

HOGAN TOPS AGAIN

Little Giants To Open Swimming Campaign With Bowling Green

Coach George Gruse's Little Giant swimmers of Ross high school inaugurate one of the most rugged schedules in recent years Tuesday when they journey to Bowling Green State university to engage the Falcon mermen in an exhibition meet.

Six lettermen, Bruce Ransom, Bob Bodenlos, Don Wensinger, Jim Pence, Harry Strauch and Lee Koenig, form the nucleus of the 34-man squad which will compete in a schedule that includes eight dual, one invitational, one regional, one district and the state meet.

Meanwhile, Gruse announced a change in the program as Toledo DeVilbiss signed contracts for a home-and-home series, replacing the previously scheduled single meet slated for the Ross natatorium. DeVilbiss will entertain the Purple January 8 and then journey here February 11. The originally booked meet was for January 21 and has been dropped.

Paced By Fremonters

Opposing the Little Giant mermen will be an experienced squad built around three former Fremont aces, Dean Hess, Ken Reed and Phil Hodes, which swam to a 58-17 victory over Wooster college Saturday.

Hess anchored the 400-yard free style relay team to a new pool record of 3:48.5, smashing the old mark set in 1944 by one and a tenth seconds, and then copped the 220-yard free style event while Hodes finished second in the diving event and Reed was second in the 150-yard back stroke.

The Little Giants will host the Falcons in a return exhibition here Wednesday, December 18, prior to starting their scholastic schedule against the Tigers of Massillon Washington January 11. The Bee Gees are tutored by Sam Cooper, former Bellevue high school mentor.

ROSS MERMEN SHOW TALENT IN EXHIBITION

Two Unofficial Pool Records Set In Bee Gee Meet

Two unofficial pool records were smashed at Ross high school's natatorium Wednesday evening during an exhibition meet between the Little Giants and Bowling Green university as Coach George Gruse demonstrated a talent-packed squad which bids fair to annex sectional honors—if not a state title or two.

Outclassed in most events by their decidedly more experienced "brethren," the Giants copped six seconds and nine thirds, bettered one school record and approached two others during the informal affair which attracted approximately 100 spectators.

Closest event of the meet was the 100-yard back stroke where Jim Stark of Bowling Green edged Lee Koenig of Ross by one-tenth of a second after trailing for half the distance.

Bruce Ransom knocked off second place in the 50-yard free style in 25.8, only one tenth of a second off the school mark set by Al Baumann five years ago. Charles Joyce of the Falcons won the event in :25 flat, one-fifth of a second better than the official pool record of :25.2 established by Ted Hobert, former Sandusky, and currently one of Mike Peppe's aces at Ohio State.

"Slick" Wins

Ransom again trailed Joyce in the 100-yard free style event while Dean (Slick) Hess, former Ross satellite, knocked off the 200-yard free style for the Bee Gees in 2:12.8, five and a half seconds off his own pool record set in 1943.

The Falcons were composed of four former Little Giant mermen, Hess, Phil Hodes, Bob Pence and Bob Rosenbush.

LITTLE GIANT MERMEN OPEN 1947 SEASON

Massillon Provides Competition For Saturday Meet

Facing a star-studded schedule which includes dual meets with Sandusky, the defending state scholastic champions, and Canton McKinley, runners-up to the Blue Streaks last year, Ross high's mermen open their campaign with a 2 p. m. dual meet against Massillon, Saturday, at the Little Giant natatorium.

Coach George Gruse's squad, rated one of the best prospects in recent years, will be composed chiefly of the youths who provided the most contention to Bowling Green State university's Falcons in two pre-season exhibitions.

Original plans call for swimming each varsity member in only one event—excepting the relays.

Tigers In Loss

Massillon opened its campaign Wednesday against McKinley's veteran crew—among the pre-season favorites for the state crown—and dropped a 47-19 decision, gaining only two of eight firsts.

The Tigers are paced by Esterling in the free-style sprints and Wey in the distance events of the free style.

