

# 13 Vets Bolster Ross Stock

It's a little early to determine anything definite yet, but chances are Ross High's varsity football team will improve the disastrous 2-8 season of last year.

Coach Mal Mackey, using the coach's prerogative of being pessimistic early in the year, won't go out on the limb with any rash statements but he does admit the team could improve.

Thirteen lettermen will be back around which to build the 1964 edition of the Little Giants. However, only five of the returnees are linemen.

The backfield could be the team's strongest point with a pair of experienced quarterbacks, five halfbacks and a fullback giving it depth.

Mackey and his staff will consider switching one or two of the backs to end positions, thus

utilizing as much of the experience as possible.

Russ Hagerty, 6-2, 180-pound senior, and 6-0, 170-pound junior Terry Bork, will be battling for the starting quarterback position with Hagerty having a slight passing edge.

Returning halfbacks are Rick Gabel, 6-0, 171, Tim Tucker, 5-8, 170, George Branco, 5-8, 174, Ron Roberts, 5-10, 165 and Dick Thiesen, 6-0, 177. Strong Bob Kreilick, a 5-8, 175-pounder, is the returning fullback. Tucker and Branco are juniors, the rest seniors.

Veteran linemen include guards Dennis Keyes, 5-10, 205, Dave Reed, 5-8, 205, and Dave Clapp, 5-8, 170 while Lew Mackey, 5-9, 155, is a center. Gene Yeager, at 5-11 and 168, is the lone returning end. All are seniors.

## Ross High Grid Reports

Fremont Ross' football fortunes took a turn for the worse as Coach Mal Mackey's gridders moved into the first full week of practice when both lettermen quarterbacks were lost for varying periods with injuries.

Senior Russ Hagerty was admitted to Memorial hospital Monday morning for observation after he suffered a broken nose during a light workout. Terry Bork, a junior letterman, will be lost to the team from four to five weeks with a broken collarbone suffered Tuesday.

Mackey said Hagerty's injury was a fluke mishap. The team's expected starting quarterback had his nose broken while the squad was running through routine drills.

Hagerty was practicing hand-offs when senior Dick Thiesen came through and somehow, as he set to grab to the ball, his elbow belted Hagerty under his face guard.

Hagerty is expected to be back for Friday but probably will not start in the four-way scrimmage Saturday morning. Sophomore Steve Raines or senior halfback Rick Gabel may run the team during the work-out.

Bork was released after treatment at the hospital. He broke the collarbone running a drill when he went through the line and was jarred on the left shoulder.

He may not be ready until the October 2 game at Mansfield or the following week's tilt in Marion.

"They're coming but they are still rough" was the summation of Ross Coach Mal Mackey following Wednesday's scrimmage with a big Toledo Libbey eleven in which the Little Giants came out on the long end of a 3-1 count.

"We looked a little sluggish in the morning but they began hitting better in the afternoon," Mackey said. The two teams took a half hour break after the morning workout before going back at it.

Ross scored all three touchdowns on long plays with senior quarterback Rick Gabel and veteran halfback Tim Tucker accounting for the tallies.

The Little Giants scored their first tally in the morning session, which ended at 1-1, when Gabel lobbed a 30-yard pass to Tucker who snaked his way another 30 yards for the score.

Gabel, working with 'red' defense, the first unit, intercepted a Libbey pass and went 40 yards with it to account for the second score.

The final tally came when Tucker broke off tackle on a slant and shook off three or four would-be tacklers to go all the way on a play that carried 55 yards.

Despite the long scoring plays, Mackey said the club needs more work on its downfield blocking. The 'blues', second unit, got the first TD and Tucker was running with the "red" team when the final score came.

Quarterback is still a problem, Mackey said. He ran Gabel, and Jim Hess and sophomore Steve Raines at the post. All are still rough as indicated by several fumbles on handoffs.

Halfback George Branco was the only casualty of the scrimmage. He suffered a sprained neck while making a tackle but is not expected to miss practice.

The workout was Ross' last inter-school affair. The club will concentrate on intra-squad workouts in preparation for the September 11 opener at Springfield South.

