

1951 Sectional Tournament Champions

Season Win Over Pt. Clinton Means Nothing, Coach Asserts

Anything can happen in a basketball tournament. Examples: St. Joseph's difficulty with low-ranking Clyde in the Protest; Jackson's hard time with Townsend, winner of only one game, in the county.

With those two examples fresh in his mind, Coach Al Ziemke is taking nothing for granted as his Ross high squad enters tonight's class A sectional struggle with Port Clinton at Sandusky.

The Giants trounced Port Clinton during the season, 74-52, but they weren't under a bit of pressure as they ran up a 25-7 first-quarter lead. How they will react in the tournament, where nerves play a big part in determining winners, is something else.

Wants Normal Performance

Ziemke is hopeful his club will be "loose as a goose", as the saying goes, when it takes the floor tonight. "If we can go out and play our normal game, we will be okay," said the burr-headed mentor. "If we tighten up," he continued, "we will be in for trouble."

Although gratified that his team had the record (13-4) to make it that way, Ziemke is uncomfortable over the fact his team is the top-seeded one in the tournament. He says that top-seeded clubs seldom win.

Port Clinton won only four games during the season, but managed to score plenty of points, even in losing. Ted Selgo is the Redskins' leading point-getter. Selgo had a comparatively bad night against Ross in the season, getting only 10 points. He generally scores between 15 and 20.

Ross and Port Clinton are due to play at 9 o'clock, following the 7:30 contest between Sandusky and Norwalk. Sandusky is favored to win and meet Ross in the semi-finals if Ross can oust Port Clinton.

The tournament is being played in Sandusky junior high school.

Bellevue, Tiffin Columbian Win Close Contests

SANDUSKY, Feb. 28—Both seeded teams advanced to the semi-finals round with last second victories last night, but not before some thrilling, unexpected action from determined underdogs.

Bellevue (11-7) nipped Willard (7-9), 58 to 56, when center Don Adams tipped in a rebound with one second left in an overtime.

Tiffin Columbian (9-7), the second seeded team in the tourney downed Tiffin Calvert (2-10) 49 to 47, when Bob Harger pushed in a lay up with eight seconds left in the game.

Calvert, which failed to defeat a class A foe during the season, led from the first three seconds until the last eight.

Columbian downed Calvert by 15 points and Bellevue routed Willard by 16 during regular season games.

Bellevue trailed from the middle of the first quarter to midway in the fourth, when the Redmen forged ahead 48-46. Bob Bone tied the score at 48-48 and then Willard wrested the lead again on a rebound by substitute J. C. Miller.

DeBlase Ties Score

Sam DeBlase connected on a corner shot for a 50-50 count with 1:55 to play. That was all the scoring until the overtime. DeBlase missed a free throw with 1:35 left.

Willard's Ken Henry scored in the first moments of the extra period, then freshman Ralph Eisenhauer made it 52-52. Adams, back in action after being sidelined the last six weeks because of knee and ankle injuries, put Bellevue in front, 54-52.

Dave Draime, shooting from far out, tied the score again as the teams continued to wage a furious battle. DeBlase and Draime traded goals, Draime's

Redskins Stubborn; Question: Did Boucher's Bucket Count?

SANDUSKY, March 1—Sandusky and Fremont Ross high schools will meet at 9 o'clock in the semi-finals of the class A sectional basketball tournament, just as they were supposed to do, but the Fremonters almost didn't make it.

Sandusky breezed by Norwalk, 63-39, after a 24-point second quarter. Ross, however, was ahead by only two points, 52-50, with two minutes and 30 seconds to play.

A foul by John Lewis and a goal by Dick (Mr. Swish) Houghtaling made it 55-50. Ted Selgo scored for Port Clinton with 55 seconds left, then Ross retained possession of the ball the remainder of the time. Selgo fouled out in the closing seconds.

Difference Of Opinion

The scoreboard clock showed the count to be 54-50, but the official scorers had recorded only 52 points for the Giants. The newspapermen had 54. Coach Al Ziemke claimed that the official scorer did not count a field goal by Bob Boucher, who was fouled while in the act of shooting. The shot went through and was ruled okay, according to neutral observers and the Ross mentor. However, it was not recorded. The official scorebook does not show a field goal for Boucher in the last period.

