

Ross has three at each weight

Fremont Ross wrestling coach Grover Dowell has 10 lettermen returning, which is nice he says, but he still lists inexperience and youth as his team's weakness.

"We do have a lot of numbers," said Dowell, in his third season as the Little Giants head coach, about a turnout of 45-50. "We have at least three wrestlers in every weight class and that gives us good competition for those positions."

Gone from the team are four-year lettermen Dave Alejandro and John Lugar. Returning are seniors Shawn Heidelberg, Eric Straube and Josh Carnahan; juniors Matt Merrill, Jason Hatfield, Ken Kreilick, Brandon Willer, Jamie Ross and Russ Mylander; and sophomore Ryan Patterson.

That corps will lead the Little Giants in the season opener against Toledo Whitmer at 6:15 p.m. Thursday in the Purple Pit.

Dowell's team was 2-5 in dual meets a year ago with a 2-4 mark in Great Lakes League matches. The team tied for second in the GLL tournament.

Dowell's lineup is set, but wrestle-offs could change the makeup slightly for the opener.

The tentative lineup will have Fred Ivy at 103, Patterson at 112, Emmanuel Heidelberg at 119, Pete Devore at 125 and Jason Lather at 130.

Matt Merrill, a GLL tourney champ as a sophomore, will open at 135 with Shawn Heidelberg at 140. Ross is at 145 and Carnahan, a transfer along with Devore, from St. Joseph Central Catholic, at 152.

Ken Kreilick will be at 160 and Mylander at 171. Brandon Willer will be at 189 and the heavyweight is Paul Cruz.

One possible change could be at 130, where Hatfield and Lather are competing. Both are having problems getting down to that weight.

"A third-stringer might be in there for the first match," Dowell said.

"What I like about the whole group, besides the high numbers is the attitude and work ethic. They are hard workers and that will help us."

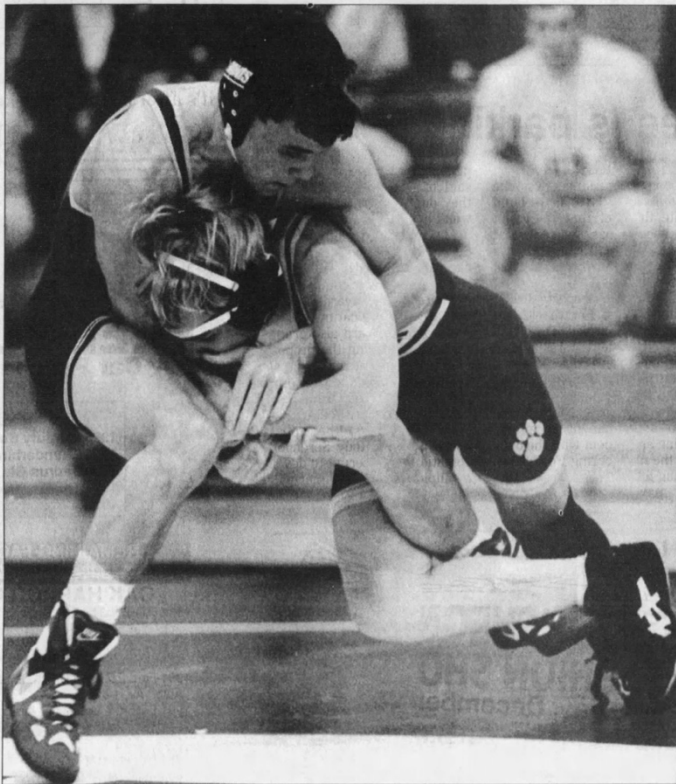
The Little Giants schedule includes hosting the Mal Mackey Tournament on Jan. 8 and the GLL Tournament Feb. 12.

Ross will also compete in the two-day Wendy's Tournament in Tiffin Dec. 28 and 29. It's the first time Ross will compete in that tourney.



