Ross Pins Hopes On 1958 Football Success On Rugged Line, Question Mark Backfield

Scrimmage sessions with Toledo eleven, Macomber, DeVilbiss and Central Catholic have disclosed some strong points and weaknesses of the 1958 Fremont Ross football edition.

Strength apparently lies in a rugged, hard-tackling defensive unit and a speedy offensive line. The pre-season drills have uncovered weaknesses in passing, pass defense, scoring punch and blocking.

Scrimmages are utilized for the purpose of discovering strength and weaknesses. Succeeding practices and scrimmages are used to develop the strong points and remedy the shortcomings. (Ross scrimmaged a fourth Toledo for this morning, Toledo Libbey at Toledo).

Strong On Defense

Ross looked strong defensively against the three previous scrimmage foes, allowing only one touchdown, that on a long pass play by Macomber. DeVilbiss and Central Catholic were held pointless. On the other hand, the Little Giants have tallied only one six-pointer in the three scrimmages. Jim Oms, sophomore halfback, ran 27 yards for a touchdown as the second string units of Macomber and Ross battled late in the initial scrimmage session for Fremont.

Central Catholic and Ross battled to a 46 deadlock Saturday at Croghan Field. The Little Giants, possibly due to the hot weather and also because the scrimmage was their third in four days, couldn't muster a sustained drive and also weakened at times against Central's passing attack.

What are the 1958 prospects for Ross high, one of the major powers in Ohio high school football the past several years?

The current team is defending an enviable record—three straight Buckeye Conference crown—20 straight games without a setback, the 30th game, 1957 finale, a 13-13 tie with Toledo Scott.

Head Coach Mal Mackey, noted out by two votes as Associated Press Ohio high school coach of the year last year, is starting his ninth season as mastermind of the Little Giants. Starting with his first year in Fremont in 1950, Mackey has piloted the Little Giants to 67 wins, nine defeats and 47 ties. Included are four undefeated seasons.

Coaching Assistants

Varsity coaching staff assistants to Mackey are a blend of new and old. Veteran Paul Raines is still around to take charge of the centers and guards. Pete Michaels, end coach his first year here in 1957, is the 1958 backfield coach. Handling the ends is Robert Auble, Beloit-fostered head coach last year. Tackles are the responsibility of James Janosek, prior coaching experience limited.

ed to volunteer duty at Bellevue and Norwalk. Missing are Bob Seale, line coach and first assistant to Mackey for several years in the past and Jack Decker, backfield coach.

Many are of the opinion that Seale will be missed. He was credited with "molding" powerful lines in the past. New coaches Auble and Janosek have a big challenge to meet.

Ross has 11 letterman back,

eight linemen and three backs. The line is mobile, has speed and good size and should be a creditable job handling blocking assignments. Defensively, the Ross line looks as if it will be a tough unit, hard to penetrate on running plays.

Lining up defensively on the line in the scrimmages so far have been Gene Nitschke, 175, junior and Reuben Lozano, 175, senior letterman at the ends; Dick Swedersky, 225, senior let-

terman and McKinley Glover, 210, junior letterman at the tackles; Ron Weisheit, 190, senior at middle guard.

Swedersky was named to the All-Buckeye Conference first defensive team and second offensive team in 1957 as a tackle. Continuing defensively, Terry Collins, 170, senior letterman and Jim Oernat, 190, senior letterman are the inner linebackers; Jim Streeter, 180, senior letterman and Dan Coleman, 190,

senior letterman the outside linebackers and Richard (Skip) Baker, 160, senior letterman and Jim Oms, 160, sophomore the deep secondary guards.

Collins was named to the 1957 All-BC first defensive unit as a linebacker, Oernat to the second team offensive unit as a guard and second team defensive unit as a guard.

