

Girls basketball season starts Friday

Crimson Streaks, Little Giants open play on the road

Bargains and belly aches aren't the only signs Thanksgiving weekend has arrived.

Girls basketball is here.

Ten of the 11 schools in Sandusky County open the season either Friday or Saturday.

St. Joseph Central Catholic travels more than an hour to Mansfield St. Peter's Friday for a non-league game. Fremont Ross opens its season a day later

at Huron.

"I'm always nervous before any game," Ross coach Sue Wolf said. "You just hope the team you've been working with all week shows up."

"We didn't go real hard (Wednesday) night," said St. Joe coach Gary Geller, who showed his team a video and a pair of trophies to remind them of the school's tradition.

The Crimson Streaks, having graduated post players Ann Foos and Shana Young, will field a quicker team in 1997-98 which will rely primarily on the shooting of Angie Reineck, Jenny Gabel, Holly Wagner and Melissa Geller.

St. Peter's has a 6-foot-1 play-

er back from the team St. Joe beat last season.

"She did a nice job for them last year later in the year," Geller said. "We've got to be conscience of her scoring ability and rebounding ability."

The Little Giants play a Huron team comprised of one senior, six juniors, three sophomores and two freshmen.

"It's kind of a rebuilding year," Huron coach Bob Bowers said. "We've had four scrimmages and we make a lot of mistakes because its the first year playing together for most of our girls."

Sophomore point guard Catherine Taylor and junior forward Monica Asher are the top return-

ing players Bowers has available. Sophomore guard Nikki Dauch is recovering from an injury.

Ross, led by returning starters Amy Smith and Emily Dowell, will need to be ready for a variety of defenses, Wolf said.

In addition to St. Joe at St. Peter's, there are four games involving six area teams. Margaretta at Bellevue, Old Fort at Gibsonburg, Otsego at Woodmore and Oak Harbor at Rossford.

Saturday Ross is at Huron, Bettsville at Maumee Valley and Clyde is at Fostoria.

Lakota opens its season Tuesday when it hosts Hopewell-Loudon.

Ross boys preview

Fremont Ross's boys basketball team won't open the season until Dec. 5 at Bowling Green, but fans can watch the Little Giants in a four-team preview scrimmage Saturday at the Purple Pit.

Play begins at 6 p.m. with the junior varsity teams from Eastwood and Port Clinton playing for one half. Next is a JV half between Ross and Oak Harbor, followed by varsity play between Eastwood and Port Clinton.

The final half will be between the varsity squads of Ross and Oak Harbor.

Admission is \$4 for adults and \$3 for students.

Ross girls roll to win in opener

HURON — Fremont Ross's girls basketball team started the 1997 season by pounding Huron 63-35 Saturday night.

The non-league road victory was keyed by a strong first quarter in which freshman Sashay Price scored six points to help the team take a 12-2 lead. The 5-foot-8 Price finished with a team-high 14 points.

In other games, buried Fostoria 64-28, Old Fort topped Gibsonburg 61-46 and Maumee Valley Contry Day stopped Bettsville 74-30.

"Price stepped up quickly for us. She had her game face on," said Ross head coach Sue Wolf. "The kids definitely came through. The bench did a good job."

"We have a lot of things to work on, but we came out strong and opened the season with a strong victory," senior guard Amy Smith said.

Ross junior Jodi Fick added 13 points, including eight in the third quarter as the Little Giants outscored the Tigers 18-5.

Emily Dowell finished with nine points and Natasha Watson had eight.

"Watson came through for us. She adds size to our team," Wolf said. "She spent a lot of time working this summer. She's really improved."

Huron's Monica Asher led all scorers with 17.

"Huron usually is stronger. But they had a player out with a knee injury and they graduated some players," Wolf said.

Ross opens Great Lakes League competition Thursday at Oregon Clay, considered a contender in the GLL race. The game is the second straight road game for Ross, which will not play in the Purple Pit until Dec. 11 against Fostoria.

