Veterans Dot Little Giants' Opening Day Track Lineup

Fremont Ross track and field coach Ron Brant will field a veteran lineup when the Little Giants open the 1971 season at Marion Harding's all-weather track Thursday.

Brant will have 14 lettermen in the lineup from last year's squad that compiled a 5-3 dual meet record, placed fourth in the Buckeye Conference meet and won the annual Fremont Night Relays.

The list of returnees includes 10 seniors — Bill Burkett, John Heidelberg, Chuck Miller, Tom Nighswander, Chuck Price, Mike Ruland, Bruce Schneider, Earl Smith, Mike Tooman and Al Widman.

Also in the lineup will be four juniors — Chuck Celek, Tom Liggins, Kim Michael and Kirt Stout — who lettered as sophomores.

"Our veterans have displayed real good leadership in

practice," Brant said Wednesday. "It helps to have 75 per cent of our boys back from last season. We are hoping for a good year."

The meet with Harding is important. They beat us 86-41 last season. A good showing is awful important for us if we hope to achieve some of our goals this season."

Ross will have at least one veteran in every event but the 120-yard high hurdles and long jump. Winning berths on the high hurdles team for the opening meet are three sophomores — Tom Price, Ken Price and Julius Simms.

"Those three have looked good in practice and turned in some good times," Brant said. "I hope they can keep doing the same in actual competition."

Other sophomores who have earned opening day assignments

are Rob Lytle, Steve Young, Tom Pitts, Rob Stierwalt, Dave Damschroder and Bob Koebel.

The Little Giants appear to be especially strong in the field events. Two shot putters, Miller and Liggins, competed in the regional meet last year. Discus thrower Tom Nighswander also traveled to the regional meet.

Miller also competes in the discus. Koebel will be the third entrant in the shot put and discus.

The pole vault and high jump also have two veterans. Tooman and Schneider will be joined by John Werling in the pole vault and Michael and Celek will compete in the high jump with Pitts.

Competing in the long jump will be seniors John Lewis and Dave Kridler and junior Chris Widman.

"I think we should be able to

do fairly well in the field events," Brant said. "Those veterans have a year of practice and the sophomores have been turning in some good efforts in practice."

Ross also has its bright spots in the track events. Big things are expected from senior Earl Smith in the 880-yard run. Smith, who placed eighth in the state meet last spring, holds the Harmon Stadium record for the event and already cracked it in practice this year.

In most of the running events, Ross will field at least two letterwinners. The mile relay team has only one change from last season. Chris Widman, the newcomer, will join Bill Burkett, Claude Price and Smith.

Little Giants Rap Bears

GIBSONBURG — A seven-run fourth inning boosted Fremont Ross to a 10-4 victory over Gibsonburg Thursday afternoon.

It was the second win of the season for the Little Giants, who entertain Lorain Admiral King in a doubleheader Saturday starting at 10 a.m. Gibsonburg was playing its first game.

Ross entered the fourth tied, 2-2.

Two errors and a single loaded the bases. Pitcher Alan Ahle walked Jeff Parkinson to tie the game. Another Gibsonburg error gave Ross a 5-3 lead. After an out and fielders' choice, Roger Hetrick slammed a three-run homer to boost Ross to an 8-3 lead.

Randy Arndt, the next batter, followed Hetrick's feat. Arndt, a senior third baseman, homered over the left field fence.

Ross' final run also came via Homer. Mike Lowery hit a shot to left center the sixth inning.

The Little Giants took a 2-0 lead in the first inning. Al Davis, the leadoff batter walked. After an out, Hetrick singled. Arndt then doubled one run home and the second scored on a Gibsonburg error.

Gibsonburg tied the contest in the third. Ladd Beck started the rally with a single. Frank LaSalvia then walked. Tom Jurski reached base on a fielders' choice to load the bases.

Pitcher Dale Shoemaker got the next batter on a strikeout. But two runs scored when Ross second baseman Chuck Lindsey booted Jim Shull's ground ball. The next two batters bounced back to the pitcher to end the rally.

The third Gibsonburg run scored in the fifth on a single by Shull. Two Ross errors helped Gibsonburg tally its final run in the seventh.

Ross employed four pitchers in the contest. Dale Shoemaker, who relieved starter Mark Harlan, was credited with the win. Also taking a turn on the mound were junior leftfielder Lee Winkle and a sophomore righthander Bob Brudzinski.

