

Pressure 'D' helps Ross turn back Bellevue

Fremont Ross used a torrid second quarter and a pressure defense to turn back Bellevue 57-37 in a high school girls basketball game Saturday afternoon.

Ross, 1-0, dropped in 9-of-13 shots in the second quarter, erasing a 12-9 deficit and taking a 30-16 halftime lead. The Redmen, 1-1, never got any closer.

Cortney Cominski pumped in 21 points for coach Sue Wolf's Little Giants, including 16 in the first half. No other Ross player was in double figures but 10 scored.

"We started out a little shaky," Wolf admitted. "You could tell Bellevue had one game under their belts."

Bellevue defeated Clyde 48-40

Friday night.

The Redmen jumped to a 4-0 lead on buckets by Jamie Lilli and Crystal Moore before baskets by Cominsky and Kasey Mangette pulled Ross even. Ross led 9-8 on Mangette's two free throws before Angela Haffey and Lilly hit back-to-back two-pointers for a 12-9 first quarter lead.

In the second quarter, Cominsky ripped in 11 points as the Little Giants made nine of their first 11 shots. Ross ran off five points to open the quarter before Christie Borgia stopped the run for Bellevue three minutes into the period.

The Little Giants countered with a 10-point run and ended the first half by scoring the final six points after Borgia's rebound

shot cut the Ross lead to 24-16.

The Ross second-quarter surge made a prophet of its coach.

"I knew we would settle down at the start of the second quarter," Wolf said, "and they did what I thought they would do."

While the Ross offense hesitantly shifted into gear, the defense functioned smoothly, generating 29 Bellevue turnovers and forcing 15-of-41 shooting (37 percent).

"We got a lot of pressure on them," the Ross coach said. "It took them out of their offense and that is what we were looking to do."

Entering the season, Wolf was apprehensive about her bench strength.

"I was happy with the kids that came off the bench," she

said. "I thought their heads were in the game and they were ready to play when they were on the floor."

Mangette finished with nine points for Ross, with Kim Crawford adding six. Dawn Zerman, Natalie Robbins and Tamie Reinbold had four apiece. Emili Kreilick, who missed most of last season because of illness according to Wolf, scored three including a key steal and a layup in the breakaway second quarter.

Ross committed 19 turnovers and made 20 of 52 shots (38 percent). The Little Giants held a slim 35-34 edge in rebounding with 20 of the Ross rebounds off the offensive boards.

Ross hosts Huron Tuesday. The JV game begins at 6 p.m.

Last-second shot fells Ross

Little Giants stumble after leading by 16

Jamie Caporini's 18-foot shot at the final buzzer completed a Huron comeback and a Ross collapse Tuesday night at Ross High School.

Huron, after trailing by as many as 16 points in the first half of the high school girls basketball game, slipped past Ross on Caporini's shot 44-42.

Huron had the ball out-of-bounds with 3.9 seconds remaining.

"She (Kari Fisher) was going to pass it in and break to the base line for the return pass," Huron coach Dick Wennes explained, "but we had too many passes and I did not think we were going to get a shot."

"But Jamie got the shot off and I am thinking, 'Oh my gosh, here we go into overtime,'" Wennes said. "The further that ball went, the more I could see it was going to come down perfect and go right through the thing."

Ross coach Sue Wolf admitted she was thinking overtime, too, but Caporini erased those thoughts.

"She got a good look at the basket; you have to be on her more than that," Wolf said.

Caporini's wing and a prayer shot erased Wennes' thoughts of the first half, a half in which his team committed 20 turnovers.

"You don't survive doing that," he said.

But the Tigers were survivalists as Ross scored only two points off the first-half Huron giveaways.

"We did not capitalize on them" Ross coach Sue Wolf said. "When you cause that many turnovers and you don't capitalize on them, you are kill-

ing yourself."

Huron opened the game with a man-to-man and the Little Giants tore it apart.

"I think they were just too quick for us," Wennes said. "We got in all sorts of foul trouble. They got into the one-and-one — I think the made nine points at the foul line — and then we went to the 1-3-1 zone in the second half. That slowed them down."

Fisher led Huron with 13 points. Amy Allendorf added nine and Caporini seven. Cominsky led Ross with 13 and Zerman had eight.

Ross led 31-18 at the half but seven minutes into the second

half, Huron trailed 34-32. Cominsky's basket gave Ross a 36-32 lead after three quarters before Huron ran off the first six points of the final eight minutes.

Fisher's three-points basket gave the Tigers a 37-36 lead, their first the opening bucket of the game.

