# Fremont Meets Rossford In Regional Baseball Finals

On Monday of last week, about 17 minutes before sunrise, it was my privilege to stand in one spot in Ohio and hear wild turkeys gobbling, ruffed grouse drumming, blue-winged warblers, wood thrushes, and numerous other songbirds singing. From the same spot I also saw five whitetailed deer and one red fox.

Before going any further, I wish to emphasize that the turkeys were wild. They had never seen the side of a game farm, except possibly as a temporary holding measure. They were bred and born in the wilds of West Virginia and Kentucky; they were trapped, transported and forced to nest in southeastern Ohio.

It is true that it takes you four or five hours to get down around Logan, Athens, or McArthur, but you may jolly well drive four miles in any other direction and not find the same combination of scenery and wildlife that exists in the hills of Ohio.

For the chance to see, hear, and eventually hunt wild turkeys in the Buckeye State, you can thank Gene Kender, forest game research man, and the officials in the Ohio Division of Wildlife who gave him the green light on his project. You can see semi-wild turkeys, that have been reared on a game farm and turned loose in the wild, in many states. In my book, to get out before daylight and meet one of those critters would be about like kissing your mother-in-law instead of your bride.

**Hunts Production**

Mixing semi-wild blood with the pure wild strain doesn't mean the aesthetic value of the bird, but has deleterious effects on production. In Pennsylvania, the wild birds that grace the Thanksgiving dinners of the Dutchman never entirely disappeared. As the turkeys were slowly restored to the wild, turkeys gradually increased. So what happens? Well, meaning, but misadventured sportsmen in the Keystone State clamor so loudly for more turkeys via the game farm route, that the game department finally yielded to the pressure.

This is unfortunate, because the wild clutch contains 11 or 12 eggs, the game farm bird lays 8 or 9. The dread disease known as blackhead is carried by the game birds into the wild stock. The wild gobbler is wary and smart. Unlike his tame cousin, he outsmarts the owls and foxes often enough to propagate his race. But, alas! He also, on numerous occasions, outsmarts the mighty hunter, and this we cannot stand. So we figure it we dump enough game farm stock

## Ross Defeats Grandview 5-0 On No-Hitter

Gallagher, Level Stop Columbus 9; Winner Today Goes To State

LIMA—Another night game was turned in by Doug Gallagher, Fremont Ross high's blazing left-handed pitcher, this time with the aid of John Level.

Gallagher hurled six innings against Columbus Grandview here Friday night in the Class AA Regional baseball tournament, struck out 17 of 18 (putouts) and recorded his sixth victory without defeat this season. Level came in at the seventh inning, faced three Grandview batters, struck out two and forced the other hitter to ground out to the second baseman.

Ross won the game 5-0. It will be an all-Northeast Ohio final this afternoon (starting time 2 p.m.) on Diamond No. six at City (Farnum) Park, Lima.

Rossford defeated Grove City 4-1 in the first game of the Regional semifinals Friday, but blew a one-run home run by rugged left fielder Bill Kuryk.

Kuryk, a right-handed with a 4-3 pitching record, will be the probable pitcher for Rossford in today's finale. His mound opponent is expected to be Gary Bieri, Ross high's junior right-hander with a 2-0 hurling record.

Gallagher's six-inning stint against Grandview was anything but sensational effort. The big lefty fired strikes past the first five Columbus suburban nats, but then walked the sixth, then fanned seven in a row.

Only batted ball (other than four balls) off Gallagher came to the top of the fifth inning and Gallagher handled the try himself. He picked up a ground ball between the pitcher's mound and first base and tagged the runner for the putout.

Gallagher then fanned the next batter, walked the next and then fanned the next. He then struck out the next four batters, including the next four Grandview hitters. Level finished up in the seventh, striking out the first batter and getting the middle man on a ground out to preserve the no-hitter.

