
### Wanted — One Left-Hander

# **Veteran Little Giant Nine Opens In Saturday Twinbill**

If you are male, of at least average health and pick up your pencil or book with the left hand you are going to be the immediate object of scrutiny at Ross high school. The sharp eye of Coach Don Purvis is going to spot you and give a long look. So far the search has been fruitless, but a left-hander is all that is lacking on the 1969 edition of the Ross high school baseball team. Coach Purvis does not particularly care if you can throw the baseball or hit it, as long as you do it from the port

Prospects are bright for the coming baseball season, which opens with a doubleheader against Lorain Admiral King, 10 a. m. Saturday, at Anderson field. The only things Purvis would like to add to a team built around nine lettermen are some left-handed hitting and pitching, possibly greater depth in pitching and a healthy Ken Knipp. Knipp was counted on as the team's front line catcher and one of the better hitters until an accident in practice. The senior was hit in the face with a flying bat and suffered loss of some teeth, lip laceration and fractured jaw. 
have thrown limited amount of relief in the past. Johnson may get a try on the mound as will Arndt, who pitched some summer league baseball.

Ross a year ago compiled a 14-7 record and reached the district semifinals before losing to Mansfield Madison. Coach Purvis, who is assisted by Henry Miesle, has a seven-year baseball coaching record of 89 wins, 35 losses. Twice in this period the Little Giants have reached the regional Finals in state tournament action. On these occasions they lost to Lima Senior, the eventual state champion, in 1964 and to Pleasant View, 1965. Ross was Buckeye Conference champion in 1964.




