Little Giants won't be so little

FREMONT — When asked recently by college coaches why he only scored 7.2 points per game as a junior, Ross' Jack Gedeon always responded by telling them that his team's game plan was to go out and win — thus he didn't take more than nine shots a game.

His unselfish attitude was shared by a majority of his Little Giant teammates a year ago, as Ross displayed what team basketball was all about. Playing without a proven star player — Gedeon returned as the leading scorer at 2.7 points per game — the Little Giants pieced together a lineup made up of role players, put together a game plan that played to those players' strengths and turned them into one cohesive unit that took many teams and onlookers by surprise en route to a 14-9 campaign and 7-7 record in the Three Rivers Athletic Conference.

"We had 10 players that averaged 10 minutes or more a game last year," said Ross coach Mark Gedeon, now in his 19th season. "Our players buy into the system. They knew if they worked hard and executed the game plan that they were going to get rewarded with playing time. These guys are looking forward to being underdogs again. They want to surprise people and they take pride in that."

Coach Gedeon, arguably, displayed one of his finest coaching jobs in the 2012-13 season. And this winter, he'll be applying the same philosophies, as once again, the Little Giants' roster will feature

players who would hold secondary roles on most teams in their conference.

"It's been my philosophy since I started coaching 28 years ago that when you have five players on the floor, each and every player has responsibility to our offense, as well as our defense," coach Gedeon said.

"If we get people in the right place at the right time, they can contribute in multiple ways, whether it's scoring, rebounding, assists or defense.

"

"This group will be the same way, too. I'm very fortunate to coach a group of guys again that are very unselfish and who believe in the team goals."

Jack Gedeon at 6-foot-4-inches is Ross' top returner in points (7.2), assists (3.1), rebounds (6.7), steals (1.4), and blocked shots (1.9).

"It's sort of weird to think Jack was a post player last year because he led us in assists," coach Gedeon said. "Even though he led us in re-

bounds, blocked shots and was second in scoring, he will definitely have a lot of the primary ball-handling duties.

"But what's nice is I think we got some juniors that are ready to take over some of those guard duties as well.

Junior James Wright is one of those guys.

"I think (Wright) is someone we'll see some quality minutes from who will hopefully allow our team to thrive in the open court," coach Gedeon said.

Grant McConnell, a 6-2 wing player, will add a good shooting touch from the outside.

Inside is where Ross' strength will lie. Seniors Jarvis Jones (6-5), Dylan Jagodzinski (6-4) and Drew Solander (6-3) are all back, and all, have plenty of varsity experience. Jones averaged six points and three rebounds a game as a junior, Jagodzinski poured in 5.7 points and grabbed 3.4 boards a contest, while Solander had 4.0 and 2.0 respectively.

off-season for us," coach Gedeon said. "He's a very active post player. He's a very good athlete and he continues to get better and better every time he's on the floor."

"Drew (Solander) and Dylan (Jagodzinski) are very experienced, very coachable and very intelligent players. There will actually be times when we can put them, Jarvis and Jack on the floor at the same time and with all at 6-3 or taller, that's considered tall for us Little Giants."

Grant McConnell, a 6-2 wing player, will add a good shooting touch from the outside.

"He's a very intelligent player and a joy to coach with his positive team attitude," said coach Gedeon of McConnell.

Jalen Slick and Chris Liggins will be other full-time varsity newcomers. Each played JV a majority of the year as sophomores, but also filled in at the varsity level. Tanner Albert, who didn't play basketball his sophomore year, is back and made the varsity team in tryouts.

As for the TRAC, coach Gedeon considers Findlay and Toledo Central Catholic to be the favorites.

"Findlay has the most experience coming back and they got a good mix of

young talent they can mix in this year where they could be much deeper than in the past few years," coach Gedeon said. "Then you look at Central with (DeShone) Kizer at point guard for the fourth year, they got the horses to make life difficult for anybody from a defensive standpoint."

Ross opens its season on Nov. 29 when it hosts arch-rival Sandusky.

Big men fuel the Little Giants

Jagodzinski, Jones,
Solander carry team

FREMONT — While many schools find it hard to find one or two big men to play the post position, Fremont Ross had three stand out in their season opener.

Dylan Jagodzinski, Jarvis Jones and Drew Solander combined for 31 points and 16 rebounds as the Little Giants topped Sandusky, 55-49 in non-league action in front of a capacity crowd at the Purple Pit on Friday.

