Fremont Ross coach Mark Gedeon has more players who can shoot from the perimeter and more who can handle the basketball than he did last season.

The Little Giants, however, will be much smaller as a group. Gedeon told his players the best rebounder will be on the court.

Sophomore varsity newcomer Bryce McKinstry, who with two others is the tallest at 6-foot-4, looks like the team's top rebounder. Senior point guard Taylor Druckenmiller is the only returning starter.

Senior wing Brandon Trolio started about 10 games last season.

"There's not much carry-over," Gedeon said. "We have two of 11 letter winners back and they'll be in different

roles. They know the speed of the game and the preparation and they'll try to share that with their teammates, but they're adjusting to roles as leaders."

Junior guard Tre Campbell will start with junior wings Keyon Sewell and Roger Burling among those competing for the final spot. Sewell returns to Ross along with junior guard Maliek Johnson, who was at St. Joseph Central Catholic the last two years.

"You like the youthful energy they have," Gedeon said. "They know they have things to learn and they're willing to be coached."

Senior forward Alec Snodgrass is the remaining senior. Junior point guard Davion Anderson and junior forward Jovan Lewis are also in the mix.

Only Druckenmiller and Trolio have varsity experience from a team that won eight games last season, including two in the Toledo Area Athletic Confer-

ence.

"Taylor is a hard-nosed ball-handler who can shoot and get to the rim," Gedeon said. "Brandon is a good outside shooter and passer. He can play multiple positions. Campbell scores and rebounds well for a guard. He plays with energy and he encourages his teammates."

"It's nice to see a player without varsity experience finding his niche."

Freshman wing Jaedyn McKinstry, sophomore wing Bryce Root and sophomore guard Jabryis Heidelberg will compete for varsity minutes.

"We've had some players step up," Gedeon said. "(Bryce McKinstry has) earned time. He's scratching his potential."

DRUCKENMILLER PACES ROSS IN WIN OVER CLYDE

Made five three-pointers
for game-high 19 points

CLYDE - Tre Campbell scored 12 of his 16 points in the first half Saturday as Fremont Ross topped Clyde 65-44 in a non-conference matchup.

"He shot the ball better," Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon said. "He admitted to nerves last night in his first varsity game. He can score in different ways. We're going to need balance and for players to step up. These kids love the game."

Campbell canned a three-pointer for a 17-11 advantage after one quarter. He scored in transition off his own steal and dropped in another three for a 12-point lead early in the second quarter.

Ross (1-1) lost its opener Friday against Toledo Woodward.

"You have to give Ross credit," Clyde coach Ryan Fretz said. "They played a game away last night. They were ready. They got in the passing lanes and ran the floor."

Taylor Druckenmiller made at least one three in every quarter and five overall for Ross.

"We focused on not turning it over, rebounding and getting out in transition," he said. "Our goal was to keep them under 10 in each quarter - we didn't quite do that - but 21 in the first half is pretty good."

Druckenmiller finished with a game-high 19 points.

"As a head high school coach, it's always great to have a senior point guard who understands the game," Gedeon said. "He's a competitor and he showed the different facets of his game. He demonstrated his growth."

"Clyde tried to get momentum and he seized an opportunity and took control."

Bryce McKinstry had an early impact with four rebounds and a block for the Little Giants.

"He's a defensive player and rebounder as a sophomore," Gedeon said. "You can see he's competitive. His foul trouble limited his time. We had some good energy in the second quarter. When we got the lead to double digits the kids relaxed and we challenged them to value the basketball."

Ross committed 28 turnovers Friday compared to eight Saturday. Brandon Trolie had 12 points and Davion Anderson helped Druckenmiller with the ball-handling.

Clyde had its best stretch as it scored the first eight points in the second half before a Druckenmiller three.

"We executed," Fretz said. "We were having an awful shooting night from outside. Fremont made 10 of 20. We took it to the hole in the third quarter."

Conner Long had 16 points for Clyde and Derick Harrah added 14.

"Conner is a winner," Fretz said. "He loves to win. He loves to play the game. You can't take the fight out of him and he stepped up."

Fremont Ross falls to Tiffin Columbian

FREMONT - It seemed like for most of the night that Tiffin Columbian senior Ro Durham was going to single-handedly do everything he could to defeat Fremont Ross.

"He was getting the ball in the low-block and we know he likes to spin. He's a good finisher over either shoulder," said Ross coach Mark Gedeon. "He's able to put the ball on the floor and create some dribble-drive opportunities. I thought Bryce (McKinstry) limited his touches and if he did get the ball, it wasn't in his scoring zone."

