Cassady Receives Maxwell Award

PHILADELPHIA (P) — Howard (Hopalong) Cassady, Ohio State's All-America halfback, today was selected unanimously to receive the Robert W. Maxwell Club award as the number one college football player of the year.

Bert Bell, commissioner of the National Football League and president of the club, announced the selection of Cassady as the 19th player to receive the honor. Ron Beagle of Navy won it last year.

Cassady, who Tuesday was named winner of the Heisman Memorial Trophy as the player of the year, was third in the nation in rushing this year with 958 yards. He was 10th in total offense with 997 yards on 171 plays.

Two Canadian Clubs Bid For ND's Don Schaefer

CHICAGO (P) — At least two Canadian pro football clubs are bidding for the services of Notre Dame fullback Don Schaefer.

Schaefer Wednesday night said he had offers from two Canadian teams and expected to talk with a third. He was a third round National Football League draft choice of the Philadelphia Eagles Monday.

Schaefer would not reveal the Canadian clubs interested in his services.

Virgil Trucks Returns To Tigers From Chisox

COLUMBUS, Ohio (P) — The Detroit Tigers today reacquired pitcher Virgil Trucks from the Chicago White Sox for outfielder John (Bubba) Phillips, in a straight player deal.

Trucks, 36, and a right-hander, had a 13-8 won and lost record with the White Sox last season.

Phillips, 25, batted .234 for the Tigers in 95 games. He returned from Army service last season and was a reserve outfielder.

Notre Dame Agreed, MSU Spartans Were Toughest

DETROIT (P) — Ed (Moose) Krause, Notre Dame athletic director, told Wednesday night how the Irish football rated their 1955 opponents.

Krause, acting as toastmaster at the Michigan State University football "Bust", said 32 members of the Notre Dame squad considered MSU, 21-7 victors over the Irish, the toughest team they met.

Three voted for Southern California and one player said "none of them are any good."

After Alumni Win, Ziemke's Little Giants Ready For Outsiders

With the season's first game behind them in a formidable 75-60 victory over the Alumni forces Tuesday night, Ross high school's varsity cagers move out to the second big test Friday night. The Truckers of Norwalk high school arrive here for a brace of games pitting varsity and reserve teams of the schools.

Matching lettermen in the varsity lineup, it'll be a situation wherein the three monogram winners of Ross and their mates compare talents with a team boasting eight letter winners of past years.

First game gets under way at 7 p.m. with the reserves coming out in the opener. The varsity quints match shots starting at 8:30 p.m.

For his starting assignment Coach Al Ziemke will be looking to Burdette (Beebe) Schneider, letterman, and Gail Branchella, letterman from Angola (Ind.) high school, named to the forward positions.

There's uncertainty at this point as to the starting center, Ziemke said, but it'll be either Fred Middleton or Jack Lee at the pivot. The Little Giants ran rather close in the Alumni game, Middleton scoring eight points and Lee getting six. Some stiff competition remains yet in that position.

Lane Becker, who showed considerable scoring punch in the first three quarters against the Alumni, getting 18 markers, then being held to a lone field goal in the final quarter, gets the starting assignment at one of the guards with Jim Houghtaling and Mark Walters listed at the other guard berth. Walters was a large contributor in the second half scoring punch Tuesday with 12 in the nets.

Ziemke also singled out Charles Glover, Glen Haas and Al Price as spares who'll be on hand for the nod in the varsity battle if the call is sent out.

The Alumni found a scrapping Ross quintet Tuesday, having a stiff contest all along the way in the first half until the varsity shook loose in the big third quarter and really rambled.

Brand of Hustle

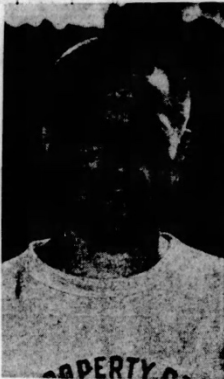
More of the same brand of hustle is expected tomorrow night as the Purple and White pick up the reins of the new season in a drive to better efforts of last year's cagers who won 12 out of 18 games.

