

Ross Fills Underdog Role In Conference Swim Meet

"We feel Ross must put forth a great individual and team effort in an attempt to move up out of that third place ranking." This was the appraisal of Coach John Balsizer as he rated Findlay and Sandusky as favored teams for Saturday's Buckeye Conference swimming championship. The Buckeye Conference meet will be held Saturday at Sandusky high school pool. The meet will open with diving preliminaries at 11 a.m. Diving and swimming finals will follow at 2 p.m. Sandusky is defending champion. Only four Buckeye Conference schools have swimming and three of these have won championships in the four-year history of the meet. Fremont was champion the first two years. Findlay was the second and then Sandusky won last

year. Ross actually won the third annual meet with victory in the final 400-yard freestyle relay, only to have the team disqualified. This disqualification came when an excited teammate jumped into the pool too soon to congratulate the winning team. The disqualification dropped the Little Giants to third. They finished second last year. "Findlay has moved into the favorite's role this year with a vastly improved squad," appraised Balsizer. He continued with a warning, "Sandusky cannot be overlooked as they possess the manpower to win it all." During the regular season Findlay defeated Ross twice and Sandusky by a convincing 60-35 count. On the Trojan side of the ledger is capability to win several events and the best

overall freestyle strength in the conference. Sandusky appears to have the individual to win at least four events, but does not have the depth to win important third and fourth places. Findlay does have this depth. Ross has to rate third best in pre-meet analysis, having lost decisively to both Findlay and Sandusky, but beating Mansfield. Mansfield has four boys Balsizer figures can finish in the top four for their specialty, but they just are not strong enough overall to move out of fourth place. . . .

The coach says hopefully, "We feel that with some spirited swimming we can take a couple of firsts and be right in the thick of the battle. . . . The squad seems to be buoyed by their improvement last week and seem eager for more this weekend."

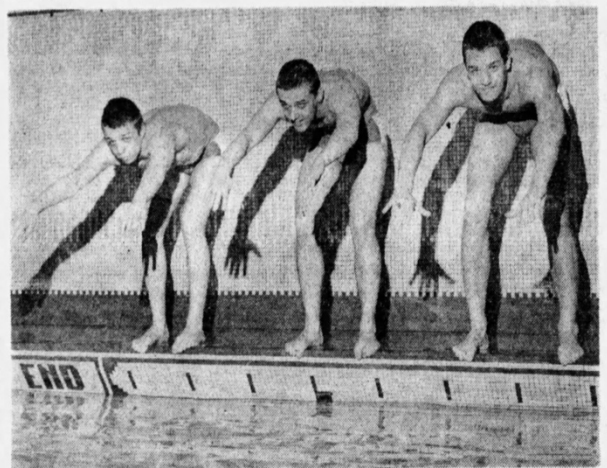
Four records were set last year in the Buckeye championships and all four figure to fall again. In the record spotlight could be Paul Gilbert, only a sophomore for Sandusky. A year ago as a freshman he set new marks in the 200-yard individual medley, 2:14.1, and 100-yard butterfly, :57.1. This year Gilbert has gone as fast as 2:14 in the medley and :55.2 in the butterfly. The butterfly time is the fastest recorded this year in Ohio scholastic competition. The Fremont Ross team of Kirby Taylor, Jon Zink, Dan Kohr and Ken Mathias last year set a Buckeye record of 3:39.1 in the 400-yard freestyle relay. Zink is the only one of this quartet returning. This record setting mark has been surpassed in regular season competition by Findlay, 3:36, and equalled by Sandusky.

The fourth record to be set a year ago was the 1:49.6 in the 200-yard medley relay by Findlay. Findlay, Sandusky and Ross all have topped this mark during the season.

Zink and diver Bill Slemmer have to rate as favorites in undefeated this year in diving competition and will be out to improve his second-place finish of the last conference meet. Zink is the lone Ross swimmer to have posted the best time in his event this year. This is a :52.7 in the 100-yard freestyle.

Steve Miller, who started the season as a breast stroker, has the second best 200-yard individual medley time of 2:17.6.

Ross has had a strong sophomore core this season. One of the best of these is Pat Aten, who has the second best Buckeye time this year in the 400-yard freestyle. This best mark of 4:33.3 is only one-tenth of a second slower than the 4:33.2 of Sandusky's Jim Glass.

