Ross opens with a loss

Missed foul shots are costly as Waite prevails

Ross lived on the long shot but died with the short shot Tuesday night in a season-opening 68-60 high school boys basketball loss to Toledo Waite.

The Little Giants made nine 3-point baskets — five by Nick Wolf — but missed 15 of 18 free throws.

"Yeah, you are not going to win very many basketball games shooting three-for-18," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said, "but it's our first game; it's a learning experience. Waite already has had one game and it showed tonight. It does not matter how many previews you play in, it's the game that counts and it looked like they executed better than we did."

At times, Waite's best defense was putting the Little Giants on the unfriendly foul line.

"I know they shot poorly at the foul line," Waite coach Joe Guerrero said, "and I am sure that is one thing they are going to work on, but we missed some foul shots in crucial spots, too."

"At the end, though, we got a little more confident at the foul line and it's kind of contagious — when one guy hits one, then a couple guys hit them. That worked for us."

It was a disease the Little Giants would have like to have caught.

The Indians, 1-1, made 13 of 22 foul shots in the fourth quarter — 17 of 27 in the game — offsetting six 3-point baskets by Ross.

When Ross crept to within three twice in the final minute, the Indians gave themselves breathing room with free throws. Eric Winters was 5-of-8 and Russel Zieroff 4-of-7 from the line in the final eight minutes for Waite.

Winters knocked in two when Ross closed to 61-58 on Wolf's fifth 3-pointer with 51 seconds left in the game.

Jason Zilles tossed in a shot from the base line with 32 sec-

onds left to pull Ross back to 63-60 but the Little Giants could not stop the Waite parade to the line.

Wolf tossed in a trio of 3-pointers, Mark Scheidler two and Mike Patterson one, all in the final quarter.

"I'll tell you, Nick Wolf is a great player," Guerrero said. "He shot well and we did all we could just to try to slow him down."

That trio along with a hustling Damon Walker kept the Little Giants from being blown out. Waite built a 45-32 lead at the end of three quarters and still held a 56-46 advantage with 3½ minutes to play before the Ross 3-point barrage.

"We did a nice job," Gioffre said about his team's long shooting, "but you have to be able to execute. A lot of those were on transition and a lot were forced threes; when you hit a three, you've got to get inside and get a two because all of a sudden, those defensive wings start forcing you farther out than you want to go."

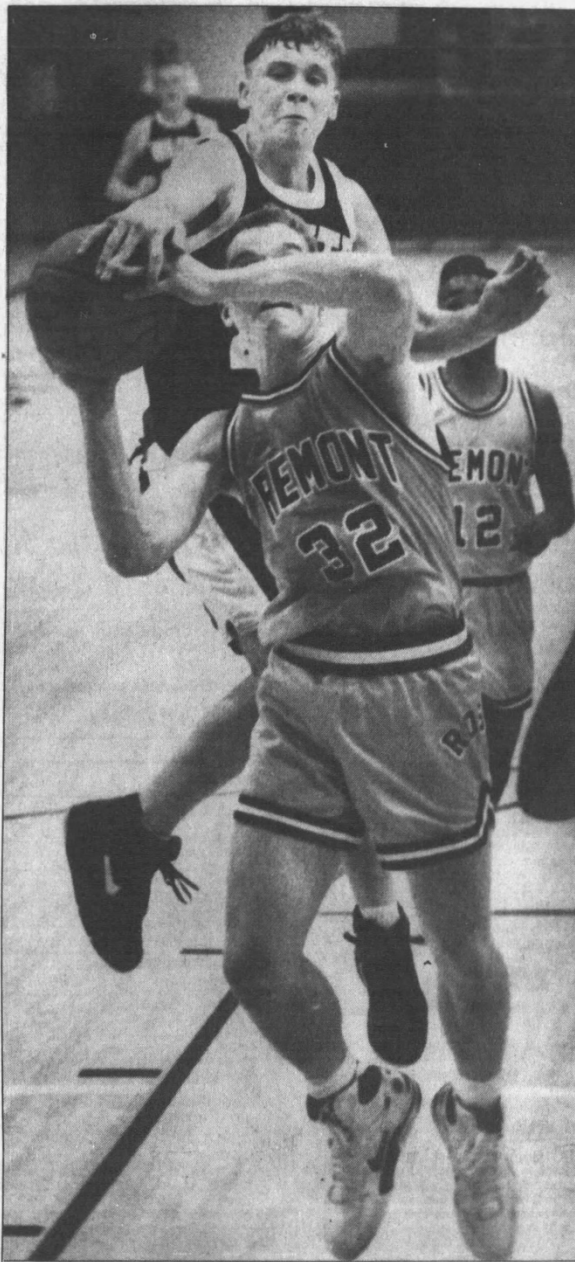
Patterson hit a short shot and Wolf followed with 3-pointer, cutting the Waite lead to 56-51 with 2:50 left. Winters hit a free throw but Scheidler's basket put Ross down 57-53.

Ross pulled to within two — 57-55 with 1:50 to play — on Tyrone Price's rebound, but Russel Zieroff sank a pair of foul shots and 6-8 Jason Beyer hit two more for a 61-55 Waite advantage.

Ross had only Wolf's final 3-pointer and Zilles' shot the rest of the way while Waite turned contagious at the foul line.

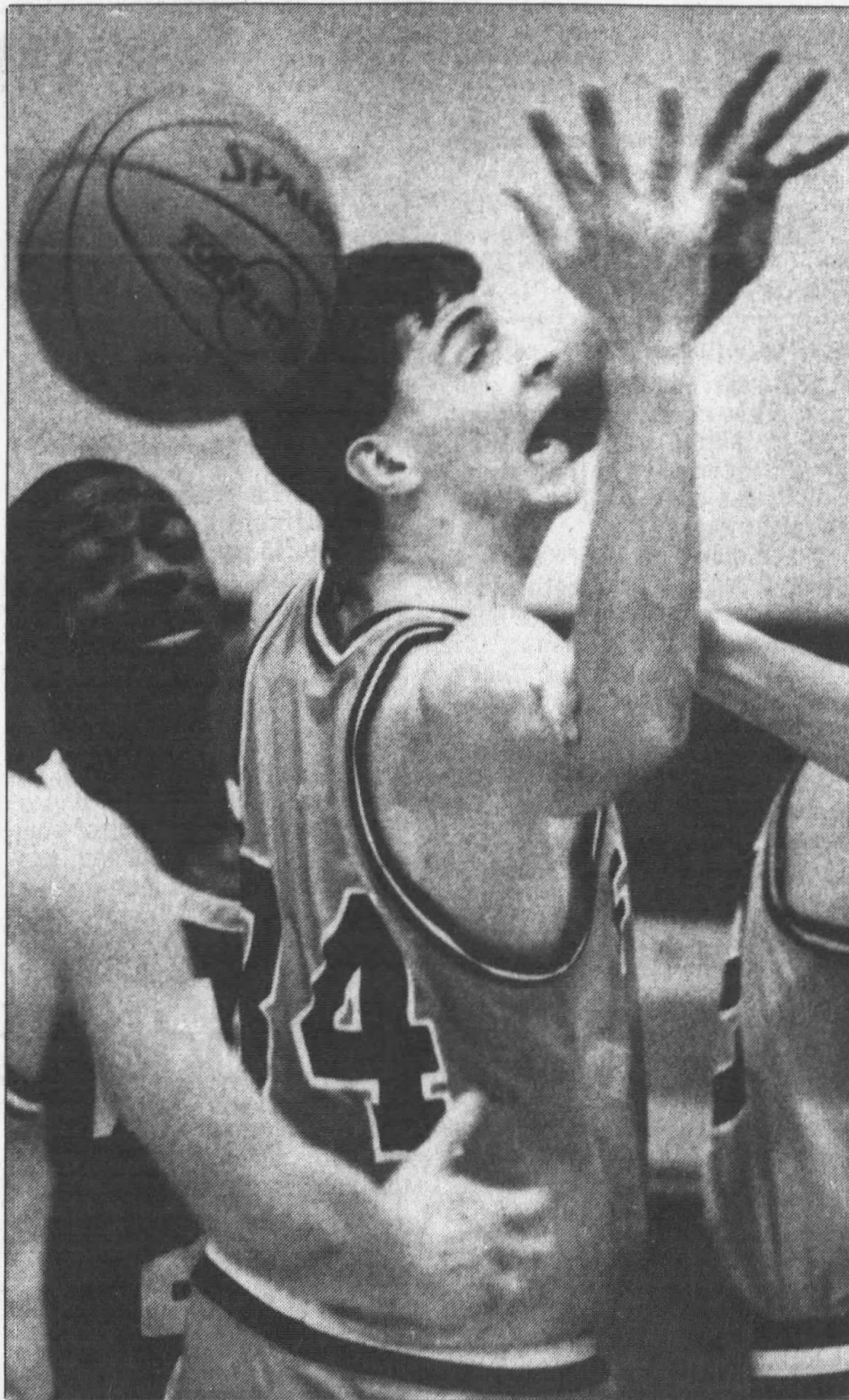
Wolf finished with 19 points, Walker added 12 and Scheidler 10. Beyer had 16, Winters 15 and Jackson 14 for Waite.

