

HIGH SCHOOL BOY'S TENNIS PREVIEW

Parker eyeing top spot

Fremont Ross senior Eliot Parker went the last several months without swinging a racquet.

He isn't worried, though, as his final tennis season begins. "I'm usually an all-season player, but this year I took basically all of the summer and winter off," Parker said. "I just started playing a couple of weeks before the season. I've matured a lot, I've gotten a lot stronger and my strokes are right there."

Parker proved that this week, when he beat senior teammate Jordan Will in a couple of challenge matches to determine who plays No. 1 singles. Parker owned that spot the past two seasons, and it's likely his again this year.

Still, a top singles spot with the Little Giants isn't an automatic bid to a state title. Last season, Parker was knocked out of the state tournament at districts.

"I'm usually just a few rounds away," he said. "We definitely have the toughest district in the state, and they only take two people."

The Greater Buckeye Conference won't be much easier. Lisa Wolfe, who's taken over for Rick LaFountain as Ross boys coach, expects Findlay, once again, to be challenging.

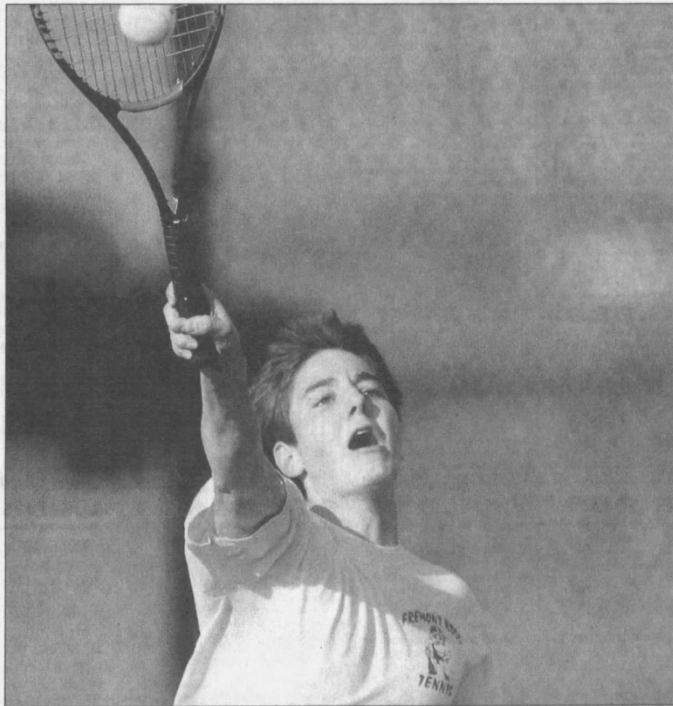
"It's going to be tough," she said. "I do a traveling team in the summer with the boys and girls teams from the [Fremont Recreation] Department, and Findlay is one of the teams that travels around. They'll definitely be a competitor."

Will, who will at least play No. 2 singles, agreed.

"Findlay's probably going to be the toughest team we've got to play," he said.

Besides Will, the Little Giants have nine players who could easily play varsity, Wolfe said. Mike Hollis and Cameron Mooney are vying for the No. 3 singles spot, as Bryce Huffman and Cody Zoller will play doubles.

"I want as many kids to play varsity as possible," said Wolfe, who coached the Ross

girls team to a 99-31 record over seven seasons until 2003. "You'll probably see a different lineup in second doubles position to give kids a chance to play varsity."

At St. Joseph Central Catholic, junior Eric Barbour returns as coach Scott Knisely's No. 1 singles player. Sophomore Chris Wobser, who played at No. 2 singles last season, joins Barbour and about eight other newcomers.

"I enjoy coaching the team," Knisely said. "We get a bunch of kids who have never played tennis before. I tell them if they don't know how to play, I'll teach you. Today, I was playing with three kids who

never even gripped a racquet before."

Oak Harbor also has plenty of newcomers, but Bobby Lochotzki is back to handle No. 1 singles. Dereck Witt takes No. 2 singles, and Clifford Goetz and Andy Biggett are also guaranteed spots somewhere.

