# Youth movement is on

Sophomore class will need to step up for Little Giants

FREMONT — With the exception of a few familiar faces, 16-year head coach Mark Gedeon has a youth movement in the Fremont Ross basketball program.

The Little Giants have just two seniors and three juniors on the varsity roster. The rest are sophomores.


"We're young, but we do have seven returning letter-winners that experienced what varsity basketball is," Gedeon said, who guided Ross to a 4-17 overall record and 2-8 Greater Buckeye Conference mark a year ago. "We started a little rough in the summer, but the kids want to learn. They want to do things right and by the end of the summer we were playing some outstanding basketball."

Included in the seven players back for the Little Giants are seniors Shunnar Gamble (6-3 forward/guard) and Jake Hiestand (5-9 guard). Skylar Reffner (6-2 post), Jay Carnicom (6-1 forward/guard) and Dianne Pettiford (5-10 guard) are all returning juniors.

Headlining a group of talented returnees in the sophomore class are Nick Streacter (6-3 post) and Drew Starks (5-9 guard). Another sophomore expected to make a big contribution is Dylan Starks (5-9 guard). Jordan Kidd (5-11 guard) is a sophomore who should also be in the mix for time.

"There's still a lot of teaching that needs done," Gedeon said. "We'll have to do a lot of things to overcome our lack of size."

Ross's size will come from Streacter, Reffner and Gamble inside. Streacter, who joined the team near the mid-point of the season, played in 13 games as a

"For him, the sky is the limit for how good he

wants to be," Gedeon said. Streacter has the ability to stretch the floor and sink 15 to 17-foot jump shots. Another player who can stretch the defense is Gamble, the Little Giants' lead-

ing returning scorer. The three-year letterman averaged 12 points and a team-best 6.3 rebounds a game as a junior. But he also had to the ability to pass, leading Ross in assists with 37.

"He's a guy who can play any position on the floor," Gedeon said. "We definitely expect him to be a focal point of what we do both offensively and defensively."

Gamble was all-GBC and all-District 6 first teamer, taking over the role as Ross's go-to guy with the departure of Kenny Penn during the midpoint of the year.

"I think people have seen some of the things he can bring to the table," Gedeon said. "We want to see it on a consistent basis. He can affect the game in a number of different ways, whether it's defense, whether it's scoring, his rebounding, blocking shots or passing the ball."

Gedeon is hoping for a big season from Reffner too. Last season he earned honorable mention district and league honors scoring 8 points a game and pulling down 3.7 boards.

"Skylar is a very versatile athlete and very competitive," Gedeon said. "He can play inside or outside. He defends. He rebounds. We have a lot of expectations for him and he of himself."

Gedeon said Carnicom and Pettiford had the team's best summers.

Hiestand also worked on

his game and showed new abilities to create offense other than from the three-point line.

"He's easily our smartest player," Gedeon said of his second returning senior. "And he's definitely one of our hardest workers. This summer we saw how he's able to put the ball on the floor better and attack the paint, whether it's for an assist or his own layup."

Smarts is what Gedeon thinks will fuel his team.

"We're going to expect a lot from our players mentally," Gedeon said. "They'll have to do a lot of quick changes offensively and defensively. Not just in transition, but having the ability to adjust to a new set or to be able to read and react to a defense."

"If we get five players executing all of that at the same speed and who handle their responsibilities correctly, I think we can cause havoc for the other teams."

Protecting the ball, executing on offense and playing great defense were a formula that equaled a lot of success in off-season scrimmages. It was key in wins for Ross over Lima Senior

(67-63 overtime) and at Napoleon (55-38) late in the season.

All that's slowed down the Little Giants in practice thus far has been football, but it was nice distraction according to Gedeon, who hadn't been affected by it in four years.

"The football playoffs always puts any basketball

program back," Gedeon said. "But the neat thing for us was a lot of our kids were out there on the football field, so we wanted them to continue to win too."

"Now that they're here, it's time to get focused on the next season and try to make use of what we did this summer."

# Little Giants drop season opener at Waite

TOLEDO — The up-tempo defense of Toledo Waite, coupled with the play of Ke-Sean Harris was too much for Fremont Ross, as it dropped its season opener 71-51 on Saturday.

