

Ross Tracksters Idle Until League Carnival

Ross High school's track team, victors over Toledo Libbey in a dual meet at Toledo last Saturday, will have no competition this weekend, Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff said Wednesday.

The coach is making efforts to book a practice meet for Friday or Saturday with a Class B team in this district. If an engagement is obtained, it will not be a regularly scheduled affair and will not count in the season's records.

Buckeye Meet

As it stands now, the next time the Ross Little Giants will taste competition will be at the Buckeye High school league meet at Findlay May 9. With Sandusky's Blue Streaks already a cinch bet for first place, Ross will concentrate on getting enough points to annex runnerup position, which they also

won last year.

After the Buckeye meet, the district meet will be held at Bucyrus. Top honors in this affair will also go to Sandusky, everyone agrees. The Streaks have one of their strongest teams in years and have already won the Mansfield relays and second place in the Ohio Wesleyan relays.

Balanced Team

Strength of the Little Giant team this season appears to be in "balance" and in ability to grab second and third places. Most of the team is inexperienced, and members will enter the Buckeye meet with only one dual meet for seasoning purposes.

The Little Giant tracksters are working out each day at Harmon Field and at the Fairgrounds, but are handicapped because of lack of a place to get in serious training.

LITTLE GIANTS GO TO FINDLAY

Intent on capturing enough points for second place, Ross high school's track and field squad goes to Findlay Saturday to take part in the third annual Buckeye high school league meet. Teams from Fremont Ross, Sandusky, Tiffin Columbian and Findlay will compete.

The Ross squad will leave here at noon, as the meet does not start until afternoon. No morning preliminaries will be held this year.

Sandusky's Blue Streaks, perennial champions of the Buckeye, are top heavy favorites to repeat. Only a miracle could move the Little Giants ahead of the Streaks in final points.

Tiffin Columbian and Findlay are rated as only "fair" this year and will battle it out for third place.

LITTLE GIANTS FINISH BEHIND SANDUSKY BOYS

Campbell Sets New Mile
Record; Freeh Breaks
Old Javelin Mark

In a meet which saw eight Buckeye league records smashed and one equalled, Fremont Rose High's track team scored 43 points to annex second place in the annual league track and field meet at Findlay Saturday afternoon. Sandusky's Blue Striders successfully defending their crown won three years in a row.

To Coach Harold (Whitey) Althoff, the showing of the Little Giants was disappointing. "We should have scored 50 more points if everyone had been doing his best," Coach Althoff said.

Final standing of the meet gave Sandusky 87 1/2 points; Fremont Rose 43; Findlay, 30 1/2; and Tiffin Columbian, 12.

Get Two Firsts

Fremont scored only two first places in the annual carnival. Wade (Soupy) Campbell setting a new record for the mile, covering the distance in 4 minutes 33.4 seconds. His old record, set last year, was 4 minutes 44.3 seconds.

The other first came on a 160 foot ten inch heave of the javelin by George (Schoolboy) Freeh. This was also a new league record, the old mark of 167 feet two inches having been held by Earl, of Sandusky, likewise set last year.

Particularly disappointing to Coach Althoff was the performance of his medley relay team. The Fremont quartet of Lewis, Forgeron, Wanstall and Campbell finished the event in 2 minutes 36 seconds, and was at least 40 yards ahead of Sandusky, but the judges disqualified the Rose team for passing the baton outside the regulation distance. Coach Althoff had barked heavily on his relay team for the meet, as these boys had done exceptionally well at the Mansfield relays.

Others Got Points

In other events, Pete Fox finished in third place in the high hurdles, and tied for second in the high jump. Fox also finished second in the low hurdles to add valuable points.

Dusky Joe Lewis ran third in the 100-yard dash event, and placed second in the broad jump. Lewis likewise ran on the 880-yard relay team which grabbed a second place. Spangler took a fourth place in the 100-yard dash and was fourth in the low hurdles.

Kaufman landed a third in the pole vault event, with Culbert getting fourth. Tindell also took a fourth in the shot put event. In the discus event, Freeh annexed a fourth place, and Brudzinski took third in the javelin toss. Hofelich claimed a second place in the 880-yard event and Powless had a fourth in the 220-yard dash.

Shakeup Looms

Because of their showing at the league gathering, Coach Althoff threatened Monday to "shake up" his team for the Northwest Ohio district event at Mansfield this weekend. He said he would give some of the younger candidates a chance to show.

SAINTS ANNEX 15TH STRAIGHT

Mud Hens Drop Eighth
in Row; Herring is in

CHICAGO, May 11.—The St. Paul Saints, winners of more American Association championships than any other club in the circuit, apparently are determined to add another to their string.

The Saints won their 15th straight game yesterday, downing the Toledo Mud Hens, 12 to 1, behind eight-hit pitching by Art Herring. It was the eighth straight defeat for the Hens.

The fast traveling Saints now lead the circuit by 131 percentage points, having a standing of 833 to 700 for the second place Kansas City Blues. The pace-setters are six games short of tying the circuit winning streak set by Milwaukee in 1928.

Split Two Ties
Kansas City and Indianapolis split their double bill, the Blues taking the first game, 4-0, behind the pitching of Phil Page and John Niggeling, but being shut out by Bob Logan in the nightcap, 3-0.

Milwaukee trimmed Columbus in the opening game of a scheduled double header, 8-3, but rain and darkness halted the second game in the third inning with the Brewers leading, 1-0. The paid attendance was 11,303, largest in years.
