Little Giant Opponent

Mansfield Dumped Ross Twice In '69

Fremont Ross will have plenty of incentive when it opens the Buckeye Conference basketball grind at Mansfield Friday.

The Little Giants, who bowed to Fostoria, 66-54, in the opener last Saturday have only bad memories concerning last year's two encounters with Mansfield.

In the first game at Mansfield, Ross dropped a 57-52 verdict. Ross led in the contest entering the final period but was out-scored 15-4 in the final eight minutes.

The Little Giants also had the lead in the second game before dropping a 55-53 decision. Ross held a 42-37 advantage after three quarters.

Those two victories helped the Tygers gain a share of the Buckeye Conference championship with Elyria.

First-year coach Vic Pfizenmayer relies on a lineup that features an All-Buckeye Conference selection from 1969-70, Jim Barnett. Barnett is the leading offensive threat for the Tygers. He bucketed 16 points for the Tygers in their lopsided opening night victory, 60-45, at Clear Fork last Saturday.

Joining Barnett in the starting five are Rob Arnett, Henry Harris, Ned Cameron and Keith Shulko.

"Mansfield has good overall size," Ross head coach Alex Clark said Wednesday. "Every one of their starters is 6-0 or better. Their center (Shulko) is only 6-3 but he weighs 230."

Barnett is 6-0 and the other three starters are 6-1.

"Mansfield will run the same type of offense as last season," Clark said. "Their fellows like to take the 20-foot jump shot if they are open. Next to Barnett, Harris is the leading shooter. Last year Barnett played forward, but he's at guard this year. He's also their best ball handler. He was the only under classman named to the Buckeye Conference team last season."

For reserve help the Tygers rely on Bob Myers and Dave Burley. Myers lettered last season.

"This will be a big game for our boys," Clark said. "It's the start of the Buckeye and our kids remember what happened last year. They also want to prove they are a better club than they showed last week against Fostoria."

"We have to eliminate the errors we had last week. We haven't put in anything new in practice this week. All of the time has been devoted to working on our mistakes."

"I'm hoping that many of the mistakes against Fostoria were just first-game jitters."

Clark intends to start the same lineup that opened against Fostoria. Junior Chuck Celek will be at the center post, John Lewis and Denny Shearon at forward and Dave Kridler and Steve Smith at guard.

The head coach has been pleased with the improvement shown by second stringers in practice this week.

"The kids who were out for football and didn't start practice until late are coming around," Clark said. "Each night our bench gets stronger and stronger. Tom Liggins and Bob Brudzinski did a good job at Fostoria and Mike Feasel has shown a tremendous amount of improvement in practice."

Ross High Cagers Fall In Buckeye Conference Opener

Two Red Hot Tygers Spoil Little Giant Effort

MANSFIELD — A pair of hot-shooting Mansfield Tygers combined with a cool Ross high hand at the foul line to sink the Little Giants in their Buckeye Conference opener at Mansfield Friday night.

Jim Barnett and Henry Harris were red hot from the field and the foul line and the Ross high Little Giants were nearly ice cold at the foul line as Mansfield posted a 67-40 victory in the Buckeye Conference inaugural for both teams.

Barnett and Harris combined to hit on 19 of 33 field goal attempts and 11 of 11 free throw tries to contribute in a total of 46 points to the Mansfield cause. Barnett, a 6'6" senior guard, who was second team All-Buckeye Conference in 1969-70, connected on nine of 16 field goal attempts and dumped in six of six free throw tries.

Harris, a 6'11" senior forward, made good on ten of 17 field goal tries and five of five free throw attempts. Both Harris and Barnett hit consistently from long range, as Barnett did not take a shot inside the three-second lane and Harris sank only two shots in that area.

"I thought we were doing a good job of covering him," Ross high head coach Alex Clark said of Barnett, "but he was really hitting them."

"Our foul shooting was the big thing though," Clark said.

The Little Giants converted on only 16 of 29 free throw attempts, missing the first try in several one-and-one situations. "We had been shooting 70 per cent plus in foul shots in preseason games and even last week, so this was surprising," said Clark.

Even with the hot shooting of Barnett and Harris and their own cold shooting at the foul line, the Little Giants, led by John Lewis stayed with the host Tygers all the way.

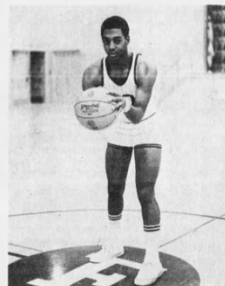
Ross led throughout most of the first period, which ended in a 13-13 tie. Mansfield moved to a slim 30-27 halftime margin and then opened a substantial margin early in the third. Ross went from three down to 11 down early in that period, but the Little Giants refused to quit.

Ross battled back to within five points of the lead on a number of occasions, but never could cut the margin any further.

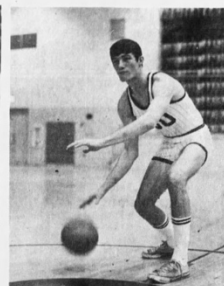
Lewis was the big man for the Little Giants. He pumped in nine field goals and five free throws for a total of 23 points. Dave Kridler scored 14 points on four field goals and six free throws and Denny Shearon added ten points on four field goals and two free throws. Shearon also was the game's leading rebounder with ten.

The Little Giants, now 0-2 for the season, host Marion in a Buckeye Conference battle next Friday and host Toledo Rogers in an independent clash Saturday.

Ross high's reserve squad gave the locals a split for the evening. The Little Giant reserves held Mansfield to just one point in the first quarter and posted a 35 to 28 victory. The string reserves led 20-9 at the half and 28-15 at the end of three periods.

Ross Cage Boss Sees Progress

MANSFIELD — Ross high head basketball coach Alex Clark was disappointed after his Little Giant cagers dropped their second straight of the season at Mansfield Friday night, but he was pleased with the progress that was shown by the Ross performance.

"I felt we could beat them tonight," Clark said after the contest, but he pointed to the red hot night experienced by Henry Harris and Jim Barnett of the Tygers. "I sure didn't expect that."

"Overall our defense was much better than last week," the Ross cage coach said, adding that at times the Little Giants were "Not reacting to the situation quick enough."

"The scoring balance was good," Clark said, pointing out that John Lewis, Dave Kridler and Denny Shearon all were in double figures. "And Steve Smith had a couple of key buckets for us in the second quarter."

"I think all the kids played a pretty fair game. John (Lewis) started scoring, which made a big difference. Shearon did a good job on the boards and scoring. Dave (Kridler) did a good job directing the offense and trying to hold Barnett. He came up to me after the game and asked that he could have to stop him (Barnett) and I had to tell him I didn't know. (Bob Brudzinski did a good job as a replacement for (Chuck) Celek. Celek got in foul trouble early in the contest."

"Our ball handling was considerably improved," Clark added. The Little Giants reduced their turnover total from 28 against Fortoria last Friday to eight this week.

In other games around the Buckeye Conference Friday night, Elyria, Sandusky and Findlay all posted victories. Findlay blasted Lorain 60-44 with Steve Wenner pouring in 35 points; Sandusky dumped Marion, 65-31, with Scott May pumping in 27 points and Elyria finding Admiral King 61-44, with Ron Becker hitting for 20 counters.

Defense Paces St. Joe To Victory Over Bears

In the modern day world of high scoring basketball the word defense is often forgotten. But the St. Joe Crimson Streaks demonstrated the value of that aspect of the game as they started the new season in the right direction with a 52-44 nonconference win over visiting Gibsonburg Friday night.

"I believe defense takes a year to learn and some of the things we worked on last year are beginning to take effect," head coach John Kahle said of his victorious Streaks Friday night.

"That defense... They've got a tough defense. They're right on there on you, really hawking," Gibsonburg senior Carl Assenheimer commented after his Golden Bears' late charge had fallen short of making up the difference provided by the Streaks defense.

What that defense did was to limit the Golden Bears to just 18 points in the first half and just 17 in the first three quarters.

"I told them (The Golden Bears) that St. Joe would play an aggressive defense, maybe they didn't realize just how good it would be," Assenheimer said. "I told them at half time that defense is the name of the game."

And, the Golden Bears certainly must have realized the value of defense then. Slowed to a near crawl by the St. Joe defense in the first half, Gibsonburg used a hustling defense of its own to give the Crimson Streaks a real scare before it was all over for the night. The Bears trailed 31-16 at the half and 43 to 37 at the end of the third quarter, but turned to a full court press to cut the gap to six points before falling 52-44.

"You've got to give Carl's kids credit. They came back well in the second half," Kahle offered. "His press did a good job against us in the last quarter."

The Streaks, however, led by junior Tim Shetzer, had built too big of a margin for the Bears to overcome. Shetzer, who was the games leading scorer, with 23 points was also one of the key factors in the defense. "Our guards," Kahle said referring to Shetzer, Bill Halm and Greg Kryder, "Played a fine defensive game."

But Kahle pointed to Mike Chudzinski, senior center, as the number one man in the defensive effort. His defensive job on Balsizer drew comments from Balsizer in the first half. "The Gibsonburg coach pointed out. 'They did a real fine job of jamming up the middle.'"

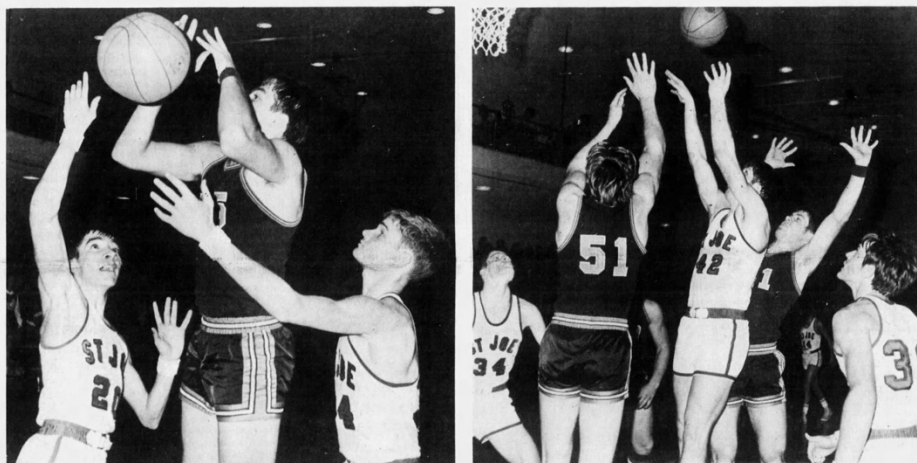
According to Kahle's figuring, Balsizer, who finished

the night with 17 points, managed just four of those off Chudzinski.

The big Gibsonburg center, however, really came to life in the fourth period and spearheaded the Golden Bears' late rally.

