Little Giants Primed For Opening Of District Meet

Win Over Willard Would Pit Purple Against Victor In Norwalk-Junior Order Clash; Gabelmen Favored To Clear Initial Barrier

Ross high's Little Giants, imbued with the "on to Columbus" spirit that has gripped the entire student body, travel to Sandusky Friday night with high hopes of clearing its first hurdle in the Class A district tournament.

Generally rated one of the strongest contenders in the 11-team district field, the Ross quintet opens its tourney play at 9:30 p. m., against Willard in the final game of the initial session at Sandusky's junior high school gym.

First game on tonight's card is between Bellevue and Tiffin Columbian, an important lower bracket contest, at 7 p. m. At 8 p. m., Norwalk faces Tiffin Junior Home, with the winner in this game to meet Ross at 9:45 p. m., Saturday. The Little Giants defeated both Norwalk and Junior Order during the regular campaign.

At Full Strength

Coach Ed Gabel announced his Ross line-up would be at full strength with Johnny Ruland and Gale Berger at forwards; Bob Shaw at center; and Jack Carroll and Dick Manahan at guards.

The Purple looked in fine fettle during practice this week and apparently have shaken off the effects of the 29-26 defeat handed them by Findlay last Friday night.

The upset by the Trojans snapped a Purple win streak at 11 straight and left the Rossmen with a season record of 16 victories in 18 starts. The only other defeat was a 46-43 loss to Fostoria, which was more than atoned as the Little Giants hammered the Redmen, 59-21, in their second meeting.

Willard Crippled

Unless the Little Giants go extremely sour, or Willard plays in-

spired ball, Fremont should move into the second round in good style.

Willard has been badly crippled during the past month. Vern Hurst, veteran 6-foot forward, was lost through an appendectomy, while Junior Whisler, sophomore forward, was forced from the line-up because of a slight concussion and influenza. Don Freed, substitute guard, went out last week with a broken big toe.

But even with these three players on the bench, Willard boasts one of the rangiest clubs in this sector. Don Sands, second highest in team scoring stands 6-feet, 2-inches. He is aggressive and a good ball handler. Richard Simons, senior guard, is 6-feet, 1-inch and ranks just behind Sands in scoring.

Win 7 of 19

Dexter Booth, senior substitute center and forward, is the tallest member on the squad at 6-feet, 3-inches. While not particularly adept at ball-handling, he is strong defensively. Hobart Neff, another senior guard, is 6-feet, 2-inches and is a good defensive player. Neff also is a consistent long shot.

Ken Thornton, senior substitute forward, stands an even 6 feet and is rated exceptionally good on defense.

Willard finished in the cellar of the Little Big Four and won seven of their 19 games, scoring 569 points to 587 by opponents.

Little Giants Clash With Junior Order Home Tonight

Bob Shaw Tallies 16 Points As Purple Turn Back Stubborn Willard Club; Jack Carroll's Spurt In Third Quarter Swings Tilt For Fremont

With the majority of some 2,000 fans pulling against them, the Little Giants of Fremont Ross turned back Willard high, 41-35, in a hard-fought opening round battle of the annual Class A district tournament at Sandusky Friday night.

Presumably on the theory that the mob always wants to see a champion dethroned, all except a comparatively small Ross delegation was rooting hard for the underdog Willard combine.

But the Purple did their own cheering in the form of a brisk third quarter rally that swept them into a commanding lead after they held a scant 21-19 margin at half-time. Willard threatened mid-way in the final chapter to reduce Fremont's advantage to 37-33, but again the determined cagers of Coach Ed Gabel turned on the pressure to pump in four consecutive points and clinch the contest.

As a result of their triumph the Purple face Tiffin Junior Order at 9:45 p. m., Saturday. The Juniors Friday night registered a distinct upset as they lambasted Norwalk, 42-30.

Redmen Meet Shelby

Although Ross twice defeated Junior order during the Buckeye league campaign, the form shown by Coach Art Mehaffey's crew against Norwalk indicates the Purple are in for a tough evening. Should the Juniors be equally hot against the Rossmen, the ironical process of a cellar-dwelling club downing the champion of its league may develop. In the Buckeye circuit season, Ross won the title with eight wins in 10 starts, while Junior Order annexed only one triumph against nine defeats.

Other second round games Saturday evening will find Sandusky facing Mansfield at 6 p. m.; Ashland meeting Port Clinton at 7:15 p. m., and Bellevue encountering Shelby at 8:30 p. m.

Bellevue, favorite to reach the finals in the lower brackets, displayed a sensational brand of shooting to whip Tiffin Columbian, 44 to 21, Frinday night. Everything tossed at the basket by the Redmen dropped through the meshes in the rout of the Tiffin team.

