BUCKEYE RELAYS AT B. G.

Coach Les Binkley takes his Ross high track team over to Bowling Green today for the Buckeye League relays. The Bowling Green squad is favored to outpoint the remainder of the schools in the loop.

Week-end in review:

The picture was a lot rosier up at Ross high for the track team today. Coach Les Binkley's thinclads came up with their biggest surprise of the season Saturday at Bowling Green in the Buckeye League track meet, placing second to the host school.

The Ross runners turned the trick the hard way as only Glenn Pocock and Dick Schaeffer could click for first places. Pocock captured the pole vault with a 10 foot, 10 inches leap and Schaeffer had to share his win in the high jump with Friend of Findlay with a jump of 5 feet, 7½ inches.

The Fremont runners ended up with 51 points to trail Bowling Green with 64. Findlay finished in third place with 48 tallies, just ahead of Fostoria's total of 47, while Tiffin could gather only 12.

Walt Weinhardt of Ross placed second in the discus and third in the shotput. Sam Sims was fourth in the shot.

Eddie Nighswander came up with seconds in both the high hurdles and broad jump, and Johnny Auxter finished up second in the 220-yard dash and fourth in the 100-yard dash.

Harold Nitschke placed third in the mile run, and the Ross mile relay team gained a third. The 880-yard relay team finished in the fourth slot, as did Tex Frey in the high jump.

The track squad goes on the road again tomorrow to visit Fostoria, but will have to contend with Jackson who placed first in three events, the 100-yard dash, 220-yard dash, and high jump in the Buckeye meet.

Warren Wright's Fervent won the event.

The week-end also brought the news that Frank Leahy would again coach the College All-Stars in the annual charity football game against the Chicago Cardinals at Soldiers' Field, August 20. It's the first time the same man has coached the team twice.

The Philadelphia Athletics continued to amaze the baseball world. Saturday against Chicago, the Mackmen came up with the first triple play in the major leagues this year, and a pitcher up and slammed a grand slam home run.

The triple play came around when with Luke Appling on second and Tony Lupien on first for the Sox, Taft Wright sent a line drive at second baseman Pete Suder. The latter grabbed the ball for one out, flipped to shortstop Eddie Joost to put out Appling, and Joost threw to Ferris Fain at first to double off Lupien for the third out.

Pitcher Carl Scheib came up with three men on base to hit the
