

ROSS TRACK OPENER...

Juniors, Led By Nuhfer, Win Inter-Class Meet

Junior class won the annual Ross high track Inter-Class meet at Harmon Field Friday. Weather was partly cloudy and cool with a few snow flurries falling at times.

High point man for the meet was Guy Nuhfer, a junior, with 13 and three-fourths points. He won firsts in the 180-yard low hurdles, good time of 22.8 seconds, and first in the high jump, five feet, three inches.

Gary Wilkins led the seniors with 11½ points, gaining a first in the road jump, 18 feet, 3½ inches, and tying for first with twin brother Larry in the pole vault at nine feet.

Larry Kelly paced the sophomores with eight points, scoring a first in the 100-yard dash in 10.9 seconds.

Dave Pankratz had 10 points for the seniors, winning the shot put, 41 feet, three and three-fourths inches, and the discus, 113 feet, two inches.

Steve Frontz had 10 and three-fourths points for the juniors, taking a first in the 440-yard dash in the fine time of 56.1 seconds and a first in the 220-dash in 24.7 seconds.

Jim Davis had four points and Gary Bailey four for the sophomores.

Juniors scored 59 points, Seniors 48 and the Sophomores 39. Actually the Sophomores might have had a chance to nose out the Seniors but were disqualified in the 880-yard relay when the first run-

ner ran out of his lane. The Sophomore foursome included Leroy Rollins, Kelly, Ken Svanoe and John Jones.

Dale Hasselbach, senior, won the 120-high hurdles in 19.2 seconds; Tom Koebel, junior, the mile run in 5:06; Senior team being Curt DeVoss, the Wilkins twins and Tom Geer; Ronald Brown, junior, won the 880-run in 2:18.5; Mile relay went to the Seniors (Wilkins, Wilkins, Dave Zimmerman, Dennis Hasselbach), 3:58.5.

Krumske's 699 ABC Headache

DETROIT (AP) — Because he rolled a hefty 699 series Friday night, veteran Paul Krumske may have given the American Bowling Congress its first big classic division headache.

Thanks to his 247-205-247 contribution, the Mont Clare Pontiac team of Chicago took fourth place in the regular team division. The team totaled 3,012, placing it 15 pins behind leading STU's Drive in of Urbana, Ohio.

Why Krumske, a top-ranking star for three decades, is not a member of the classic division is a question which is likely to puzzle thousands of bowlers. Mont Clare, furthermore, competes in the Chicago Classic League, one of the nation's top tenpin loops.

How Krumske managed to bowl in the regular division while hundreds of bowlers of lesser skills and reputations were forced to compete in the classic (professional) division is not easily explained.

"I don't fit into the ABC's definition of a classic bowler," Krumske said. "I derive less than one-quarter of my income from bowling and I am not a member of the professional bowlers association. I talked the matter over with ABC officials extensively before I bowed."

Should Krumske sprint into the all-events lead today — with the help of Friday night's 699 — the ABC will have a lot of explaining to do.

Genoa Defeats Ross 64-54 In Dual Track, Field Meet

Bob Peloquin, winning three events and anchoring Genoa's come-from-behind 880-relay victory, paced the Comets to a 64-54 track triumph over Coach John Ihnat's Ross high thines Tuesday at Harmon Field.

Peloquin won the 100-yard dash in 10.7, barely edging sophomore Larry Kelly of Ross. The Genoa speedster passed up Steve Frontz of Ross the final 10 yards to cop the 220-dash in 24.3 seconds and won the broad jump with a leap of 19 feet, 8½ inches.

Ross' 880-relay team gained a lead via initial bursts of Kelly and another sophomore, Ken Svancie, and Gary Wilkins lost ground the third leg and Peloquin outdistanced anchor Tom Geer of Ross in the final 220 yards. Genoa's time was 1:39.4.

Closest race of the meet was in the 120-yard high hurdles. Dale Hasselbach of Ross nosing out Larry Green of Genoa, Hasselbach's time 15.8 seconds.