Lose Stars

Willard's rangy club played brilliant ball against the Rossmen, especially in the first half in which the Crimson Flashes matched the Purple almost point for point. Don Sands and Dick Simons, center and guard, who stand well above the six-foot mark, were uncanny in their shooting during the initial half. Each flipped in four field goals, hitting the hoop on almost every try.

Big Bob Shaw, hooted lustily by a throng comprised mainly of Tiffin, Bellevue and Willard fans, tallied 16 points to head the Purple. He plunked in six fielders and connected on four of his nine chances at the charity stripe.

Ably supporting Shaw was Jack Carroll, who tallied four fielders and four of five gift shots for a 12-point total. As a matter of fact, it was a five-point splurge by Carroll that featured Fremont's game-deciding rally early in the third quarter.

At the start of the fourth period, Shaw sank a free throw to boost the Ross margin to 22-19. Then Carroll broke through for a clean short shot. After Dick Manahan arched in a charity fling, Carroll

hooked in a two-pointer from directly in front of the basket and followed with a free throw to swell the Purple advantage to 28-19.

Held to Four Points

In this Ross flurry both Sands and Forward King went out of the Willard lineup on personal fouls to seriously weaken the Flashes. Willard was limited to but four points in the entire third canto but in the final chapter made a desperate bid that again threatened the Purple.

After two baskets by Shaw and one each by Gale Berger and Billy Jenkins left Ross in front, 37-28, Willard bunched five points to trail only 37-34 with less than three minutes to play.

At this point the desperate Willard cagers were fouling recklessly and Ross picked up two points from the charity stripe as Jenkins and Carroll each hit on gift tries. Then Carroll again broke in for one of his patented hook-shots to put the game on ice as Fremont led, 41-33, with only seconds left to play. Hobart Neff whistled in a long shot for Willard but the game ended before either team could score again.

Get 25 Gift Shots

Scoring from the field was even with each quint scoring 14 baskets, but Ross high's 13 free throws settled the issue, Willard dropping in only seven. Willard had a total of 16 gift attempts while Ross went to the charity stripe for 25 shots, giving both teams almost an even percentage.

The Little Giants completely outclassed Willard in rebound work with Shaw and Berger especially outstanding. Carroll and Manahan came through with their customary excellent ball handling and floor work, while Johnny Ruland turned in his usual aggressive, all-around game.

Besides Sands and King, Willard also lost Dexter Booth, guard, on fouls. Ruland was lost to Fremont on infractions late in the fourth period. Jenkins, who registered three timely points, starred in his relief role at forward:

Triumph Over Junior Order, 49-41, To Gain Semi-Finals

Gabelmen Play Most Of Wide-Open Second Round Battle At Sandusky With Patched Lineup; Trail At Quarter, 15-12; Ruland Stars With 14

Hurdling a dangerous Tiffin Junior Order Home team, 49-41, in a wide-open second round contest Saturday night, the Little Giant cagers of Mentor Ed Gabel carry their title hopes against the snarling Tygers of Mansfield high in the semi-finals of the current Class A district tournament at Sandusky Friday night.

After drawing a first round bye, the defending championship Mansfield quintet nosed out Sandusky's Blue Streaks, 33-31, in the other quarter-final game in the upper bracket Saturday evening.

Clashing in the lower bracket semi-finals Friday night will be Bellevue and Ashland, the former scuttling Shelby, 39-31, and the latter drubbing Port Clinton, 39-23, in Saturday night's round.

The semi-final survivors will collide Saturday at 8 p. m. for the district crown and a berth in the state tournament at Columbus.

Juniors Take Lead

Ross confronted the same desperate, stubborn foe in Junior Order Saturday night as it did the previous night in Willard's rangy combine. However, while Willard

threatened the entire first half of a game in which the Red Flashes eventually bowed, 41-33, Junior Order embarrassed the favored Little Giants in only the opening period.

Blasting away with deadly accuracy from every angle, the Tiffin cagers outscored Ross, 13-12, in the initial period. But the Purple opened up with a 17-point barrage in the second period while holding Junior Order to only three points and led 29-18 at the intermission.

Junior Order rallied to collect 11 points in the third chapter and 12 in the closing canto, but Fremont kept pace with nine and 11 points to cop a tilt in which a total of 90 points, an average of almost four a minute, was scored.

Lose Carroll

The battle was exceedingly rough with Junior Order losing two men and Ross one on personal fouls. Jack Carroll, who played a bang-up game at guard as he scored 11 points, was chased from the Purple line-up on infractions in the middle of the fourth quarter.