Coach Grant Walls of the Norwalk quintet has one six-footer, Alan Angell, a senior guard; and one cager at 6' 1" in the person of Ken Miller, a senior forward. These two boys are lettermen. The other monogram winners range under six feet, hovering anywhere from 5' 9" to six feet, but no quite.

These include John Francisco, senior guard; John Schaechterle, senior guard; Dick Heaston, senior forward; Jim Rogers, senior center; Allen Beach, senior forward; and Dick Paplinski, senior guard.

Others on the Truckers' roster are Stanley Obrenovich, Bob Mitchell and Don Zureich, all junior forwards; Forest Middaugh, Phil May and Ned Hoelzer, junior guards and Grant Walls, Jr., a center in the junior class.

Mike Cronk, also a junior, rounds out the squad at a guard position.

Basilio Stages Sharp Comeback; Defeats DeMarco

BOSTON (P) — Carmen Basilio, the immovable welterweight champion, looked forward to Johnny Saxton today while nursing a sore left hand he acquired in his destruction of rugged Tony DeMarco.

Basilio, the 28-year-old Canastota, N. Y., gamester, rallied from DeMarco's stinging punches Wednesday night to repeat his June technical knockout of the Boston challenger in the 12th round.

The time was 1:54—just two seconds longer than it had taken him at Syracuse six months earlier. Both fighters weighed 145½ for the nationally televised title scrap at Boston Garden.

After he had knocked down DeMarco for an eight count with a smashing right to the jaw, then flattened him for good with withering combinations in the 12th, Basilio revealed he had hurt his left hand in the second round.

That sore hand may make the patient Saxton wait even longer for his title shot. Saxton, who lost the championship to DeMarco here April 1, has since waived his contract return-bout priority for both of the Basilio-DeMarco slugfests. The contract for the latest match called for the winner to meet Saxton within 60 days.

A near-capacity crowd of 13,373 paid a local record of \$171,373 to watch what amounted to two fights in one.

DeMarco, calling on his long-range power, took charge in the early rounds and had Basilio wobbling into his corner in the seventh round. It took a near superhuman effort by the ex-Marine from upper New York state to keep from going down for the second time in his professional career.

After he survived the staggering left hook, Basilio grew stronger as he unleashed a battering body attack on a weary DeMarco tiring just as he had done in punching himself out last June.

DeMarco was ahead in rounds on all the officials' cards. Referee Mel Manning had it 2-2-2 on rounds

Browns Can Win Title Sunday, IF

The conference races in the National Football League approach the showdown stage Sunday as the contending teams seek to clarify their title aspirations in the next-to-last weekend of regular season play.

In the Western Conference the Los Angeles Rams hold a half game lead over the Chicago Bears, who, in turn, are a half game ahead of the Baltimore Colts. Green Bay is two games off the pace, but the Packers still have a mathematical chance to gain the title.

The Eastern Division race presents a clearer picture with the Cleveland Browns and the Washington Redskins the only title contenders. The Browns, aiming for their sixth straight division crown, hold a half game advantage over Washington.

Sunday's pairings list Baltimore at Los Angeles, Detroit at the Chicago Bears, Green Bay at San Francisco, Cleveland at Pittsburgh, New York at Washington and the Chicago Cards at Philadelphia.

The Rams 6-3-1 can win the Western race if they defeat Baltimore—5-4-1 and the Bears 6-4 bow to Detroit. And the Eastern championship will be all over but the shouting if the Browns 7-2-1 down Pittsburgh while the Redskins 7-3 are losing to the Giants.

Iowa-Nebraska Tilt On TV; Ohio State To Meet Butler

CHICAGO (P)—Seven Big Ten basketball teams, including defending champion Iowa, make their season debuts today.