Returning Little Giants

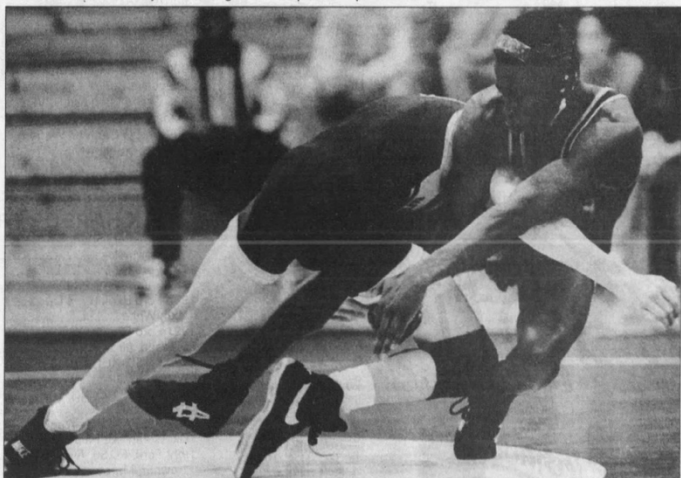

Cooper still predicts bowl victory

SAN DIEGO — John Cooper on Thursday reiterated his guarantee that Ohio State will win its bowl game. Besides bravado, he's got history on his side.

When Cooper made the guarantee at a postseason banquet two weeks ago, he didn't know if the No. 11 Buckeyes would play UCLA in the Rose Bowl or the Western Athletic Conference champion in the Holiday Bowl here on Dec. 30.

Wisconsin beat Michigan State 41-20 in Tokyo to earn the Big Ten's Rose Bowl berth, sending Ohio State (9-1-1) to San Diego to play Brigham Young (6-5) in a rematch of the 1982 Holiday Bowl.

"We're going to win the game," Cooper said at a news conference also attended by BYU coach LaVell Edwards.

"The kind of football team we have, we've got to end this season with a victory. I think if you ask any football coach if they're going to win a bowl game, they'll tell you yes."

The Buckeyes have lost four straight bowl games under Cooper, but they are 2-0 against BYU in the postseason. They won that 1982 Holiday Bowl game 47-17, and then beat BYU 10-7 in the 1985 Citrus Bowl.

Edwards said he understood Cooper's boast. "If I had his team I'd guarantee one, too," Edwards said. "They've got a great football team. There's not many weaknesses, if any, on that football team."

"We're going to have to play about as well as we're capable and then get a few breaks."

Ross wrestles tough

Fremont Ross made up for a lack of sharpness with intimidation in a 33-25 season-opening high school wrestling win over Whitmer Thursday night at Ross High School.

"We did not wrestle too badly," Ross coach Grover Dowell said after the Great Lakes league match, "but I see there is a lot of work we have to do. I didn't think we were as sharp as I thought we were going to be."

The Little Giants were sharp enough to move out to a 30-7 lead against the young Panthers.

After a forfeit to Ross at 103 pounds, Ryan Patterson put Ross up 9-0 with a 12-6 win over Shawn Szkatulski in the 112-pound match. Following a pair decision losses in the next two matches, Jason Lather started Ross on a four-match win streak with a 16-9 win over Brandon Wolfe at 130.

Matt Merrill (135), Shawn Heidelberg (140) and Jamie Ross (125) followed with falls for Ross, putting the Little Giants up 30-7. Merrill's win in two minutes, 52 seconds over Corey Himebaugh was the quickest of the three pins.

"We are young through the middle of the lineup," Whitmer coach Dennis Brighton said, "plus they intimidated and we just did not wrestle well because we were intimidated."

The Panthers wrestled without 1993 state tournament placer Jason Pitzen.

"He was fourth in the state," Brighton said. "He hurt his toe and we did not want take the chance of him doing any more damage to it."

Strangely, Dowell missed Pitzen, too.

"That helped us a lot," Dowell said, "but I would have liked to see him wrestle. I hate to see good wrestler not in the lineup."

Pitzen would have wrestled at either 135 or 140, costing Brighton maneuverability with his lineup.

"Well, when you take the best kid out of the lineup, it makes it tough," Brighton said.