Ross opens Great Lakes League play Friday at Whitmer before traveling to Port Clinton Saturday. The junior varsity game at Whitmer begins at 6:15 p.m. and the JV tip-off at Port Clinton is 6:30 p.m.

Little Giants lose in OT grudgingly

TOLEDO — It was the only thing Fremont Ross coach Frank Gioffre could do: chalk it up as a moral victory but write it down as a loss.

Gioffre's Little Giants erased a 15-point second half deficit only to run out of gas late in a 74-68 overtime loss to Whitmer in the Great Lakes League boys basketball opener for both teams.

"Our kids played hard," Gioffre said, "but we still are not starting off the way we want to. We played a great second half. That's two games in a row now, but we have to play four quarters. We play four quarters tonight, we win the basketball game."

"You can't be down 13 at the half (37-24) and then make a great run at the end and expect

to have anything for the final drive. Our kids were really tired."

In addition to the Panthers, Ross was also battling the flu bug.

"We had one playing with the flu (Ryan Zimmerman), Nick Wolf is not feeling well, Damon Walker just got over the flu, I have the flu — it's everywhere," Gioffre said.

Ross fell behind 43-28 three minutes into the second half before turning up the defensive pressure on the Panthers, 3-0, using it to cut the Whitmer lead to 45-42 at the end of three quarters. Wolf, Walker and Mike Patterson led the Ross surge, combining for all 18 Ross points in the period.

After Justin Keller followed his own missed free throw with a rebound basket, Ross ran off 14 un-

answered points. Wolf hit back-to-back buckets, Walker turned in a three-point play and a basket and Patterson's back-to-back baskets made it 43-42 before 6-foot-9 Craig Tipton's short shot for Whitmer stopped the Ross run.

"It was a tremendous game," Whitmer coach Bruce Smith said. "We expected it, knew it was coming and we did not deal with it very well."

"We never saw 12 (Patterson) shoot that well; he hurt us. He came down the lane, we had guys in his face and he just jumped over us."

Walker scored eight points in the final period, including a steal and a court-length drive for the layup that put Ross ahead 56-54 with 2:04 left in regulation. Patterson, who came off the bench to score 16 points, pulled Ross

even at 54 with a 3-point basket seconds before Walker's theft.

Tipton's two free throws tied it but Walker drove the right base line putting Ross up 58-56 with 1:03 left. Keller hit the back end of a two-shot foul, cutting the Ross lead to 58-57 with 48 seconds remaining before Ross fell victim to a malady they suffered in a 68-60 season-opening loss to Waite Tuesday: missed free throws.

Ross missed 15-of-18 foul shots in that game. Against Whitmer, Ross made 13 of 23 but the misses down the stretch were costly.

"Well, at least we did not shoot 17 percent from the line, you know," Gioffre said, "but we have to step up at the end of the game and make those free throws — that cost us the victory tonight."

Walker, who finished with 18 points, missed the first attempt on a one-and-one with 23 seconds remaining in regulation. Wolf, who dropped in 19 points for the second consecutive game, hit the front end of the bonus at the 16-second mark but came up short on the second but still, Ross had a 59-57 lead.

After a timeout, Whitmer got the ball into Keller on the left baseline where the 6-4 junior wheeled and knocked in a 5-footer sending the game into overtime.

Whitmer got the tip in overtime and after running more than 30 seconds off the clock, Ben Langenderfer drove the lane, hit the layup and was fouled by Walker. Langenderfer made the free throw and the

Little Giants were forced to play catch-up.

Whitmer moved out to a 66-61 lead as the Panthers began parading to the foul line. Patterson brought Ross back to 66-63 but Tipton, who was 6-of-6 from the line in overtime, put the lead back to five. Mark Scheidler's basket put Ross within three with 38 seconds left in overtime, but Denard Mays hit two free throws. Wolf sank a 3-pointer, bringing Ross to within two, 70-68, with 12 seconds left, but Tipton and Keller closed the Little Giants out with four more free throws.

"Their quickness gave us a great deal of difficulty," Smith said, "but any time you have a great player like Nick Wolf is, he will elevate the games of the people behind him and that is exactly what happened."

Tipton led the Panthers with 18 points, 10 at the foul line. Walker, 6-2, kept the tall Panther at bay for the better part of the game.

"Damon Walker worked hard on both ends of the floor," Gioffre said.

"(Walker) used his body extremely well," Smith said. "We were crying for a foul but evidently there was none; he did a good job on him."

Gioffre and Smith disagreed on one item: Gioffre said his team was picked to finish sixth in the GLL race while Whitmer was favored to win. Smith said his team was picked to finish third.

"There is no way in the world that is a sixth-place team," Smith said about Ross.

Gioffre could only smile at that thought.

"Whitmer knows they were in a dogfight," Gioffre said. "It was a moral victory, I guess ... but we lost."

Redskins rip Ross

PORT CLINTON — Port Clinton got off to its best start in five years Saturday night with a 73-57 non-conference boys basketball victory over Fremont Ross.

The Redskins snapped a four-game losing streak to the Little Giants to improve to 2-0 for the first time since the 1986-87 season. Ross fell to 0-3 with its second loss in as many nights.

PC should call Toledo Whitmer and thank the Panthers for their 74-68 overtime victory over the Little Giants on Friday. Port Clinton coach Tom Bodager and Ross coach Frank Gioffre both agreed that Whitmer took some of the wind out of the Little Giants' sails.

"That's one reason we got after them right from the beginning," said Bodager, whose team hadn't played a game since a 65-49 win over Norwalk eight days earlier.

Ross fell behind 12-0 after 4½ minutes, missing its first 10 shots, and trailed 16-6 after one quarter.

"I don't think we've had a day off in about two and a half weeks," Gioffre said. "We've played three games in five days."

"Friday night was such an emotional game for us. We wondered how our kids would react (Saturday). It's the same storyline in all three games: we fall behind early, catch up at half, try to make a big run in the second half and not have any legs left."

Port Clinton outrebounded Ross 21-11 in the first half and 21-13 in the second half behind a team-high 11 rebounds from Matt Quayle and 10 from Jason Kreulen.

Kreulen also poured in a game-high 22 points, with Scott Postma adding 15 and Quayle 11.

Mark Sheidler led Ross with 18 points, while Nick Wolf added 13.

"I think our kids were physically exhausted," Gioffre said. "We've got three kids battling the flu right now. We're going to be a good basketball team, it's just a matter of getting some rest."

The Little Giants managed to battle back in the second quarter, thanks to 10-of-19 shooting.

