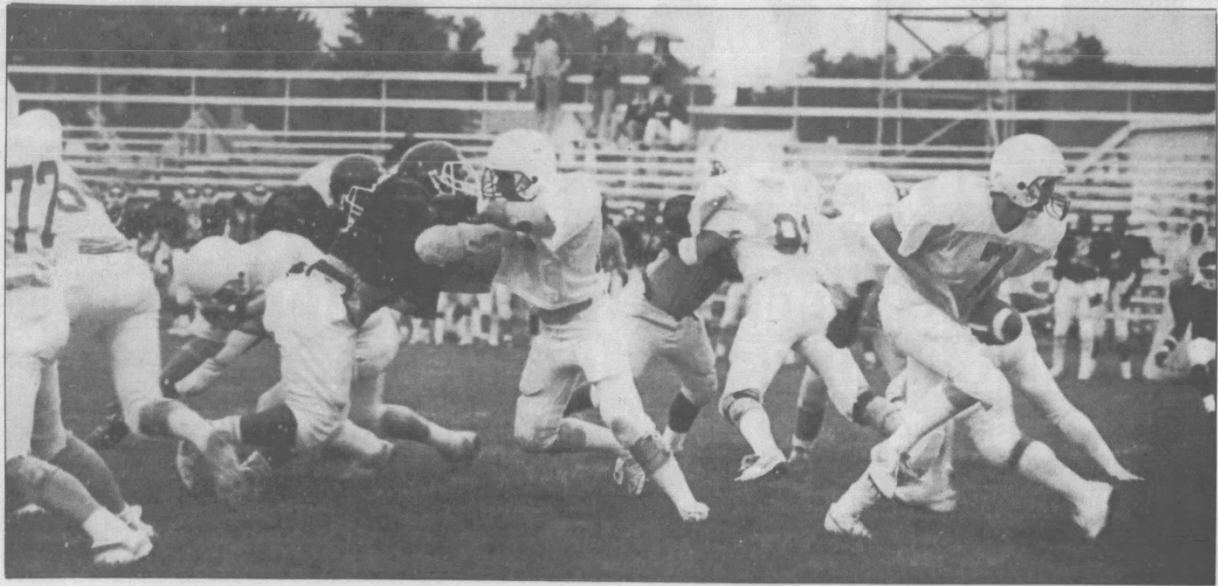

Rain dampened the Ross and St. Joseph Central Catholic preseason football scrimmages Friday.

The Little Giants took on Toledo Macomber at the University of Toledo Glass Bowl while St. Joe traveled to Lakota.

At the Glass Bowl, Macomber outscored Ross 2-1 in a hard-hitting scrimmage that resulted in several Ross injuries.

"I don't know if any are serious," Ross Coach Rex Radeloff said, "but we got quite a few."

Chuck Webb, Macomber running back, scored twice for the Macmen.

"He is definitely a big college prospect," Radeloff said.

Ross will open the regular season at Tiffin, Friday, against Columbian. The Tornadoes defeated Sandusky 10-7 in a "preview" game Friday night.

At Lakota High School, rain and wet grounds made playing rough for the teams.

"It was awfully wet and sloppy," St. Joe Coach Tom Narducci said. Narducci's team had the only score of the game.

"That was set up on a long pass," the St. Joe coach said.

He added, "It was too wet and sloppy but I was just glad to get out and get some work done."

St. Joe opens the regular season next Friday, traveling to Clyde to take on the Fliers.

Tornadoes whip Little Giants 36-6

TIFFIN — Tiffin Columbian Coach John Tomaszewski may have known the feeling, but he could not feel the pain knifing through the Ross Little Giants.

Columbian quarterback Duane Tyree tossed four touchdown passes while riddling the Ross secondary for 268 yards to lead the Tornadoes to a 36-6 mugging over Ross Friday night at Columbian Stadium.

It was the worst beating that Ross has absorbed since a 35-7 playoff loss to Cincinnati Princeton in 1983. It was only the third time a Ross defense has allowed over 30 points in a game since 1977 and it was the first time a Columbian team has beaten Ross two consecutive games. The Tornadoes tripped Ross 20-17 in the 1986 opener.

"I can imagine how they (Ross) feel," Tomaszewski, in his first season at Columbian, said, "but we are thrilled to win like this. This should really fire up the kids."

"We just got beat by a very good team," said Ross Coach Rex Radeloff. Radeloff tried to sum up the lopsided loss succinctly but it was almost impossible: His team was kicked about and walked over.

"We had been concerned," Radeloff said, "about our defense. In three scrimmages (and against Columbian), we had not seen a hard hit on defense. In my 14 years here, I cannot remember anything like that. I know Coach (Joe, defensive coordinator) Siesel feels the same. We just have to work and work and work at it."

"In our defense, the 4-4, you have to have two good tackles and two good inside linebackers who want to hit," Radeloff said, "and we have to look for them."

Tyree, a 6-1 senior, offered a good imitation of a former Heisman Trophy winner who

wore the number the Columbian signal-caller carried: 22. Doug Flutie would have been proud.

Tyree completed 12 of 16 passes as he picked apart the Little Giants. He hurled touchdown passes of 74, 10, 19 and 69 yards and scored the first Tornado TD of the season, trotting seven yards around left end nine minutes into the game.

Bryan McGowan hauled in five Tyree passes for 126 yards and a TD and sophomore Joey Goodman caught three more, including the 74-yard bomb, for 97 yards.

To rub more salt into the Little Giants' wounds, running back Ben Fogel continually slashed into the Ross defensive backfield while rushing for 99 yards on 13 carries. Running mate Brian Heebsh added another 34 on 11 carries as Columbian balanced out the passing attack with 145 yards on the ground.

Ross quarterback Craig Raney and wide receiver Tracy Hufford pulled Ross temporarily back into the game midway through the third quarter. After Columbian had rolled a 23-0 halftime lead, Raney directed the Little Giants on a 60-yard, 11-play drive to the Little Giants' touchdown.