"We get tested early," Wolf said. "Whitmer and Clay were picked at the top of the league."

Little Giants search for depth

Wolf's team has won back-to-back GLL titles

Fremont Ross's nickname, Little Giants, is a contradiction in terms.

Here's another: A veteran team which lacks depth.

But that's an accurate description of the school's girls basketball team, which does not have an abundance of potential starters despite having seven seniors on the roster.

"We have a lot of seniors so we have a lot of (basketball) experience, but they haven't played a lot of games on varsity," senior Amy Smith said.

"We need to develop a bench," said coach Sue Wolf, who has 259 coaching wins in 23 years.

The Little Giants finished 15-7 in 1996-97, but said goodbye to Michele Smith (averaged 11 points, 11.5 rebounds), defensive specialist Marcy Reinbolt and Tonya Elder.

Top returning players are Emily Dowell (10.5 ppg, 6.8 rpg), Smith (11.9 ppg, 2.6 apg) and Natasha Watson (4.3 rpg).

"I think coach wants Emily and I to be the leaders," Smith said. "We've played on the team the longest so we need to share some of our experience."

"I think since I've been there for four years, I know what's going on I can stay calmer than the younger kids and help everyone else out," said Dowell, elected co-captain along with Smith by their teammates.

Prior to the season, Wolf did not know what to make of the Giants.

"We're up and down. Very inconsistent," Wolf said after watching her team scrimmage against St. Joseph Central Catholic and Edison last week. "It depends on which quarter and which day you see us."

When opponents play man-to-man defense, Ross plans to use a

continuity offense in which players keep moving and go to specific spots.

In addition to leadership roles, Smith (5-foot-6) and Dowell (5-9) will be asked to put the ball in the basket. Another starter will be Watson, a 5-11 junior post player.

"Natasha Watson has improved a lot from last year," Wolf said.

A fourth starter is 5-8 Sashay Price, the third freshman to start for Wolf in recent years. The first was Dawn Zerman, followed by Dowell.

"Sashay Price is struggling with her game because she is pressing too much," Wolf said, days before Price scored 14 points in the season-opening win against Huron. "If I think (freshmen) are ready to go I play them. But I expect them to play that way too."

In addition to Watson, the Little Giants have only one player — 6-0 senior Dusty Ruffing — who stands taller than 5-9.

"We don't have a lot of size but every player on our team is very quick," Smith said.

Other seniors are Rachael Damschroder, Jenni Knoke, Dawn McElfresh and Mysti Reeny. The team also has three juniors: Watson, Erin Tuckerman and Jodi Fick. There are no sophomores on the team.

Ross will be tested early with games at Clay (Thursday) and at home against Whitmer (Dec. 18). Both are picked to finish atop the Great Lakes League race.

"Needless to say we have to be ready in a hurry," said Wolf, who believes Findlay could challenge for the league title.

And with back-to-back championships entering this season, Ross should not be dismissed.

"The players want to win another GLL, that would be the third in a row," Wolf said of team goals. "We also want to be more consistent as a team. Improve after every practice and every game."