Dawn Zerman pulled Ross at 38 with a layup, but two free throws each by Julie Warren and Fisher put Huron up 42-38 with 4:17 remaining.

Cominsky and Zerman countered with two free throws each, with Zerman tying the game at the 3:15 mark.

In the final 20 seconds, Cominsky missed a layup after a Ross steal and after a scramble, Huron came up with ball. The Ross defense seemingly had the Tigers boxed up until less than four seconds remained.

Caporini took it from there. "We missed key shots inside and there is no way you are going to win missing the shots we missed inside tonight," Wolf said.

"In the pressure situation, no one wanted the ball. I don't know why."

Caporini did and Ross paid for it.

Fremont Ross girls basketball coach Sue Wolf will accept the win, but she would have liked it to be more of a learning session.

The Little Giants defeated Napoleon 48-37 in a Great Lakes League game Thursday night in the Purple Pit in a game that deteriorated as it wore on.

"We played out of control the whole second half," Wolf said. "I thought we were looking for the cheap basket. We did not run our offense and work on things we need to work on."

In the first half, the Little Giants were in the classroom — running to a 29-16 halftime lead.

Cortney Cominsky scored eight of her 22 points in the first quarter as Ross led 16-10. The 5-foot-9 senior added six more in the second quarter.

Tami Reinbolt scored eight of her 11 points in the first half for Ross.

In the third quarter, Napoleon cut the Ross lead to 10 at 31-21 but got no closer.

"I pulled them out of the press," Wolf said of her team's defense that had the Wildcats caged. "I did not think it was going to do us any good. We could have pressed them and maybe beat them worse, but I wanted to work on some things and then we did not go out and do it."

Cominsky scored eight more points in the third period as the Ross lead grew to 43-27.

In the fourth quarter, Ross produced the only point — Cominsky's final one — in the first 4½ minutes.

"Whatever game we play," Wolf said, "we want to learn and to get better. I don't think we took advantage in the second half to learn and to get better."

"I am happy for the win, but I know we can play better basketball."

The win was the third in five games for Ross and raised its GLL mark to 1-1.

Napoleon, 0-4, is 0-2 in league play.

Renee Miller paced Napoleon with 16 points.

Ross made 16 of 45 shots and Napoleon 12 of 42. The Little Giants committed 19 turnovers, one less than the Wildcats. Napoleon held a 23-22 rebounding edge.

Fremont Ross held Tiffin Columbian scoreless in the first quarter, but it may have gone to the Little Giants heads.

"It seemed like when they (Tiffin Columbian) scored," Ross girls basketball coach Sue Wolf said, "we just went ..."

The Ross first-quarter defensive high was tempered by a struggling offense that was 0-for-13 shooting in the third quarter.

Despite the opportunity, Columbian did not take advantage of the Ross famine, falling for the seventh time in as many games.

"I cannot say that the shots they took were not good shots," Wolf said. "They just did not go into the basket. I told them going into the fourth quarter, all we had to do was put the ball into the basket."

After a 24-8 halftime lead, Ross took a 27-14 lead into the final quarter. Cortney Cominsky hit the first Ross field goal of the half, canning a layup 41 seconds into the final quarter. The Little Giants went on to make 4 of 7 shots and added 5 of 6 from the free throw line.

Ross, 5-2, led 12-0 after one quarter as Dawn Zerman, Cominsky and Tami Reinholt tossed in two baskets apiece.

Anjee Beard scored Columbian's first two points, cutting the Ross lead to 12-2 at the 6:18 mark of the second quarter. The Tornadoes never got the deficit into single figures.

"It's good to survive when you don't shoot the ball well," Wolf

said while looking at the shooting charts.

Ross was 14-of-46 while Columbian was 11-of-31.

"One thing about Tiffin," Wolf said, "is they hustle all over the floor. They are a young team and they never quit."

Wolf, despite the tough shooting time, was happy with her team's ball handling.

Fremont Ross defeated Oregon Clay 51-37 Thursday night in a Great Lakes League girls basketball game, but Ross coach Sue Wolf could not figure out how her team did it.

"Who played well for us?" Wolf asked and then answered herself. "Not one person. I can't say one person really played well for us."

"I told them 'I don't think you know how good you are.' We won the game by what — 15 points? And not one person played well."

The Little Giants, though, played well enough for the 14-point win, raising their record to 8-2 and 4-1 in the GLL. Clay fell to 5-5 and 1-3.