Iowa's Hawkeyes will meet Nebraska in a nationally televised game at 3 p. m. EST over CBS while the other six Big Ten members meet non-conference foes in tight action.

Bolstered by three returning regulars, Iowa will be seeking its fifth consecutive non-conference victory at home.

Indiana's "darkhorse" Hoosiers re home to Ohio University while Michigan is at Pittsburgh, Western Michigan at Northwestern, Ohio State at Butler, DePaul at Minnesota and Missouri at Purdue. Illinois and Michigan State are tie as Wisconsin, which was umped by Butler Thursday, 67-63, t Madison.

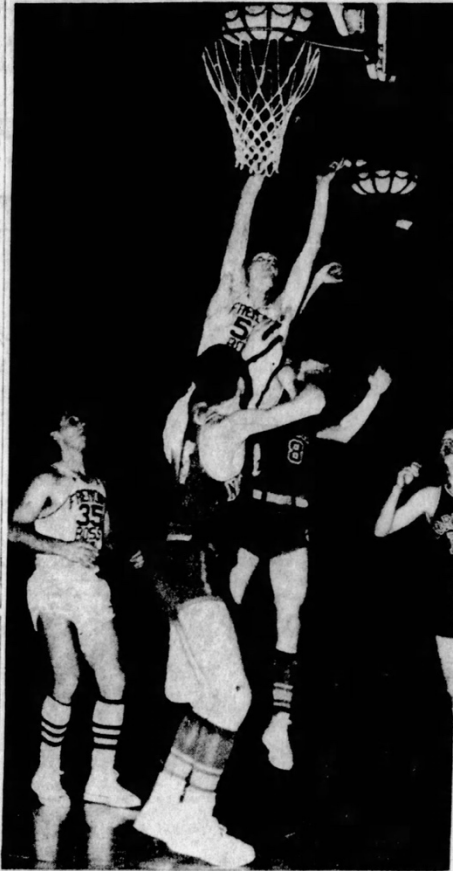
Berra Wins American MVP; Kaline, Al Smith Close

Football Coaches Favor Spring Drill

Other High School Items On Slate For Coaches

COLUMBUS, Ohio (P)—Ohio's high school football coaches today presented an almost solid front in favor of spring gridiron practice.

The mentors, in session until the wee hours this morning, urged that a referendum to abolish the spring drills, offered by the Principals' Association of Ohio, be defeated.

Although only 45 or 50 of the state's 565 football-playing high schools hold the spring practices, the coaches felt the comparatively few should be permitted to continue, and that the question of spring workouts should be left up to the principals of the individual schools.

The referendum will be submitted next week to the principals throughout the state, and the vote of each principal will be subject to public scrutiny. Three years ago a similar proposal to oust the spring practices was defeated in the statewide vote.

The football coaches adopted a "hands off" policy relative to another statewide referendum which would limit the start of basketball

RHS Reserves Win By 42-33 Margin

The wraps came off of the Little Giants of Ross high school Friday night as Coach Al Ziemke's basketball crew broke away to a 10 point lead at the end of the first period and went on to a 57-42 opening night victory over the Truckers of Norwalk high school.

Gail Brauchla, transfer student from Angola, Ind., and a rangy sharpshooter from out or under the basket, paced the Little Giants' scoring with 22 markers garnered on 11 baskets. The total matched his efforts in the Alumni game of Tuesday. He's a forward and looks to be the one to fill the shoes of Larry Miller, Ross' high scorer who graduated in June.

Over in the Truckers' lineup, Dick Heaston was the point maker setting the pace with 14.

Ziemke used his full crew of 12 players in rolling up the victory. Mark Walters, who worked into the starting lineup at guard, started the scoring for the evening, when he hit on a long shot in the opening minute after Ross got the ball away from Norwalk who took the tip off.

Norwalk held a brief lead only once; that was in the opening minutes with a 4-2 edge. Brauchla knotted the count 4-4 with a set shot from out. Fred Middleton netted a free throw, and the Little Giants were out in front for keeps.