Dowell, despite his assessment that of his team lacked sharpness, could smile about the bout that clinched the win. Brandon Willer struggled while hanging on for 12-10 win in the 189-pound match. That gave Ross an insurmountable 33-19 edge.

It was the first time, according to Dowell, that Willer has had any "contact" this season.

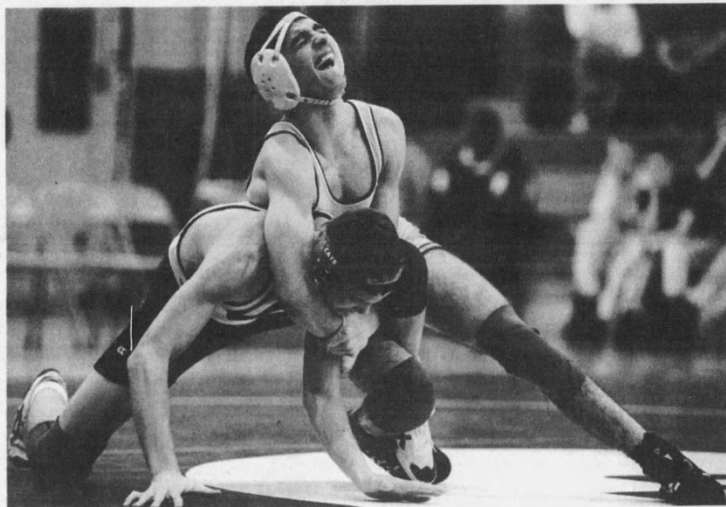
"He has just been running and riding bike," Dowell said.

Ross wrestles in the Toledo Rogers Tournament next week.

"What we have to work on are our shots," Dowell said.

"We're not following through on our second step. Too many were just taking a shot and sitting."

Intimidation, though, made up for that.

Ross wrestlers avenge another 92-93 setback

Fremont Ross got an early start to win its second successive Great Lakes League wrestling match Thursday night at the Purple Pit.

The Little Giants built a 40-5 lead before settling for a 46-17 victory.

"I think it got started in the first junior varsity match (Ross won 25-6) and kept right on going," Ross coach Grover Dowell said.

The two Ross wins came over teams that had beaten Ross last season.

"That's kinda nice, isn't it?" Dowell asked no one in particular.

Dowell said his team, unlike a week earlier in a 33-25 win over Whitmer, was sharp. Backing up that summation were six pins for the Little Giants, half of them under a minute.

Fred Ivy started the Little Giants off on the right foot, pinning 103-pound opponent Mike Rohda in 43 seconds. Emmanuel Heidelberg pinned David Rittenhouse in 36 seconds of the 119-pound match, fattening the Ross lead to 15-0. Then came a Ross loss that, oddly, Dowell said was a key to the victory.

"What really got the kids going," Dowell said, "was when we stuck a JV wrestler (Dan Hickam) in at 125 and he fought to keep from getting pinned and saved a team point. That happened all up through the lineup."

Hickam lost on a technical fall, allowing Napoleon five team points and not six had he been

pinned.

The other Little Giants Dowell referred to were Ken Kreilick at 160 and Russ Mylander at 171. Kreilick lost a major decision (four match points) and Mylander a regular decision (three match points). Both wrestlers fought from their backs to keep the Wildcats from a possible 12 team points. Instead, Napoleon settled for seven.

"They saved team points by coming back," Dowell said.

"Really, all through the lineup, I am tickled pink with the aggressiveness and the moves they showed tonight. We were much sharper."

Napoleon coach Karl Yunker discounted any possibility that his team may have been hampered by the system's teachers strike. Many programs were being run by volunteers before a court order put the teachers back in the classroom.

"I don't think the strike had anything to do with this," Yunker said. "I think Fremont Ross had a lot to do with this."

"I was afraid this would happen. Once it got started, it rolled."

The Little Giants also got pins from Matt Merrill at 135, Shawn Heidelberg at 140, Josh Carnahan at 152 and Brandon Willer at 189.

The Little Giants return to action today at the Toledo Rogers Tournament beginning at 4 p.m. The 15-team tournament will Saturday with semifinals and consolations at 11 a.m. Admission is \$3 for adults per session and \$2 for students.

