

# Defense first priority for '93 Little Giants

This isn't Florida, but that doesn't mean a baseball team can't train outside if the weather is moderate.

If the snow is dispersed and the temperature is in the 40s, as it was last Tuesday, Fremont Ross coach Dan Fought will have the Little Giants outside.

"We had everything but a right field," Fought said. "I couldn't get a right field no matter how I walked it off."

Fought says the reasoning behind his outside if at all possible philosophy is twofold.

"Parents and the community don't accept you making cuts by seeing kids in the gymnasium," Fought said. "The other thing is, baseball is an outside sport. I really believe an hour outside is worth three hours in the gym."

The Little Giants had infield and outfield practice on Tuesday, the second day of full-squad workouts.

there was me getting an opportunity to see especially outfield candidates," said Fought, who replaces Steve Ebert in his second stint as Ross coach. "It gave me an opportunity to see infielders making cut-offs.

"Plus, you get to see how the team is communicating at that point."

Fought said he used live pitching last Monday for his first look

at the Ross hitters. The players faced a pitching machine Thursday and hit off tees Friday.

"You put off more of the offensive aspects than anything because you have to be able to play fundamental baseball in the field," Fought said. "If you commit errors and are not making fundamental plays, I don't care how well you swing the bat; you're always playing catch-up."

Pitching, of course, is an extension of the defense.

"Our kids realize we don't have a true number one yet," Fought said. "There's no one coming back with the kind of experience you build around."

Five pitchers are vying for spots in the Ross rotation. Fought expects conditioning to be a given since the pitchers and catchers have had two additional weeks of work.

"You're looking for a kid to be able to throw 75 pitches by game one (April 2)," Fought said. "That's our point of emphasis early."

## Ross baseball today builds for tomorrow

There is a heavy emphasis on senior leadership in the Fremont Ross High School baseball program.

# Smith, Ross open with 6-2 victory over Columbian

The Little Giants had 11 hits and rode the strong pitching of junior right-hander Ryan Smith.

Smith went the distance and gave up six hits, with seven strikeouts and three walks. He threw 109 pitches and struck out four in the final two innings.

"It was a good first game," Ross coach Dan Fought said. "We hit the ball well in our final scrimmage against Anthony Wayne and that's a strength that's nice to see."

Fought's teams rely on defense and an aggressive offense predicated on fundamentals. The 1993 Little Giants have fit the mold perfectly so far.

Of course, pitching has had as much to do with the Little Giants' 3-0 start as anything else.

Shane Moran was the third Ross pitcher to throw a complete-game victory Thursday as Ross defeated Sandusky 4-1. Moran needed only 66 pitches and the game was played in an hour and 20 minutes.

Ryan Smith, Aaron Smith and Moran have combined to throw 262 pitches in the Ross wins.

looking back," said Fought, who returned to coach this season after taking two years off. "I'll use any one of them any time."

Moran struck out five, including Sandusky clean-up hitter Eric Irby three times, and did not walk a batter. "He mixed his pitches very well," Fought said. "That's a credit to Moe (catcher

Myers); he called a great game."

The pitchers have been the beneficiaries of great defense. The Little Giants have not committed an error this season.

"It was great defense," Fought said of the effort against the Blue Streaks. "(Second baseman) Brian T. Wilson made three big-league plays."

Fought said Wilson speared a line drive up the middle off the bat of Sandusky's first batter, did the same thing to snuff out the Blue Streaks lone rally and ended the game with a diving stop of a grounder in the hole between first and second.

Shortstop Brian J. Wilson, meanwhile, finished with five assists and one putout. "They work real well together," Fought said.

Offensively, all four of Ross's one-run innings Thursday included a sacrifice bunt. The Little Giants are seven of eight in sacrifice situations this season, according to Fought.

"They all have a willingness to sacrifice at any time," he said. "And I think they understand that anytime you lay down a bunt, there's a good chance in high school baseball it might not get fielded (correctly) and you could get on base."

That's fundamental thinking.

Ross is scheduled to play its first home game Monday, hosting Perrysburg at Anderson Field at 4:30 p.m. Get out and see the Little Giants.