Port Clinton led by just five points, 34-29, at the half.

The Redskins, however, caught fire in the third quarter, converting six of their first 11 shots. Back-to-back baskets by Kreulen gave PC a 49-37 lead with 2:44 left in the quarter, and the Redskins extended it to 54-41 on a 3-pointer by Craig Thomas less than two minutes later.

Ross made another run in the final eight minutes, closing within six points, 54-48, on a 3-pointer by Sheidler with 6:45 left to play before Port Clinton began steadily increased its lead, forcing the Little Giants to foul.

The Redskins hit 7-of-11 free throws in the fourth quarter and were 6-of-8 from the field. Ross, which was 5-of-22 in the last period, shot 29 percent (11-of-38) in the second half to PC's 63 percent (15-of-24).

"What we tried to do was allow them to shoot from the outside," Gioffre said. "Give Port Clinton a lot of credit, because those kids just stepped up every time and knocked it down when they needed it."

Bodager said the victory over Ross left a better taste in his mouth than did the win over Norwalk.

Little Giants net first win

Ross tops Fostoria

Everything that had been going wrong for Fremont Ross was momentarily forgotten Tuesday night after the Little Giants' 51-44 high school boys basketball victory over Fostoria.

"As far as confidence, we needed that," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said after Ross overcame a 29-20 halftime deficit. "Hopefully, we can build on that ... get our kids some confidence knowing they can finish a game."

"We held our composure very well in the second half. Our kids didn't panic. We were patient with the basketball, got some good shots and made some free throws when we had to."

The Little Giants, 1-3 and 1-1 in the GLL, made 13-of-19 foul shots in the fourth quarter as they outscored Fostoria 22-6 after trailing 38-29 after three quarters.

"I never doubted our kids," Gioffre said. "When we're in a rut where we're not scoring ... we're looking for someone to get fouled and get to the foul line."

Ross, which has struggled at the line this season, made 18-of-31 shots there Tuesday night.

The Redmen, 2-1 and 1-1 in the GLL, had trouble putting the ball in the basket at all in the fourth quarter. They did not tally a field goal in the period until Derek Kidwell's putback with 18.3 seconds remaining.

"Poor shot selection — extremely poor selection," Fostoria coach Jim Rutter said. "And we were careless with the ball."

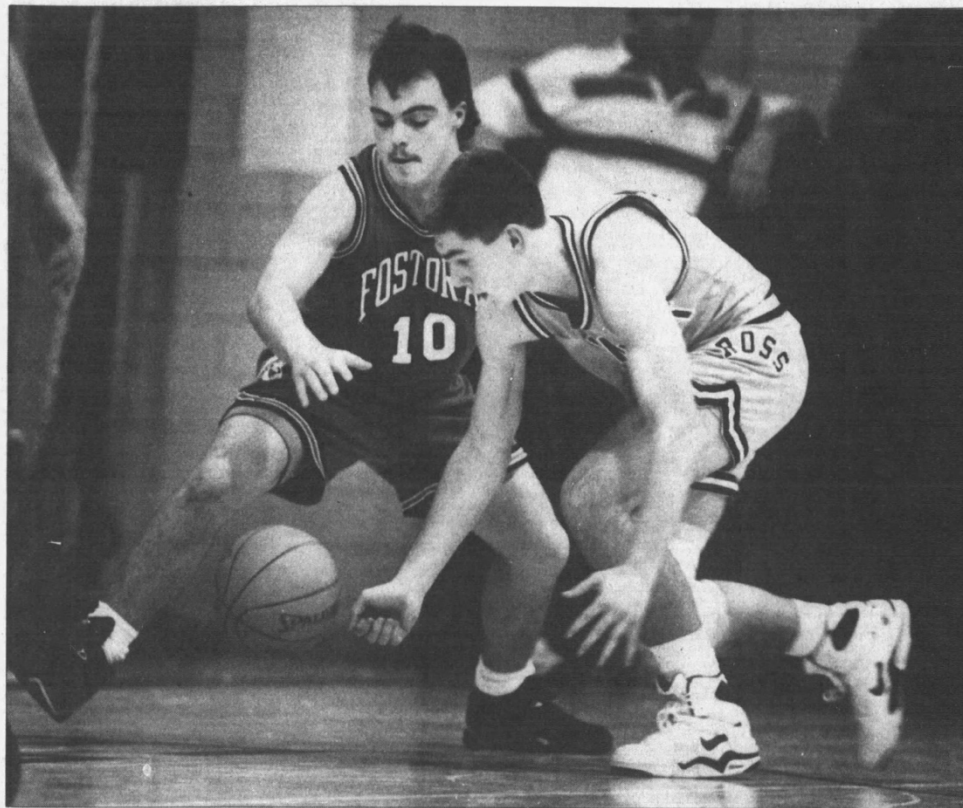
"We look to push it up and down the floor, but we also like a little bit better shot selection than we used tonight. We just didn't use good judgements."

"That's as poor as we've played in three years."

The Ross combination of Nick Wolf, Damon Walker, Ryan Zimmerman, Justin Perry and Mike Patterson had something to do with that.

□ Walker grabbed 14 rebounds and had a hand in the Little Giants' first five points in the second half.

□ Zimmerman scored all six of his points and collected eight of his nine rebounds in the fourth

quarter. "He knows what his role is, and he proved it tonight," Gioffre said.

□ Perry, who had not practiced until Monday because of a football injury, played five minutes and contributed two points and two rebounds. "He's a spark," Gioffre said. "Everyone picked it up a bit when J.P. was on the floor."

□ Patterson was a big reason Fostoria's Russell Robinson was held to five points. His jump shot from the circle also gave Ross its first lead of the game at 43-41

with 3:05 remaining.

□ Wolf led Ross with 13 points, collected eight rebounds, made four foul shots in the fourth quarter and was the steady influence on the floor.

After Perry opened the fourth quarter with two free throws, Zimmerman scored off a pass from Patterson. Wolf sank two at the line and Zimmerman added a foul shot — cutting Fostoria's lead to 38-36 with 5:54 to go.

Steve Dieter's foul shot put the Redmen back on top by three but after a Ross timeout, Patterson's

3-point shot with 4:11 left tied the score at 39-all.

Kidwell, who led Fostoria with 11 points and 15 rebounds, made two free throws to slow Ross temporarily with 3:42 to play.

Two free throws by Patterson retied the game 12 seconds later, and Patterson's 16-footer after a Fostoria turnover made it 43-41.

When Zimmerman grabbed a long rebound and went the length of the floor for a layup, it sent the Ross crowd into a frenzy. Zimmerman converted a three-point play, and Ross stretched

its lead to 51-42 before Kidwell's putback.

Fostoria scored the first six points of the game, and the score was tied twice in the first quarter before the Redmen took a 14-12 lead after eight minutes.

The score was knotted at 16, 18 and 20 in the second quarter, but Fostoria took advantage of two Ross turnovers and converted a three-point play in the final minute of the half for its 29-20 halftime lead.

The Redmen held their biggest lead at 32-22 less than a minute into the third quarter.

Findlay runs past Ross

FINDLAY — Four players scored in double figures as the Findlay Trojans broke quickly away from Fremont Ross with a second-half spurt in a 79-56 high school boys basketball game Friday night.

Findlay led 33-25 at the half but the undefeated Trojans, 5-0, outscored the Little Giants 12-4 in the first four minutes of the third quarter to break the game open.