Cavaliers suffer one-point loss

MIAMI — Steve Smith scored Miami's last four points, including a 17-foot jumper with 7.3 seconds remaining, to give the Heat a 90-89 victory Thursday night over the Cleveland Cavaliers.

Mark Price made his third 3-pointer of the fourth quarter with 49.2 seconds left to give Cleveland an 89-86 lead, capping the Cavs' comeback from a 17-point deficit in the final period.

Smith, who was playing his first game in a week after recovering from the flu, nailed a 16-footer to cut the deficit to 89-88. Then, following a miss by Price, Smith sank a turnaround that gave Miami the winning points.

Cleveland's Terrell Brandon took the inbound and was hounded by Smith before taking

a forced 15-footer that rolled off the rim. Glen Rice grabbed the rebound as time expired.

"The shot felt good, but I guess I didn't get it up there enough," Brandon said.

Price, nursing a score right calf, scored 22 points for Cleveland, which lost its fourth in a row and has dropped seven of eight. Cleveland, held below 100 points in all seven losses, has lost its last seven road games.

Brad Daugherty led Cleveland with 25 points, and Tyrone Hill had 15 rebounds.

Smith, who missed three games, didn't start but he came through down the stretch.

"It was important for our confidence even though we lost a 17-point lead," Rice said. "Steve's very capable of doing anything."

Mills hospitalized

Mills was taken by ambulance to Palmetto General Hospital. He was seen clutching his chest as he left the court after the game and was given an electrocardiogram in the lockerroom.

"He had heart flutterings and was very short of breath and we're very concerned right now," Cavaliers coach Mike Fratello said.

Mills played 24 minutes with six points and three rebounds.

Hatfield takes 130-pound title

Jason Hatfield won the 130-pound championship, and Fremont Ross placed third at the Toledo Rogers Tournament this weekend.

Hatfield scored a technical fall over Springfield's Jason McCourt 19-2 in the finals. Hatfield, who was seeded fourth, also beat top-seeded Justin Vonderberg of Tiffin Columbian by technical fall before knocking off the third-seeded McCourt.

Ross finished with 127 points, trailing team champ Wauseon and Springfield. Wauseon compiled 218 points and Springfield 172 in the 15-team event.

"Three kids didn't place that I thought would," Ross coach Grover Dowell said. "If they would have placed, we would have gotten second."

Shawn Heidelburg of Ross also advanced to the finals before losing 12-8 to Springfield's Rick Steele in the finals at 140 pounds.

Matt Merrill, meanwhile, finished third at 135.

"He ran into a real tough kid in the semifinals," Dowell said. Jeff Blidner of Westerville South edged Merrill 7-5 in the semifinals.

Other placers for Ross were heavyweight Paul Cruz, who finished fourth; Jamie Ross, who was fifth at 145; and Fred Ivy, sixth at 103.

"All six kids that placed did a real nice job," Dowell said. "Fred Ivy at 103 and Paul Cruz at heavyweight were two that came through surprisingly."

Little Giants win Mackey title

■ Back to roots:

Ross wrestling team wins tourney named for its first coach.

Fremont Ross wrestlers won five of seven championship matches, leading the Little Giants to the team title in the 21st Mal Mackey Memorial Wrestling Tournament Saturday at Ross High School.

It was the fifth time the host Little Giants have won the tournament, which is named in honor of the coach who began the wrestling program at Ross. Previous titles came in 1985, '86, '87 and '88.

The Little Giants scored 181 points in the eight-team tourney, easily outdistancing runner-up Lakota's 151 1/2. Port Clinton was third with 136 and Elida rounded out the top four with 111 points. Sylvania Southview was fifth with 87, followed by Spencerville 60 1/2, Lima Shawnee 43 1/2 and Bryan 29.

It was the second tourney title for Ross coach Grover Dowell, in his second season as head coach. Last season, Dowell's team won the Lima Tournament.

"I did not think we would be that far out in front," Dowell said. "We had a good second round; that was the spark."

Ross entered the tournament with eight seeded wrestlers.