For Ross, Gruse is expected to start the following lineup:

The Ross mermen have six lettermen—Ransom, Bodenlos, Pence, Strauch, Wensinger and Koenig—for a nucleus.

They face Sandusky in their next meeting Thursday, January 16, at 7:30 p. m. at Ross. The Little Giants administered the lone dual meet defeat suffered by the Blue Streaks last year.

Little Giants Swimmers Rout Weak Massillon Squad, 45-21

Paced by rangy Bruce Ransom who smashed two school and pool records, Coach George Gruse's Ross high swimming team routed a weak Massillon squad at the local natatorium Saturday afternoon by a 45 to 21 score.

It was the second successive dual meet defeat for the Tigers who had earlier dropped a 47 to 19 decision to Canton McKinley, runner-up for the state crown last year to Sandusky's Blue Streaks.

The Little Giants completely dominated the meet, winning six of the eight events and capturing three seconds and four thirds while the Massillon tankers were annexing only two firsts, three places and a like number of thirds.

Thrilling Sprints

Of the entire meet, the free style sprints between Ransom, one of Gruse's six lettermen, and Grant Esterling provided the most even-matched competition. Esterling, who finished second in the 50-yard event of the state meet, pressed Ransom in both the 50 and 100-yard races, losing each by a matter of inches, and pressing the Ross swimmer to new records.

In the sprint, first event of the program, Ransom barely touched out Esterling in 24.9 seconds to better by three-tenths of a second, the eight-year-old pool record established by Sandusky's Ted Hobert, now a member of Mike Peppe's Ohio State varsity. It also bettered by nearly a full second, the 25.7 second previous school mark set by Al Baumann in 1941.

The 100-yard meeting between Ransom and Esterling was a virtual repetition of the sprint as the duo battled head and head throughout the entire four-lap route with the Little Giant again gaining the verdict by a split-second. The time of 56.1 seconds cut four-tenths of a second off Bob Walden's previous school and pool mark of 56.5 set in 1938 in the same meet in which Hobert had established the 50-yard record.

Tiger Wins Grind

Dave Wey gave Massillon the 200-yard free style with a last lap spurt which passed Fremont's Dick Adams, who had set the entire pace.

The Tigers gained a somewhat hollow win in the 150-yard medley relay when they edged the Ross "seconds" although the Fremont varsity, composed of Lee Koenig, Harry Strauch and Bud Nord, actually finished nearly a half-lap ahead of the visitors. However, this trio was swimming as an "exhibition" and their placement did not affect the scoring.

ROSS MERMEN TO HOST BLUE STREAK SQUAD

Sanduskians Appear Weak After Rout By Lakewood

That Fremont-Sandusky rivalry crops to the fore again today as Coach George Gruse sends his Little Giant swimmers through final preps prior to colliding with the Blue Streak mermen at the Ross pool Thursday at 7 p. m.

Only injuries and an overconfidence bugaboo appear likely to knock the locals out of possibly their best season in recent years following their 45 to 21 devastation of a weak Massillon squad last Saturday.

During that meet, Bruce Ransom definitely carved a position as one of the state's better scholastic free stylers as he lowered pool and school records in both the 50 and 100-yard events.

The showing of Don Wensinger in the diving, Lee Koenig in the breast stroke and Koenig, Harry Strauch and Bud Nord in the medley relay gives the Croghan-streeters one of the best balanced teams in northern Ohio.

Sandusky Routed

Meanwhile, they will be facing a seemingly impotent Sandusky squad which was bumped by Lakewood, 51 to 15, without capturing a single first place. But those Streaks will be out for revenge against the Fremonters who imposed the lone dual meet defeat sustained by the Sanduskians, state champions, last year.

Dan Thomas in the breast stroke, Alfred Behrendsen in the back stroke and Ron Lauber in the diving events appear to be Coach Walter Caldwell's chief point getters. Each registered a runner-up award against Lakewood.

