Cleveland East Tech May Lose State Track Crown

COLUMBUS, May 25.—UP—Preliminary rounds of the state scholastic track, golf and tennis championships opened today at Ohio State university under the direction of Ohio High School Commissioner H. W. Emswiler.

Championships will be decided in the three spring sports tomorrow afternoon, while the state baseball title will be determined next weekend. District champions and runnersup qualified for state tournament play last weekend.

Champs May Lose

Cleveland East Tech, for six consecutive years the holder of the state Class A track championship, qualified the smallest squad since it battled for its first crown in 1939. Tech qualified the half-mile and relay teams and its ace sprinter, Jumal Afzal, in the 100 and 220-yard dashes, Allen White in the broad jump and Chuck Smith in the high hurdles.

Orange of near Chagrin Falls, defending Class B track champion, qualified two relay teams, two con-

high hurdles with a time of 15 seconds—just two-tenths of a second slower than the state record set by Jesse Owens of Cleveland East Tech in 1933.

Light of Sulphur Springs set a 10-second mark in winning the Class B 100-yard district dash. The present record is 9.9 seconds set five years ago.

Columbus North's relay team approached the state Class A record of 1:29.4 at the Central District meet at Delaware by setting a mark of 1:31.9. Lockland's Class B one-mile relay team qualified with a 3:34.2 mark as compared with the state meet record of 3:32.8.

In the Bowling Green qualifier, Knapp of Delta turned in a 2:02.9 time in the 880-yard run. The district time was one second slower than the state record.

Athletes back to defend 1944 titles include Foster of Cleveland Marshall in the Class A pole vault and Boudreau of Ashtabula Harbor in the Class B event, Fred Johnson of Columbus East in the Class A 100-yard dash, Hilti of Pandora in the Class B one-mile run, Knapp of Delta in the Class B 880-yard run and Afzal in the 220-yard dash.

New Records Probable

Mansfield And Lockland Are State Track Champs

COLUMBUS, May 28.—Harry Mehock's Mansfield Tygers today were the 1945 Ohio scholastic track champions after Cleveland East Tech unsuccessfully attempted to defend its state crown, which it had held since 1939.

While Mansfield rallied in the final pole vault event to nose out Columbus East in the Class A tournament, Lockland of Cincinnati captured its first Class B crown by scoring 19 points. Plainville of Cincinnati was second with 15 points, while New London and the defending champion, Orange of Cuyahoga county, scored 12 points each.

Meanwhile Bexley's Leonard Schiff and Tom Reed won the state high school tennis doubles championship and Bob Malaga of Cleveland Cathedral Latin took the singles title Saturday. Bexley defeated Tony Travert and Ted Price of Cincinnati, 6-2, 2-6, 6-1, while Malaga upset Dick Schneebeck of Cincinnati Walnut Hills, 6-3 and 7-5.

Won On Pole Vault

Columbus North successfully defended its state golf championship by turning in a 639 total for 36 holes to defeat North College Hill of Cincinnati, which carded a 670 total for second place. Toledo De-Vilbiss trailed with 677 and Upper Arlington of Columbus with 678. Anthony Blom of Cincinnati and Roger Bacon won the individual

In the Class A track competition Columbus East snatched an early lead.

With Ivan Wallington, Ollie Cline and Bob Wilging sparking Mansfield, the Tygers scored 23½ points to Columbus East's 22 points. Warren trailed in third position with 19 points.

One New Record

Wallington won individual track honors by winning both hurdle races and scoring a high jump fourth-place tie. Pole Vaulters Wilging and Cline handed Mansfield its first championship when Cline won the pole vault with a leap of 12 feet, 2 inches. Wilging tied Bill Foster of Cleveland for second place.

Steve Orfaneo of Canton McKinley set the only new record during the 1945 championships when he scored a 1:56.9 mark for the 880-yard run over a rain-soaked track. He sliced one and one-tenth seconds off a mark set by Sylvester Stewart of Toledo Waite last year.

Mansfield didn't secure a single point in a running race, Lockland won the Class B title by virtue of its power in sprint events. Bob Kuntz of Lockland won both the 100 and 220-yard dashes to spark his Cincinnati squad to victory.

The only 1944 individual event winner who defended his title successfully was Herman Hiltz of Pandora who won the Class B mile in 4:38.2.