Raney completed five consecutive passes to Hufford in the drive, passing the final two to the 6-2 senior to complete the drive at the 6:46 mark of the quarter.

Raney was 11 of 20 for 117 yards with Hufford hauling in eight passes for 97 yards. Sophomore Terry Carter, inserted into the lineup when starting tailback Rick May suffered a neck injury in the second quarter, led Ross runners with 37 yards on 14 carries.

May suffered a jammed neck. X-rays were negative at a Tiffin hospital but he was kept overnight for observation.

Woodward helps Ross open big home slate

Maybe the Ross football team should adopt a revised Golden Rule as its motto.

This one would go "Do unto others before they do unto you."

Tiffin Columbian followed the revised commandment and parted the Ross defenses for three dozen points while allowing the Little Giants to pass for six.

"Saturday and Sunday were hard days," Ross Coach Rex Radeloff said. "We went over films and we did not see any hard contact or aggressiveness. I guess you could say it showed a lack of varsity experience.

"We had a lot of kids not hustling on the back side of plays defensively and on offense, we were letting their defense hit us before we hit them."

Do unto others....."

"What we have to do," Radeloff reasoned, "is instill confidence. That is what our whole week is focused on."

Only Radeloff and his staff did not have had a whole week in which to prepare for Friday's 8 p.m. opponent at Harmon Stadium, Cincinnati Woodward. Tuesday, when a dense fog blanketed the Sandusky County area, Fremont schools were postponed for a day. That wiped out a day of practice.

"A football coach is schedule oriented," Radeloff began, "and you get into a pattern and hopfully, you don't break it. To football coaches, Tuesday and Wednesday are 'work' days; the days when you have contact. We have missed one of the work days."

Radeloff planned a longer practice session Wednesday as his team gets ready for the Bulldogs.

Woodward, like Ross, is 0-1,

losing 28-0 to Cincinnati Elder last Friday.

"They are a team that will hit you," Radeloff described Woodward. "they have decent size and speed."

Linebacker/running back Charles Mitchell, defensive tackle, offensive guard Cory Jones and defensive end/tight end Ricky McGill are rated as the Bulldogs to watch by the Radeloff.

"Defensively, they went hard at Elder," Radeloff explained, "and were doing fine until Elder began to hurt them with passing."

If anything, that facet of offers an encouraging note for the Little Giants; passing was the only area that Ross looked fairly decent in against Columbian. Quarterback Craig Raney completed 11 of 20 passes for 117 yards. Eight of Raney's passes, including a two-yard touchdown pass, were hauled down by split end Tracy Hufford.

"We did not check off (change plays at the line) in the first half," Radeloff said, "but in the second half, we did and it paid off."

Another of the few positive things for Ross was the running of sophomore tailback Terry Carter. Taking over for injured Rick May, Carter picked up 37 yards on 14 carries. Carter, or Bryant Haralson will draw the starting job Friday.

May is definitely out of the game against Woodward after jamming his neck in the Columbian game. He was to go to neurologist today for further evaluation.

The game with Woodward is the first time the schools have met on the gridiron and it marks the first of seven home games for the Little Giants.

Two first half TDs good for first Ross win

Sophomore Terry Carter rushes for 102 yards

It could be termed an ordinary football scoring drive but to Rex Radeloff, it was a sight for sore eyes.

Quietly smarting from his team's lopsided setback in the season opener a week ago, Radeloff's Ross Little Giants made a pair of first half touchdowns pay off for a 14-0 victory over Cincinnati Woodward Friday night at Harmon Stadium.

"That was a super drive," Radeloff said as he relaxed in the coaches room located above a noisy Ross dressing room. "The offense played well the whole first half but in the second half, we got conservative and were sitting back on our heels."

The Little Giants could be forgiven for that.

An 11-play, 64-yard drive following the opening kickoff help sweeten the sour taste that had lingered in Radeloff's mouth for the last week, ever since his team was beaten 36-6 at Tiffin.

"I don't even want to think about that," he said. "There was a lot more hitting in this game."

Craig Raney's four-yard keeper put Ross on the board at the 6:38 mark of the opening quarter. Sophomore tailback Terry Carter, who finished the

night with 102 yards on 23 carries, gained 44 of the yards on six carries. The sophomore keyed the drive with runs of 15 and 17 yards.

The second Ross scoring drive was set up by the first of two Bryant Haralson interceptions. Taking over at the Woodward 48 with just under five minutes remaining in the half, Ross hit paydirt in eight plays. Carter, running out of a power-I, bounced off the blocks of Cardell Beachum and Gary McClure and skirted left end from the three for his first varsity TD.

The key plays in the second drive were a 17-yard strike from Raney to Kevin Heck on a third-and-four and a 10-yard first down pass from Raney to Beachum to the Woodward eight.

Sophomore Eric Siesel hit both extra points.

"The defense played very well in the first half," Radeloff said.

"In the second half, I felt we lost a little intensity late in the third quarter and early in the fourth, but by the end they were playing well again."

Jeff Draeger added another interception to the Ross totals and a fourth pass theft by Jim Moore was wiped out by a penalty. The Little Giants gave up 74 yards

rushing and 40 more in the air.

"What I liked most out there tonight," Radeloff said, "was I saw a lot of good hits. Last week, it may have been lack of confidence or experience but I saw some good hits tonight."

The Ross defense gave the offense a shot at a third first half touchdown when Chris Smith blocked a punt off the foot of Woodward's Wayne Edwards. Andy Manbeck scooped the ball up but tumbled to the ground inches short of the goal line. On the first play, Ross was called for illegal procedure and two plays later, Raney's fumble while being sacked was recovered by Bulldog defender Ricky McGill.

With Smith plugging up the inside, the Ross defense was led by linebacker's Troy Novitski, McClure, Jamie Whipple, Jason Shultz and Beachum.

