Ross Cagers Impressive

Showing tremendous improvement over last year, Al Ziemke's Ross high school basketball team more than held its own with Sandusky St. Mary's, a veteran aggregation, Tuesday afternoon in a scrimmage on the local floor.

The unofficial count after four regular periods of play showed Ross ahead 46-33.

Sandusky, undefeated until the semi-finals of the district class B tournament last season, has five of its eight lettermen back. The Panthers fell behind the Ross-men 20-2 at the end of the first quarter, but made it interesting from that point.

St. Joe has displayed plenty of zip in practice, but Coach Bob Smith fears that lack of size will hurt his team's chances. Ed Mayle, 6-1, who is battling Clare Bell, 6-0, for the center spot, is the tallest boy on the squad.

Giants Make Early Lead Hold Up To Edge Grads, 48 To 45

Ross high's basketball team slumped after an excellent first quarter but still had enough left to overcome an alumni aggregation 48-45 last night before about 450 fans in the local gymnasium.

The Giants moved the ball well and executed some nice plays in a wide open game the first eight minutes, but after taking an 18-12 lead at that point, they settled down to a methodical game.

The alumni threatened to overtake the varsity at several points in the final half, but always Ross came up with a bucket just when it appeared it was in the blow-up stage.

Four personal fouls on Dick Baron in the first half slowed the alumni considerably, but Baron hung around until less than a half minute remained in the game. The ex-Ross ace netted 10 points, all in the last half, before bowing out to join Len Brudzinski, Dick Porczak and Ed Seils. The losers played the last few seconds with only four players.

Alumni Trials 31-18

Good work on the board by John Lewis and John Allen offset the enemy forces in the second period as the Giants steamed to a 31-18 lead before Porczak made his only bucket of the night shortly before the half ended. In the second half, the alumni whittled the margin to 31-30 on three goals by Baron and two by the clever Bob Auxter.

Auxter removed some of the pressure with a fielder and a free throw but Baron meshed a two-pointer from the side to make the score 34-32 in favor of the varsity. John Lewis potted a jump shot in front of the hoop and Charlie Glover, sub forward, connected on a free throw.

Ross displayed smoothness in the first half and controlled the boards. Lewis started the scoring with a foul and Boucher hit for the season's initial field goal to give Ross a 3-0 lead. Lloyd (Butter) Bischoff's bucket put the alumni ahead 43 with about two minutes gone, the only time the losers held the upper hand. Lewis set the score pace with 12 points, followed by 10 for Allen, Brudzinski, Baron and Auxter each scored 10 for the alumni. Boucher and Glover of the varsity fouled out. The alumni, led by Warren Rhodes' 16 points, won the reserve game, 31-24.

Ross opens its regular season Tuesday at home against Willard.

Willard, Ross Vie Here Tuesday Night

Ross high plays its first regular game of the season Tuesday night while St. Joseph's will strive for its second victory on Friday as basketball goes into high gear this week.

The Giants take on a pair of foes, meeting Willard on Tuesday and Fostoria on Friday. Both games will be played on the Ross floor. St. Joe's game with Gibsonburg is on the Golden Bears' floor.

Coach Al Ziemke's Rossmen showed they are out to improve on their record of the past two seasons when they defeated an alumni team, 48-45. The Giants were especially impressive in the first period but slowed down after that. Ziemke hopes to keep the team rolling at full speed from here on.

"We have a pretty good bunch this season," the mentor asserted. "I plan to do a lot of substituting if it is necessary to do so to keep the team moving."

Willard, which provides the Giants' with its official 1950-51 opener, was also the last team played. Willard eliminated Ross from the district tournament at Sandusky last March.

St. Joe At St. Paul

St. Joseph's also tackles Norwalk St. Paul there Sunday.

From the looks of Saturday's game at Green Springs, the Crimson Streaks will surpass their 1949-50 outlay of wins, seven. In that one, the opener, the Streaks showed scrap and zippy pass-work. St. Joe was off in its shooting form but Coach Bob Smith has an array of potentially accurate gunners who should prove hard to stop.