The Little Giants (0-1) jumped out to an 11-7 lead after the first quarter, but their 17 turnovers and Harris' 26 points ultimately did them in.

"They took advantage of our turnovers, which allowed them to be much more aggressive," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said. "We had 13 turnovers in the first half and that's what we want for the game. So we just gave away too many opportunities."

Fremont Ross's Skylar Reffner scored the game's first four points on layups set up by Shunnar Gamble. The Little Giants played from in front the entire quarter.

That's when Harris began to heat up, as he would hit ten consecutive shots after missing his first three. The Indians (1-0)

began the second quarter on an 11-3 run and turned the deficit into a 26-21 lead.

Jay Carnicom's and Jake Hiestand's six points, kept the Little Giants within striking distance going into the second half. But Harris took over the game, scoring the first eight points of the half for the Indians to push their lead to double digits.

"We have to do a better job at recognizing their special players on the floor," Gedeon said. "Harris is a four-year varsity player for them, and we allowed him to score the first eight points — all on defensive breakdowns and lack of recognition from our players."

The Little Giants trailed 43-28 entering the fourth quarter and never could pull within ten points. Waite had ten players

score, including Henry Newson's 12 points to go with his 11 rebounds.

"We've been working on that in preaseason, trying to work guys in because we want to play up-tempo," Indians coach Dave Pitsenberger said. "We were a little sloppy but we executed when we needed to."

"Coach Gedeon does a great job with his guys so we told them we had to step up and put pressure on the ball and create turnovers."

Jordan Kidd's ten points led the Little Giants, while Gamble pulled in six rebounds. Ross shot just 15-of-45 (33 percent) from the field and 16-of-34 (47 percent) from the free throw line.

The Little Giants next game will be at home Friday when they take on Lima.

"One thing we have to improve on is taking care of the basketball, that's our number one thing every time" Gedeon said. "Second thing is we have to play much better defense and be much better with our execution both offensively and defensively."

# Lima forces tempo, tops Ross

FREMONT — A fast start to the second half powered Lima Senior to a 87-73 victory against Fremont Ross at the Purple Pit Friday on opening night of the Greater Buckeye Conference.

Leading 44-38 at halftime, the Spartans (2-0, 1-0) went on a 14-2 run to start the third quarter — highlighted by an alley-oop dunk by Kendall Jackson on a pass from Tyler White.

Spartan coach Shawn Allen used an up-tempo offense and defense, a strategy he believed led to the third-quarter outburst.

"If you look before the half, I think they were making subs quicker than they wanted to and we controlled the tempo from the beginning of the game," said Allen. "While we took control in the third, I felt it started in that late stretch of the second half."

In addition to the Spartans forcing the tempo, Ross (0-2, 0-1) coach Mark Gedeon was disappointed in the fact that

his team turned the ball over 17 times in the second half — many of which were unforced.

"We've got to do a better job in that second half and make sure we execute," said Gedeon. "I mean we can't have 17 turnovers in the second half alone and expect to win a basketball game."

"Most of those turnovers were us being very tentative. They're looking for us to make mistakes whether it's our players being out of place, our players not coming back for the basketball, or if it's our players throwing 25-foot passes — those things don't work against a Lima Senior basketball team."

Turning the ball over proved to be even more detrimental, as trading baskets with a the Spartans multi-faceted and

dangerous offense.

Allen said after the game he hopes his team averages 80 points a game this season.

White had a game-high 30 points, while Jackson added 16 points and Shawn Devon Allen — the coaches' son — added 13 points including two key 3-pointers during the third quarter run.

"With a team that has multiple options offensive, you can't just focus on one guy," Gedeon said. "But we want to limit how much that one guy can hurt us. Lima's always going to have five guys on the floor who can score."

Losing by 14-points overshadowed an impressive effort from Ross center Nick Streacter. The 6-foot-5 sophomore recorded a double-double with 21 points and 14 rebounds.

Skylar Reffner also had a strong night under the basket, scoring 20 points and grabbing five boards for the Little Giants.

"We thought we had an advantage with those two getting the ball inside, and hopefully they'd have some opportunities to convert," Gedeon said. "Them both having 20 points says a lot about their effort."