Raney, after hitting 11 of 20 passes against Columbian, fell off to three of 10 for 45 yards and one interception. Rodney Johnson was the only other Ross runner, besides Carter, to reach double figures, getting for 13 yards on four carries.

Next week, Ross will host Toledo Central Catholic.

Quarterback, punter slide by Ross defense on 2 key plays

It was a drive and a chip along with an offensive pass interference penalty that did in Ross Friday night at a wet and soggy Harmon Stadium.

Toledo Central Catholic, 3-0, took the opening kickoff and drove straight down the field 76 yards in a dozen plays to top the Little Giants 8-0.

"We came out and got things going that first drive," Irish Coach Greg Bailey said, "and then they (Ross) got tough."

The opening drive featured the bullish runs of tailback William Peterson and fullback Art Bates. Peterson charged 23 yards on the opening play. Bates picked up two and 14 on the next two and Peterson came back for 11 to put the ball at the Ross 22. That duo got the Irish to the Ross one but the drivers failed at that point.

Facing a fourth and goal, quarterback Toby Bryce came up with the winning chip shot, rolling in around right end

unmolested for the touchdown with 7:32 remaining in the first quarter. Earl Kiestler scored the extra points on a fake kick.

"They came out and controlled us," Ross defensive coordinator Joe Siesel said about the opening drive. "After that, we played very well."

"It was a great effort for us," head Ross Coach Rex Radeloff said. "We played hard the whole game. That was a good football team we went against; they are going to win a lot of games."

The Little Giants did get into the Irish end zone but wide receiver Tracy Hufford was called for pass interference and the TD was nullified. Quarterback Craig Raney, facing a third and 19 at the Central 27, hit Hufford behind the defense for what appeared to be the TD with 6:08 remaining in the game.

"That was a heck of a call," Radeloff grimaced, "especially

Undefeated Clay next for Little Giants

"Undefeated" is becoming a whispered word in the Ross High School football team locker room.

The Little Giants have had their fill of that word. If it was used to describe Ross, it would be different. Instead, Coach Rex Radeloff's team will have to force it down one more time Friday when Oregon Clay's unbeaten Eagles visit Harmon Stadium for a 8 p.m., Friday, clash with the 1-2 Little Giants.

Ross opened the season at Columbian and came back last week against Toledo Central Catholic. Those teams are 3-0 like this Friday's opponent.

"They are three-and-h," were the first words out of Radeloff's mouth when asked about Clay Tuesday before his team's first hard day of work this week. "They are senior-oriented, starting 10 seniors and a sophomore on both the offense and defense."

The chief weapons in the Eagles' arsenal are tailback Chris Langer and quarterback Don Walendzak. Langer transferred in from out-of-state and Walendzak quarterbacked Clay as a junior.

"JJ (Clay coach John Johnson) told me Langer is the best running back he has had at Clay," Radeloff said and added, "the quarterback runs well and he can throw the ball on the run very well."

Clay has beaten Toledo Bowsher, Cardinal Stritch and Sylvania Southview. The Little Giants are coming off an 8-0 loss to Central Catholic. The Irish scored on the first drive, going 72 yards in 11 plays. After that, the Ross defense would bend but refuse to break.

Radeloff and his team were unhappy with the loss but the Ross coach could see a positive side.

"The effort was there the whole game," he described. "We were in the game all the way. Sure, we don't like to lose and we feel bad about it but the kids gave it all they had."

He added that the game was the best his team has played in the still young season.

The Ross passing game has progressed but Radeloff is worried that it may be getting into a rut. Wide receiver Tracy Hufford has been the main target of quarterback Craig Raney, Radeloff pointed out.

Hufford caught four passes for 67 yards against Central and took one of Raney's passes into the Central end zone only to have the TD wiped out when he was flagged for pass interference on a disputed all. The senior has 13 receptions for 172 yards and a touchdown in the first three games.

"Hufford has been playing very well," the Ross coach praised, "and Raney has been throwing the ball well but we have to utilize people besides just Hufford. We have to spread it around."

"He (Hufford) has been getting open but we don't want Raney to get into the habit of just looking for him and not reading the defenses."

Ross put 14 first half points on the scoreboard and then let the defense take over in the second half for a 14-9 upset of previously unbeaten Oregon Clay Friday night at Harmon Stadium.

"I thought the whole defense did a super job," Ross defensive coordinator Joe Siesel said, "especially the way they turned it up in the last few minutes."

Trailing 14-9, Clay had a shot at pulling out a miracle. The Eagles took over at their own 43 with 2:06 remaining in the game. On the first play, Ross turned on the pressure as inside linebacker Mike Longanbach blew up the middle to sack quarterback Don Walendzak for a nine-yard loss.

Walendzak hit Chris Langer for 10 yards on the next play but misfired on the next two plays as Little Giants forced him to throw off-balance both times. The second incomplection gave the Ross the ball with 1:18 play and clinched the Giants' second win against two losses. Clay is 3-1.

The Ross defense surrendered a net 110 yards on the ground as Langer ran for 122 yards on 26 carries. Walendzak pulled the

total yardage down with a minus-33 yards on seven attempts.

"That was a good defensive effort," Ross head Coach Rex Radeloff said. "I think we played

better tonight than we did last week."

Last week, Ross fell 8-0 to undefeated Toledo Central Catholic, but at the time Radeloff said that was his team's best effort of the season. Friday night, it got better.

"We are getting better," Radeloff said. "We are getting more confidence and it is showing."

The Ross defense set up both touchdowns. Defensive end Maurice Jones fell on a Langer fumble at the Eagles' 43 on Clay's first offensive play. Nine plays later, sophomore tailback Terry Carter followed the blocks of right tackle Cory Reed and wingback Gary McClure into the end zone. The first of Eric Siesel's two extra point kicks put Ross up 7-0 at the 5:44 mark.

After Clay answered that TD with a 26-yard field goal off the toe of Chad Schwierking, the Little Giants' defense put the offense back in business.