Prize for the oldest fisherman in the District finals, Gallagher fanned 18 and pitched a perfect ninth game as Ross beat Anthony Wayne 4-0.

**Ross Gains Lead**

Fremont started quickly in the first inning to gain a two-run lead. Roger Mann walked. John Kelly forced Mann at second. Bieri popped out. Level singled to left sending Kelly to third. Level going to second on the throw. Chuck Houshield then and a looping single to right center field to plate both Kelly and Level.

In the fifth inning, Level walked, went to second on Bieri's bouncing single to right field and scored as the right fielder let the ball get by him for an error.

Ross picked up another run in the sixth as Denny Sine, who went in in the second inning, to play second base due to the removal of Harry Walter (the second inning), led off with a walk, went to second on Mark Walter's single, to third on an error and scored on a passed ball by the Grandview catcher.

Bieri walked in the seventh frame. Level walked. Houshield forced Bieri at third. Gallagher walked to lead the bases and Level scored when pitcher Bill Brownfield of Grandview uncorked a wild pitch.

Bieri, Kelly, Level, Houshield, Mark Walter and Frank Walby all singled for the six Fremont hits. All were off starter and walk-off Brownfield who struck out 10 and walked eight.

Sophomore Norm Lonsky walked his pitching record to 5-0 as he weathered a three-hit attack by Grove City. The Ross left fielder struck out five and walked three.

Grove City scored two runs in the first, but Rossford tied the score with two in the last of the third. In the bottom of the fourth, Jim Kuyk belted a lone drive to left center field that was good for a home run. Grove City added a single marker in the fifth.

Both Ross backs Gallagher and Brownfield's Lonsky will be available for relief chores if starters Bieri (for Fremont) and Kuryk (for Rossford) run into trouble.

## Sports Scan

**LIMA**—There were six major league baseball scouts on hand here at Diamond No. Six, City Park, Friday to view the Regional Class AA baseball tournament. Fans also packed the stands for both games. Fremont Ross and Rossford, Northwest Ohio natives, won Friday and meet at 2 p.m. today for the Regional championship and a spot in next week's state baseball finals in Columbus.

The six baseball scouts were present to look over youthful prospects for pro ball but mainly they were in Lima to "look over the Fremont left-handeder."

Fremont lefty, of course, is Doug Gallagher, 18 son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles H. Gallagher, 424 Walnut street. The Ross high pitcher showed the scouts plenty. He allowed no runs, no hits, struck out 17 and allowed only one fair ball to ground out fielded by Gallagher who made the putout in six innings.

In seven games, Gallagher has now pitched 41 two-thirds innings, allowed four runs, five hits, struck out 110 and walked 13. He has a 4-0 record, including three no-hitters, two one-hitters and one three-hitter.

Scouts on hand were Charley Warren, Cleveland; Red Sox, Detroit; Fred Shaffer of the Philadelphia Phillies; and John Stoen of the Chicago Cubs.

Talking to Pat Mullin of the Times Herald, he said that he was looking for a lefty pitcher. The City pitcher signed by Mullin at the end of the 1957 season.

Mullin said Gallagher is pitching for Valdosta, Georgia under the guidance of Stubby Overmire, major league pitcher. Mullin said Gallagher is having a little trouble controlling his fast ball but "his curve is still a mighty pretty pitch." Mullin expects Overmire to correct Walter's wildness.

In comparing Walter and Gallagher, Mullin said Gallagher throws a faster ball but that Walter has the better curve.

Mullin said that Gallagher has great potential and that his natural speed could be developed by a major league club. Mullin indicated that the Tigers are very high on Gallagher.

**ADDED NOTES**—Gary Bieri, the third baseman-pitcher for Ross who is expected to start today's game, has hit his two original trips to the plate Friday to raise his season team leading base on balls to 10. He has 18 in 30 times at bat. Bieri is 5-0 as a pitcher, is a solid hitter and handles chances at third base with considerable poise.