St. Joe stayed in an aggressive man-to-man defense throughout the ball game and allowed the Golden Bears just 12 field goals for the 32 minutes of action. The Streaks attacked the offense of the Bears, rather than waiting for Gibsonburg to come to them with the ball and the effort paid off.

The Crimson Streak reserves, displaying a polished fast break and a stingy defense of their own, registered a 50-21 victory over the Gibsonburg reserves in the preliminary event. Jerry Yeager with 16 points and John Barrington with 12 paced the St. Joe attack.

Shetzer Wins Victory Trophy

It's early in the season, but Tim Shetzer carried a trophy home with him already Friday. Shetzer banged home eight of 13 field goal attempts and seven of nine free throw tries to lead all scorers with 23 points. He also hauled down six rebounds and played a big game on defense.

The player who does the most to help the team to victory each week gets to keep the trophy for one week. If any cager should be named to the honor ten times during the season, he gets to keep the trophy permanently. If the Streaks lose, no one gets the trophy.

"He was tough," Gibsonburg coach Carl Assenheimer said of Shetzer after the contest. "He hit a couple early and got his confidence." According to St. Joe's head coach John Kahle's figures, Shetzer earned his first four field goal attempts without a miss.

"He did a nice job," Kahle said of Shetzer after the game, but while he was anxious to praise the young guard — "He's got all the tools"—he preferred to spread the credit around to all the members of the St. Joe squad. The Streaks' coach pointed to Bill Halm for "A nice job of moving the team on offense." Dan Fey, who turned

Mark Mosser, Greg Miesle and Bill Kiser.

"One thing we have that we didn't have last year is that two or three guys can be off and we can still do the job," Kahle pointed out.

A tough zone defense held the Redskins to just nine points in the first period.

Lakota was paced by Bill Kreilick and Paul Wasserman, who combined for 35 of the 47 Raiders' points. Kreilick connected for eight field goals and six free throws for 22 points, while Wasserman came in for four field goals and five free throws for 15 points.

Scott Reitz with 18 points and John O'Brock with 14 paced the winners.

UCLA — put it all together, it spells another.

The No. 1-ranked Bruins, putting it all together again this year, opened defense of their national college basketball championship with an easy 108-77 victory over Baylor Friday night.

Talent-blessed UCLA, tracking its fifth straight NCAA crown with most of last year's cast back, trampled the Bears with a rascally offense led by ringleader Sidney Wicks.

"This is a better team than UCLA had in 1962, and that team had Gail Goodrich and Walt Hazzard," said Baylor Coach Hugh Meneffe. "This team has good outside shooting by the forwards and they are commanding under the boards."

UCLA Coach John Wooden wasn't playing the role of sure-fire winner.

"I just hope we can get over the jitters in the big games as we did tonight," said Wooden, who has molded six national champs in the last seven years.

California topped Arizona 87-79; Texas A&M toppled East Texas State 67-41; Creighton lashed Iowa 88-73; Georgia Tech ripped Georgia 97-88; George Washington ripped East Carolina 88-79; Memphis State outscored South Dakota 113-58 and Miami of Florida held off Lehigh 74-47 in other games.

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Ross Cagers Need Defensive Effort In Initial Home Engagement Friday

Fremont Ross basketball coach Alex Clark hopes the defense comes through this weekend when the Little Giants (0-2) entertain Marion in a Buckeye Conference clash Friday and Toledo Rogers in a non-league tilt Saturday.

"The defense must do a better job of keep the score down," Clark said Wednesday. "If we can get a good defensive effort I think the fans are going to see two fine teams."

Prior to the opening of the season Clark stated he wanted the Little Giants to limit their opponents to less than 50 points a game. That hasn't happened in the first two contests. Fostoria registered a 66-54 victory and Mansfield dumped the Little

Giants by a 67-60 count last Friday.

Both games were played on the road.

"We're anxious to play a game in our own gym," Clark said. "It's bound to make a difference. I know that in pre-season scrimmages we played a lot better on our home floor. The home crowd has to help us."

Marion enters the clash with a 2-2 record, but is 0-1 in Buckeye Conference play. Sandusky belted the Prexies, 62-51, last Friday. Marion bounced back, however, the following night with a 71-66 victory over a highly touted Marion Franklin squad from Columbus.

The Presidents use a starting lineup that consists of Preston

Owens and either Neil Shaffer or Jon Sissler at guard, Frank Gifford and Mike Roades at forward and Lee Gipson at center. Gipson stands 6-5. Roades and Gifford are 6-3 and 6-2, respectively. Owens stands 6-0 and Shaffer and Sissler are 5-10.

"They have fine height," Clark said. "Of the clubs we've faced so far this season, Marion has the best overall height. Offensively, they have fellows who can score from the outside and inside. We can't allow them to stand and shoot."

"Owens hits well from 20 feet. He's their most consistent scorer. Gifford can connect on the 15-foot jumper if he's left alone. Roades is a good shooter and has scored 21 in one game already this

season. Gipson has been inconsistent for them. One night he scored 25 and the next he got one."

Clark is planning to use the same lineup that has started the first two games. John Lewis, the leading scorer through two games with 36 points, will be joined by Denny Shearon at the forward slot. Chuck Celek jumps center and Dave Kridler and Steve Smith share the duty at guard.

Kridler is second to Lewis in scoring with 33 points through two games. Shearon has bucketed 19 points, Smith and Celek have nine and seven, respectively.

"Bob Brudzinski will probably see plenty of action, too," Clark

said. "He did a good job for us in the Mansfield game."

Tom Liggins and Mike Feasel have also been called off the bench in the first two games.

The Little Giants will play three of their next four games at home. After this weekend's two games, Ross journeys to Lorain Senior Friday, December 18. The following evening the Little Giants host Findlay, the pre-season favorite to snare all the laurels in the Buckeye Conference.

Other Buckeye games this week find Lorain at Sandusky, Mansfield at Admiral King and Elyria traveling to Findlay.

Gates for this weekend's games will open at 6:30 p.m. Tipoff time for the reserve game is 6:45 p.m.

Little Giants Nail Second Straight Win

It has been a long time coming—nearly five years—but Fremont Ross has finally put together back-to-back victories on the basketball court.

The Little Giants, who squeaked by Marion Harding, 59-58, Friday, rallied for a 59-56 victory over Toledo Rogers Saturday. The last time Ross took two consecutive victories was way back in the 1965-66 campaign when it put together three straight victories at the close of the season.

"I'm real pleased with the effort our kids gave out on that floor tonight," head coach Alvin Clark said as he accepted congratulations in the middle of the Ross locker room. "After the way our kids played last night (Friday) I thought they did a great job."

The fellows were tired. Friday's game took a lot out of them. Our defense wasn't as aggressive tonight but I think that's because the kids were tired.

Our philosophy on defense was to get position on Rogers, not go for the steal. It worked out pretty well. We did have a lapse in the second quarter and another near the end of the game."

Denny Shearns quipped the Little Giants offensively, scoring 17 points in the first three quarters. He added two more in the fourth period to finish as Ross' leading scorer. "This was undoubtedly Denny's best game in high school," Clark said. "I've coached him for three years and he has never looked better."

Ross held a 26-23 halftime lead thanks mostly to the work of Shearn who put the Little Giants in the front. He connected on six of eight field goal attempts in the first half while the rest of the squad combined to score on only five of 22 floor shots.

After missing his first shot, Shearn, a 6-2 junior, connected on his next six tries. Ross held a 16-4 advantage at the first rest stop. Shearns bucketed exactly half of the Ross total in the first period.

The Little Giants never trailed in the first 16 minutes. Their biggest lead was 11 points—23-12—with 3:38 remaining.

After intermission, Rogers outscored Ross, 6-1 in the first three minutes to move into a 29-27 lead. Ross continued to trail until Shearns harked in a six-footer with 1:41 left in the quarter to make it 33-24. John Lewis drove the lane 2 seconds later to put Ross up by three points.

Scott Wolff hit a charity toss to narrow the gap, but Shearns gave Ross a four point advantage with 36 seconds still left in the period. Ross still led by four points (41-37) after Wolff and Dan Kridler traded two pointers in the closing 28 seconds.

Rogers outscored Ross, 19-18, in the final period. But, the Rams never held the lead. The score was deadlocked at 43 and 41 before Ross took the jump ball in front for good.

Kridler put Ross in the driver's seat in a 1:12 second stretch. He drove the lane with 28 remaining in the game to give Ross a two point advantage. Five seconds later he connected on a technical foul and then the bustling center crashed in on both ends of a one-and-one to make it 53-47.

Rogers narrowed the gap to two on Joe Carroll's field goal and Rod Drew's free throw. Lewis, however, gave Ross a four point cushion when he hit from the side.

With 2:11 showing on the clock, Rogers again seized the margin to two (49-47) on a 18-foot jumper by Bob Riley. But, Kridler again came through when he connected from short range with 1:54 remaining.

After Kridler's field goal, Rogers turned the ball over. Ross' Bob Brudzinski was fouled, but he missed the first shot of a one-and-one. Wolff got the rebound and drove the length of the court to can a layup, and bring Rogers within two with 1:17 showing on the clock.

Kridler was fouled with 1:01 remaining as Rogers players tried to steal the ball. The 5-9 guard shot both ends of the one-and-one to again boost the margin to four points.

But Wolff wasn't ready to give up. He connected from 15-feet with 50 seconds remaining and Rogers was again within two.

Ross called time with 43 seconds remaining to plan its final strategy. Whatever was supposed to happen backfired, however, when the Little Giants turned the ball over and Rogers had one last chance to tie or even gain the victory.

Wolff shot from the side of the basket with 15 seconds remaining and it bounced off the rim. Brudzinski grabbed the most important rebound of the night for the Little Giants.

As Ross ran out the clock, sophomore guard Steve Smith was fouled. He made the first shot of a bonus situation with two seconds remaining to clinch the victory.

In that hectic fourth quarter, Kridler and Lewis combined for 15 of the 19 Little Giant markers. Kridler had nine of the points—two field goals and five charity tosses.

"All of the fellows kept plugging away in there," Clark said. "Dave and Joe came through when we needed them most. And, like in the Marion game the fellows I used as substitutes did a good job. I'm real pleased with the job Brudzinski, Mike Feasel and Tom Liggins did."

"Chuck Celest also came around. He had three field goals and they were all important buckets. He seems to be getting off his feet a lot better than before. All three of his field goals came on offensive rebounds."