"Our goal was to get the ball inside," Jagodzinski said. "I don't think they could stop us and when we did get it down low, it was easy for us to finish because we have three big post players."

The Streaks got within four points at 40-36 in the fourth quarter, but a 3-pointer from the corner by Grant McConnell allowed Ross some momentum. Jagodzinski made a free throw and after one of Sandusky's 18 turnovers on the night, Jagodzinski made a bucket for a 46-36 lead. The lead was 12 points when Michael Delk made back-to-back 3-pointers sandwiched around a free throw again from Jagodzinski.

After a Ross turnover, Delk scored again to cut it to 54-49, prompting a timeout from Ross head coach Mark Gedeon. Sandusky, however would turn the ball over three times in the final 90 seconds and wouldn't score again, allowing Fremont Ross the victory.

"It's always nice to get that first victory," Gedeon said. "We know we're capable of playing better. We know our level of intensity has to go up so we play to the best of our ability."

After an early 2-2 tie, the

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Little Giants went to work. McConnell hit the first of three 3-pointers on the night and buckets by Jones and Jack Gedeon quickly made it 9-2. The Blue Streaks (0-1) scored on a jumper by sophomore Davion Fisher, but a layup by Jones, a short hook by Jagodzinski and a deep 3-pointer by James Wright off the bench gave Ross a commanding 16-4 lead after a quarter.

“It would be nice to get that first quarter back,” Sandusky coach Dustin Sharp said. “We just want our kids to keep getting better. We faced adversity early on and a lot of kids would have packed it in, but our kids didn’t tonight.”

Sandusky battled back and cut the lead to four after two free throws by Fisher. The run including a rim-rattling break-away dunk by Fisher to bring the Sandusky half of the jump to its feet. However, the Little Giants re-grouped for a 25-19 halftime lead. Ross out-rebounded Sandusky in the first half, 15-8.

“When you go against a team like Sandusky, their tra-

dition is to get a lot of offensive rebounds,” coach Gedeon said. “So when it comes to that, you have to maximize your possessions and get as many rebounds as you can.”

The Little Giants boosted the lead to eight points on four separate occasions in the third quarter, but a late 3-pointer by Fisher gave Sandusky life heading into the fourth quarter.

Fisher led Sandusky with 21 points while Delk scored 12 points.

“We really wanted to compete tonight and we really did,” Sharp said. “Ross is an experienced squad but we had a lot of positives. We have a lot of young players and they did not quit. I’m proud of them.”

Jagodzinski topped Ross with 12 points and seven rebounds while Jones had 11 points and seven rebounds. Solander added eight points and four rebounds while Gideon finished with seven points and a game-high eight rebounds.

“At times, the big guys did play well for us,” coach Gideon said.

“Jarvis Jones really stepped in the first half but then Dylan Jagodzinski had a huge second half. They all played well.”

FREMONT — Drew Solander poured in a game-high 15 points and Jack Gedeon chipped in 13 as the Little Giants outscored the Spartans, 29-15 in the second half en route to a non-league victory on Saturday at the Purple Pit.

Gedeon led the team with eight rebounds, while also contributing three assists and two steals.

“We played solidly throughout,” Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon said. “We moved the ball well, communicated well and played solid defensively. Anytime you have 13 assists to only 11 turnovers, that’s going to make any coaching staff happy. And we shot 55 percent from the floor and held Start to only 30 percent.”

Grant McConnell and Jalen Slick added a two steals each. Slick added 10 points for Ross (2-0), which led 29-21 at halftime.

“Our guys kept staying with the game plan,” coach Gedeon said. “Jack had a dunk to start the fourth quarter, that I think broke Start’s back and gave us the momentum to finish it off.”

The Little Giants will host arch rival Findlay on Tuesday in Three Rivers Athletic Conference play.

Perimeter shooting floors Little Giants

FREMONT — Although Findlay was picked to win the Three Rivers Athletic Conference by the league coaches, it was Fremont Ross looking to make a statement Tuesday.

However, the Trojans nailed eight 3-pointers as they seemingly squeaked out a 56-44 win over the Little Giants.

"We were worried about their inside guys," Findlay coach Jim Rucki said. "That hurts us and to be honest, we

haven't shot well lately. We did (Tuesday), but it was a tough struggle all game."