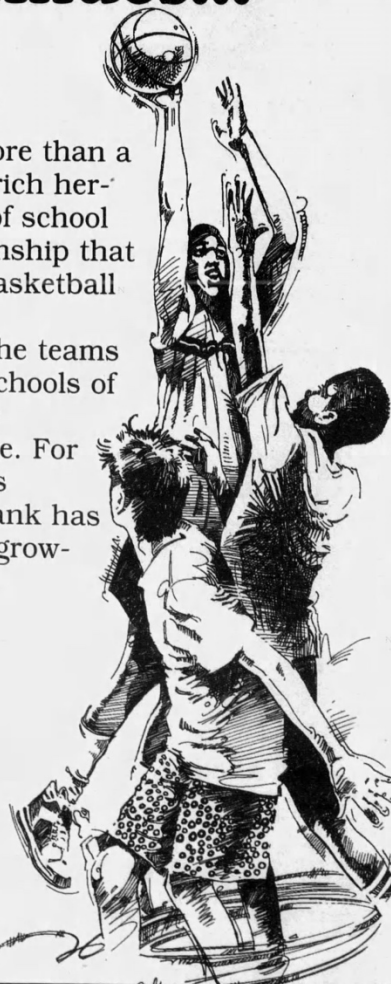

Eagles hold off ice-cold Ross

OREGON — Thursday night was not a good night for Fremont Ross's shooters.

The Little Giants shot just 32 percent (21-of-65) yet still managed to stay within striking distance against Oregon Clay before eventually suffering a 60-52 Great Lakes League loss.

"We had some good shots," Ross coach Sue Wolf said, "we just didn't put it in the basket."

The loss dropped the Little Giants to 1-1 and 0-1 in the GLL. The Eagles, picked by the league coaches to win the GLL crown this year, improved to 2-0 and 1-0.

Emily Dowell, a 5-foot-9 senior guard/wing, led Ross in scoring (21 points) and rebounds (8) while Amy Smith chipped in 15 points. Dowell and Sashay Price dished out four assists each.

The Little Giants outrebounded Clay 29-28 as Natasha Watson and Jodi Fick contributed seven and six rebounds, respectively.

"One thing we need to do is rebound better," Wolf said. "If we shot that many times (65) and missed and finished that close in rebounding, we need to get to the boards more."

"Also, there were some shots we had that we had to convert on."

Ross trailed 15-13 after one quarter and 30-29 at the half. A 13-10 advantage in the third period gave the Little Giants a 42-40 lead, but Ross was unable to hold on in the final eight minutes.

The Eagles won the fourth quarter by a 20-10 margin.

"We started off poorly in the fourth quarter," Wolf said. "We gave up a basket off an inbounds play to start the quarter and that's a no-no. They just kept going after that and we didn't."

Both teams finished with 16 turnovers but the Eagles converted 56 percent (27-of-48) of their shots.

Megan Beshalslle scored 20 points, Jodi Harrington had 15 and Jenny St. John added 12 for Clay.

"I thought our bench played really well," Wolf said. "Jodi Fick scored eight big points off the bench."