In what may be the largest one bucket and four fouls in the score in its basketball history, first six minutes. Schafer Outstanding

Little Gladyn Schafer, 5-6 inch bundle of energy, was the game's outstanding player. Showing a basketball player's instinct for being in a certain spot at the right time, Schafer was all over the floor to grab rebounds, steal the ball from passers and dribblers and at the same time score 13 points. He was runner-up to John Allen in the scoring department, the husky forward tallying 14 on three goals and eight fouls.

On a parade to the foul line, Ross took a 20-7 lead after two and one-half minutes of the second half had elapsed. Allen made four free throws in that time. Then Schafer clicked off three goals in rapid succession and in a few minutes the score was 30-8.

Whitecomb's Shot Equals Mark

As Ross kept creeping toward the 70-mark the crowd, sensing something historic-like was in the making, urged Ross to keep up its pace. Ronnie Whitcomb, freshman forward, laid one in from the left side of the foul rim to equal the previous high Ross score, 68, and with 30 seconds to play, Marlin Farver made it 69-27 with a foul.

Bob Boucher, elongated forward and center, connected on a pivot shot with about five seconds remaining and the crowd, about 400, cheered as the scoreboard recorded the 71st point.

Ross is due for much tougher competition Friday night when Fostoria invades.

Ross high's reserves won 46-43 after nearly blowing a big lead in the last two minutes.

PAUL SWEENEY, WHO THIS WEEK ANNOUNCED his resignation as head football coach at Tiffin Columbian, said he did so because a request for a salary increase had been turned down.

The likeable mentor, who made many friends since he arrived in Tiffin in 1949, said he found it impossible to combat the high cost of living at his salary, which he said is \$3,025.

We had quite a chat with Sweeney on the telephone last night and in addition to his salary troubles, we learned he is also extremely dissatisfied with the way the Buckeye League handled the recent meeting at Fostoria. But the money question remains his No. 1 gripe.

"I'm making less money this year than I did last," he declared. "I started at \$3,000 and after my first full year, the board made it \$25 more. All that did was put me in a different income tax bracket and the government takes \$50 more for taxes. In other words, I got a \$25 raise, but I have \$25 less take-home pay."

Tiffin Columbian didn't set the world afire in football this season, but it did manage to halt a losing streak that dated back to 1945. Sweeney's gentlemen won three and lost five and one of their victories was over Calvert, a city rival. Tiffin lost one game by a single point, 27-26, to Bowling Green.

THE TIFFIN BOARD has not acted on Sweeney's resignation, although it has been hanging fire for some time. He said it would receive consideration Monday, at the next board meeting.

Sweeney indicated that if the board would change its mind and come through with a raise he would like to stick around. "I like to work with boys," he said. "I feel we have made a lot of progress here and that we will show it on the football field next season. Those three victories this year helped a lot to put the spirit back in the sport. We lose only six seniors from the squad. Thirteen lettermen will be back."

Discussing the Buckeye League's action, Paul said this writer's recent comments "hit the nail right on the head." Asserted the Tiffin coach: "It's strictly a principal's and superintendent's league. When I first came here I heard a lot of talk about all the league activities aside from football and basketball but all I have been able to see are a track meet, a music festival and a girl's frolic."

Nobody was more surprised when Tiffin Columbian decided to stay in the Buckeye League than Paul Sweeney. The Tiffin athletic board decided to drop out last year," he related, "but some of the other school heads persuaded our administration to make it a three-year withdrawal in football. Then, when the question of future scheduling came up earlier this year, the board met again and decided it would be best to drop out entirely."

SWEENEY WASN'T at the meeting when applications of Lima Central and Lima South were smugly ignored by a resolution that the league would maintain its present size of six schools. Instead, he sent an assistant, Nick Mazzafaro, and it was to Nick that Mal Mackey of Ross was talking concerning a game next year. Mal, a newcomer to these parts and a trifle unfamiliar, presumed it was Sweeney he was asked for an opinion. However, Sweeney's reply would have been the same as Nick's, which was: "We don't want any part of you."

The Tiffin coach said he didn't know that Tiffin decided to stay in until he read it in the newspaper the night after the meeting. Since the athletic board had voted to get out, he presumed that was the way it would be. And for some reason, his principal and superintendent neglected to inform him of the surprise action.

You can put it down in your

book that Sweeney was mighty unhappy over the prospect of taking on Findlay and Fremont again.

