

Sandusky Tops In Sectional Wrestling

St. Joe Qualifies Three, Ross Two For District

Sandusky continued its domination of the Fremont Sectional wrestling tournament Saturday afternoon and evening, winning four championships and qualifying nine for the district tournament next weekend at Toledo. Sandusky was one of only three schools to win more than one individual championship. The others were Fremont, St. Joseph and Edison, each with two.

St. Joseph, one of the smallest schools in the competition and one of only three Class schools in the sectional, placed a surprising fourth place and qualified three wrestlers for the district meet. Bill Beer, at 145 pounds and Ed Fiber, 165, both won championships for St. Joseph. In addition Mike Blechinger won the consolation for third place at 138 pounds and a trip to the districts.

Ross managed to qualify two for the district as Ted Brunner and Mark Weiser fought their way through the consolation for third place. In the 175-pound and heavyweight divisions each of the Little Giants won three consolation matches.

Both championship bracket finalists and consolation winner qualify for the district at Whitmer. Behind the nine qualified by Sandusky, Bellevue qualified four: St. Joseph, Edison, Huron, Norwalk and Port Clinton, three each; Ross, two; Clyde and Vermilion, one each.

Making return trips to the district tournament will be Bel-

knap, Fiber, Blechinger; DeLaca, and Al Walker, Port Clinton, runnerup at 127 pounds. DeLaca and Emerson advanced to state a year ago by winning the district consolation bracket. Emerson defeated Belknap in the 103-pound consolation final and DeLaca advanced at 127 pounds. Failing to gain district this year was Randy Keegan, Clyde, who advanced a year ago at 123.

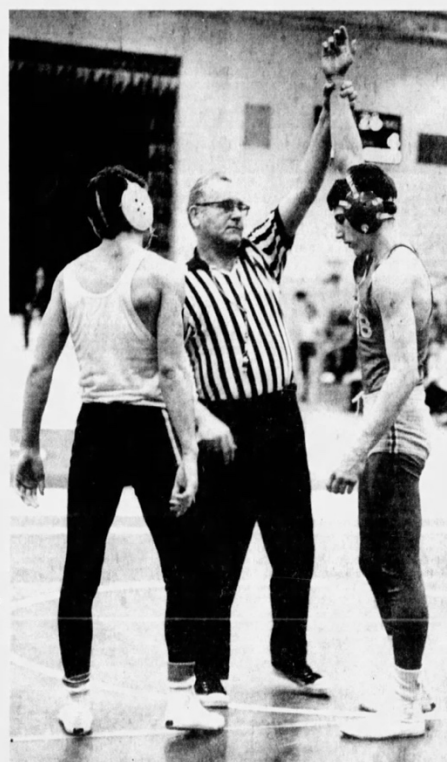