The four hurlers allowed Gibsonburg six hits, walked three and fanned eight batters. Winkle recorded three strikeouts in two innings of work.

The loss was charged to Gibsonburg starter Carl Balsizer. He had relief help from Ahle and Jurski.

The first Ross game Saturday will be played at Anderson Field at 10 a.m. At the same time the Little Giant reserves will play Admiral King on the high school field. The second varsity game will be played at the high school field. Fremont St. Joseph will play Port Clinton at Anderson Field starting at 1 p.m.

Head coach Tom Dorman announced Friday that Denny Shearon will start the first game. Jim Faussey will get the call in the second contest. Winkle and Brudzinski are scheduled for relief duty.

Ross will play four straight days next week. Monday the Little Giants are at Oregon Clay. They return home Tuesday for a game with Genoa. Wednesday the Little Giants play at Tiffin Columbian. Findlay will be the Ross guest at Anderson Field Thursday. All games start at 4 p.m.

Widman Establishes Record In Two-Mile

MARION — Fremont Ross gained revenge.

The Little Giant track and field team which was humiliated on Marion Harding's all-weather track last season by the Prexies returned yesterday.

The result was a little different.

Instead of Marion winning, Ross took the victory. Sparked by fine performances in the field events and some brilliant running on the part of Al Widman, Claude Price and Earl Smith, the Little Giants carved out a 67-60 win over Harding here yesterday.

Last spring Harding won by a 67-60 count.

Ross held a 31-14 lead over Harding at the end of the field events. In two classes — shot put and pole vault — Ross scored a 9-0 advantage.

Tom Liggins led the way in the shot put with a put of 49-3. Sophomore Bob Koebel placed second and Chuck Miller, a regional contestant last year, finished third.

In the pole vault John Werling and Mike Tooman tied for first with vaults of 11-6. Bruce Schneider was third. Werling's vault was the best of his career.

Other Little Giant winners in the field events included Tom Nighswander (discus) and Chuck Celek (high jump). Junior Kim Michael finished second in the high jump.

Marion competitors swept the long jump.

Widman set a new school record in the two mile run with a 10:10.1 clocking. It eclipsed the previous mark of 10:10.2 which Widman established last season.

Smith, an eighth place finisher in the 880 of the state meet last spring, appeared to be in mid-season form, winning his specialty with a 1:58.3. That established a new Marion track record. The time was only 1.2 seconds off Smith's time in the state competition.

The only other first place finisher for Ross in the track events was Price. He won the 440-yard dash with a :51.5 time, a tenth of a second better than the second place finisher from Marion.

Although the number of first places was small, Ross made up the point advantage with second places and six third places.

Sophomore Rob Lytle, competing in his first varsity competition, placed second in the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Another sophomore, Julius Simms, was second in the high hurdles.

Joe Widman was second in the mile run and Mike Ruland took the runnerup spot in the low hurdles.

Pitts also had two third places — high hurdles and 440. Also finishing third were Liggins (100), Joe Widman (880), John Heideburg (220) and Kirk Stout (two mile).

"I was pleased with the effort of our kids," Ross head coach Ron Brant said. "It's always good to win the first one and this one means a little more.

"Marion had about 75 per cent of their boys returning from last year's squad. I think we surprised them. Going into the meet I figured it was going to be a tossup.

"We (the coaching staff) were happy with the work of the kids in the field events and also the job turned in by Smith, Price and Al Widman. They had outstanding efforts for this time of the season. That was the best time Price has ever had in that event."

Ross was without the services of senior standout Bill Burkett, who sustained a pulled muscle in practice Wednesday and was kept out of the competition. He's expected to be in the lineup for the home opener against Bowling Green at Harmon Stadium Tuesday, however.

ELYRIA — A sweep in the long jump and high hurdles provided the spark for Elyria to go on and beat Fremont Ross, 78-49, in track and field yesterday at Ely Stadium.

The Little Giants (1-1) captured first places in only five events. Tom Nighswander was first in the discus, Mike Tooman won the pole vault, Earl Smith took the 880, Al Widman bested the field in the two-mile and the mile relay team completed the list of winners.