"Obviously, nothing was going right," Bedford coach Mike German said about the first half. "Everything we tried was not

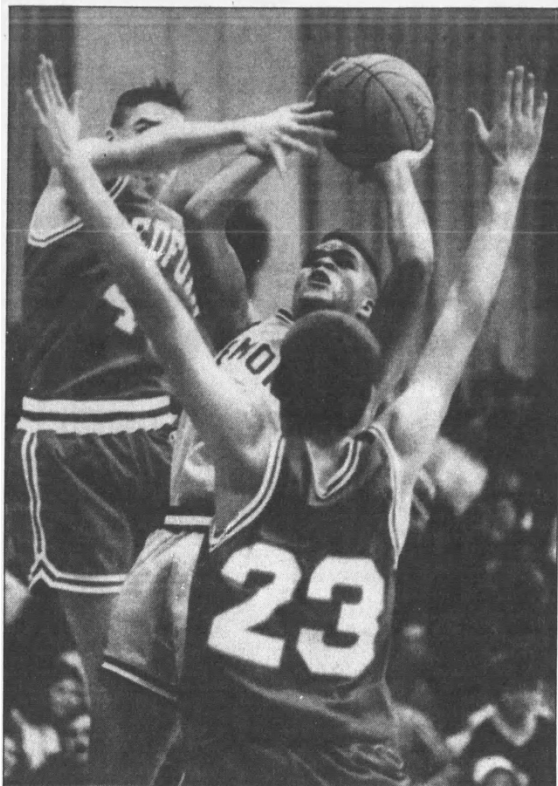

Findlay survives in Purple Pit 63-60

A season-long jinx and a key rebound cost Fremont Ross in a 63-60 high school boys basketball loss to Findlay Saturday night in the Purple Pit.

Trailing 62-59 with slightly under 2½ minutes to play, the Little Giants missed five of six free throws the rest of the way while Findlay survived its own missed foul shots with a big rebound off one of the misses to remain undefeated in eight games in the non-league clash.

Ross entered the game shooting below .500 from the line and missed 13 of 24 against the Trojans.

The Ross foul line problems began again at that point.

Wolf made the front end of a one-and-one and missed the bonus, but Walker rebounded in the miss — making it 60-58 with 2:40 to play.

Jeff Lobb drove the left side of the lane putting Findlay up by four with 2:30 left. Wolf, who led all scorers with 20 points, hit the front end of the bonus but missed the second. Ross got the ball back but Mark Sheidler, after absorbing Lobb's fifth foul, missed the free throw, leaving it 62-59 with 2:13 remaining.

After a Findlay turnover, Chris Ireland fouled Sheidler but the Ross senior's shot bounced off the rim.

With Findlay melting time off the clock, Wolf fouled Aaron Gralak with 47 seconds left. Gra-

lak missed the free throw but Miles pulled in the rebound for the Trojans forcing more time off the clock.

Still, the Trojans refused to put the Little Giants away as Lamont Paris missed from the line. Mike Patterson of the Little Giants drove the lane, was fouled by Miles with 33.1 seconds remaining. The Ross junior made the first shot but missed the second with Findlay getting the rebound.

Patterson's fifth foul put Chris Ireland on the line with 16.5 seconds left. Ireland made the first shot for a 63-60 lead, missed the second with Ross getting the rebound.

Gioffre called timeout with 10.6 seconds remaining to set up a 3-point shot. The Findlay defense kept Wolf, the man Gioffre wanted to take the long shot, bottled up and with four seconds on the clock, Jon Hetrick cast up an uncontested 3-pointer which bounced off the rim. Miles won the rebounding battle with Ryan Zimmerman of Ross, preserving the Trojans' win.

"They were keying on Nick Wolf," Gioffre said. "It was a play that we run all the time in practice. Jon Hetrick is a good

shooter and I don't think you are going to see a more wide open 3-point shot in the last second of the game than that, but hey, it should not have come down to that. We had some opportunities at the free throw line not to make it a three-point game at the end; it really should not have come down to that."

Findlay coach Jerry Snodgrass said, "I give Ross a lot of credit for an excellent game plan. He (Gioffre) said before the game they weren't overly prepared for us, but I find that hard to believe. They did an excellent job of taking our wings away and that took our rhythm away the whole night."

Paris and Ireland scored 16 points apiece with Gralak adding 11 and Lobb 10.

"We are improving," Gioffre said quietly in the hallway outside the silent Ross lockerroom. "We are going to be a good basketball team if we keep improving like we have been, we are going to compete for the league title."

The Little Giants step back into the Great Lakes League war Tuesday, traveling to Oregon Clay. The junior varsity game begins at 6:15 p.m.

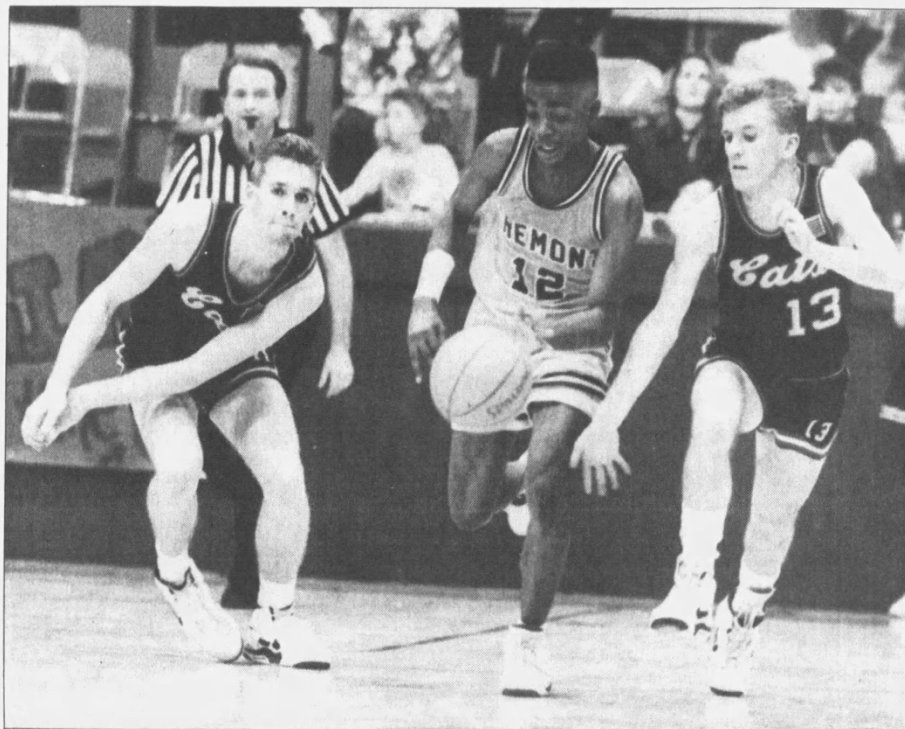

"They missed a lot of free throws, too, going down the stretch; it's just called execution and we did not get it down," Gioffre said. "That's been the story the whole year."

Napoleon point guard Todd Wesche started the 18-point run with a pair of foul shots.