The Little Giants were able to slow down Durham long enough in the last half of the third quarter and first half of the fourth quarter to get their own 3-

point shooting going.

Ross made 5-of-9 3s in the third quarter, made another early in the fourth quarter and held off a late Tornadoes rally for a 60-56 non-league win on Saturday night.

"The play off of our bench with Bryce and Davion (Anderson) and others was key," said Gedeon. "They started getting us back in the game. In the second half, I thought we got the outside shots to go. We hit a couple 3s and the kids relaxed. We told them in the locker room that we needed to make some plays and that the team that was more aggressive and made plays was the team that was gonna come out with a victory."

With the game tied at 24-all at half-time, Taylor Druckenmiller nailed a 3-pointer to open the third quarter for the Little Giants (2-2). Columbian followed

that up with six straight points before Tre Campbell connected from 3. Later, Druckenmiller again hit a 3-pointer before McKinstry hit two free throws. Brandon Trolie made a 3-pointer as the third quarter ended to put Ross up, 44-37.

"Give Fremont a lot of credit. Their kids played incredibly hard," said Columbian coach Travis Kinn. "They really hurt us on the glass and got a lot of second chance opportunities. I think that was the difference."

Roger Burling joined the 3-point party when his make just over a minute into the fourth quarter and a McKinstry score made it 51-41.

A bucket by Todd Simonds seemed to reignite the Tornadoes (3-1) offense, especially Durham, who scored twice more to cut the lead to 51-47, prompting a timeout from Gideon. The teams ex-

changed buckets over the next few minutes before a score from Anderson and a free throw by Trolie kept the Ross lead at 58-51.

Simonds scored as Kinn called time-out with 25 seconds left. Ross committed one of its 14 turnovers on the ensuing in-bounds as Durham scored and was fouled. The free throw made cut the lead to 58-56, and Campbell was fouled. He missed the front end of the 1-and-1 but Trolie grabbed the offensive rebound. Druckenmiller was fouled and made both free throws with 10.8 seconds left to seal the win.

"They were open looks," said Gedeon of the second-half makes. "We have to be able to hit open shots. We don't have that go-to inside player that we can just feed

off of. We have to do ours with movement, passing, and cutting in order to get some open shots."

Durham paced the Tornadoes with 27 points and 13 rebounds while Simonds scored 17 points. Ross out-rebounded Columbian, 36-27.

"They did a good job of hitting shots," said Kinn. "I think they ran some good plays to get guys open shots. They hit shots and got a lead but our guys bounced

back and kept playing hard."

Trolie topped the Little Giants with 15 points and 12 rebounds. McKinstry had nine points and eight rebounds. Ross made 7-of-11 shots in the fourth quarter.

"With this young bunch, we know we have to do a lot of teaching," Gedeon said. "We seen the mental mistakes but I also thought we saw some baby steps in terms of growth."

Saturday was Ross' only home game in the month of December. After three road games to start the season and the win over Columbian, the Little Giants hit the road for four games before returning home Jan. 6 vs. Toledo Whitmer.

ROSS CAN'T FIND MAGIC IN OT

After big rally to force overtime Little Giants come up short

FREMONT - Fremont Ross trailed by as many as nine points in the fourth quarter Friday.

The Little Giants finished the quarter on a 11-2 run to force overtime, but once in the extra session, Ross seemingly could not find the offense spark it needed.

The Little Giants made just 1-of-7 shots and committed two turnovers in the final four minutes as Toledo Whitmer escaped the Purple Pit with a 65-60 win in Three Rivers Athletic Conference action.

"I think our team took a lot of positive steps tonight, in terms of what it takes to compete at the level against top competition," said Ross coach Mark Gedeon. "I think tonight was the best team effort we have had all year. Everybody contributed and everybody supported each other. I am proud of my boys. It is a shame we were on the wrong side of the scoreboard."

The Panthers (6-3 overall, 3-2 TRAC) were led by Derrick Rayford's 22 points, while Nick Witcher scored 20 points. The two combined for the last 18 points by Whitmer over the final 11 minutes.

"We got the shots we take. When it gets to overtime, it is about who makes more plays," Gedeon said. "Whitmer's physicality really dictated what happened in the second half. Witcher is a very talented athlete. Everybody knows that when you talk about Whitmer basketball, Witcher and Rayford are the two you talk about. They established themselves like the veterans they are. They are their go-to guys."

Witcher started overtime off with four consecutive makes from the free throw line. Brandon Trollo made a pair of free throws for the Little Giants (2-7, 0-4) but Witcher scored inside off of an assist from Rayford on the other end.