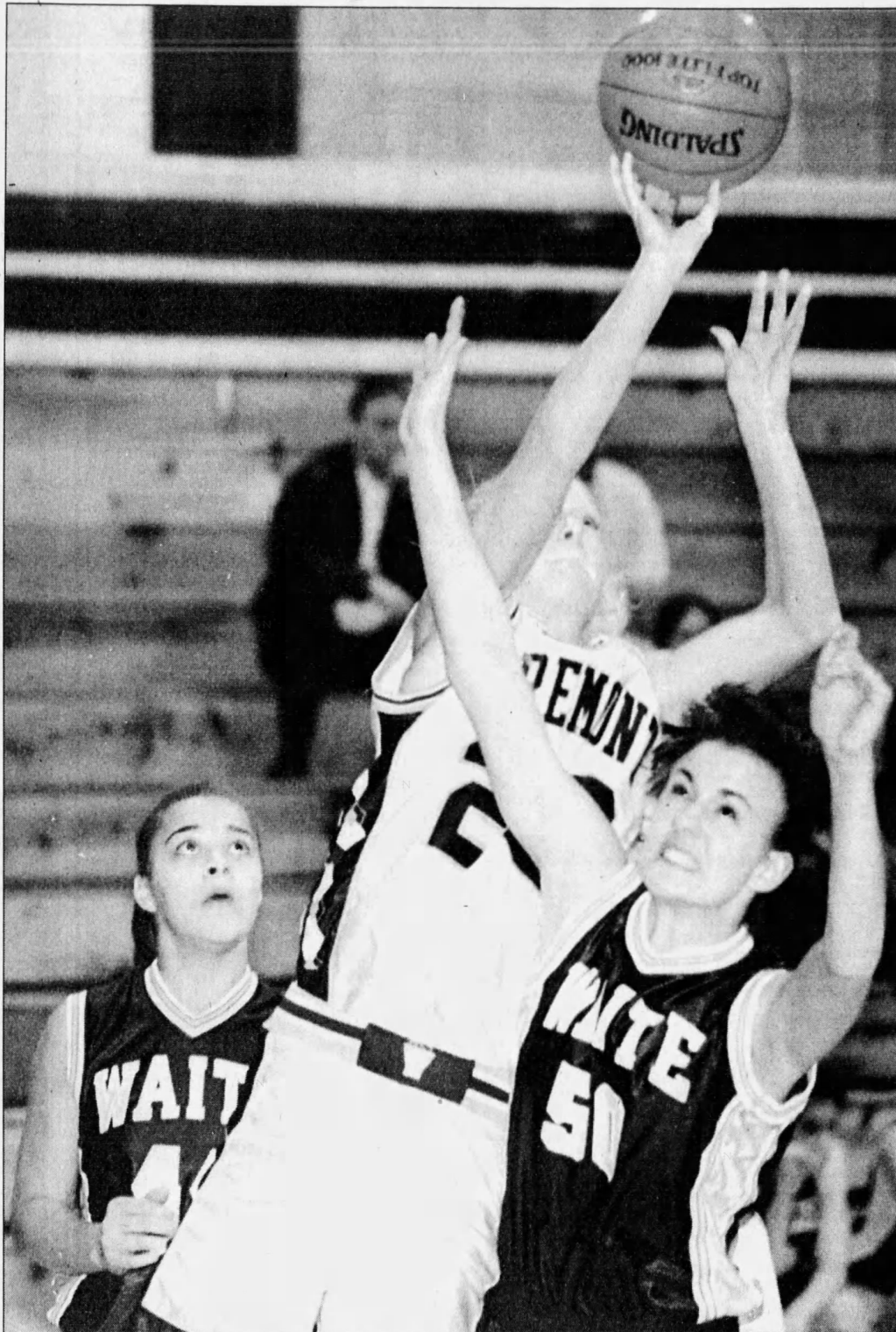
The Indians scored no more than eight points in any of the four quarters.

The best way to measure yourself is to take on the best.

Fremont Ross's girls basketball team did that Thursday, but the result was not favorable. Ross lost 67-51 to Great Lakes League favorite Toledo Whitmer in a game played at the Purple Pit.

Whitmer improved to 4-2 (2-1 GLL) while Ross dropped to 3-2 (1-2).

"We knew Whitmer was going to be near the top in the league this year," Ross coach Sue Wolf said. "We had to come out and prove that we belonged there and we didn't."

The teams played nearly even in the first quarter, with Whitmer leading 17-15. In the second quarter the Panthers, led by Elizabeth Edinger, went ahead by as much as 17 points in the second quarter.

Edinger, a 5-foot-7 senior, scored six of her 21 points in the second quarter and made the shot which gave her team a 34-17 lead.

But Ross came back.

Cold Whitmer shooting in the third brought Ross back within four at 43-39 with 3:07 left in the quarter. The Panthers scored just one point in more than three minutes of the period.

The 1-for-6 cold spell ended when Kyle Gibson scored on a layup to make it 45-39 with 2:23 showing.

Then Whitmer regained control of the game. The Panthers closed out the third strong and outscored Ross 18-12 in the fourth period to win.