In winning the pole vault, Tooman, a senior, tied the Ross school record. His winning vault was 13-6 which tied the mark set by Dan Linder in 1969. Tooman tried to set a new mark after winning the event but was unable to cross the bar.

The mile relay team came within eight-tenths of a second of the school mark. Bill Burkett, Claude Price, Tom Pitts and Earl Smith recorded a 3:32.8. The record of 3:32 was set during the years when Rod Lash coached the Little Giants.

Nighswander tossed the discus 147-2. Smith recorded a 2:02.1 in winning his speciality. Widman's winning time was 10:22.4.

"Tooman and Nighswander had their best efforts of the year," Little Giant head coach Ron Brant said. "The score was pretty lopsided, but I was proud of our kids, especially in the last two events when we out-scored Elyria 13-1.

"The fellows could have just given up, but they ran in those two races like the outcome of the meet was still in doubt."

Tom Liggins (shot put), Pitts (high hurdles), Joe Widman (mile run), Price (440), Rob Lytle (220) and Kirk Stout (two-mile) notched second place points for the Little Giants.

Third place points were recorded by Bruce Schneider (pole vault), Liggins (100), Burkett (440) and Al Widman (880).

Elyria held a 29-16 edge over the Little Giants at the conclusion of the field events.

Next outing for Ross is Tuesday when it hosts Findlay at Harmon Stadium. It will be the first home meet of the campaign for Ross, which was rained out of its scheduled home opener against Bowling Green Tuesday.

"The meet with Findlay should be a real barn burner," Brant said. "If comparative scores mean anything the two clubs are almost even. We beat Marion in our opening meet, 67-60, and last Tuesday Findlay beat Marion by 68-59."

After the Findlay engagement, the Little Giants will begin preparations for the annual night relays at Harmon Stadium scheduled for next Friday. The Little Giants will play host to five other schools.

Ross Throttles Trojans, 74-53

Record-setting performances by Earl Smith and Tom Nighswander sparked Fremont Ross to a surprisingly easy 74-53 track and field victory over Findlay at Harmon Stadium yesterday.

Smith set a new stadium record in the 800-yard run and Nighswander broke a long-standing mark in the shot put.

Nighswander threw the discus 151-7 that broke the old mark of 150-9½ set by Archie Biggs during the 1962 season.

"Those two boys did a outstanding job," Little Giant's head coach Ron Brant reported. "Earl's time is especially impressive. It's awful hard to run on the Harmon Stadium track. Nighswander seems to be rounding into form."

Several other performances also drew the praise of the coach.

Sophomore Rob Lytle also drew special mention. He won the 100 with a 10.2 time and finished second in the 200, where the Little Giants' John Heidelberg turned in a 23.1, which was also a career low.

"Performances of Lytle and Heidelberg mean we are getting plenty of help in the dashes where we weren't sure what to expect this year," Brant said. "Those two have been coming on since the first meet of the season. I just hope they continue to improve like they have been in the last three weeks."

Al Widman won the two-mile run with a 10:18.1 time. That was also his best effort of the young campaign.

Other individual winners for the Little

Giants were Claude Price (440) and John Werling and Mike Tooman, who shared honors in the pole vault.

Price cleared 5½ in the 440. Werling and Tooman each vaulted 12-feet and had the same number of misses.

The number of misses prevented Chuck Cekel from notching a victory in the high jump. He and Findlay's Frank Smith each cleared 5-11 but Cekel had more misses overall.

Both Little Giant relay teams recorded victories. The mile relay unit composed of Price, Bill Burkett, Smith and Tom Pitts recorded a 3:33.2. They have already done a 3:32.7 this season but that was at Marion's all-weather track.

The 800-yard relay unit was made up of Heidelberg, Lytle, Ned Sewell and Liggins. They finished with a 1:34.

"Optimistic" is how Lytle put it when asked what he might be able to do if first place was the goal.

"We had 10 so I guess I don't have room to complain."

"In most instances this was our best effort of the season. But I don't think we peaked tonight. There are a lot of areas where we still need to improve."

Findlay's Jim Barnes fell in the balmy weather. Findlay's Jim Barnes won the mile with a 4:35.6 time. That's nearly two seconds better than the old stadium mark of 4:35 set by Dan Gdovik of Lakeside in 1968.