"We have 23 kids on the roster and 12 are freshmen," said LaFountain, who's in his first season coaching the Rockets. "Other than the youngsters, we have some upperclassmen who may be able to step right into the lineup and win some important matches for us."

Clyde won a few big matches last season, and it has most of last year's team intact. The

Fliers lost only one player, and coach Jeff MacFarland expects his team to continue its improvement.

"I'm really looking forward to the season," said MacFarland, whose Fliers jumped from 3-10 to 8-5 from 2005 to '06. "I'm hoping our experience pays off with some victories this year."

Bellevue coach Shana Young lost some of her most experienced players to graduation, but she expects Jon Stout and Matt Allen to step up in singles play. Her team went 9-9 overall a season ago.

Outlook: Knisely lost three seniors from last year's team, but Barbour is back to handle No. 1 singles for the second straight season. The Crimson Streaks added three senior exchange students, but only one of those has previous experience playing tennis. The team has about eight total newcomers, including a couple of boys who have little or no tennis experience.

CLYDE

Coach: Jeff MacFarland, 15th season

Outlook: Clyde's top three singles players — Foreman, Cammam and Minich — return this season. So do Wott and Bender, who make up the No. 1 doubles team. MacFarland, who had six out of seven players return, is hoping his team's experience pays off with a few more wins. Last season, the Sandusky Bay Conference was loaded with seniors, which could benefit the Fliers. Still, Port Clinton should be the favorite entering the season, MacFarland said.

Young said, but she expects a lot of close matches between teams like Shelby, Columbian, Willard — and even Norwalk.

This Rockets team is extremely young, LaFountain said, but it has 23 boys on its roster. Twelve of those are freshmen, which should make Oak Harbor a major factor in the SBC in seasons to come. This is LaFountain's first year at Oak Harbor after coaching Ross for many years.

Little Giants due for one against Trojans

Fremont Ross senior Eliot Parker is 0-for-his career against Findlay senior Kyle Collette. He plans to make that 1-for-something Thursday, when the Little Giants host the defending Greater Buckeye Conference champion Trojans.

"I've never beaten the kid," Parker said. "He's been No. 1 (singles) the past two seasons. He played No. 2 his freshman year when I did, so we've played together now probably 10 times."

Last season, Parker lost rather quickly to Collette during the regular season, 6-2, 6-1. Then, he finished third at the GBC Championships, where Collette earned an individual singles title.

A year later, Parker figures he's due for a victory against him.

"He was killing me from the beginning," Parker said. "The more and more times I've played him, the more and more times I've gotten better."

The team has improved this season, too. The Little Giants are 4-0 already, and they've beaten Lima Se-

nior and Sandusky to pick up two early conference wins.

Yet now, the Trojans stand in their way.

"Findlay is the favorite," said Ross coach Lisa Wolfe. "From doing some research, I think all the courts (Thursday) are going to be tough along the way. But it seems like Findlay can graduate five seniors and come back

with five freshmen who are tough."

Last season, Ross senior Jordan Will gave Findlay junior Steven Albert a tough time at No. 2 singles. He pushed Albert into a third set during their regular season meeting, yet eventually lost.

Will is now 0-2 against Albert, but he just might catch a break Thursday.

"They actually have a new up-and-comer named Jason Brooks," Will said. "He's probably going to play No. 2. I haven't really seen the kid play, but maybe his style matches mine more than Albert's."

Even if his style doesn't, the Little Giants will probably need victories from No. 3 singles player Cameron Mooney, Bryce Huffman and Mitch Langley at No. 2 doubles or Mike Hollis and Cody Zoller at No. 1 doubles to beat the Trojans.

"Doubles are doing a lot better," Parker said. "Last year, singles kind of carried the team. Doubles are pulling through with wins this year."

Neither doubles team won Tuesday against the Blue Streaks, but Wolfe was proud of each duo's effort.

"I saw a lot of fight in them," she said. "As a coach, that's what you want to see. And that's probably the first time I saw that kind of fire from them."