Offensive Performers

An understudy to Ron Shawl as quarterback last year, Collins is expected to pilot the Little Giants in 1958, with Baker and Len Smith, 140, junior at the halfback spots and Streeter at fullback. Offensive line has Mike McCarthy, 175, senior letterman and Lozano at the ends. Swedersky and Coleman (switched from offensive guard) at the tackles. Tom Woessner, 165, senior letterman and Oernat at the guards and Bud Gahn, 250, senior letterman at center.

Woessner made the All-BC second team on offense at guard last year. He also will be called on defensively this year, possibly as a middle guard.

Depth beyond the first unit might be a problem in 1958. The Junior class is very thin and Coach Mackey may have to dip into the Sophomore ranks for needed extra strength.

Dick Clinebell, 157, senior, although not a letterman, is a definite possibility on offense and defense at end. Other major candidates are Steve Cecil, 175, junior quarterback, Oms, promising offensive quarterback and halfback and defensive performer. Walter Smith, 165, senior at offensive center and defensive line backer, Chris Young, 165, senior who is experienced as an offensive guard and line backer on defense, junior prospects Lloyd Both, 185-pound fullback and a possibility at defensive end, Fred Bailey, 182, end, Jerry Jones, 136, speedy halfback, Les Waggoner, 165, line backer and sophomore.

Dick Dundore, 180, tackle, Max a rice Grepper, 150, quarterback and secondary defender, John Nighswander, 170, fine backfield prospect on offense and as an outside line backer on defense and Jerry Brooks, 175, an end.

Lost via graduation are members of the powerful undefeated, one-tied 1957 grid squad, John Level, fullback, Larry Longan, back, guard, Shawl, quarterback, Charles Houdeshell, end, Jack Parish, tackle, Jim Halley, halfback, Dave Kehr, center, backs Bob Jabon and Mark Walter and linemen Larry Nitschke and Ray Arnold.

Need Punch

The current Little Giants edition must develop offensive punch to weather the rugged schedule in 1958. The opener against Cincinnati Purcell on September 12 and second game against Toledo Waite on September 19, both at Harmar Stadium, will be stern tests.

Ross plays in the Tiffin Preview Friday night, meeting Tiffin Columbian.

Thus far, Collins, as quarterback, has shown that he must improve as a passer and also on pitches to his backfield mates. Baker and Smith, the halfbacks, have only fair speed but might go "all the way" with better blocking downfield. Streeter, at fullback, hasn't run too much in the scrimmages. However, he is strong and fairly shifty and may come along as an added offensive threat in the backfield.

Pass defense is a weak point so far this year but it may be strengthened enough to go along with the tough Ross defensive team that is evident against a running attack.

McCarthy is slated as chief punter for the 1958 team and Woessner is an accomplished punter — after — touchdown kicker. However, with the new rule on points-after-touchdowns in effect (two points on a run or pass and

Dick Mortimore of Toledo ended McCune's feature win streak as he captured the Modified Feature race. Jerry Cosano of Toledo, a newcomer to the winner's circle at Fremont Speedway, took second honors. Jim Faving of Fostoria was third, Jim McCune fourth, and Bob Krist fifth.

An idea on where the power lies in the Buckeye Conference should be gained this Friday when Sandusky's Blue Streaks travel to Elyria to meet the Pioneers in the opening league game of the season.

Both teams got off to healthy starts last week, Sandusky pounding Cleveland Rhodes 50-6 and Elyria blasting Cleveland West Tech 49-0.

Stern Foe

Fremont Ross high's Little Giants, champs of the Buckeye loop the past three seasons and beaten by Cincinnati Purcell 12-0 last week to end a 30-game unbeaten streak, face another stern foe this Friday, entertaining Toledo Waite at Harmon Stadium.

Lorain, loser to Toledo Libbey in its opener, is host to Lakewood Friday. Marion Harding, easy winner of Cleveland Glenville last week, is at Fostoria Friday and Findlay, defeated by Toledo Woodward in its inaugural, is at Delphos St. John.

Coach Mal Mackey, and his Ross high coaching staff, is trying to locate some backfield offensive strength to use against Waite. During drills this week, halfback Jim Streeter, who started as a fullback in early scrimmages, was returned to his old post. Sophomore Jim Ohms saw some service at halfback as did Len Smith, speedy junior. However, Smith has an arm injury which may prevent full participation against the Toledoans.