Cortney Cominsky scored 14 points, Natalie Robbins 12 and Dawn Zerman 10 in a balanced Ross attack. Despite that, Ross missed 33 of 51 shots.

After leading 10-9 at the end of one quarter, Ross fell behind 15-13 midway through the second quarter when Clay's Jill Naugle hit from in close. That was the last lead for the Eagles as the Little Giants came to life, running off the final 11 points of the half for a 24-15 advantage.

Robbins' two free throws tied the game at 15-all and Emili Kreilick's rebound shot put Ross ahead for good. Zerman followed with a layup, Cominsky added a bucket and 1 of 2 free throws before Christy Holland's two free throws topped off the 11-point run.

"That was the turning point," Wolf said. "We got a couple of steals out of the press that really made a big difference."

In the second half, the Ross lead climbed to as many as 18 twice after slipping to nine, 33-24, late in the third quarter.

Ross comeback nets overtime victory

An eight-day layoff between games almost cost the Fremont Ross High School girls basketball team Saturday, coach Sue Wolf said Sunday.

The Little Giants, who last played on Jan. 7, overcame a 23-12 halftime deficit for a 44-41 overtime victory over Sandusky Perkins.

"I didn't think we would lose (even when we were down), and the kids said the same thing," Wolf said. "(Winning) gives you a lot of confidence."

Ross, 9-2, outscored the Pirates 24-13 in the second half, including 16-8 in the third quarter, and 8-5 in the overtime.

"I think the layoff may have hurt us but it also helped us," Wolf said. "We were a little tentative, and I'd like to take part of the blame because the kids may have been looking past Perkins because we play Whitmer Wednesday.

"But we worked on situations, and we needed that at the end."

In other games, Seneca East beat Bettsville 62-17, Huron topped Oak Harbor 69-52, Margaretta edged Toledo Notre Dame 56-52 and Bellevue got by Norwalk 53-49.

Cortney Cominsky scored eight of her 23 points in the third quarter, and Ross made 8 of 11 free throws in the fourth quarter and the extra period.

Christine Ash, who led Perkins with 12 points, made two free throws after an intentional foul, which made it 36-34 in regulation. Natalie Robbins then stole the inbounds pass for Ross on

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the ensuing possession with nine seconds to go, and Ross called a timeout.

"We set up a play, and they let us get Cortney going to the basket," Wolf said.

Cominsky missed a shot, collected the rebound and was fouled on the putback attempt. She sank both foul shots for a tie with seven seconds to go.

Dawn Zerman then stole the inbounds pass and scored, but the basket was waved off because of a foul on the floor before the shot.

Zerman missed the foul shot with four seconds left, and Kim Crawford rebounded but could not get a shot off before time expired in regulation.

Cominsky scored to open the overtime and Perkins answered before Kasey Mangette's turnaround jumper gave Ross the lead for good.

Ross, 4-1 in the Great Lakes League, will meet Toledo Whitmer in the Purple Pit on Wednesday for the outright league lead.

"In the first game against Whitmer (a 61-52 loss), we weren't ready to play a team of that caliber," Wolf said. "I think now we've gotten it together. This game on Wednesday is the biggest game these girls have played."

Whitmer is 10-2 and 3-1.

Little Giants defeat Whitmer

Fremont Ross rolled out the bleachers in the Purple Pit and rolled over Toledo Whitmer Wednesday night.

The Little Giants' 46-36 girls basketball victory gave them

first-place breathing room in the Great Lakes League.

Ross, 10-2 and 5-1 after its ninth straight win, is a game and a half in front of Whitmer, 10-3 and 3-2 in the GLL race. The Panthers have lost two straight league games, and the Ross win

avenged a 61-52 loss to Whitmer in the third game of the season.

In front of what is believed to be the largest crowd to see a girls game at Ross, the Little Giants fell behind 4-0, came back

If you open them, they will come

Sue Wolf got her wish Wednesday night. Both sets of bleachers in the Fremont Ross High School gymnasium were pulled out, and fans filled them.

Earlier this week, the Ross girls basketball coach said a team goal this season was to get both sets of bleachers pulled out for a game. Normally, one set of bleachers is used for a girls game.

Both were needed Wednesday

night as, unofficially, the largest crowd ever to see a Ross girls game in the Purple Pit, gave the Little Giants a true home-court advantage.

The partisan Ross crowd was rewarded, watching the Little Giants pull off a 46-36 victory over Whitmer. The win gave Ross outright first place in the Great Lakes League.

"Principals, the ADs (athletic directors), the newspaper have been promoting it (the game)," Wolf said, "and we have never had a crowd like that. I want to thank them all because it was great with that crowd."