The rally will be helped out by the Ross grididers running through a light workout on the turf in game uniforms. The team will run kickoffs and complete sets of plays but there will be no tackling.

Coach Mal Mackey and his staff will be on hand to address the crowd while the cheerleaders and band set the pace in the vocal department.

Mackey reports the team is healthy with no one having been added to the injured list which has sidelined the two veteran quarterbacks, senior Russ Haggerty, who is apparently through for the season, and junior Terry Bork, who will be back in another three weeks or so to boost the club's stock.

In the meantime, Mackey indicated he will be going with sophomore Steve Raines, 160, and — or senior Rick Gabel, 170, at the key post. Haggerty's departure left another gap in the team since he was the Little Giants' punter. Mackey said Ken Pasch, 175-pound senior who was out to practice

for the first time Wednesday, looks like he will take over the kicking.

Pasch was booming high punts out in drills which averaged around 40 yards. He played football as a freshman and sophomore but wasn't out last year.

Starting in the backfield behind Raines will be seniors Ron Roberts, 160, and Dick Thiessen, 175, and sophomore Tim Arndt, 180. Junior Tim Tucker, a pile-driving 170-pounder, Gabel, junior George Brancos, 168, sophomore Dave Longanbach, 150, and seniors Jim Hess, 160, and Bob Kreilick, 170, will also be seen

ing plenty of action in the backfield.

Ross' forward wall will be anchored by five lettermen, including team captain Dennis Keyes, 205-pound senior guard. Manning the other guard post will be senior Dave Clapp, 168, with senior Lew Mackey, 155, at center.

Two other veterans, senior Dave Reed, 203, and Gene Yeager, 158, will be handling a tackle and end position respectively. Non-lettermen Wally Pankratz, 200, and Fred Tolhurst, 195, will be at the other tackle and end slots.

Backup men on the line will be ends Howard Overmyer, 170,

and Herman Kanan, 160, tackles Kris Perry, 194, and Fred Swisgood, 190, guards Jim Kreilick, 176, and Russ Coleman, 190, and center Ken Briney, 185.

Ross will be meeting a South team which will be about the same in size as the Little Giants. The Wildcats' offensive line will average around 187 pounds and the backs about 178.

The South ends will be Harold Daniels, 176, and Bill Wilkerson, 170, the tackles Gary Roush, 183, and Dave Schultz, 198, the guards Mike Peterson, 189, and Bob Warman, 189, and Ron Lebaroff, 206, gets the call as the starting center.



Ross will leave by charter bus from Harmon Field at noon Friday. The team will eat at Wittenberg University in Springfield and relax on the campus before going over to the South stadium.

## Little Giants Play Hard

SPRINGFIELD—The Springfield South elevens boasting 18 lettermen, scored the first three times they got their hands on the football Friday night to chalk up a 25-0 opening game win over Fremont Ross before a crowd of about 5,000.

Ross got a drive going after the break and was driving to the 10 before the attack stalled and the hosts took over on downs. Daniels missed a 21-yard field goal but from the Ross 36-yard stripe 45 seconds from the end of the third period.

South's final score came with 8:18 remaining in the game. It was another field goal, this one down mentally on the part of the Little Giants.

With the pigskin on the Ross 41, Kuss took a good rush by the left side of the Fremont line when he tried to skirt his own right end. He was chased back to the South 40 and a series of tucks by before Captain Dennis Keyes nailed him.

# Ross Opens At Home Against West

Coach Fred George will bring in a veteran team boasting weight and speed but whose one problem may be lack of depth. West has eight lettermen back from the squad that posted a 20-14 win over Ross last fall.

All eight are on the starting unit. In back of them lies unknown quantities. Cleveland Shaw beat West last week, 32-14.

Coach Mal Mackey has listed two probable changes in his first team offensive unit. Senior Rick Gabel, 170, will get the call at quarterback in place of sophomore Steve Raines. Raines, however, will also see plenty of action.