Defensively, Streeter may be moved to one of the corner back spots to plug a weakness against opposition end sweep plays.

Ross, minus the pressure of a long winning streak, could settle down into a tough foe for the rest of the season. The Waite game is a big one. A victory would do much to restore the confidence of the players and could set the pattern for the rest of the year.

Little Giant line received instructions this week on attempts to increase speed. Mackey wants his line to move a little faster on offense.

Rough Outfit

The Ross head coach termed the 1958 club as a good, rough outfit which could be very potent if one or more backs started to display vast improvement.

Ross hasn't been able to get in as much varied practice as is wanted this week due to the wet weather. That situation probably prevails in many area gridiron camps.

Concerning practice sessions, Mackey said the 1958 club isn't getting out on the field as soon as in the past which he considers a hindrance.

"Last year the boys were out of school by 2:30 p. m. and on the field ready to begin practice at 3 p. m.," he explained. "This year,

with the new Senior high school in effect, players aren't out of school until 3 p. m. and the coaches are not out until 3:15 p. m. We're lucky if we're on the field before 4 p. m."

Green Springs Battles League Foe On Friday

Green Springs, beaten in its football opener with Maumee Valley last week, tackles Montgomery Local at 3:30 p. m. Friday in Wayne, O. in an opening San-Wood league game.

Montgomery Local is defending champion of the league.

Coach Bud Rutherford said there are 69 boys in the Green Springs high school. One boy, Fred Harrah, sophomore quarterback, is injured and will miss the entire season.

Last year at this time there were only 19 boys on the football squad. Number is up to 34 this year, a record total. Of the 34, only six are seniors, 10 are juniors, seven sophomores and 11 freshmen.

Starting line averages 170 pounds and the backfield 152. Biggest player is Richard Weiker, 6-2, 220 pound freshman. Smallest is Danny Keegan, 5-7, 120 pound freshman.

Green Springs talked about dropping football next fall but with the interest shown, it appears as if football is to stay at Green Springs high school for a long time according to Coach Rutherford.

Up to this year, the Bobcats have won only four 11-man football games (two in 1955 and two in 1956). All games won were in the San-Wood league.

Next home game for the Bobcats is against Risingsun at 7:30 p. m. Friday, September 26, a San-Wood game.

Yankee Reserves Best In Business

World Series 3rd in series

NEW YORK (AP) — Manager Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees can knock on wood. He has a strong bench.

The Yankee reserves are the best in the business, considerably better than Milwaukee's in ability and versatility.

Always the master maneuverer, Stengel has outdone himself this season. He's made a full-time shortstop of Tony Kubek, an outfielder of Yogi Berra, a third baseman of second sacker Bobby Richardson while rushing in his pinch-hitters and pinch-runners with the usual abandon.

Fred Haney of the Braves has come up with some effective switches of his own. He moved

first baseman Joe Adcock to left field and second baseman Felix Mantilla to center on several occasions.

Enos Slaughter, a .313 batter in his 23rd season in pro ball, is the best pinch-hitter on either club. The Yanks also got some timely regular season pinch-hits from Jerry Lumpe, Elston Howard, Hank Bauer and pitcher Don Larsen.

Adcock will be Milwaukee's No. 1 pinch-hitter when he doesn't start. He will be backed up by Andy Pafko and Harry Hanebrink.

So, the 1958 World Series which gets underway in Milwaukee next Wednesday, figures to provide a strategical field day for both managers.

A lot depends on the starting pitchers. When lefty Whitey Ford pitches for New York, the Braves likely will have Adcock at first base and either switch-hitting Mantilla or righty Pafko in center.

The big question for the Yankees is: "Where will Yogi Berra play?" Howard took over as the No. 1 catcher and Berra moved to the outfield after Yogi recovered from a hand injury late in July. Chances are that Berra will open behind the plate with Hank Bauer in right field.

