Ross To Field Veteran Baseball Team

8 Varsity Lettermen Returning

Strong Mound Staff
Led By Gallagher,
Level Aids State Hopes

A veteran baseball team possibly a good bet for state championship honors will be fielded this spring at Fremont Ross high school under the direction of Manager Lawrence Doren.

Assisting Doren is Pete Michaels. Workouts have been confined indoors thus far, outdoor drills held up until the weather breaks.

Eight Varsity lettermen and five Reserve lettermen are included on the 1958 Ross baseball roster. Only three lettermen were lost due to graduation, Ken Adams, first baseman; Bob Entenmann, outfielder; and Al Price, pitcher.

Varsity letterman returnees include pitchers John Level, senior, righthander; Doug Gallagher, junior, lefthander; Gary Bierly, junior, righthander; infielders, Charles Houdeshell, senior, first baseman; Richard Fulton and Mark Walter, seniors, infielders; and Ralph Oxley, senior and Roger Mann, sophomore, catchers.

Reserve lettermen up for a crack at the Varsity are John Kelley, senior, outfielder; Franklin Walby, senior, outfielder; Robert Nickel, junior, outfielder; Milton Hetrick, sophomore, infielder-pitcher; and Harry Walter, sophomore, infielder.

Ross high's diamond squad is gifted with exceptional pitching strength, a necessity in high school baseball. Ace southpaw Gallagher has the potential to rate as one of the top hurlers in the state and he is backed up by hard throwing, burly righthander Level to give Ross a potent one-two mound staff. Bierly has had considerable mound experience. Other pitching candidates are Milt Hetrick and sophomore Steve Cecil. Howard Fought, Jeff Frost, Tom Lee and Jerry Jones and freshmen Dick Dundore, Dan Moran and Denny Stine.

Biggest drawback to a successful campaign is in the hitting department. Last year's team had little punch but Doren feels the experience gained in 1957 might aid that department this season.

There is experience in every position. Level can play first base when not pitching and Houdeshell is a top candidate at that position. Both also can play the outfield. Other first base hopes and Milt Hetrick, Dundore and freshman Richard Schepflin.

Catching department has veterans Oxley and Mann plus sophomores Cecil and Ruben Rendon and freshmen Philip Delasantina, Schepflin and Stine. Catching was weakest last year in passed balls and in light hitting.

Shortstop candidates are led by Fulton and Mark Walter with the possibility that one may move over to second base. Harry Walter, Mann, Cecil, Lee and freshmen Maurice Gnepper and Paul Keen also will get a look at short stop. Bierly, the No. 3 pitcher, is the top third base candidate with Ken Smith and Fought and Stine next in line.

Fulton and Mark Walter both

can handle second base chores. Other prospects — Smith, Mann, Cecil, Harry Walter, sophomore Bengy Eisler, Jones, Gnepper, and Keen and freshmen Jack White and Gary Wilkins.

Houdeshell, Kelley, Gallagher, Level and Walby can man outfield posts. Leading candidates for starting roles are Walby in left, Kelley in center and Houdeshell in right field. Other outfield bets — Oxley, senior Richard Humburg, Nickel, junior Kenneth Fleming,

sophomores Jeffrey Frost and Willard Smith, Harry Walter, Moran, White, junior Bart Oliver, Jones, Stine, freshmen Gary and Larry Wilkins, freshmen Clifford Ferguson and Al Johnson, junior Robert Semes, sophomore Gordon Hart and Delasantina.

It was at Bradenton during an exhibition game between the Braves and their World Series victims, the New York Yankees, that pitcher Bob Buhl of the Braves sunned himself along the sidelines. He kept up a steady patter and exchange of gibes with Wes Covington, Milwaukee's left fielder.

In the first inning, Mickey Mantle put one of Joey Jay's pitches into orbit, clearing the left field fence with daylight to spare at the 375-foot mark.

"Where were you on that one, Wes?" Buhl needled.

"Inside," said Wes.

Manager Birdie Tebbetts of the Cincinnati Redlegs describes little Nellie Fox of the Chicago White Sox as the "softest hitting \$40,000 player I've ever seen."