Ross committed one of its 12 turnovers on the ensuing play, which led to Rayford being fouled. He made one free throw before Tre Campbell drilled a deep 3-pointer to get Ross within 61-59 with 42 seconds left.

Rayford was fouled and made one free throw to allow the Little Giants to stay within one possession. The Panthers called timeout and Ross eventually dumped the ball down low to Trollo,

who was called for an offensive foul before attempting a short jumper.

"We had a play with several options and to be honest, that was not options one, two, or three," Gedeon said. "But, we went through our progressions and it is a tribute to our kids to find that open spot there. Brandon had a nice look, but the call did not go our way."

Witcher made two free throws on the other end to seal the victory.

A 3-pointer by Rayford opened a 52-

43 lead for Whitmer with 6:24 remaining in the fourth quarter, but Taylor Druckemiller and Campbell hit consecutive 3s to draw Ross to within 52-49. Campbell split a pair of free throws and Keyon Sewell (13 points) scored to tie the game.

Rayford drove on the other end, was fouled, and made both free throws for the lead with 1:28 left. The Little Giants nearly turned the ball over on the next

possession, but fell on a loose ball that eventually was ruled a jump ball, in favor of Ross. Campbell took the inbounds pass, scored, and was fouled. He missed the free throw to leave the game knotted at 54-all.

Each team missed the front end of a 1-and-1 before Ross called timeout with 21.7 seconds left. The Little Giants put the ball in the hands of Druckenmiller, who drove and missed a lay-up in the waning seconds of regulation.

"That is what we wanted. We wanted Taylor going to the basket in that situation," Gedeon said. "Taylor had a great look and that is something that if we get in that situation again, we would put Taylor in that position again."

Ross jumped out to an 8-2 lead before Whitmer responded with an 11-0 run. In the second quarter, Campbell scored five straight points and Trolio added a 3-ball for a 27-22 lead. Later, two free throws by Trolio gave Ross a 29-25 lead at halftime.

Davion Anderson scored for the Little Giants out of halftime, but the Panthers used another 11-0 run to take a 36-31 lead. Whitmer led, 45-39, after three quarters and a score by Leon Hughes extended the lead to eight points early in the fourth quarter.

"I am proud of my boys. It is a tough loss, there is no question," Gedeon said.

Ross can't contain Williams, Sandusky

FREMONT - Fremont Ross coach Mark Gedeon has enjoyed watching Jayrese Williams for the past four seasons.

Coaching against the Sandusky senior is a different story.

Williams, already the all-time leading scorer in Sandusky High School history, added 38 points, leading the Blue Streaks (8-3) to a 74-54 non-league victory over Ross (2-8) on Saturday.

"Jayrese is tough to defend, no matter what gameplan you come up with," Gedeon said. "We did not want to give him any free runs to the basket. His ability to not only drive to the hole and draw contact, but his step-backs, make him a very special player. There is a reason he is all-Ohio."

Williams asserted himself early and often. He scored 15 of his team's 23 points in the first quarter, but it was the third quarter where he took over.

A 3-pointer by Taylor Druckenmiller cut the Blue Streaks' lead to 37-34, but Williams and Sandusky owned the rest of the quarter. Williams scored and added consecutive 3-pointers to prompt a timeout from Gedeon.

Williams added a 3-point play and Brent Hanson scored before Williams

stepped in front of a Ross pass and scored on a lay-up for a 52-34 lead.

rese. He is a difficult matchup for a lot of teams... Jayrese gets a lot of open shots, but our guys are setting him up."

Ra'Landes Johnson scored and Williams split two free throws to finish off an 18-0 run for the Blue Streaks. Druckenmiller got a lay-up as the quarter ended. Ross made just 2-of-15 shots in the quarter.

"We went 12 possessions in a row that we came up empty," Gedeon said of the third quarter.

"We missed a couple of good looks early in the quarter. I thought we had some good opportunities to get some baskets there. As the quarter went on, I think we resorted back to some bad habits."

Johnson added two

buckets and Keith Williams scored to open a 61-36 lead with 6:11 left in the game — a game that had only a four-point margin at halftime.

"We didn't panic, which was nice to see. We were tested because Ross came out and played extremely hard," Irish said. "We hit some big shots, but the biggest thing was our defensive effort was incredible tonight. Our defensive communication was one of the better we've had out on the court. We picked it up another notch. We have our eyes set on a lot of things and this was another step."

Williams scored eight of Sandusky's first 10 points. Keyon Sewell and Brandon Trolio each hit a 3 to get Ross within 14-9, but Williams countered with one of his four 3-pointers.

