Caution is the word

The Ross High School girls track team begins its season against Tiffin Columbian Tuesday with a nucleus of 14 returning lettermen, but a group of 22 sophomores could become the key to the team's success.

Ross Coach Jolyn Smith expresses cautious optimism about her sophomores, who represent the first class at Ross which has gone through two years in the junior high program. She said they should give the team strong depth.

"Again our depth-more so than anything else," she said when asked about the team strength. "It's going to depend a lot on how our sophomores develop. That's exactly where it's going to lie."

"We probably should most of the time finish one-two in distance which is going to be our strength," she added.

Among the top distance runners for Ross include senior Lisa Meek, an 880 specialist, junior Dorothy Clark and her sophomore sister Debbie, and sophomores Penny and Debbie Broschius.

In the 440 Ross will have senior lettermen Roxie Price, Meek, and Gail Recktenwald, Debbie Clark and junior letterman Mary Hasselbach all vying for berths.

Coach Smith said the Little Giants could have four or five good sprinters from the sophomore class to go with the return of seniors Roxie Price and Lisa McGilton. Among the sophomore hopefuls is Jackie Mullen, who can run both the 220 and 100.

Ross has all three hurdlers from last

season returning in senior Robyn Price and juniors McGilton and Lisa Lash.

In the field events, Ross has been hurt with the loss of junior high jumper Angie Eyster, who underwent back surgery and will be out for the season. Senior Julie Mosser and Janet Reardon figure to be the high jumpers, while Roxie Price and Brown perform at long jump.

The shot put and discus might not be as strong an event for the Little Giants this year because of the graduation of Sue Buehler and Lena Mercer. Smith said Recktenwald and sophomore Kim Walter are throwing the discus at about 90 feet now, and she feels with continued improvement the team won't lose that much. A pair of senior lettermen, Jerri Carper and Carol Byers, will throw the shot put.

The Ross schedule this year is the biggest ever. In addition to the Tiffin Relays this Saturday and the Fremont Relays on April 22, the Blade Relays (April 23) and Whitmer Relays have been added.

Ross will also host the first complete Buckeye Conference meet on May 14. The Little Giants have won a Buckeye invitational the past two seasons, with Elyria and Mansfield excluded, but all eight schools will be in it for the first time this year and it will count in the all-sports standings in the Buckeye. Although Ross hosts the meet this season, it will be held on an all-weather track after this year.

Smith said winning the Buckeye meet is one of the goals she has set for this season, as well as beating Toledo Start and Whitmer, the two toughest dual meet opponents for the Little Giants.

Hurdlers dominate Ross

Ron Brant does not have to count sheep to get to sleep. Instead, he counts hurdlers that dominate his Ross High School track team.

Brant, in his 17th season as a coach at Ross, has five classy hurdlers in his crew of 49 cindermen and if there were a dramatic rule change to establish more hurdles races this season, the veteran Ross coach would be the first to voice his okay.

"Hurdles are definitely our strongest event," Brant said as he gazed at his team which was spread around the acreage at Harmon Stadium.

"We have Mitch Clayton, our high hurdles record holder, Dan DeLeon, Terry Bates, Jeff Brown, and Mike Price back this year and they all are good hurdlers."

All seniors, Clayton heads the group from last season. The lanky senior blazed to a 15.0 for the Ross school record a year ago. All five of the ace hurdlers are capable of times in the very low 15-second range with Brown and Clayton capable of breaking the 15-second mark.

Brown, Brant freely admits, will be Ross's "do it all athlete." The junior can be called on for the sprints, hurdles, relays, and long jump specifically but if Brant wanted, Brown could also pole vault - he's that good of an all-around athlete.

The thought pole vault, however, turned Brant's face from a grin to a scowl.

"This is the first time in 7-8 years that we do not have a definite 13-foot vaulter," he said. The only man back with experience in the pole vault is junior letterman Jeff Shanahan.

In other field events, the discus appears to be the strongest with returning lettermen Rick Kusmer and Mark Gysan back to do the hurling.