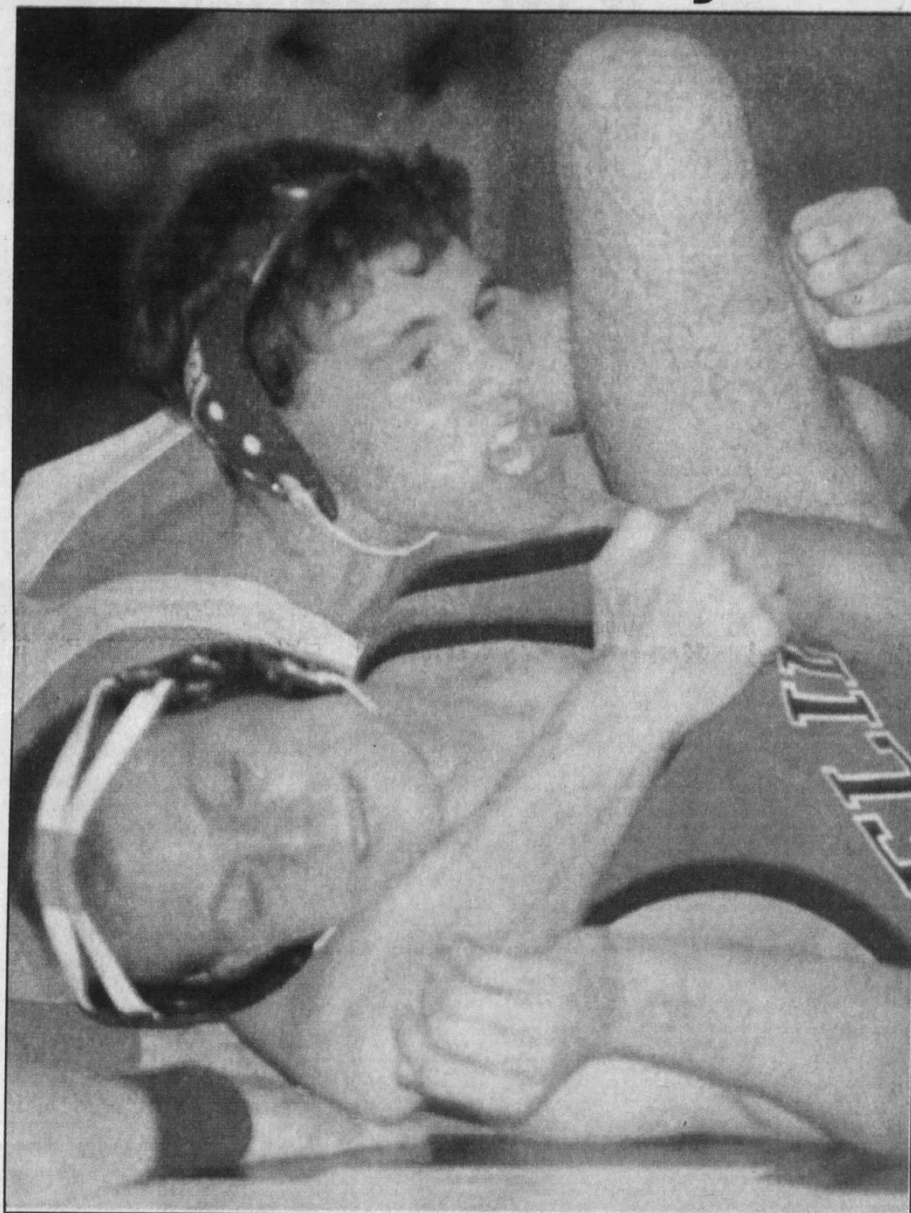
"But we placed 10," Dowell said. "That shows the kids did an outstanding job."

Ryan Patterson (112), Emmanuel Heidelberg (119), Jason Hatfield (130), Matt Merrill (135) and Brandon Willer (189) won individual titles for Ross. Shawn Heidelberg (140) and Ken Kreilick (160) were runners-up, Jamie Ross (145) and Paul Cruz (275) were third and Brian Reinbolt (152) finished fourth as the Little Giants lost only once in their 10 matches in the championship round.