With Clay driving midway through the second quarter, linebacker Cardell Beachum stepped in front of a Walendzak pass at the Ross 14. The senior cut to his right and raced 76 yards to the Eagles 10 before Langer hauled him down from behind.

Carter ran six and three yards on two carries and quarterback Craig Raney sneaked in from the one as Ross forged to a 14-3 lead with 1:33 remaining in the half.

Other than the 40-yard scoring drive, Clay's deepest penetration in the second half was to the Ross 24 but Jones and Jason Schultz sacked Walendzak for a 10-yard loss on a third and seven. On the following play, the Ross pressure forced another

incomplete pass.

Clay, after a Langer punt pinned Ross at its own nine, took over at the Little Giants 40 after a Siesel punt with 4:47 to play in the game. Two Walendzak passes got the ball to the one and Langer took it in from there at the 4:13 mark. Clay elected to go for two points but Ross tackle Chris Smith knifed through to dump Walendzak at the five.

The tackle wiped out the possibility of field goal tying the game and forcing an overtime.

Beachum performed well on both sides of the ball, Radeloff said. The senior co-captain ran out of the fullback and tailback slots offensive, rushing for 36 yards on seven carries. Carter was the leading rusher for Ross with 83 yards on 22 carries. Rick May, back in action since being injured in the season opener with Columbian, had 13 on four carries.

"I think Rick coming back, sparked us," Radeloff said. "He did a good job for just coming back."

Defensively, Longanbach was in three sacks, Schultz two, Jones and Steve Boonie one each. Linebacker Troy Novitski came up with a pair of tackles for losses.

Next Friday, Ross will host Cleveland Benedictine.

No. 1 Bennies next for Little Giants

Rex Radeloff is beginning to like the common things.

It's been common this season for Radeloff, in his second season as head football coach at Ross High School, and his team to face an undefeated on a week-in, week-out basis.

Cleveland Benedictine, 4-0 and the Division II Associated Press poll leader, visits Fremont Friday for an 8 p.m. game at Harmon Stadium is the latest unit in that parade.

"You hope to play the good teams," Radeloff said Tuesday before practice. "It is easier to prepare for an undefeated team than for a team that does not have that good a record because the kids are mentally into it. The kids know they have to play hard."

Preparing for the Bennies is easy. Stopping them is another matter.

"They have always been a good team," the Ross coach said. "I don't think they have changed offense or defense for years. You know what they are going to do; you just have to stop them."

It will be the eighth meeting of the teams with Benedictine holding a 6-1 edge.

Ross, 2-2, and improving week to week, Radeloff said, will face a veteran Bennie team.

The tailback, Ron Grasel, is a three-year starter. Quarterback Preston Hrisko started last season.

"The tailback can go up the middle or outside," Radeloff said, "and Hrisko can crank (throw) it."

"They have two good receivers," Radeloff said, "and he (Hrisko) likes to throw the wide receivers."

Kevin Macci, 5-10 senior, and John O'Neill, 5-10, 165, are Hrisko's main targets.

Fullback Tim Zdavowicz is another key cog in the Bennie offense.

"He'll run five or six times but he is mainly a blocker," Radeloff said, "and he is a good blocker."

The Little Giants are coming off a 14-9 win over previously undefeated Oregon Clay.

"Offensively, we hurt ourselves with penalties," Radeloff said. "Defensively, we played hard the whole game; they were hitting people out their."

One of the key defensive plays, Radeloff said, was linebacker Cardell Beachum's 76-yard return of an interception to the Clay 10. That theft killed an Eagles drive.

Offensively against Clay, Radeloff said he felt the return of running back Rick May was a plus.

"It seemed like May coming back, picked them up," he said.

May, a senior, suffered a neck injury in the first game of the season and did not return until last week.

NOTES: Ross ranks fourth in Buckeye Central Conference offensive stats after four non-conference games. The Little Giants average 154.5 yards per game. Defensively, Ross is also fourth, allowing 260 yards per game. Zanesville is the offensive leader with 326.5 yards per game but also ranks fifth in defense, allowing 275 yards per contest.

TDs while rushing for 182 yards on 22 attempts.

After a scoreless first half, Ross began a drive from its 27 with 4:17 remaining in third quarter. Carter ran for 33 yards on four carries and quarterback Craig Raney hit Tracy Hufford for 16 yards to the Benedictine 20 to key the drive. Rick May, who had nine yards on two carries during the eight-play drive, got the ball to the 15. Carter took it from there over left tackle for the TD with 38 seconds to play in the period.

Eric Siesel's kick made it 7-0.

"The offensive line told me they could handle them," Radeloff said, "and they did. Carter ran behind them and hit the holes."

Cory Reed, Dave Carroll, Mike Longanbach, Matt Manbeck, Tony Roob and Chad Overmyer saw most of the duty from tackle to tackle for Ross.

But, the Bennies bounced back, driving 62 yards on 16 plays, the final five by Grosel. Greg Gotto's kick tied the game at 7-7 with 7:03 remaining. The drive was aided by a controversial call. With a second and six at the Ross 19, Bennie quarterback Preston Hrisko faded back, seemingly was in the clutches of a Ross tackler, but managed to get rid of the ball as he fell.

The play was ruled an incomplete pass as Radeloff's arguments went unheeded.

Two plays later Hrisko, on a fourth and 10, passed 14 yards to John O'Neill for the first down at

the Ross five.

"Hrisko did not have that good a game," Bossu admitted, "but he made the big plays in the pinch."

Ross roared right back, covering 63 yards in three plays. Carter ran for one before Raney hits tight end Scott Swanger for 22 to the Bennie 40. Carter then cut around right end, faked a linebacker off his feet and broke into the open on a 40-yard scoring run.

Disaster struck on the extra point. The snap was a trifle high forcing Siesel to hesitate. The result was a miss to the left that gave Ross a 13-7 lead with 5:35 to play.