Sweeney says he will stay in coaching. "I want to stay in," he asserts. "I like boys and football and want to make it my life's work. But I must earn enough to keep my head above water."

Everybody Looks Good

From the top to the bottom of the lineup the Trojans were all that a state championship team should be. Johnson and Bill Barnes, 6-5, and Carl Ziemke, 6-2, were well set in the back and Capt. Ted Bishop, back in the role of a regular after a long layoff due to an injury, Jim Koehler and Carl Brooks treated the rabid Findlay roosters to some razor-sharp shooting. It was suicide to let the Trojans get an open shot the hoop.

The entire team, especially Johnson and Barnes, showed clever passwork as they overcame a short-lived Ross lead in the first quarter to roll to their third Buckeye League triumph. All Reserved Seats Gone As Unbeaten Trojans Seek 16th

One of the largest crowds in the history of the Ross high school auditorium is expected to witness Friday night's all-important Buckeye League basketball game between the battling Giants and the undefeated Findlay Trojans.

All reserved seat tickets are sold, Faculty Manager John Titsworth announced today. However, there are still plenty of general admission tickets available at the school and at Tremper's news stand, Titsworth said.

Findlay was sent 325 tickets, while another additional 100 reserved seats were put on sale at Tremper's Tuesday night, the same evening that Ross was at Sandusky racking up its 11th triumph. They were all sold the same night.

Findlay is expected to bring a large delegation, that city being one of the most rabid basketball locations in the state. Fremont, hardly noted for its basketball enthusiasm, is suddenly showing considerable interest and it is through an upsurge in local attendance that Ross hopes to present a record or near-record Friday.

Top Crowds

The 1,700 who were present at the first basketball game in the local auditorium in 1931 when Ross played Sandusky are believed to have set the record for the local school. Several years ago, 2,040 persons witnessed a Protest tournament game.

The current squad, which has surprised everyone by its excellent performance when such was not expected, further endeared itself when it knocked off Sandusky there Tuesday night to the tune of 60-52. That triumph, the 11th in 13 games this season, was a big boost for local morale in the athletic rivalry that exists between the two schools. It was the first win over S.H.S. in basketball since 1947. It removed a portion (but not all) of the sting from the stunning 29-7 football setback handed Ross last fall and it came only a few hours after the Sandusky swimmers eked out a 38-37 decision over the local lads.

The Sandusky victory gave the local cagers and fans much personal satisfaction. Now they have a chance to get state-wide recognition when they meet Coach Carl Bachman's polished crew.

The Trojans' strong point is their close-guarding defense. Led both on defense and offense by big Bill Garnes, the invaders seldom allow a close-in shot and they have been able to control the boards in every game they have played, including the initial encounter there with Ross. That one ended 69-37.

Findlay has scored at the rate of 58 points per game this sea-

son, getting 872 points. Their top production was at Fostoria, where they blasted the Redmen 84-53.

Garnes In Wheelhorse

Garnes has no peer in Ohio as an all-around performer. He specializes in feeding off clever passes to tall John Nicholas Johnson, who stands in the neighborhood of 6-5, and Ted Bishop, a streamlined forward who was out of the lineup two games in mid-season after being hurt at Newark.

Carl Brooks and Jim Koehler are fine set shot artists who can hit from far out. In their first meeting, Bishop scored 16 points, Koehler 14, Brooks 12 and Garnes 11.

Uncanny shooting demoralized Ross early at Findlay, the Trojans getting a 42-18 lead at the half. In the last two quarters, the Giants settled down and played a much better brand of ball.

Defensively, the Findlay record speaks for the type of game that has made Bachman the most highly-regarded high school mentor in the state. The average score against his quint is 36 points. The highest number against Findlay in one game this season was made by Canton Lehman, 51. The Trojans won a 54-51 decision in an overtime there. Tiffin managed 48 in dropping a 58-48 verdict at Findlay. Columbian, by the way, is getting tougher every week and looms as a rugger obstacle for Fremont when it comes here Tuesday.

Ross is averaging 62 points per game, getting 306 for the season. On defense, the Giants have allowed 684, an average of 52 per game.

Coach Al Ziemke believes his squad is mentally ready for Findlay. "The kids want to win this one worse than any we play," he said yesterday. Then he added: "So do I."

