Bowling Green Wins Relays

Bowling Green high school put down a determined Toledo Clay bid last night and went on to win the Second Annual Night Relays at Harmon field. Defending champion Findlay finished third, one point ahead of host school Fremont Ross.

A crowd estimated at much larger than the one which sat in on the first relays last year when

the weather was cold and wet, witnessed a revamp of the record book as all running event records were broken.

The final standings were, Bowling Green 53, Clay 48, Findlay 31, Fremont 30, Fostoria 26½ and Oak Harbor 19½.

Medals and ribbons were presented to first five place finishers by Ross high students Shar-

on Martin, Ruth Weaver, Emile Roush, Kathy Busch and Joyce Oxley. These girls were chosen as queens of the relays by the track squad, then voted upon by the student body.

Ross' best efforts came on second place finishes in the mile relay, two-mile relay, sprint medley and distance medley. Ron Brown of Ross brought the crowd to its

feet as he came within an eyelash of winning the last leg of the two-mile relay, coming from far back to take the lead in the last 50 yards only to lose it again in the final 20 yards.

Officials felt the balmy weather was a definite factor in causing the record book to be rewritten. Several marks fell by a considerable margin.

No records were kept on field events as this year the three-man teams were used as compared to two-man teams of a year ago.

Donovan Notches Fourth, Keeps Tribe In First Place

Dick Donovan, who's made more stops than a local bus, may have found himself a home with the Cleveland Indians.

The tall, veteran right-hander, one of four players the Indians acquired when they dealt fiery Jimmy Piersall to the Washington Senators, is one of the principal reasons the Indians are leading the American League.

He chalked up his fourth victory in an unbeaten season with a solid, six-hit 7-2 triumph over the Minnesota Twins Friday night that kept the Indians a game ahead of the pack.

In the others, all night games, Detroit punished Los Angeles 13-4, New York outlasted Washington 10-8, Chicago beat Boston 7-4 and Kansas City routed Baltimore 14-5.

In the National League, the Los Angeles Dodgers defeated Pittsburgh 7-2, San Francisco edged the Chicago Cubs 5-4, Milwaukee nipped Houston 2-1, St. Louis belted Cincinnati 14-3 and Philadelphia outslugged the New York Mets 11-9.