Dick Manahan drew three personals in the first four minutes of play and left in favor of Billy Jenkins, who delivered in great style, scoring four baskets and a free throw. Bob Shaw, held to four points, his lowest total in three years of varsity competition, was charged with his third personal midway in the second period and like Manahan did not see service again until the fourth quarter.

Johnny Ruland, turning in his best game of the season to pace the Rossmen with 14 points on six fielders and two free throws; Jenkins, and Dale Bowlus, sub forward, each finished with three personals against them, while Gale Berger, who rang up eight points, finished with two on him.

Shaw Debates

A Purple line-up of Ruland and Bob Hall, forwards; Berger, center; and Carroll and Jenkins, guards, played the entire third quarter and functioned well although the absence of Shaw and Manahan hurt considerably.

Shaw had a second quarter debate with the officials that drew heavy heckling from a capacity crowd, but the Purple star was justified in taking an obstinate stand. He was called for charging Ashmore but Perkins was given the free throw to shoot. The scoring table credited Ashmore with being fouled, but despite this the officials awarded the free throw to Perkins and turned a deaf ear on Shaw's protests.

The Ross-Junior Order fray was the finale of a four game card that left tourney fans convinced the Fremont clash with Mansfield Friday night will be the most exciting of the meet. Bellevue's torrid crew is given the edge over Ashland.

Streaks Rally

Late in the fourth quarter of the Mansfield-Sandusky fray with the Blue Streaks behind, 33-25, the cagers of Coach Glenwright began to find range. Ben Fleming, Sandusky's ace center, whipped in two baskets and Bill Harris, forward, tallied another to reduce Mansfield's margin to 33-31.

But lanky Russ Beer, Mansfield pivot man, dropped in a two-pointer for the Tygers to put the game on ice.

Bellevue sowed up its game with Shelby by scoring a 13-7 third quarter advantage. Bob Baur was

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Johnny Ruland May Be Lost To Ross Against Tygers

A nasty micro-organism, called by Mister Webster "bacillus influenzae," Thursday was gnawing away at the district title hopes of Fremont Ross high's cage team.

Taken ill at class Wednesday, Johnny Ruland was sent home and ordered to bed "for at least two days" by his doctor, who said the veteran Little Giant forward had an attack of the 'flu.

All of which has cast a pall of gloom over the Purple camp

where Coach Ed Gabel is polishing off his charges for their semi-final clash with Mansfield at Sandusky Friday at 7:30 p. m.

A consistent player all season, Ruland was the outstanding Little Giant in the first two rounds of the current district meet. His aggressive follow-up work and hustling floor play were main factors in Purple triumphs over Willard and Tiffin Junior Order Home.

Against Junior Order, Ruland pumped 14 points through the

meshes for his best offensive performance of the season. Although Ruland may recover in time to see action against the Tygers, Coach Gabel isn't counting too much on it.

He plans to move Jack Carroll up to Ruland's forward post and insert Billy Jenkins at guard. While Jenkins is almost ripe for regular service, the fleet-footed negro lad is shy a foot of Ruland's stature. Mansfield is paced by towering Russ Beer at center and the Little Giants will need all the height they can muster

for rebounds.

Gabel gave his cagers a rest Monday and since has kept them in keen condition. Dick Manahan has a back ailment, aftermath of the Junior Order fray, but is expected to be ready to go full tilt against the Tygers.

Carroll, Bob Shaw and Gale Berger all are primed to carry on in the semi-finals with hopes of gaining the championship round, although without Ruland the odds would be stacked pretty high against the Purple.

Downed After Holding 34-24 Lead Entering Final Period

Little Giants Carry Game To Defending Champions
For Three Quarters, But Fade In Last Chapter;
Bob Shaw Knots Count With Seconds To Go

Fremont Ross high's Little Giants all but knocked the stripes off the Tygers of Mansfield high in the semi-finals of the Class A district tournament at Sandusky Friday night only to lose a stinging heart-breaker, 38-37, in a "sudden death" overtime period.

The game Purple cages of Coach Ed Gabel played the defending champions off their feet for three quarters and seemed a cinch to gain the championship round. But after holding a 34-24 margin going into the final quarter, Ross faltered badly to tally only two points while Mansfield counted 12, knotting the score at 36-36 as the regulation time ended.

Bob Shaw, who justified his selection as all-state center with a 17-point total, booped a free throw within a minute of the overtime period giving Ross a 37-36 lead. Three times Mansfield was fouled by Ross, but on each occasion the Tygers elected to take the ball out of bounds under the new ruling. Twice this meant nothing as the alert Ross defense quickly intercepted the ball. But on the third attempt the ball was floated in to Gene Miller.