Fremont Ross (2-1, 0-1) jumped out to an early 8-6 lead before the Trojans' defense settled in. Grant Niswander's 3-pointer put Findlay up for good.

Adam Twining swished a pair of free

throws and Grant McKinniss' jumper made it 13-8 before Twining, who checks in at 6-foot-3, threw down his first of three dunks on the night to end the quarter.

"It's so difficult to play from behind against a Findlay team," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said.

Neither team made much progress in the second quarter, each scoring six

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points.

The third quarter saw more offense. The Little Giants cut the lead to four at 22-18 on a layup from center Drew Solander.

A jumper from Twining and 3s from Niswander and Braden Miller opened Findlay's lead to 30-21. Ross cut the lead to 34-29 on its final offensive possession, but a deep corner 3-pointer by Twining was crucial.

The Little Giants didn't go away, as back-to-back layups by Solander and Jarvis Jones cut Findlay's lead to five points. But as they did all night, the Trojans (4-0, 2-0) came up with big 3-pointers.

First it was Twining, and after a Ross turnover, Miller connected and in a matter of 30 seconds, the lead had blossomed to 11 points. The Little

Giants couldn't get close after that.

Rucki noted before the season that rebounding was going to be a challenge, but he wasn't concerned with that Tuesday.

"I thought we did O.K. rebounding," he said. "The easy buckets we gave up is what hurt us. We didn't communicate too well and that almost hurt us a lot."

Twining topped Findlay with 17 points, while center Austin Gutting was held to a quiet 13.

"With Gutting inside — he's a horse," Gedeon said. "He's so skilled and then when you surround him with three or four good 3-point shooters, that's so tough to defend."

While Fremont Ross was successful at times on offense, Findlay did just a little bit more.

"We needed to make a play and then Findlay would make a play," Gedeon said.

"I'm proud of how my kids played."

Spartans roll past Ross

FREMONT — After Ross controlled the opening tip, there wasn't much else it controlled during the game's next 32 minutes.

Lima Senior forced the Little Giants into 18 first-half turnovers and cruised in the second half to a 71-44 Three Rivers Athletic Conference victory Friday night at the Purple Pit.

"We really went to the de-

fensive glass, and got some rebounds," Lima Senior coach Shawn Allen. "Our defense created offense. I couldn't be happier with our squad."

The Spartans (2-3 overall, 1-1 TRAC) led 10-6 early on before Rico Stafford broke away for a thundering dunk. Momentum stayed on Lima Senior's side as they forged ahead for a 17-8

lead after one quarter. The Spartans' defense led the way, forcing 11 Ross turnovers in the quarter.

Another seven turnovers by the Little Giants (2-2, 0-2) allowed Lima Senior to breeze to a 36-16 halftime lead. Brady Allen made three 3-pointers in the first half to pace Lima Senior.

"We needed to execute of-

fensively and defensively and we didn't," Ross coach Mark Gedeon said. "We needed to get pressure and hit the glass. Lima Senior was the more aggressive and better team tonight. They played with hunger and a high level of intensity."

Aggressive play by the Spartans also forced them into foul trouble and free throw opportunities for the Little Giants. However, they made just 6-of-16 free throw attempts in the

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first half.

“With that many missed free throws and so many turnovers, it’s so hard to have that many empty possessions,” Gedeon said. “We knew they would be aggressive and allow us to get free throw opportunities but we didn’t capitalize.”

The Little Giants were unable to get any offense strung together in the second half. The Spartans pushed ahead by as many as 30 points, which was also the margin (57-27) after three quarters. Lima Senior snapping a three-game losing streak with the win.

Ross finished with 29 turnovers and made 16-of-30 free throws. Lima Senior outrebounded Fremont Ross by five, something coach Allen

noted as a problem in the three-game losing streak.

“We’ve been outrebounded badly lately,” he said. “We didn’t really go to the glass in our last three games but we made a concentrated effort on that tonight.”

Allen led the Spartans with 18 points while Jay Thomas scored 17 points.

Jack Gedeon topped the Little Giants with 11 points and nine rebounds while Dylan Jagodzinski added 10 points. Ross now turns its thoughts towards a road trip to Toledo Whitmer next Friday night.

“We have to get a heck of a lot better,” coach Gedeon said. “We have to have our players accept responsibility. We need all five players doing the same thing. We’re not good enough for four players, or three players to be doing the same thing. We need to get back to Fremont Ross basketball.”

