked in the top 10 in the state.

"I remember thinking, 'Oh, my gosh, how are we going to compete?' We had an outstanding game, they hit a 3 at the buzzer to send (the game) into overtime, but we won. We had half of Anderson Arena filled with purple and white. The Purple Pit Crew was great.

"At the time, I knew that was unique. That was the first time I ever cut down the net. That helped put Ross on the basketball map."

The 1997 club lost in the regional semifinals to Lakewood St. Edward, a team with 12 Div. I scholarship players that featured Steve Logan and Sam Clancy, Jr. both of whom went on to have stellar careers at Cincinnati and Southern Cal, respectively.

Gedeon also recalls his teams from 2001-03 that won three straight GLL titles. From '97 thru '03, the Little Giants averaged 16 wins per season and also won the GBC title in '06. Gedeon achieved another milestone when Ross defeated Waite in the season opener for his 200th career. His record at Ross is now 204-175 (.540) with four

league titles -- three in the GLL and one in the GBC -- and one district championship.

"We had some outstanding teams through out 3-peat concluding in 2003 and being ranked 11th in Div. I. The '01 team won the first league title in 47 years, that was pretty special because we had finished second a number of times before that. And the '06 team had great chemistry. We had an amazing run, that's probably be the best interval for Ross basketball."

Juan Vela, a 2000 Ross graduate who still holds the single-season, career and single-game records for 3-pointers, is currently the girls head coach.

"There is one comment that sticks out in my mind and that gave me that drive," said Vela, who Gedeon refers to as the greatest shooter he ever coached. "I was a freshman, it was right before an open gym, and he pulled me aside, said, 'If you keep working, you could be out here on Friday nights playing for us.'"

"That comment stuck out and I didn't want to let him down. He believed in me and as a kid, that's important. He gave me that drive to learn more and play hard. That's what I try to do with my kids so that they can experience the same thing. That came natural to Coach Gedeon and he brings out the best in (people)."

Vela succinctly summed up just why people respect Gedeon so much.

"He's modest, he's classy. You can't get much better than that."

Unbeaten Irish roll in win over Ross

Little Giants the latest victim for deep, talented Toledo Central Catholic squad

FREMONT — On Friday at home, Ross became the latest victim of undefeated Central Catholic, 59-30, in Three Rivers Athletic Conference play.

For the season, the Fighting Irish (6-0, 3-0) are outscoring opponents by more than 25 points per game. After the first quarter on Friday, Central Catholic held a commanding 17-4 lead.

The Fighting Irish "are a very impressive collection of athletes," Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon said. "They can hurt you

in many different ways."

One of those ways is in the paint with the presence of senior forward Keith Towbridge, who signed a letter of intent to play football at Louisville. The 6-5, 230 pound finished the contest with 11 points and 15 of 37 rebounds for Central Catholic.

Also in the lineup for the Fighting Irish was 6-2 senior guard Jayme Thompson, who signed a letter of intent to Ohio State to play defensive back.

"We knew coming in what we were up against," Gedeon said. "DeShone Kizer frustrated us a lot in the game, getting in the

paint and passing it off for easy layups."

Kizer would end the contest with six assists to complement four points.

For Ross, the second quarter was one of the few bright spots for the contest. The Little Giants were only outscored 12-11 in the quarter and built momentum heading into the third quarter with a three-point field from senior guard Alex Metcalf as time expired for a deficit at half-time at 29-15.

"We only turned the ball over three times in the second quarter but we had 19 for the game," Gedeon said. "We did a good job with the dribble-drive in the quarter, attacked more and had better spacing."

In the third quarter, the spacing seemed to collapse as the Fighting Irish were able to force the Little Giants into two turnovers that led to four points in transition by Nate Harris by the 6:28 mark.

Following a Ross timeout, Central Catholic managed to force five more turnover prior to the fourth quarter with two of them coming from charges.

By the time the fourth period did emerge, the Little Giants were at a 47-20 disadvantage.