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Bad 1st Half Dooms Giants

Findlay high's basketball team was rated No. 2 in the state in the latest Associated Press poll, but you will never be able to convince the 1,800 fans who saw the Trojans trample Ross here last night that they are second to any scholastic team in Ohio or any other state. It was their 16th straight win.

Ross was defeated 65-39 and it was no disgrace to be so treated for Coach Carl Bachman's quintet is about as polished as a brand new knife at one of the local cutlery plants.

You can run out of superlatives describing the Findlay performance last night. "Exceptional" is as good a word as any for it. Findlay's victory was its 100th in 105 games.

Ross Goals Are Scarce!
The Men of Troy wheeled to a 17-3 edge in the first quarter while holding the Giants without a field goal. They led 37-10 at the half, when Ross was able to show only one bucket, by John Lewis.

Ross, obviously nervous and "tight" in the first two quarters, came back in the last half and exhibited some of the stuff that has given them 11 victories in 14 games. In fact, the Giants outscored the Trojans in the last half, 29 to 28, but all four periods make it conclusive.

Findlay left the floor at half-time with a record of 17 field goals out of 35 attempts. Ross, on the other hand, made only one of 25. In the early stages of the contest, the local boys had several easy chances close to the hoop and could not connect.

Many of Findlay's goals were from difficult angles, and all five starters seemed capable of doing it. John Nicholas Johnson, a 6-foot, 5-inch southpaw senior, made several "cute" scoring sorties. Jim Koehler, a streamlined forward, popped in 17 points, one less than Johnson. Ted Bishop and Carl Brooks kept up the assault when one of the others would taper off.

And a standout in all departments was Bill Barnes, a 6-4 senior center who made a letter as a freshman. Barnes fed off cleverly to his teammates, scored nine points and blocked many Ross shots.

Poor Start Removes Chances
Had Al Ziemke's lads been able to click in the first half, it might have been an exciting ball game, but the "cold" night on field goal attempts plus Findlay's "hot" shooting soon put the game on ice.

John Lewis made a foul to open the scoring, but Findlay bounced back on a layup by Barnes. Dick Houghtaling, who clicked for five long shots in the second half, sank a foul for a 2-2 count before the Trojan express got rolling.

Johnson and Bishop scored rapid goals and Lewis made a foul for Ross to make the score 6-3. Findlay scored 11 points in the next five minutes for a 17-3 quarter count. Koehler made three set shots during that time.

Findlay's largest lead was 33 points, which came in the last frame with five minutes to go. Ross gamely kept driving and never matched in its desire to give all it had, a tribute because Findlay was demoralizingly accurate.

Ross fared well in getting defensive rebounds, with Lewis the leader in that department. Houghtaling, who had only a few chances in the first half, looked more like his old self in the last two cantos. He and Lewis led Ross with 11 points.

That Ross was off form can be seen in the foul shooting, a big factor in the Giants' success all season. They made only 13 of 27.

Ross high's basketeers were far from top form here last night but they managed to produce when the chips were down and racked up their 12th victory in 15 games over Tiffin Columbian, 55-48.

The Giants were never behind after three minutes of the second quarter had been played, but Tiffin was within one point early in the fourth period before they finally put on a game-clinching splurge.

With the score 42-41, Bob Boucher connected on a free throw and Glayden Schafer sized the nets with a long set shot for a 45-41 edge. Ned Brinkman sank a foul for Tiffin, but then Dick (Mr. Swish) Houghtaling, who was given few scoring chances, plunked in a goal from 10 feet out, Schafer counted on a fast-break layup and Marlin Farver pushed in a one-hander that rolled around the rim before falling through.

That little spree put the Giants in command 51-42 with 3:30 left to play. Tall John Lewis and Schafer made free throws for a 53-44 score, but Chad Vogt, the outstanding shooter on the floor, and Harry Groman hit on short shots to leave Ross ahead by five points, 53-48, with two minutes remaining.

Ross froze the ball for a minute before a jump was forced at midcourt. Tiffin missed a couple of easy shots, then in the last second Lewis tallied on a short chance from the side.

Looked Bad At First

For a time it appeared that the hard luck on shooting that plagued the Giants in the loss to Findlay would doom them against Tiffin. Boucher was the entire offense in the first period. He made seven points in four minutes, but Ross trailed, 8-7. Ross spurted ahead 15-11 on buckets by Boucher and Farver, but Chad Vogt and Jim Homan trimmed it to 15-14 at the quarter.