Radeloff did not fault his sophomore kicker.

"We are just not at the point where we are consistent (on the extra point) but we are not going to go for two," Radeloff said. "It was just one of those things that happens."

Ross got into trouble on the following kickoff when Bruce Coffey returned it to the Bennie 43. After two incomplete passes, Hrisko hit Mike Garred for 15 yards and a first down at the Ross 42. Hrisko followed with a 12-yard strike to O'Neil to the 30.

After a five-yard penalty pushed the Bengals back, Grosel bolted 35 yards on a draw play for the tying TD. Gotto split the uprights to put Ross down 14-13 with 4:10 to play.

Ross came back quickly. Facing a second and 18 at the five after Raney had been sacked, Carter ran 20 yards for a first down. Raney hit Hufford for 14 more to the 39 before Carter ran 39 yards to the Benedictine 22 before being knocked out of bounds.

On a third and 13, Raney lofted a pass just over the outstretched hands of Hufford and into the hands Bennie defensive back Mike Nelson, killing the drive with 1:34 to play.

"I told Augie after the game," Radeloff said, "you just beat the best two and three team in Ohio."

"There's no question about that," Bossu confirmed. "This is the best team that we have faced."

1st Ross BCC test at Newark

At first glance, it could appear that Ross was getting a reprieve by taking a trip south.

But quick glances are, many times, deceiving. Rex Radeloff has taken more than a passing look at his Ross Little Giants' opponent Friday, winless Newark.

"Both of us," the Ross coach began, "play a tough schedule and we have played pretty good lately."

To add spice to the game, it will be the first Buckeye Central Conference game for both teams.

Four of the Little Giants five opponents have just one loss to date and Ross put that blemish on Oregon Clay 13 days ago. Last week, Ross lost to Cleveland Benedictine, ranked No. 1 in Division II schools by the Associated Press, 14-13.

"We lost," Radeloff said after that game, "but it was the best we have ever played Benedictine. The kids had nothing of which to be ashamed. They played the best game of the season."

Newark has had more than its share of problems with a schedule that includes, Worthington, Pickerington, Toledo Whitmer and Columbus DeSales. Waiting down the road after Ross is Columbus Mifflin in week eight and undefeated Zanesville in the final week.

Worthington and Whitmer were in the state playoffs last year, DeSales won the state Division III title in 1985 and was undefeated in 1986 after stepping up to Division II. Mifflin and Worthington were other undefeated teams last season.

The Wildcats have been paying for that schedule. Newark has been outscored 119-41 but still ranks above Ross in Buckeye Central Conference season stats, allowing opponents 249 yards per game, 25 yards less than the Little Giants.

But, for both teams, Friday marks the beginning of a "new" season.

"We have five games left," Radeloff pointed out, "and it is the first game of the conference schedule."

"The kids have confidence," he said. "They have improved week after week and they know they can playwell."

"The biggest thing for us it that this Friday is a conference

NEWARK — Fremont Ross, suffering from a short-term case of travel-lag, spotted Newark a touchdown before reviving to smother the Wildcats 34-6 in the Buckeye Central Conference opener for both teams Friday.

"I don't want to blame it on the two-and-a-half hour drive down here," Ross Coach Rex Radeloff said, "because we actually enjoyed it, but we were not ready for the kickoff; we were not ready to eat nails."

early treat.

A 29-yard scoring pass from Craig Raney to Tracy Hufford and the first of four Eric Siesel extra point kicks put Ross ahead 7-6 at the 5:35 mark of the opening period.

Terry Carter, who did not start at tailback because of stomach cramps, made a quick recovery with a 64-yard punt return for a Ross TD three minutes later and Ross was on its way.

In the second quarter, Rick May scored his first TD of the season on a two-yard run and

Hufford hauled in another Raney TD pass with 13 seconds remaining in the half. The 26-yard scoring play and extra point gave the Little Giants a 28-6 halftime edge.

Unbeaten Devils and Howe square off against Ross

It may seem that Buster Howe does everything except drive the team bus for the Zanesville High School football team, and if he did, he would probably be a bus drivers' All-Ohio selection.

Howe is riding an old offense toward state and national acclaim.

Operating out of the "single-wing," Howe, a 5-foot-11, 182-pound Mr. Everything, rushed for 160 yards on 32 carries and scored on touchdowns of 1, 26 and 6 yards in a 27-0 victory over Findlay last Friday.

If that was not enough, he also kicked three extra-points, intercepted a pass, recovered a fumble and handled all of the punts and kickoffs.

Through his six games, Howe has 790 yards on 140 carries, has rushed for 20 touchdowns and also has a 99-yard kickoff return for a touchdown. Out of the single-wing offense, he has completed 20 of 34 passes for 347 yards and two touchdowns. He has thrown two interceptions, but has intercepted four as a defensive back. He is averaging 46.8 yards per punt, has a kickoff return average of 45.1 yards and has recovered three fumbles.

Rex Radeloff qualified for the "Understatement of the Year Club" when he described Howe as a "a great athlete."

Radeloff's Little Giants have the task of Zanesville's Mr. Everything and his Blue Devils teammates Friday at Harmon Stadium. It will be the second Buckeye Central Conference game for both teams. Both are 1-0 in the BCC and Ross is 3-3 this season.

For those unfamiliar with the single-wing, the predominant offense well up into the 1940s, there will be a tight end and a guard on one side of the center with a guard, two tackles and an end on the other in the unbalanced alignment. There is a wingback on the outside of the end on the strong side of the formation with the "quarterback" close behind the inside tackle. The fullback lines up slightly ahead of the tailback, who is about three to four yards back of the center.

Usually, Radeloff said, Zanesville will have formation's strong side on the right.

"Howe does most of the running, but they will run counters and the fullback up the middle," Radeloff explained, "and Howe will go inside and outside."

The single-wing offense is being used for the first year by Zanesville Coach Whitt Parks. In a recent interview, Parks said he went to the offense because he sees an abundance of good tailbacks in the Blue Devils' future. Howe is the first.

