WIN ALL BUT TWO EVENTS

Ross Sophomores, Seniors Shine In Track Team Debut

Surprising sophomores and steady seniors will be the foundation of the Ross high school track hopes this season. This was proved Tuesday as the Little Giants opened their season at home with a 94-2-3 to 32-1-3 victory over Oak Harbor.

Ross completely dominated the meet in which there was no doubt except the effect of the extreme cold and wind on winning times. Fremont thin-clads captured all but two of the 15 events, posted one-two finishes in three events and clean

sweeps of all three places in four more.

Of the 13 Little Giant victories four were recorded by sophomore runners. The other nine were by seniors.

Gary Snyder, Ross senior hurdler, was the only double winner of the meet. He topped the high timbers in :15.9 for 120 yards and then came back with a second win in the 180 - yard lows on a :22 timing.

One of the sophomores, Jim Goodwin, posted the fastest two mile time to be recorded in this vicinity. He finished in front of Oak Harbor's Howton with a time of 11 minutes, 35 seconds.

Ross had its one-two finishes in the 100 - yard dash, Pole Vault and shot put. Clean sweeps came in the 120 - yard high hurdles, Discus, 180-yard low hurdles and 220 - yard dash.

Line Oak Harbor victory came in the mile run where Jim Lacer was pushed to his final strike but finished just ahead of Ross Sophomore Mike Geib. Oak Harbor then captured its second event in the mile relay, final event of the meet.

Sophomores gaining first places for Ross, in addition to Goodwin, were Rusty Williams, 440-yard dash; Terry Byers, 880-yard run and Steve Parker, 220-yard dash.

Green Springs Sprinters, Weight Men Lead 72-55 Tranck Conquest

Victory number one of the young track season was put on the books for Green Springs Tuesday as they outran and jumped Mohawk 72-55 on the losers' home cinders. The victorious Bobcats making their second outing of the year won nine of the 15 events.

They utilized domination of

the short and middle distance running events and the weight tosses for the victory margin. In the weights Clint Humbert put the shot 43-5 to set a new Green Springs record. He topped the old school mark of 43-0 set by himself last season.

Humbert led a sweep of the shot and finished second in the discus, trading places with second place finisher in the shot, Bob Edwards. Humbert was the big winner for Green Springs with a first in the 220-yard dash to go along with his shot put victory.

Coach Ron Shaffer was pleased with his team's output, particularly the fact that 17 different boys scored for the Bobcats. The impressive victory came despite the fact the leading Green Springs sprinter Duane Burrows was out of action with the flu and Shaffer pulled a flu-weakened John Salazar out of the mile midway in the action.

Fostoria Takes Relay Events To Insure Win

FOSTORIA—Ross high school track team tasted defeat for the first time Friday at Fostoria, 74-53. Relays could have made a difference in the event which was characterized by several tight finishes.

Fostoria insured victory by winning both relays to give the home team wins in 10 of the 15 events. The score belies the closeness of the meet, where decisions on who finished first could have very well gone either way in the 100-yard dash, 880-yard relay or 880-yard run.

It took a sharp eye to determine whether Fostoria's Ron Markoff or Ross' Tim Arnold broke the tape in the 100-yard dash. The finish judges gave the nod to Markoff of the home team. Both runners were timed in :10.75.

In the 880 - yard relay Ross ran a fast 1:35.9, but still finished four - tenths of a second behind Fostoria. This was the fastest 880-yard relay time posted so far this season in this immediate area.

Ross also ran into the premier two-miler to develop in the early part of the first season for the event. Ron Carpenter, Fostoria, broke the 11-minute mark in the event with a time of 10:59.7.

Only double winners in the meet were Ron Burton of Fostoria and Gary Snyder of Ross. Snyder once more won both hurdle events. Burton, who divides his talents between field and running events, captured the shotput and the 440 - yard run.

The loss evened the Ross record at one win, one loss. The Little Giant thinclads will return to action Tuesday at Bowling Green.

Bowling Green Thinclad Depth Too Much For Ross

BOWLING GREEN—Fremont Ross track men ran some of their best times of the season, but they were no match for the deep Bowling Green high school team here. The host team won 11 of the 15 events in racing to an 80-47 victory.