Dowell pointed out the effort of Emmanuel Heidelberg, who was third-seeded.

"He pinned the second-seeded kid (Ryan Reed of Southview) and technical failed the first-seed (Andy Yonikus of Lakota)," Dowell said. "He did an excellent job."

Adam Milligan (145) and Jeremy Schmeltz (152) won titles for

Carothers said he expected the toughest match for his team would be at 135 pounds. His soothsaying was correct. After surviving two cradles in the final minute, Clyde's Mike Andres edged Matt Merrill of Ross 8-6.

"I just wanted to keep my balance," Andres said about surviving Merrill's potential three-point moves.

Even though his team dominated, Carothers said he sees room for improvement.

"Most of them wrestled very well," he said, "but some of them were a little bit slower than I would like to see."

Clyde started with falls by Chris Staats (103), Jason Lamson (112) and Tim Arden (125) to go with a major decision by Gary Laub (119) for a 22-0 lead before Ross got on the board.

"I knew it was going to be tough," Ross coach Grover Dowell said. "We came in without a full standard lineup. Clyde is a good squad...they just took it right to us."

By the time Ross scored next, Clyde had built a 37-6 lead on pins by Chad Long (140) and Steve Yates (145) along with Andres' narrow win.

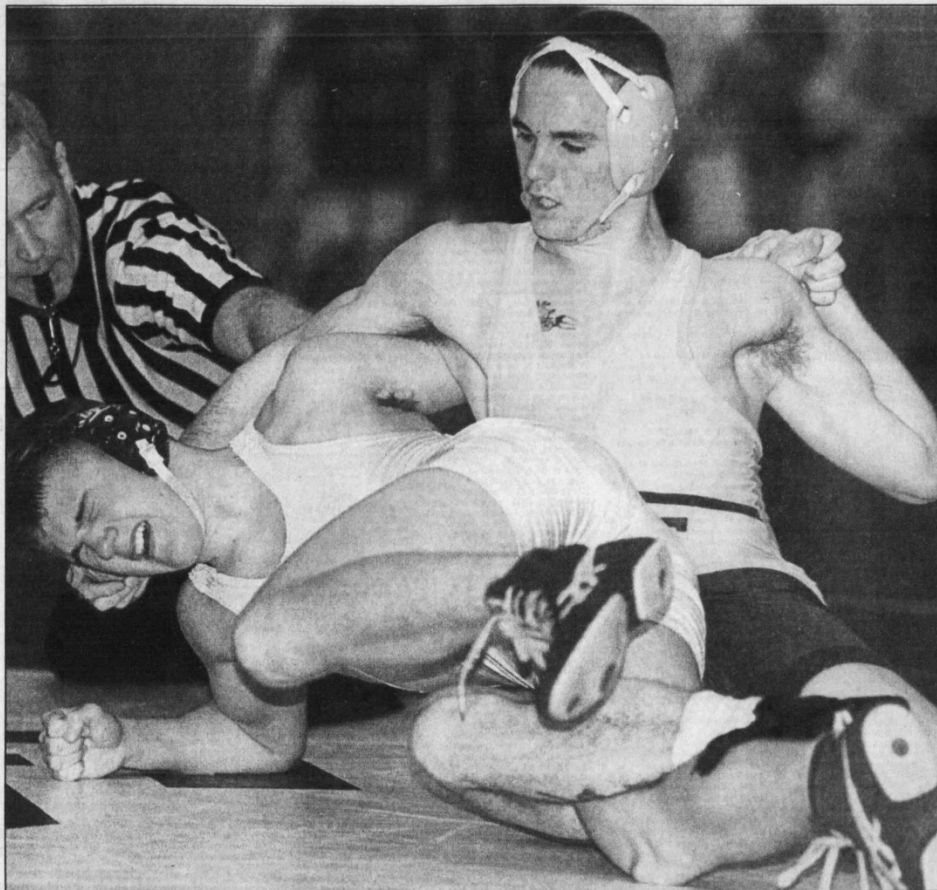
Ken Krelick, dropping down a weight to 152, outpointed Clyde's Lucas Borer 9-8 for the second Ross match win.