The other change is in the line where Jim Buehler, 204-pound junior, will replace senior Dave Reed, 203, who has been sidelined with a stomach virus and may not play at all.

Rounding out the backfield will be Ron Roberts, 160, Dick Thiessen, 175, and sophomore Tim Arndt, 180.

Manning the forward wall will be ends Fred Tolhurst, 195, and Gene Yeager, 158. The tackles will be Wally Pankratz, 200, and Buehler and Dave Clapp, 168, and Dennis Keyes, 205, the team captain, at the guard positions. Lew Mackey, 155, will be the center.

Mackey and his aides have been working the Little Giants

hard all week, placing particular emphasis on containing the Cowboys outside.

Much of the yardage picked up by South last week was gained around the corners. If the Little Giants let West go outside their speed could be the difference.

Both backfields will average 171 pounds but West will have a 17-pound per man advantage in the forward wall which averages 200 pounds as opposed to Ross' 183 pound average.

With the exception of a pair of twins, Fred and Fran Herman, Coach George will be going with an all-senior lineup. Fred, 165, is the starting right end and Fran, 165, is the quarterback. Both are sophomores.

The rest of the lineup is composed of lettermen except for center Gary Patterson, 190, who played as a sophomore but was sidelined by ineligibility last fall.

Handling the other end position will be Richard Maynard, 175. The Cowboy tackles are mammoth with both Jim Hutchison and Leon Williams going 235 pounds.

The West guards will be Chris Gance, 190, and Jim O'Grady. Halfback Orville Harboldt, 165, is the fastest man on the West team. He does the 100 in 10 seconds flat and last spring won the Cleveland District title in that event.

The fullback will be Bill Pataki, a strong 190-pounder while Phil Smith, 165, will be at right half.

Tickets for the game are still on sale at Tremper's on west State street. A large crowd is expected for the 8 p.m. home opener.



Ross high's Little Giants will be sporting a new look Friday night when Coach Mal Mackey's crew invades Mansfield in the Buckeye Conference lidlifter for both teams.

For the first time this fall, Ross will have an experienced quarterback to guide them. Terry Bork, 6-0, 170-pound junior letterman, will return for his first full game of activity when the BC foes meet at 8 p.m.

Bork had been sidelined by a broken left collarbone on the third day of practice. He made his first appearance last week against Canton McKinley but was limited to punting duties.

It was felt the extra week of no contact would allow the shoulder to heal completely and the risk wasn't worth the possibility of losing Bork again.

Steve Raines, sophomore helmsman who guided the team through one win and two losses in the first three games, will be Bork's backup man. No fault can be laid at the 14-year-old's feet for the 1-2 record, he simply needs experience.

Mackey and his aides know a team can't go with a sophomore quarterback in the rugged conference. The addition of Bork to the squad probably means the Little Giants will be using a more wide-open offense.

To date, Raines has thrown 16 passes, an average of just over five per game. From now on, with a healthy Bork on the

aerials to be thrown.

Another change in the starting lineup will find Rick Gabel, 170, moving to halfback along with Ron Roberts, 160. Starting in the fullback position will be 180-pound sophomore Tim Arndt.

Mackey indicated a defensive switch would be made also. Bob Kreilick, who had been playing middle guard, will move to defensive end, and end Fred Tolhurst will play a tackle position. Tackle Dave Reed will take over the middle guard slot.

Ross will be meeting a Tyger eleven that has yet to win a game and, like Fremont, has scored just two touchdowns. Both Mansfield TD's came in the opening 13-12 loss to Cuyahoga Falls. Following that game, Coach Jim Dougherty's crew was blanked, 16-0 by Cleveland East, and 26-0 by top-rated Massillon last week.

Mansfield suffered a severe blow in the East game when it lost the services of 200-pound fullback Ron Parr. The senior co-captain, a first-stringer since his sophomore year, suffered fractures of the left leg and is lost for the season. He scored one of the two TDs against Falls and had an 8.3 average per carry in 18 attempts before his injury.