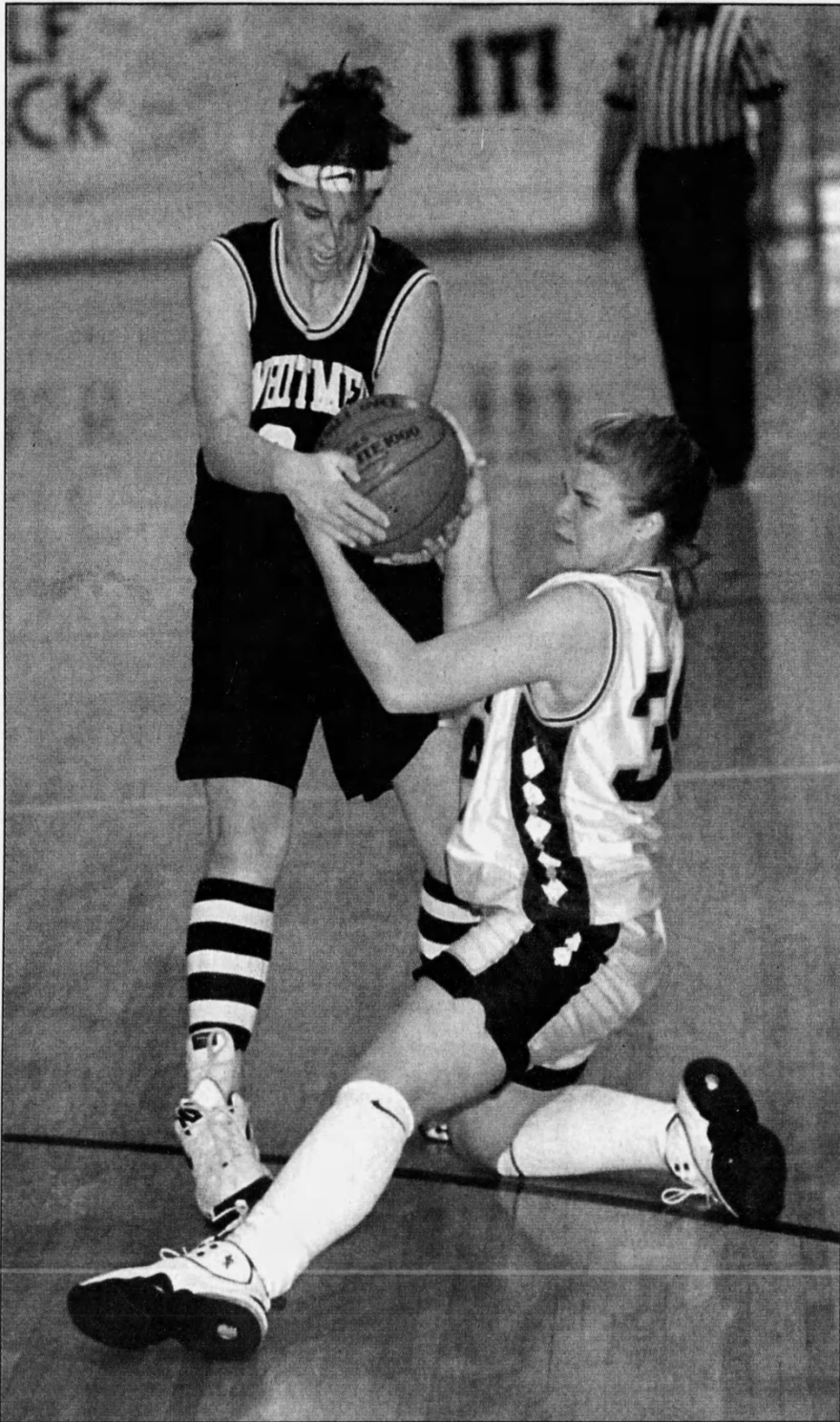
"We got back into the game and then we missed some one and ones and that cost us big time. We needed those shots and we missed too many shots tonight," said Wolf.

Ross was paced by Emily Dowell with 20 points while Amy Smith had 11 and Jodi Fick 10.

Improved bench helps Ross defeat Sandusky 55-39

It wasn't a work of art. The Fremont Ross Little Giants didn't win any beauty contests Thursday night, but they did earn a 55-39 victory over rival Sandusky.