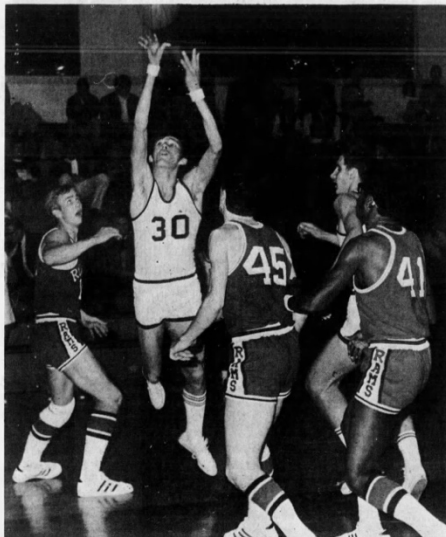
From the field, Ross made 22 of 56 attempts. The Little Giant shot a sizzling 78 per cent from the charity line, making 15 of 19.

"Offensively I was pleased," Clark said. "We were pretty consistent out there."

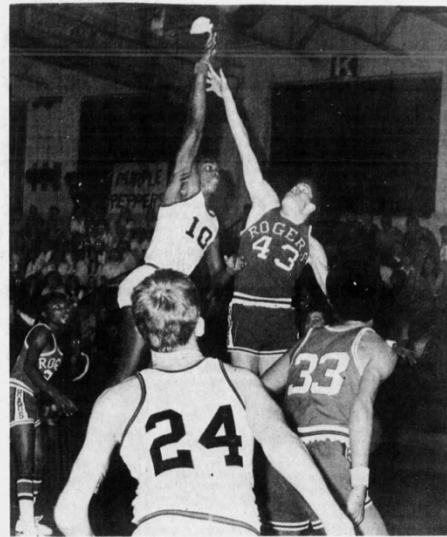
The Ross reserves out-scored Rogers, 12-2, in the fourth quarter to pull out a 57-33 victory.

Little Giant Cagers Have Busy Weekend

Ross' basketball team has two consecutive victories — the first time that has happened since the 1965-66 season — and the Little Giants will try to extend that string this weekend with victories over Lorain Senior and Findlay.

Friday head coach Alex Clark takes his squad to Lorain for a meeting with the Steelmen, who are still looking for their first Buckeye Conference victory.

The Little Giants return home Saturday to host Findlay, the team considered as the front-runner in the Buckeye Conference this season. The Trojans are currently 4-0.

"It's going to be a typical Buckeye Conference weekend — tough," Clark said Wednesday. "Lorain will be very hard to beat on their floor. Findlay is the best club I've seen in the Buckeye Conference in the last five years.

"But, we won't be looking ahead to the Findlay game. We are going to take them one at a time. We won't save anything Friday for Saturday. First we'll worry about Lorain. After that game we'll concentrate on Findlay."

Clark reports that last weekend's victories over Marion and Toledo Rogers have been a

big boost to the Little Giant cage program.

"It has provided an improved mental attitude," Clark says. "The fellows now know they can win. Several members of the team told me Saturday they wished they could play those first two games of the season over."

The second-year coach is contemplating one lineup change — inserting sophomore Bob Brudzinski in the place of another sophomore, Steve Smith.

"If we do put Bob in the lineup it will give us more height," Clark said. "But Steve will see plenty of playing time this weekend."

Brudzinski has tallied eight points in the first four games.

Leading the Ross scoring attack is senior forward John Lewis, who has scored 73 points, an 18.2 average. The rest of the starting five consists of Dave Kridler, Denny Shearon and Chuck Celek.

Kridler is second in scoring with 68 points. Shearon (50), Smith (16) and Celek (15) round out the top five scorers.

Shearon's the leading rebounder with 35. Lewis has pulled down 24 caroms. Celek and Brudzinski have each been credited with 23 rebounds.

Findlay Here Saturday

Foul Shooting Rockets Lorain Past Ross Cagers

LORAIN — Fremont Ross had two more field goals than Lorain Senior but couldn't match the Steelmen at the foul line as the hosts pulled out a 67-59 Buckeye Conference basketball victory Friday.

The loss snapped a Ross winning skein at two games and dropped the Little Giants' season log to 2-3. Lorain gained its first Buckeye Conference win and boosted its overall record to 4-2.

Ross will be seeking to return to the winning path Saturday when its hosts Findlay. The Trojans, considered by many as the team to beat in the Buckeye Conference this season, routed Sandusky, 69-50, Friday.

"Foul shooting was the big difference," Ross head coach Alex Clark said as he reviewed the loss to Lorain. "Lorain was 27-35 from the foul line. We made 15 of 27 shots.

"In the last quarter, we made four of 10 free throws. We missed the first shot in three one-and-one situations. Each time the game was tied. That really hurt us."

After three quarters, the Little Giants trailed by one point, 44-43. Lorain took a two-point lead at the start of the final quarter on a free throw by Jack Stephenson, but Ross' John Lewis came back moments later with a field goal to knot the contest.

The game was then tied at 47, 49, 51, 53, 57 and 59 before Lorain went ahead for good.

A bucket by Lewis with 1:00 remaining tied the game at 59, but Lorain went ahead 61-59 on Jim Stringfellow's field goal. Brad Frank, who shared game scoring honors with Lewis, added two more points to the Lorain total with 34 seconds remaining when he canned two free throws.

Two more free throws by Phil Craig with 20 seconds remaining boosted the Lorain margin to six points. Craig then got the final two points on a field goal with two seconds remaining in the contest.

In those final eight minutes, Ross had six field goals compared to Lorain's five. But, the Steelmen made good on 13 of 13 free throws. Franks connected for 10 of that total, all in bonus situations.

"We hurt ourselves," Clark lamented. "A couple of those fouls we committed were silly. Several times we fouled Franks after he had taken a rebound."

Ross led at the quarter, 15-14, as Lewis hit for seven points. But Lorain opened the second quarter with eight straight markers to take a 23-15 lead. The Steelmen maintained that margin the rest of the period and went to the dressing room at intermission with a 34-26 advantage.

"Our defense in the second quarter was terrible," Clark commented. "We weren't hustling at all. We picked up seven fouls in that quarter and nearly every one of them was because we weren't hustling."

"In the second half our defense was good in general. But three or four times we didn't hustle and they got a cheap basket on us."

Lewis finished the night as the leading Ross scorer with 30 points. Clark, however, was displeased with the offensive performance of the rest of the squad.

"We got out of character," Clark said. "John was hot and the other fellows kept feeding them. That isn't the way our offense is supposed to work. If one man does all the shooting the rest of the fellows tend to stand around. We were depending too much on John tonight. Most of John's shots were good ones, however.

"I was real pleased with our floor game. We had only seven turnovers compared to 12 for Lorain. That's the best we've done all year."

Clark singled out junior center Chuck Celek for his performance in the losing effort.

"Celek played a real good game," Clark said. "In overall performance I was pleased more with Chuck than anybody else. He's moving around a little better under the boards and getting some key rebounds. He played the best game of anyone on our team.

"Tom Liggins and Steve Smith also did a good job coming off the bench for Denny Shearon."

Shearon, the leading rebounder for the Little Giants and third leading scorer, was in foul trouble most of the night. In fact, he picked up his fourth of the game with 31 seconds remaining in the second quarter. Shearon, after sitting out most of the third quarter, fouled out with 6:16 left in the game.

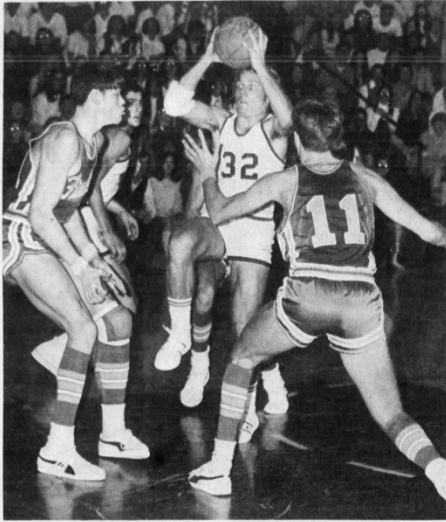
Lorain won the reserve game, 50-42.

Ken Brooks didn't get a chance to play in Ross High's gym as a sophomore last season.

But, Findlay's 6-1 guard more than made up for his 1969-70 absence when the Trojans invaded Saturday.

Brooks swished the nets for 25 points including 14 in the last eight minutes as Findlay remained unbeaten with a 61-54 Buckeye Conference victory.

It wasn't easy for the Trojans, however. Findlay never trailed but its biggest lead was only 11 points. Most of the night the host Little Giants were within striking distance for pulling off the first major upset in the Buckeye.

"We didn't play well tonight," Findlay's personable head coach John Stotich said after the game. "Their (Fremont's) kids set the tempo of the game and our fellows followed."

"I think our game last night (Friday) with Sandusky had a lot to do with our play tonight. That game was really physical. Every time a whistle blew and sometimes when one didn't there were bodies on the floor."

Ross head coach Alex Clark agreed that his Little Giants had command of the contest.

"I think we played the better game," Clark said later. "I thought our pressure defense bothered them. But give Findlay credit. They had a bad night and still won on the road. That is the difference between a superior and good ball team."

With their all-state candidate Steve Wenner hobbled by a knee injury, Brooks, who broke his arm against Ross at Findlay last season, took over the offensive chores for the Trojans. Ross trailed by only three markers (39-36) entering the last quarter. But, that is when the 6-1 rebound caught fire.

Brooks connected on three straight field goals at the start of the period to put Findlay in front 45-36. Wenner added two free throws before Ross denied the columns on a field goal by Steve Smith and two charity tosses by John Lewis, who was the leading Ross scorer with 17.

After Brooks connected for two free throws, Ross moved within five points on buckets by Denny Shearon and Dave Kridler. Brooks connected from 20 feet before Shearon hit from the corner to make it 51-46 with 1:54 remaining.

Brooks scored again at the 1:43 mark but Lewis brought Ross back to its five-point deficit with two free throws.

But John Arnold's two free throws and a three-point play by Terry Moore with 1:05 remaining iced the victory.

"That Brooks is tough," Clark said, "he really came alive in the last quarter. We couldn't stop him."

In the eight-minute span, Brooks hit on five of six field goal attempts. He added four free throws to that total. For the night, he was nine of 15 from the field and perfect at the charity line—five of five.

Chuck Rogers also contributed heavily to the Trojan cause. A 6-5, 210-pound junior Rogers bucketed 15 points, hitting six of 10 shots from the field and three of three at the charity line.

Wenner, who had been averaging in the neighborhood of 28 points per game, was held to six points. He hit one of seven shots from the field and four of five at the charity stripe.

"Steve was hurting," Stotich said. "His knee hit the floor in the Sandusky game and it's slightly bruised. He's a fine ball player. He broke Dave Sorenson's rebounding record against Sandusky. That's doing something when you consider he was battling with Scott May."

"Brooks is the best shooter we have. Outside of the Toledo Scott game, however, this is the roughest game we've been in so far. Ross was ready for it. It has been like this every time we've played Ft. Ross since Alex took over. He had those kids ready."