In addition to Richardson, the Yankees have Andy Carey and Lumpe for third base. Carey probably will get the nod for the first couple of games at least. In left field, Norm Siebern, a lefty batter, has been in against all types of pitching the last couple of months. But Stengel may choose to replace him with Howard against southpaw Warren Spahn.

In most cases, the names will be the same as in last year's series. But the positions will be different in several instances.

Gary Beatty, another sophomore, may get to handle some quarterbacking chores.

Gnepper, Nighswander and Ohms also may be in the starting defensive unit.

Fostoria has a small starting backfield but the ball carriers are fast, especially junior fullback Dwight Kimble, 145 pounds. Quarterback is Brook Browne, 145, junior and the halfbacks, Larry Runion, 145, senior and Grant Jackson, 155, sophomore.

Big men on the line are Doug McDonald, 195, senior, Dave Moore, 190, senior, both ends and Larry Firestine, 185, senior, tackle.

Fostoria reports no injuries.

Sandusky's Blue Streaks captured the first loop title in 1954. After that, in 1955, 1956 and 1957, Ross was No. 1 team in the conference. Ross was unbeaten in league engagements all three years, in fact had an unblemished record, except for a tie game with Toledo Scott in the 1957 finale, in all its assignments including non-conference in the three-year span.

Sixteen Straight

Last defeat suffered by the Little Giants in the Buckeye Conference was to Sandusky, 13-0, in October, 1954. Fremont has since whipped 16 straight league foes.

Ross lost its first two non-league games this season to Cincinnati Purcell and to Toledo Waite. A 16-7 victory over Fostoria last week started the Purple and White gridgers on another hoped-for string of triumphs. Ross pits its 1-2 record against Findlay's 2-1 mark. Friday's battle marks the first league assignment for both clubs. Ross beat Findlay 21-0 in 1957.

The Trojans lost their opener to Toledo Woodward 28-8, then bounced back with a 42-0 over Delphos St. John and a 12-4 margin over Ashland last week.

Non-conference games Friday send Sandusky to Toledo Waite while Lorain entertains Cleveland John Hay, unbeaten and untied Elvira is at Cuyahoga Falls and also unbeaten, untied Marion Harding is host to Dayton Roosevelt.

Elvira and Marion are 1-0 in the BC and Sandusky and Lorain 0-1.

"New look" of the Little Giants came about after a disheartening 32-14 loss to Waite.

One regular was switched and a newcomer inserted prior to the Waite game. Veteran was Terry Collins, 175-pound senior, moved from quarterback to fullback. Sophomore Maury Guepper, 150, took over Collins' job at quarterback.

While hoping for continued offensive improvement in blocking on the line and running and blocking in backfield, Ross still must depend on its powerful defensive line to contain opponents. That is another item.

First Buckeye League Setback In Four Years

Inspired Trojans Tally All Points In Last 2 Periods

FINDLAY — An unexpected reversal of form in the second half sent Fremont Ross crashing to its third loss in four games this season, a disastrous 14 to 12 setback to an inspired band of Trojans from Findlay high here in Donnell Memorial Stadium Friday night.

It was an opening Buckeye Conference contest for both eleven. Defeat was the first suffered by the Little Giants in the league since Sandusky handed the Fremonters a 13-0 loss in October, 1954. It also was only the second overall for Ross high in the Buckeye Conference since the league was formed in 1954.

Ross had a 31 conference record in 1954, finishing second in Sandusky. The 1955, 1956 and 1957 Fremont teams had 5-8 records in league warfare, the Little Giants winning an undisputed title all three seasons.

Findlay hadn't topped Ross in seven years, last victory for the Trojans, 14-0 in 1950. Findlay also won in 1949, 26-13.

Were On The Way

It appeared that the Little Giants were well on their way to an eighth straight triumph over the Trojans and a second victory in a row this season after two opening 1958 losses. Fremont, completely dominating the first half, had taken a 12-0 lead.