Fleming Ranks By Herself

GRENOBLE, France (AP) — America's Peggy Fleming would have to fall 20 times and wind up landing on her ear to lose the Olympic gold medal in the ladies' free-style figure skating final Saturday, her rivals conceded today.

"Peggy—she is much too good. No one has a chance to catch her," said Gabrielle Seyfert of East Germany, who placed second to Miss Fleming in the compulsory figures completed Thursday.

Tracing five figures brilliantly, the 19-year-old ice ballerina from Colorado Springs, Colo., rolled up 1,062.1 points to 984.9 for Miss Seyfert, 960.0 for Austria's Beatrix Schuba, and 943.2 for Hana Maskova, the European champion from Czechoslovakia.

Miss Maskova, 18, a student at Prague and a shapely, brown-eyed brunette who has been labelled the prettiest girl in the 10th Winter Olympics, joined in the raves for her American opponent.

"Peggy is a marvelous free skater and she will win quite easily," admitted the Czech girl. "The only competition is for the silver and bronze medals."

Miss Schuba, 16, her blonde hair tied in a bun, laughed when someone asked if she, in third place, had a chance of making up the difference in free-skating.

"Oh, no, no," she insisted. "It is impossible. We have no chance."

Even the Russians admitted that Miss Fleming was the sport's unparalleled queen.

"Peggy, she is way up here," Elena Chelgova of the Soviet Union said through an interpreter, lifting one hand above her head. "And the rest of us—we are way down here."

Petra Ruhmann of Germany, after watching Peggy trace the last of five figures, commented, "When she skates, we all rush to the edge of the rink to watch her perform."

When Peggy's name is announced, an electric charge seems to go through the big, glassed-in arena. Spectators who have been chatting casually and paying little attention to the other competitors suddenly come alive. There is a rustling movement.

People rush to vantage points. Some pull out cameras. Others hug the plastic edge of the rink. They watch in quiet appreciation.

Almost everybody says in one language or another, "She's sensational."

Killy Snares Downhill Ski; U. S. Girl Racers Startle

GRENOBLE, France (AP) — Jean Claude Killy, France's cool colossus of the ski slopes, won the men's downhill race at the Winter Olympic Games today while three American girls sprang a major surprise by sharing silver medal honors in the 500-meter speed skating test.

Killy, 25-year-old ace of the powerful French Alpine team, beat countryman Guy Perillat by a slender margin for the gold medal in the downhill, with J. Daniel Daetwyler of Switzerland third and the four-man Ameri-

can contingent far off the pace. The victory opened Killy's bid to match the 1956 feat of former Austrian star Toni Sailer, who won all three Olympic Alpine events—the downhill, slalom and giant slalom.

Mary Meyers of St. Paul, Minn., Dianne Holum of Northwood, Ill., and Jenny Fish of Strongsville, Ohio, provided the speed skating fireworks, finishing in a startling three-way tie behind gold medalist Ludmila Titova of Russia in the women's 500-meter race.

The American trio finished

with identical times of 46.3 seconds—two-tenths of a second behind the winner—and each will receive a silver medal, highest award ever captured by U.S. girls in Olympic speed skating competition.

Killy, the world's premier skier, ripped down the Chamrousse slopes in one minute, 59.85 seconds to win the downhill race, postponed Thursday because of bad weather, by less than one-tenth of a second.

Perillat, starting in the No. 1 position, had set a bristling race of 1:59.93. Daetwyler finished in 2:00.32 and fourth-place Heinrich Messner of Austria in 2:01.03.

Billy Kidd of Stowe, Vt., skiing on a tender left ankle which he sprained two days ago during practice, could do no better than 18th, with a 2:03.40 clocking.

Dennis McCoy of Bishop, Calif., was 21st in 2:04.82, but the other two U.S. starters, Jere Elhott and Jim Barrows, both of Steamboat Springs, Colo., were among five of the 62 skiers who did not finish.

"I just skied badly," Kidd said. "I was terrible at the turns. My ankle was all right. It gave me no trouble."

Killy announced after the race that he would retire from competition after the World Cup race in Heavenly Valley, Calif., April 5-7. "I'm very happy about this victory," he said. "I'm especially happy I showed that I was in as good form as at Portillo two years ago."

SANDUSKY WINS BUCKEYE CONFERENCE SWIM TITLE

Slemmer Is Diving Champ, Ross Finishes Third

SANDUSKY — Bill Slemmer, Fremont Ross diver, carried his dual meet supremacy into the Buckeye Conference Championships Saturday to give the Little Giants their lone individual title. Slemmer finished 12 points ahead of John Cassidy, Sandusky, the defending Buckeye Conference champion.