Lewis and Kridler are real tough. Those two fellows have unorthodox shots but put the ball in the hoop."

Baskets by Jeff Hochstetler and Brooks gave the Trojans a 4-0 lead at the start. The biggest lead for the

visitors in the period was seven points (14-7) following consecutive buckets by Rogers and Arnold.

Ross, however, narrowed the gap on a layup by Kridler, foul shot by Lewis, two more free throws by Shearon and Brudanski's charity toss. A basket by Brooks with 27 seconds remaining gave Findlay its 16-13 first quarter advantage.

In the second quarter, the Trojans held a 15-8 scoring edge. With 4:33 remaining Ross pulled within two points (22-20) on a bucket by Brudanski. But four straight field goals, two by Rogers, one by Arnold and another by Brooks and two free throws by Rogers put the Trojans in front, 30-8.

It was Ross' turn to hold the scoring edge in the third quarter. The Little Giants out-scored Findlay, 14-8, as Kridler led the way with eight points. Shearon, John Lewis and Celek also had field goals in the spree.

"Findlay is a very fine ball club," Clark said. "Brooks and Rogers hurt you from the outside and Wenner does an excellent job for them inside."

"I was real pleased with our effort. The only thing wrong is that we came out on the short end of the score. We did a real good job on defense. A few times in the second quarter we gave up cheap baskets, but it wasn't often."

"Findlay got a couple of key scores when they scored from our weak side that is because our fellow wasn't in position to cover. We work on that a lot, but it's something that needs to come naturally."

"In the fourth quarter when we had trouble scoring we were taking too long to set up offense."

Kridler and Shearon followed Lewis in the scoring column with 15 and 12 points, respectively. The Little Giants canned 21 of 56 field goal attempts and were 12-19 at the foul line.

Findlay came within one shot of a perfect night at the charity stripe. The Trojans made 17 of 18 attempts. From the field, the Trojans made 22 of 46 shots.

The Trojans also took the reserve contest, 48-33.

Can Little Giants Snap Road Jinx?

Fremont Ross, which has had no success on the road in basketball tilts so far this season, will try again Wednesday.

The Little Giants are slated to play at Sandusky in a Buckeye Conference matchup. Ross is currently 2-4. Sandusky has a 4-1 mark. In Buckeye play, Ross is 1-3. Sandusky has posted a 3-1 mark in loop action.

Ross has played three road tilts, losing to Fostoria, Mansfield and Lorain Senior. The other loss came at home against Findlay. The Little Giants' two victories also came at home. Marion and Toledo Rogers bowed in the North Street gymnasium.

Sandusky has beaten Marion Harding, Willard, Lorain and Elyria. Findlay is the only team that has beaten the Blue Streaks.

Coach Bob Beachy starts a quintet that includes Jerome Augustus (5-8), Ben Chapman (5-10), Mark Deming (6-1), Barry

Glass (6-2) and Scott May (6-5).

"This is a typical Sandusky team," Ross head coach Alex Clark said Tuesday. "They are very strong. They like to run the fast break any time they have the chance.

Clark is expected to start Dave Kridler and John Lewis at guard, Chuck Celek at center and Denny Shearon and Bob Brudzinski at forward.

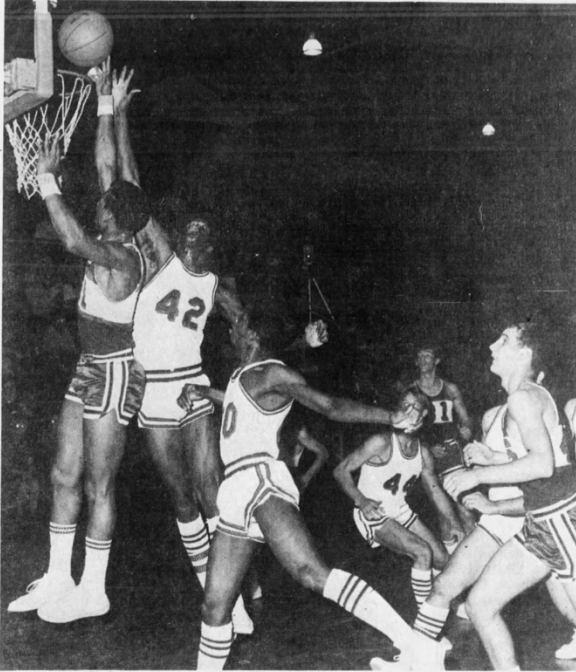

SANDUSKY — Scott May did his thing for Sandusky.

That didn't worry Ross high basketball coach Alex Clark. He expected the powerful Blue Streak junior was going to get his points one way or another.

Thus, the objective for Ross last night was to stop the rest of the Sandusky cagers. The Little Giants didn't accomplish their mission and were crunched 73-52 as the Blue Streaks rolled to their fifth victory in six outings.

Ross led 14-12 at the close of the first eight minutes. But, it was all downhill for the Little Giants after that. Sandusky ripped the nets for 21 points in the second quarter to take a 33-24 lead to the dressing room at halftime.

Ross continued to build its lead in the third period. In fact, midway through the frame the Little Giants scored 10 straight points to go in front by 24, 48-24.

"This is the complete opposite of what we did here last year — we probably played our worst game of the season here."

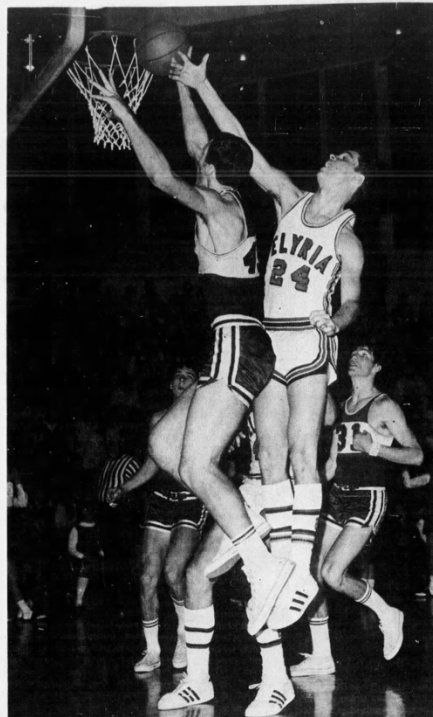
The highlight of last season was a stunning upset of Elyria early in the season.

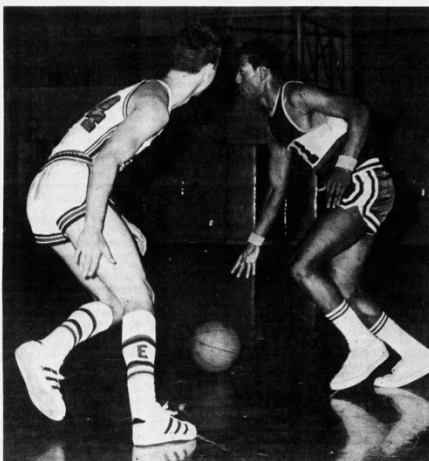

Little Giants Tangle With Admirals

Fremont Ross, after a nine-day layoff, returns to the Buckeye Conference basketball war when the Little Giants entertain Lorain Admiral King Friday.

Ross has a 3-5 overall mark and is 2-4 in the conference. In their last outing, the Little Giants stopped Elyria on the Pioneers' court, 73-52.

Admiral King is also 2-4 in conference play. The Admirals are 3-4 overall.

"Their record doesn't show much," Ross head coach Alex Clark said Wednesday. "Next to Findlay and Mansfield Admiral King probably has the best overall talent in the league.

"A lot has been said about Gary Deidrick — their main offensive threat, but Doug Taylor, Barry Prosak and Tim Kish can also be damaging."

Deidrick, the leading scorer in the Buckeye Conference, has a 28.6 average. Against Sandusky in a 94-90 Admiral King win, the 6-4 senior forward ripped the cords for 48 points. He tallied 35 against Lorain.

"He's an excellent outsider shooter — dangerous from 30 feet in," Clark said. "He's very fast and gets his shot off quickly. For his size he handles the ball well and can drive."

Taylor is the second leading scorer for coach Elmer Myers. The 6-1 senior guard is averaging slightly more than 14 points a contest.

Prosak (6-4) mans the center slot. He had eight offensive rebounds against Sandusky and put four of them back in the basket.

Kish broke his ankle in the first game of the season. Myers has said that Kish will see some action against Ross. Last

season as a junior Kish (6-3) led King in scoring with 365 points, a 17.4 average.

Doug Adams (6-0) and Jeff Hilko (5-10) are the starting guards. Adams has a 7.6 scoring average. Hilko is hitting for only 2.6 points a game. Both of the guards are juniors.

"We must have the same type of effort against Admiral King that we had against Elyria," Clark said. "They remind me a lot of Sandusky — when they get the opportunity they like to run. Admiral King plays best when it can run and shoot.

"We need to set up offensively. Admiral King doesn't like to play defense. If we run our offense it will bother them.

"If we continue to play like we did against Elyria it should be a good ball game. The key to our success must be how aggressive we are on offense and defense."

Clark intends to go with a starting lineup that includes Bob Brudzinski and Denny Shearon at forward, Chuck Celek at center and Dave Kridler and John Lewis at guard.

Lewis is the club's leading scorer with a 21 point per game average. Next in line are Kridler (14) and Shearon (11). Brudzinski and Celek each sport a four-point a game average. Shearon is the leading rebounder through the first eight games with 75. Brudzinski has pulled off 56 caroms.

For bench strength Clark can call on Tom Liggins, Mike Feasel and Steve Smith.

"I'm pleased with the job our bench has done so far," Clark said. "With those fellows in there we lose a little in height but don't lack for hustle and aggressiveness."

The visit of Admiral King marks the start of a three-game home stand for Ross. Mansfield visits on Friday, January 15, and Tiffin Columbian invades the following evening. The Little Giants play six times in January and four of the contests are slated for the home floor.