Both Lewis and Boucher played despite slight attacks of influenza. Boucher was out of school Wednesday because of the illness, while Lewis missed Monday and Tuesday. According to Ziemke, they will play again tonight, but will be a long way from par as far as physical condition is concerned.

Ross led 11-6 midway through the first quarter, but four free throws by Selgo, who with 19 points led the Redskins' attack, made the score 11-10. It was 14-13

at the end of the period. Boucher had three personal fouls against him before the quarter ended.

Glover Takes Over

Port Clinton forged into the lead 18-14 at the start of the second quarter. Houghtaling scored three points, then substitute Charlie Glover, senior forward, pumped in a pair of one-handed shots from out on the court and added a foul a minute later for a 25-18 Ross lead.

Houghtaling incurred his fourth personal in the frame and was removed, cutting down the Giants' offense. Houghtaling is the team's second leading scorer.

Port Clinton fell behind 11 points starting the last period but gradually worked to within range before Houghtaling and Lewis sewed it up in the last two minutes.

Coach Ziemke paid tribute to Port Clinton declaring: "They played a good game. I'm not taking a bit of credit away from 'em."

Sandusky was behind 13-12 at the end of the first quarter, but the Blue Streaks put on a torrid show in the second canto, scoring 24 points for a safe 36-19 margin. Jim Holzmiller scored 15 and Bill Rice 14 for the winners. Sub John Storer made nine for the Truckers.

In the first game tonight, at 7:30, Tiffin Columbian, a close winner over Tiffin Calvert, plays Bellevue, which nipped Willard in an overtime in the first round. Tonight's victors play Saturday for the tournament championship.

Lewis' Goal Wins Overtime, 51-50, After Houghtaling Gives Giants Another Chance

SANDUSKY, March 2—A game band of basketballers from Ross high, twice only seconds from elimination, entered the finals of the sectional class A tournament here last night in a sensational finish before 1,700 spectators.

You had to see it to appreciate it.

Trailing Sandusky 49-50 with 15 seconds to play in an overtime period, John Lewis, six-foot, three-inch junior center, leaped in the air, shot from 15 feet from the side of the basket and looped a field goal that put the Giants in the championship game Saturday night.

The 51-50 victory goes down in Ross basketball history as one of the most thrilling ever won by the local school. Lewis' shot means that the Giants and Tiffin Columbian will play Saturday at 8:30 p. m.

Tiffin had an easy time in its semi-final game, trouncing Bellevue 52-42. Columbian led all the day.

Swish Ties Score

The Giants would never have had to play the overtime if Dick (Mr. Swish) Houghtaling hadn't hit one of his specialty shots, a one-hander from the corner, with 12 seconds to go in the final period. Sandusky was ahead by two points, 47-45, and appeared to have the game in the bag when Jude Theibert was called for stepping the wrong direction over the back-court line.

Ross took the ball and moved down court. There were 20 seconds to go when the locals received possession. Glayden Schafer, whose ball-hawking helped upset the Sandusky efforts to stall out the last 55 seconds, passed over on one side to Charlie Glover. Glover threw back to Schafer, who fired the ball to Houghtaling.

From the corner, Dick let fly. It was a true hit, the ball never touching the rim.

In the overtime, Ross took possession of the tipoff, but Glover missed a shot at the hoop and then Schafer fouled Jude Theibert of the Blue Streaks. It was the fifth personal on Schafer, who was forced to leave with 2:35 of the three-minute overtime remaining. Theibert made his shot, and Sandusky was on top 48-47.

Ross 3 Points Behind

Ross couldn't score, and with 1:15 left, McNutt was fouled while shooting and was given two shots. The substitute made the first. Before another shot could be tried, Coach Vic Malinovsky of Sandusky jumped up and told his team to waive the free throw and take the ball out of bounds. However, the ball had already been handed McNutt and Referee C. W. Jones ordered that the foul be attempted. Under the rules, if the player decides to shoot the ball and is handed it, the decision cannot be changed.

When McNutt's second shot severed the cords for a 50-47 lead, it appeared that the victory was again out of reach for Fremont.

Lewis, however, was fouled just before getting off a shot, re-

ceiving one shot with a minute to play. He made it. The score was 48-50.

Sandusky moved down the floor, but Glover forced a jump ball with Theibert, and the Ross senior controlled the tip. The ball went to Farver, to Glover, then over to Houghtaling, who drove in and shot with 35 seconds to play.