Head Coach Lawrence Doren of Ross and Head Coach Myron (Buck) Luck of Rossford, both opponents this afternoon, once coached at Webster township in Wood county in baseball. — at different times, however.

Doren, who announced his resignation earlier in the season as head baseball coach of Ross high, could retire in a blaze of glory. His team already has the District title of its credit and now about to win the Regional and State crowns.

Doren took quite a razzing from Grove City fans early in the Fremont game yesterday. They were calling him "Casey," linking him with Casey Stengel of the New York Yankees.

Rossford has a 12-3 baseball record, losing to Perryburg twice and Anthony Wayne once. Fremont Ross beat Anthony Wayne 4-0 last week in the District finals.

## Batters Finally Back Up Pierce

The Chicago White Sox finally gave Billy Pierce some runs and their stubby southpaw ace, who won 35 the past three years, has his first victory of the season.

Even this one was tough for Pierce, who allowed only six hits, walked but three and struck out 10 for a 6-3 decision at Cleveland Friday night. Two of the hits were homers, but the other Cleveland hitters, two one-hitters and one three-hitter.

It was the sixth victory in nine games for Chicago, but the Sox stayed in last place, 7½ GAMES behind New York. The Yankees stretched their American League lead to five games over second place Washington by beating the Senators 7-2.

Hogan's score of 19 halved through the 72-hole tourney is only a stroke higher than in 1950 when he shot a winning 239 total. At the time, it equaled the lowest competitive score anywhere for 72 holes. Mike Souchak since has lowered it to 237 on a Texas course.

Snead, who had teed off with Player, also a stroke in back of Hogan, dropped back another shot. Hogan, believed to be the oldest player ever to make the cut, had an eagle three on the 35-yard 17th and four on the 55-yard 18th and after that he was in the clubhouse.

The hot golf of Hogan, Player and Snead proved too much for Stan Smol, 26-year-old from San Francisco, N.J., who had matched Hogan's first round of 65. Smol scrambled to a 73 on the second 18 holes and plummeted into a four-day or so eighth place.

Hogan, Player and Snead switched to a different course for the third round and come back to the scene of the first 36 holes for Sunday's showdown.

Marty Fulford of Lemont, Ill., firing his best golf of the year, switched to cross-handed putting and added a 67 to his first round 146 for a total of 133, leaving him in second place.

The pre-tourney favorite, Gary Player, moved up to third with 67-67-134. Tied with him were Billy Maxwell of Odessa, Tex., 68-65, and Ernie Vlasotel of Midland, Tex., 68-66.

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# Stine, Level Star In 4-3 Win Over Rossford; Barborton Foe In State

LIMA — There were several glossy stars in Fremont-Ross high's come-from-behind 4-3 victory over the Rossford Bulldogs in the Class AA Regional baseball finals here Saturday that advanced the Little Giants to the state finals this weekend in Columbus.

Brightest of the stars were freshman Denny Stine and senior veteran John Level.

Stine, hitless in five official trips to the plate in his limited activity this season, registered his first safety in the bottom of the sixth inning Saturday and it was a BIG one. He measured one of Rossford pitcher Bill Kuzyk's deliveries for a

long home run to deep left-center field that won the ball game for Ross.

Fremont had rallied from a 3-0 deficit after an inning and a half to tie the score 3-3 at the end of five frames.

With two out and the bases empty in the sixth, Stine, ninth hitter in the Giant's batting order, walloped his "on to Columbus" blow.

Level followed starter Gary Bierly and a tired Doug Gallagher to the mound in the second inning, pitched 5 1-3 innings of no-run, three-hit ball to record his first victory of the season. He had been charged with Ross high's only losses—two—this spring.

It was a "guty" performance by Level, who proved once again his fiery, competitive spirit.

The big guy with "the big heart" survived an almost fatal misjudged fly ball to weather constant Rossford threats in his plus five innings.