In addition to Ransom, Gruse will use Nord in the 50-yard free style and Don Smith in the 100-yard event. Jim Pence and Strauch will swim the breast stroke with Dick Adams and Fred Lafferty in the 200-yard free style grind. Koenig and Jerry Anderson will be used in the back stroke while Johnny Schwartz will team with Wensinger in the diving.

"Second-stringers" will be used in both the medley and 200-yard relays with Larry Price, Ralph Engle and John Bowlus swimming the former and Don Naftulin, Bill Kirsch, Roger Gerwin and Bowlus in the latter.

The Giants will travel to Toledo for a dual meet with DeVilbiss Saturday at 4 p. m.

ROSS MERMEN ROUT STREAKS IN DUAL MEET

Ransom Again Lowers 50-Yard Sprint Record

Paced by stocky Bruce Ransom who copped both free style events and smashed his own pool and school record in the 50-yard sprint, the Little Giant mermen pasted a 43-21 defeat onto a weak Sandusky squad at the local natatorium Thursday evening.

It was the second straight dual meet victory for Ross who had downed Massillon last Saturday, and the second successive loss for the defending state champions.

The Fremonters swept all but two firsts but failed to exhibit impressive performances other than those by Ransom. Two poor turns by Lee Koenig in the 100-yard back stroke were responsible for the loss of one top spot as Sandusky's Bill Smith came from a five-yard deficit at the half-way point to win going away.

The other Blue Streak victory was recorded in the 150-yard medley relay where Smith picked up a short lead on the first leg and Jim Caldwell and Joe Buder maintained it throughout.

Strong Start

Ross opened as if to sweep the meet with Ransom swimming the short free-style sprint in 24.7 to slice two-tenths of a second off the previous record he had established against Massillon. The Little Giant was never pressed as Bud Nord came from far back on the last lap to edge out Buder for the place.

The 100-yard breast stroke was a virtual replica with Jim Pence taking the major portion of the awards with a last-lap spurt to touch out teammate Harry Strauch with Wilson Voigt of Sandusky far in the rear.

Dick Adams turned in a rousing finish in the 200-yard free style to beat Don Bohanon of the Streaks who had set the pace through the first seven laps although the time of 2:34.2 was comparatively slow. Fred Lafferty of Ross gained the show.

Don Wensinger scored a repeat victory in the diving although Herbert Drake and Ronnie Lauber of Sandusky swept the remaining two places.

The visitors took a short lead in the first two legs of the 200-yard relay which Don Smith and Johnny Bowlus overcame in the last two legs to take the nod.

LITTLE GIANT SWIMMERS IN THIRD VICTORY

Bruce Ransom Cops Both Free Style Events Again

Following the pattern of their two previous victories, the Little Giant mermen swam to a 47 to 19 victory over DeVilbiss at the Toledo Y. M. C. A. Saturday with Bruce Ransom again pacifying the individual scorers with wins in both divisions of the free style.

DeVilbiss picked up only two firsts—the 200-yard free style where Chan Nautz finished on top and the 100-yard back stroke where George Valassis administered the second successive defeat to Ross' Lee Koenig.

Ransom's victory in the 50 and 100-yard free styles marked his sixth consecutive first place effort as the Little Giant weaknesses of

Dean (Slick) Hess, former Ross high swimming star, smashed the old Baldwin-Wallace 220-yard free style swimming record of 2:41 by 15.8 seconds Friday as his Bowling Green university squad routed their hosts, 65 to 20. The Falcon mermen established new marks in every event, including the diving.

Ken Reed, another former Little Giant, swam the first leg of the 300-yard medley relay and finished second in the 150-yard back stroke.

previous meets, the gruelling eight-lap free style 200-yard event and the backstroke again cropped to the fore.

Don Wensinger joined Ransom among the squad's unbeaten with an easy victory in the diving where Johnny Schwartz finished second.