Running alongside of Howe is the next: sophomore fullback Steve Hodge.

Radeloff said that the biggest concern about defending against the single-wing is it offers a new look.

"You cannot change your defense," he said, "you have to keep doing what you normally do. One of the bigger problems is simulating it in practice."

The blue Devils have scored 241 points this season and after surrendering 66 points in the first four games, have posted two consecutive shutouts.

"They do not have a big defense," Radeloff said, "but they are quick. They like to penetrate and go after the ball."

Buster Howe lived up to his billing, but credit Ross with a big assist for Howe and his Zanesville High teammates.

The Little Giants committed five turnovers and Zanesville erupted for 21 second half points to knock off Ross 33-7 Friday night at Harmon Stadium in a Buckeye Central Conference football clash.

Zanesville, ranked third in the state in Division I of the Associated Press poll, is 7-0 and took over sole possession of the top rung in the BCC race. The Little Giants slipped to 3-4, 1-1 in the conference.

"You have to make athletes like him work hard for the yardage," Ross Coach Radeloff said. "You cannot give him the

ball at the 50 or closer."

Howe rushed for 189 yards on 28 carries running out of the single wing. He scored on touchdown runs of 13 and six yards, kicked three extra points and booted field goals of 23 and 27 yards. The 5-11, 185-pound senior, collected 137 yards and both TDs in the second half.

"We like to think we are a second half team," Zanesville

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Ross

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Coach Whit Parks said. "I guess we are."

Zanesville had a 12-7 lead at the half after scoring on Howe's 23-yard field goal and a 39-yard fumble return for a touchdown by Chad Grandstaff in the first four minutes and 40 seconds of the game. The field goal was set up on the opening kickoff when Zanesville's Tom Cash fell on Jim Moreno's fumble at the Ross 34. Howe booted a 27-yard field goal with seven seconds remaining in the half.

"We were still in it at the half," Radeloff pointed out, "but we just could not get going in the second half."

The Blue Devils did, but with a big boost from Ross. Gene Evans stepped in front of a Craig Raney pass and raced 57 yards for a TD midway through the third quarter.

Four minutes later, after the Little Giants's Eric Siesel squibbed a punt 21 yards to the 50, Howe raced 13 yards around left end to climax the five-play drive, making it 26-7.

The final Zanesville TD came on an eight-play, 67-yard drive in the final quarter with Howe scoring from six yards out at the 6:45 mark.

"Anytime you play a good team," Radeloff said, "turnovers, field position and the kicking game will decide it. We turned the ball over, gave them field position and they had the

good kicking game."

That was three strikes and the Little Giants were out.

"We just did not perform well and they did," Radeloff said.

With Howe leading the attack for most of the game, the Blue Devils' single-wing offense featured fullback spinners, deceptive counter plays and even a Statue of Liberty play. The offenses generated 287 yards on the ground with 195 in the second half.

Howe was one of four passing for 14 yards.

As the game wore on, Howe

seemed to get stronger.

"He does that," Parks said. "He is dedicated; he works in the weight room hard and he make himself durable."

To add spice to his offensive performance, Howe intercepted his fifth pass of the season in the first half.

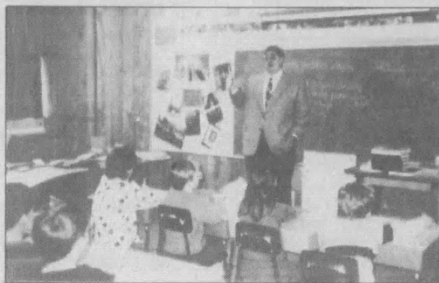
Ross, trailing 9-0, scored with a half-minute remaining in the first quarter. Raney's 27-yard pass to tight end Scott Swanger put the points on the board. Swanger hauled in the pass at the 20, got a block from Tracy Hufford that wiped out two

Ross will face Lakewood aerial attack at Harmon

Ross is going to extremes. Last week, the Little Giants football team was occupied with the ground-pounding single-wing attack of undefeated Zanesville, but this Friday at Harmon Stadium, Ross defensive heads will be tilted skyward as Jon Koz and the Rangers of Northwood invade Harmon Stadium for the 8 p.m. Ross homecoming game. Lakewood is 5-2 while the Little Giants are 3-4.

"They (Lakewood) like to air (pass) it out," Ross Coach Rex Radeloff said. "Koz is a good quarterback with a strong arm."

Koz's most recent exploit was in Friday's 24-7 victory over Shaker Heights. The 190-pound junior completed 20 of 41 passes for 347 yards. He also caught a 13-yard touchdown pass on a quarterback eligible play.

"Koz likes to go deep," Radeloff pointed. "He does not seem to like the short stuff."

"We do throw a lot — I like the passing game," Brian Burke, Lakewood coach said. "We do what we do best."

Burke is a former head coach at Ohio University.

"This kid is pretty good," Burke said as he talked about his quarterback. "For a junior, he has a lot of poise."

Radeloff said that Koz does not have a favorite target, instead his passes are spread around to several receivers. Burke agreed with that assessment.

"If teams double up on a particular receiver...if they take one away, Koz will find someone else," Burke said.

The Rangers' losses have been close: 21-8 to Lakewood St. Edward and 15-13 to Cleveland Heights.

Radeloff feels his team will have to get sophomore tailback Terry Carter outside against the Rangers. To do that, Radeloff hopes to use more of the option attack this week. Once that is accomplished, he feels that fullback Rick May will be able to run inside the tackles.

Ross is coming off a 33-7 loss to Buckeye Central Conference foe Zanesville, a team that had 287 yards on the ground and just 14 in the air.

On the surface, it would seem to be ludicrous saying that the Ross defense played well against Zanesville but that was the case.

"The defense did play well the first half," Radeloff said about the recent Ross loss.

