# Buckeye Baseball Tourney Saturday

Buckeye Conference western division baseball championship will be determined Saturday at Fremont's Anderson Field. Ross high school will be host and one of the participants as four teams vie for the supremacy in the West.

The division titleist will meet the winner of the three-team Eastern Division for the Conference crown. Ross is the swing team in the conference which has only eight schools participating in baseball. Sandusky does not field a diamond team. One year Ross will play in the eastern division and the next in the west.

## Oak Harbor Is Relay King

BOWLING GREEN — Oak Harbor proved to be the relay king Saturday in the Class A regional track meet at Bowling Green University. The Rockets, who reign this year as Toledo Blade and Fremont District champions, won both the mile and 880-yard relays in the regional. In posting the mile victory Oak Harbor stopped previously undefeated Montpelier.

The Rockets qualified for the state meet next weekend in Columbus with four entries. The qualifiers were the two relay teams and pole vaulter Tim Harder who won regional events, plus sprinter Keith Her-

bert. Herbert, who made the state finals a year ago, was runnerup at Bowling Green with a .50.8 time.

Montpelier, the team which had its relay string broken, when Oak Harbor's Randy Strausbaugh nipped Roger Zimmerman at the tape, led the regional with qualifiers in seven events. Archbold, Cory-Rawson, Columbus Grove and Ada shared the honors of four qualifiers with Oak Harbor. Oak Harbor, Montpelier and Archbold tracksters all won three events.

Oak Harbor won the mile relay in a time of 3:30.5 with the

team of Tony Gaines, Herbert, Jim Benadom and Strausbaugh. The 880-relay team which was clocked in 1:33.2 included Kurt Grier, Benadom, Harder and Strausbaugh.

Harder leaped 12-0 to win the pole vault. In the 440-yard run Herbert trailed Terry Shaw, Upper Scioto Valley, who was timed in .50.5.

Elmore qualified two, while Elmore, Danbury-Lakeside and Old Fort of area schools will send one each to the state meet. Of other schools which went to Bowling Green Regional from the Fremont district Ottawa Hills and Milan advanced one.

Double distance winner Chuck Gdovicak of Danbury-Lakeside did not qualify in the 880-yard run, but won the regional mile. Gdovicak ran the victorious mile in 4:30.5.

Other area qualifiers for the state meet were:

Dennis Wickert, Old Fort, shot put, third, 48-11 3/4; Steve Harpster, 440-yard run, fourth, .51.3; and mile relay team, fourth, 3:33.7, both of Lakota; Charles Romanoff, Ottawa Hills, 220-yard dash, .23.3; Rex Durdell, Elmore, discus, second place, 131-9; and John Struve, Milan, pole vault, second, 12-0.

## Near-Perfect Ziemke Mound Job Wasted

"Chuck Ziemke pitched as well or better than in his two no-hitters." Those words of praise from Coach Don Purvis did not erase the fact Ross fell to Mansfield, 1-0, in the opener of the Buckeye Conference Western Division baseball tournament.

The opening game of the four-team tournament was played on the Clyde Community Park field. The location alone could have deprived Ross of victory. Long triples by Ken Knipp and Ziemke flew over the hill in left field of the fenceless diamond. Purvis said at least one by Knipp would have cleared the fence in Anderson field at Fremont.

Remainder of the tournament games were played at Anderson, but conflict with St. Joseph schedule moved the first game to Clyde.

Findlay survived as the Western Division champion when it stopped Marion, 4-2, and then topped Mansfield, 7-3, in the finals. Findlay now must play the Eastern Division Champion Ziemke had a perfect game going with one-out and two strikes on the batter in the sixth inning. The next pitch hit Mansfield's Tom Branham, number eight hitter in the lineup. Branham moved to second on a sacrifice and scored on the only hit allowed by Ziemke, a bloop over second base by lead off batter Jim Pagni.

In six innings Ziemke faced only 19 batters, gave up one hit, one run, walked none and struck out three. Purvis noted there was only one good ball hit off Ziemke. That was a line drive out at centerfielder Dennis Brudinski by Tom Smith in the fourth inning. It was only one of three balls hit to the outfield against Ziemke.

Knipp led off with his triple in the second inning and was stranded by two strikeouts and a flyout to left field. Ziemke hit his triple with one out in the third and was caught trying to score on a ground ball.

## Turbines Steal Time Trial Show

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Drivers of conventional racers were about ready today to concede the 52nd 500-mile Memorial Day race to one of the Lotus turbines that dashed to Indianapolis Motor Speedway qualifying records over the weekend.

But they could be premature, said S.A. Silbermann, metallurgist and long-time U.S. Auto Club official who heads the 500 technical committee.

He noted that the weather was damp and chilly Saturday when Graham Hill of London set the 10-mile qualifying record at 171.288 m.p.h. and Lotus teammate Joe Leonard of San Jose, Calif., raised it to 171.559.

Silbermann said the picture could change if Memorial Day is hot.

"The turbines' horsepower and torque will drop off about 20 per cent if the temperature is 85 degrees," he said. "They hit their peak at 59 degrees."

Bobby Unser of Albuquerque, N.M., winner of the last three USAC championship races and defending Indianapolis champion A.J. Foyt Jr., Houston, were among a host of drivers and car owners who said the piston cars will have to run a separate race behind the turbines. They said the "heat engines" will ruin auto racing.

Silbermann commented, "Did you see that crowd Saturday? Turbines won't kill racing. The crowd will always turn out to see something new and controversial."