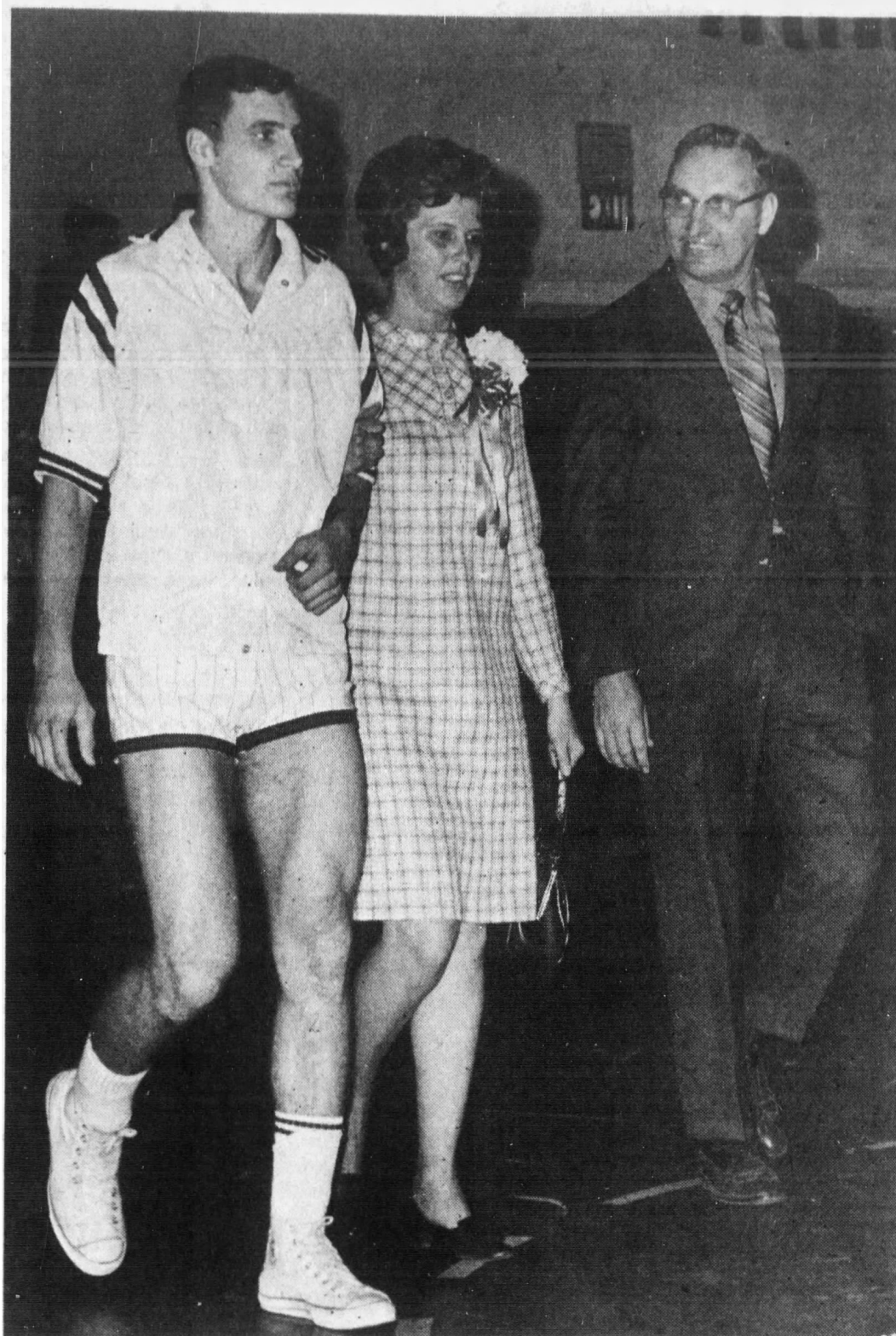

Ross Bids For Second Road Win

Fremont Ross will be gunning for its second road victory of the season at Marion Friday.

The Little Giants, who currently show a 1-4 mark for road activity, won't have an easy time with the Presidents, who are 3-5 in Buckeye Conference play and 5-6 overall.

"Marion has come a long way since we beat them in overtime," Ross head coach Alex Clark said Wednesday. "I understand they had a very fine effort against Sandusky last week.

"It's going to be a real problem trying to beat them on their floor. I believe Marion and Findlay have the biggest home court advantage of any of the schools in the Buckeye Conference. Their fans really make it rough on the visiting team."

Besides the fans, the Little Giants also must be concerned with an improving group of basketball players.

"They have five fellows who score well," Clark said. "We won't be able to concentrate on just one or two individuals.

"We must get plenty of movement on defense, Marion has an offense that creates movement. We also want to force them to take more shots than they did against us last time. They shot only 48 times and hit 57 per cent.

"Offensively we also must have more movement than we've had in the last two games. To try and get that movement we'll probably do some fast-breaking. We didn't have one fast break in the second half against Mansfield last Friday."

The Little Giants will continue to field a lineup that consists of Dave Kridler and John Lewis at guard. Denny Shearon and Bob Brudzinski at forward and Chuck Celek at center.

Through the first 11 games Lewis is the leading scorer with 218 points. Kridler has pushed 154 through the nets. Shearon (118), Brudzinski (59) and Celek (49) follow.

Shearon has pulled off 95 rebounds. Brudzinski (76) and Celek (62) complete the top three rebounders.

Technicals Hurt Marion Nips Ross

MARION — Would you believe Fremont Ross trailed Marion Harding 2-0 before a second had passed in last night's Buckeye Conference basketball game? It happened.

And, those two points Harding garnered on technical fouls meant the difference in a 51-49 Buckeye Conference loss for the Little Giants.

Ross was assessed two technicals when Bob Brudzinski and Denny Shearon appeared on the floor wearing different uniform numbers than appeared in the scorebook.

According to the book, Shearon was supposed to be wearing 35 and Brudzinski 31. Instead, Shearon was wearing 31 and Brudzinski had 35.

"It was my fault," Ross head coach Alex Clark said. "I put the numbers and players' names in the scorebook. I know Shearon wears 31. For some reason I just put it down wrong.

Ross wasn't without its chances for victory. Trailing 51-49 in the final seconds, the Little Giants had one shot at the basket and also tipped three rebounds toward the hoop but none of them fell through the net.

"We couldn't get the foul call under the bucket in the last series," Clark said. "I'm sure they fouled Chuck Celek when he put one of the rebounds up — Harding players were hanging all over him.

"I thought we had good efforts offensively and defensively tonight. We were running our pattern offense and getting the open shot. Our fast break was also working well.

"Our defense was fairly consistent all night. Honestly, I felt we played better in this game than when we beat them earlier in the season at our place."

After the two technicals, Harding stretched its lead to 6-0 before Ross got on the scoreboard. Fremont cut the deficit to 12-10 and the quarter ended with Harding in front 16-13.

Ross was able to tie the contest with 3:09 remaining in the second quarter on a John Lewis bucket. The game was then tied at 27 and 29 before John Sisler sank a 25-footer at the buzzer to put Harding in front, 31-29.

A long jumper by the Little Giants' Denny Shearon knotted the contest at 35 early in the third quarter.

Ross took the lead for the first time with 5:05 remaining in the period on another jumper by Shearon, who finished the night with 22 points, to lead all scorers. A free throw by Lewis made it 38-35.

The Little Giants managed to increase their cushion to 44-38 late in the period. But back-to-back field goals by Larry Gipson and Rick Spaulding narrowed the lead to two, 44-42, when the quarter ended.

Preston Owens and Neil Shaffer each connected for two free throws apiece to put Harding in front, 46-44, early in the last quarter.

The score was then tied at 46 and 48 before Owens hit on a baseline drive to put the Presidents ahead for good.

Shaffer's free throw with 2:59 showing on the clock made it 51-48. Shearon got the final Ross point with 2:11 still to be played.

Harding then went into a stall. The Prexies didn't give up the ball until an offensive foul was called on Frank Gifford with 48 seconds left.

Fremont then missed a shot and Harding got the rebound. Ross got the ball right back,

however, with a Harding turn over. Less than 10 seconds remained when Lewis tried to connect from the side. After the Little Giants missed the three rebounds, Shaffer grabbed the loose ball and held it until time ran out.

Ross was held to five points in the final eight minutes. Shearon had three of the markers and Celek tallied the other two. The Little Giants connected on two of nine shots in the period. Harding made two of three attempts.

Overall, Ross was 17-36 from the field and 15-19 at the free throw stripe. Harding connected on 20 of 44 action shots and made 11 of 15 charity tosses. The victors held a 31-29 rebounding advantage.

Owens and Gipson paced the Presidents with 14 and 13 points, respectively.

"Denny (Shearon) and Bob (Brudzinski) had especially good nights for us," Clark said. "Denny hit on eight of 11 shots from the floor and Bob picked off nine rebounds. Celek also did a fine job on the boards.

"In general I thought it was a real good team effort. No one was selfish out there. They were always looking for the open man with a better shot."

Marion skipped past the Ross reserve squad, 45-40. Steve Smith's 15 points paced the Little Giants.

Ross, which now has a 2-7 mark in the conference and is 4-8 overall, returns to action Friday with a home engagement against Lorain Senior. The Little Giants travel to Findlay next Saturday.

Fremont Ross has an important engagement with Findlay, Ohio's third-ranked AAA cage squad Saturday.

But, by the tone of the Ross practice sessions this week you wouldn't know it.

"We haven't even talked about Findlay," Ross head coach Alex Clark said Wednesday. "Our main concern is to beat Lorain Senior. We'll worry about Findlay after the Lorain game."

The Little Giants entertain Lorain Friday and travel to Findlay Saturday. Both games count in the Buckeye Conference standings.

"It's going to be another tough two games," Clark said. "From here on they are all tough. We're going to try and win as many games as we can and get ready for the post-season tournament."

In the first meeting with Lorain and Findlay Ross dropped both contests. Lorain pulled out a 67-59 verdict with an eight-point spree in the final minute. Findlay took a 61-54 decision. The games were played back-to-back on the same weekend.

"We were looking ahead to Findlay and not worrying about Lorain," Clark said, "It cost us the Lorain game."

"The fellows realize they can't do that this time. If we do look ahead it will mean the same result against Lorain."

An added incentive for the Little Giants against Lorain will be the position in the league standings. Both teams are deadlocked for the cellar with 2-7 records. The winning team will vacate that position. The two teams are 2-7 in loop play.

Lorain, however, has a better overall mark. The Steelmen are 5-8 on the season compared to Ross' 4-8 log.

Top scorer for Lorain is Brad Frank, who's averaging better than 15 points a game. He's getting help from Charlie Lane, Jack Stephenson and Chet Saladin. Saladin, a 5-8 sophomore, was on the reserve squad the last time the two teams tangled.

Clark intends to use the same starting five he has been employing since mid-December — John Lewis and Dave Kridler at guard, Chuck Celek at center and Bob Brudzinski and Denny Shearon at forward.

"Basically I've been pleased with the job they are doing," Clark said. "Our main problem is to get Chuck (Celek) and Bob (Brudzinski) to go to the basket more. We aren't getting much scoring on the inside. I am happy with the job those two boys have been doing on the boards and on defense."

"We need to have a game like Tiffin Columbian had against Bellevue last Saturday. Columbian finally put it all together and they blew Bellevue off the court."

"We still haven't put it all together. If we could have Lewis, Shearon and Kridler all scoring on the same night we will cause somebody problems. That has been one of our main problems. One individual or two has been carrying us."