In the second half, Zanesville rushed for 195 yards but it was an early Ross turnover that seemed to sink the defensive effort. A pass was returned 57 yards for a touchdown, stretching the Wildcats' lead to 19-7. After that, Zanesville's Buster Howe ran freely.

"After that big turnover, we let down," Radeloff said, "but we held them down in the first half."

"It was a tough loss but, like I said before, in big games, the team that does not have the turnovers and has a good kicking game will usually win. Zanesville had that."

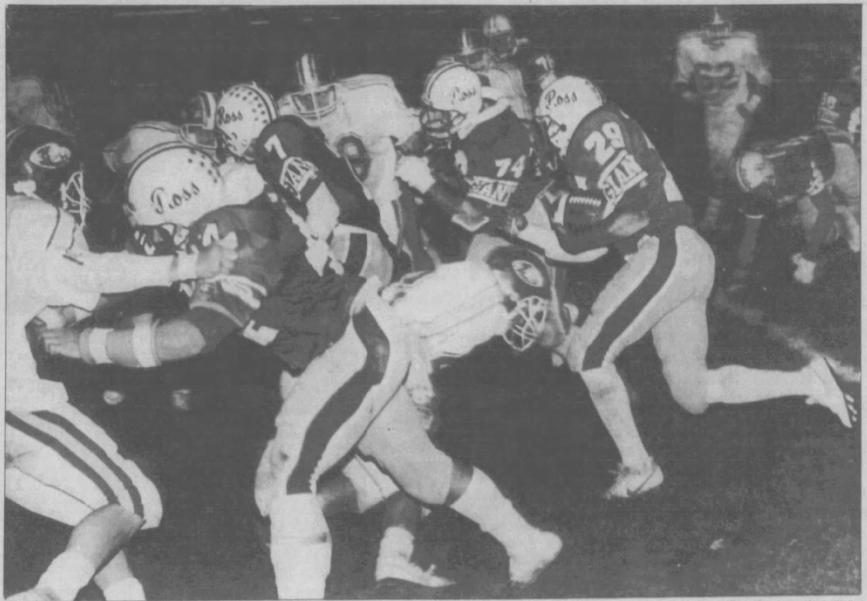

Ross drops triple-overtime thriller

The passing game was pretty, but in the end, there was nothing like sticking to the ground.

Tim Gates' 20-yard run on a counter over left tackle in the third overtime gave Lakewood a 27-21 victory over hard-luck plagued Fremont Ross at Harmon Stadium Friday night.

"I don't know about it being a great call," Lakewood Coach Brian Burke said. "It was the execution that made it look like a great call."

Gates, who caught seven passes for 90, raced untouched to the end zone on the first play of the final overtime for the Rangers. Ross had failed to score on its offensive series in the third extra session.

In overtime, each team starts its series from the opponent's 20.

"It was a good call," Ross Coach Rex Radeloff said in an

icy quiet Ross locker room. "They trapped us and that was it."

Lakewood is 6-2 while Ross slipped to 3-5.

Ross had its chances to win but Lakewood's defense swatted down a pair of sophomore Eric Siesel field goal attempts. The first try was from 28 yards with 3:27 remaining, and the second, from 18 yards with no time remaining in regulation.

That brought the game to overtime with a 7-7 deadlock.

The Little Giants had yet another chance in the first overtime. After sophomore tailback Terry Carter had run 20 yards on the first play in the Ross offensive series for a touchdown, the Little Giants defense had forced Lakewood into a fourth-and-goal situation at the six.

Jon Koz, who had 307 yards on 24 of 37 passing, dropped back

and found Brendan Ryan at the goal line for the TD. James Gomez split the uprights for a 14-14 tie, forcing another overtime.

"We could not come up with the big plays when we had to," Radeloff said. "We had them on a fourth down and they scored."

Lakewood scored first in the second OT, this time on an 18-yard pass over the middle from Koz to Ryan. It was the same type play that the Rangers had used to tie the game in regulation 40 seconds into the final quarter. That play was a Koz to Ryan 50-yard aerial.

"It's not a screen pass," Radeloff explained. "Four of the receivers pull the defenders to one side and he circles around underneath. That leaves us with a linebacker to cover and we could not cover him."

Ross bounced back from the 21-14 second OT deficit, scoring in three plays coupled with a

Lakewood personal foul. Carter carried the final five for the TD and Siesel's kick tied it.

Ross had the ball first in the final overtime but was unable to move. On a fourth-and-four at the 14, Carter's halfback pass fell at the feet of Jeff Draeger and the game was one play from being over.

Gates struck on the first Lakewood play to end it.

"I knew it would be a good ball game," Burke, former head coach at Ohio University said, "but not that good. I felt that Fremont was a very well disciplined team; they did not make mistakes."

Burke's team did make a mistake and it cost the Rangers.

With 1:20 remaining in the first half, Ross defensive back Bryant Haralson blocked Vince Curiale's punt, scooped up the

ball at the Lakewood 28 and ran untouched for the game's first TD. Siesel's boot put Ross into the lockerroom with a 7-0 lead.

"We have been spoiled on punts," Burke said. "We have not had one blocked in two years. We may not have blocked and I think our punter was slow getting it off."

Although Ross surrendered 307 yards in the air, the Little Giants allowed just 39 on the ground.

"All losses are disappointing," Radeloff said, "but this was very disappointing to the kids."

Carter had 114 yards on 28 carries and Rick May added 45 on 12 attempts. Craig Raney was seven of 15 passing for 137 yards. Tight end Scott Swanger had three receptions for 62 yards and Tracy Hufford two for 57.

Hufford hauled in a 43-yard yard aerial from Raney to the Lakewood seven, setting up Siesel's last field goal attempt.

Ross still has shot at crown

Searching for a positive statement, you could say Fremont Ross is beating the high school football teams it should beat, and losing to the ones it should.

If there is some consolation in that, tell Coach Rex Radeloff and his Little Giants.