The first quarter was a back-and-forth opening to the contest. It was a tempo that would carry throughout the rest of the night, as the Spartans outscored the Little Giants 23-19 in the opening quarter.

Lima Senior would out-score Ross 21-19 in the second quarter, setting up the eight-point deficit that the Spartans would balloon to 17 points at the end of the third.

With both teams emptying their benches, Ross outscored Lima Senior 23-20 in the final stanza to reach the final margin.

The Spartans will play tomorrow at Mansfield Senior, while the Little Giants will have a week to prepare for Findlay.

Diate Pettiford had a career-night with 30 points, but Fremont Ross was unable to complete its comeback, falling Saturday in a non-league tilt at Start.

The Little Giants fell behind 40-26 at halftime and got the Spartans edge down to 10 after three quarters, but couldn't get key stops down the stretch.

"Our kids really battled hard," said Ross coach Mark Gedeon. "We closed it to two late in the game several times, then we had a 50-footer go off the backboard at the buzzer."

Jake Hiestand added nine points and Skylar Reffner tallied eight for Ross (0-4), which was still playing without the services of the injured Shunnar Gamble.

Maurice Taylor led Start (3-1) with 19 points, while Demond Crisp chipped in 13.

"The beginning part of the second quarter was key," Gedeon said. "They scored on the first five possessions to turn a two-possession game into a sizable lead."

Pettiford, a junior, kept the Little Giants going, though, as he was active on both ends of the floor.

"Diate was spectacular," Gedeon said. "He attacked the basket, and was active offensively and defensively. We need him to be aggressive all the time for us and this was something we knew he was capable of doing. It was nice to see his efforts pay off."

# Carnicom keys Little Giants in first win

TOLEDO — Not too many basketball coaches can say they have a post player with the skills of a point guard.

Fremont Ross coach Mark Gedeon can.

That's because Jay Carnicom, his backup point guard from a year ago, has been forced to play inside because of some key early-season injuries. And the 6-foot-2 junior is making the most of it.

Carnicom tallied a team and career-best 16 points for the Little Giants, who closed 2010 with their

first victory of the season, topping Toledo Woodward 53-44 in a Thursday afternoon non-conference tilt.

"Jay is very multi-skilled and we have expectations for him," said Gedeon. "He's still trying to come off the gates stronger for us. Once he gets that first basket, that first rebound or first assist, he relaxes a bit and comes out and plays."

Carnicom scored 10 of his points in the second and third quarters, helping Ross (1-5) in what turned out to be the key stretch of the game.

After the quarter ended the first quarter in a 10-10 tie, the Polar Bears (1-5) jumped out to a three-point lead twice — once on a

3-pointer from Breontay Smith and again on a second-chance bucket inside by Brandon Wyatt.

Dante Pettiford cut the lead to 15-14 on a drive-in layup and then Carnicom gave Ross the lead on the next possession. He pulled down a defensive rebound and took the ball coast-to-coast for laying in and three-point play.

"My handles have definitely been one of more stronger points," said Carnicom. "I try to do a nice crossover and then take it to the basket hard."

Carnicom and the Little Giants ended the half on a 9-4 run to take a 23-19 lead to the break. Their momentum quickly shifted Wood-

ward's way however, to start the second half.

A Jalen Wells basket started a 10-1 run for the Polar Bears, giving them a 29-24 advantage.

Ross changed its defense during a timeout and got back to work. Pettiford sunk the front-end of two foul shots before finding Drew Starks for a 3-pointer the next time down the floor.

Jordan Kidd sank two from the charity stripe to put the Little Giants ahead 30-29. Two possessions later, with Ross up 32-31, Carnicom had in a hand in six straight points that gave the Little Giants a 38-34 lead entering the final period.

"We got some hustle plays that we

needed and it allowed us to run the floor," Gedeon said. "That was a key stretch for us, especially with the way we got down five. We had unforced turnovers and missed some bunnies where we got a lit-te sloppy."

First, Carnicom sank two foul shots. Then he drove in for a chance to get three points and finished the run with a nice backdoor pass to Jake Hiestand who laid in to give Ross a seven-point edge.