Take Big Lead
Bud Nord trailed Ransom in the shorter free style which opened the meet and Jim Pence and Harry Strauch finished "one-two" in the 100-yard breast stroke for the second straight time to give the Fremonters a comfortable 16-2 lead.

DeVilbiss picked up eight points in the backstroke where Bill Stansbury finished second to Nautz. Another runner-up berth, this one by Dick Aubry in the 100-yard free style, concluded the Tigers' threat as Wensinger and Schwartz dominated the diving and Koenig, Pence and Nord annexed the 150-yard medley relay while Orval Earhart, Bob Bodenlos, Don Smith and Johnny Bowles gave the Purple the 200-yard relay.

Coach George Gruse's outfit now bides time until Thursday when they again trek to Toledo to meet Scott high.

LITTLE GIANTS SEEK FOURTH SWIM VICTORY

Undefeated Rossmen Journey To Toledo Scott Pool

Seeking their fourth successive dual meet victory, George Gruse's undefeated Little Giant swimming team journeys to Toledo Thursday for a 3:30 p. m. meet with Scott's tankers at the Bulldogs' natatorium.

It will be the first test for Scott's squad about which little is known.

Highlighting the Ross attack will be Bruce Ransom and Don Wensinger, each of whom is undefeated during the campaign. Ransom has annexed three wins in each the 50 and 100-yard free style events and established three new school records in so doing while Wensinger has triumphed in all diving events thus far.

In order to better condition his squad, most of whom are sophomores and juniors, Gruse has replaced Ransom in the shorter free style event with Johnny Bowlus. Bud Nord will be the other starter.

Same Lineups

The remaining entries will be the same as in the previous meets with Jim Pence and Harry Strauch in the backstroke; Dick Adams and Bob Bodenlos in the 200-yard free style; Lee Koenig and Jerry Anderson, backstroke; Don Smith and Ransom, 100-yard free style; Wensinger and Johnny Schwartz, diving; Koenig, Strauch and Nord, 150-yard medley relay, and Orval Earhart, Bodenlos, Smith and Bowlus, 200-yard free style relay.

It will be the last outing for the Fremonters until Thursday, January 30, when they entertain Scott at the Ross pool. Two days later the Little Giants will participate in the Northern Ohio Relays at Fenn college, Cleveland, where they are rated along with Lakewood and Cleveland East Tech as favorites.

UNDEFEATED ROSS SQUAD ROUTS SCOTT

Bruce Ransom Breaks Free-Style Records In Exhibition

Following the trend of previous meets, Ross high's undefeated swimming team annexed its fourth straight victory Thursday with a 47-19 rout of Toledo Scott.

As in their other affairs against Massillon, Sandusky and Toledo DeVilbiss, the Little Giant mermen dropped two firsts—but they were accompanied by Bruce Ransom's exhibition efforts in the 50 and 100-yard free style which completely shattered all pool and Ross records while swimming against time.

The Rossmen swept the first two places of the first four events as Johnny Bowlus won the free style sprint with Bud Nord second; Jim Pence copped the breast stroke followed by Harry Strauch; Dick Adams annexed the 200-yard free style grind trailed by Fred Lafferty, and Lee Koenig finally broke back into winning stride in the back stroke with Jerry Anderson netting the runner-up berth.

Relay Win Voided

Scott broke into the scoring in the 100-yard free style when Jimmy Einhart edged out Don Smith and Bob Bodenlos of Ross. The remaining Toledo points were scored in the 200-yard free style relay when Johnny Bowlus "jumped" the start of his anchor leg of a race that was "head-and-head" throughout. The Ross swimmer finished on top by a mere fraction.

Don Wensinger continued his undefeated ways in the diving where he had his closest competition of the year from Al Guyton whom he outscored 73.2 to 68.7. Johnny Schwartz gave the Little Giants third place.

In the 150-yard medley relay, Larry Price, Ralph Engle and Don Naftulin swam their first meet and checked in with a win.