Steelmen Nip Little Giants

Ross basketball coach Alex Clark was looking for balanced scoring — he got it.

The means didn't bring about the desired end, however. Lorain Senior gave the Little Giants sole possession of the cellar in the Buckeye Conference in a nail-biting 58-57 victory for the Steelmen on the Ross floor last night.

The Little Giants, who have lost more games by five points than Clark would like to think of, had a three-point lead (57-54) with 1:21 remaining before collapsing.

Senior forward Denny Shearon gave the Little Giants their three-point cushion when he drove the lane with a layup. Corey Cunningham brought Lorain within one 20 seconds later when he cashed in with a rebound.

Ross maneuvered the ball across the 10 second line and called time with 43 seconds showing on the clock. A missed shot with approximately 20 seconds remaining gave Lorain its opportunity to go ahead.

The Steelmen got the ball in scoring position and Charlie Lane got free on a pick. He connected from the side of the bucket with 12 seconds showing to boost the Steelmen into the lead.

The Little Giants still had a chance for victory. After a time out, Kridler brought the ball upcourt. He tried a jumper from the foul line that bounced off the iron. Chuck Celek snagged the rebound but wasn't able to get a shot off before the buzzer.

Before the final minute of action, Ross fans were smelling a stunning comeback victory after the Little Giants fell behind 21-9 at the end of eight minutes.

The score was tied at two, four and five before the Steelers scored six straight to go in front 11-5. With Brad Frank and Mike Pivodelich doing the bulk of the scoring the Steelers kept adding to their margin.

Frank and Pivodelich, who's a 6-6 sophomore, each netted six points in the first quarter. Lane connected for four, Phil Craig and Chad Saladin each had two and Stephenson hit a free throw.

Celek accounted for a third of the Ross total

The Little Giants began the long road back in the second quarter. A steal by Mke Feasel and two free throws by Celek cut the margin to 21-13 before the Steelers hit a free throw.

Ross put together eight straight points to cut the deficit to one (22-21) with 3:44 remaining in the half. Celek, who had his best scoring night of the campaign, scored the first four points on short jumpers. Shearon and Kridler followed.

Stephenson and Kridler traded field goals to make it 24-23 with 3:44 remaining.

Feasel was then fouled under the Little Giant bucket with 2:14 remaining in the half. When Frank displayed disgust at the call by kicking the ball, a technical foul was added.

Instead of Feasel stepping to the line, however, Lewis went to the charity stripe. He hit three straight and gave Ross a 26-24 lead. That's what their fans thought.

Lorain head coach Dale Reichert protested. The referees brought out the rule books and for 10 minutes there was a discussion in front of the scoring table.

Eventually, one of Lewis' free throws counted — the technical. The scoreboard, which had shown a 26-24 Ross lead, reversed to 24-24. The other two were erased and Feasel was sent to the line. He made one of his two charities to crack a 24-24 deadlock.

The halftime score was 27-26, Ross, after Lewis and Stephenson traded field goals.

Early in the third quarter, the game was tied at 27, 28 and 31 before Saladin hit from the side to put the Steelmen ahead, 33-31.

Five straight points by Lewis gave Ross the advantage with 4:14 remaining. Lorain never led the rest of the quarter but the Steelers were always within striking distance.

The contest was tied at 38 and 40 before Celek gave the Little Giants a two-point advantage (42-40). Lorain countered with a free throw, but a Lewis two-pointer put Ross up by three at the quarter.

Ross' lead blossomed to seven points (48-41) following two Kridler free throws and a Lewis steal in the early moments of the fourth period. After Saladin canned two charity tosses, Lewis gave the Little Giants a 50-43 bulge.

Lorain then scored seven straight to knot the contest at 50. Ross went in front by three (53-50) on a three point play by Shearon. A field goal by Craig and another by Stephenson gave the lead to Lorain.

The Little Giants took the lead for the final time with 2:02 remaining on foul shots by Bob Brudzinski and Kridler.

Then 'Lady Luck' which has managed to leave Ross on so many other occasions this season headed in the other direction.

Steve Smith's 20-point effort led the Little Giant reserves to a 64-47 victory over the Lorain cubs. The point total was the highest for Ross this season. Coach Mark Froning's team now shows a 4-0 report card.

Findlay Keeps Rolling

Little Giants Falter In Second 16 Minutes

FINDLAY — The final score doesn't indicate it but Fremont Ross came up with one of its better efforts of the season in dropping a 74-57 decision to high-flying Findlay Saturday.

"I just wish we could have played this type of game some other time this season," Little Giant head coach Alex Clark said. "I'm sure if we would have played like this against any other team on our schedule we would have won."

Ross trailed the third-ranked Trojans by a mere five points (29-24) at intermission before running into problems early in the third quarter.

"We were able to get our fast break moving," Findlay head coach John Stozich said. "In the first half Ross controlled the game. Their playmaker (Dave Kridler) set the tempo."

"Then early in the third quarter they made a couple of mistakes. We took advantage of them. We got a big enough lead that Ross had to start playing our type of game. I thought that was the difference."

Clark agreed with Stozich to some extent, but not entirely.

"Findlay was able to get the ball moving but we were getting hurt under our own boards," Clark said. "Three times one of our men went up for a shot. It appeared that he was obviously fouled but the officials didn't call anything."

"Findlay definitely seemed to get a break in foul calls. Before the last minute of the game there were 13 called against us and six against them. Findlay is a very physical team. We were getting roughed up. Chuck Celek (Little Giant center) is a pretty timid player. But he was even getting disturbed that nothing was being called."

"Nothing should be taken away from Findlay, however. They have a very fine team and I hope John (Stozich) can take them the whole way. It would mean a lot of basketball in the Buckeye Conference."

After intermission, Findlay widened its lead to 39-28 in the first two minutes. Steve Wenner and Ken Brooks got back-to-back buckets to put the Trojans in front, 33-24.

Bob Brudzinski got Ross' first field goal of the half, but Chuck Rogers and Wnner countered with two-pointers of their own. Denny Shearon got the third and fourth points of the period for the

Little Giants. Wenner, who finished the night with 31 points, gave Findlay its 11-point lead.

Three times in the next three minutes Ross was able to cut the gap to eight (39-31, 41-33 and 43-35). The Trojans' lead went to 12 points following a three-point play by Wenner and Ken Brooks' free throw.

Findlay maintained the lead throughout the rest of the quarter and was in front by 11, 52-41, when the period ended.

Ross couldn't buy a bucket in the first 2:55 of the final frame while Findlay ripped off six straight points—field goals by Rogers and Jeff Hochstettler and a pair of foul shots by Brooks—to take a commanding 58-41 lead.

Lewis finally altered the Ross totals when he connected from the lane with 5:05 remaining. Field goals by John Arnold and Wenner followed and Findlay was in front by 19 (62-43) with 4:18 remaining.

It wasn't the biggest lead for the Trojans, however. Their cushion was 21 points (69-48) with 2:38 remaining in the game.

Celek and Wenner accounted for most of the scoring in the first half. Celek, who had his best performance of the season, 15 points, picked up 12 of those markers in the first half. Wenner scored 16 of Findlay's 29 points in the opening 16 minutes.

"We did something we haven't done consistently all season — got the ball to our men in the middle," Clark said. "Findlay was letting Celek wide open and we were taking advantage of it in the first half."

"Bob Brudzinski was also open in the middle and we were getting the ball to him. Both boys (Celek and Brudzinski) had good offensive nights. I hope it continues."

"I was real pleased with the job Dave Kridler did on Ken Brooks out front. Brooks really hurt us in our first game this season but had

just 15 points this time — nine of those came at the line."

"John Lewis had a good defensive effort against Jeff Hochstettler. Denny Shearon did an exceptional job for us on the boards."

Four of the Ross starters completed the evening in double figures and Kridler missed that mark by just a single point. Celek's 15 led the way. Shearon chipped in 12 and Brudzinski and Lewis each scored 10.

The Ross reserves dropped a 63-52 decision to the little Trojans. Mike Miller (14) and Steve Smith (12) headed the Little Giant offensive effort.

Ross, which has now lost three straight, will concentrate on regrouping this week and prepare for the invasion of its arch-rival, Sandusky, Friday. The Little Giants travel to Toledo Whitmer Saturday and have the opportunity to test the state's leading scorer, John Kantner.

Ross, which was blown out of the gym in an earlier game this season with the Blue Streaks, seemed to be out of it again. Sandusky was in front by 15 points (54-39) at the end of three quarters.

Then the Little Giants took command and moved within three on three occasions late in the game before seeing time run out.

"Sandusky made a lot of mistakes in the fourth quarter and we were taking advantage of them," Ross mentor Alex Clark said. "They also had a lot of turnovers early in the game but we weren't converting them into points."

"Our shooting in the first quarter and play in the third were the big differences. We just couldn't get the ball to go in early in the game. Then we just played terrible ball in the third quarter. We did very little right in that period."

Ross hit on only five of 17 field goal attempts in the initial eight minutes and still trailed by only three (14-11). Sandusky connected on six of its 11 attempts in the frame.

Dave Kridler got the first Ross points with 5:54 remaining. He hit from outside to cut Sandusky's lead to 3-2. A foul shot by John Lewis and Mike Feasel's field goal gave Ross a short-lived 5-3 lead with 4:44 remaining in the period.

But Sandusky's burly center Scott May made it 5-4 with a field goal and Barry Glass put the Blue Streaks ahead moments later with a short jumper.

Ross never regained the lead. Back-to-back buckets by Mark Deming and Glass gave Sandusky a 10-5 cushion.

Lewis nailed the sixth and seventh points for Ross before May scored his first of 13 field goals. Ross cut the gap to one (12-11) on field goals by Brudzinski and Lewis. May upped the lead back to three with a layup at the 12 second mark.

May, who finished with 30 points added three more points (free throw and field goal) to the Blue Streaks bulge in the first 30 seconds of the second frame.

Feasel got a free throw and Lewis canned two straight jumpers, however, to make it 17-16. Jackson and Lewis then traded buckets before the Blue Streaks went ahead by five on May and Deming two pointers.

Baskets by Lewis and Brudzinski sliced the lead back to one, 13-12, with 2:51 still remaining in the half.

Sandusky then took over for the rest of the period. Deming connected twice from the foul line and May and Ben Alexander had field goals to push the Blue Streaks in front, 20-22.

After a Brudzinski field goal, May hit consecutive field goals in a 20 second span to push the lead to 33-24. The scoreboard showed the Blue Streaks in front 33-26 at intermission following a Liggins two-pointer.

4 In the third quarter, Sandusky opened the

scoring with baskets from Glass and Jackson. Ross changed its tally on a Kridler free throw at the 6:56 mark. The first field goal for the Little Giants didn't come until 1:56 later when Shearon swished from the corner to cut the deficit to 41-30.

