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Little Giants face Perkins at Ashland College tonight

It's that time of year when an old favorite basketball cliche starts to make another appearance.

The cliche? It goes like this: "We've played the whole season this way and we aren't going to change anything now for the tournament."

That's usually true. The coaches don't change anything but tournament time invokes new feelings into the bones of the players and the coaches. Adrenalin flows that they never knew they possessed. In short, things happen at tournament time that usually never occur during the season and those happenings fall under the title of the "unexpected."

Fremont Ross and Sandusky Perkins get to test the world of the unexpected at Ashland college tonight. At approximately 9 p.m., the two Class AAA schools will square off in the second game of the Ashland Sectional Tournament.

Perkins, a member of the Sandusky Bay Conference, was a Class AA school last year but by this year, nudged into the Class AAA bracket by virtue of having 406 boys in the high school . . . just the amount that classifies them as a large school. One less and they would have been a AA school again this year.

"I don't think not playing any triple-A schools will have an effect on my kids," Perkins coach Paul Yocum said. "We have several schools on the schedule that are comparable to triple-A. One in particular is Margaretta who has a front line of 6-7, 6-6, and 6-5."

Yocum continued, "My kids realize that you can only put five kids on the floor at one time, the same as the other team."

Perkins won four of those five with the only loss, a 59-57, squeaker at the hands of Sandusky St. Mary's.

What's it going to take for his team to upset Ross, a

pre-game favorite despite having a 9-9 record as compared to Perkins' 11-7?

"Well, we're going to have to play a pretty darn good ball game, first of all," Yocum laughed. He added to that by saying "We are going to have to do an exceptional job on the boards. We have to keep Celek (Mark) and Oberholtzer (Neal) off of the boards."

Defensively, Yocum hinted that he likes to use a man to man but Ross coach Ken Miller does not expect that type of defensive alignment out of Perkins.

"We are guessing that they are going to be playing a tight zone and a deliberate type of offense against us," Miller said.

The veteran Ross coach qualified that last statement by saying, "We told the kids the other night that whenever you prepare for a team in regards to the type of offense they will use and the defense, it's purely a guessing game."

When asked about how emotions are expected to run because of Perkins' underdog role, Miller said, "We expect them to be 'up' for us emotionally because of the tourney game and it being their first time in the triple-A tourney."

As for lineups, Yocum will probably go with 6-3 Tim Bertch, a senior at center with a 12.1 average. At one forward will be Craig Norman, a 6-2 junior, and the son of former Ross head basketball coach Dick Norman, who is now the athletic director at Perkins. Norman is the team's leading scorer with a 12.4 average.

The other forward will be Jim Smith, 6-3, and the owner of a 10.7 scoring norm. The guards will be Willie Matthews, 5-10 senior with a 8.4 average, and 5-10 junior Dave Koch, who has a 5.8 average.

Ross will counter with 6-5 Neal Oberholtzer (14.2) and 6-2 Bob Ford (12.4) at the forwards with 6-8 Mark Celek (4.6) at center. The guards will be 6-3 senior Kevin Smith (5.2) and 6-0 Jim Flower, a senior, with a 4.9 average.

Regionals for Galion?

Tigers nip Little Giants in sectional, 61-60

ASHLAND — Ross lost a heartbreaker to Galion, 61-60, in the Ashland Class AAA Sectional Basketball Tournament, and with it, a chance to go farther in a state tournament. "I think Ross has ever had a team feel the way we feel that if we had gotten by Galion, we could have made it to the regionals," Ross coach Ken Miller said Sunday afternoon, the day after his team had lost by the narrowest of margins.

"Right now, I say Galion will make it to the regionals."

Miller's hopes went up in smoke with 2:14 to play when Mike Nicholls hit an 18-foot jumper from the left side to put Galion up, 61-60. Miller had watched his team race to a 36-25 lead late in the first half only to hold a 36-30 lead at the half.

But still the hope for what would have been termed an upset against the tournament's top seeded team was dashed with seven seconds to go.

Ross actually had two chances in the last 17 seconds to pull the game out of the fire. With Galion coach Jim Kirk ordering his team into a stalling offense with two minutes to play, Ross was forced to either shoot or go all out for a foul. The latter was true with Galion's Chuck Fahrbach taking the ball away from Galion's Bill Fox. Fahrbach immediately fouled Fox.

Ross called time out at that moment with seven seconds left to play. Fahrbach fired the ball to Kevin Smith who snaked his way downcourt, fired up an 18 footer that bounced off the rim and into the hands of Galion's Bill Fox. Fahrbach immediately fouled Fox.

Miller was asked if he had wanted a time-out earlier after the Fahrbach steal.

"No," he said, and added an explanation. "It was a matter of judgment at that point. I felt that they would be scrapping if we did make a steal just like we were. In that case we would have a better chance to get off a shot."

"If we missed then we could have a shot at the rebound or a quick foul. As it happened, the latter was true."

Miller called a time-out to give Fox a chance to think about the charging toss at the seven-second mark.

The extra thinking worked as Fox missed and Fahrbach grabbed the rebound, whistled a pass to Ford who got the ball downcourt but was immediately double teamed.

Ford, who scored 26 points in the game, managed to shoot a three to Smith with two seconds to go. Smith put up the shot but Galion's Jeff Fischer got a hand on the ball to partially block the shot and dash Ross' hopes.

Miller explained his thinking about the regional after rehashing the last seconds of the game.

"I felt that over the last six weeks we were twice as good a team as we had ever been and that was simply caused because we were more physical," he said.

"I think the way we played, we made Galion look bad but they are not a bad team," the Ross mentor said. "I think that by playing us and getting by us, Galion can go on and show just how good they really are."

As for Kirk, he was busy breathing big sighs of relief over the one-point win.

"I knew we were in for a good game . . . but that was too close. That Ford really hurt us," Kirk said.

But Kirk was philosophical about the close, the press.

"We had to have those eight points that we were down at the start of the second half and we knew the press was giving Ross trouble so we put it back on and it got us those points."

Those eight points that Kirk referred to came in the first four minutes of the third period. Ross was leading 38-30 on Smith's bucket 45 seconds into the period but the momentum started to swing toward Galion at that point.

Capitalizing on four straight Ross turnovers, the Tigers took the lead on Nicholls' bucket at the 4:15 mark, 40-38.

Ross came back in the final period to take a 52-47 lead but Galion came back to beat Little Giants, 10-2, from 6:42 to 4:15 to end the game with a 57-54 lead.

"We lost our poise for a couple of minutes," Miller said. "You know when a team throws one way against a press, it sometimes affects you like that."

Ross took the lead for the final time at 60-59 on four straight points by Neil Oberholzer and Ford. That led Galion with 2:26 to play. Nicholls hit his shot 12 seconds later to win it for the Tigers.

Miller summed up his feeling about the season-ending defeat.

"I have no complaints — anytime kids play that hard, you cannot say anything but good things about them. I'm sure they feel badly about losing but they never gave up and they have nothing to be ashamed about."

Ford's 26 led all scorers with Oberholzer adding 13 for Ross. Fox had 18, Fischer, 16, and Nichols, 10 (all in the second half) to lead Galion. Ford and Jim Flower held Galion's high scorer, Chuck Roser to nine points.