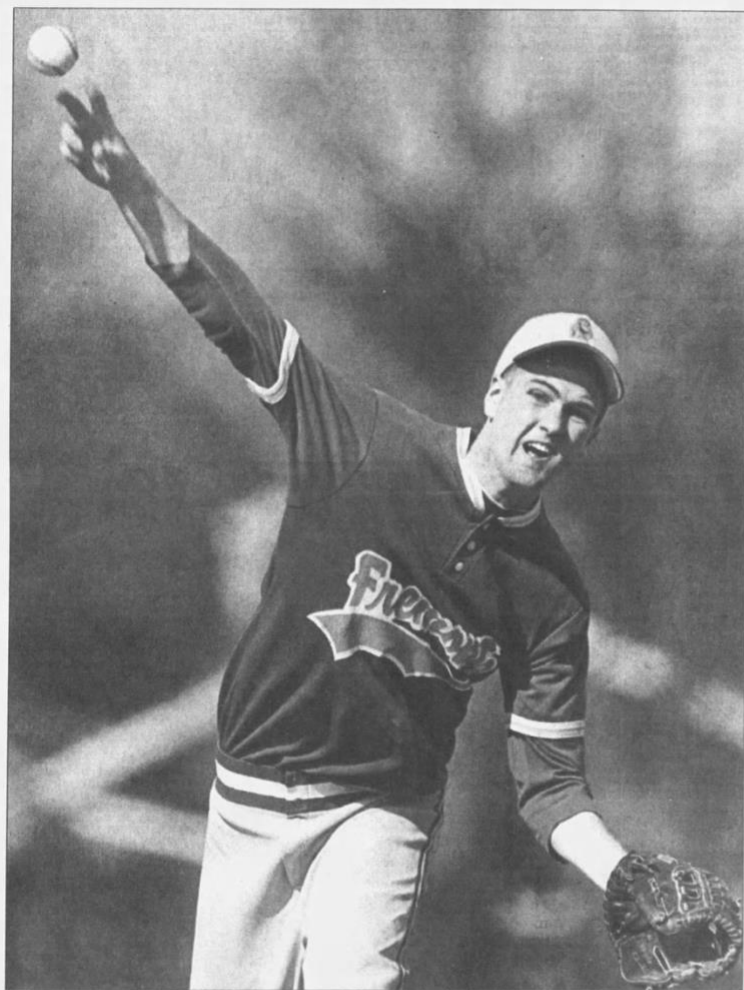

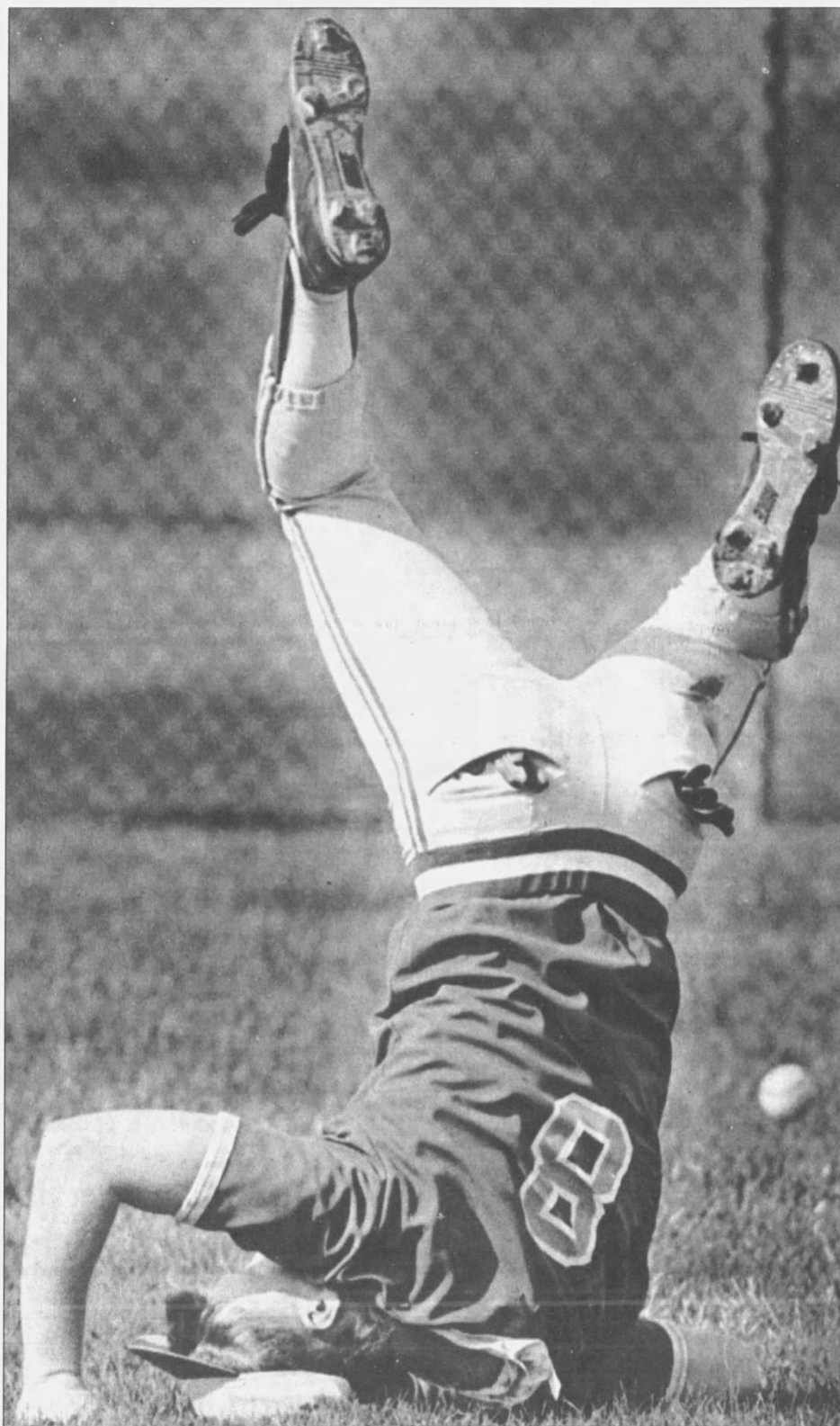