He scored four of the Little Giants' first six points in the final quarter as Ross pulled out to a comfortable lead. Carnicom and Pettiford then helped Ross go

7-of-8 at the foul line in the final two minutes to preserve the win.

As for his new duties, Carnicom, who usually plays the wing, said the positions differ only a little.

"With our offense we just go open," Carnicom said. "So it's really the same position I'm normally at. Just on defense, now I've got to guard the big guy and be a little tougher."

Carnicom pulled down six boards and added a pair of steals and assists. Ross forced the Polar Bears into 24 turnovers.

"Rebounding is the big thing," Carnicom said. "Coach wants me to get about 10 boards a game. I haven't been doing that, but I'm trying to get more."

One player who did pull down rebounds was Kidd, who finished with a game-high eight rebounds. He also chipped in eight points.

"He's really stepped it up," Car-

nicom said. "He's a 5-foot-10-inch post player and he's been getting all the boards for us."

Pettiford was the only other Ross player in double figures, with 14 points. Skylar Reffner chipped in seven rebounds.

The win was a welcome site for a team decimated by injuries to two of its two top post players, Shunnar Gamble and Nick Streacter. Gamble dressed for the first time this season, but didn't play. Gedeon is hopeful the senior can return next week at Sandusky.

"Coach keeps telling us that January is going to be our month," Carnicom said. "December was a tough month. We just needed to get this first win and now hopefully we'll start rolling."

Wells' 18 points paced Woodward which shot just 34 percent (20-of-58) from the field.

# Ross can't keep up with Sandusky in 70-43 loss

SANDUSKY — Fremont Ross coach Mark Gedeon implored his kids to make plays and be aggressive in the huddle before the second half Thursday.

The Little Giants had six steals in the third quarter and cut a deficit to five points, but Sandusky surged from there and defeated Ross 70-43 in the Greater Buckeye Conference.

Jordan Kidd canned a three-pointer for a 37-32 margin before the Little Giants failed to convert a layup in transition. Xavier Turner, who scored a game-high 24 points, then sandwiched two buckets around seven points from Cordney Strickland as the Blue Streaks scored 11 straight. "We didn't score off turnovers," Gedeon said.

"We need our defense to create offense. We didn't get anything easy."

"We tried to get them on their heels, but the running game started and they got confident."

Turner (four) and Tristen Jeffries combined for seven field goals as Sandusky (3-4, 2-1) led 21-10 after one quarter.

"Xavier and Tristen set the tone early on," Blue Streaks coach Steve Keller said. "Xavier was there in key stretches with a putback or score. I was pleased with the team effort."

Ross (1-6, 0-3) went to man-to-man defense in the second quarter and outscored

Sandusky 8-6 to trail 27-18 at the half.

"It's like a roller coaster," Gedeon said. "At times we play with the passion we need to be successful and other times we hang our heads and one mistake turns into three. Nobody will give you anything."

The Blue Streaks outscored Ross 33-11 following Kidd's three. Kidd and Skylar Reffner each scored nine points for the Little Giants.

"We left too many opportunities on the floor that you have to convert," Gedeon said. "We gave up second-chance points and we didn't execute. We have to execute and be in the right spots and communicate. We didn't do those things well."

Turner scored 16 points in the second half.

"He's playing really well," Gedeon said. "He's the main person we were concerned with. He knows where to be on the floor to get conversions on the glass and in the paint. He played a great game."

Sandusky played at a frenetic pace much of the game. It consistently hurt the Little Giants in transition, but Sandusky did commit 17 turnovers in the middle two quarters.

Ross, however, was unable to take advantage.

"With a young team — the psychological part — we have to learn to overcome," Gedeon said.

"It's about now. You can't dwell on the past and the last possession."

## Ross loses lead late, falls in OT

TOLEDO — The Fremont Ross basketball team allowed St Francis to rally back from a ten point halftime deficit late in the fourth quarter, and fell in overtime 60-54 on Saturday night.

After a solid first half of play that gave the Little Giants (1-7) a 30-20 advantage, the Knights (3-6) stormed back into the game and took control.