After the Little Giants play the Trojans, they'll host Port Clinton in the Fremont Doubles Tournament on Saturday. Then, they'll meet April 16 against St. Joseph Central Catholic before their conference schedule resumes April 17 against Marion Harding.

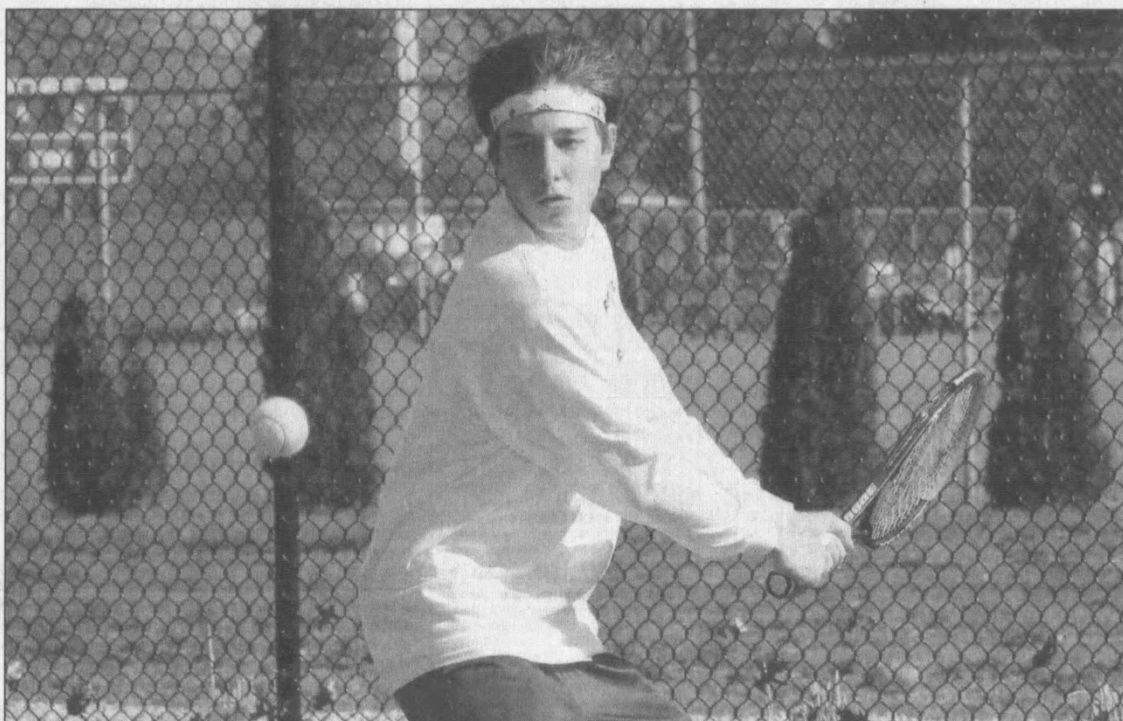
The invitational was won by Port Clinton, which scored 110 points.

Streak's Barbour stays competitive, loses to Parker in straight sets

There were no victories to be had on the court for the St. Joseph Central Catholic boys tennis team Monday against Fremont Ross.

But for Eric Barbour, there was, at least, a moral victory.

Last year, Barbour couldn't win a game against the Little Giants' Eliot Parker. This time, he lost in straight sets again, but made it competitive, 6-4, 6-2.

"I played better, but I don't think I played to my full potential," said Barbour, a junior.

Parker, a senior, saw room for improvement in his own game.

"I missed so many shots," he said.

The Little Giants were coming off their first loss of the season, a 5-0 waxing Friday at the hands of their Greater Buckeye Conference rival. Parker was

especially bitter, having lost in straight sets to Kyle Collette but forcing a tiebreaker in the second set, 6-2, 7-6 (7-3).

"It motivated me a lot," Parker said.

Second-year Crimson Streaks coach Scott Knisely was pleased with Barbour's performance, noting that his backhand was better and that he hit his corners.

"He's improving," Knisely said.

Barbour played for the Fremont United States Tennis Association team over the summer — under the watchful eye of Lisa Wolfe.