Sandusky then mounted its biggest lead of the evening (47-30) on a May field goal and two more by Deming. For the rest of the quarter, Sandusky's lead never was less than 13 points.

The Blue Streaks seemed to have the game in the bank with seven minutes remaining. They were in front 56-41 and head coach Bob Beachy was even using some of his second stringers.

Ross then caught fire. In a two-minute span the Little Giants ran off 10 straight points while Sandusky was having problems even getting the ball past midcourt.

Two free throws by Lewis ignited the surge. Fielders by Kridler, Lewis, Shearon and Brudzinski followed. With more than four minutes remaining, the Little Giants were back in business, trailing 56-51.

Sandusky finally broke Ross' string on free throws by Jerom Augustus and Glass. A foul line jumper by Lewis cut Sandusky's lead back to eight.

Ross then had a basket called back at the 2:07 mark when Kridler was called for carrying the ball.

"That was a key point in the ball game," Clark explained. "If he scores we trail by only three and the next basket by Shearon would have brought us within one. I can't complain about the call, however, it was right."

Shearon's bucket with 1:44 remaining made it 50-55. May upped the Blue Streak lead back to five with 1:06 remaining with a base line layup.

Brudzinski scored with 32 seconds remaining but it was offset by a Jackson field goal. Shearon and Jackson traded a pair of free throws in a seven second span and Sandusky was up by five, 64-59, with 36 seconds left.

Ross, which now has a 4-11 record on the season and is 2-10 in conference play, returns to action tonight. The Little Giants will travel to Toledo Whitmer for a non-conference duel. The reserve game begins at 6:30 p.m.

TOLEDO—"It was our worst performance of the season."

That was the analysis given by Fremont Ross basketball coach Alex Clark after Toledo Whitmer ripped the Little Giants, 87-62, in non-conference play Saturday.

Ross was never in the ball game. Whitmer sprinted to a 32-15 lead in the first quarter and then toyed with their guests until the final buzzer.

Whitmer burned the nets in the opening eight minutes. It made 12 of 16 field goal attempts and was eight for nine from the foul line.

John Kantner, the state's leading scorer, led the surge. He was four-for-four from the field and had the same totals at the foul line in the opening eight minutes.

Doug Good had 10 points and Bob Huebner six in the same period.

"Whitmer didn't play last night (Friday) so they were fresh," Clark said. "We were a little tired from the Sandusky game. But, that is no excuse. We just didn't play ball."

"We didn't do anything right until the last quarter. Whitmer was hot in the first quarter but we weren't playing defense either."

They would bring the ball down court and take any type of shot they wanted. We didn't even try to stop them."

Both teams scored 14 points in the second quarter and Whitmer went to the dressing room at intermission with a 46-29 advantage.

Whitmer's shooting percentage dropped off in the second quarter. But the Panthers still shot better than 50 per cent from the field in the opening 16 minutes. They made 18 of their 31 attempts. Ross shot 20 per cent from the field at the same time.

The Little Giants' shooting woes continued in the third quarter. Whitmer outscored Ross 16-5 in the period. Ross got two field goals from John Lewis and a Denny Shearon free throw to account for its scoring.

Lewis' two field goals were his first points of the night. The high-scoring senior guard picked up three personal fouls early in the first quarter and spent most of the half on the bench. He finished the game with 14 points, adding three field goals and four free throws in the fourth quarter.

Ross found its scoring machine in the fourth quarter. It outscored

the Panthers, 28-25. Lewis' 10 points led the way. Denny Shearon tallied six, Dave Kridler five, Tom Liggins four and Bob Brudzinski three.

Shearon finished with 19. He had 16 of those in the first and fourth quarters. Lewis, Brudzinski (11) and Liggins (11) completed the Little Giant delegation in double figures.

Kantner finished with 37. He swished 11 of 15 floor shots and was 15-17 at the charity stripe. Good, with 16, was the only other Panther in double figures.

Ross connected on just 21 of 64 floor shots. The Panthers finished at the 50 per cent level, making 29 of 58. The Little Giants were 20-30 from the free throw line. Whitmer cashed in on 29 of 36 bonus tosses.

The rebounding derby also went to Whitmer, 44-5. Good and Shearon each shared rebound honors with 12.

The loss was the second in as many days for Ross and left Clark asking himself many questions to which he has trouble locating answers.

"It's hard to figure how a team could look so good in pre-season scrimmages and then fall apart

like we have," the second-year tutor said. "We have been going downhill since the year started. Tonight we hit bottom."

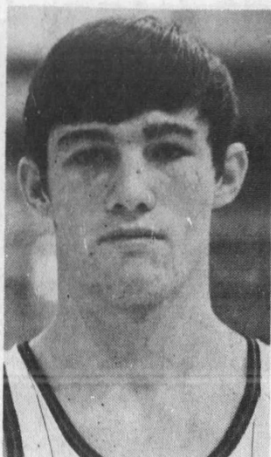

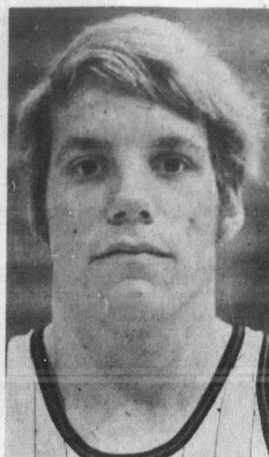




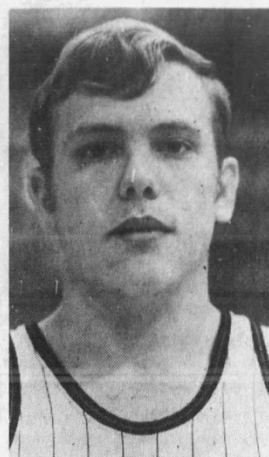

Elyria Has 10 Losses

Troubled Cage Squads Collide Friday At Ross

Ross last met Elyria back on December 29.

The Little Giants ripped the Pioneers, 79-56, that night. It was the last time the Ross cage corps won a game in the Buckeye Conference. Six consecutive losses have followed.

Since that night in Elyria, victories have been hard to come by for the Little Giants. In fact, there has been only one win in eight games. That came against Tiffin Columbian on January 16.

So, it would only be natural if the Little Giants are looking forward to the invasion of Elyria Friday night.

But, Ross head coach Alex Clark has already cautioned his club—the Pioneers can't be taken lightly.

"Elyria has improved since we played them," Clark said. "Rick Pietch has been a big difference. He has given them a good outside threat to go with the three big men.

"If our kids think Elyria is going to be a pushover we'll get beat. I think that's what happened at Whitmer last Saturday. We had beaten almost the same Whitmer team last season. Our kids weren't mentally ready to play and we were soundly beaten."

Elyria has only five victories in 15 games, but the Pioneers have never been completely out of the games they've lost. The 10 losses represent the most defeats in regular season for an Elyria club since 1955-56.

Statistics tell a major story to the Elyria woes.

The Pioneers have four straight losses—Findlay (67-61), Mansfield (75-64), Sandusky (80-74) and Marion (72-67). But in those four defeats, the Pioneer opponents have attempted 138 free throws and made 100 for a sizzling 72 per cent.

Meanwhile, the Pioneers have scored on 61 per cent of 95 charity tosses.

In the four games, Elyria has scored seven more field goals than the combined totals of Findlay, Mansfield, Sandusky and Marion.

Mansfield was the only team able to outscore the Pioneers from the field and that was only by one basket which came in the closing seconds.

Elyria lines up with Dale Griffin (6-6) and Ira Perkins (6-2)

at forward, Jay Underman (6-5) at center and Rick Pietch (6-2) and Rick Nelson (5-9) at guard.

And, for students of the law of averages, here's another fact to consider. Elyria has yet to win a game on the road this season.

So, Ross can't afford a mental disposition like it had last Saturday.

Clark's game plan for the Pioneers will be the same he used last time.

"We'll try to run against them," the head coach explained. "We can't give them time to set up in that zone. If they do, it's almost impossible to control the boards against their height.

"We'll also press. The weakest part of their game the last time we played was the floor game. The teams who have had success against Elyria have pressed."

The availability of Chuck Celek, 6-4 junior center, for the Friday contest is uncertain. Celek missed last weekend's games. He was confined to Memorial hospital with an arm infection and wasn't released until Tuesday.

"The doctors didn't tell us Chuck couldn't play," Clark said, "but I doubt that he'll start. We'll just have to wait and see how he reacts in practice."

The starting lineup will probably feature John Lewis, Bob Brudzinski, Denny Shearon, Dave Kridler and either Tom Liggins or Mike Feasel.

Lewis continues to lead the scoring race. He has 293 points in 16 games. Shearon has taken over the number two spot with 198. Kridler has dropped to number three, only two markers behind Shearon.

The contest marks the final home game of the season for the Little Giants. Making their final appearance on the home floor are four seniors — Kridler, Lewis, Shearon and Jeff Parkinson.

Ross concludes its regular season next Friday, February 19, at Lorain Admiral King.

The sectional tournament draw for the Little Giants will be held at Ashland College Tuesday.

Lewis, Liggins Score Career Highs In Loss

LORAIN — John Lewis and Tom Liggins each set personal career scoring marks but it wasn't enough to lift Ross to a basketball victory over Lorain Admiral King last night. The Admirals won a 99-83 decision.

Lewis, who twice had scored 30 in his career, ripped off 33, including 27 in the second half. Liggins, a junior whose previous high was 11, bagged 17, 15 in the third and fourth periods.

"Lewis and Liggins were about our only bright spots," Ross head coach Alex Clark said.

The Little Giants, who finished the regular season with a 5-13 mark, stayed with the running Admirals in the early moments of the first quarter. In fact, King had only a 10-9 lead with 4:14 remaining in the first quarter.

Then Ross went into a scoring slump. The Little Giants didn't score again until 5:48 remained in the second quarter. By that time, King had mounted a 33-9 lead.

"That was the difference in the game," Clark said. "We just weren't playing good ball. We started well and were moving the ball in the first four minutes. Then, for some reason, we stopped.

"I think part of our problems has to be the attitude of the boys. After last week's victory over Elyria I think they thought things were going to begin coming our way. We need to learn that a team wins its own games and doesn't depend on the other team to make a mistake.

"Consciously, I don't think we were looking ahead to the tournament game on Tuesday with Shelby. But, subconsciously I think the fellows might have been thinking about it."

Admiral King led 23-9 after the first quarter. The Admirals had eight field goals and seven free throws in the period. High point men were Tim Kish and Gary Deidrick, who scored seven and six, respectively.

Chuck Celek scored four and Lewis three for Ross in the same period.