Coach John Balsizer lauded the improvement of his premier diver and the assistant coach responsible for this development. "Bill has come a long way in the last two years under Coach Gary Shelt. His Saturday win over the defending conference champion was proof of his improvement."

Despite a third place finish the Ross coach was pleased with the balance of his team and improved times. Sandusky pulled a minor surprise in repeating as team champion with 65 points. Finishing behind the Blue Streaks were Findlay, the pre-meet favorite, 58; Fremont, 51½, and Mansfield Senior, 29½.

Balsizer termed the 51½ points "Better than I thought." Sandusky repeated its strong showing of the Bowling Green relays two weeks ago. It gave them a second championship and tied with Ross for most conference swimming titles.

In rating the Sandusky performance Balsizer praised,

"Several of the Sandusky swimmers far exceeded their best performances of the year to take the win. As a team Sandusky is well-coached, well-disciplined and quite determined."

The top three teams were all in the running for the team title up to the final relay. In most cases only tenths of a second separated places and judges' decisions were needed in two cases to decide places.

"I felt we swam very well in all but a couple races," Balsizer stated. "For the first time all season the boys reached back for that little extra that it takes to be something more than just another swimmer."

where it counts from our sophomores and juniors."

Balsizer had particular praise for Randy Christy in the 200 and 400 yard freestyle and Mike Allen in the same event. The pair placed in both events with Christy improving his 200 time from 2:09.3 to 2:05.6 and the 400 time from 4:43.2 to 4:38.3. Allen turned in his career best in the 400, leading most of the way.

He was not strong enough to withstand Mansfield's junior Larry Williams in the last 50 yards. Allen swam the distance in 4:30.8 and added a career low of 2:02.8 in the 200.

Dan Abbey swam the 100-yard backstroke in 1:05.4, his best by eight-tenths of a second

and placed fifth. Steve Miller had his best day of the year with a 2:16.6 in the 200-yard individual Medley, only five-tenths second off the school record for second in conference. Miller just two weeks ago was a breaststroker but was switched to backstroke where his 1:03.1 was good enough for second.

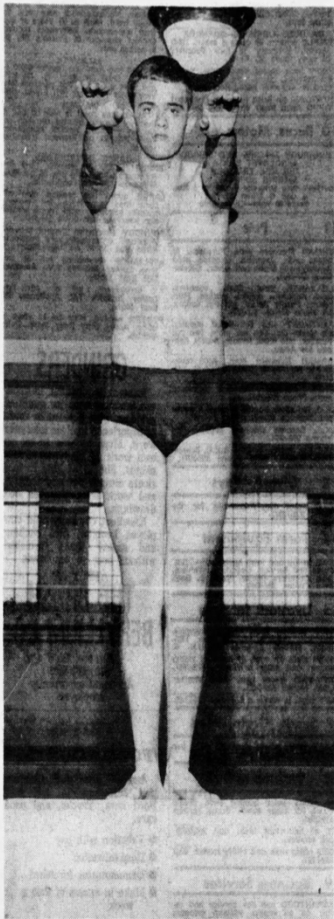

Michigan State Is Added To Illegal Aid Suspect List

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) — Athletes at both of Michigan's Big Ten schools have been receiving discounts, free meals and parttime jobs in probable violation of conference rules, according to the student newspaper at the University of Michigan.

The paper, the Michigan Daily, made its latest allegations against Michigan State University in a copyrighted story appearing in its Sunday editions. Earlier, it had stirred a tempest in sports circles with similar allegations against the University of Michigan in a story Friday night.

An investigator from the Big Ten headquarters in Chicago was to arrive at the Michigan campus in Ann Arbor Sunday night to begin an investigation into the charges.

University of Michigan officials have promised full cooperation.

The paper said that MSU football players have been getting discounts at four major movie theaters in the vicinity of the MSU campus in East Lansing.

The paper also said Michigan State athletes get so-called grill passes, entitling them to free food at dormitory snack bars. Athletes at MSU also were al-

It also quoted a freshman football player who asked not to be identified that Daugherty held a "big hotel banquet for five of us" apparently to attract football players from the Chicago area.

In addition, it said, Daugherty paid the travel expenses of a football recruit and his parents for a visit to the MSU campus.

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