"We did a nice job defensively and were taking some things away, especially the easy pass," said Fighting Irish coach Jim Welling. "This is an experienced group of kids."

"This is the way we play all

the time. We weren't focused on taking one kid away from Ross' flow. We just focused on playing good defense."

Despite a rather large crowd, Ross only managed to score 10 more points before the end of regulation and had no player in double figures.

Metcalf and Tyler Wolf were the high scorers for the Little Giants with eight points each, while five others managed to reach the scoring column.

One of the biggest positives for Ross was the defensive effort against Deontae Cole, who totaled 10 points.

"To limit a player like Deontae Cole to 10 points is a good," Gedeon said. "He is one of the best shooters in Ohio."

"He works well with teammates getting steals and assists. It was nice for him to get

accolades as a leader."

Smith leads Panther rout

Standout senior sparks Whitmer

TOLEDO — A year ago, Whitmer's Ricardo Smith was a big-time defensive stopper as the Panthers made a run to the Division I state finals (later vacated because of penalties).

This year, the 6-foot-2-inch senior is turning his game up on offense. Smith, a second-team all-Three Rivers Athletic Conference selection in 2011-12 and University of Findlay commit, tallied a game-high 27 points, including 13 in the second quarter as the third-ranked Panthers broke away from Ross en route to a 69-44 league win Friday at the Whitmer Fieldhouse.

FREMONT — Despite breakout performances on Saturday from the Starks twins for Ross, Willard came back from a double-digit deficit to secure a 61-58 overtime win at the Purple Pit.

Ross' defense keys win over Clay

Little Giants hold Eagles to six points in two quarters

FREMONT — Two six-point quarters on defense underscored why Ross was able to hold off winless Oregon Clay for a 56-48 victory in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference on Tuesday.

"I thought (Clay) came out and

played outstanding," said Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon, whose team ended its first two-game skid with the win. "I thought (Clay) out-hustled us. They executed against our pressure very well ... made sure they got high-percentage shots. And we didn't adjust our intensity for a very long time."

"But, it was nice to find our anchor there, our defense, and we're very pleased that we held them to six points in each of those quarters," Gedeon added. "With it being game time crunch in the fourth quarter, we were able to hold them to one score in their last 13

possessions.

Despite seven turnovers in the fourth quarter, the Little Giants iced the game with a series of defensive plays in the final 1:04. Jones' block of Clay's Jack Nagy was the first key play, the second was a steal from Dylan Starks that setup foul shots, with the final being a steal near mid-court by Metcalf.

Nagy, whose averaged around 14 points per game over the last 10 contests, led all game scorers with 19 points for the Eagles. He and Patrice Booth, the second-leading scorer in the league, were a big reason why their team's up and down game had worked so well in the first and third quarters.

"Those two guys are experienced varsity players," coach Gedeon said.

"It was just a re-group timeout, where he wanted us to get back on track and calm down," Metcalf said. "We were going a little faster than we should have been and got a little sloppy."

Little Giants solve the Findlay riddle

Ross tops Trojans for first time in 15 tries

FREMONT — Winless in its last 14 meetings against Findlay, including a 37-point loss in December, Ross decided to try something a little different coming into Friday night's second meeting this year with their old rivals.

Instead of playing the game

their way, up-tempo and using their athleticism to get around the Trojan's big bodies, the Little Giants adopted a lot of the characteristics Findlay has used over the years against them. They slowed up the offense, used some patience and made sure they got the right looks. And it worked.

Findlay's Michael Clark missed the mark on a 3-pointer with two seconds remaining as the Little Giants held on for a 37-35 Three Rivers Athletic Conference win in front of a big crowd at the Purple Pit.

Ross (11-6, 6-5) hadn't beat the Trojans (9-8, 5-5) since a 57-46 win in Findlay on Feb. 24,

2006. That was also the last year the Little Giants had a winning league record as they won the Greater Buckeye Conference title with a 9-1 record. Ross has three TRAC games remaining.

"It feels good to finally beat them" Little Giants senior guard Drew Starks said. "It's a good win for us. We played hard and stayed focused throughout."