In the second quarter, Admiral King outscored Ross, 20-16. Deidrick and Doug Taylor combined for 14 of King's points. Deidrick scored eight and Taylor six. Dave Kridler scored 10 of Ross' 16.

"We were getting the open shots for Bob Brudzinski and Celek in the first half but they weren't taking them," Clark said. "And, we had a number of turnovers that didn't help. It seemed that every time we had a turnover Admiral King would make a basket out of it.

"Another thing that didn't help was that our kids got in early foul trouble. Denny Shearon was sitting on the bench with four personals in the first quarter and Chuck Celek fouled out with 3:07 remaining in the first half.

"I'm not saying the officiating was the difference. It wasn't. Our kids didn't play good ball. The officials didn't help matters, however. It seemed they were calling things one way on one end of the floor and another way on the other."

Ross managed to begin to piece its offense together in the second half. The Little Giants outscored the Admirals, 58-56, in the final two periods.

While Lewis and Liggins were doing most of the Ross scoring in the third and fourth quarters, Deidrick was handling those chores for Admiral King. He racked up 29 points over the final two quarters. He had 20 in the final eight minutes.

"He's tough when he gets open," Clark said. "We had one man with him all the time and when they got Deidrick the ball our other fellows weren't helping out. Thus, the player guarding Deidrick had one of two choices — let him shoot or foul him."

In the final quarter, Deidrick was letter perfect from the field, making eight of eight shots. He canned four of six free throws.

Overall, Deidrick, who finished the season as the Buckeye Conference scoring leader, made 16 of 28 field goal attempts. He was 11-13 at the line.

Lewis connected on 12 of 29 action tries. He was nine- for- 13 at the foul line. Lewis made eight of 13 field goal attempts and one of three foul shots.

Admiral King made 38 of 87 field goal tries compared to Ross' 34 of 75. At the line King was good on 23 of 34 attempts. Ross made 15 of 31. The Admirals held a 52-34 rebounding bulge. Kish pulled down 15. Shearon had 10 for Ross. In the personal foul department, Ross was charged with 27 compared to Admiral King's 15.

The Ross reserves lost a 70- 47 decision. Steve Smith scored 13 in the losing effort.

Ross' Lewis Named All-Buckeye Conference

Kridler Selected For Third Unit

John Lewis is a member of the elite in the Buckeye Conference.

Lewis, Ross high's leading scorer, has been voted a first team berth on the All-Buckeye Conference basketball team announced today by the eight league coaches.

Coaches selected three teams and the Little Giants' Dave Kridler polled enough votes for a third team berth.

"This is a tribute to the type of season John and Dave had for us," Little Giant head coach Alex Clark said after making the announcement. "Both boys deserve the recognition they are receiving."

Findlay, which ran away from the rest of the league in the team race, placed just one player — 6-6 senior center Steve Wenner — on the first team. The rest of the "dream team" is composed of Jim Barnett from Mansfield Senior, Gary Deidrick of Lorain Admiral King and Scott May of Sandusky.

Deidrick carried a 20.2 scoring average to lead all members of the first team in that vital department. May checks in with a 25.1 log and Wenner averaged 23.9 in 14 league contests. Lewis carried a 20.1 league average through the league games while Barnett checked in at 17.9.

Barnett, Wenner and Deidrick were unanimous choices.

"I wouldn't mind coaching this team for a few games," Clark said. "I think if it (the team) were put against other all-league teams from around the state it would do more than hold its own."

Lewis, a 6-0 senior guard, becomes the first Ross player to win a spot on the first unit since Tim Thomas accomplished the feat in the 1965-66 season. Lewis was a second team selection in 1970.

"It's probably a rarity that a school would have a first team selection on an all-star team when it finished last in the league," Clark said, "but we lost many of our games by the narrowest of margins."

"I know many of the coaches were impressed by our team and John's performance. We played some of our better ball against Findlay and Mansfield, the one and two teams in the league. And, against some of the other squads John had real good scoring nights. The other teams respected John's ability — we could tell that by the way they played against him."

Two Findlay players — 6-1 junior guard Ken Brooks and 6-5 junior forward Chuck Rogers — head the second unit. Also named were Brad Frank of Lorain Senior, Tim Kish of Lorain Admiral King and Mansfield Senior's Henry Harris.

Frank is a junior. Kish and Harris have played their final high school games.

Joining Kridler on the third unit are Elyria's Dale

Griffin and Rick Pietch, Marion's Frank Gifford, Sandusky's Mark Deming and Lorain Admiral King's Doug Taylor.

Kridler is the smallest player on the entire squad. "That doesn't mean much," Clark said. "Dave was really the one who made us move. He guided our ball club on the floor. His selection is a reflection of his ability."

"Dave was the one we asked to defend the other team's top guard every week. He did a fine job. I think his defensive work earned him the berth more than anything else."

Clark also had praise for a Little Giant who failed to earn a berth on the first three units — Denny Shearon, a 6-2 senior forward.

"I went to the meeting hoping to get all three of our seniors on the squad," Clark said. "I think if we would have won a few more ball games this season Denny would have made the team."

Findlay's John Storch was named "coach of the year" by his colleagues. Vic Pfizenmayer of Mansfield Senior and Clark received honorable mention.

Although the squad was selected by the coaches, no coach was permitted to vote for his own players. The voting was done Monday during a league meeting at Serwin's Restaurant. At that time, Findlay was presented the league trophy for this season.

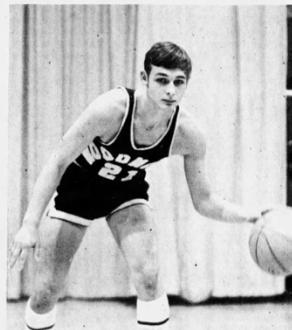
Ohio State, the Big Ten leader, moved closer to nailing down a berth by trimming

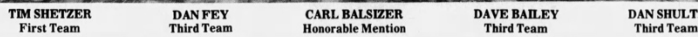

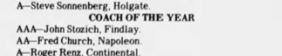

What Of Ross Cage Year? Clark Views It!

Does a record always indicate the story of a team's season?

Fremont Ross basketball coach Alex Clark doesn't think so.

"Sure, we finished with a 5-15 record and that is probably the most disappointing aspect of our season," Clark said recently, "but I don't think the record is a true reflection of how we played through the season.

"Granted, there were times we didn't play the ball we're capable of. Overall, however, I feel my club on the whole gave a better all-around effort than any team we faced this season.

"Our greatest asset was the hustle and desire we had to win. The other schools in our league have more talent and a greater number of boys to choose from. That makes it tough to compete."

On the floor, the Little Giants were led by a trio of seniors — John Lewis, a first team Buckeye Conference selection, Dave Kridler, a peppery guard, and Denny Shearon, a consistent forward.

"In many respects this season was a big disappointment to the three seniors," Clark said. "They had hopes of finishing the season with a much better record.

"But each of them made valuable contributions to any success we had. Lewis was very valuable. He did a good job on both ends of the floor. His best effort came in the first tournament game against Shelby. John's effort that night is the type we want our younger kids to emulate.

"Kridler was our offensive and defensive leader. When we were on offense Dave was the quarterback, charged with making it run properly, and, defensively, we always asked Dave to guard the other team's leading outside scorer.

"Shearon provided us with a consistent effort throughout the season. His rebounding efforts were especially pleasing. In the last four games of the season he was averaging between 14 and 15. Denny was always hustling on the floor no matter what the score."

The Little Giant victories came against Elyria (2), Marion, Tiffin Columbian and Shelby.

"I guess you would have to classify the win over Shelby as the highlight of the season," Clark said. "We showed that night that we did have a fine ball club despite the record.

"The Buckeye Conference wins over Elyria and Marion were also important. Beating Elyria two times in any season is quite an accomplishment. We beat Marion on our floor but lost to them in the final seconds at their place. I thought we could have won that one, too.

"Both those teams finished

higher than us in the standings. Yet I wouldn't trade clubs with either of those coaches. I think we had the better team despite the final standings.

"I know this — the clubs in the Buckeye Conference have respect for Fremont Ross. They knew when they played us they were going to have a tough ball game. Twice we gave Mansfield Senior a real scare and in both games with Findlay we always had them looking over their shoulder."

Findlay finished first in the conference and Mansfield was second.

Clark completed his second season as head coach.

"Just by the improvement in the record I think our program is advancing," Clark said. "Things are looking better. However, I can never see Fremont Ross competing year in and year out for the Buckeye Conference championship.

"We just don't have the talent to compete with other schools in the conference. In the last two years we have been getting a greater number of boys out for the sport but it's still nothing compared to what some other league schools get out."

Although three starters will be missing, several players return who recorded a great deal of playing time this season.

That group includes guards Steve Smith and Mike Feasel and forwards Bob Brudzinski, Chuck Celek and Tom Liggins. Brudzinski and Celek started in practically every game this season.

"Those boys should give us a good nucleus to start out with," Clark said. "Next year we should have more balance. Six or seven players should do the scoring, not like this season when we relied so much on Lewis."

Some help is also coming from the reserve squad. Clark has high hopes for guards Jon Smith, Rob Lytle and Chuck Lindsey and forwards Mike Miller, Ed Fitzgerald and Tom Pitts.

"All those fellows have the tools to become good basketball players but they will have to work at it," Clark said. "If they do come around like I think they can they will push the varsity returnees for a starting spot."

Ross' tallest starter this season was Brudzinski who stands 6-4.

"The lack of having one big man hurts us," Clark said. "Brudzinski grew about an inch and a half during the season. If he keeps growing it might solve part of the problem. Yet, we still will lack the big forwards that are needed to compete with other Buckeye Conference teams."

What type of prediction does Clark have for the 1971-72 Little Giants?

"I won't give a definite prediction," Clark said. "Let's just say I'm optimistic about our chances."

NCAA Checks Porter On Early ABA Signing

VILLANOVA, Pa. (AP) — The National Collegiate Athletic Association says it is investigating reports that Villanova University's basketball star Howard Porter jumped the eligibility gun.

Warren Brown, executive director of the NCAA's rules enforcement program, said Tuesday his group is following the latest allegations that Porter has been under professional contract since late last year.

If the NCAA confirms reports that Porter signed with the Pittsburgh Condors of the American Basketball Association, the verdict could strike Villanova's recent successful season from official memory.

Fans would have to forget that the Wildcats, led by the 6-foot-8 Porter, came close to denying UCLA its fifth straight NCAA title.

Villanova lost to the Bruins 68-62 in the NCAA final last Saturday.

On Monday the Condors announced they had acquired a contract on Porter from the ABA, but they would not say

oath that he had not entered into any agreement with a professional organization or agent.

If, as reported, Porter committed himself on Dec. 16, 1970, and continued competing as a collegian, the deed would invalidate his and Villanova's 1970-71 season.

Porter said he hasn't signed anything with anybody.