An example of the problem faced by the visiting Little Giants was the 880-yard relay. The Ross foursome ran the event in a season low and good early season time of 1:34.6. Still they finished second to Bowling Green by one-tenth of a second. The event was decided in the final steps of the anchor leg.

Bowling Green insured its

meet dominance by capturing both the relays, adding the mile to the narrow half-mile victory.

Gary Vogtsberger was again the pace - setter for Bowling Green, winning three individual events and running a leg of the victorious 880-yard relay team. Vogtsberger came out on top in the 100 and 220-yard dashes, as well as the broad jump.

Gary Snyder, winning both hurdles, was a double-winner for Ross. Other Ross winners were Rusty Williams, 440-yard dash, and John Burkin, shot put.

The final score was the exact opposite of the meet beginning. Bowling Green swept all three places in the two mile, but still had only a 5-12 lead after three events.

Distance, Field Events Disappointments Spell Defeat For Ross Thinclads, 68-59

FINDLAY — Failure to score effectively in the distance and field events was costly to Fremont Ross here Tuesday. Gaining a giant advantage in these areas Findlay posted a 68-59 track victory in extremely cold and windy conditions.

Ross dominated the sprint events, capturing the three events through 440 yards and the 880-yard relay. In the three distance events — 880-yard, mile and two mile — the Little Giants took only two points of a possible 27.

Findlay also padded its advantage with 25 points to 16 for Ross in the five field events. The Trojans recorded first places in four of these five events with only Tim Arndt in the broad jump breaking this domination.

For the meet Findlay took nine first places to six for Ross.

Through 11 of the 15 events Ross held a 50-45 lead. Findlay then took the first two places in the two mile run and swept the 880 points to take a 62-51 lead. Ross with Steve Parker winning and Tim Arnold

second in the 220 dash narrowed the home team advantage to 63-59 with only the mile relay remaining.

"The mile relay could have won the meet for us, but it didn't lose it," noted Ross Coach Rod Lash in reviewing the meet. He pointed to the field and distance deficiencies as the point at which the meet was lost.

In the decisive mile relay Findlay won with a 3:39.6 timing. Ross, which was on top until the last curve finished a

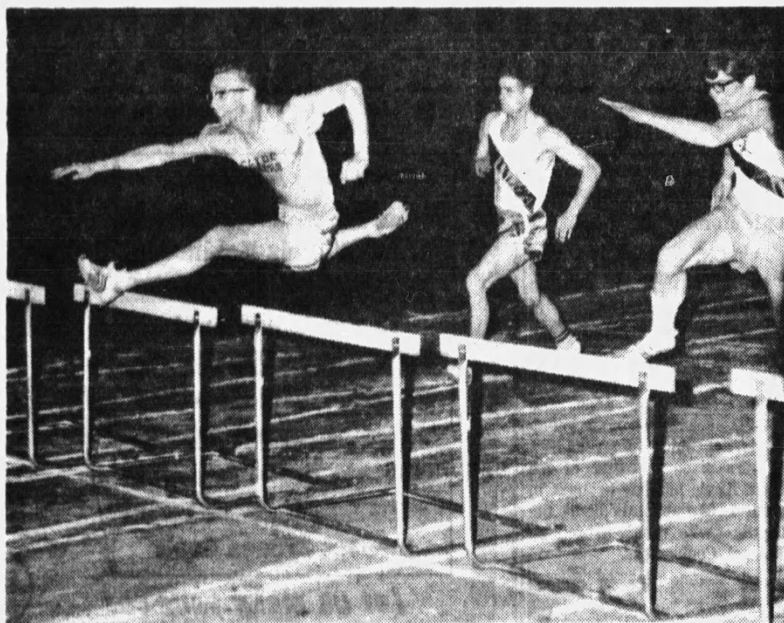

Ross Loses Sandusky Track Challenge But Posts Six Top Performances Of Year

SANDUSKY — The better the competition the better the effort. This formula was proved Tuesday as Fremont Ross tangled with mighty Sandusky in a dual meet which was originally scheduled as a triangular meet. The third school dropped out and efforts to find a replacement were futile.