To add, "It doesn't get any easier," despite two games remaining in the dwindling season, is becoming commonplace when referring to the Ross schedule.

The Little Giants have fallen five times, losing to Tiffin Columbian, Toledo Central Catholic, Cleveland Benedictine, Zanesville and Lakewood — teams that have a combined record of 36-3. The first three are undefeated while Zanesville has lost once and Lakewood twice.

Ross has beaten Cincinnati Woodward, Oregon Clay and Newark — squads that are 6-15. This week, Ross travels to Lancaster, the team that ended Zanesville's seven-game unbeaten streak Friday, and owner of a 6-2 record.

Easy? This Ross schedule is definitely not.

Still, the Little Giants can salvage the season, even though at 3-5, Ross appears to be bogged down in a season where any remaining talk of a conference championship seems ludicrous. But, it is not.

"I hope Lancaster beats Zanesville," Radeloff said after a triple overtime loss to Lakewood Friday. He was thinking ahead.

"That would give everyone in Buckeye (Central Conference) a loss," he said, "and that means we can still tie for the championship."

Lancaster accommodated Radeloff with a 35-27 win, tossing the BCC race into turmoil.

Lancaster and Zanesville are 2-1 with Ross and Findlay 1-1. Lancaster has only Ross remaining on the BCC schedule while Zanesville has winless Newark and Findlay has Newark before closing the season in Fremont Nov. 6.

"We are still in the running," Radeloff said.

Lancaster, though it a big hurdle in the Little Giants' path.

The Golden Gales rank first in all games defensively and first in Buckeye Central Conference games, allowing 224 and 278 yards, respectively. On offense, Lancaster is second for all games with 318 yards of total offense each game and first in the BCC with over 386 yards and 109 points.

Quarterback Jeff Pica is first with 79 of 151 passing attempts for 1,206 yards and 12 touchdowns. Receiver Tim Graham is first with a 37-31 advantage of Tracy Hufford of Ross in receiving. Graham has 608 yards and seven TDs.

LANCASTER — An old trick treated Lancaster to a stunning 28-22 Buckeye Central Conference victory over Fremont Ross Friday night.

Trailing 22-21 and facing a fourth and 12 at the their own 43 with less than a minute to play, the Lancaster goblins of Halloween Eve reared their heads in the form of the "flea-flicker."

Lancaster quarterback Jeff Pica passed to John Holland 15 yards downfield to start the off-beat play. Holland lateraled to

Tim Graham who then completed the 53-yard scoring play with 50 seconds remaining in the game.

"We knew we had to find ways to win," Golden Gales Coach Lee Owens said.

The flea-flicker was one of two tricks the former Galion High School coach pulled out of his bag. The first, according to him, may have saved his team.

Ross scored on Terry Carter's three-yard run with 3:07 remaining in the first half for a 6-0 lead. Owens went to his bag after that.

With time running out and the Golden Gales at the Ross 29, Owen's team lined up in an apparent field goal attempt. The trickery took over from there. Graham was frantically being waved off the field by his teammates as if the Gales had too many men on the field. There were, however, just 11 and Graham stopped short of the sidelines and cut upfield when the ball was snapped.

Holder Joel Foote pulled the ball back from kicker Tony Shinn and passed to Graham

who was all alone for the easy touchdown as time ran out.

"I think the fake field goal was the key for us," Owens said. "Because we have such a high-scoring offense, I felt that if we had gone into the locker room without having scored, it would have really hurt us."

Lancaster built a 21-6 lead in the third quarter, scoring on a 28-yard run by Nat Loraditch and a 47-yard pass interception return by Brian McQuaid.

In the final quarter, Ross came roaring back. The Giants

cut the Lancaster lead to 21-14 on a 42-yard pass from Craig Raney to Tracy Hufford with 8:21 on the clock. Carter added the extra points.

Ross took the lead with 1:52 to play when Raney, on a fourth and goal at the Lancaster eight, found Scott Swanger in the end zone for the TD. Ross disdained the tie and went for the win, and Raney hit Swanger again for the extra points which put Ross up 22-21.

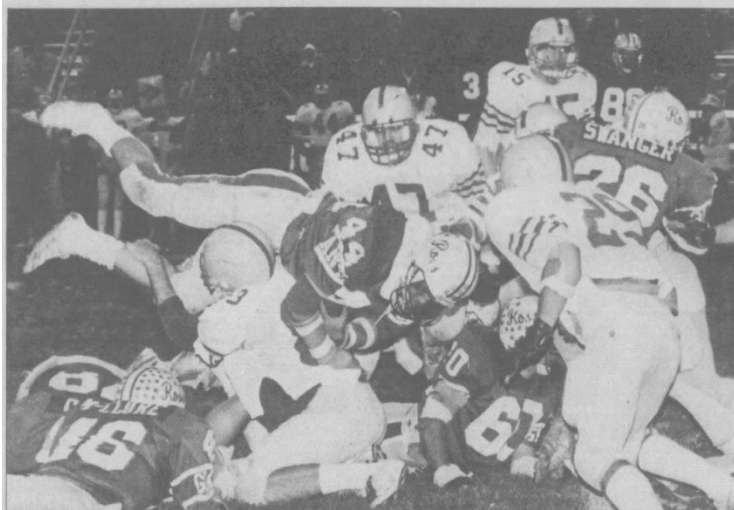

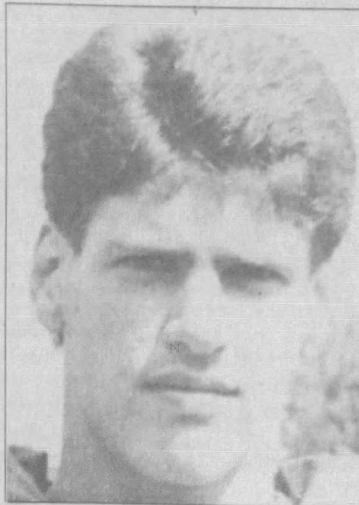
