# 100 BUCKEYE LEAGUE ATHLETES WILL GATHER AT HARMON FIELD; OLD RECORDS

More than 100 athletes from the four schools of the Buckeye High School league will gather at Harmon field Saturday afternoon to take part in the league's first annual track meet.

Being the first meet for the new organization, the participating athletes will have to shoot at Harmon field records in their performances as there is no "league record" in any of the 15 events.

In former years the records of the Little Big Seven have been the aim of track performers, but that league has now broken up and the athletes are free to establish new marks.

When they start shooting at Harmon field records, however, difficulties will be encountered. The field in use since 1928, boasts of marks that will be hard to break.

Even at that, Sandusky high school's outstanding team will be given a 50-50 chance to set new marks in the broad jump, the pole vault, the 100 and 440-yard dashes and the 880-yard and mile relays.

## Sandusky Favored

Winners of the Ohio Wesleyan and Ohio university relays the past two weeks, the Sandusky streaks have one of the outstanding teams in Ohio. They will have little difficulty in taking away the highest

honors of the afternoon.

Fremont Ross, coached by Bill Ogden, undefeated in seven dual and triangular meets this spring, will get many points, however, and should take second place without any trouble. Tiffin Columbian and Findlay will battle for third place.

Bob Oldfather, football and basketball coach at Ross high, has been selected by the league coaches and principals to be manager of the league meet.

# STREAKS NOSED OUT ROSS AND HAD TO AMBLE

First Buckeye League  
Meeting Great Success;  
Several Records

Findlay and Tiffin Teams  
Fail to Provide Hot  
Competition

By the narrow margin of 17 points, Fremont Ross high school's tracksters lost the first annual Buckeye high school track and field meet to Sandusky's Blue Streaks Saturday afternoon at Harmon Field.

Sandusky, boasting one of the best scholastic teams in Ohio, scored an even 100 points to make it a clean sweep of championships for the year. Previously, Sandusky had won the football and basketball titles of the new Buckeye loop.

Fremont Ross pushed the Streaks from the first, but could get no more than 51 points. Tiffin Columbian and Findlay, the other contestants, finished far down the list. Had for third with 13 points each. The turning point came when Fremont's mile relay team was run right off the track by both Sandusky and Findlay. Up to this time, Sandusky had a lead of 73 1/2 to 69 1/2. But by scoring five points in the relay to one for Fremont, Sandusky took too commanding a lead.

Fremont's ability to stay within a point or two of Sandusky's fine team came through consistent capturing of second and third places. Although Sandusky won first in most of the events, Fremont boys always came through for their share of points in the same events.

**Ross High Climax**  
Climax of the meet as far as Fremont was concerned came when the Ross 80-yard relay team, composed of Captain Hal Binkley, Burkett, Christy and Lewis, stepped out in a record performance to defeat the Streaks. The Fremont team set a new field record of one minute 23.4 seconds. The old record was one minute 24.7 seconds set in 1922 by Peterson, Albert Schneider and Eckert.

Three other record-breaking performances were turned in during the afternoon, and all were set by Sandusky athletes.

Lauffer Krueger leaped 21 feet five inches in the broad jump on the fourth trial to set a new mark. The old record was held by Peterson, of Fremont, who jumped 20 feet 10 inches in 1922.

Don Whittaker hurled his angular body in the 44-foot, one-fourth inch to establish a new mark for pole vault. The old record was 11 feet 4 1/2 inches set this year by Bill Thraives, of Fremont.

It is well, too, that Whittaker made his record vault, as Thraives bettered his own record in clearing the bar at 11 feet 8 inches to get a tie for second place with Jim Whittaker.

Garrett sprinted the 440-yard dash in 52.1 seconds, bettering the old field mark of 51.6 held by Burton of Sandusky, and established in 1921.

**All League Records**  
Winners of all events Saturday hold the "league records" for another year at least. Since this was the first meet of the Buckeye league, any marks set are league records. Since some of the Harmon Field records were regarded as very good for high schools, those which were broken are all the more notable.

The meet was featured by the appearance of five "queens" from the Buckeye schools. They were: Mrs. Jane Lytle and Betty Getton, of Fremont; Inogene McConahay, of Tiffin; Virginia Gagar, of Sandusky; and Betty Jean Muecke, of Findlay.

The "queens" not only started the meet by setting off an aerial bomb, but they also presented the medals and ribbons to the winners after each event. The winners were placed on steps in front of the bleachers as three buglers called attention. Then as Fred Bode announced the names, the awards were presented by the "queens."

Miss Gomer also had the honor of presenting the large trophy to Coach Bob Whittaker at the conclusion of the meet.

The field and track at Harmon field were in excellent condition for the festival. Faculty Manager Howard A. Cochran and a force of student managers had everything in readiness for the annual meet. Coaches Bill Ogden, Howard Laub, Harold Althoff and Bob Oldfather also did their share of the labor. It is no easy task to make preparations for a large track festival.

**Capable Officials**  
C. D. McDaniels, of Mt. Blanchard, Hardin county, was the official starter for the meeting. Timers were Eddie Gabel, of Fremont; Ted Beaman, of Sandusky; and C. A. Robbins, of Findlay.

Judges at the broad jump were Harold Althoff, of Fremont; S. C. Rowland, of Sandusky; and Harry Titworth, of Fremont. Virginia Getton, of Fremont, was judge of the 80-yard relay. Judges were Jay R. Bode, of Fremont; Frank Miller, of Tiffin; and J. R. Pugh, of Findlay.

Finish judges were Howard Laub, Malcolm Clark, of Findlay; Grace, Judy Lerch, Peggy Kitzel and Stanley Hawk, of Fremont; George Burkett, of Tiffin; Jay Winters, of Findlay; and Wayne Blough and George Selzer, of Sandusky.

Harmon Field will again be the seat of much activity next Saturday when the district Class A and Class B meet is run off. The preliminary meet Saturday in both classes will be held during the morning. Finals will be in the afternoon.

Howard Laub and Bob Oldfather were co-managers of the meet Saturday and will act in the same capacity next Saturday. The summary of the Buckeye league events follows:
