

Ross High Track Squad To Have At Least Nine Meets

Nine meets, plus the District meet, have been scheduled for the Ross high school track team, Coach Mal Mackey announced today.

Mackey has hopes of organizing one of the best teams in the district, several speedy youngsters from last year's squad being available. In addition to the holdovers, a freshman, Jim Tiller, should be a leading point-getter. Tiller turned in the time of 10.2 seconds in the 100-yard dash and has broadjumped as far as 20 feet, 11 inches.

In addition to meets definitely scheduled, Mackey said he may enter some boys in the Ohio Wes-

Ross 2nd In Triangular Meet

Marion high's depth in distance runs featured its all-around squad balance as the Prexies romped off with the annual triangular track meet against Fremont Ross and Findlay at Harmon Field Tuesday night. The meet was Fremont's opener.

Marion scored 81 points to 34 for Ross and 33 for Findlay.

Fremont's Ron Whitcomb was the leading point getter with 16. He won both hurdles and finished second in the high jump and shot put for a truly versatile performance.

The only other Fremont first came in the 100-yard dash, where freshman Jim Tiller, aided by a strong breeze, scampered home 10 yards in front of Marion's Chet King in the time of 10.1 seconds.

After his 100-yard victory, Ross was counting on Tiller winning another first in the 220. He was leading until the last 15 or 20 yards, then King pulled even and Tiller sagged to fourth place.

Ross will be in action again Friday in the annual invitational meet. Ross, DeVilbiss, Toledo Waite, Toledo Scott, Clay and Marion will compete.

Lopez Saving Garcia For Yanks

BOSTON (AP)—Manager Al Lopez, looking ahead to a series opening Friday at New York, has decided not to send out Mike Garcia to pitch for Cleveland against Boston tomorrow.

He had originally scheduled Early Wynn, Garcia and Art Houtteman to work in that order against the Red Sox, but changed his mind after yesterday's first game of the Sox series was rained out.

Using Garcia tomorrow instead of today would not give the big right hander enough rest before the two-game set against the Yankees.

"I'd rather pitch Mike against the Yankees than the Red Sox," Lopez said, adding: "After all, New York is the team to beat."

He said he had not made up his mind who to work tomorrow but that it probably would be Houtteman.

Lopez used either Wynn, Garcia or Lemon to start all but one of the games last year against the Yankees. Once when the Yanks went to Cleveland for a four-game series, he started Bob Feller.

By saving up its best pitchers, the Tribe broke even with the Yankees for the year, each winning 11 games.

Against New York, Lemon had a 4-3 record, Garcia was 3-3, Wynn was 4-3, and Feller was 1-0. Relief Bill Wight was charged with one loss to the Yankees.

Whitmer Nips Ross In Triangular Meet

Whitcomb Nabs Three Firsts

Toledo Whitmer high school won a triangular track meet on its home field Tuesday, nipping Fremont 61 to 54 while Sylvania brought up the rear with only 8 points.

Three straight fouls by Fremont's Jim Tiller in the broad jump, who exceeded the best jump of the winner, Chisam of Whitmer, cost Ross the meet. After each infraction, Tiller was advised to start his jump behind the board if necessary, but each time he was over the line. The winning distance in the broad jump was 17 feet, 3 inches.

However, Ron Whitcomb continued his brilliant work for the Little Giants. Rounding out a long athletic career, Whitcomb continued undefeated in the high and low hurdles, won the shot put and finished third in the high jump.

No Vaulters for Ross

It was a cold day for a track meet, and only a dozen or so spectators hung around to watch the athletes perform. Ross didn't have an entry in the pole vault.

In addition to Whitcomb's three firsts, Ross won the 100-yard dash on a 10.6 seconds effort by Tiller, the discus throw and two relay victories. Tiller, Jim Houghtaling, Ward Sewell and Dick Harter composed the half-mile quarter, while Horace Sewell, Walt Deickert; Rick Schlebner and Dick Beal won the mile relay.

Dave Wolshuck won the discus throw for Fremont.

SANDUSKY — The Sandusky Blue Streaks had too much all-around strength for Fremont Ross as they won an easy 88-30 tracks and field decision here Friday.

Freshman Jim Tiller and Senior Ron Whitcomb scored all except one of Fremont's points. John Goodman of Ross got a third in the discus throw. Tiller speeded to victory in the 100-yard dash, 220 and broad jump.

Whitcomb was defeated in hurdles for the first time this year when Skip Routh of Sandusky edged him out in the 120-yard highs, but Ronnie came back to win the 180-yard lows.

His team without a pole vaulter, Whitcomb entered the event for the first time and got a tie for first place. Whitcomb also was third in the high jump.



Fremont Ross won one of three events and finished second in another at the annual Bowling Green invitational relays Saturday.

The 440-yard quartet of Jim Tiller, Ron Whitcomb, Ward Sewell and Dick Harter won in the time of 46.6 seconds. Findlay was second.

Findlay won the 880-yard relay, with Ross second, using the same team which won the 440. Findlay's time was 1.34.2, a new meet record.

Ross was fourth in the mile relay, with Horace Sewell, Walter Diechert, Rick Schliebner and

Freshman Clocked In 10 Seconds As Ross Loses To Bellevue, 67-51

A youngster whose embryo athletic career stamps him as potentially one of Fremont's all-time standouts set a new Harmon Field and school record in the 100-yard dash in a dual meet Thursday.

Fremont Ross went down 10 defeat 67-51 at the hands of Bellevue after freshman Jim Tiller ran the 100 in 10 seconds.

The old Harmon Field mark was 10.1 seconds, set by George Bromm of Sandusky in 1929. Tiller tied the record twice in dual meets this season in breaking the old school mark of 10.2 held since 1920 by Towner Smith.

Tiller came back to win the 220-yard dash in 23 seconds flat, just three-tenths of a second off the record of 22.7 set in 1936 by Pete Erchenbrecher, now a Shelia (O.) merchant.

Ron Whitcomb, the team's leading point-getter this season, hadn't suffered a bruised heel in the broad jump.

The injury kept him from participating in the pole vault, an event which he probably would have won since 8 feet, 6 inches was the winning height. Fremont had no other entries for the Pole vault, so Bellevue automatically took all three places. Fremont also was shut out in the high jump.

Whitcomb won the 180-yard high hurdles after finishing second to Jim Strayer of Bellevue in the low hurdles. Other Fremont firsts were scored by Dave Anstead in the mile run, Dave Wolshuck in the discus throw and by the half-mile relay team composed of Tiller, Charles Black, Ward Sewell and Dick Harter.

Harter, incidentally, probably was in the vicinity of 10.2 in the 100-yard dash, being just a stride behind Tiller. It was Harter's fastest time of his career.



Losing only two events, Fremont Ross thinclads gave Fostoria a drubbing at Harmon Field Tuesday.

The Fostoria junior high gained a measure of revenge by defeating the Ross juniors, 65 1/3 to 34 2/3.

Veteran Ron Whitcomb and freshman Jim Tiller each won three events and Dave Anstead, Walt Deichert, Dick Beal and Dave Wolshuck also won individual events. Fremont swept both hurdles.
