





## 13 Meets Face Local Natators

This appears to be a rebuilding year for the Ross high school swimming team. Only two letter-men are back from the squad that brought Fremont state championship honors.

Coach George Gruse has a squad of 37 boys and the only veterans are backstroker Merlin Eversole and Ned Frantz, a free-styler.

The natators have been practicing for a couple of months and will publicly display their wares December 15 against the Bowling Green freshmen in the local pool. They have one more meet in December, going to Shaker Heights on the 18th, then they are idle from interscholastic competition until January 14.

The Little Giants have 13 meets, including the district and state meets.

### Newcomers In Spotlight

With gaping vacancies in almost every position, inexperienced boys will have to carry the torch. For the 50-yard free-style, Jack Balsizer, a sophomore, appears destined to become a regular, along with Frantz. Balsizer also will be on the free-style relay team.

Jack Bovard, a junior, looks good in the 100-yard free-style and may make the medley relay team. Walt Deichert, a senior, likely will team with Bovard in the 100 and swim a leg of the free-style relay.

Dave Hunt has the inside track for the 200-yard swim and also a position on the medley relay group.

### Hull Rates High

One of the most outstanding prospects is Charles Hull, a junior. Hull will go in the 200 for sure and has also clinched a berth on the relay team. In the opinion of Gruse, Hull has record-breaking potential, and it may blossom this winter.

A pair of sophomores, John Hensley and Tom Wadsworth, are pressing hard for the starting nod in the breaststroking department. Senior Tom Wolf will be one of the two choices.

Dick Smith, a senior, is Gruse's most experienced diver.

### Butler Upsets Purdue, 67-65

CHICAGO (AP)—Still another Big Ten basketball team dropped from the undefeated ranks Tuesday night, Purdue being edged 67-65 by Butler, a much-abused foe in previous appearance against conference teams.

Butler was trounced four times earlier this season by Big Ten squads but licked the Boilermakers with phenomenal fourth-quarter accuracy.

The Indianapolis team took only eight shots from the field in the last period and hit six of them. Throughout the game, Butler hit on 22 of 53 shots—a solid average.

Only six Big Ten teams now have undefeated records. Northwestern, Iowa and Wisconsin also have been beaten once.

Iowa, which lost to Nebraska last time out, returned to the winning side last night with a handy 72-55 victory over Colorado A&M.

The Hawkeyes played without their star forward, Deacon Davis, who suffered a head injury against Nebraska.

Iowa and Purdue were the only Big Ten teams in action last night. DePaul's 98-68 victory over Illinois Normal featured midwest independent play.

The next conference action takes place Thursday with Michigan State at Marquette. Loyola is at Notre Dame in a top independent game Thursday.

Ross high school swimmers demonstrated last night that they have potential but lack experience as they defeated a good Bowling Green State University freshman squad, 39-36, before about 100 fans in the local pool.

Now the Little Giants face a high school team that is confident this far in advance of winning or scoring a near-miss in the 1951 state finals. On Friday, the Fremonters invade the Shaker Heights pool. Starting time is 4:15.

Free-styler Ned Frantz, and Bob Corthell proved to be revelations, and the 150-yard medley relay team, composed of Corthell, Wolf and Jack Bovard, made a sound showing with a victory in the time of 1:27.2.

#### Frantz Wins In 15.2

Frantz rolled home a winner in the 50-yard free-style in the nifty time of 25.2 seconds. He won the 100-yard free-style in 58.8. His time for the 50 was just two-tenths of a second slower than the time which was good enough to win a state championship for Sidney Hall of Grandview last March at Columbus.

Tom Wolf splashed home first in the breast-stroke in 1:12.5, not exceptionally fast but not bad for a dual meet and good considering it was the first meet of the season.

#### Corthell Outstanding

Corthell backstroked 100 yards to defeat teammate Merlin Eversole, a letterman, in the time of 1:08, which is usually good enough to win the district meet and add points in state competition. Eversole won the district last year on 1:09.

