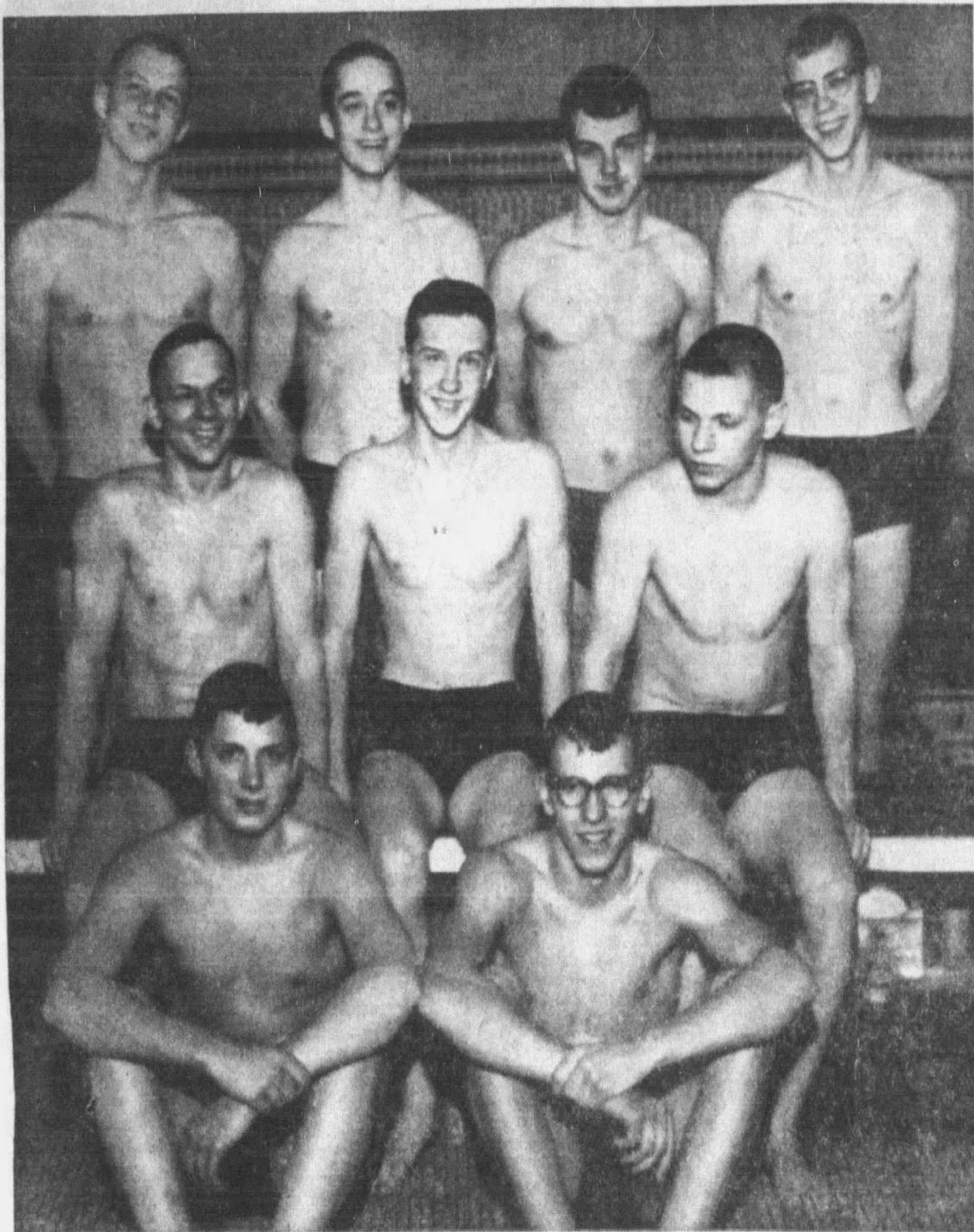

Ross Swimmers Fail To Qualify In State; Lozano Tries Luck

Fremont Ross' swimmers failed to earn a berth last night in the qualifying round of the state tank meet at Columbus. Ross' only hope lies in diver Bob Lozano who was involved in his preliminaries as the News-Messenger went to press.

Only the top six places earn the right to compete in the finals this afternoon. The finals of the diving also will be held this afternoon.

Ross' closest effort came in the 200-yard medley relay when the team of Jack Jaisler, Bill Knoke, Jim Parker and Tom Lloyd finished ninth with a time of 1:51.2. This time was one second slower than the school record set in the Bowling Green district last week. Ross swim mentor Bill Faunce said over the phone late last night that even had the relay team tied its record time it still would have been one place

short of qualifying for the finals.

Ross' 200-yard free style relay team placed 13th with a time of 1:40.6. This time was one second faster than Steve Weller, Jim Hetrick, Neil Wensinger and Bob Cliburn did in Bowling Green.

On an individual basis, Lloyd placed 10th in the 200-yard free style with a time of 2:06.6, which

was .04 faster than he has ever gone.

Parker swam the 100-yard free style in 54.9, two seconds faster than the time he turned in at the district. He finished 12th.

Faunce believes Lakewood, Upper Arlington, Shaker Heights and Berea appear strongest in the meet in total points.