**Level On Mound**

Level took over on the mound with two out and two Rossford runners on base. Dick Fix, Rossford shortstop, lifted an easy fly to center field but Ross outfielder John Kelly, apparently bothered by the sun, let the ball elude him. Fix being credited with a double as two runs scored (both charged to Gallagher who put the batsmen on base with walks). Fix was out trying to reach third.

Level intercepting him with a diving charge.

Rossford put men on base every inning from the third through the sixth but Level, with amazing coolness, squelched every rally.

After Stine's clout gave Ross a one-run edge, Level retired the Bulldogs in order in the seventh.

The Little Giants, prodded by Head Coach Lawrence Doren and Assistant Coach Pete Michaels, demonstrated championship ability by battling back after Rossford gained its three-run margin.

The Bulldogs opened up against Bierly with singles by leadoff batter Fix and Tom Sattler. Fix stole and reached third on Sattler's single. Sattler going to second on the throw. Doren replaced Bierly with Gallagher.

It wasn't the brilliant left-hander's day, however. His no-hit effort for six innings Friday against Grandview apparently affected Gallagher. The pitcher appeared tired and, although throwing hard, lacked his usual sharp control.

Gallagher fanned the third and fourth Rossford hitters but, while pitching to Ray Dickinson of the Bulldogs, Fix stole home with the first run of the game. Dickinson then grounded out.

In Rossford's second inning, Gallagher struck out the leadoff batter but walked Kuzyk. He fanned Bill Tinney but then walked Tom Losonsky. Doren decided it was time to bring in Level. Gallagher moving to first base.

Level, great when the chips were down in football and basketball, came through again on the diamond. He struck out four, walked three and thwarted all Rossford bids.

Teammates backed up Level with timely hitting and some nifty fielding plays. Ross was errorless in the field.

With runners on second and third and two out in the third, Ross shortstop Mark Walter made a fine stop of a hard-hit grounder and his accurate throw to Gallagher nipped the runner by a step. Kelly made up for his early fielding lapse by gathering in Losonsky's long blast in the fourth.

A "right-on-the-button" toss by Fremont catcher Roger Mann nipped a Rossford runner trying to steal second in the sixth. Mann, by the way, turned in sparkling efforts behind the plate both Friday and Saturday.

**Ross Scores Twice**

Ross hitters went to work in the

second to tally two runs. Level walked, went to second on Chuck Houseshell's single and scored on Harry Walter's single to left.

Houseshell going to third and H. Walter to second on Losonsky's wide toss to the plate. Houseshell scored on a passed ball. Ross wasted opportunities the rest of the second inning and in the third.

Stine led off the fifth frame with a walk. On Mann's successful sacrifice, Stine reached second and when he saw nobody covering third, he alertly scooted to the uncovered sack. Bierly then rammed a liner over the first baseman's head to plate with the tying run.

Stine's tremendous liner to left center in the sixth settled the issue.

Bierly, with one-for-two, upped his team leading batting average to .447 on 17 hits in 38 trips.

**Rossford's nine, well-coached by Myron (Brick) Long, was a rugged, tough competitor. The Bulldogs bowed out with a 12-4 record.**

Kuzyk, loser of several low-run games this season, hurled creditably, giving up only four hits, striking out seven and walking five.

Although guilty of two errors, the Bulldogs fielded other chances with assurity.

A large gallery of Fremont and Rossford fans were on hand in Fawcett Park to back their clubs. An estimated 500 fans were in attendance.

State finals in Columbus are scheduled Friday and Saturday afternoon.

**Ross Vs Barborton**

Fremont-Ross (12-2) vs Barborton, winner in the Bridgeport Regional finals 4-3 over Lancaster Saturday, at 2 p. m. this Friday at the Ohio State university diamond area. On another OSU diamond, other state finalists Cincinnati Elder (17-3) vs Euclid (18-3) also at 2 p. m. Friday.