Starting in his place will be his brother, Clendon, a 190-pound junior. Dave Hutchins, 155, currently leading the team in rushing with 110 yards in 30 tries, will be at one halfback post and Gene Earick, 150, at the other. The Tygers' quarterback will be Kerry Dean, 185-pound senior who has completed 10 of 31 passes for 148 yards and both Mansfield touchdowns.

The Tyger line will have Terry Swarn, 184, and Ron Gonzales, 180, at the ends, Charles Williams, 223, and Charles Harpster, 210, at the tackles, and Phil Horvath, 210, over center. Les Jameison, 200, and Bob Palm, 203, are expected to start at the guard positions.

Mansfield and Fremont will be equal in the weight department with the Tyger line averaging 191 to Ross' 190 and both backfields averaging 170 pounds.

In addition to Tolhurst, 200, and Reed, 208, Ross' line will be composed of end Gene Yeager, 160, tackle Wally Pankratz, 200, center Lew Mackey, 160, and guards Dennis Keyes, 215, and Dave Clapp, 175.

Last fall Mansfield whipped Ross here, 24-0, enroute to a 3-7 season.

Fremont's touchdown came with exactly one minute showing on the scoreboard clock when Terry Bork, back in the lineup as the team's quarterback for the first time this year, dropped a perfect 30-yard pass into Gabel's hands at the goal. Gabel was in front of two defenders who tried to keep him out of never-never land but he dove over.

On the try for the points after, halfback Ron Roberts found there wasn't any hole when he tried to slant off left guard.

Ross tried an onside kick but the boot went out of bounds at the Mansfield 36 and Coach Jim Dougherty's charges elected to keep from there. # Ross-Sandusky Meet For 58th Time

It's trick or treat night Friday and the big trick will be at Harmon Field if Fremont's Little Giants treat arch-foe Sandusky right — at least in the eyes of local fans.

The game offers a study in contrasts. Ross is fresh from its best victory of the season in the 14-8 upset of Findlay while Sandusky is coming off its worst showing in 20 straight Buckeye Conference matches.

An expected packed house of 7,000 or more fans will be on hand to see the big question answered: can Ross keep the momentum gained last week against a potent club which was humiliated in one of the year's biggest Ohio high school games and is likely to be one of two things — fighting mad or still flat?

Sandusky has the explosive-

ness to blast a ball game wide open. But against a strong Elyria defense, the Streaks were turned into just another football team.

Team defense was the key last week and Coach Maj Mackey and his staff are hoping it will be this week. In Ross, the Blue Streaks will be facing another top defensive unit — an outfit good enough to hold Findlay to seven net yards rushing in the first half of last Friday's tilt and one which is considered around the league as one of the best in the BC.

But, Fremont let down in the second half last week and to do that against the seventh-ranked Streaks will be fatal. In its four BC games this fall, Ross has permitted just four touchdowns and with a better start in the losses to Mansfield and Lorain, could just as easily be 4-0 in the loop instead of 2-2. The Gi-

ants rank second in the BC behind Elyria in defense.

However, the offensive has been sluggish until last week's first half, getting 38 points in the four league games. Sandusky has chalked up 106 points in four games and permitted 46 enroute to a 3-1 BC mark.

In Jim Brown, 163, George Williams, 183, Bill Yeager, 171, Cleveland Dickerson, 204, and Willie Amison, 173, the Streaks have a fleet of fast, hard-hitting backs that Ross must contain or go down to defeat.

Brown, Williams and Yeager will start along with quarterback Steve Derringer, 183, in the Sandusky backfield. Brian Healy will alternate frequently with Derringer, and Dickerson and Amison will be in as much as they are out.

Brown has picked up 519 yards

in 52 tries in seven games,

Williams 458 in 64, Yeager 399 in 56, Dickerson 293 in 40 and Amison is averaging 8.7 yards in 23 tries. The Streaks are not noted for their passing although Derringer has hit eight of 17 for 186 and three TDs.

Sandusky will offer an offensive line that will average around 196 pounds. The defensive line will be even bigger with the addition of Tom Ernst, 64 and 291 pounds and Art Biddle, 6-3 and 251 pounds. Ross' offensive forward wall averages about 187.