Swarm Onto Floor
The star Mansfield forward drifted to the far side of the basket and let fly with an off balance shot. The ball caromed against the backboard and into the hoop to give Mansfield a dramatic triumph. If one ever was scored in the district tournament, Mansfield fans swarmed into the floor to greet the Tygers with hilarious joy as the game ended.

With the exception of the first half rebound work of Ross Beer, 6-foot, 8-inch center, Mansfield was given a basketball lesson by the inspired charges of Coach Gabel. The Little Giants swept to a 13-7 lead in the opening period and were in front 18-13 at the intermission.

The third quarter saw the Purple pick up 16 points with comparative ease to top the Tygers, 34-24, entering the closing canto. What happened to the Rossmen in the last chapter is hard to explain.

Turn on Heat
They tried to play a conservative game but the Tygers, with everything to gain and nothing to lose, turned on the heat and in the first two minutes of play reduced Fremont's lead to 34-31.

With the capacity house in an uproar, the two teams squared off for a battle to the finish. However, the lid seemed to be on the basket as far as Ross was concerned. Only two points filtered through the Purple meshes in the fourth period and those were dramatically registered by Shaw with 30 seconds left to play and Ross trailing, 36-34.

The regulation time ended with both clubs screaming frantically in mid-court. After Shaw's charity shot at the opening of the extra session, Shaw, Billy Jenkins and Dick Manahan had good cracks at the hoop but the ball failed to nestle anywhere near the business side of the basket. With the overtime four minutes old, Miller cut loose with his pay-off basket.

Tygers Lead

After Mansfield took a 6-2 lead in the first few minutes of the game, Manahan and Jack Carroll on a basket and free throw, respectively, whittled the count to 6-5. A free throw by big Center Beer, who collected 12 points for the victors, moved Mansfield ahead, 7-5. Then Gale Berger slapped in a fender and capped a gift shot to put Ross ahead, 8-7. Shaw arched in another, a few moments later to raise the Purple margin to 10-7. Before the first chapter ended, Shaw slipped in a gift shot and Berger banged in another two-pointer to give the Gaismen a 13-7 margin.

Big Beer dropped a pair of charity tosses to start the second period, but Berger batted in a rebound to keep Ross ahead, 15-8. After Bill Herpich sank a long shot for Mansfield, Shaw countered with a gift throw. Beer jumped in another free throw for the Tygers, leaving them behind, 16-12. Jenkins broke in for a short shot and Jack Shiplet scored a free throw for Mansfield as the half ended with Ross in front, 18-13.

Six-Point Sprint
After Miller arched in a basket to start the second half Manahan crashed in for a two-pointer. Miller retaliated with another bucket, leaving Ross in front, 20-17. Then Ross exploded for six points within a minute and a half as Shaw hooked in a pair of shots that failed to touch the rim and Ruland looped one in from the side. But a basket by Shiplet and two free throws by Beer put Mansfield behind only, 26-21.

Shaw drove in for a neat basket and a moment later added a free throw to widen the Ross margin to 29-21. After Don Rose showed in a fender for the Tygers, Shaw Shaw tipped in a follow-up shot and swished in another gift shot to make the Ross advantage 32-23. Shiplet tallied a free throw and Jenkins slipped in a fender to give the Purple a 34-24 lead as the third quarter ended.

In the fourth quarter Mansfield waxed extremely hot. Miller made a fender, Rose dropped in a free throw, Miller swished in another basket and Shiplet bounced in a two-pointer to leave Mansfield behind only 34-31 with only two minutes of the fourth chapter transpired.

Berger Lost on Fouls
Beer dropped in a fender to leave Mansfield behind only 34-33. Berger fouled Rose and went out of the game on four transgressions. Rose missed the gift shot and the struggle went on until only two minutes remained. Then Beer,

isolated in a gift shot to knot the count at 34-31.

Shiplet crashed in for a fender with a minute remaining to apparently sew up the game for the Tygers. But Shaw flipped in a hook shot with 30 seconds to play, knotting the score at 36-36 and that's the way the regulation time ended.

After Shaw looped in a charity shot at the opening of the overtime, Mansfield took the ball out of bounds twice on fouls by Carroll and Ruland, the latter's being his fourth, removing him from the contest. Bob Hall took Ruland's place. Again Mansfield was fouled this time by Shaw. The Tygers for the third time took the ball out of bounds and a quick race in to Miller resulted in the game-winning basket.

Beer, 235-pound Mansfield pivot threat, drew three personals in the first half and then played the entire second half without a foul being called against him. If he had been chased, a Purple victory would have been inevitable. The Tygers Saturday night play Bellevue, which downed Ashland 36-28 last night in the other semi-final game.