Despite a low-scoring first half, 36 points for both teams combined, Wolf said the large crowd did not make her team nervous because they had prepared for it.

"We have been telling them 'You are prepared,'" she said. "The girls literally worked their rear ends off. Our saying for our team is 'We busted our's to kick your's.' Well, they did it."

In front of a big crowd, too.

to lead 6-4 and broke a 6-6 tie on Natalie Robbins' basket with six seconds remaining in the first quarter.

Whitmer never came back, falling behind 20-10 at halftime and 30-18 after three quarters.

"We have never had a crowd like that," Ross coach Sue Wolf said. "It made a big difference."

A tenacious defense and an aggressive offense helped, too.

Reo Doom, Whitmer's leading scorer, was held to six points, by Robbins.

"Natalie and Reo are good friends," Wolf said. "They played on the same AAU team last summer and Natalie told me she wanted to guard her."

"She did a heckuva job on her."

The third quarter was pivotal. Cortney Cominsky scored six of her 18 points in the period, while Whitmer suffered through 1-of-12 shooting.

"You ever see a team shoot as badly as we did?" Whitmer coach Jack Mattimore asked. "We have played two weeks in a row where we cannot put the ball in the basket from a foot and a half away."

"In that first game (win over Ross), we just shot better. I'm not taking anything away from Ross, they have a nice team. They had a nice team the first time, but we put the ball in the basket the first time."

Whitmer made 17 of 43 shots, but eight of the field goals were in the fourth quarter. In the same eight minutes, Ross made 10 of 15 free throws.

Thirty seconds into the final quarter, Ross had its biggest lead, 33-18, when Cominsky scored on a layup and was fouled, sinking the free throw with 7:08 remaining.

The Panthers charged back quickly. Over the next 3½ minutes, Whitmer outscored Ross 9-1, cutting its deficit to 34-29 before the Little Giants regained their composure and returned to the game plan.

Dawn Zerman fed Kim Crawford for a layup and Zerman hit the front end of a one-and-one for a 37-29 lead. Holly Sebring's bucket brought Whitmer back to within six but Zerman knocked in a pair of free throws and fed Robbins for another basket, putting Ross up 41-31 with 2:40 to play.


Whitmer got back to 42-35 on Lisa Lippincott's hoop with two minutes left, but Cominsky hit two foul shots and Robbins one as the Ross lead climbed back to 10 with 50 seconds on the clock, and there no longer was any doubt of the outcome.

"We had that little point where they started to come back on us, where we started to back away from the basket," Wolf said. "Needless to say, when we took a timeout, they heard 'You take the ball to the basket; that's what got us here. If they beat us and we are going that way, then we deserve to get beat.'"

Robbins backed Cominsky with 11 points and Crawford added eight. Lippincott topped Whitmer with 12.

"We have to play some other good teams in the GLL. We cannot think that this did it, because it didn't," Wolf said.

It likely helped make the challenge of a league title chase easier, however.


Wolf said the players coming off the bench against Clyde played very well.

Little Giants still winning

Victory streak hits 12

Fremont Ross shook off Northview with a late rally and earned a 49-41 high school girls basketball victory Wednesday in the Purple Pit.

Ross, 13-2, raised its Great Lakes League-leading record to 6-1 with its 12th straight victory. Northview is 7-7 and 3-4.

"This," Ross coach Sue Wolf said, "was a long game ... and it was a big win for us."

Ross, playing without leading scorer Cortney Cominsky, who is sidelined with a knee injury, survived with a balanced attack and a steady effort from its bench.

Freshman Dawn Zerman led Ross with 13 points, 11 from free throws. She made the last 10 foul shots she attempted. Kim Crawford added 11 points, including seven in the fourth quarter. Tami Reinbolt tossed in eight points and Natalie Robbins six for Ross.

The Little Giants overcame a 5-of-20 shooting slump in the first half with a 12-of-21 effort in the second half. Ross was 9-of-11 at the foul line in the final quarter and made 15 of 22 at the line in the game.

"We were lucky enough to be in the ballgame," Wolf said. "We were shooting the ball horribly."

Ross led 9-7 after one quarter but made only 1 of 10 shots in the second period and fell behind 20-16 at halftime.

But with members of the Ross bench brigade hitting clutch baskets, Ross broke a 22-22 deadlock midway through the third quarter and never trailed again.

"We just don't have any depth and we have two starters out," Northview coach Jerry Sigler said. "Of course, they have Cominsky out, but she kept bringing kids in, and, we just don't have the depth."