Ross took a 95-32 lacing, but posted some of its best times of the year and was a serious challenge to the Blue Streaks in several events.

Ross won the 880-yard relay with a 1:35.4 timing and Tim Arnold and Steve Parker finished one - two for the Little Giants in the 220 -yard dash. Arnold won the event in :23.7.

In losing efforts six Ross runners turned in their best times of the season. In the 180-yard low hurdles Gary Snyder ran

:15.5 and Ben Chambers :15.8, both individual bests for the year. Despite these efforts Snyder and Chambers finished fourth and fifth.

Sandusky had three 180 -yard high hurdlers with times of 15 seconds or better. Willie Amison equalled his Buckeye Conference championship record time and best time of the year in the state at :14.4. Brian Healy came across the finish in :14.6 and Henry Jackson was clocked in :15.

Arnold with :10.3 and Parker at :10.4 finished second and third in the 100 with top efforts. Mike Geib, sophomore Ross miler, lowered his time to 5:04 in finishing second two seconds behind Sandusky's Bickley.

Other top time of the year for Ross was Chambers in the low hurdles, :21.5, good for third behind Sandusky's Amison and Jackson.

Sweeps in the high hurdles and two mile helped make the score more lop-sided in Sandusky's favor.

Running for Ross on the victorious 880-yard relay team was the combination of Tim Arnold, Dave Longanbach, Tim Arndt and Steve Parker. This same quartet ran third in the Buckeye Conference meet last Saturday.

Bob Patterson again flirted with a super jump before finishing second at 18-10½ in the long jump. Patterson put a front cleft into the turf fouling by fractions of an inch on a 20-foot plus jump.

Bobcats Win Relay Title, Ross Second

The host squad captured twelve first places in 15 events and won the championship of the first Bowling Green Relays Friday, beating 2nd place Fremont Ross 69-49. Toledo Cardinal Stritch finished last in the three team meet, getting only 13 points.

The Bobcats used some narrow victories and strength in the running events to take the title. The Bowling Green team captured nine of ten first places in the running events, including narrow victories over Ross in the 440 relay, the spring medley relay and the 880 relay.

Ross captured the other three first places and took seconds in eleven of the events.

Little Giant relay teams that won titles were the discuss trio of Fred Tolhurst, Wally Pankratz and John Burkin; the shot put combination of Burkin, Russ Coleman and Jim Buehler, and the shuttle hurdle relay team of Ben Chambers, Dave Longanbach, Jeff Wise and Gary Snyder.

Tolhurst hurled the disc 141' for the top individual mark, as the Ross trio totaled 373'9" for first place in that event.

Burkin's put of 46' 2½" was the top individual mark as the Little Giant team combined for 129'4" and first place in the shot put.

The shuttle hurdle relay team clicked off a 1:01.65 clocking to beat Bowling Green to the wire.

Bowling Green's dominance in the running events was made possible by three narrow victories over the Little Giants.

In the 440 relay, the Bobcats nipped Ross by two tenths of a second, winning the race with a time of 45 seconds flat. Smooth work on the baton exchanges helped the Bobcats to make up lost ground and come from behind in the sprint medley relay. Ross led most of the way, but Bowling Green hit the tape first in a time of 1:37. The Bobcats came on in the last lap of the 880 relay to nip Ross by two tenths of a second, finishing with a time of 1:32.7.

Tom Vogtsberger, a Bowling Green junior, played a big part in the narrow victories, bringing the Bobcats from behind twice in the final leg. Dennis Weaver, John Helm and Eric Fletcher combined with Vogtsberger in each of the three close races.

Vogtsberger also led the Bowling Green broad jump relay team to victory with a leap of 21' 31¼". The Bobcats totaled 59' 11¼".

Ross got a good effort out of Wally Pankratz in the high jump. The Little Giant jumper leaped 5'11" for the best individual mark of the night.