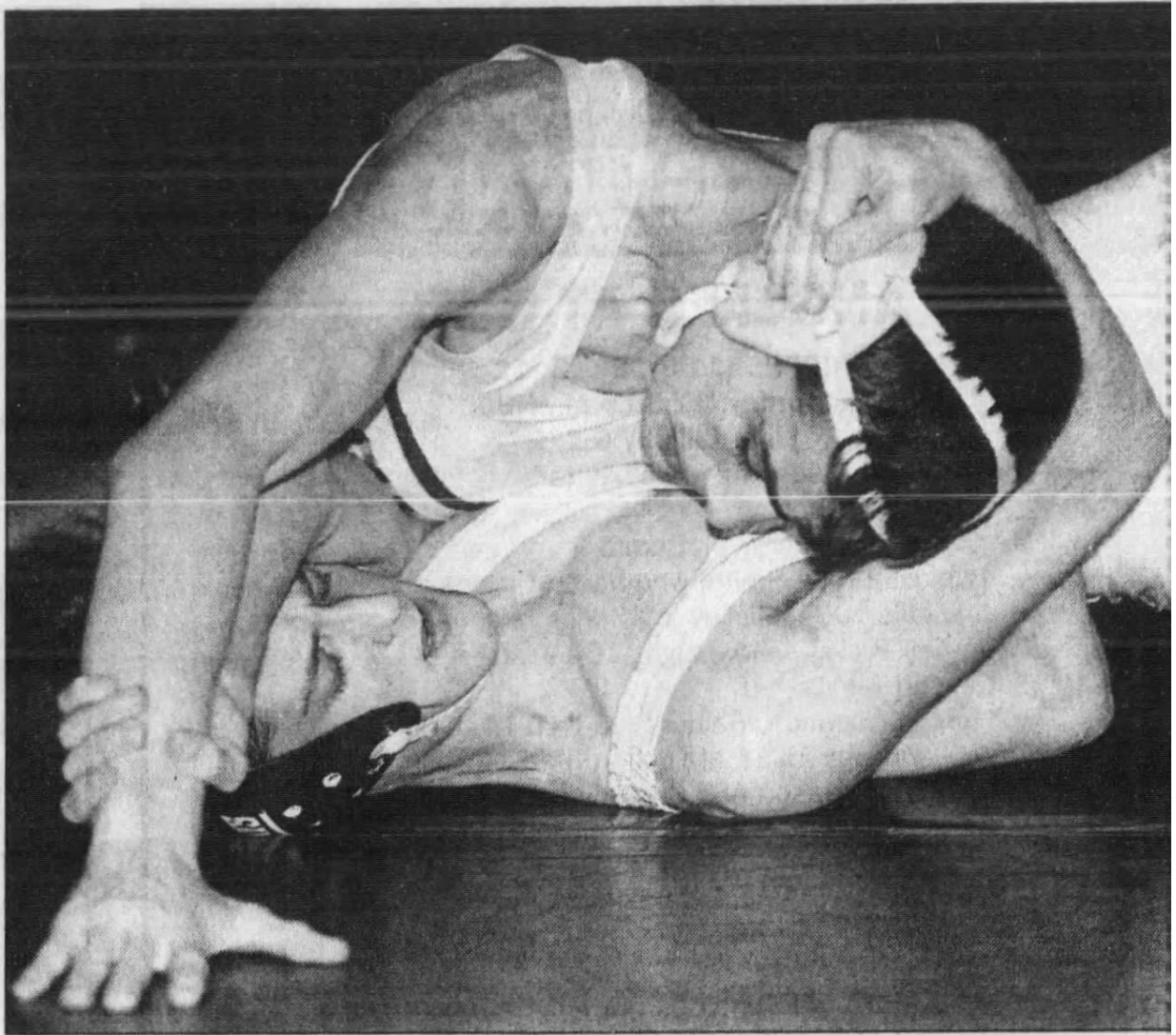