Actually, Corthell was the star of the meet. He won his individual event with an impressive time and got the medley relay trio off to a good start.

Charles Hull, who Coach Gruse believes will be a star in his own right, looked good for half of his 200-yard free-style race but faded on the third lap. However, the youngster was weakened by a cold and Gruse believes he will live up to expectations.

Bowling Green won the 200-yard free-style relay but it wasn't the fault of Eversole. Swimming as a free-styler for the first time in competition, he almost overtook B. G.'s Bob Horzfall on the last leg of the relay after trailing by four yards when he hit the water. Each free-styler swims 50 yards in the relay event.

## Shaker Heights Wins, 50 $\frac{1}{2}$ -24 $\frac{1}{2}$

CLEVELAND—Shaker Heights' state championship fever soared beyond thermometer measurements Friday.

The Red Raiders, who put all the pressure on themselves with pre-meet buildup, gave defending swimming champion Fremont Ross a sound 50 $\frac{1}{2}$ -24 $\frac{1}{2}$  trouncing in the Shaker pool.

Fremont was able to win only one event, the 100-yard breast-stroke. The 150-yard medley relay teams finished in a rare dead heat. Fremont went through the 1952-53 season undefeated and although most of the squadmen from last year graduated, the Little Giants' mentor, George Gruse, was hopeful of great things from this year's inexperienced team.

### Gruse Not Downcast

However, Gruse still is not convinced, and he declared his inexperienced squad did "very well." Pointing out that most of yesterday's finishes in the 40-yard pool (standard length is 50 feet) were close, Gruse asserted:

"I am satisfied that we will still have a good team before the season is over. Shaker has a well balanced team. However, it is not a great team as yet."

Tom Wolf won the Fremont first. Gaining the deadlock in the medley relay were Bob Corthell, Wolf and Jack Bovard.

So great was the Raiders' combination that not only did they take seven firsts plus a tie, but they also were second in three events.

## Gruse Makes Lineup Changes

Ross high will present a slightly revamped lineup tonight when it resumes its swimming competition.

The Little Giants meet Sandusky in the local pool. The match pits last year's Nos. 1 and 2 teams, Ross winning the state title and Sandusky being runner-up. The meet will start at 7:30.

The Blue Streaks, unbeaten in two matches, will be led by two veterans, Ben Lauber and Jim Lanker. Lauber, a junior, is one of the state's most versatile swimmers and has an excellent chance of making off with first place in the medley swim this year. Lanker is a free-styler.

Coach George Gruse announced today he will start Walt Deichert in the 50-yard free-style instead of Jack Balsizer. Freshman Tom Hite will replace Bob Amey in the 200-yard free-style and Agee takes over Deichert's old spot in the 100-yard free-style.

John Hensley, a sophomore, will swim in the 150-yard individual medley instead of Amey. Gruse is uncertain as to whether to lead off the 200-yard free-style relay team with Deichert or Balsizer.

Under competitive swimming rules, a boy may compete in only two events.

## Seventh Grader Visitors' Star

George Gruse is feeling chipper again after his Ross high school swimming team's 49-26 victory over the Toledo Y. M. C. A. in the local pool last night.

The last two events were enough to cause any coach to smile. The relay teams, for which Fremont is becoming famous in Ohio scholastic circles, turned in solid performances.

The 150-yard medley group won easily in the time of 1 minute, 27.5 seconds. The 200-yard free-style quartet splashed to another lopsided verdict in 1:42.7. The times compare favorably with last year's state finals. The Ross free-stylers, after setting a state meet mark with 1:40 in the prelims, won the state championship the next day in 1:41.3, while Sandusky's crack trio won the medley relay in 1:25.3.

### Jastremski Pushes

Ned Frantz, Charles Hull, Bob Corthell and Jack Bovard won individual races for Fremont, while a seventh grader swimming for the Toledo Y distinguished himself by capturing first place in the individual medley and running second in the 200-yard free-style. The youngster Chet Jastremski, pushed Hull to the excellent time of 2:13.6 in the 200.