Boys Basketball: Gedeon steals win for Ross

Ross' Jack Gedeon made two of the biggest plays in the final five seconds of Friday night's Three Rivers Athletic Conference tilt at Whitmer.

With the Little Giants trailing by two points with 17 seconds left, Gedeon pulled down the defensive rebound on the second of two missed Whitmer foul shots. The senior then drove the ball the length of the floor, before spotting up and sinking a 12-foot jump shot to tie the game with five seconds on the clock.

But instead of getting overly excited and running to the other end of the floor to play defense, Gedeon instead stole the Panthers' inbound pass and made a lay-up with 2.6 seconds left to seal a 52-50 Ross win.

"He showed his basketball IQ and experience on that play," Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon said. "He has a great IQ, which makes him the great player he is for us."

Jack led Ross (3-2, 1-2) with 15 points, 10 rebounds and six assists. Jarvis Jones added 11 points and seven boards, while Dylan Jagodzinski had 10 points and six rebounds.

"I'm very pleased with the way we bounced back after the Lima game," coach Gedeon said. "Going into the week I told the guys our focus is on the now. It was a great team win. Everyone out there gave us something positive tonight."

"Hopefully it will carry over to (tonight's) game against a big and physical Tiffin Columbian team."

John Ash had 16 points to lead the Panthers (1-4, 1-3).

Ross wins physical battle

Little Giants beat Tornadoes 53-40

TIFFIN — The first official day of winter greeted northwest Ohio with a miserable embrace of flooding, lashing winds and nearly non-stop cold, enveloping rain Saturday.

But that didn't stop the Tiffin Columbian faithful from showing up at their home gym decked out in all manners of ugly Christmas sweaters, ribbons, bows and wrapping paper — and even a full Santa Claus suit — as the Tornadoes welcomed the Little Giants for a little pre-holiday hoops brouaha between friendly rivals.

Still, instead of "The Carol of the Bells" to accompany, and somewhat define the whole festive tableau, a cacophony of whistles rang out and was more often than not followed by a chorus of boos which rained down on the referees from the crowd after every stoppage of play during the physical, foul-riddled non-conference tilt.

In all, the evening's officiating crew called a not-so-grand total of 39 fouls, 22 against Columbian and 17 against Ross, with 23 whistles alone coming in the first half. But the road-tested Little Giants, fresh off an emotional 52-50 buzzer-beater victory at

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Whitmer the night before, overcame every holding, illegal use of hand and lane violation call imaginable — along with a gritty outing by the Tornadoes — to stay hot and energetic enough to head back up SR 53 as 53-40 winners.

"Definitely, after playing last night and winning at the buzzer at Whitmer, to come in here tonight and show the energy to start off this game 9-0, I was very, very pleased," said Ross coach Mark Gedeon, of the fast, tone-setting lead his team churned out.

"I think we had good position defensively, which helped execute the game plan, and that allowed us to stay in a comfort zone for the whole game," he said. "It was another good team win, but it was also sort of another grind-it-out victory, which is something I think is going to be a characteristic of this team.

"We're much different from the last couple of years where we had people who could go out and press, and trap, and run the floor," he added. "This team, I think, is going to rely on things like execution and half-court defense, and hopefully our ability to compete on the boards to stay in basketball games."

Jack Gedeon, definitely helped out in that latter capacity, ripping down seven of the Little Giants' 17 rebounds on the evening, to go along with a solid nine points that he was rewarded with for perhaps being the most active Ross (4-2) player at both ends of the floor.

Jarren Hampton knocked down two big ones from downtown to finish with 10 points. Post Drew Solander added four points off power lay-ins via a pair of savvy in-bound plays by Gedeon, while fellow senior "big," Jarvis Jones, muscled in four more.

It was versatile 6-foot-4

senior forward Dylan Jagodzinski who emerged as the biggest offensive story of the night, via his game-high 14 points, which came courtesy of his ability to use his body to out-duel the Tornadoes' big guys down low.

On the TC side of the floor, the Tornadoes' "bigs" battled in the trenches, too, with 6-6 junior Derek Dryfuse pouring in 11, and fellow 6-6 junior Cody Daniel and imposing 6-5 senior Isaih Moore chipping in four and six, respectively.

Yet, when the final tally was in, it was 5-11 senior playmaker Josh Flint who was the high man for the Tornadoes (2-1), as the wiry guard pretty much slashed, scooped, stopped, popped and dished his way to 13 points at will.