The Blue Streak offensive ends will be Bob Scalla, 184, and Dan Kaser, 196, both of whom sat out last week's game with injuries but are expected to be ready Friday. Gerry Gray, 240, and Dave Schweinfurth, 200, are the tackles, and Ron Balconi, 181, and Dan Neese, 192, the guards. Bill Sharp, 178, will be the center.

One of the problems Sandusky must face is how to defend the Little Giants' offense which displayed a strong ground game last week when Findlay opened its defense to prevent Terry Bork, the BC's top passer, from taking them apart with the long bomb.

Mackey indicated the purple and white will attempt to keep Sandusky's defense opened up too. Rick Gabel, 170, and Ron Roberts, 160, will open at the halfback posts and Bob Kreilick, 170, at fullback. This unit powered to 183 yards on the ground last week with the aid of good line blocking. If Sandusky tries to stack the middle, Bork will be throwing.

Jim Kreilick, 176, and Gene Yeager, 160, will start offensively at the ends for Fremont, with Fred Tolhurst, 200, spelling Kreilick. The tackles will be Wally Pankratz, 200, and

Dave Reed, 208, with Captain Dennis Keyes, 215, and Russ Coleman, 190, or Dave Clapp, 175, at the guards and Lew Mackey, 160, over center.

But the story may be told by the Ross defensive unit which warded off four Findlay thrusts at the goal from the three-yard line. That crew will consist of Tolhurst and Reed at the tackles, Roberts and Reed at the ends, Clayton Williams, 260, and Pankratz at the guards and Keyes at middle guard. Doug Davis, 150, and George Branco, 170, will be the cornerbacks, Jim and Bob Kreilick at linebackers and Jim Hess, 160, at safety.

At any rate, it won't be the game it looked like it would be earlier in the season. The Little Giants have come a long way since then and the Streaks just might have slipped a little.

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

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## Elyria's Al Campbell Sets Scoring Mark

Elyria's fourth-rated Pioneers walked away with a 30-0 Buckeye Conference football victory over unranked Fremont Ross Friday night but the score was no indication of the tenacity of the battle viewed by some 4,000 chilled fans.

# Ross Closes Out At King

With nothing much to gain or lose, Fremont Ross' football team invades Lorain Admiral King for the final gridiron tilt of the season with just one thing on its mind — get Coach Mal Mackey's 100th coaching victory.

Mackey goes into the game with a 99-44-7 mark accumulated while at the helm of the Little Giants for the past 15 years. His club picked up the 99th at Findlay's expense but hasn't been able to hit the century mark with successive losses to Sandusky and Elyria. Friday night's Buckeye Conference duel is the final effort of the season and against a tough Admiral King crew, the Little Giants and Mackey may have to wait until next fall.

King enters the game with a record just a notch or two better than Fremont's. First-year Coach Pete Reisen's charges have dropped five foes and bowed to four others while Ross is 3-6 overall and 2-4 in the loop. The Admirals are 3-3 in the BC and a win would give the Little Giants a tie for fourth place.

However, the Admirals cannot be rated too heavily on their record. The blue and gold was routed only once, by Elyria, 37-6, in a game in which they did not perform up to their abilities. The other losses included a 6-0 dogfight with unbeaten

Cleveland St. Joseph, an 8-0 loss to cross-town rival Lorain which was won on the second play of the game, and a three-point loss to Sandusky last week, 14-11.

King has beaten Parma Senior, 30-61, Cincinnati Taft, 16-0, Mansfield, 31-6, Marion, 45-0, and Findlay, 21-20. The comparison of records shows Ross dumping Marion, 12-0, and Findlay, 14-8, while losing to Mansfield, 8-6, Lorain, 14-6, Sandusky, 16-0, and Elyria, 30-0, in league games.

