

Ross Cagers Play Alumni

Ross high school launches its 1952-53 basketball season to-night against its alumni.

Al Ziemke's squad has three lettermen from last season, Dick Garcia, Jack Baron and Dean Doren. Those three, along with a pair of lanky sophomores, Larry Miller and Henry Tiller, will form the starting lineup.

Ross will also be in action Saturday at Norwalk.

A reserve game tonight will start at 7 o'clock.

Garcia Stands Out For Varsity Team

Ross high school's varsity basketball team showed promise and scoring punch but lacked defense and a "take-charge" guy as the Giants were upended by their alumni, 66-62, in their first appearance of the season last night.

Ross held a 12-point lead in the third quarter but Dick Baron and Jerry Pastorius came through in the stretch to snatch victory away from the varsity.

The loss did not dim the performance of Dick Garcia, only Ross senior. Garcia scored 18 points on a variety of shots, most of them difficult, played a flawless floor game and intercepted several enemy passes.

But the Giants needed a floor leader when the alumni put on the heat near the end of the third period. Ross didn't wilt, but let down perceptibly.

Sells Scores 18
Ed Sells emerged from the fray with 18 points for the old grads, netting 13 points in the first half. Sells and Len Brudzinski kept their team in the contest as Baron, Dick Houghtaling and Bob Boucher were limited to a total of three field goals in the first half.

Dean Doren stepped into the pivot position and looked good at times, while sophomores Henry Tiller and Larry Miller held up well. Jack Baron, after sinking seven points the first half, lost his shooting eye the last two quarters.

Experience was the main factor as the game drew close in the third period. Midway through it, the score was 49-39, then the alumni made its bid. Boucher goaled from underneath, Pastorius flipped in a short shot and Dick Baron made his first bucket. Garcia tallied for a 53-47 edge, but Len Brudzinski countered with a goal and a free throw. After Doren hit a foul, Baron made another bucket for a 54-52 count. The lead was extended by one point on a foul shot by Doren as the quarter ended.

Pastorius, Grubbs Connect
Two quickies by Pastorius put the graduates in the lead 56-55 and Junie Grubbs made a shot from the side for a 58-55 score. The varsity never held the lead after that, although Larry Miller poured in tieing goals to make the count 60-60 and 62-62, the latter score coming with 1:20 to play. Dick Houghtaling's corner shot and Pastorius' snowbird wrapped it up.

The Ross reserves were also edged out, 47-46. Pastorius scoring 13 points. Hugh Miller, transfer from Benton Harbor, Mich., a senior, tallied 14 for the varsity.

Ross opens its regular schedule Saturday at Norwalk. Last night's crowd totalled about 300.

Giants At Norwalk; Green Springs Tests Crimson Streaks In Fremont

Fremont schools open their regular basketball season tonight, Ross traveling to Norwalk to meet the potent Truckers and St. Joe playing host to Green Springs in the Ross gym.

The Giants were defeated by their alumni, 66-62, Tuesday, but the game is not recognized by the Ohio High School Athletic Association as official, so the loss does not go into the record.

St. Joe, having been thoroughly tested in numerous scrimmages against rugged opposition, including Toledo Central, Ross and local independent quints, will use the two-platoon system against Green Springs.

Not Much Difference

Coach Bob Smith said that he used two groups in the practice tilts and the results are so iden-

tical that he has decided to alternate them in early season games.

He will start with Tom (Red) Foos and Gary Godfred at forwards, Ron Borer at center and Pete Spieldener and John Daniels at guard. The other five is composed of Bill House and Ken Gabel, forwards; Jim Mitchell, center, and Jim Walters and Paul Spriggs, guards.

Smith said the only reason he is starting Foos, Godfred, etc. is because that combination contains a senior, Spieldener, the only 12th grader on his squad. In practice games, the other five scored a total of 151 field goals to 149 for the starting team, a remarkable similarity. Other departments of play have been virtually as even.

No Change For Ross

Ross Coach Al Ziemke plans no change in his starting team. It will be sophomores Larry Miller and Henry Tiller at forwards, Dean Doren at center, and Capt. Dick Garcia and Jack Baron at guards.

Garcia scored 18 points against the alumni and played a bang-up floor and defensive game. A dead-eye set shot, Garcia could be one of the standout players in the Buckeye League this season.

Reserve games here and in Norwalk start at 7 p. m., with the varsity encounters set for 8:15 or 8:30, depending on when the first game ends.

Norwalk has won three games and lost one. The defeat was at the hands of Shelby, 74-72. Green Springs has broken even in four games, winning over Townsend and Old Fort and losing to Milan and Woodville.