"Josh had an all-around nice game for us tonight," TC head coach Bill Beaston said. "The biggest thing I liked, was he did it out of an offense. He didn't just say, 'OK, I'm going to take this one-on-one.' The ball got entered, it got swung, it came in the framework of an offense and things opened up. Josh saw that and he took advantage of it."

"It's always nice going against Coach Gedeon and Fremont," he added. "I spent three years there before I came here, and it's always really nice to see those people.

"There were times I thought maybe we should be wearing shoulder pads and helmets, instead of being on a basketball court."

After coming out for the second half, the two teams seemed to settle down a little, with the Tornadoes committing 10 fouls down the stretch, and the Little Giants only six. However, it was the latter that broke the game open in a big third quarter, when it doubled up TC by scoring 14 to the Tornadoes' seven, to make it 44-30 going into the final quarter.

On the night, Ross shot 15-of-29 from the free throw line, while TC went 11-of-18.

Jack of all trades

Ross' Jack Gedeon records triple-double in 72-58 win over Sandusky

SANDUSKY — Jack Gedeon has only attempted 10 or more shots in a game once in his Little Giants' career.

He only needed eight to tally a new career-high 16 points on Friday, recording a triple-double — adding 13 rebounds and 13 assists — as Ross defeated arch rival Sandusky, 72-58 in a non-league contest for its third win in as many games.

"My dad (Little Giants coach Mark Gedeon) has been yelling at me to shoot more," the younger Gedeon said. "I've always been more of a facilitator. But if people are going to play back on

me, that's when the scoring opportunities are going to appear."

Jack Gedeon only had four

points after the first half, however, his impact was more than felt on the floor. The senior had 10 assists and eight boards in the first 16 minutes as Ross (5-2) scored the game's first 10 points and built a lead as big as 22 points (33-11) in taking a 41-27 advantage to the halftime locker room.

"My dad (coach Gedeon) gave us a great game plan for the defense (Sandusky) was running in the first quarter, and it really paid off," Jack Gedeon said. "I saw a lot of open looks and thank God my guys finished them."

Most of the Little Giants'

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Ross

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first-half scoring came from Grant McConnell on the outside and Jarvis Jones in the paint. Jones finished with 15 points, 10 of which came in the opening half. McConnell had 14 points and nine in the opening 16 minutes. McConnell's corner 3-pointer with 5 minutes, 55 seconds to go in the first quarter, off a pass from Jack Gedeon, gave the Little Giants a 10-0 lead.

Ross led 23-9 after one quarter.

"We worked hard all week on our spacing and moving the basketball knowing that we got a little bit of a physical size

advantage inside, and that I got three posts that finish pretty well around the rim," coach Gedeon said. "Combine that with a couple of 3-pointers right out of the gate, I couldn't ask for a better start."

Jayrese Williams poured in a game-high 19 points for Sandusky (1-6), including a three that cut the Blue Streaks' deficit to 45-39 with 4:05 left in the third quarter. But two baskets inside by Drew Solander, combined with a three from Jack Gedeon, got the Little Giants' advantage back up to 54-39 entering the final period.

"We got lucky there because I thought initially that our rebounding at the defensive end was very poor, and Sandusky came out and was very aggres-

sive offensively and on the offensive glass in the third quarter," coach Gedeon said. "That's how (the Blue Streaks) were able to chip it down to six points. Thank goodness, I think we showed a little bit of composure there and were able to get it back to double digits towards the end of the quarter."

"I thought that was a critical part of the game where we could have really folded to the pressure and instead we just got back to the game plan and showed our experience."

Sandusky never got any closer than a 56-49 deficit that came after a three-point play from Williams to end an 8-2 run to start the fourth quarter. The run ended on an in-

side basket from Jones, who added three assists and two blocks. One of his blocks on the baseline helped the Little Giants push their lead to four possessions late in the contest.

"He's just a joy to coach," said coach Gedeon of the 6-foot-5 Jones. "He's a hard worker and an athletic big man with a huge heart. For him to come up with 15 points tonight is a nice reward for him."

Coach Gedeon also liked what he saw from the 6-2 McConnell.

"I thought he had an outstanding fourth quarter," he said. "I thought he was a little shaky at times in the middle quarters. But in the end, he hit 7-of-8 free throws, and he got a

couple key rebounds, too."

Solander finished with 10 points for Ross, while Dylan Jagodzinski contributed seven boards.