"At times we played some very good basketball, unfortunately we came out on the short end of this one," said Ross coach Mark Gedeon. "I thought the first three minutes of the third quarter were critical.

"They outscored us by seven during that time and that gave them the belief that they could win."

The Knights opened the half on a 9-2 run to cut the lead to three, as were red-hot from the field. But the Little Giants' Jordan Kidd poured in three 3-pointers to temporarily hold off the rally.

Fremont Ross would lead 41-36 going into the fourth quarter, but St. Francis again would go on a run, outscoring the Little Giants 6-1 to cut the lead down to two points.

Trent Morrisey's two foul shots with just over two minutes left gave the Knight a 51-50 lead. They would go up two points on another free throw with a minute left to play.

After both teams exchanged missed shots, Jay Carnicom dropped in a contested runner in the lane with 1.8 seconds remaining to knot the score at 52 apiece and send the game to overtime.

The momentum would not carry over to the extra period, though, as St. Francis quickly went up four points on a pair of driving layups from Morrisey and Dan Yodiz.

Jake Hiestand would score the Little Giants' only points of the overtime when he stole a Knights pass and drew a pair of free throws to pull within 56-54.

While Fremont Ross continued its cold spell offensively, St. Francis closed the game out with four free throws to complete the comeback.

"We've got to make sure we're in better position defensively," Gedeon said. "They scored 25 out of their 60 points from the free throw line; we've got to do a much better job getting into our positioning."

Morrisey and Yodiz did most of the Knights damage from the charity stripe, where they both sank nine apiece to help end a

six game losing streak.

"We don't have a lot of experience back, especially out front with our ball handlers," said Knights coach Brad Britton. "We've just got to keep getting better and more confident."

"We've played a tremendously hard schedule, and if we're going to beat anybody we have to play good defensively, and I thought we did that in the second half."

Carnicom led Fremont Ross

offensively with 15 points while Kidd added 11.

Carnicom added a spinning lay-up at the buzzer to end the first half, and the good offensive performance showed only flashes of what he is capable of.

"He has the potential," Gedeon said of Carnicom. "We know he's got the potential, he's just got to be consistent all the way through."

Yodiz led the Knights with 21 points and Morrisey chipped in 15.

# Reffner sees the future

## Ross junior predicts good outing, team tops Marion

FREMONT — Ross's Skylar Reffner let his coach know early that he was going to be a difference-maker on the court Friday.

"As soon as I walked in the gym, Skylar told me, 'Coach, we're going to play well tonight,'" Mark Gedeon said. "He just had that look of confidence in his eye and had that assertiveness."

Reffner scored the Little Giants' first seven points on his way to a team-high 19 as Ross topped Marion Harding 58-48 to earn their first Greater Buckeye Conference win this year, as well as their first victory this season inside the Purple Pit.

"I scored 21 points against them last year, so I knew coming in that I could do something down low on them," said Reffner. "I just went out there and tried to make my presence felt."

Reffner gave Ross (2-7, 1-3) a 3-0 lead after converting a three-point play just 24 seconds in. Then after a Marvin Owens 3-pointer tied the game for the Presidents (2-7, 0-3) the next trip down the floor, the junior sank two foul shots before Dianne Pettiford found him inside for two more.

"After that first play my confidence got up," Reffner said. "I knew it was going to be a good night after that."

The Little Giants led 12-8 after one quarter. They went on to lead 26-18 at the break with Reffner recording 11 of their first-half points.

On defense, Ross held Harding to 6-of-24 shooting (25 percent). Ross was 9-of-20 on the opposite end.

"We did a nice job of keeping them out of the paint, which was something Coach Gedeon preached all week," Reffner said. "We were making them shoot a lot of outside shots and deep threes."

Coming into the game, Owens, Shaquille Smith and Dewey Smith had accounted for 85 percent of the Presidents' scoring. On Friday, they would account for all of it. Owens led the way with a game-high 22 points, chipping in four rebounds and four steals. Shaquille Smith had nine points and eight boards, while Dewey Smith added 15 points.

Two shots at the charity stripe from Shaquille Smith gave the Presidents their lone lead of the game at 15-14 with 5:08 left in the second quarter.