Manager Fred Hutchinson of the St. Louis Cardinals was discussing the suggestion of ex-boss Frank Lane, now general manager of Cleveland, to use field mikes so the fans could get closer to the

game. "I'm all for it," said Hutch, "—if they put one next to Frank, too."

"The first time I ever saw a pitcher doing any long running in spring training," said Al Lopez, "was in 1925. Walter Johnson used to do it then. I was just a kid in Tampa (his home town) and the Senators used to pay me to catch batting practice."

"Clubs never brought a lot of players to spring training in those days," said Lopez, now manager of the Chicago White Sox.

"I used to catch Johnson then and I was real scared the first time... Imagine a kid like me catching the great Walter Johnson's fast one. But I was surprised. His fast ball was real soft. He was easy to catch."

The day after Stan Musial hit his first home run of the spring, Casey Stengel mentioned he had read where "Mr. Musial says he now feels good up there at the plate. Says he was doing something wrong before."

"Humph," Casey grunted. "I notice he's only hitting sickly .350. He couldn't a been doin' much wrong."

Harry Walter, shortstop.
Roger Mann, catcher.

Level may take over on the mound sometime during the game. If so, Hetrick will move to first base and Bierly will play third.

Mann probably will get the starting nod as catcher but Doren also wants to get a look at Steve Cecil, Ralph Oxley and Denny Stine. Cecil has the strongest arm of the four but has had little experience. Stine also might be used at third base.

Ross held outdoor drills Monday and Tuesday including two intrasquad games Tuesday. The Little Giants will practice at Rodger Young Park this evening as St. Joseph baseballers take over Anderson Field. Ross will go through batting and fielding drills tonight.

Ross Wins Baseball Opener By 11 To 1 Over Gibsonburg

Batting power, lacking last year in the Ross high school baseball attack, has improved considerably if the Little Giants' game against Gibsonburg at Anderson Field Thursday is any indication.

In their season opener, Ross batsmen bashed out nine safeties in six innings to provide Coach Lawrence Doren's Fremonters an 11-1 victory over the invading Golden Bears of Coach Herb Redding.

Bierly Fans Eleven

Right hander Gary Bierly worked the first six innings on the mound for Ross, gave up Gibson-

burg's lone run and all of its three hits, struck out 11 including all three hitters in the fourth inning and walked four. Lefty Dick Dundore toiled the seventh frame for the Little Giants, fanned the first two hitters to face him, walked the third who was promptly cut down by sub catcher Dennis Stine while trying to steal second base.

Bierly also picked a runner off second base who was leaning the wrong way.

Bill Belcher started on the mound for Gibsonburg and gave up all but two of the Ross runs and eight of its nine hits in 3 2-3 in-

nings. Andy Ruggiero came in relief and pitched creditably, fanning two and walking one.

Steve Cecil laced a line drive double over the left fielder's head for Ross and teammate Chuck Houdeshell also connected for a 2-bagger down the right field line.

Catcher Roger Mann had two singles, John Kelley a single and three walks, Bob Nickel a single which drove in two runs and Harry Walter two singles for Ross.

The Fremonters played errorless ball.

Ruggiero was the big gun in the Golden Bears' attack with two singles, one driving in the first run of the game in the first half of the first inning. It was a clean drive past shortstop Mark Walter's hands into left field.

Ross wrapped up the game with a six-run fourth frame in which Cecil drove in two runs with his double.

A large audience viewed the game on a cold, windy day. Many departed for warmer areas before the contest was over.

Ross plays next on April 9 against Tiffin Calvert at Anderson Field.

The good-pitch, good-field Baltimore Orioles finally have come around to belting the ball, the one item that checked their surprising surge at .500 and fifth place last season in the American League.

After losing four in a row on the exhibition trail, the Orioles busted out with 25 hits Thursday and swept a double-header from the Cleveland Indians 10-5 and 11-10. They had scored only 10 runs in the losing string.

What they needed, it turned out, was a crack at ex-Oriole Don Ferrarese, the young left-hander swapped to the Indians this week.

Ferrarese left after two innings with an 8-1 deficit in the opener. Jack Harshman worked five innings in the seven-inning opener and drove in four runs with three singles while giving up two of the Tribe runs.