Ransom opened his exhibition with no competition—swimming only against three stop-watches. He covered the 50-yard sprint in 24.6 bettering his own Ross record for the third time this season. In four dual meets, the lanky senior has sliced 1.1 seconds off the previous mark established by Al Baumann five years ago.

In the 100-yard event, again swimming only against time, Ransom churned the distance in :55.8 to lower this mark for the second time during the campaign.

Ransom's feats were even more remarkable considering the conditions of the Scott pool which is only 50 feet in length necessitating one extra turn in the sprint and two in the 100-yard event.

Relay Win Voided

The remaining Toledo points were scored in the 200-yard free style relay when Johnny Bowlus "jumped" the start of his anchor leg of a race that was "head-and-head" throughout. The Ross swimmer finished on top by a mere fraction.

Don Wensinger continued his undefeated ways in the diving where he had his closest competition of the year from Al Guyton whom he outscored 73.2 to 68.7. Johnny Schwartz gave the Little Giants third place.

In the 150-yard medley relay, Larry Price, Ralph Engle and Don Naftulin swam their first meet and checked in with a win.

Ransom opened his exhibition with no competition—swimming only against three stop-watches. He covered the 50-yard sprint in 24.6 bettering his own Ross record for the third time this season. 

Little Giant Swimmer Seeks Added Laurels In Fenn Meet

Expected to be the pace-maker when Coach George Gruse's Ross high swimming team goes in quest of its first major title of the season Saturday in the Northern Ohio Relays at Fenn college, Cleveland, is rangy Bruce Ransom, unbeaten in scholastic competition thus far this year and a leading candidate for All-American honors.

Ransom, who has posted six successive victories in free-style competition and shattered five school and three Ross pool records, is a 17-year-old senior majoring in a business course.

He finished third in the 50-yard free style of the 1946 state meet and second in the 100-yard event after knocking off the 75-yard individual medley race at the Fenn meet. In this event he set a new record of :46.2 seconds. Ransom is also the defending district 50-yard free style champion.

He also completed the 100-yard event a few minutes later in :55.8.

Ransom will swim the individual medley at Fenn, lone individual event on the program, and anchor the 200-yard free style relay team.

First legs of this event will be swam by Johnny Bowlus, Bob Bodenlos and Bud Nord. Gruse will enter Larry Price, Jerry Anderson, Jim Pence and Lee Koenig in the 200-yard backstroke while Ralph Engle, Louis Apple, Harry Strauch and Pence will swim the 200-yard breast stroke.

The Ross medley relay team will be composed of Koenig, Strauch and Nord while Bodenlos, Don Smith, Dick Adams and Bowlus will go in the 400-yard free style.

Incidentally, Fremont swimmers hold the Northern Ohio Relay records in all events excepting the 200 and 400-yard free style.

LITTLE GIANTS FINISH FOURTH IN FENN MEET

Bruce Ransom Knocks Off Individual Medley Race

In a meet featured by five record-smashing efforts in the six events, the Little Giant swimmers finished in fourth place at the annual Northern Ohio Interscholastic Relays Saturday at Fenn college, Cleveland.

Cleveland East Tech's undefeated powerhouse romped with the major laurels following a strong display of team balance, while Canton McKinley, runner-up to Sandusky for the state crown last year, and Lakewood tied for second place.

It marked the first time during the campaign that Coach George Gruber's Little Giants had bowed to scholastic competition.

The lone victory registered by the Fremonters came in the 75-yard medley race when young Bruce Ransom, the defending champion, bettered his old mark of :46.2 second by nearly two full seconds, covering the preliminaries in 1:44.5 and the final in :44.5.

Canton and East Tech each picked up two victories while Lakewood took the finale.

Streak Opened
McKinley opened the program with a show of power in the 200-yard free style, swimming the preliminary in 1:21.3 and the final in 1:19.4 to bettered his 1939 mark by two and two-tenths seconds. East Tech finished second, followed by Lakewood and Ross.