Ross now begins preparing to defend its Fremont Night Relays title. The 11th annual meet, which is sponsored by the American Legion, is scheduled for Harmon Stadium Friday.

Field events will begin at 5 p.m. Running events get underway at 7 p.m. Teams in the field include Parma Padua, Bowling Green, Potosia, Findlay, Port Clinton and the Little

Nighswander Smashes Mark For Ross Discus Throwers

TOLEDO—Tom Nighswander set a new Fremont Ross High School discus record for the third time this spring and led the Little Giants to a tie for seventh place in the Blade Relays for big schools at Lucas County Recreation Center Saturday.

Nighswander, a senior, heaved the disc 163-9, which was good for second place behind Sandusky's powerful Mark Deming. Nighswander set the old Ross record in the Fremont Night Relays April 23 when he got off a toss of 158-7 $\frac{3}{4}$.

Earlier in the same week he had cracked the old mark of 150-9 $\frac{1}{2}$ set in 1952 by Archie Biggs.

"We are real pleased with the way Tom has been coming along," Little Giant head coach Ron Brant said Sunday. "He has shown improvement in practically every meet we have participated in."

Besides Nighswander, the Little Giants had three other place winners in the meet. Earl Smith took a third in the 880 and Bruce Schneider and Chuck Celek finished fourth in the pole vault and high jump, respectively.

Smith, who set a school 880 record at the Marion Relays in placing second Friday, ran a 2:02.5. Louis DeFreeze, last year's state champion from Cleveland Glenville, and Dudley Roski of Cleveland Heights finished in front of the Ross senior.

DeFreeze's winning time was 1:59.7, which was considerably slower than his winning state time. All the distance runners were hampered by a strong wind, however. Smith was clocked in 1:56.9 at Marion.

Schneider went out of the pole vault competition at 12-0. A 13-6

effort by Sandusky's Bob Crabb won the event.

Celek's best leap in the high jump was 5-10. Jerry Davies from Toledo Woodward won the event with a final jump of 6-2.

"Overall, I was fairly pleased with our showing," Brant said. "I told the kids before we got off the bus that if we finished in the top 10 of the 28 schools entered I would be pleased.

"We had some stiff competition Friday at Marion and then didn't get back here until after midnight. We met again early Saturday morning to leave for the Blade meet.

"Tom Liggins has been having some trouble with his leg so we didn't enter him in any of the sprints. We also scratched our 880 relay team.

"The only northwestern Ohio schools to finish in front of us were Sandusky and two Toledo schools. I think we gave a good showing, but I don't know if we'll ever run in two big meets back-to-back like we did this weekend. That's asking for a lot from the kids."

Cleveland Glenville won the meet with 38 points. Cleveland Heights (29), Sandusky (28), Toledo Libbey (24), Cleveland Rhodes (14) and Toledo DeVilbiss (12) also finished ahead of the Little Giants, who were tied with Cleveland John Adams. The Ross delegation compiled 11 points.

The event kicked off a murderous week of competition for the Little Giants. They were slated to travel to Tiffin Columbian today for a 4 p.m. dual meet. Sandusky, which has one of its best teams in years, invades Harmon Stadium Wednesday for a 4 p.m. dual meet. Saturday Ross participates in the rugged Buckeye Conference meet at Sandusky's Strobel Field.

Brant: 'Happiness Is Beating Sandusky'

Little Giant Thinclads Sting Blue Streaks

Happiness is... a 84-63 Fremont Ross track victory over Sandusky.

If you don't believe it, just ask Ross head coach Ron Brant. "I'd take a victory against Sandusky over any other win," the Ross Coach has already said after his squad stunned the Blue Streaks at Harmon Stadium last night. "This is just unbelievable. I never expected it."

Ross went into the contest to prepare for the Buckeye Conference meet at Sandusky's Strobel Field Saturday.

"I told the kids our big meet this week was the Buckeys," Brant said. "That's what we were preparing for. Naturally, we wanted to beat Sandusky but we never dreamt we might."

"Sandusky has an excellent track team. They will be favored to win the conference meet. We needed a couple breaks to beat them, but I'll take a victory over them anyway we can get it."

Ross received two major breaks during the meet and got another one during Sandusky's Tuesday practice session.

At the start of the 880-yard relay, Sandusky's lead runner, Paul Scoville, tripped up in a hamstring cramp and entered the first turn. He walked off the course and all Ross' fourmous of John Heideberg, Tom Liggins, Al Sewell and Rob Lytle did was trot through the race.

