TWO FREMONT DIVERS COMPETE . . .

Talbot Of Giants Qualifies In Swimming; Mooney Of Ross, Shaull Of Clyde In Mat Semis

Three Fremont Ross boys remain in contention in the state swimming meet and one from Ross and another from Clyde enter the state wrestling semifinals this afternoon at Columbus.

Jack Talbot of Ross placed fifth in the qualifying round of the swimming meet Friday in the 100-yard backstroke event. Best qualifying time was 1:01. Talbot's best time this year is 1:02 flat. He placed sixth in last year's finals to pick up one point for the Little Giants.

Dave Serwin and Jim Kaufman, third and fourth place finishers in the district, competed this morning in the diving preliminaries.

In state wrestling, Jim Mooney, 120 - pound Ross wrestler and Charles Shaull, 112-pound Clyde matman, will be trying this afternoon to advance to tonight's finals of state wrestling.

If either lose this afternoon, they will still compete at night for third or fourth place.

Mooney decisioned Pyros of Lakewood 7-1 Friday afternoon and decisioned Condon of Euclid 7-3 Friday night.

Shaull decisioned both his afternoon and night foes Friday by the same 4-1 margin.

All of the other district qualifiers from the Fremont event including all of champion Huron's grapplers were eliminated either in Friday afternoon initial bouts or in the evening. Sandusky lost all its boys as did Fostoria.

Tim Weltin, 138-pounder from Fremont St. Joe, was pinned in his first match by Brown of Euclid.

Ruben Rendon of Ross was pinned in the afternoon by Ford of Ravenna township in the 133-pound division.

Neil Fausey of Ross, 138-pounder, lost his afternoon match on a decision to Colph of Canton Timken.

Jeff Pump and Bernie Walden of Clyde both lost opening bouts. Cliff Perrin of Clyde, 154-pound

division, won his match by pinning Catterwood of Eastlake North. He narrowly missed advancing to today's semifinals and possibly the finals when he dropped an overtime decision Friday night to Mike Holman of Columbus Franklin Heights.

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Canton McKinley swimmers set three records Friday as they took five first places in preliminary events of the 33rd annual Ohio high school swimming and diving championships at Ohio State University's natatorium.

The defending champions also placed in three of the nine other events.

Richard Frederick of Canton set a new mark as he took first in the 50-yard freestyle in 23 seconds flat. The old mark of :23.1 was set by Oldham of Cincinnati St. Xavier in 1957.

Canton's Marty Mull splashed to a :50.9 victory in the 100-yard freestyle event, bettering the :51.3 mark of Canton's Jack Foster in 1958.

Mull, holder of a national record in the 200-yard individual medley, topped the same event here in 2:10.4.

The defending champs also eclipsed their own 1956 record of 1:35.3 in the 200-yard freestyle relay, taking it in 1:35.2.

There were no diving events Friday.

Jim Mooney Of Ross State 120-Pound Mat Champion

Fremont Ross has a state wrestling champion in the 120-pound weight division.

Jim Mooney, a senior, went all the way to top honors this season, his first as a varsity wrestler.

Mooney won four matches in the state tourney at Columbus, two on Friday by decision, a semifinal match Saturday afternoon by decision and his championship match Saturday night, also by decision.

Clyde Boy Fourth

Charles Shaull of Clyde won

fourth place in the state 112-pound division. Mooney and Shaull were the only two wrestlers who performed in the Fremont District wrestling meet who placed in the state.

Mooney was on the Ross high swimming team two years ago. He didn't participate in winter sports last year.

"Mooney came a long way this season," Head Ross Wrestling Coach Mal Mackey said. "He started from scratch as a be-

ginner, worked hard and improved as the season progressed. He lost a couple of early season matches and also once in a tournament but the rest of the year he was unbeatable."

Mackey said Mooney wrestled consistently well throughout all four matches in the state.

Proud of Him

"I'm real proud of him as are his teammates," Mackey commented. "He caught the fancy of the crowd and they pulled for him in his final two matches."

Mooney won the 120-pound division in an invitational at Worthington this year, won in the District and then in the state.

In the afternoon semifinals, Mooney beat last year's defending 112-pound state champ from Bridgeport. The Bridgeport boy had moved up to the higher 120-pound weight this season.

Championship match saw Mooney decision Ray Steely of Garfield Heights, team winner of the state wrestling championships.

Shaull of Clyde lost to Jeff Jones of Martins Ferry in the 112-pound consolation finals Saturday night.

Mooney was a happy boy after winning the championship.

"He grinned from ear-to-ear after picking up the first place trophy," Mackey said.

McKinley Garfield Heights Win

Ohio Swimming, Wrestling Honors

COLUMBUS, Ohio (AP)—Canton McKinley and Garfield Heights are the new state high school swimming and wrestling champions, respectively.

Canton's swimmers splashed to their fifth straight crown, and their 12th in 33 years, by piling up a new team high of 60 points in Saturday's championship finale here. Lakewood was second with 28 points and Upper Arlington third with 26.

At the same time, Garfield Heights replaced Bridgeport as wrestling champion by gathering 57 points, eight more than runnerup Maple Heights. Bridgeport finished third in a tie with Cleveland John Marshall, at 32 points.

Canton's Marty Mull broke two

Behind the top three finishers in the swimming and diving championships were Kent State with 20 points, Warren with 19, Cleveland Heights 18½, Lima 18, Sandusky 14, Cincinnati Walnut Hills 13, Cincinnati Withrow 9, Cincinnati Woodward 8½, Cleveland Shaw 5, Bexley, Fremont Ross and Cincinnati Hughes 4, Berea, Cuyahoga Falls and Massillon 3, and Euclid and Shaker Heights 2.

Behind the top three in the wrestling championships were Toledo Rogers and Martins Ferry with 24 points, Whitehall with 23, Lakewood 20, Euclid 18, Eastlake North 15, Canton McKinley and Parma 14, Mayfield Heights, Fremont Ross and Shaker