In the second quarter, a

3 by Williams coupled with a score from Jamonte Alexander pushed the Sandusky lead to 30-18. After a Ross timeout, Trolio completed the rare 4-point play and added another score to get the Little Giants within six points. A 3-ball by Sewell cut the Sandusky lead to 35-31 at halftime.

"When we take bad shots, it leads to misses, and leads to run-outs for Sandusky," Gedeon said. "They get up and down the

floor as good as anybody in Northwest Ohio. We allowed one mistake to turn into three mistakes."

Trolio had 17 points at halftime, but was held scoreless in the third quarter. He finished with a team-high 24 points.

"I think Sandusky was aware of him at halftime," Gedeon said of Trolio. "We tried to run some sets and get him some shots like we do. A couple of times he got some good looks."

Knights dictate tempo, never look back after fast start

FREMONT - Fremont Ross won the opening tip Friday.

After that, things went downhill, and went quickly. Division I, fifth-ranked Toledo St. Francis ran away from the Little Giants in the first quarter and never looked back in a 89-38 win in Three Rivers Athletic Conference action.

"I liked our defensive intensity in the first half, especially in the first quarter," said St. Francis coach Travis Lewis. "I think we attacked well off of missed shots and in transition. We took care of the ball in transition."

Jakiel Wells scored the first two buckets of the game for the Knights (12-1 overall, 6-1 TRAC), but Keyon Sewell scored for the Little Giants (3-10, 1-6). Later, Sewell hit

a 3-pointer, but that's when St. Francis took over.

Jackson Harris scored inside before Kenny Coleman hit two consecutive shots. After John Burnham scored, Drew Swerlein nailed a 3-pointer and added three free throws for a 21-5 lead.

Brandon Trolie scored to stop the run, but, it was only momentary. Burnham hit a 3, Harris made two free throws and Marcus Lang connected on a 3-ball to put the Knights up, 29-7, after one quarter.

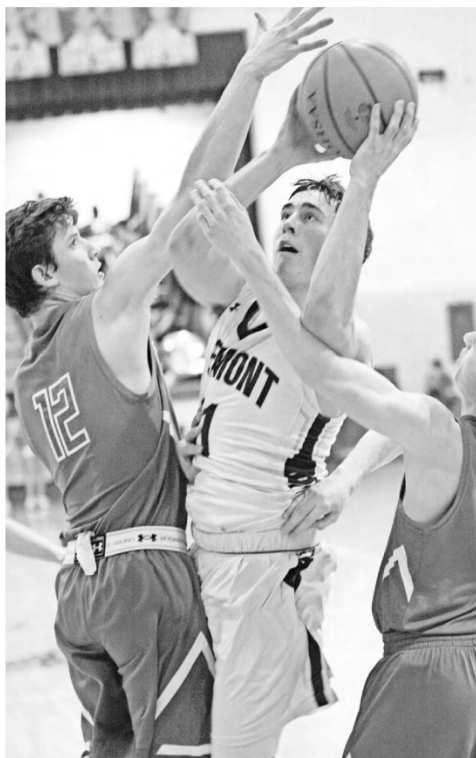

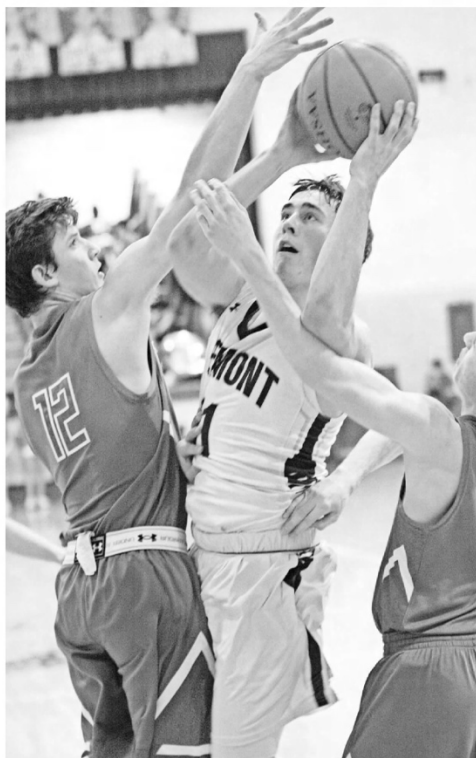

"They've been responsive," Trolio said. "They want to learn. Some practices you have to treat it like a game. Even if we're up 20, it's the Fremont Way. Be sound and play our basketball."

Coaches have also recognized Trolio's progression off the court.

"He's matured in the classroom," Little Giants assistant Mike Wilson said. "We sometimes focus on the athlete. Athletics has helped a young man become a better student and more goal-oriented."