B.G. Over Ross In Track 64-54; Tom Koebel, Brown Turn In Fine Mile Runs; Rollins Leaps 20-8 3/4

A couple of feet made the difference Thursday at Harmon Field in keeping Fremont Ross from tying Bowling Green in a dual track meet. B.G. won 64-54.

Ross trailed 59-54 going into the final event, the mile relay and needed the 5-0 point spread awarded the winning team to tie. Tom Koebel led off with a 55-second 440 to give Ross a lead. B.G. cut down the distance on the next two Ross runners, the Wilkins twins, Gary and Lary, and benefitted from a faulty Ross final baton exchange. Anchor Steve Frontz of Ross was slightly ahead of B.G. anchor Bill Krabill until the latter spurted just before reaching the tape to nose out Frontz. B.G. went the distance in 3:41.7 to just over 3:42 for Ross.

Ross was hampered in the 880 and mile relays and in the sprints by the absence of Larry Kelly, out with a leg injury, and Jim Davis, who was attending an uncle's funeral in New York.

Leroy Rollins continued his fine broad jumping with a first place leap of 20 feet, 8 1/4 inches. He went 20 feet, 11 against Findlay earlier in the week. Gary Wilkins took second and Lary Wilkins third for a Ross sweep.

Ross also swept the pole vault, Gary Wilkins winning with a 9

foot, 6 inch effort with Lary Wilkins and Bill Thraves tying for second.

Mile run produced a torrid duel between Ross runner Tom Koebel and Ron Brown. Brown passed Koebel with about 220 yards left and only a spurt in the final five yards allowed Koebel to win. Koebel clocked a fine 4:47.8 and Brown 4:48.

Scruggs Sets New Harmon Field Marks

Judge Scruggs, Sandusky high senior, set two new Harmon Field records in a dual meet against Fremont Ross here Tuesday. Sandusky won 33-1 to 41-23.

Scruggs set a new pole vault record of 13 feet, 1 1/4 inches, believed to be the highest standard in the state this year. It bettered the old Harmon Field record by more than a foot. Previous record was 12 feet, 1 1/4 inch, set by brothers Don Whittaker, 1935, and Jim Whittaker, 1945, of Sandusky.

Another Sandusky Harmon Field mark was topped by Scruggs when he went 21 feet, 7 inches in the broad jump. Old mark was 21 feet, 5 inches set by Carl Krueger of Sandusky in 1935. Scruggs took only two jumps, the second one breaking the record.

Fans were awed by Scruggs' apparent ease in clearing the barrier in the pole vault. He went over with ridiculous ease at 11 feet, cleared 12 feet easily and went over at 13 feet, 1 1/4 inches with a little to spare. He tired at 13 feet, 6 inches and would have made it his third jump but hit the bar with his hands after clearing the mark.

The state record in the pole vault is 13 feet, 9 and fractions inches.

Nuhfer Wins Twice

Ross won three first places, two by junior Guy Nuhfer, time of 17.1 in the 120-yard high hurdles and time of 22.2 in the 180-yard low hurdles, fine performances by the Ross underclassman.

Ron Brown, also a Ross junior turned in another nifty 880-yard run, winning in 2:05.7.

Harmon Field records were threatened by Bill Espy, SHS, who went 10.2 in the 100 (record is 10.1) and by Paul Garrett, SHS sophomore, 51.7 in the 440-dash (record is 51.4).

Espy also neared the 220-dash mark with a time of 22.8 seconds (record is 22.7).

Ross second places were registered by Leroy Rolins, broad jump; the Wilkins twins, Gary and Lary, tied with Bill Thraves and a Sandusky boy for second in the pole vault; Tom Koebel, second in the mile and half-mile; Steve Frontz, second in the quarter mile.

Both Sandusky and Ross are entered in the Mansfield Class AA District track and field meet which starts Saturday morning and concludes Saturday afternoon.