Wolfe said she knows a lot of the Crimson Streaks (2-6) from the summer, and was a little torn when they played the Ross boys — the team she currently coaches. Wolfe had previously coached the girls team, but this

is her first year at the helm for the boys.

"I'm just hoping everyone has a really good match," Wolfe said diplomatically.

At the very least, everyone had a really blustery match. Although the sun was out and it was a temperate day, the wind continued to blow.

"You've got to learn to play in all kinds of conditions," Knisely said.

Wolfe saw it as another advantage for the Little Giants (5-1).

"My kids probably have the advantage of practicing out here every day," she said.

Both Ross doubles teams lost a total of two games, both by the second doubles team of Bryce Hoffman and Eric Hottinger, who beat Jordan Rodriguez and Andy Golamb, 6-1, 6-1. The first doubles team of Mike Hollis and

Cody Zoller didn't lose a game in bating Anton Kabisch and Derek Dickman 6-0, 6-0.

Cameron Mooney dropped just one game in beating Matt Barbour, 6-1, 6-1, at third singles, while Jordan Will beat Chris Wobser 6-2, 6-4, at second singles.

"Ross was just the better team today," Knisely said. "We were competitive in most matches. We hung in there."

But Knisely does see a positive. While Ross will graduate many of their netters, the Crimson Streaks will return most of theirs — another year wiser and more experienced, and in the case of Barbour, maybe with a few extra pounds of muscle.

"I've got a lot of young kids," Knisely said.

Little Giants second at Port Clinton doubles tournament

PORT CLINTON — Jordan Will and Cameron Mooney faced a five-point deficit early in their semifinal match Friday against Port Clinton's Carey Clum and Craig Miller.

But Will and Mooney rallied past those Redskins, advanced to the finals and finished second at the Port Clinton Doubles Tournament.

"I knew they were going to make a mistake at some point," said Will, who normally plays second singles for the Little Giants. "Cameron and I play together in the offseason, but this is the first time we played together all year."

Slick conditions caught up with Will and Mooney in the finals, though, as they lost, 10-3 to St. John's Ravi Katragadda and Joe Donaldson.

Still, they won two of

Eliot Parker and Bryce Huffman, like Will and Mooney, trailed early in their semifinal match. But they mounted a comeback at first doubles against St. Mary Central Catholic's Joe Miller and Austin Opfer, who gave up their lead and lost a 9-7 tiebreaker.

In their final match, Parker and Huffman played St. John Jesuit's De-

von Sbrocchi and Joe Pontash, falling 10-2.

Mike Hollis and Cody Zoller also reached their final match at third doubles, beating the pairs from Edison and Napoleon along the way. Port Clinton's Paul Carman and Blake Troller took the championship, one of two for the Redskins.

Their other one came at fourth doubles, where Jamie Que and Rob Szabo beat Edison's Kevin Corso and Tyler Camella. Ross placed fourth at fourth doubles behind Mitch Langley and Eric Hottinger, who won their first match against St. Joseph Central Catholic's Gil Byers and Jon Kosik.

"It was really important

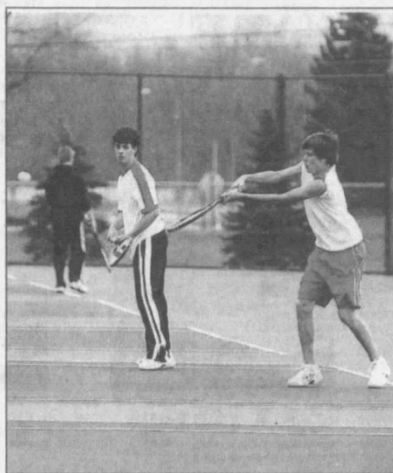
that we won all of our first matches," Ross coach Lisa Wolfe said. "That was so important in terms of scoring points later on."

Barbour and Wobser then dropped their second-round match to Napoleon, before they took an 8-5 victory from Bellefontaine's Rob Ball and Nick Stein.

SJCC's Matt Barbour and Andy Golamb placed seventh, as well. They beat Bellefontaine's Rob Stahler and Connor Dunn in their final match.