"In the shot put we will be fair," Brant said, "with Reyna (Rey) in that."

Senior letterman Tim Simms will give Ross strong representation in the high jump. "He has gone six feet in practice already," Brant said about Simms.

The long jump will have Brown as the leading Little Giant with the most experience.

With Brown and Bates along with Eddie Jones and Mike Cozette, Ross could surprise a few people in the sprints. In the 440, Brant is counting on junior Randy Hammer to add depth behind Bates and Jones. DeLeon is expected to be the top dog in the 440 while he is also the lone returnee from Ross's mile

relay team of a season ago.

In the distance races, Brant will be looking at veterans Dane Ramirez, Jeff McCormick, and Mark Boedecker along with a couple of promising sophomores.

Boedecker, a junior who finished fifth at two miles in the Buckeye Conference a season ago, is expected to lead Ross in that event. Ramirez, a two-miler a year ago, may be dropped down to the mile.

In the 880, McCormick tops the Little Giants with sophomores Dave Stover and Mike Schlea expected to get stronger as the season continues.

Summing up, Brant compared this season's edition of the Little Giants to the 1971 and 1973 teams.

"We look strong on paper like those teams," he said, "but we sort of have to take a wait and see attitude."

Ross will open the season at Tiffin Columbian Tuesday (4 p.m.) and will be in the Tiffin Relays on Saturday. The first home meet for Ross will be Tuesday, April 12, against Bowling Green.

Football stays at UC

CINCINNATI (AP) — "I felt it would come to this," said Ralph Staub, head football coach at the University of Cincinnati.

"I didn't think they would have hired me if they were planning to drop football," said the longtime Ohio State assistant.

Staub's remarks came after the school's board of directors unanimously voted to retain upper division football.

A new, unspecified funding arrangement must be created to support spiraling football cost. And the sport will now face more rigid monitoring.

Those were among the recommendations made by executive vice president Henry R. Winkler, who wants general fee support of football cut from \$495,400 to \$359,400 within three years.

Ross boys relay team sets record

Clyde girls win Tiffin Relays

TIFFIN — Host Tiffin Columbian won the boys championship while Clyde edged Toledo Whitmer for the girls title in the Sixth Annual Bill Krause Memorial Tiffin Relays here Saturday.

In the boys meet, Columbian posted 57 points to 50 for runner-up Lima Shawnee. Whitmer was third with 47 to 44 for Fostoria, 35 for the Ross Little Giants, 32 for Bellevue and 31 for seventh place Clyde in the 12-team race.

The Clyde girls team set three meet records in racking up 66 points to 62 for Whitmer. Ross placed third with 36, Bowling Green was fourth with 28 and Mohawk took fifth with 27.

The highlight of the meet for the Ross boys came in the last event of the night when the Little Giant mile relay team broke its own meet record set in 1974. Randy Hammer, Terry Bates, Dan DeLeon and Jeff Brown finished the race at 3:31.7, one-tenth of a second better than the previous record set by Ross. It was the only meet record broken by the boys Saturday.

The Ross 440 relay team of Mike Cozette, Bates, DeLeon and Brown placed second at 45.7, while the Little Giants took third in the shot put when Rick Kusmer, Troy Amor and Rey Reyna totaled a distance of 133-8 3/4.

Ross was fourth in the long jump and 880 relay, fifth in the discus and sixth in the distance medley.

The Clyde boys were paced with victories in the four mile relay and distance medley. Tom Brixen, Ray Guerrero, Mark Cullen and Jerry Hansen were clocked in the four mile at 19:00.7 and Guerrero, Matt Wood, Brixen and Hansen finished the distance medley at 11:13.8.

The two mile relay team of Guerrero, Cullen, Brixen and Hansen placed third at

8:44.7. Clyde was fifth in the high jump and 880 relay and sixth in the 440 relay.