Brooks Robinson belted his third homer of the spring for the Birds while Joe Ginsberg and Foster Clestleman hit their first. Rocky Colavito rapped a pair for the Indians, who blew a 6-4 lead in the nightcap.

The Los Angeles Dodgers scored a 5-3 decision over the Milwaukee Braves. Charlie Neal hit two homers and rookie Dick Gray one for the Dodgers, who built a 4-2

Ross Nine Loses To Calvert 5-2

An easy fly ball dropped between Ross high's left and center fielder in the third inning to allow three runs to cross the plate for Tiffin Calvert and the visitors went on to score a 5 to 2 victory over Ross high in a baseball game at Anderson Field Wednesday.

Ross, now 1-1 for the season, tackles Findlay at 4 p. m. at Anderson Field Friday with Gary Bierly (1-0) scheduled for mound duty.

Ross gained a 1-0 lead in the first inning against Calvert when John Level reached base on an error, stole second, advanced to third when Bierly and Chuck Houdeshell walked and scored as John Kelley was thrown out on a ground ball.

Level, pitching for Ross, ran into

trouble in the third when he hit a batter, walked Calvert pitcher Reinhart and leadoff batter Wright to load the bases with none out. Level appeared to be out of trouble when he struck out the next two hitters.

But shortstop C. Burns of Calvert lifted a high fly to left center which Ross center fielder Kelley appeared to have under control. Bob Nickel, Ross left fielder, coming over as if to make the catch, startled Kelley and the ball dropped between the two outfielders for a bases-clearing double. Level then fanned the next Calvert batsman.

The Little Giants came back to score a run in the fourth on a bunt single by Kelley who reached second on a wide throw to first. Kel-

ley moved to third when Frank Walby skied deep to center field and talked on Harry Walter's blooper single over the short stop's head.

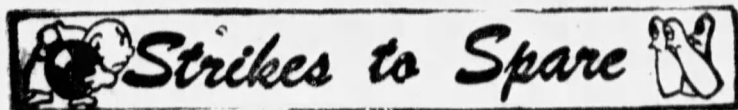
Calvert added single runs in the fifth and sixth frames to ice the victory.

Giants Threaten

Fremont threatened in the final three stanzas but couldn't move any runner past first base. Level scratched an infield hit in the fifth but was erased on a double play. Kelley waked in the sixth but was forced at second. And Steve Cecil, with one down in the seventh and final inning, singled but was cut down on an attempted hit-and-run. Mark Walter missed the pitch and Cecil was tagged out at second. Walter then fled to center field for the final out.

Pitcher Reinhart of Calvert, a poised right hander, struck out four, walked three and allowed five hits in posting the victory. Loser Level of Ross struck out 11, walked four, was guilty of a wild pitch and was touched for five hits.

Level had two of Ross high's five hits including a double to right center in the third inning which was wasted.

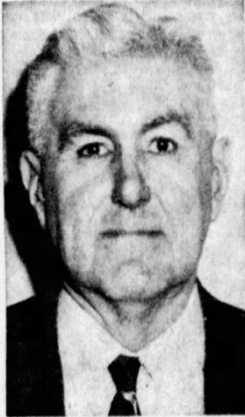

Doren Resigns As Ross High Baseball Coach

Resignation Effective
At End Of School Year;
To Continue As Teacher

Lawrence Doren, Ross high head baseball coach the past four years, Friday resigned that position effective at the end of the present school year.

In a letter to the Vermont Board of Education, Doren submitted his resignation and added that it is his wish to continue at Ross high only in a teaching capacity.

Doren has been contemplating retiring as head baseball coach the past couple of years according to Supt. A. E. Rupp.

Supt. Rupp said the baseball job could go to any one of a number of men. Current assistant baseball coach is Pete Michaels who may continue in that capacity or be elevated to the head job. Also, the new basketball coach to be named soon may be fitted into the baseball program as may one or more new football coaches.