But, the Trojans weren't "dead." They rebounded with two second half touchdowns and, with the aid of two old one-point extra point tries via placement, added the decisive markers. Ross had attempted two runs for points after touchdowns and failed on both efforts.

It was a dismal second half for Ross. The sure tackling, hard running, devastating blocking and tight defense against both running and passing plays so evident in the first two periods suddenly collapsed.

Seemed to Wilt

Ross players seemed to wilt in the final two quarters in a "let-down" performance. A powerful first half was completely negated by a lackluster second half, characterized by both mental and physical lapses. Findlay, on the other hand, bounced back in the closing chapters, with new-found confidence and a pinpoint air attack mixed with powerful running through the middle of the Ross line.

Statistics point out the almost unbelievable and stunning backtracking of the Little Giants. Ross gained 180 net yards rushing in the first half to only 12 for Findlay, had eight first downs to one for the Trojans, ran 36 plays for a total net gain of 180 yards; Findlay's 17 plays for a total net of 44 yards.

Second half was a different story. Ross had the ball for only 15 plays and gained but 28 net yards. Findlay possessed the ball for 35 plays, gained 171 net yards. Findlay made nine first downs in the second half to two for Ross.

The Little Giants tallied both their touchdowns in the second quarter. One sure Ross touchdown was missed in the first period when end Redden Lozano, in the clear on the Findlay five, dropped a pass tossed by quarterback Jim Ohms. Halfback Jim Otermat had dashed 21 yards to set up the near miss.

Ross took over after a Findlay punt late in the first period on the Findlay 49. In nine plays, four in the opening moments of the second quarter, Ross had scored its first six-pointers. Sophomore Ohms, behind sharp blocking by guard Tom Woessner, ripped off a 21-yard gain to the Findlay two. Fullback Terry Collins was only inches short on the next play and Ohms carried that distance for the TD. Otermat's run for points after failed.

Following the kickoff, Findlay picked up its first first down and entered Fremont territory for the initial time in the game when quarterback Bob Traul connected with halfback Mike Pegg for a 21-yard pass completion to the Ross 48. But Traul's next pass was intercepted by Maury Guepp. Ross high's sophomore quarterback, on the Ross 24 and he returned into Findlay territory. A clipping penalty shoved Ross back to its own 27.

Ohms Scores

Later in the period, Ross took over, after a Findlay punt, on the Fremont 47. Collins gained a yard and Otermat, behind the blocking of tackle Dick Swader,

sky, swung around Findlay's right end for 27 yards to the Findlay 21. Ohms and Collins carried to the Trojan 15 and Ohms, behind excellent blocking, worked his way 10 yards to the Findlay five. Otermat rammed for three and Ohms, finding a big hole over right guard, went the remaining distance to chalk up his second touchdown of the evening. Ohms tried a run for extra points around left end but was stopped.

Ross took over on downs late in the first half and, with Otermat running for nine yards, Ohms for seven and Guepp hitting Otermat with a six-yard pass, wound up at intermission with the ball on Findlay's 27.

Second half began in the same fashion, with Ross halting the Trojans' running and passing efforts. They did manage a first down but, Jim Streeter, Ross defensive halfback, picked off one of Traul's aeriels and returned to the Ross 48. Then, for the first time during the game, Findlay halted the Little Giants "cold." It might have been an indication of what was to follow.

Mike McCarthy, Ross end, who did some fine punting, kicked one 41 yards returned by 260-pound rugged, workhorse fullback Chuck of Findlay to the Trojan 17. Findlay marched 83 yards in 12 plays to score.

Halfbacks Mike Pegg and Jack Adams, held practically yardless in the first half, gained 23 yards and Hickle seven to the Findlay 47. Hickle gained six and two yards but Pegg was tossed for a two-yard loss by Woessner, who had turned in a brilliant defensive performance in the first half.