Clyde broke girls meet records in the shot put, long jump and shuttle hurdles. Kandy Lippert, Barb Stucky and Heichel totaled 101-2 in the shot put, breaking the Toledo Whitmer record in 1976 of 96-8. Clyde broke its own record in the long jump when Kathy and Kelli Aman and Cindy Caudill totaled 47 3/4, with the previous record set in 1976 at 46-9 1/4. The Aman twins, Caudill and Paula Greene were clocked in the hurdles at 48.3, beating the 1976 Whitmer record of 49.8.

Clyde won five of the eight events with its other wins coming in the 880 and 440 relays. The 880 relay team of Kathy Aman, Christy Cenkus, Sheila Greene and Kris Kuehne finished at 1:52.4 and the 440 team of Paula Greene, Kelli Aman, Kuehne and Sheila Greene was clocked at 53.2. The Flyers placed in every event with second place in the discus, third in the two mile relay and sixth in the mile relay.

The Ross girls won the two mile relay when Dorothy Clark, Penny Brosious, Debbie Clark and Lisa Meek finished at 10:54.9. The Little Giants also had third place finishes in the long jump, discus, and mile relay. Roxie Price, Stephanie Brown and Julie Mosser totaled 42-3 1/4 in the long jump, while Gall Recktenwald, Mary Trabbic and Kim Walter were 241-7 in the discus. The mile relay team was clocked at 4:33.0.

Charles Corn won the 100 and 440 and Vaughn Shores took both the high and low hurdles to pace Elyria.

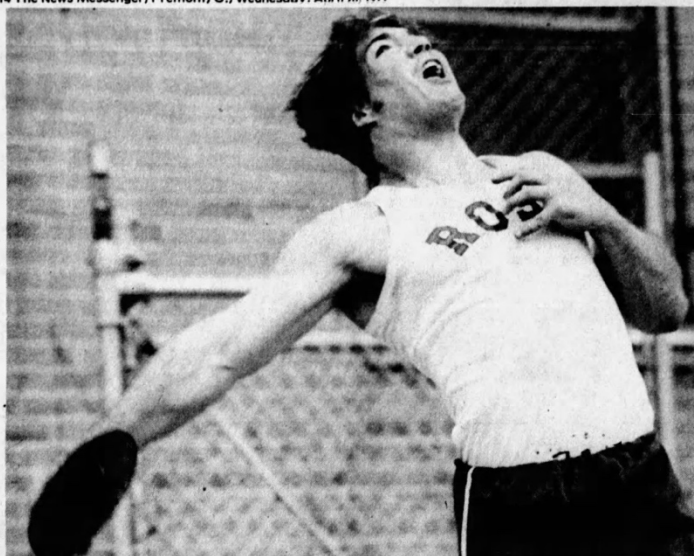

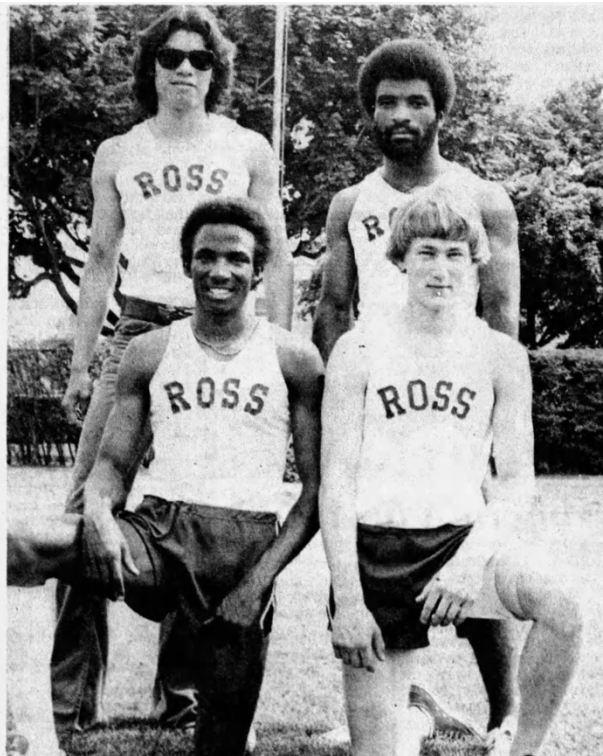