At the 50-yard point, Fremont's record went by the boards in the 200-yard breast stroke where the Scarabs completed the grind in 2:02.6, nearly six and one-half seconds better than the previous year. Lakewood trailed in second place with McKinley third and Ross fourth.

East Tech rocketed into a huge lead in the 400-yard medley relay, which they completed in 2:01.7 to better Fremont's 1939 standard by .3 of a second. The Little Giants moved into second place in this event with Scarabs getting its lone points of the meeting with third place and Lakewood fourth.

Ransom Wins Easily

Training Ransom, nearly three tenths in the individual medley was Akron Buchtel's Al Palmer with the rest of the field far to the rear.

At this point, East Tech had 22 points; Ross, 15; Lakewood, 12, and McKinley, 12.

Canton raced into contention in the 400-yard free style after another record-breaking effort as their time of 3:33 bettered the previous mark, also set by McKinley, by five and four-tenths seconds. East Tech got a runner-up with Lakewood third and Akron Buchtel fourth. This was the only event in which the Little Giants were shut out.

The 200-yard medley finale was the lone non-record event of the meet, as Lakewood knocked off first place with the Scarabs second; McKinley third and Ross fourth.

Freshmen, Sophomores Pace Locals To 11th Straight Victory

A preview of the 1948-49 Ross high school swimming team was afforded Little Giant followers Thursday evening as the Croghan streeters posted their most lopsided victory of the year in dumping Toledo Scott, 51 1-2 to 14 1-2.

Guyton finished second to Wensinger in the diving to conclude the Toledoans' point-making.

Canton McKinley Hands Little Giants First Dual Meet Loss

In one of the most evenly-matched dual swimming meets of the scholastic season, a well-balanced Canton McKinley squad was forced to the final event before gaining a 36-30 decision over Ross high school's previously unbeaten Little Giants, Saturday in the Bulldog pool.

The Fremonters hogged individual honors and posted the lone record-breaking performance of the meet—but the hosts swept second and third places in four events to more than overcome the lead compiled by the Rossmen through their five firsts.

It was the sixth dual meet Victory of the year in seven starts for McKinley, runners-up to Sandusky for the state crown in 1946, and the first loss for George Gruse's squad in eight outings. McKinley meets Lakeside's powerful contingent Wednesday while the Purple are idle until the district meet at Bowling Green Saturday.

Bruce Ransom opened the Bulldog meet by setting a new pool record for the 40-yard free style which he completed in :19.4 seconds, smashing a two-year-old mark by .3 seconds. Tom Whiteleather and Dwight Kirk finished second and third respectively for Canton to make the score 5-4 in favor of Ross.

Score Tied

Harry Fox knocked off the 100-yard breast stroke for the Bulldogs, heading Jim Pence and Harry Strauch as the count was deadlocked at 9-9.

An overwhelming victory in the 200-yard free style where Harry Shearer finished some 20 seconds ahead of Fremont's Eddie Kirsch with Sandy Wilson, also of McKinley, second, really provided the margin of victory as Canton went to the front, 17-10.

Lee Koenig annexed the 100-yard back stroke to place the Rossmen back in the running but Ted Brannin's squad picked up the place and show awards with Don Barth and Nick Kakas to make the score 21-15.

Ransom continued his string of undefeated performances by coping the 100-yard free style but the Bulldogs stayed right in the fight with Gene Austin second and Dave Oby, third. It was the same story in the 60-yard individual medley which was substituted for the diving events due to the lack of a board and which was won by Pence only to find Barr and Wilson trailing in for McKinley to give the Canton squad a 29-25 margin.

Ross In Front

Ross went ahead again in the 180-yard medley relay where Koenig, Strauch and Johnny Bowlus outswam Barth, Fox and Oby to make the tally read 30-29. It was the fourth successive first that Ross had registered without being able to follow with either a second or third place.

In the 160-yard free style relay finale, Canton's Kirk, Austin, Whiteleather and Shearer amassed a terrific lead to win easily over Bud Nord, Bob Bodenlos, Orval Earhart and Don Smith.