Indeed, the play was ragged at times. And both clubs experienced periods of cold shooting and excess turnovers.

The Little Giants improved to 5-6, while Sandusky fell to 1-7.

"Our center got in foul trouble and our backup center is out with a back injury," Ross coach Sue Wolf said. "That hurt us. Sandusky takes the ball strong to the basket and they're physical."

Center Natasha Watson picked up two fouls in the first quarter, and backup Mysti Recny is day-to-day with a back injury. That allowed Sandusky to lead 10-8 after one quarter.

In the opening quarter Sandusky's Amanda James, a 6-foot forward, took advantage of the situation and scored six points inside.

But things fell apart after that. The Little Giants outscored Sandusky 15-12 in the second quarter to take a 24-22 lead at the half. Not to be outdone, Ross poured it on in the third, leading 41-29 after three.

A key was the Little Giants bench. Ross received solid efforts from Jodi Fick (11 points), Erin Tuckerman (8 points) and Rachel Damschroder (2 points).

"I thought Eric Tuckerman off the bench did well. Jodi Fick played hard and Rachel Damschroder did some good things," said Wolf. "I also thought Emily Dowell and Amy Smith got together versus their zone and hit some shots."

Dowell led the Ross effort with 13 points while Smith added nine points. Both scored key baskets in the third period when Ross began pulling away. The

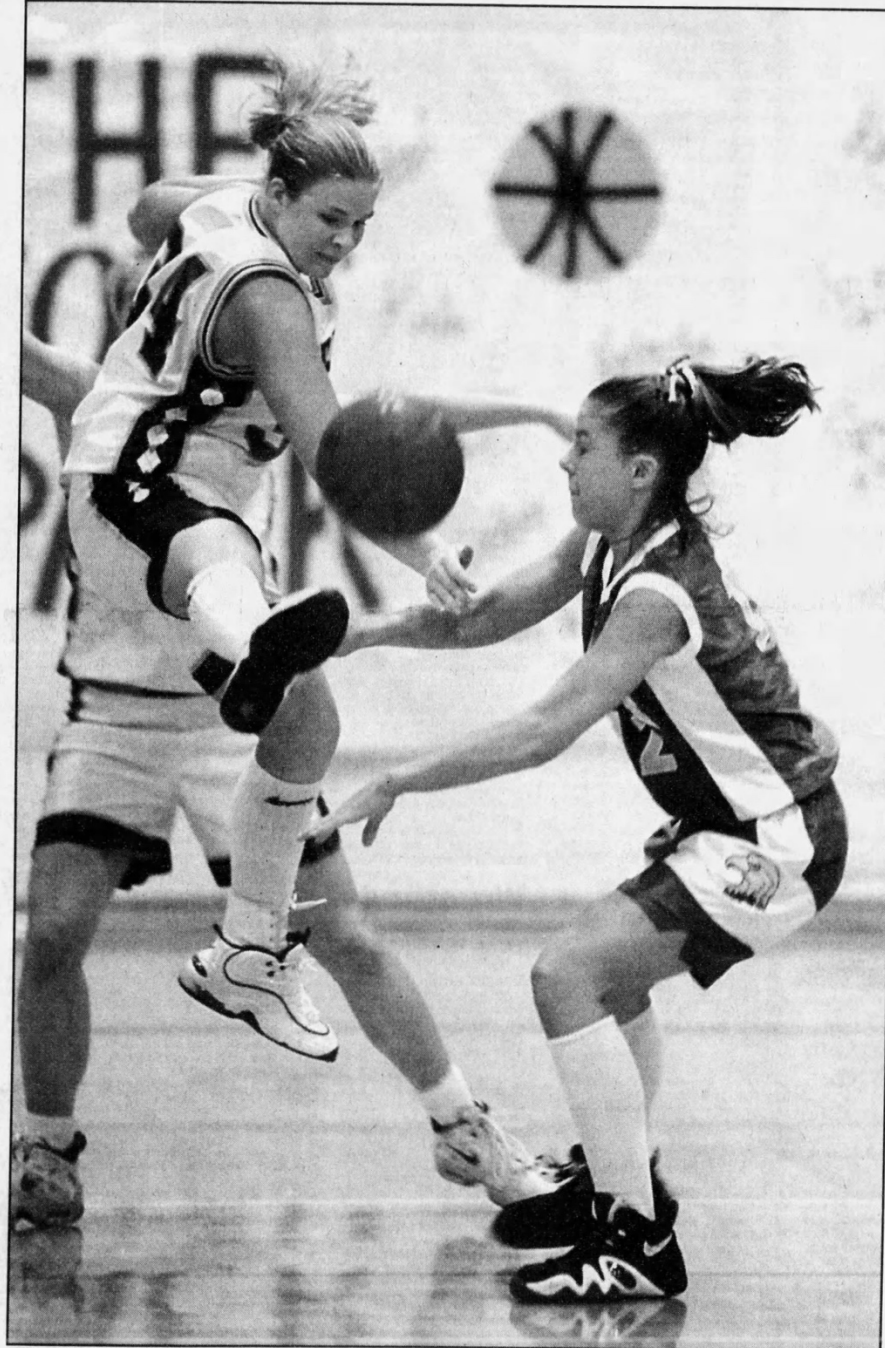
Clay closed out the final 63 seconds with two more inside baskets following offensive rebounds.