Al's Strategy Works

The ball misseu going through, but Houghtaling was fouled. He was awarded two shots. Mr. Swish made his first, narrowing the score to 50-49. Then Coach Al Ziemke pulled some daring strategy.

Playing to win, the Ross mentor instructed his team to waive the second shot and put the ball in play from mid-court. The pass went in to Boucher, who shot and missed. Houghtaling missed the rebound, Boucher grabbed it and tried again, then Houghtaling's try was off. Lewis shot once, failed, grabbed the ball over on one side, leaped in the air and fired.

It went through to put Ross ahead, 51-50.

Sandusky had one more chance, but Jim Holzmiller's shot was wide and Glover grabbed the rebound. He was tied up by a Sandusky player, but before the ball could be put in play again the buzzer sounded.

It was a signal for the Ross students, subs and regulars to form a mob scene in the middle of the floor as the emotion-filled Giants put on a wild victory demonstration.

The game was a dog fight from the time the Giants overcame a shaky start to get within 14-11 at the end of the first period. Sandusky led by the brilliant Holzmiller, was ahead 14-4. With Lewis doing most of the scoring, it was 14-11 after eight minutes, then Houghtaling scored from the corner for a 14-13 count in the first 30 seconds of the second period.

The score was tied at 20-20. 24-24 (halftime), 26-26 and 28-28 before Schafer's foul put Ross ahead for the first time since the opening minutes. The free throw came after two minutes of the third period.

Schwanger, Elgart Out

Ross led 36-33 with 1:30 left, in the quarter, but Holzmiller made a long shot a second before the buzzer sounded. Ross led 36-35 starting the last quarter. Sandusky spurred to a 39-36 edge, but the lead was whittled and Houghtaling tied it up at 39-39 with 5:46 to go. Lewis made a pair of fouls and Ross was on

top 43-41 with 3:55 to play. Lewis was fouled by Ted Schwanger, his fifth personal. Schwanger joined Howard Elgart on the bench, the latter fouling out with five minutes to play in the third quarter.

The score was tied 12 times in the game as the thrilling finish neared. Lavon Ward was almost a Sandusky hero, scoring from in front of the hoop with 1:17 left to put his team ahead, 47-45.

Lewis made three fourth-period goals that didn't count, each time being fouled by Harold Stradtman before getting off a shot. The Ross center scored his team's first eight points and was the game's chief point-maker with 22. Saturday's championship tussle promises to be another scorcher, as Tiffin was impressive in routing Bellevue.

Ohio Wesleyan To Pay Tribute To Jud Millhon

NEW YORK, March 3—P—Harry Matthews, boxing's latest sensation, sought a title shot with light heavyweight champion Joey Maxim today following his decisive victory over Irish Bob Murphy.

The 28-year old ex-G.I. from Seattle and Idaho showed 6,922 fans in Madison Square Garden and television viewers some of the finest boxing seen around here in many years last night. There hasn't been a better body puncher in these parts since Jake La Motta was sending them solid about five years ago.

No. 2 in the ring ratings, the sturdily built westerner knocked Murphy, ranked No. 3, right out of the race with a magnificently rounded attack that all but blew Irish Bobby out of the Garden. There were no knockdowns but Matthews won the unanimous ten round decision handily.

Whether the transplanted Idaho socker gets his title shot depends on many factors. Maxim's manager, Willy Jack (Doc) Kearns, said he is weighing offers to fight middleweight champion Ray Robinson, heavyweight champion Ezzard Charles and British light heavyweight king Don Cockell as well as the Seattle boxer.

semi-final encounter with Sandusky. The Giants came from behind twice, Dick Houghtaling tying the score for a 47-47 deadlock in regulation time, and John Lewis sinking a shot for a 51-50 victory in a three-minute extra period.

The Ross mentor paid tribute to his team today, declaring that it was sheer fight that won over the Blue Streaks. "We took shots before Lewis finally scored in the last 15 seconds and our boys were really battling for the ball. I'm proud of them. They deserve a lot of credit, for the pressure was terrific but they didn't blow up."

Discussing his strategy in the closing seconds of Thursday's thriller, Ziemke said he was fully aware of the facts—the score and time, but figured that an advantage in size made it worth the gamble of waiving a free throw and taking the ball out of bounds although his team was trailing only one point.