Turning Point

Turning point of the game came up with Findlay located on the Ross 47, fourth down and four yards to go. Catching Ross high's defenses down, Findlay chose to punt instead of punt. Hickle racing 11 yards to the Ross 36. Three plays later, on a third and seven situation, Traul found Pegg wide open in the Ross left secondary, pitched him a pass, Pegg being knocked out of bounds by Guepp on the Ross one. Hickle ploughed over for the touchdown. Dick Hightsmith split the uprights with a placement.

Findlay, "played out," it couldn't move on the next series. McCarthy opening up the fourth period with a 39-yard kick to the Findlay 32. Findlay marched from there to its clinching touchdown.

Pass defense or lack thereof, a weakness in the past for Ross, again was the potent weapon of an opponent. Traul tossed one to Adams for seven yards on a third down play, then hit Pegg with a nine-yarder. Hickle and Pegg blasted for 11 yards and Traul tossed a 17-yard aerial to Pegg as Findlay reached the Ross 26.

Second Trojan Score

A Traul passed to the goal line was knocked down by Guepp but Pegg split the middle for an 11-yard gallop to the Ross nine. Hickle lost a yard but then picked up six to the Ross four. The big tailback - fullback, who carried the ball 23 times in the game, rammed over for the decider. Hightsmith kicked his second extra point.

Ross lost an advantage when Gene Nitchie took the ensuing kickoff, a short one, the Fremont end fumbling with Jerry Powell recovering for Findlay on the Ross 40. The Little Giants stopped the Trojans but valuable minutes were ticking by.

Ross finally regained possession after a Hightsmith punt into the end zone. From its own 20, Ross gained a first down on runs by Ohms and Otermat. Collins, Ohms and Otermat, in order, totaled 16 yards on rushes to reach the Ross 46. However, Ohms, back to pass, was tripped up for an 11-yard loss and McCarthy kicked on fourth down with 21 yards to go for a first-and-ten.

Findlay controlled the ball the rest of the game. Traul's passing and the running of Hickle featured Findlay's attack. Big 255-pound tackle Gene Byrd, tackle Charles Fenimore and guards Tom Ramalla and

Injuries, Illness Hit Both Elevens

A pair of teams on the abhorred list thus far, arch-rivals Fremont Ross and Sandusky resumed their long series at 8 p. m. Friday on Strubel Field, Sandusky.

The Little Giants and Blue Streaks have had early season troubles, both showing losing records, 1-1, going into the halfway point of the campaign.

Loss of the Buckeye Conference engagement will be out of the running in the league race. Ross lost its only previous conference outing, 14-12, to Findlay last week. Sandusky was topped by Elyria, 24-0, in the Streaks' only circuit clash.

Loop Headliner

Headliner in the Buckeye loop Friday will be the battle between Marion Harding and Elyria at Elyria. The two are unknown, untied in four games and are 1-0 in the league. Elyria's Pioneers were ranked fifth in both the AP and UP vote early this week while Marion's Prexies were listed ninth by both wire services. Findlay, 1-0, in the B.C. and 3-1 for the season, travels to Lorain Friday to meet the Steelers, 0-1 in the league and 2-2 for the season.

The Elyria-Marion game matches the conference's most defensive-minded club, Elyria, against its most offensive-minded team, Marion.

Sandusky and Ross should be rated about a teaming with possibly the best Streaks rating, a slight nod. One basis of comparison is how both eleven fared against a common foe, Toledo. Waite, Ross lost to Waite by three touchdowns, 32 to 14, while the Streaks last week were beaten by Waite by a two-touchdown margin, 28 to 14.

Statistically, Sandusky fared better against Waite. Ross was defeated mainly due to Pete Stoner's accurate passing and some fine receiving by his mates. The Waite quarterback completed a "Perfect" 18 for aerials against Ross, four good for touchdowns. Stoner didn't do badly against the Streaks, six of 12 passes finding the mark, but none was good for a touchdown.