Seixas Upsets Aussies' Ace

MELBOURNE, Australia (UPI) — Crafty Vic Seixas of Philadelphia, whose chances were considered "next to nil," stunned this tennis-mad nation today by whipping Frank Sedgman, 8-6, 3-6, 6-3, 6-4, to win the Victorian championship.

Seixas' brilliant victory, on a court made slick by a weekend rain, rocketed Uncle Sam's hopes in the coming Davis Cup matches

"We just don't seem to have that spark," said the Ross mentor. "It looks like the loss of John Lewis is going to be too much for us. Last year he was the only regular we had back, and we won 10 games. This year we have three regulars back, and we get beat 31 points the first game."

Smith Leads Railroaders

Lewis scored 24 points as Ross downed Willard last season. One of the Willard boys who faced the Giants then, J. C. Smith, is going to town for the Railroaders this year. He scored 22 points against Marion to keep his average near the 25 mark.

Willard has lost to Marion and Findlay and owns a verdict over Tiffin, so Ross will be the fourth straight Buckeye League rival faced this season by John Ihnat's crew. Ihnat coached at Lakeside before going to Willard three years ago.

Tiffin Columbian will play Bucyrus tonight in Tiffin, while a neighborhood scrap is in store for Gibsonburg and Woodville fans when the Golden Bears and Warriors tangle at Gibsonburg. Genoa goes to Pembererville.

Two county schools are on the road, Jackson at Risingsun and Townsend at Republic.



15 College Teams Unbeaten, Untied

NEW YORK (AP)—Fifteen colleges ended the 1954 football season unbeaten and untied.

Maryland State remained in the select group Saturday by defeating North Carolina A & T, 10-7, for its seventh straight. But Virginia State dropped out by losing to Florida A & M 29-7 in a game billed as the mythical Negro college championship.

Any resemblance between the Ross high school basketball team here last night and the one that played at Norwalk Saturday was not apparent as the Giants blasted Willard, 71-47, to renew hopes that this may be an interesting season after all.

The Giants are ready to tackle unbeaten Fostoria, a Buckeye league rival here Friday after giving one of their best displays of ball-hawking and hustle that any Al Ziemke-coached team has shown in several semesters.

At Norwalk, there was little defense, spirit was lacking and shooting was off. Against Willard, the defense was passable, the spirit and enthusiasm exhibited was excellent and the shooting was good, at times brilliant. Thus, the Giants squared their season record at 1-1.

Giants Grab Rebounds

Larry Miller, a growing sophomore who currently measures between 6-2 and 6-3, caught fire from the opening whistle and along with his clever teammate, Capt. Dick Garcia, kept up a steady bombardment. The team as a whole appeared to be "up", and that could be applied literally as the Giants dominated the rebounds, due, in part, to the visitors' lack of height. J. C. Miller, whose first name is James but who prefers to be called by his initials, was the tallest Railroader at 6-2.

J. C. scored 16 points, being particularly effective from the side, but his mates gave him little in the way of support. Garcia was the game's high scorer with 23 points. Miller made 19.

The starting Fremont combine was broken up by personal fouls early. Dean Doren, 6-4 junior center, looked like he was headed for a fruitful evening when he bagged two nifty pivot shots in the first period, but after eight minutes he was rested by Dick Harter after incurring four personals. He drew his fifth, and last, in the first 30 seconds of the third quarter. Harter fouled out in the same period with 2:56 to go.

Miller took up much of the slack caused by Doren's departure by grabbing rebounds, along with steady Henry Tiller, and Garcia played an outstanding guarding game, stealing the ball several times and blocking a couple of shots.

Ross Ahead Early

Ross raced to a 19-11 lead at the end of the first quarter and increased it to 27-12 early in the second. Willard managed to get within eight, but Garcia and Jack Baron scored for a 34-22 halftime edge. Garcia pumped in four baskets in the third period to lead the sealing of the Railroaders' fate. Willard made only 14 field goals but picked up 19 points at the free throw line. Miller shot 17 times, making nine field goals. Garcia took 26 shots, cashing nine.

The Willard reserves won the prelim, 60-42.

NCAA Maps New Code With Teeth

KANSAS CITY (AP)—The National Collegiate A. A., which has been seeking ways and means of becoming a strong enforcement body ever since the death of the ill-fated "sanity code" two years ago, will consider a new program at its meeting in Washington next month.

A 10-point plan, embodied in a 2,250-word report from the NCAA Membership Committee, was released Thursday by executive director Walter Byers.

