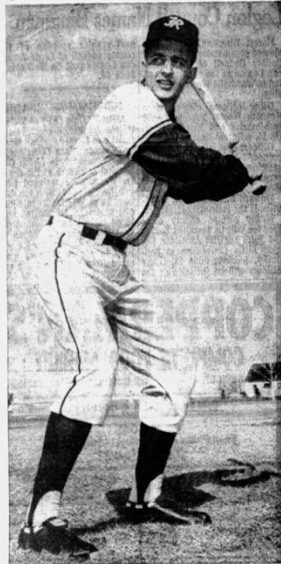

Russ Hagerty Selected For All-Ohio All-Star Team

Russ Hagerty, shortstop and pitcher for Ross high school baseball team, has been selected to play with the All-Ohio High School All-Star team. The selection was revealed Wednesday by his high school coach, Don Purvis.

The all-star team is annually selected by the high school

coaches association. The honored boys are then divided into two teams for a three-game series. The All-Star series, which attracts scouts from both colleges and professional teams, will be played June 18-20 in Jet Stadium, Columbus. There will be a single game Saturday, June 19, and a doubleheader, June 20.

Hagerty will report with the other All-Star June 17. Purvis stated a belief that Hagerty was the first Ross boy to be honored for the team. John Prosser was named as an alternate two years ago. Prosser later had a chance to play but couldn't get off his job to report to the All-Stars.

All baseball coaches in Ohio

vote for members of the team. The votes are then evaluated by a high school coaches association selection board. Each coach is allowed to vote for not more than two players from his district. There are approximately 30 teams in the district including Ross.

Hagerty is a three-year letterman for the baseball team.

During the past year he batted .418 and hit seven home runs. As a pitcher he won five games without a loss. Hagerty stroked a key home run in the game at Deshler against Toledo Star, which gave Ross the district baseball championship.

As a basketball player Hagerty during the past season was

able to mention All-Ohio and second team All-Northwestern District. He has accepted an athletic scholarship to attend Bowling Green State university. At the recent Spring Sports Banquet Coach Purvis revealed that seven Major League baseball teams have shown interest in the 6-2, 185-pound senior.

Twins Explode Big Bats To Trim Boston, 9-7, Take Over First Place

BIRDIE'S JUGGLING ACT ON STAGE

Latest Shuffle Knocks Chisox Off Top

CLEVELAND (AP) — Manager Birdie Tebbets has one of the best juggling acts in baseball.

He has switched the Cleveland Indians starting lineup 16 times since the season started, and it paid off Wednesday night with a 5-1 win over the Chicago White Sox.

The loss dropped Chicago out of first place in the American

League race and pushed the Minnesota Twins, who beat the Boston Red Sox, 9-7, into the top spot by seven percentage points.

Tebbets pulled left fielder Leon Wagner, moved Chuck Hinton into that spot and put Chico Salmon on first base against Chicago.

He punched a key double in a seventh-inning rally after Gary Peters had two outs. Salmon doubled to left-center and

scored on Chuck Hinton's single. Hinton raced to third as Rocky Colavito singled and came home on Max Alvis' double.

Colavito also scored on the play when left fielder Danny Cater furnished the ball. The Sox scored in the eighth on singles by J. C. Martin and Tom McCraw and Luis Tiant's wild throw on Don Buford's two-out grounder.

It was one of the few bad throws Luis made all night. Tiant gave up five hits, struck out four and walked one. He faced only 14 men in the first five innings, giving up only a second-inning single to Pete Ward.

The Indians have today off then open a three-game series with the Detroit Tigers Friday night in Detroit.