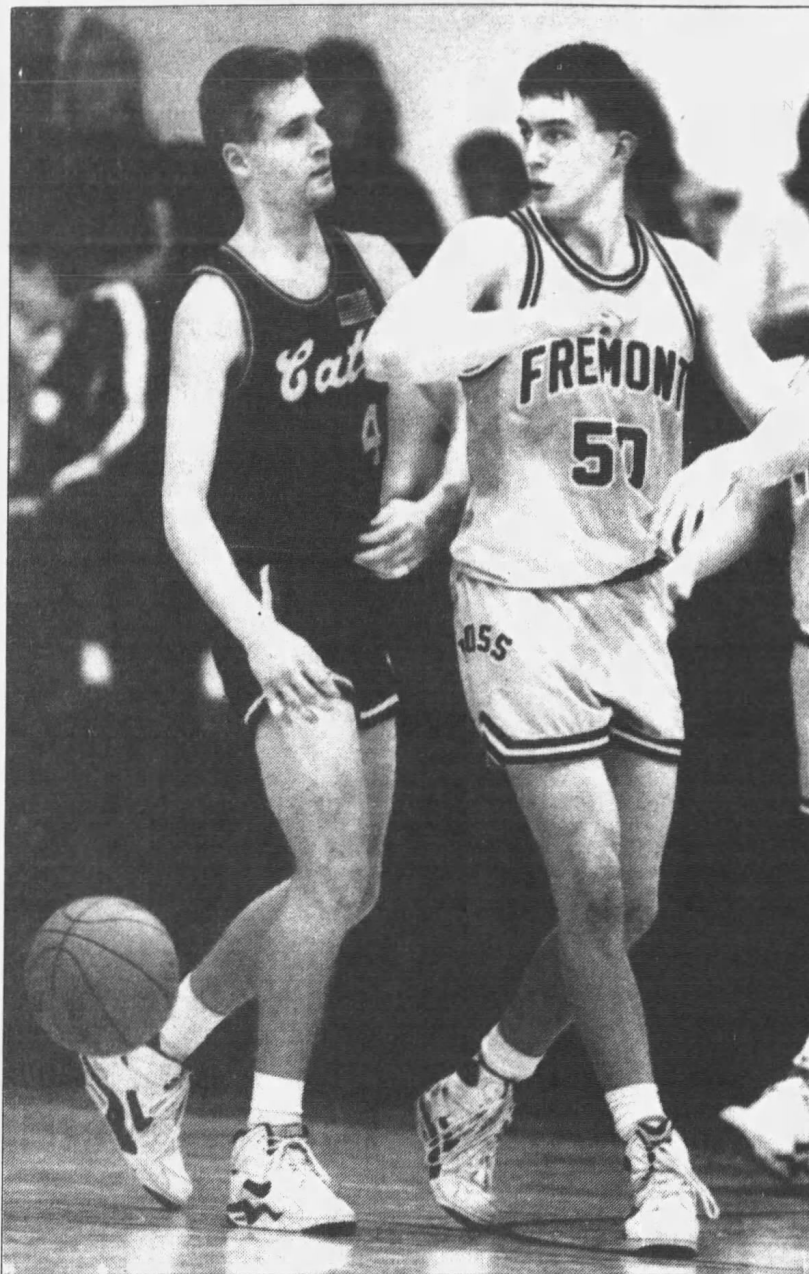

Gioffre addresses foul shooting

Frank Gioffre flinches at questions concerning his team's free throw shooting.

If he was on Jeopardy, he'd have the answer, but for the Fremont Ross boys basketball coach, the question is: Why is his team is doing so poorly at the line?

It has been unanswerable in the first 10 games. Gioffre's team is shooting a shade over 50 percent at the foul line, which has cost his team.

Gioffre figures if the Little Giants had made two-thirds — 67 percent — of their free throws, they could be 7-3, not 3-7.

"Seven-and-three at best and six-and-four at the worst," Gioffre said while seated in his office between snow days this week.

Losses against Findlay (79-56), Port Clinton (73-57) and Clay (71-51) were

games Ross lost legitimately, not beat themselves.

"Our free throws... those are clutch," he said. "You have to have people who want to step to the line when the game is on the line and make some critical free throws. We just have not been able to do that the first part of the year."

The Little Giants have gotten a little better, rising from 46 percent at one point to .5047169 — you can't get it to 51 — on 107 of 212 shooting at the line.

Gioffre is hesitant to say the foul line has tossed up a psychological defense at the Little Giants, but he has a hard time denying it, too.

"I have to believe a little bit," he said, "that when the games are tight and when the kid, whoever it is, steps to the line knows in the back of his mind that we are shooting 50 percent; it may have an effect."

The problem has struck other teams before Ross. In each case, it is mystifying.

"The thing is, we have been practicing every day; the kids have been shooting free throws since the third grade," Gioffre said. "It's a matter of concentrating, mental toughness, stepping to the line and making free throws when it counts."

"Those are situations when the game is on the line, you get fouled, you have to be able to step to the line and win the game for Ross."

That hasn't happened.

"The first part of the year has been disappointing," Gioffre said, "because I had high hopes for our kids — I still do. I know we are going to turn this around and finish the second half of the season strong."

"I am just disappointed because I feel we should be 7-3."

The Little Giants are not in action to-

night after playing four games in eight days. Ross has been off since a 68-56 loss to Napoleon last Friday. Ross tips off the second half of the season Saturday night at Bowling Green, where the Bobcats are 3-5.

The Ross record is nearly opposite of last year's 10-2 start and Gioffre remembers that, albeit painfully. After reaching that point, the Little Giants lost nine in a row, including the first game of the sectional tourney.

"I told the kids Monday," Gioffre said, "if you remember last year, we were 10-and-two and everything was fine and dandy but all of a sudden, we lose nine straight."

"I said 'Let's make it the same thing this year, but let's reverse it.' We had a bad first half, let's really turn it around the second half."

His wish is that it doesn't get fouled up.

'Best two minutes of basketball' leads to Ross victory over BG

BOWLING GREEN — Fremont Ross used a first-half spurt and a big third quarter to upend Bowling Green 69-55 in a non-league high school boys basketball game Saturday night.

The Little Giants, 4-7, outscored the Bobcats 12-2 in the final 2½ minutes of the second quarter for a 41-31 halftime lead before putting the game away with an 18-4 scoring advantage in the third period.

"That's the best two minutes of basketball we have played this year," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said. "We talked to them about going into the lockerroom at the half with some momentum and we definitely picked up the intensity at the end of the half."

Nick Wolf led a quartet of Little Giants scoring in double figures with 25 points including five 3-point goals. Ryan Zimmerman and Mike Patterson added 11 apiece and Damon Walker 10. Justin Perry, making his first start, scored eight.

"Nick Wolf shot the basketball well (10 of 18) and anytime he shoots well, it opens up a lot of things for us," Gioffre said, "especially inside. Walker and Zimmerman did a super job of going after the ball on the offensive glass and creating some opportunities down low for us."

Perry started in place of Walker who had missed a couple of practices because of football recruiting visits.

"J.P. (Perry) has been working hard, so it was an opportunity to start him," Gioffre said.

Ross was as hot as it was cold outside, making nine of its final 10 first-half shots.

Wolf's 3-pointer broke a 29-29 tie with 2:30 to play in the second quarter. After BG sophomore Mark Carek's basket, Ross ripped off nine unanswered points. Zimmerman started the run and Patterson finished it with a 3-point play off a steal and a pair of jump shots. Patterson scored nine points in the period.

"Mike Patterson did exactly

what we needed in the first half," Gioffre said. "We like to tell our point guards to score the last couple of minutes every half; that is the time for him to take the game over. The first part, he has to get everyone involved in the offense and he did that and then he took it over the last part of the half."

Patterson's only problem was two quick fouls in the first quarter. Bryan "Moe" Myers came in at that point, picking up where Patterson left off before Patterson returned in the second quarter.

"Moe did a great job," Gioffre said. "He was controlling the offense and playing good, solid defense."

In the third quarter, Wolf hit a trio of 3-point buckets and four other Little Giants scored. Ross sandwiched seven and 11-point runs around buckets by BG's David Sullivan and Tony Kramp. The Bobcats did not score the last 3:15 as the Ross lead shot to 59-35, its biggest lead, at the end of the period.

In the final eight minutes, the Bobcats mounted a mild charge but never got any closer than the final margin.

Bowling Green, 3-6, behind 10 points from point-guard Shawn McMahon and seven from Andy Tracy, led 20-18 after one quarter. The last Bobcat lead was 29-27 before Walker's rebound bucket pulled Ross even and put the Little Giants in gear for the first-half surge. Tracy finished with 15 points and McMahon 12.

"We had to go to a match-up zone," Gioffre said, "we could not stop them in the man-to-man defense. We were getting beat on the dribble ... they hit some big baskets in the first half and kept the game close."

The Little Giants made 29 of 60 shots and were 6 of 9 from the foul line. Bowling Green was 23 of 57 and 3 of 3 at the line. Ross had a 36-31 rebounding advantage but held a 31-18 edge in that department after three quarters. Ross had 18 turnovers — 10 in the final quarter — and Bowling Green 23.

