Dierksheide, and Buckeye Central Conference runner-up Mike Byrnes round out the singles spots.

"I think Rod (Myers) has a shot at districts or higher," Andrews said. "He's a pretty good player, and he should do well against the ranked players."

The last returning letterman, Mark Schwartz, will team with Justin Oxley at first doubles. Schwartz played second doubles with his brother last year, while Oxley is in his first year.

"They should be all right," Andrews said. "We have an experienced player teamed with someone that is very athletic."

Shaun Badertscher and Jamie Schroeder are playing varsity for the first time this spring, but they are not strangers to each others playing style, as they played doubles all winter.

Andrews admits that asking for a BCC title this spring may be impossible, but that a runners-up trophy may be within reach.

Findlay won the tournament last year with 150 points. Lancaster was second with 70, then came Ross with 60 points.

The Trojans won all five championship matches, while Ross settled for two silvers.

"We should be second," Andrews said. "Hopefully, we can put a dent into Findlay (points)."