Doren's retirement adds to the growing list of coaching vacancies at Ross high school. In football, a new line coach and new backfield coach for the Varsity are needed to replace Bob Steele and Jack Decker. Two new basketball coaches are needed to replace Al Ziemke as head coach and Larry Willis as assistant coach. And, replacement for George Gruse as head swimming coach is needed. However, it is expected that when the Board of Education meets next Tuesday, Bill Faunce and Don Kepler, assistants this year in swimming, will be named head co-coaches of swimming.

Supt. Rupp said he has received over 60 applications for the vacant head basketball coaching position at Ross high school. It is expected that the new cage coach will be named the latter part of April. Mr. Rupp currently is narrowing the list down to about five men who will be called in for an interview within the next couple of weeks.

Gallagher's Ross High Record

Doug Gallagher, who signed a pro contract with Detroit Friday, pitched sensationally this spring with the Ross high baseball team that went all the way to the state Class AA finals only to lose by one run to Cincinnati Elder in the final inning.

During the 1958 season, Doug posted a 7-0 record. He pitched in 10 games, worked 50 1-3 innings, faced 181 batters, struck out 132 and walked only 18. He allowed but seven runs, only 3 earned, gave up 10 hits and hit one batter. Teammates committed two errors while the ace lefty whirled, catchers were guilty of three passed balls and Doug turned lose two wild pitches.

Included in Gallagher's seven 1958 victories were two seven-inning no-hitters and one six-inning no-hitter (John Level finished up in the seventh and didn't allow a hit), two one-hitters and two three-hitters.

One of Gallagher's no-hitters was a perfect game, no runner reaching first base. That was in the District tournament finals at Anderson Field, Fremont against Anthony Wayne.

Doug averaged about 18 strikeouts per game this season.

In pacing Ross high to second place in the state in 1958, Gallagher also contributed a few timely hits. Most notable was his home run in the state finals against Elder when, with Ross behind 5-0, the Little Giants rallied to score two runs. Two men were on base with two outs when Doug slugged a drive over the 360-foot mark of the Ohio State university Varsity field which landed about 40 feet outside the playing arena. His wallop tied the score 5-5.

Gallagher's overall record pitching for Ross high was 12 victories, four defeats. In his sophomore year, Doug posted a 4-2 record including a no-hit victory over Marion and two one-hitters.

The Fremont southpaw had some arm trouble during the 1957 campaign. His record last year was 1-2. One of his losses was to Toledo Clay, 3-2, although Doug hurled a no-hitter. Walks, passed balls and errors led to the defeat. His lone victory in 1957 was on a one-hitter.

Doug also performed on the mound and in the field for the Fremont Legion traveling team and helped the Legion nine defeat Clyde for the County Tournament championship last summer. Fremont lost to Ashland in the Dis-

trict. Gallagher's high school coach Lawrence Doren, who retired on a successful note at the end of the 1958 season, praised his star lefthander for a brilliant pitching performance this year.

"It was his best year," Doren pointed out, "with success coming mainly due to his exceptional control."

Doug will try that fine control plus a sizzling fast ball and a sharp-breaking curve and drop against the pros now. He has to be good to remain in organized baseball. Doug has all the tools. A "golden arm" and poise... How well he uses them remains to be seen.

The 39-year-old Bolt Friday had a double bogey six that marred his second straight round of 71. As 55 survivors of the field which numbered 2,150 original entries and 162 starters plunged into today's final 36-hole marathon, the players to beat lined up this way: Bolt, 142; Gary Player, the 22-year-old South African who is the tournament's only par-breaker so far, at 143 and wealthy 35-year-old Frank Stranahan at 144.

Missing for the first time in this stage in 18 National Opens was Sam Snead, who never has succeeded in winning this title. Cary Middlecoff, two-time champion who shared the favorite's role, barely escaped elimination with 154. Four-time winner Ben Hogan, suffering from an injured left hand, made a brief bid for the lead but wound up six strokes behind at 148.

Dick Mayer, the defending champion, was farther back at 150 and Ken Venturi, brilliant leader of the younger generation of touring golfers, had 152.

Tied for fourth place at 146 were Julius Boros, 1952 Open champion and one of the first-day leaders and two Oklahomans, former Amateur champion Charlie Coe and Labron Harris, 50-year-old Oklahoma State University coach.