Dick Houghtaling, who has made 74 per cent of his fouls this season, had two shots with 20 seconds to play in an overtime period and Ross behind, 50-48. Houghtaling, cool and poised despite the tense situation, made the first, but Ross took the ball out of bounds instead of letting Houghtaling try again.

Giants Spurt In 4th Period, Beat Tiffin 57-54; Dick Houghtaling Scores 24 Points

Ross high's cool and determined basketeers, in their third straight pressure-packed game, became champions of the sectional tournament at Sandusky Saturday night by coming from behind in the last quarter to defeat Tiffin Columbian 57-54.

The Giants were ahead 55-54 with two minutes and five seconds to play when they started to stall out the remaining time. They waived three free throws, the first with 1:40 to go, then took a three point game clinching lead when John Lewis went in unguarded to score on a layup.

Amazing accuracy at the foul line is the prime reason why the Giants will participate in the one-game district eliminations at Toledo this Saturday. The Giants made 15 of 16 tries. Tiffin, outscored from the field 20 goals to 21, also showed a good percentage on its free throws. Coach Harry Auble's lads made 14 of 20.

Dick (Mr. Swish) Houghtaling, whose field goal in the last 12 seconds tied the score in the Sandusky game and enabled Ross to go into overtime, again rose to the occasion by scoring 24 points.

Coach Al Ziemke's aggregation treated the crowd to another thrilling finish, although it wasn't quite as dramatic as Thursday's overtime victory over Sandusky. The lead changed hands eight times and the score was tied on six occasions.

Ross Trails, 42-36

Columbian got off to a slow start but picked up 17 points in the third quarter while holding Ross to six for a 42-36 lead heading into the last period.

Tiffin led 45-41 with 6:18 remaining to play, but Houghtaling scored twice, once a long shot and again on a tip-in, to tie the score. Then Glayden (Little Poison) Shafer hit a side shot and the locals were in command. Jim Homan tied it up for Tiffin, however, with a shot from 10 feet out.

Charlie Glover, whose performance as a substitute helped the Giants over rough spots in each tourney game, sank a sizzling shot from the side with 4:15 to go and the Giants took a lead they never gave up, although Tiffin stayed too close for comfort.

Bob Harger's free throw made the score 49-48, but Lewis retaliated with a pair of free throws to make it 51-48 with 3:38 left. Harger and Houghtaling traded buckets, then Chad Vogt put Tiffin only a point back with a pair of fouls for a 53-52 count with 2:55 to play.

Ross Starts "Freeze"

Bob Boucher, scoreless up to that time, scored from the pivot

and the Giants kept the lead, 55-52. Columbian swept down the floor and after Vogt missed a shot, Groman tipped the ball in and it was 55-54 with 2:15 left. Glover tried a shot from the side a few seconds later, missed, but Ross controlled the rebound and started their "freezing" act. Tiffin never came close to wresting control. Three personals were committed by Columbian, two in favor of Houghtaling and once on Lewis. Houghtaling was fouled with 1:40 left the first time, 0:57 the next, and Lewis turned down a shot with 0:53 remaining.

As the finish neared and with the crowd of about 1,000 persons shouting and screaming, the Columbian defense moved out toward mid-court. Lewis spotted the clear territory, took a pass from Houghtaling, bounced the ball once and scored.

Ross jumped into an early 6-1 lead and goals by Lewis and Houghtaling and two fouls by Houghtaling but Tiffin roared from an 8-2 deficit to take a 12-10 lead. Harger's shot from the side gave Tiffin the lead at the end of the quarter, 14-13, the ball being in the air when the buzzer sounded. Referee C. W. Jones first signalled that the shot was too late, but after conferring with the timer, ruled the opposite.

In the second period, the score was tied at 16-16 and 18-18, before Homan scored with 5:40 left for a 20-18 Tiffin lead. Lewis promptly tied it up on a rebound, then DeVon Simon and Harger scored to put Columbian on top by four points, 24-20.

Giants Ahead At Half

The Giants ended the period with a flurry of baskets, Houghtaling, Glover, Lewis and Ken Wolf sinking goals for a 30-25 halftime margin.

The third quarter was harrowing for Ross. The team attempted 21 field goals but made only two, while Tiffin went over the 500 mark with seven for 13. But