Sheidler, Walker lead the way

Fremont Ross found a friend in an old foe while combining a pair of streaks to defeat Toledo Whitmer 63-58 Friday night in front of a boisterous Purple Pit crowd.

The loss was the Panthers' second in 11 games and dropped their Great Lakes League record to 4-2. Ross raised its record to 5-7 with its second consecutive win and is 4-3 in GLL clashes.

"That was a great, great win for us," Ross coach Frank Gioffre, his raspy voice echoing the strain of the game, said. "Our kids played hard and kept their composure the whole second half."

The game was marred at the end with a minor skirmish which was quickly broken up by school officials and police. Tyrone Price of Ross suffered a scratch on the neck but there were no other injuries in the melee.

Ross — which was shooting slightly over 50 percent from the foul line for the season — sank 4 of 5 from the line in the last three minutes. The Little Giants ended up missing 9 of 17 foul attempts, but Whitmer connected on only 7 of 21.

"We made some free throws when we had to," Gioffre grinned.

Whitmer's foul line performance baffled Panthers coach Bruce Smith.

"I don't know if it is the gym," Smith began. "Those are young kids out there and there is a lot of pressure. We normally make them but tonight we didn't."

The streaks, however, did the most damage to Whitmer.

First Damon Walker, then Mark Sheidler, had the hot hands for the Little Giants, who twice led by 10 points in the first and second halves.

Walker scored eight first-quarter points — 10 for the half — as

Ross grabbed 16-14 and 28-22 leads. Walker, a 6-foot-2 senior, topped off his first half with a bounce pass to Jason Zilles for a layup as the first half ended.

Sheidler, after scoring two points in the first half, scored 14 in the third quarter, finishing with 20. His final quarter basket put Ross back on top 59-58 and his two free throws gave Ross breathing room at 61-58 with 43 seconds left in the game. Nick Wolf polished off the win with a breakaway layup as time expired.

Sheidler, a 6-foot senior was 8-of-10 shooting and grabbed six rebounds in taking over the show in the second half.

"They took care of the basketball, didn't force anything and ran the offense the way we had to," Gioffre said.

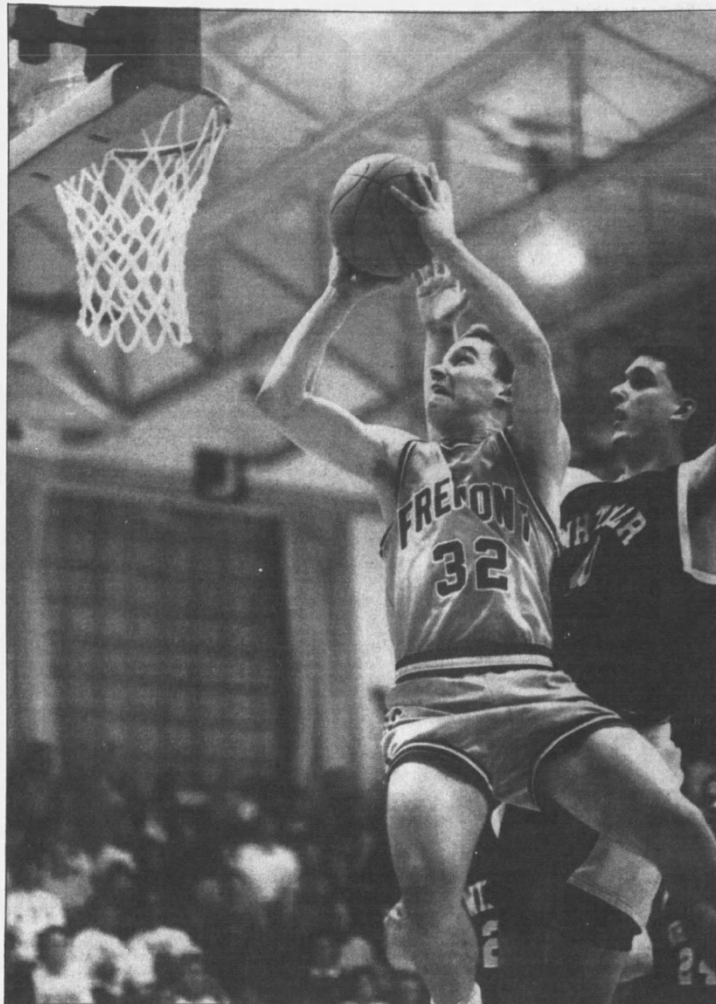
After Tipton tied the game at 16, the Little Giants ran off 10 unanswered points, six coming from Wolf.

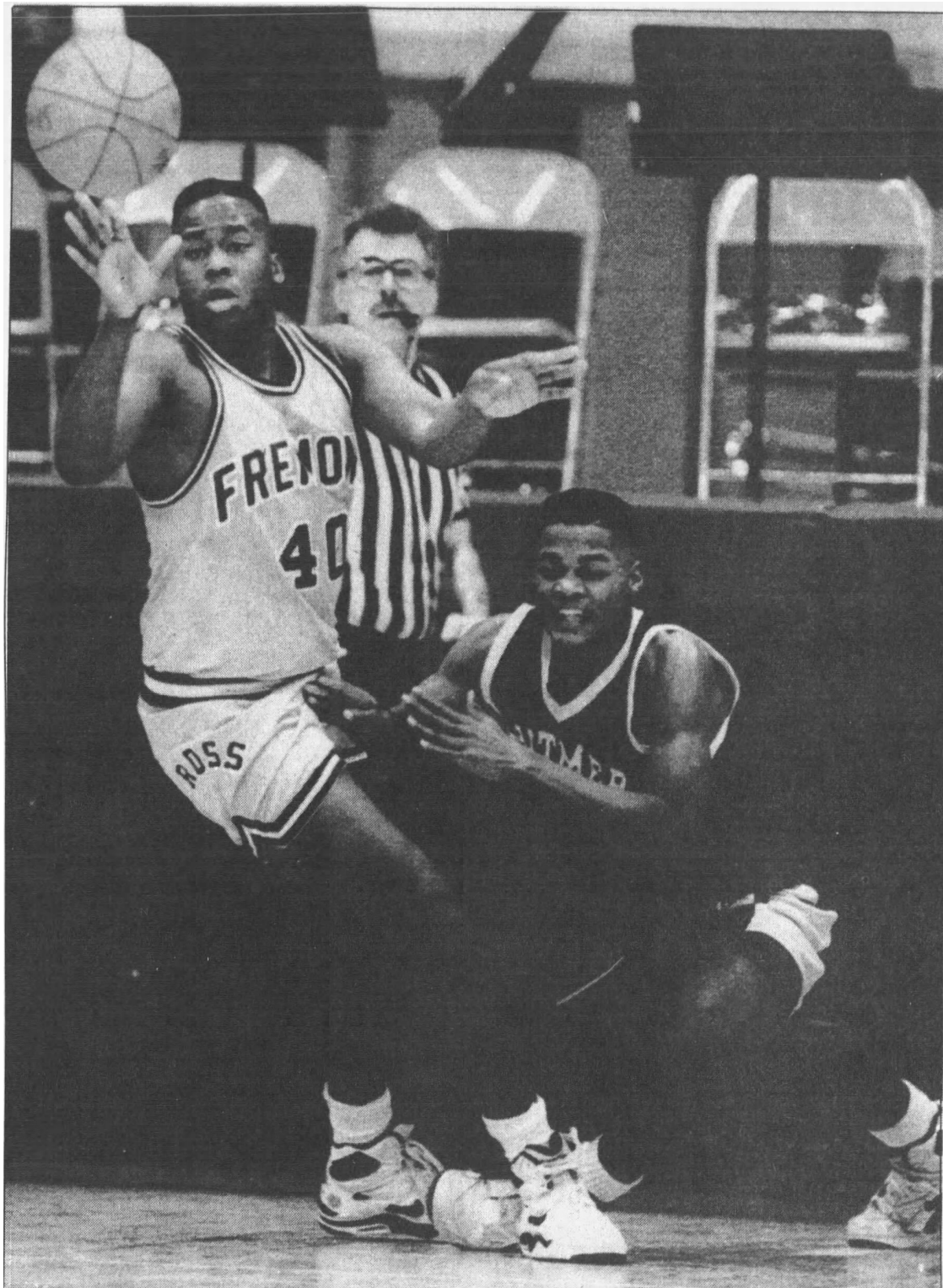

Sheidler's basket gives Ross win over Streaks

Mark Sheidler's 12-foot jumper with five seconds remaining gave Fremont Ross a 75-73 victory over Sandusky Saturday night at the Ross Purple Pit.

