Ross Tracksters Idle Until League Carnival

Ross High school's track team, victors over Toledo Libbey in a dual meet at Toledo last Saturday, will have no competition this weekend, Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff said Wednesday.

The coach is making efforts to book a practice meet for Friday or Saturday with a Class B team in this dsitrcit. If an engagement is obtained, it will not be a regularly scheduled affair and will not count in the season's records.

Buckeye Meet

As it stands now, the next time the Ross Little Giants will taste competition will be at the Buckeye High school league meet at Findlay May 9. With Sandusky's Blue Streaks already a cinch bet for first place, Ross will concentrate on getting enough points to annex runnerup position, which they also

won last year.

After the Buckeye meet, the district meet will be held at Bucyrus. Top honors in this affair will also go to Sandusky, everyone agrees. The Streaks have one of their strongest teams in years and have already won the Mansfield relays and second place in the Ohio Wesleyan relays.

Balanced Team

Strength of the Little Giant team this season appears to be in "balance" and in ability to grab second and third places. Most of the team is inexperienced, and members will enter the Buckeye meet with only one dual meet for seasoning purposes.

The Little Giant tracksters are working out each day at Harmon Field and at the Fairgrounds, but are handicapped because of lack of a place to get in serious training.

LITTLE GIANTS GO TO FINDLAY

Intent on capturing enough points for second place, Ross high school's track and field squad goes to Findlay Saturday to take part in the third annual Buckeye high school league meet. Teams from Fremont Ross, Sandusky, Tiffin Columbian and Findlay will compete.

The Ross squad will leave here at noon, as the meet does not start until afternoon. No morning preliminaries will be held this year.

Sandusky's Blue Streaks, perennial champions of the Buckeye, are top heavy favorites to repeat. Only a miracle could move the Little Giants ahead of the Streaks in final points.

Tiffin Columbian and Findlay are rated as only "fair" this year and will battle it out for third place.

Campbell Sets New Mile
Record; Fresh Breaks
Old Javelin Mark

In a meet which saw eight Buckeye league records smashed and one equalled, Fremont Ross had the best day, with 100 points to amass second place in the annual league track and field meet. Findlay had 110, and Sandusky 112, while the "Buckeyes" successfully defended their crown with three years in a row.

To Coach Hause, Earl of Althoff, the showing of the Little Giants was disappointing. "We should have scored 20 more points if we had been doing his best", Coach Althoff said.

Final standing of the meet gave Sandusky 112, Fremont 100, Findlay 95; and Tiffin 90.

Get Two Firsts

Fremont had the only two first places in the annual carnival. Wade (Soupy) Campbell setting a new record in the 100 yards, covering the distance in 4 minutes, 54.5 seconds. His old record, set last year, was 4 minutes, 44.2 seconds.

Then came other firsts on a 160-foot ten inch heave of the javelin by George (Schoolboy) Fresh. This was also a new league record. The old record, set by Earl of Sandusky, likewise set last year.

Particulars concerning the Coach Althoff was the performance of his medley relay team. The Fremont quartet of Lewis, Forger, and Campbell, who had established the event in 3 minutes, 38 seconds, and was at least 40 yards ahead of Sandusky, had to qualify the Ross team for passing the baton outside the regulation distance. Coach Althoff had hardly sympathy for his relay team, for the meet, as these boys had done exceptionally well at the Mansfield meet.

Others Get Points

In other events, Pete Fox finished in third place in the high jump, and Fred Cullum took the high jump. Fox also finished second in the low hurdles to add valuable points to the total.

During Joe Lewis ran third in the 100-yard dash event, and placed a second in the broad jump. Lewis also ran on the Fremont medley relay team which grabbed a second place. Spangler took a fourth place in the 100-yard dash and was fourth in the low hurdles.

Kaufman landed a third in the pole vault event, with Culbert getting the second place. Culbert took fourth in the shot put event. In the discus event, Fresh annexed a fourth place and Brodhead took the javelin toss. Hoefflich claimed a second place in the 880-yard event and Powlett had a fourth in the 220-yard dash.

Shakeup Looks

Because of their showing at the league gathering, Coach Althoff thinks the Little Giants will up his team for the Northwest Ohio district event at Mansfield this weekend. He also has in mind some of the younger candidates a chance to show.