"My dad always preaches team basketball," Jack Gedeon said. "This year, we've really taken that to heart."

Jack doesn't care that he's not racking up the points. Even when his dad wants him to shoot at times, he sees another play to be made by a teammate.

"Sometimes I feel like there's shots I could take,

but in the flow of the game, it isn't the right shot to take," he said.

His coach can't complain.

"I don't think there's any question that he was the best player on the floor tonight," said coach Gedeon of Jack. "When you get to coach those types of players, obviously, it makes the coaches' job easier."

"It's even more special when you know he's your own son, too."

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Ross slugs past Clay, streak grows to 4

FREMONT — Drew Solander isn't your prototypical basketball player in terms of athleticism.

Even Ross coach Mark Gedeon won't shy away from acknowledging that the 6-foot-3 senior post is the slowest kid on his team. But what Solander lacks in athletic ability, he

more than makes up for in his ability to catch and finish around the basket.

Solander's inside presence provided a much needed shot in the arm for the Little Giants' offense on Friday in a 46-41 Three Rivers Athletic Conference victory over Clay inside the Purple Pit.

"I thought he was just outstanding tonight," said Gedeon, whose squad only attempted 36

total shots, shooting 16-of-36. "We gave him some great post feeds and he finished well.

"He was definitely the spark we needed in this one."

With Ross (6-2, 2-2) leading, 42-39 with 20 seconds remaining, Solander got positioning down low where Jack Gedeon found him with a great feed pass from the right wing for a lay-up and a key two-possession advantage. The Little Gi-

ants had built a lead as big as 41-31 with 2:16 left, before Clay's defensive pressure in the final two minutes made things interesting.

"Jack is our leader and he's the one we look to when we're in a slump to get us out of those kinds of situations, and he came through for us like he always does," Solander said.

Gedeon finished with only two points, but contributed eight rebounds, seven assists, four blocks and two steals.

"We can definitely win without Jack scoring, just because he does so many other things for us," coach Gedeon said. "With this game, we wanted to go inside to Drew as much as we could because we knew we had the size edge."

Solander had eight points in the final eight minutes alone, helping Ross extend its five-point lead (31-26) entering the final quarter. The Little Giants led 18-16 at halftime, attempting only 17 first-half shots.

"Our intensity was definitely a lot less than it normally is," Solander said. "I think the day off of practice yesterday really hurt us. We came out flat and I think that was the difference in the game. It allowed Clay to hang around all night and make things as close as they were."

The Eagles (1-8, 0-5) weren't big on shooting either, attempting 39 shot attempts. Clay finished 14-of-39 from the floor. Pat Booth led all scorers with 18 points, including nine points in the second quarter where the two squads traded the lead six times.

"I, personally, expected this to be a much slower paced game since Clay's scores normally weren't above 50," So-

lander said. "Coach (Gedeon) didn't talk about it too much. But I knew they'd play us tough, which they did."

Solander is enjoying the role of being a senior leader. He's played on the Little Giants varsity squad the past three seasons.

"I love it," he said. "I try not to be a bully or anything like that, because I didn't like that stuff when I was a freshman. So I try to be a likeable guy and lead these guys by example."

There's no doubt in his coaches' mind that he's been a key player and leader for this Little Giants' team that continues to impress with their ability to win, despite not having a prototypical star player.

"Without question," coach Gedeon said. "He's a leader by example for us and he's very responsible and intelligent. He understands his role well and he's probably one of our best players in terms of boxing out and getting position. We always know he's going to be in the right spot on the floor, whether its offensively or defensively."

"He gives us his heart and soul each time out."

Senior Jarvis Jones added 13 points inside for the Little Giants and pulled down seven boards.

Ross will look to keep its four-game winning streak alive tonight when it hosts Waite in a non-league contest.

"We'll have a similar game plan to what we had tonight," coach Gedeon said. "Hopefully we can keep things rolling."

Stubblefield established a single-game Port Clinton program record with 40 points, including six 3-pointers in the


first half.

Little Giants searching for answers

Ross struggles in 63-41 loss to Titans

TOLEDO — Ross coach Mark Gedeon asked his bench several times on Friday, "how many times this week did I tell you we have to play team basketball?"

"At least they were honest with me and told me, 'a lot coach,'" Gedeon said.