Emilie Kreilick got the first key bucket for the brigade, rebounding Reinbolt's miss for a 24-22 Ross lead. A few seconds later, Kreilick took a pass from Robbins for a layup and a four-point Little Giant lead.

Northview closed to 32-30 at the beginning of the fourth quarter but the brigade's Brandi Johns canned a shot from the foul line to get Ross rolling.

"That was a big basket," Wolf said.

Shortly afterwards, Ross ran off eight straight points for a 44-34 edge. Zerman's pass to Crawford a layup started the run. Crawford scored from the top of the key, Robbins followed with a layup and Kasey Mangette's rebound shot put Ross up by 10 with less than three minutes to play.

"Reinbolt (Cominsky's replacement) came through again," Wolf said. "The guards (Zerman and Robbins) were a little scared in the first half. They must have remembered the game up there (Ross won 53-34) where the Northview guards were in their faces, but in the second half, they were ready to handle the pressure."

Ross win streak ends at 12

NAPOLEON — Fremont Ross had its 12-game winning streak snapped Thursday night and fell into a virtual tie for first in the Great Lakes League girls basketball race.

Napoleon held the Little Giants to a season-low offensive output in a 40-34 victory.

Ross, 13-3, is 6-2 in the GLL race. Whitmer, a 60-29 winner over Fostoria Thursday, trails Ross by a half game in the league race with a 5-2 record.

"We gave it away," Ross

coach Sue Wolf said. "I think Napoleon hustled; I take nothing away from them because they hustle constantly. We knew that coming in here and we did not adjust to it."

Ross committed 25 turnovers, including 10 in the first quarter and 15 in the first half.

Napoleon (8-8, 4-3) used two spurts — early and late — to put the Little Giants in the hole and keep them there.

Tami Reinbolt's bucket gave

Ross its only lead, 2-0. Napoleon, with long-range shooter Renee Miller leading the way, ran off the next 10 points and Ross never got closer than five points the rest of the game.

Cortney Cominsky, the Little Giants leading scorer (19.5) this season, did not play in the first half, but scored five points in the second half. The 5-foot-8 senior is nursing an injured right knee.

"It hurts them not having Cortney Cominsky," Napoleon coach Rod Hersha said. "We couldn't lose 20, 22 points a game out of our lineup and not have us hurt."

Miller scored nine first-quarter points as Napoleon rolled to a 14-

5 lead. Miller hit a pair of 3-point buckets in the second quarter as Ross fell behind by as many as 13 points before closing to 26-19 at the half.

In the second half, Ross charged early, cutting the Wildcat lead to 28-23. But Napoleon scored the final five points of the period as Miller scored on a put-back of her own missed shot, and Shannon Boultion added a three-point play.

Ross got back to 34-28 three minutes into the final period before Napoleon ran off six unanswered points for a 40-28 lead with 3:07 left.

"After that," Hersha said, "we made a lot of mistakes but fortunately we had a big enough lead to hang on."

Miller finished with 21 points and Taya Tassler had eight for the Wildcats. Dawn Zerman, Kim Crawford and Reinbolt topped Ross with eight apiece.

"I think it was a very simple basketball game," Hersha said. "It ended up being a defensive struggle ... it was kind of one those games where you just hang on to your seat because it's a defensive struggle and any little spurt can mean the difference in the game."


Erica Hare was the only Redmen in double figures with 14.

one else did," said Cominsky, a 4.0 student who ranks seventh in a class of 396. "I wasn't very fundamental ... I weighed about 30 pounds more than I do now and I was pretty short, five-four, and I wasn't too fast, but I wanted to play."

Long hours of practice paid off when a couple of junior high coaches took an interest.

"In my eighth grade year (at Fremont Junior High School), Mr. (Russ) Hagerty was our coach," she said. "I had him for a gym teacher and he saw that I had some potential. He worked with me and that year, I started and got to play a lot more and I got some confidence."

She came back after missing three games and part of another. Still, she can't fully extend the leg and is completing the season on a gimp wing and prayer. Surgery awaits soon after the season.

"It was so hard for me to sit on the sidelines and watch," Cominsky said. "I wanted to play so bad; it tore me apart. I

hate to sit on the sidelines."

In the past two games, while playing through pain, she has scored 20 and 11 points.

Some could have quit because of the pain, but that is minor for Cominsky. The thought of withdrawal from the game would have been worse.

"I love this game; I'm a junkie," she repeated simply her reason for continuing.