From there on Ross outscored Harding 12-3. It took a three-possession lead to the break on a last second 3-pointer from Jake Hiestand.

"That start definitely wasn't very good for us," said Harding coach Roger Jury. "Some of the shots we got were pretty good shots, but we were missing some point-blank layups too. That got our kids starting to question their shot. Then we missed some jump shots we usually make."

The third quarter belonged to

Harding however, as the Presidents cut the Little Giants' lead to three points on four occasions.

"Our defensive intensity was pretty good, but the fouls started to catch up with us in a couple important spots," Jury said. "We sat there for awhile with two or three kids with four fouls, which

pushed our intensity back a bit."

For what would've been a bad quarter for the Little Giants, Shunmar Gamble saved it in the final two minutes. He would tally six points inside using his height on isolation plays, keeping Ross from losing the lead.

“He’s slowing starting to get healthier, but he gave us a presence tonight for sure,” Gedeon said, whose team had the height edge for the first time this season. “We knew he was that go-to player for us in that situation.”

Gamble finished with 11 points, chipping in a game-high 11 boards and adding three assists. It was just his third game back after missing much of the early season with a back injury.

“That was great to see Shunnar come out and score points for us like that,” Reffner said. “It was big for this team. We need him to score for us.”

A steal and layin at the other end from Dewey Smith cut Ross’s

lead to 34-33 just 1:04 into the final quarter.

But it was a short-lived rally, as the Little Giants scored 10 of the next 13 points to lead 45-37 with 3 minutes, 33 seconds remaining.

The Little Giants went on to close it out going 13-of-24 from the line in that final stanza.

“We did a nice job of executing there in the fourth,” Gedeon said. “We got some inside buckets, then got the ball in our free throw shooter’s hands.

“It was nice to see Skylar get to the line 14 times tonight.”

Ross finished 19-of-31 at the line on the night, with Reffner going 9-of-14. Harding finished just 9-of-19, with all the makes from the two Smiths and Owens.

“We’ve got a young team that has some injuries,” Jury said. “Those aren’t excuses. But aside from our main guys, we’ve had very few of our kids play varsity. So we do a lot through them.”

# Big men carry Findlay

## Large front line helps Trojans overwhelm Little Giants

FREMONT — In basketball you just can't teach height, and Findlay brought lots of it to Fremont Ross on Friday.

Trojans center C.J. Gettys stands at 6-feet, 10-inches. Brock Ammons is 6-6, and together they nearly outscored the entire Ross team.

Gettys tallied a game-high 19 points and Ammons added 10, helping Findlay to a comfortable 54-33 Greater Buckeye Conference victory.

It was the Trojans' (13-1, 7-0) 12th win in a row after falling to Bowling Green the second game of the season.

"We knew we had that advantage and we tried to get it inside," said Findlay coach Jim Rucki. "Obviously, they tried to collapse on us and have five guys in there, but we did a nice job of kicking it out and making them play honest."

Ross (4-10, 1-6) started strong on early, forcing five turnovers in Findlay's first eight possessions. During that stretch, Skylar Reffner found some room inside around Findlay's big men to get the Little Giants a 4-2 advantage halfway through the opening quarter.


That's when the wheels fell off.

Findlay's guards began to penetrate, finding Gettys open near the basket. He hit three straight shots in or near the paint on the left side of the basket to give the Trojans an 8-4 edge.

Grant Birchmeier's 35-foot three at the buzzer then capped what ended up being 14-0 Findlay run to close out the quarter.

"That made it a long night," said Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon. "When you're going against a Findlay team the one thing you don't want to do is get behind them."

Two Dianté Pettiford hoops inside got Ross back within single digits to start the second quarter. However, the Trojans kept finding ways to score even

when the Little Giants managed to keep the ball out of the paint.

Birchmeier hit the second of his three treys and Boston Ballmer hit one during the final minute of the half to give Findlay a 27-12 edge at halftime.

Meanwhile Ross went cold from the floor shooting just 5-of-18 in the opening 16 minutes.

"We didn't shoot the ball like we'd have liked to," Gedeon said. "We'd been shooting the ball pretty well lately. But we've got to do a better job of moving without the basketball and being ready to

shoot when we are open.