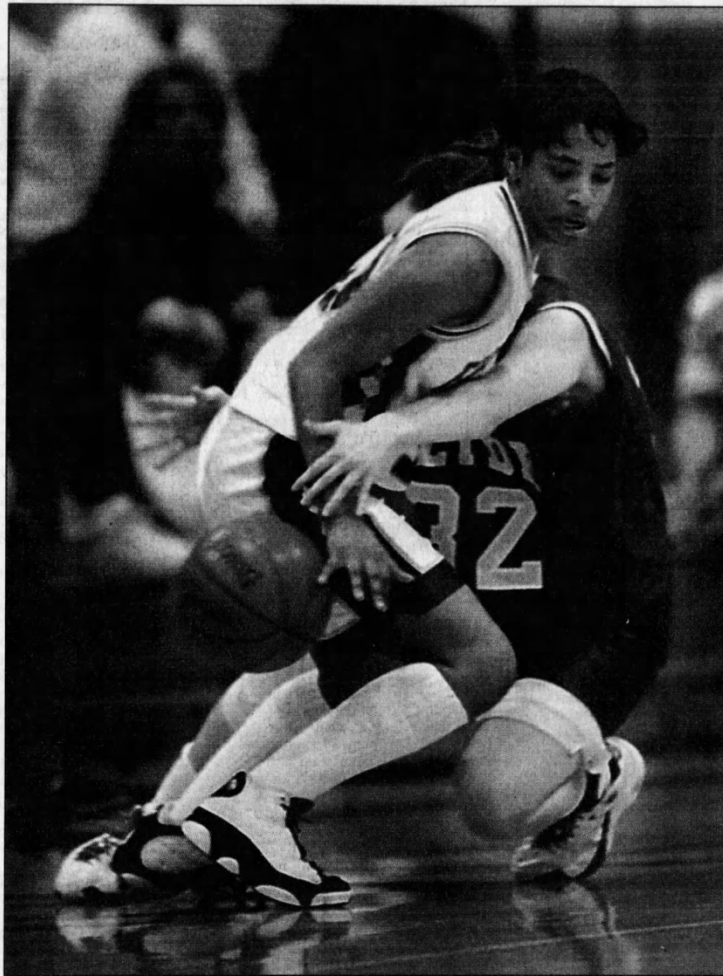

Emily Dowell lost the handle but won the game.