Fremont won top honors in fancy diving. Jim Weaver and Dick Smith finishing 1-2.

In the loss to Shaker Heights before Christmas, the 200-yard free-style was won by Shaker's Brown in 2:17. The time of 2:06.3 took state honors for Graham Vanderveer of Lakewood last year.

### Frantz Shows Speed

Frantz sped to victory in the 50 in 25.5, just five-tenths of a second off the time that won the state meet in 1953 for Sidney Hall of Grandview.

Corthell, a junior who is Gruse's newest discovery in competitive swimming, splashed to victory in the back-stroke after overtaking teammate Merlin Eversole in 1:08.8, four and one-tenth seconds above the state championship time of '53.

Bovard won so easily that his time was slower than it would have been had he been exerted. He swam his 100-yard free-style in 1:01.

# Frantz, Lauber Set Record Pace

Sandusky high school's swimming team, runner-up to Ross for the 1953 state championship, won its third straight victory before a large crowd in the local pool last night, 43-32.

The Little Giants could have pulled it out of the fire in their "bread and butter" event, the 200-yard free-style relay, but Sandusky got off to a big lead and Fremont's Ned Frantz missed by a foot in closing the gap. Frantz was the hero in a similar situation Saturday at Western Reserve Academy.

Frantz was far behind when he hit the water and he gained plenty on Jim Lanker, crack Sandusky free-styler. Frantz won the 50-yard free-style over Lanker in the first event of the night.

Frantz equalled a school record with his time of 24.5 seconds in the 50, tying the time of Bruce Ransom of the 1947 team.

Ben Lauber, one of Sandusky's many veterans, broke a mark set last year by Jack Rose when he swam the 150-yard individual medley in 1:44.3.

Ross won the first four events, Frantz in the 50, Tom Wolf in the 100-yard breast-stroke, Charles Hull in the 200-yard free-style and Bob Corthell in the back stroke. Then the roof caved in and Sandusky won five consecutive events.

Sandusky forged ahead, 32-31, when Lauber and Dave Ortman finished 1-2 in the 120-yard individual medley. Lauber broke a pool record with 1:18.9. The Blue Streaks widened their margin to 37-31 in the medley relay, with Farben, Hotchkiss, Rehfuss and Dewey barely getting the verdict over Corthell, Wolf and Balsizer.

But the big relay, worth seven points, turned the tide in the unusual finish which saw both teams breaking the pool record.

Well, last night's swimming meet between Canton McKinley and Fremont Ross was also a matter of inches. Just a few inches at that, but they were enough to keep McKinley undefeated in seven dual meets. Ross has a 4-3 record.

Ted Brannin's Bulldogs nipped Ross at the finish of the medley relay when Joe Thatcher touched out Jack Bovard in a thrilling race. That was the margin that Canton needed for its 40-35 victory.

Ross won the final event, the free-style relay, in the excellent time of 1:41.7.

### Not Exactly Convincing

The defeat, while not exactly relished by Coach George Gruse, actually did not put much of a damper on the 'little Giants' chances of big things in the state meet. In the first place, the Bulldogs are much better balanced than the Shaker Heights team which trounced Ross earlier in the season and secondly, the Giants are capable of doing better in a couple of individual events than they did last night.

**Ned Frantz and Tom Wolf** got Fremont off to winning starts, Frantz in the 50-yard free-style and Wolf in the 100-yard breast-stroke. Then Canton took over and ran up a 26-19 lead going into the diving. Fremont's Jim Weaver and Gene Smith came through, finishing in 1-2 order, to square the match at 27-27. However, Joe Van Horn of Canton came roaring back in the 150-yard individual medley to set a new pool record.

Van Horn's time was 1:42.8, beating the pool mark set earlier this season by Sandusky's Ben Lauber. His time was 1:44.03.

Joe Van Horn also won the 200-yard free-style. Other individual winners for Canton were Bud Troxler in the back stroke and Pete Parker in the 100-yard free-style.