MILE RELAY IS DECIDING EVENT:

Columbian Cinder Men Nip Ross, 67-60

For the second time this year a meet was decided in the final event, the mile relay, and for the second time Ross was the victim in a close track meet. Tiffin Columbian took the first two places in the two-mile run and run the mile relay in the

final two events to defeat Ross, 67-60, Tuesday at Harmon field.

Ross trailed 62-60 going into the final event and could have won the meet with a victory in this event. The Columbian quartet ran a 3:37 mile to insure victory for the visitors.

Ross led in the meet until the 880-yard run, 12th event on the 15-event card. In the 880 Tiffin took first and third and a 48-47 Ross lead evaporated to a 53-51 Columbian advantage. Tim Arnold and Steve Parker finished one-two for Ross in the 220-yard dash and the Little Giants were back on top 59-54 with two events to be run.

Jim Speaker then ran the fastest two-mile outside the Cleveland district in northern Ohio for Tiffin, 10:06. A one-two finish for Tiffin in the two-mile left Tiffin on top 62-60 with only the relay to be contested.

The two teams were matching strides until the final baton pass when Tiffin jumped into a lead, which Coleman, a hurdle specialist, protected in the anchor leg.

Ross managed to win six events with Tim Arnold a double winner in 100 and 220-yard dash. Arnold also ran the opening leg of the victorious 880-yard relay.

Tiffin controlled the meet in field events with two double winners—Dick Mizen, shot and discus, and Tom Lyon, broad jump and high jump.

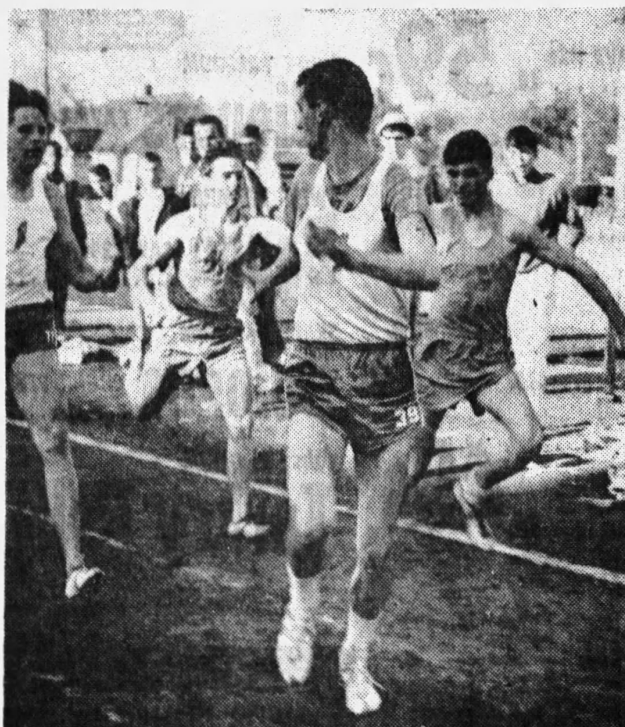

Ross Thinclads Drop Final Meet At Home, Fall To Port Clinton By 68-59 Margin

Ross track team concluded the season on a dim note Tuesday, unless you consider the number of returning athletes on which Coach Rod Lash has to build next season. The Little Giants for the third time this year fell in a meet which could have been swung the other way by one event victory.

Port Clinton captured the Tuesday meet, 68 - 59. Earlier this season Ross also fell by the margin of one event to Findlay and Tiffin.

Against Port Clinton Ross won seven of the 15 events, including both relays. The Little Giants are concluding the season this week with the annual season - end decathlon of team members.

Also on schedule tonight is the annual Freshman Invitational meet, in which Sandusky is defending champion. Other teams competing will be Ross, Bowling Green, Bellevue, Fostoria and Oak Harbor.

If there is a bright spot for

the Little Giants in a season when they recorded only one dual meet victory it is the returning lettermen. Of the major point winners this season six are sophomores and three juniors. The key sophomores returning are Steve Parker, dashes; Rusty Williams, 440-yard run; Tom Pettiford, pole vault, Bob Mackey, Mike Geib, Gary Goodwin, Terry Byers and Rex Damschroder, distance events.