Sandusky fell to 9-3 when Sheidler's shot fell through. The Little Giants have won three in a row and are 6-7.

"(The shot) felt good," Sheidler said in a noisy lockerroom. "Nick (Wolf) dished it off ... and I just threw it in."

Sheidler, who is known as the quiet man on the Little Giants, let his shooting do his talking in a pair of weekend victories. Friday night, his 20 points — 18 in the second half — keyed a 63-58 win over Great Lakes

League rival Whitmer. Saturday, he had only eight points but four came in the final eight minutes when the Ross lead shrunk from 13 early in the third period to a 65-62 deficit in the final quarter.

"We had a great weekend," Ross coach Frank Gioffre said. "I was anxious to see how our kids would react after beating Whitmer."

The reaction was positive but Sandusky offered a helping hand, missing six of 10 free throws in the final quarter.

"The obvious thing, except the end of the game, is all the one-and-ones we missed," Sandusky coach John Schlessman said, "and possibly a breakdown defensively at the end."

The Little Giants spotted Sandusky a 4-0 lead before Justin Perry's layup three minutes into the game broke the ice for Ross. With Ryan Zimmerman and Mike Patterson scoring six points apiece, the Little Giants were up 19-13 after one quarter.

Zimmerman, who hit a career high 20 points, knocked in 10 in the second period. Wolf, the Little Giants' leading scorer, was held scoreless in the first eight minutes but fired in 10 in the second period as Ross raced to a 48-38 halftime lead.

"We lost the basketball game in the first half," Schlessman said. "We were out of sync; Fremont took it to us ... we just did not play with emotion."

Wolf and Damon Walker dropped in buckets as Ross expanded its lead to 53-40 in the third period before the Blue Streaks turned up the defensive pressure and clawed their way back into the game.

Scott Irby, coming off the bench, scored 11 of his 13 points in the third period. The Blue Streaks forced Ross into eight turnovers and closed to 60-58 at the end of the period on buckets off turnovers by Dasha Jones and Bryce Weatherspoon.

Jones, penetrating for short jumpers as well as hitting from outside, brought Sandusky even at 62 and put them ahead with a free throw when he was fouled by

Weatherspoon, scoring 18 points in a substitute role, put Sandusky up 65-62 before Ross came back.

Wolf, who had 22 points, cut it to 65-64 with 5:10 to play. Zimmerman's layup off an inbounds play put Ross ahead 66-65 and Wolf's slam dunk and free throw resulting from a Sandusky turnover put Ross up 69-65 at the 3:08 mark.

Sandusky bounced back, tying it at 69 on Jones' free throw and Weatherspoon's 3-pointer.

"We went to our match-up zone for awhile," Gioffre said, "but Dasha Jones —he's just such a great basketball player — went through it."

Up to the third period switch to the zone, Ross was playing man-to-man.

"We were not as aggressive (in the zone) as we were in the first half when we played man the whole time, so we switched it back the last quarter and our kids did a lot better job," Gioffre said.

Zimmerman's shot shot put Ross up 71-69 but Jones tied it with a foul line jumper with 90 seconds left. Patterson dropped

in a pair of free throws — Ross was 13 of 17 from the line in the game — with 1:12 remaining before Irby hit a layup with 45 seconds on the clock.

Ross took the clock down to 31.7 seconds before calling timeout.

"We went to our high delay game," Gioffre explained. "We wanted to get the ball into Mike Patterson's hands with 12 seconds but he got it with 17 seconds left and had to give it up to Nick Wolf too quick but Nick did a good job of seeing the open man, Mark Sheidler. You know Mark had such a great game last night (Friday), he was just destined to make that shot."

Schlessman said, "The Sheidler kid made a heck of a move and a heck of a shot."

Sandusky called timeout with 4.1 seconds remaining. The Streaks got the ball in but never got off a shot as the Ross defense kept the ball in front, forcing the Streaks to go the length of the floor.

"We just did not put the ball in the hole," Gibsonburg coach Keith Diebler said. "We could have won that game tonight. Our shots just went in and out."

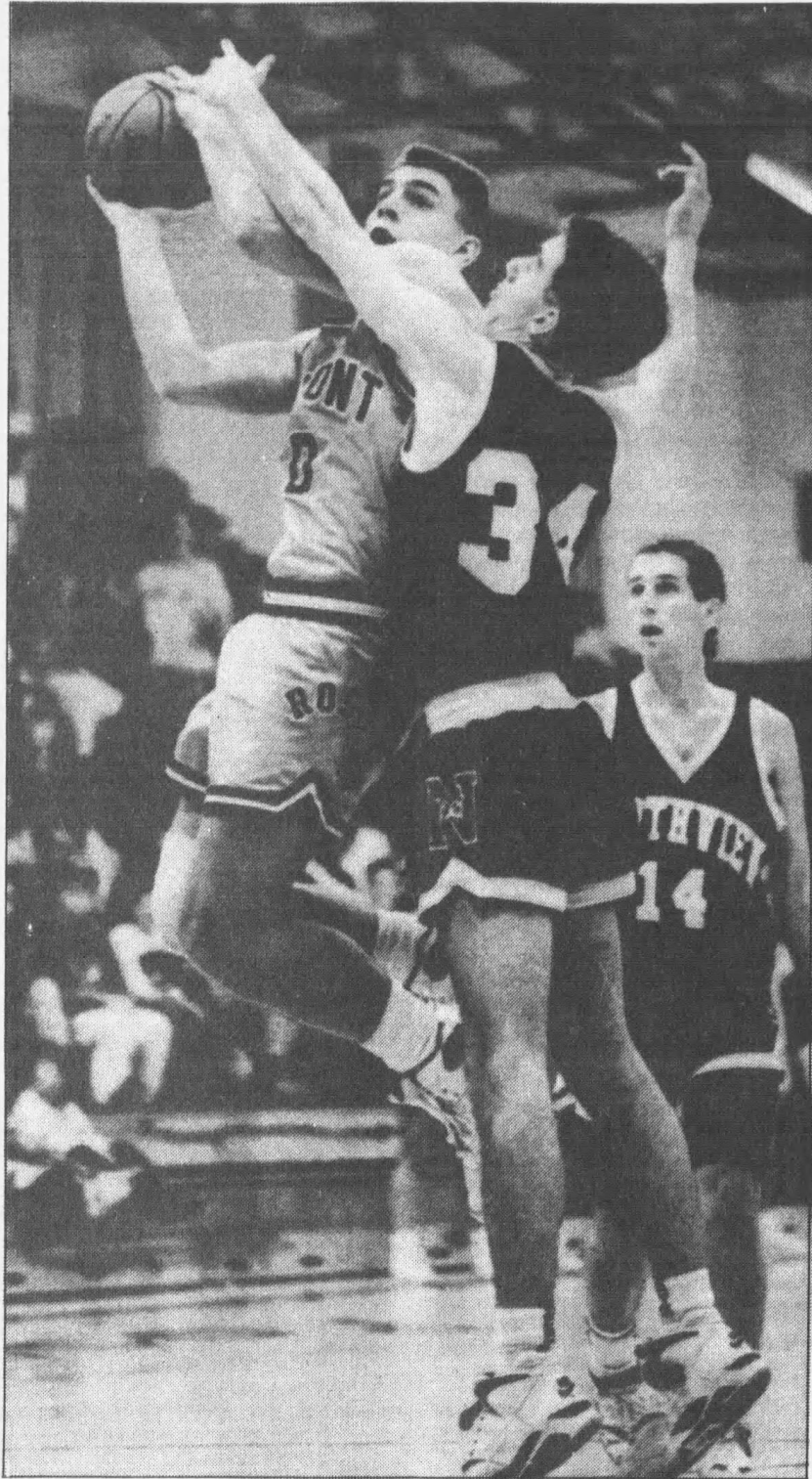
"I thought it was a hard-fought game," Woodmore coach Jude Meyers said. "I thought both

Little Giants asked to respond without Wolf

Fremont Ross lost a shot at the Great Lakes League championship last week, and the Little Giants now face a two-game weekend with their leading scorer likely to miss both games with an injury.