For the first 10 games of the season, his team — made up of

role-type players — was as good as any group when it came to executing as a cohesive group. The results proved it as Ross started the campaign 8-2.

But after a surprise loss at Port Clinton last Saturday and Friday's 63-41 Three Rivers Athletic Conference loss to Toledo St. John's Jesuit, the longtime bench boss of the Little Giants is dumbfounded by what he's seeing from his team.

After having a lot of early success pounding the ball inside to posts Dylan Jagodzinski, Jarvis Jones and Drew Solander,

Ross (8-4, 3-3) got away from its game plan. The Titans — winners of 11 straight — outscored the Little Giants 21-9 in the third quarter and blew the game open after Ross had its deficit at five points midway thru the second quarter.

The key factor: too much individual play and not enough team basketball. Instead of running plays, players were freelancing, driving to the basket with multiple defenders on them, not helping on defense or forcing bad shots.

"Those are definitely some

uncharacteristic things, and we're doing them now," Gedeon said. "Early in the year when we did things we wanted to do, good things happened. When we do things that individuals want to do, there you go, you get those type of results offensively and defensively. The plan worked for awhile tonight, but we can't have people playing four versus five or three versus five. It doesn't work.

"This isn't a team that can play as individuals."

St. John's guard Gabe Kynard scored seven of his game-

high 14 points in the third quarter. He shot 4-of-7 from the field in the second and third quarters as the Titans (11-2, 7-0) shot 13-of-26 in the middle periods as a collective group.

"I told my guys that they needed to come in and respect this team," said St. John's coach Ed Heintschel, whose team is currently ranked 15th in Division I. "(Ross) was coming in here with a nice record, we had to be ready to go. This was an important TRAC game.

"I thought we were a little tight early. The officials let us play and there were a few plays under the basket where we got banged around a little bit. Right now, we're just looking to get better and try to play that perfect game, which we never will. But we'll take positives from this."

Ross opened the game's scoring with two buckets in the paint from Jagodzinski. Second-chance points were also a key for the Little Giants in the opening quarter as Solander registered two baskets off of offensive rebounds. Jack Gedeon dished out a majority of his six assists in the opening two quarters. But was largely silent in the second half as St. John's made adjustments.

"We wanted to speed the game up and we felt that the match-up we had on Jack Gedeon wasn't putting enough pressure on him, so we switched more people on him and tried to make him play faster," Heintschel said. "(Ross') inside game is very

good. We wanted to push them out and away from the basket a little bit to prevent them from using their size."

James Wright led the Little Giants with 11 points, seven of which came in the second quarter. Jagodzinski and Jones each had eight points.

Wright's 3-pointer from the wing with seven minutes remaining in the opening half, closed Ross' deficit to 15-14.

The Titans finished the half outscoring the Little Giants 18-7 to take a 33-21 halftime lead. They outscored Ross 16-4 in the six minutes of the third quarter for a 54-30 advantage entering the final quarter.

"We're definitely capable of being a lot better," coach Gedeon said. "I hope our players believe we're capable of a lot better. One of the things we've always preached is learn from your mistakes and your successes, too. We got to make a commitment to doing that."

"Hopefully this will get some of our players focused on what we need to do together."

FREMONT — Although the Toledo Central Catholic team banner is listed under the "F" section of seating at the Purple Pit, the Fighting Irish brought their "A" game to Ross on Tuesday night, and then some.

Three Fighting Irish players scored in double digits as they beat the Little Giants 60-35 in Three Rivers Athletic Conference action.

"The kids played hard tonight," Central Catholic coach Jim Welling said. "It was a Tuesday night in these weather conditions and that's hard. We're back in school but the kid are just kind of blah. It was low fan enthusiasm so we tried to create

energy."

While leading just 8-6 after a Dylan Jagodzinski lay-up, the Irish (11-2, 6-1) went on a 7-0 run.

Later, a Jack Gedeon bucket cut the lead to 17-10. But on the ensuing possession, Central Catholic looked to be in a bit of trouble as DeShone Kizer, who is committed to Notre Dame for football, was called for his second foul of the game. He was sent to the bench with 50 seconds left in the first quarter.

Trojan's Niswander shines with steals

FINDLAY — Anticipation wasn't making Findlay's Grant Niswander late Friday.

His waiting made it easy for the ball to be with him as he stole the ball away from Ross defenders eight times in the Trojans' 58-36 win over the

Little Giants in Three Rivers Athletic Conference play.