"A couple times I thought our kids were real tentative about whether they were going to pull the trigger or whether they were going to drive."

The Little Giants finished 11-of-41 (26 percent) from the field. Findlay shot the ball at a 45 percent (20-of-44) clip. It also outrebounded Ross 36-24, with Gettys finishing with a game-high 13 boards.

"He ran the floor nice tonight," Rucki said. "We had a couple tip-ins where he hustled down the floor and got us some points."

Ammons took charge in the third quarter, tallying six of his points — most which came from

him getting the foul line. He and Gettys saw limited action in the fourth as the Trojans opened up a 43-22 edge heading into the final period.

"We actually did better on them this time around," Gedeon said. "The first time we played, Gettys scored 27 points and had 15 rebounds. So if you told me going into this game that we'd have held them to 54 points I'd have taken it."

Pettiford led the Little Giants with seven points. Jake Hiestand had six and Reffner had five points five boards.

"I thought Skylar was very active early," Gedeon said. "He's been playing very well for us late-

ly. And I thought Shunnar did a great job defensively considering he was giving up not only six inches, but probably 70 pounds there inside."

Gamble in charge of handling Gettys, was held to two points offensively, but had three steals on the defensive end.

"Our kids played hard," Gedeon said. "They're still understanding what it takes to be at the level of a team like Findlay right now. But we're definitely getting better."

# Ross boys struggle with slow start in loss to Sandusky

FREMONT — If Fremont Ross coach Mark Gedeon could just get some consistency from his players, the Little Giants might not be at the bottom of the Greater Buckeye Conference looking up.

Unfortunately for the Lit-

tle Giants' 16th-year bench boss, finding that steady play has been a battle.

Ross allowed Sandusky the first 15 points of Thursday's game, scoring a single first quarter point en route to a 63-47 GBC loss.

"Competition has to come within the player's hearts," Gedeon said. "That's something we can't make a switch

for and just flip it on and off when we want to do it. That's something we just have to be much more consistent with."

The Blue Streaks (8-8, 5-3) tallied seven points off Little Giant turnovers in the first quarter alone and out-rebounded Ross 10-3. When the Little Giants (4-11, 1-7) did get shots they couldn't get them to fall,

going 0-of-7 from the field in the first quarter.

Dante Pettiford's 1-of-2 effort from the foul line with 1:12 remaining in the quarter was Ross's lone point.

"Our whole mindset was we got to come in here and defend," Sandusky coach Steve Keller Jr. said. "And I thought our guys did an excellent job defensively as a

group. I was real pleased with how we took that physical-toughness mentality into that first quarter."

first quarter.

His exclamation point of the first quarter came on a breakaway dunk with three minutes left after he stole the ball at midcourt. That gave Sandusky an 11-0 edge at the time.

Page finished with a double-double also adding a game-high 14 rebounds.

"We just reverted back to some of our old ways in that opening quarter," Gedeon said. "We'd been doing a much better job, really since the last Sandusky game, of executing offensively ... reversing the ball and having some poise."

"But tonight we didn't get the ball inside," Gedeon continued. "We didn't have good balance on the floor. We took quick, off-balance shots and didn't execute our patterns. As a result, we gave (San-

dusky) some times to run out and do what they do well, which is attack the rim."

But Ross wouldn't pack in, even though it trailed 15-1 entering the second quarter. Two 3-pointers from Jordan Kidd and Pettiford got the Little Giants sparked. They closed the quarter on an 11-6 run to trail just 29-21 heading to the dressing room.

"This is a team that plays on confidence," Gedeon said. "In that first quarter, we didn't have any confidence after a few of our shots missed. Then once we hit some shots in the second quarter, it gave us some positive energy for the remainder of the quarter."

Ross also picked it up on the defensive end, forcing Sandusky into some turnovers and poor shots.

"We didn't handle their 1-3-1 defense real well in the second," Keller said. "We turned it over some and it

created better opportunities for them in transition."

Seven different players tallied points in the second quarter for Ross, including Cameron Smith, Shanquise Mills and Alex Metcalf, who have juggled back and forth all season between the varsity and JV teams.

"That's what we expect from any kid that puts on that Ross uniform," Gedeon said.