"We're starting to play well," Lobb said. "If you're going to play well, I guess you should do it at the end of the year."

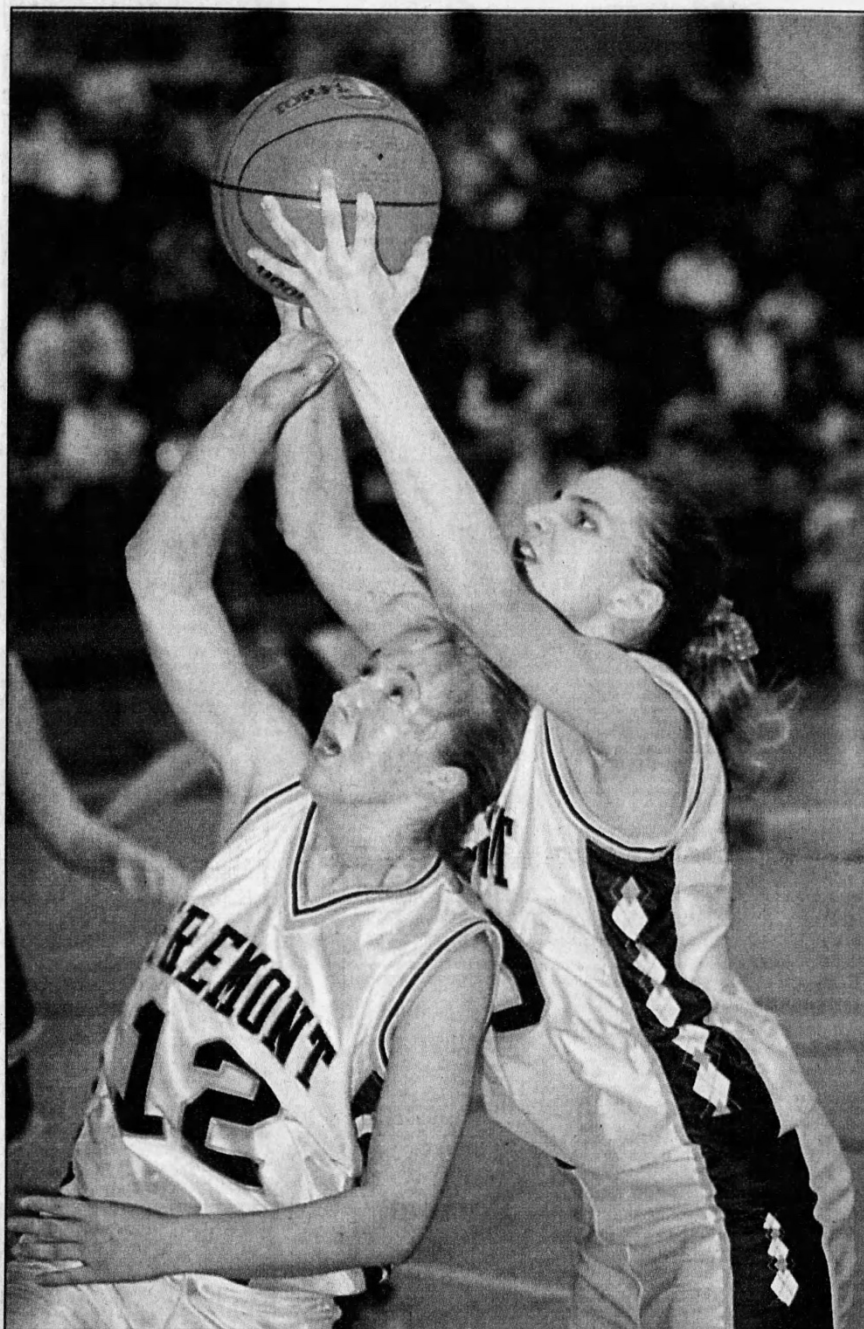
