TEAM ENTERED AT MANSFIELD

Tracksters of F. H. S. to Participate in Satur- day Meet

Coach Bill Ogden at Fremont High school announced today that his tracksters will be entered in the district track and field meet to be held at Mansfield Saturday. The full team will be entered, with about six or seven expected to qualify for the state meet to be held at Ohio State University in Columbus a week later.

All the events offered at the Mansfield district meet will be entered by the Fremonters, Ogden stated. Several of the younger men on the squad may not place for the state session, but will be taken along for the experience gained. The team will leave Fremont at 7 a. m. Saturday and will travel in private cars.

Those who will make the trip are Peterson, Alberts, and Eckert, sprinters; D. and G. Schneider, brother quarter milers; Michael, miler; Thompson and H. Peterson, pole vault; Pettiford and Holmes, high jump; Demmel, broad jump; Moore, weights; H. Binkley, low hurdles; and Becker, a member of the relay team. Peterson, Alberts, Eckert and the Schneiders also have places on the relay teams.

Twelve class A teams and twenty class B teams are expected to be entered in the race.

SANDUSKY WINS DISTRICT MEET AS GANT STARS

Fremont Finishes in Fourth Position; Rec- ords Fall

Sandusky, for the third consecutive year, won the Northwestern Ohio track and field championship at Mansfield Saturday. Lead by the powerful London Gant, the one man team, eased out a winner with 59 points. Mansfield was second with 45; Tiffin finished third, scoring 28, while Fremont edged in fourth with 24½. Willard's 21 points gave it fifth position and Norwalk 17; Wapakoneta, 15; Upper Sandusky, 10; Bellevue, 10, and Ashland 6 were the way the fag enders brought up the procession.

Gant, scoring 15 points, taking first in the shot-put, javelin and discus, was individual champion of the session. This performance gave his team the commanding lead and the blue and white will enter the Columbus finals.

Three meeting records were broken. Tommy Sexton, Willard's great miler, stepped the mile in four minutes 36.6; Magers, of Tiffin did the high jump at 5 feet 7 inches and Nederhouser, of Upper Sandusky, scored 21 feet 6½ inches in the broad jump.

Fremont finished fourth in the mile relay and Thompson was tied for third in the pole vault. Peterson took third in the broad jump, fifth in the 220 and was unplaced in the 100 yard dash. Pettiford won second in the 120 high hurdles and Michaels was fifth in the mile. Moore drew fourth place in discus and Dave Holmes was tied for third position in the high jump.

Schneider, who scored Fremont's only first place, featured the running of the 440 taking the event in 54.4. The crack Fremont relay team which has been sweeping up the opposition in the 880 event, lost to Mansfield at a 1:34.4 clip.