Boucher made three points early in the second period, but Vogt made four and it was 18-18. Ned Brinkman shot one in from the side and Groman pushed in a basket for a 22-18 Tiffin lead.

Farver picked that stage of the game to catch fire. After Schafer netted two points, Farver made three buckets on a variety of shots, one set shot, one layup and one push try from the side. Ken Wolf's pair of fouls and Houghtaling's first goal left Ross in command at the half, 30-26.

The Giants managed to stay

in front in the third period, but once the margin was only a point and four times Columbian was only two points off. Starting the fourth period, Ross led 39-37.

Houghtaling, the main object of the Tiffin defense, made one of his long shots to open the last quarter but Brinkman countered. Boucher sank his fourth straight foul before Lynn Cole put Tiffin on the verge of taking over. Ross was ahead, 42-41. Then the above described finish took place and Ross sewed up second place in the Buckeye League. The Giants have won six and lost two, while Tiffin has five league losses. Columbian has a 9-5 mark for the season, all its reverses coming at the hands of league foes.

The Brighter Side

It was not a well-played game, with Ross looking like a tired club, but the results were encouraging. If the Giants can win when they're "off," they should have no trouble on a good night. About 500 fans saw the game.

Friday, Ross tries for No. 13 at Marion. The Giants end their season the following Friday, Feb. 23, against Bowling Green on the Ross floor.

MARION, Feb. 17—Harding high school spotted Fremont Ross a lead for most of the first period, then took charge to get a 65-44 basketball victory here last night.

The Presidents, ahead by five points at halftime, swept to a

33-23 advantage after the first four minutes of the third quarter and were never pressed.

It was Ross high's fourth loss in 16 games. The Giants play their last game of the season prior to the tournament next Friday in Fremont against Bowling Green.

Lewis Scores 26 To Lead Way In Impressive 66-48 Romp

Ross high's basketeers demonstrated last night that they are ready for tournament competition after knocking off Bowling Green 66-48 in their final home game of the season.

The Giants were especially impressive in the first half when they assumed a 39-26 lead behind the excellent shooting of John Lewis, six-foot, three-inch junior pivotman.

It was the 13th victory in 17 games for Al Ziemke's plucky cagers. That doesn't include a victory over the alumni.

Lewis, controlling rebounds off both baskets, scored 26 points in his best performance of the season. Forward Bob Boucher, 6-4, scored 13 for runner-up honors. Boucher also turned in his best game.

It was a fast and furious game for the first eight minutes. The lead changed hands no less than eight times as the Giants and Bobcats took turns at scoring fielders. A goal by Lewis, his eighth point of the period, put Ross ahead 16-13 as the first quarter ended.

Lewis, Boucher, Schafer and Houghtaling, led a second-quarter assault that netted the Giants 23 points. Lewis and Schafer scored to open the period and put Ross in a 20-13 lead. Ross steadily pulled away as the Giants continued to pass and shoot in excellent fashion.

Bowling Green presented a rangy team, although not as tall as Ross. The departure of Bill Stewart on fouls in the third period cut down the Bobcats' production. Stewart led his team with 12 points.

Ross steamed to a 19-point lead in the third quarter and continued to hold a similar margin the remainder of the game.

Coach Ziemke removed all his senior regulars with two minutes to play. Those making their last home appearance were Boucher, Schafer, Marlin Farver, Houghtaling, Ken Wolf and Charlie Glover. Note of this fact was made over the P.A. system, with John Allen, senior forward who received a broken foot nearly two months ago, also being mentioned.

Lewis is the only remaining regular.

Both teams exhibited excellent form at the free-throw line. Bowling Green made 12 of its 14 shots, while Ross converted 20 of 31. Only 13 personal fouls were committed by the local lads.

Ross plays Port Clinton in the Sandusky sectional tournament next Wednesday. If the Giants win, they play the Norwalk Sandusky winner Thursday in the semi-finals.

The Ross reserves blew a big early lead and bowed to Bowling Green, 41-40.

Pee-Wee Icers To Play In Toledo




Finnegan Takes Grid Job At West. Reserve