Nick Wolf, the second leading scorer in the GLL with a 16.9 average, sprained an ankle during Monday's practice and it is doubtful that he will see action against Oregon Clay tonight in the Purple Pit or Saturday at Tiffin Columbian.

With Wolf hobbled, Ross coach Frank Gioffre offered two words how his team must cope.

"Step up," he said. "We have a lot of kids who are going to have to step up a level for Clay and then we have to come right back and play at Tiffin.

"We have to have some of the other kids step up and take up some of the scoring slack.

"Defense, though, is going to be the key for us (against Clay). We have to play sound defense and hopefully create some turnovers in order to get some easy transition baskets. We are going to probably press most of the game and switch it up as much as possible and hopefully catch them off guard for some easy baskets in the beginning.

"We are going to have to really rely on Damon (Walker) and Zimny (Ryan Zimmerman) to give us some scoring inside, but every kid has to step up right now and take their game to another level."

Clay, at 14-3, is tied with Napoleon for the GLL lead at 8-2. In the first meeting

with Ross, the Eagles cruised to a 71-51 romp.

The Eagles feature Josh Jaco, the GLL's leading scorer at 17.5. But Gioffre pointed out, Jaco's supporting cast is formidable.

"The scary part of the team," Gioffre said, "is not just Josh Jaco. Probably one of their better players is Dan Tobias (third in the GLL scoring race at 15.2); he is overlooked. He scored 21 and had 17 rebounds against Whitmer — he's a great player.

"The (Russ) Revenaugh kid does a great job of running the show; he's a penetrator and he gets everyone involved in the game. They've got a kid named McMahon who can really shoot the ball from the outside and Donnelly who is an inside-outside player.

"They have a nice bench with (Brian)

Schroeder coming in — he's deadly from the outside.

"So, it's not just Josh Jaco — he's just one part of that unit."

While not have a shot at the league title may have dulled the Little Giants' lightning finish to a season that started with seven losses in 10 games, Gioffre has kept his team informed of the "spoiler" role against Clay.

That's the nice thing derived from last week's loss to Napoleon.

"That's the nice part," Gioffre said, managing a small smile, "we can go in there a little relaxed and just have some fun.

"It is senior night and I would like to see these kids go out winners."

That would be a positive step up toward ending the regular season in Tiffin.

Emotion carries Ross

Little Giants prevail in final home game

The emotion of the game rolled down Frank Gioffre's face.

"This is the most emotional game that I have ever been involved in," Gioffre said after the Little Giants' shocking 70-56 victory over Oregon Clay.

Emotion.

It oozed from the Purple Pit as Ross knocked the Eagles out of a first-place tie with Napoleon (which clinched a tie for the championship with a 71-63 victory over Toledo Whitmer) in the Great Lakes League.

Ross, 10-9, is 8-4 in the GLL. Clay is 8-3 in the league after losing for the fourth time in 18 games.

Emotion.

There were very few dry eyes on the Ross bench before the game and there were none in the lockerroom afterwards. It was the final home game for the seniors and the eyes betrayed their emotions.

"It was so emotional before the game, you could not help but to cry a little bit," Gioffre said. "I knew that we were going to play with a lot of emotion, but I did not know how it was going to affect them but it affected them in a good way."

Emotion.

Nick Wolf, the GLL's second leading scorer, watched the game from the bench while riding crutches to get there. He sprained his ankle Monday and is hoping to get back into the lineup by sectional tournament time. The fidgeting on the crutches gave away his emotions.

"Each kid has to step up,"

Gioffre said in midweek about replacing Wolf.

"Every kid stepped up," Gioffre declared Friday night. "Everybody. I can go down the line and bring out specific plays but it was a great, great team effort. That was the bottom line. Tonight, they stepped to the top."

Clay coach Doug Dippman said, "Sometimes, our kids look over there and see Nick's not playing, and they start thinking it's going to be easy but Frank did a good job of getting his kids ready to play and they just outplayed us. They were the better basketball team tonight."

Four Little Giants scored in double figures. Mike Patterson, the first junior inserted by Gioffre after starting all seniors, pumped in 19 points.

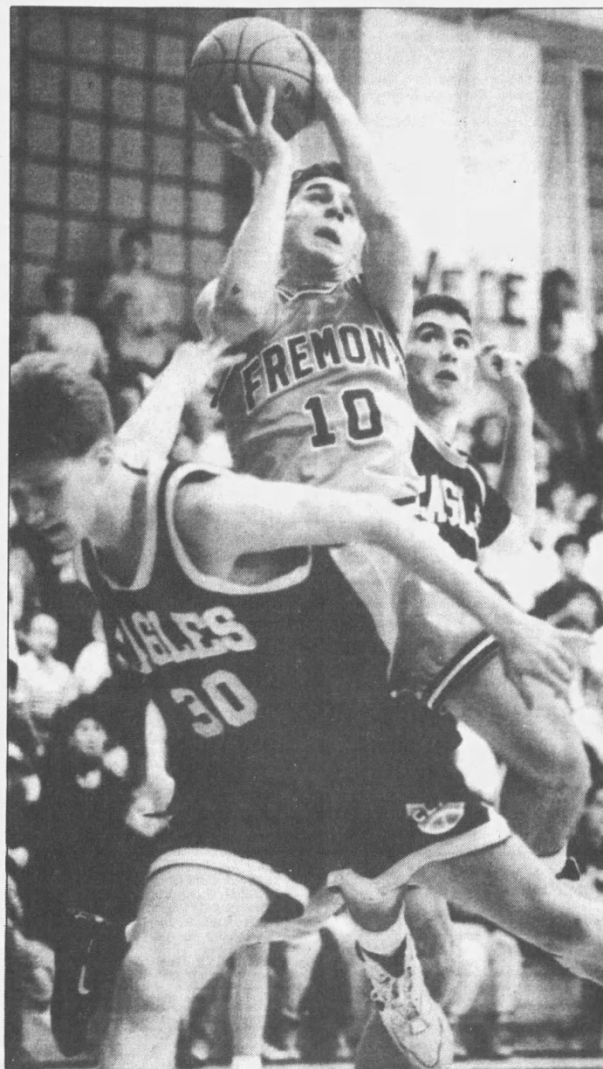
All five senior starters — Damon Walker, Justin Perry, Ryan Zimmerman, Jon Hetrick and Mark Sheidler — scored in the first quarter.

The Little Giants turned their emotion into torrid 56 percent (25-of-45) shooting, easily compensating for a 47-30 Clay rebounding advantage.

Topping the shooting effort was a 17-of-31 performance — 14 of 21 in the fourth quarter — from the foul line, where the Little Giants have faltered at times this season.

A skin-tight Ross defense forced Clay into 22-of-65 (34 percent) shooting while the Eagles were 9-of-16 at the line.

Hetrick finished with 13 points, including a 6-of-9 effort at the line in the final period; Perry