A Skylar Reffner basket off a Pettiford steal cut the Sandusky lead to 34-28 with 5:57 remaining in the third quarter. It forced the Blue Streaks to call a timeout.

They regrouped and went on a 16-4 run to close out the third quarter. Once again it was points off turnovers that aided them. Sandusky tallied 20 points off Ross mistakes.

Xavier Turner's 3-pointer in the last remaining seconds off a full-court inbound pass gave the Blue Streaks a

healthy 50-32 lead entering the final quarter.

"That just sealed the deal for us," Gedeon said. "And a couple of those plays were missed assignments by our players defensively, including that 3 at the end of the quarter."

Donald Williams chipped in 13 points and eight rebounds for Sandusky, which won the rebound war 34-26. Tristen Jef-feries had four steals.

"We did a nice job of making runs, and when we made runs, certain guys were on the floor," Keller said. "But I was just real pleased at us as a team. I thought we did a good job sharing it, and I thought we always answered their runs with runs of our own."

Reffner's 11 points paced Ross. Pettiford finished with eight points. Shunnar Gamble led the team in boards with six.

## Gamble pays off for Ross

The tattoo on the back of Shunmar Gamble's left hand says: One life to live.

For Fremont Ross's Gamble, the message is a reminder that we get one chance at life and we should make the most of it.

Gamble had 14 games highs of 20 points, nine rebounds and two blocks as the Little Giants defeated Tiffin Columbian 52-34 in a non-conference matchup Saturday. Ross coach Matt Gedeon said he can imagine Gamble's opportunities to close his career.

Gamble, who has a handful of tattoos that represent his belief in Jesus Christ and his love for basketball, has battled inconsistency and injuries this season. He still sits at 100 percent healthy. A chronic back injury cost Gamble two games last season, a portion of his summer preparation, and six complete games and parts of two others as a senior.

"It took a long time for him to get back to 100 percent," said Gedeon.

Gamble scored the first five points Saturday off two offensive rebounds. A difficult jumper to give his team a 21-12 advantage early in the second quarter.

"He gave us that initial spark," Gedeon said. "He showed his versatility. In the second half, in the fourth quarter we spread the floor and got him some isolations. He scored in transition."

Gamble, who picked up his third foul just over a minute into the first quarter, had 10 points on the court, scored eight points in the fourth quarter, including six straight to give his team a 47-32 lead. He drove baseline from the right side, but dropped the ball in with his left hand as he ducked to score under the backboard early in the quarter.

"Shunmar had an outstanding game," Gedeon said. "So many different people contributed for us. Four guys who played in the JV game played within the first three quarters."

"He worked throughout the game to get stops and then got in the transition game going early in the fourth."

Gamble had confidence he would finish strong.

"I go up against some tough kids and I have to be physical. I'm used to contact and playing physical. I try to carry that over and just think everything is going in."

Gamble scored in transition off a steal and added a bucket after a block by Skylar Refner for a 27-20 advantage in the half. He blocked four on Columbian and had two possessions of the ball.

"Being up seven gave us a little buffer considering we let a lot of first-half possessions go with turnovers and missed layups."

Ross (7-1) turned the ball over 14 times in 29 possessions in the first half compared to five turnovers in 28 possessions in the second half.

"We were going too fast," Gedeon said. "Taking care of the ball gave us more opportunities."

The Little Giants allowed only four points in the fourth quarter.

"Just picking it up more aggressively on defense," Gamble said. "Early in the game they got some open threes. We had to put more pressure on them and concentrate."

Columbian (5-13) made four 3-pointers and two 2-point field goals in the first half.

Diane Pettiford scored all nine of his points in the third quarter to help his team to a 38-30 lead entering the fourth quarter.

"That's the great thing about Diane — he just wants to win," Gedeon said. "He can handle the ball, defend and score."

Jake Hiestand started Saturday where he left off Friday for Ross when he scored 12 points in the final 6 minutes to beat Marion Harding.

Hiestand made two threes in the first quarter Saturday and Jordan Kidd added two more. Gedeon encouraged Hiestand to play be aggressive and not rest on Friday's laurels.

"He's such a competitor."