Basically, the plan calls for added powers and machinery whereby the membership committee can investigate and punish reported infractions of the association's principles of conduct.

At last year's meeting these principles, somewhat milder than the code which had been killed the year before, were embodied in the NCAA constitution with the provision that a college was obliged to follow them as a condition of membership.

The new 10-point program, which has been forwarded to the association's 406 members, calls for greater powers to investigate, clearer definition of disciplinary powers and closer co-operation with the various conferences in conducting investigations and taking disciplinary action.



Ross Cagers Still Hampered By Flu As Findlay Invasion Nears

Influenza, which caused Ross to postpone basketball games with Tiffin Columbian and Sandusky, will leave the Giants in a poor physical condition for the game with Findlay here Friday night, Al Ziemke declared today.

"I thought Monday morning that most of the sick boys would be recovered," said glum Al Tuesday, "but it looks like I was wrong. I don't think Jack Baron will play at all. Dick Garcia can hardly move and Larry Miller doesn't have any pep."

Baron was still in bed Monday and was not able to practice yesterday. Garcia, looking like a mere shadow of his old self, struggled into a suit Monday for a short while. He practiced Tuesday and showed no drive or sharpness on set shooting and was in scrimmage action only briefly.

Miller has been battling a mild attack of influenza for six days. It has left him weak, although he has not been confined all of that period of time. Substitute forward Dick Harter is still confined to bed. He has been ill for a week.

Dean Doren was bitten slightly by the flu bug, but looked okay yesterday. Only Henry Tiller, sophomore forward has managed to escape entirely.

Depends On Black, Houghtaling

"I think we could stick close to Findlay all the way and possibly upset them," said Al, "if we had all our boys in good shape. How far we go Friday depends on Charley Black and Ted Houghtaling."

Black and Houghtaling are first-line subs. One of them will start in Baron's place unless he makes a rapid recovery. The other will see plenty of action, because he is not figuring on Garcia or Miller going the distance. Hugh Miller may also see action Friday as a replacement.

There were no indications from Findlay that the Trojans are in anything but a healthy and hungry mood. Findlay suspended by the O.H.S.A.A. and Buckeye League is going through its schedule with the same zeal as any club that has a good chance for a championship. Findlay is playing its regular schedule, but the O.H.S.A.A. will not permit the Trojans to play in tournaments and the league has decided not to count their games.

Feller Comes To Terms Quickly

CLEVELAND (AP) — Bob Feller, on the mound as deliberate as a Supreme Court justice, signed a 1953 Cleveland Indians contract yesterday after talking it over just seven minutes and 31 seconds.

The onetime fireball artist, who often gives batters the fidgets by taking so long between pitches, said he thought his negotiations with General Manager Hank Greenberg set a "new record" for brevity.

The former Iowa farm boy—who now lives in one of Cleveland's swankiest suburbs—got a bonus of less than \$1,000 when he joined the Tribe in 1936. He never held out and has always been comparatively easy to come to terms with.

Greenberg declined to tell Feller's current salary, but sources close to the club said the strikeout king would get \$40,000—a cut of about 20 per cent from last year, when he won 9 and lost 13. That was the first time he won less than half his games.

"With a little luck and better control," Feller said, "I might have another good season."

Sub-Par Giants Lead 23-11 In First Quarter

For one quarter last night the Fremont Ross had everything that goes to make up a great basketball team. After seven minutes and 30 seconds, the Giants led the Trojans by 12 points. There's no way to prove it, but that could be the biggest margin by which Fremont has led Findlay in 20 or more years.

Then the roof caved in and what was a beautiful dream turned out to be an old story. Findlay won, 73-56. It was the 11th straight Trojan victory, the 14th in 15 games.

Dave Miller Hot

Only Dave Miller's uncanny shooting kept the first half from being lopsided in favor of Fremont. The Findlay sophomore made all 17 of his points in the first two periods. All his field goals came on shots from 10 feet out. He made five straight shots in the second quarter.

Ross never trailed in the game until late in the second period. The score was 6-6, then Ross scored seven points in a row, two by Black and five by Garcia. After Dave Miller made it 13-8, the count went to 18-8. Larry Miller scored five points in that drive.

The quarter ended 23-13. The Trojans clicked for six quick points in the second period as Miller scored twice from the floor and Symonds once. Doren made a nifty pivot shot for a 25-19 lead and Larry Miller added a point at the free throw line.

Dave Miller led the Trojans on a march that finally knotted the score at 27-27. Ross drew even with 1:30 to play in the half on Larry Miller's foul. Big Bill Porter, 6-5½ guard, put the Trojans on top at the half 31-30 with a free throw.