Midway in the second period Ross held a 14 point lead with the count at 31-17 and that was the widest advantage that the locals held at any point in the contest.

Middleton's bucket got things going for Ross at the start of the second period after Ross took the tip off and continued to roll. Norwalk narrowed the Ross lead to nine points at the half but Brauchla's drive, netting six of the eight buckets scored, widen the local lead.

For a good look-see at the team strength, Ziemke had all the Little Giants in action against Coach Grant Walls' five.

Jim Hailey, reserve guard, sparked Coach Paul Raines' five to an opening victory as the guard pumped in 16 markers in the 42-33 victory.

Also hitting high in the scoring was Charles Houdeshell, with nine points for runnerup honors. Don Thomas had 17 points for Norwalk as lead point maker.

Ross opened with a 13-5 first period advantage and didn't get passed any where along the line thereafter, although Norwalk outscored Ross 13 points to nine in the third period.

Strong Little Giant Second Period Erased By Redmen Late Thrust

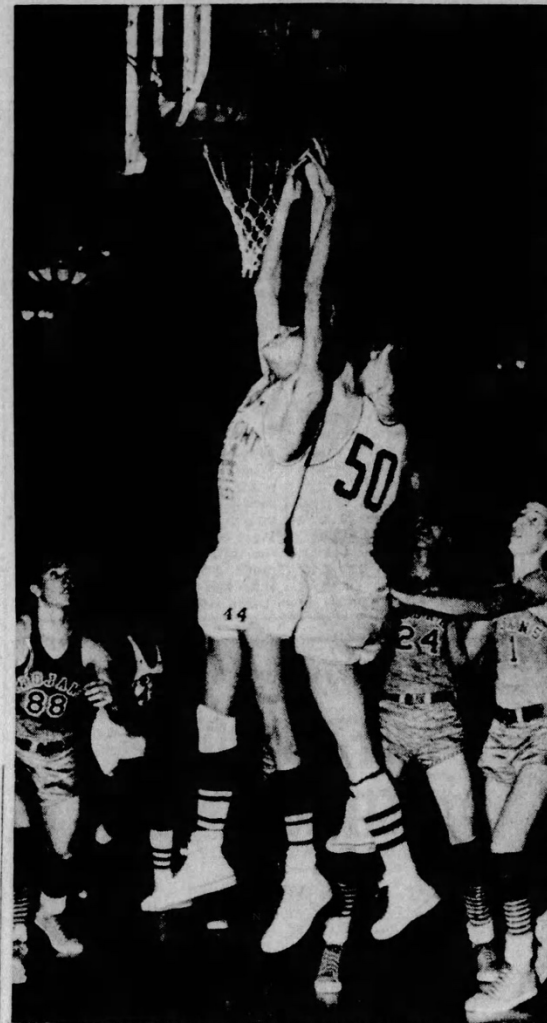

Three other Little Giants beside Brauchla hit the double figure scoring. They included Becker with 16 and Fred Middleton, who got all his points in the first period, and Beebe Schneider, with 11 each.

Al Price hit for nine, completing the starting lineup for Ross. Only one point was scored by one of five subs who entered the game for Ross and that was Mark Walters gift shot in the final period.

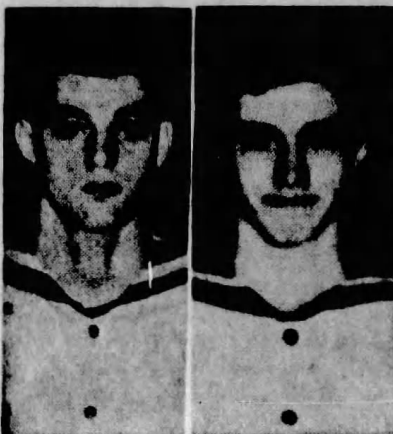
Friday night Brauchla will be one of two seniors performing for the last time before the home town audience.