The Admirals appear to have an edge offensively and defensively but the defensive margin may be misleading. Ross' defense didn't jell until the Mansfield game and half the points scored against the Little Giants came in the three games preceding that tilt as the purple and white bowed to unbeaten powerhouses Springfield South, 25-0, and Canton McKinley, 50-0, while beating Cleveland West, 14-0.

Since then Ross has given up 76 points, all in the league. Admiral King has yielded 107 points in nine games and 85 in six BC contests.

Offense is a different story however. King has moved to 158 points and Ross to just 52. Leading the Admirals' attack are speedsters Joe Payne, 150-pound junior, and 175-pound sophomore flash Willie Rice.

Payne is the leading ground gainer with 686 yards in 117 carries while Rice has 389 in 54 attempts and halfback Emmett Ross, 170, 372. Ross leads the scoring with eight TDs and 12 points after for 60 points.

There is a possibility that Payne won't play because of an ankle injury suffered while making a downfield block against Sandusky. The injured foot was placed in a cast as a preventive measure and was slated to be taken off today. His status for Friday is doubtful though.

If Payne can't go, Rice will move to right half, Ross will be at left half and either Bob D'Andrea, 160, or sophomore John Milam, 180, at fullback. Bill Krupski, 150, runs the team at quarterback. He doesn't throw much, having tossed 56 passes and hit on 15 for one TD and 167 yards. Krupski is considered another one of the many good running quarterbacks in the league and has garnered 230 yards on the ground.

Weight-wise, the Admiral line will be about the same as Ross'. Ends are Paul Biber, 180, and Larry Solomon, 215. Dave Nemeth, 190, and Bob Johnson,

185, will be the tackles with Dave Brieto, 170, and Kevin Jakubec, 195, the guards. Center will be George Ferlic, 190. Solomon booted a 35-yard field goal against the Blue Streaks last week and if the Ross defense continues to prove tough inside the 30-yard line, he can be expected to try a couple Friday night.

Mackey's starting defensive unit will find Fred Tolhurst, 200, and Bob Kreilick, 170, at the ends, Wally Pankratz, 200, and Dave Reed, 208, are the tackles with Clayton Williams, 260, and Dennis Keyes, 215, as linebackers and Ron Roberts, 160, and George Branco, 170, at the cornerback positions. Jim Hess, 160, and Doug Davis, 145, are the deep backs.

The veteran mentor indicated he may run Davis, a junior, and sophomore Craig Swartz, 145, a couple of speedsters, offensively Friday night along with Tim Arndt, 180, in an effort to get the offense moving. However, he will probably start Roberts, and Rick Gabel, 170, at the halfbacks, and Bob Kreilick at fullback. Terry Bork, 170, will be at the helm.

Starting in the offensive line will be Tolhurst, Reed, Keyes, Lew Mackey, 160, Russ Coleman, 190, Pankratz and Jim Kreilick.



COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP) — Ohio State's long, brilliant string of Big Ten basketball championships figures to be snapped this season.

The inexperienced Buckeyes, stripped of two-time All-American Gary Bradda and two other frontliners, may be hardpressed to finish in the first division.

There simply doesn't appear to be enough talent around to capture a sixth straight conference crown. Unless coach Fred Taylor, who has built a 114-18 record in the last five years, finds solid replacements for his departed warriors.

In addition to Bradda, cornerman Don DeVoe is gone as is guard Tom Bowman, a victim of the books.

But Taylor, beginning his seventh campaign, appears unperturbed.

### Better Team Speed

"How well we can do depends a great deal on how quickly our offense jells. We have better unit speed than a year ago and that added quickness should help us on defense," Taylor told a luncheon Tuesday.

The Buckeyes lack depth, height and are extremely green. But Taylor overcame other problems the last two years when no one expected Ohio to share the title with Illinois and Michigan.

What makes things tougher is that the conference is loaded.

"Indiana and Illinois return all five starters and five other teams return four," Taylor said. He points to Michigan as the club to beat and "somebody better whip them early or we're liable to see a runaway."

The Bucks, who open next Wednesday, are not without some bright spots.

Returning is Dick Ricketts, an outstanding backcourt performer who does everything well.

Taylor also has two highly