Then, in the 180-yard low hurdles, Bob Crabb had a break on the last hurdle. He got back up, dragged and he fell to the cinders. Crabb got back up and crossed the finish line. By that time, however, two Ross competitors had passed him.

And, in Sandusky's warm-up practice Tuesday, Osmond Pearson, their top-notch miler, who will be favored to win in

the conference meet, stubbed his toe. He couldn't run well yesterday and was scratched from the competition.

"Certainly those breaks helped us," Brant said. "But my kids gave one heck of an effort. Nothing can be taken away from them. Everyone was digging into the bottom of the gut barrel."

The difference is in the meet scores in the number of first places. Instead, it was decided in the number of seconds and thirds. Ross had just six firsts compared to Sandusky's nine. But, the Little Giants picked up nine seconds and seven thirds.

"Those second and third places are what did it for us," Brant said. "Our fellows could have quit when those Sandusky kids got in front but they didn't."

The Little Giant's had just one significant change for the contest and that was only for training purposes. Earl Smith, who has become the 'People's Choice' as far as Ross fans are concerned, ran in the mile instead of his specialty, the 880.

"We only did it to get him some over-distance work," Brant said. "We wanted to strengthen his endurance for the conference meet. The 880 is Earl's race and we don't have any plans to change him."

The move paid off, however. Smith won the mile with a 4:32.2 clocking. Al Widman placed second after leading for the first three laps. The two seniors dueled for first place while racing step-for-step down the backstretch.

"I wanted to see two seniors — to see two fellows battling stride-for-stride as they head to the finish line," Brant said. "It's especially nice when your coach for both fellows."

"We knew Earl had a good kick. But he really didn't know how to run the mile. Before the race he asked me what to do. I told him to stay with the leader for the first three laps

and then begin his kick when he got by the scoreboard on the last lap."

Smith provided Brant with some anxious moments, however. When the last lap started he was in the fourth position and nearly 20 yards behind Widman.

Also earning first places for the Little Giants were Rob Lytle (100), Claude Price (440), Ken Price (low hurdles) and Tom Liggins (shot put).

"Our runners are the ones who won it for us," Brant said.

"This was one of our worst meets of the season in the field events. We trailed 30-15 when they were completed."

Lytle's victory and a second place finish by Liggins in the 100 sparked the Blue Streaks.

"It gave us confidence," Brant said. "After that race, Smith and Widman earned up in the mile. We out-scored Sandusky 8-1 in those two events and then we won the 880-yard relay."

"After that Claude Price came on strong in the 440-yard dash and Ken Price won the low hurdles."

Other second place in the running events were earned by Mark Shaffer (low hurdles), Joe Widman (880), John Heideberg (200) and Al Widman (one mile).

Al Widman set a new Ross school record with a 9:59.3

clocking. It broke his own record of 10:05.4 set last Friday at Marion Relays.

"For two years Al has been working to get that two-mile time under 10 minutes," Brant said. "He has kept plugging away. He was so happy when I told him this time he couldn't believe it."

Winner in the two miles was Sandusky's Bob Fair with a 9:57.4 time.

Ken Price (high hurdles), Bill Burkett (440) and Lytle (200) scored third place points in the running events.

Liggins pushed the shot put 50-3 1/4. Stan Johnson, a Sandusky freshman was second at 46-7 1/4 and Ross' Chuck Miller placed third at 44-10 1/4.

In the other field events, Sandusky's Mark Deming won the discus, Crabb the pole vault and Velma Evans was the meet's only double winner with first in the long and high jumps.

Price set a new Harmon Stadium record with a 144 vault. In the same event, Ross' Mike Tooman, the second place finisher, tied the school record with a vault of 13-6. The mark of Dan Linder set in 1969.

Chuck Cekel earned second place in the high jump with a 5-8 effort. Numerous misses was the difference between Cekel and Sandusky's Scott May, the third place finisher.

Although the outcome was pleasing for everyone concerned with the Ross track program it will be remembered for a long time by the seniors.

"It was the last home meet of their career," Brant said.

"This will be something they'll never forget."

The loss was the first of the season for Sandusky. Ross now has a 5-1 dual meet mark.