Starks, who led all Ross scorers with 13 points, canned a big three from the left corner with 5:08 remaining to give the Little Giants a 36-28 advantage. But Findlay fought back. A trey from Clark, along with a pair of inside buckets from Austin Gut-

ting and Adam Twining cut the Trojans' deficit to 36-35 with 2:59 left.

Twining came back on defense and got a steal on Ross' next possession. However, the Trojans couldn't take advantage. Gutting missed a shot in the paint with 1:15 to go, just before Jack Gedeon was fouled and split a pair at the line for the final 37-35 margin. Findlay turned the ball over with 42.8 seconds showing, but Alex Metcalf missed a one-and-one with 27.8 left that could have put the game out of reach.

The Trojans took a timeout with 20.7 seconds remaining, and again with 4.4 seconds

showing after they couldn't get a shot off.

"We had a primary option on that play, but if they thought they weren't guarding the ball out of bounds, that we might be able to throw it in and get it back to Michael," Findlay coach Jim Rucki said. "He didn't get a great look, but we wanted it to come down to one shot."

Findlay ended the game 11-of-37 from the field, which accounted for most of its offensive troubles. Ross held the Trojans to six third-quarter points, winning the quarter by a 13-6 count to take a 29-24 lead to the

final eight minutes.

“(Ross) made a couple of nice plays and we were just stagnant on offense, couldn’t get anything going,” Rucki said. “Their help was good. We’d get the ball inside, but they’d get people around there.”

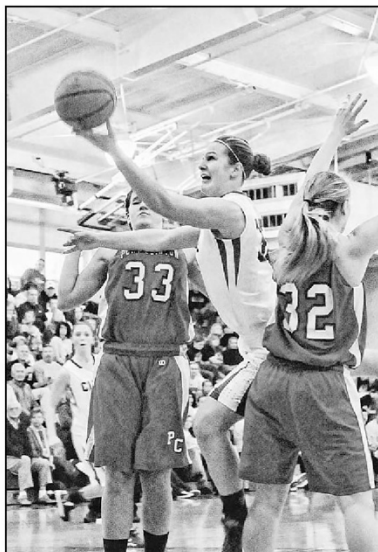

We had to withstand that first-half explosion by them and that was impressive. We had to hang on for dear life."

Ricardo Smith had 21 points to lead all scorers, including three 3-pointers, Chris Boykins finished with 10 points and center Nigel Hayes, who will be playing at the Univeersity of Wisconsin next year, chipped in with eight points and was a force in the paint.

"Ricardo can do that," coach Smith said. "He's had some big games this year. They were just trying to match basket for basket with Metcalf. Metcalf was unbelievable. I looked up (at the scoreboard) and saw that he had 11 and (Ross) had 11. Then he had 18 and (Ross) had 20. I don't know what degree of health his knee his, but I think he might have worn down a little in the second half. He was lights out before the half."

Because St. John's beat Central Catholic, 48-34, the Panthers have to settle for a second-place finish in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference. The Titans finish the year with a 13-1 league record, just had of Whitmer's 12-2 mark.

"My mindset was to help my team out and get us started in the second half," said Ricardo Smith, who will be playing basketball next year at the University of Findlay. "They played us pretty good in the first half and we knew we had to do something in the second half."

Ross head coach Mark Gedeon spoke about the run Whitmer made to take control of the game.

"It started off with four straight turnovers by us," Gedeon said, "We know, based on our first experience, that if we had turnovers, they'd turn them into points. Whitmer does well in transition. The Little Giants return to action on Mar. 1 when they play the winner of the Perrysburg-Lima Senior game at 6:15 p.m. at Liberty-Benton High School in Findlay in the Division I sectional tournament.

"We'll put it behind us, but it's going to hurt for a while, there's no question about that," Gedeon said. "But that's what is great about these kids, they want to go out and compete. The coaches will have a gameplan and we'll teach it for four days. We might not make every shot, we might not get every rebound, we might have a mistake here and there, but I know (the kids) are going to give me a good effort."