SHS had 17 first downs to 12 for Waite. Ross 18 first to 17 (11 by passing) for Waite. Sandusky had a 215 to 209 edge in net yards rushing to Ross high's margin of 186-103. SHS completed one of two passes for 34 yards to Waite's total pass yardage of 48. Ross hit on only one of 11 throws for 12 yards passing to 243 for Waite. Net yardage was Sandusky 249, Waite 26; Ross 18, Waite 345. Sandusky ran 32 plays to 44 for Waite, Ross 47 to 52 for Waite. Sandusky fumbled four times, lost three and was penalized 97 yards. Ross fumbled twice, lost both and was penalized 40 yards.

Comments of Sandusky

Here are some comments by John Malcolm, Sandusky Register sports editor, on the performance of Ben Wilson's club against Waite. Wilson, after successful seasons at Mount Vernon, took over as head coach of the Streaks' gridiron team this year.

Malcolm's comments: Murdered by penalties and plagued by fumbles and injuries, Sandusky high dropped its third game in a row 28-14 to Toledo Waite. . . . Trailing 14-0 at halftime, the Blue Streaks battled back to tie in the third quarter on an electrifying 24-yard touchdown pass from Jim Gill, quarterback, to Ray Young, halfback, before an almost unbelievable chain of misfortunes ruined the chances of Ben Wilson's valiant club. . . . Sandusky's line was jolted by injury in the Waite game. Lost, probably for the season, is offensive end and defensive linebacker Donovan Bryant who is in the hospital with his neck in traction suffering from a compressed vertebra.

Collins Gives Giants Air Arm For Future Gridiron Contests

ELYRIA — Beware Lorain, Marion Harding, Columbus South and Toledo Scott! All are future foes of Ross at Harmon Stadium.

The seemingly defunct Little Giants of Fremont Ross high school have found a "weapon."

The weapon, a passing attack, specifically a passing attack from the spread formation, scared the "outs" of highly favored Elyria in Ely Stadium Friday night.

True, the weapon backfired once in the fourth period and produced the second of three Elyria scores. It didn't provide victory either but it almost did. Ross lost a two-touchdown lead in the final period, Elyria noosing out the Little Giants due to perfect success on three two-point extra point tries, the Pioneers winning 24 to 20.

The Homecoming night crowd of about 6,000 saw a tremendous game. Elyria was a pre-game choice of from three to six touchdowns. Fremont had been beaten, "humiliated," last week 46-0 by Sandusky. Elyria had ripped Sandusky earlier in the season 28-0. Ross, high school football's best team, went into a spread formation with the ends split about five to 10 yards and Terry Collins, 175-pound senior quarterback — full-back — tailback or what have you, dropping back all alone some 10 to 12 yards behind the center.

The shapenback would send the football directly to Collins who would then look for his ends or any of his backfield mates downfield. Tom Woonester, 185-pound senior guard and Dick Swedersky, 225-pound senior tackle, were the main blocking cogs who fought off Elyria forward's attempts to "get at" Collins.

The "spread" was almost a necessity for Ross. Coach Mal Mackey has been groping all season for a "combination." Offensive punch has been inconsistent. Collins found the range on passes last week in the loss to Sandusky, hitting on 16 of 19 throws. Sixth more quarterback Maury Geppert also was successful against Sandusky on two of two pass tries.

10-Man Line
Elyria is used this year for its defensive strength, especially against a running attack. The Pioneers tend to hit the passer, crashing in to bother a passer or collapsing on an opponent. The formula has been a success. But against a spread formation, that 10-man line has to dissolve. There are too many targets for a sharp-shooting passer. And Collins proved to be a markman last night.

The senior back hit on 10 of 20 throws for 200 yards, one going for a touchdown. Collins actually should have had a better completion mark at least five of his aerials dropped despite being put perfectly into receivers' hands or arms.

It was undoubtedly the greatest aerial circus in Ross football history. Add two more touchdowns, complete by Geppert, and Ross tossed 28 times, completing 12 for a total of 228 net yards passing.

Ross scored its first touchdown in the second quarter on a 25-yard pass play from quarterback Geppert to end Mike McCarthy. Elyria had mastered its 10-man front and McCarthy slipped through all alone into the Elyria middle secondary, gathered in the aerial on the Elyria 15 and passed into the end zone. A placement try by Woonester failed.

Elyria grabbed a brief 8-0 lead later in the period, clinched by quarterback Ritchie Poad's two-yard quarterback sneak. Poad ran for two extra points.

Jim Otermat, hard driving Ross halfback (who sustained a bruise to his hip in the game), scored on the last play of the second quarter on a 12-yard pass from Collins. Otermat ran for the extra points to give Ross a halftime lead of 14-0.

Ross went ahead 24-0 after three periods, talking in the first stanza on a two-yard plunge by Otermat. A run for points after failed.

Scal by Mrukowski
Still employing the spread, Collins saw one of his passes picked off by alert 160-pound Elyria fullback Bill Mrukowski on the Elyria 40. The rugged Elyria back dashed 31 yards with the interception for the Pioneers' second TD with 4:45 left to play in the fourth quarter.

Clincher for Elyria came with 3:27 remaining in the game on a 30-yard pass run going from Poad to end Walt Rock. Hays ran for the two extra points to put Elyria on top 24-20.

Collins had beautiful protection

Marion brought a big, talented high school football team to Marion Stadium last night. The Prexies deserve every bit of state recognition they are receiving (third ranked on the UPI coaches' poll). The Prexies have speed in the backfield, a silky quarterback in Tom Prichard and an awesome line featuring Bob Middleton, 255-pound end, Mike Chamberlain, 180-pound end, huge tackle and a splendid guard in Pete Sikes, 170-pounder. Their alert secondary stifled Ross' high passing attack in the second half, intercepting three Fremont aerials and converting them into scores.

Ross played an excellent game defensively, except against Marion passes. The defense against passing again was woefully weak. But that's what you expect from a team that has lost its first game. Marion's defense was very quick. Marion backed a huge following, filling most of the seats on the temporary bleachers. (Tom spilled out around the stadium field.)

Couch Marks Triumph
About the only thing detracting from the Marion triumph was the action of its head coach, Gary Couch. Last year, when he handled Marion, a 244 loss and dashed the Prexies' hopes for a longer title. Larson finished right by Ross Coach Mal Mackey after the game without offering a congratulatory handshake.

John Nighswander, promising Ross sophomore halfback, who electrified the big crowd with his first period 55-yard touchdown run, was the game's leading runner. 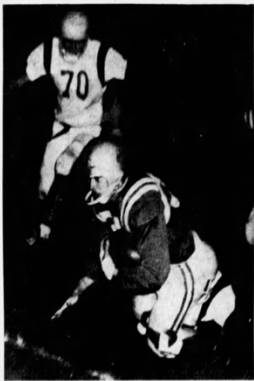

Hint Third Major League With NYC In Drivers Role

NEW YORK (AP)—For the first time since the Federal League era nearly half a century ago organized baseball was confronted today with the threat of an independent third major league.

New York City, virtually abandoning hopes of obtaining a National League franchise, set in motion the drive for the new league.

Baseball officials, already faced with such problems as controlling television, antitrust inquiries and collapsing minor leagues, met the surprise move with generally skeptical comments. Even baseball-minded people in major-league minor league cities viewed the proposal warily.

Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick said, "Baseball is not going to be sledgehammered."

Frank Lane, general manager of the Cleveland Indians, quipped, "First I think they have to catch one team before they can catch eight."

But it was this inability of the nation's largest city to catch a team to replace the Giants and Dodgers that touched off the latest bomb.

William Shea, chairman of Mayor Robert Wagner's committee on baseball, announced at a press conference Thursday that the committee, convinced that it is getting nowhere in its bid to land a National League franchise, would start negotiations for a third major league with an unnamed National League executive.

Shea insisted that the committee would like to see the league formed with the cooperation of the current majors, but added that he felt New York had run into a blind alley in efforts to acquire an existing National League franchise or gain one through NL expansion. He accused NL President Warren Giles of evasive action.
