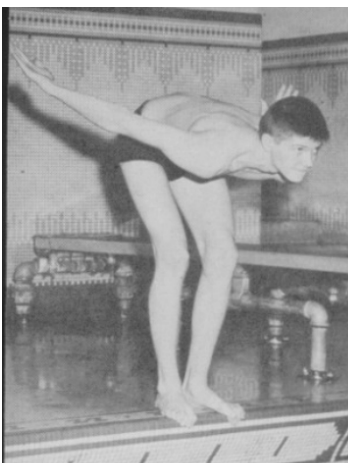


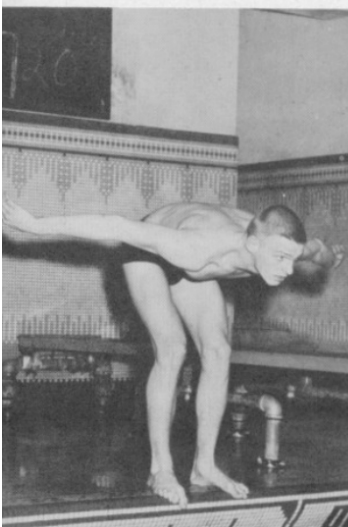

THE SWIM SEASON

The Fremont Ross swimmers opened the season by defeating Oberlin College freshman 49-28 in the Oberlin pool on December 15. Ross took all but two firsts to start the season off in fine fashion.

A trip to Sandusky January 10 proved successful as the Ross tankers swam to a close victory of 39-38. Dave Carl, Jim Streeter, Al Hetrick, and the freestyle relay pooled firsts for the Little Giants.

Victory number three saw the Little Giants swamp Lima 67-9, January 17. Fremont traveled to Lima to take all firsts and all but one second place and to set three Lima pool records.

The first loss came with Ross losing a triangular meet January 19 in the Fremont pool. Upper Arlington was first with 52 points, second, Fremont with 51 points, third, Sandusky with 33 points.

The Ross swimmers won victory number four January 24 as they defeated Marion Y 53-17 in the local pool. The Ross tankers copped all first places.

Swimming to the fifth win in dual meets, the Little Giants beat Western Reserve Academy January 26 by a score of 50-27.

February 2 the Ross tankers traveled to the Bowling Green Relays and tied for sixth place. Points were gained by the free style relay and the medley relay, who set a new school record of 2:02.0. (Old record 2:02.4.)

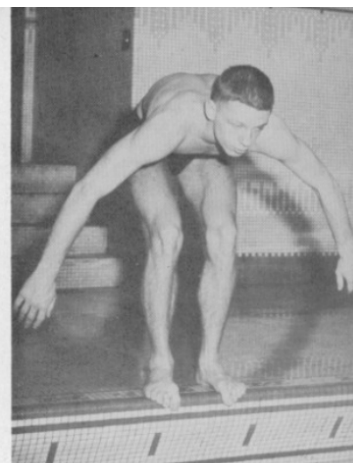
February 7 the Sandusky Blue Streaks came to Fremont with revenge in their eyes only to lose 36-41 to the Ross mermen. Ed Nickel, Tom Trout, Streeter, Hetrick, and the medley relay team which again broke the record getting 2:02.2 pulling the Ross squad to their sixth victory.

The Ross mermen lost their first dual meet February 8 when the powerful University School of Cleveland came to Ross defeating them 59-18. University School set a new pool record of 1:34.9 in the free style relay.

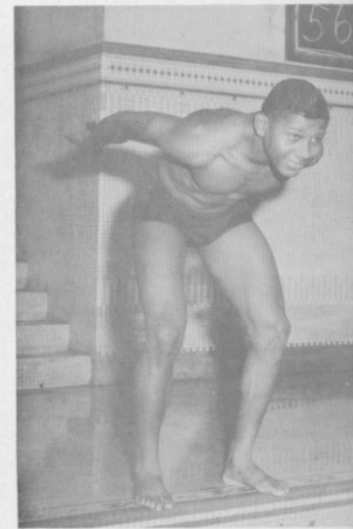
February 15 saw the Ross tankers make a valiant but futile effort to defeat Canton. Canton won 41-36 with Tom Trout, Dave Carl, and the free style relay gaining firsts for Ross.

The Little Giants final dual meet saw mostly the reserve squad defeat Marion Y at Marion 39½-37½ on February 16.

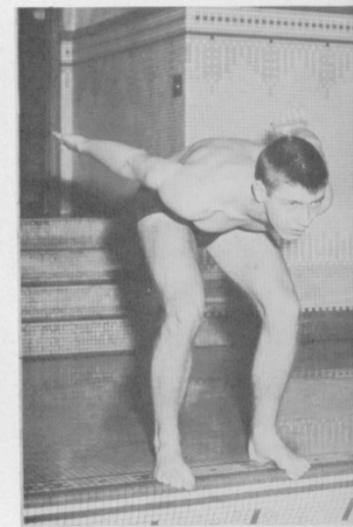

Ross Mermen Open Saturday In Oberlin Freshmen Meet

Little Giants On Road To Launch Schedule With Stiff Opponents

With the warmup Purple and White inter-squad meet behind them, mermen of Ross high school open the season's slate of 11 meets (exclusive of district and state action) on Saturday afternoon. Opposition will be the freshmen of Oberlin college who host Coach George Gruse's squad, action starting at 3:30 p. m.

This season the co-captains directing the Little Giants are Al Hetrick and Tom Hite, both seniors and both classed as lettermen in the free style events.

Coach Gruse bade goodbye in June to three lettermen. Among them were the co-captains, Jack

Balsizer and Norm Kroh. Third monogram winner to pick up his diploma was Toivo Tagamets.

The mermen from Ross have five varsity lettermen as the foundation of the squad. Besides Hite and Hetrick there are Bill Myers, diver; Ed Nickel, free style; and Dave Carl, breast stroke.

From a squad of 43 swimmers, Gruse lined up the following to compete in the Oberlin outing:

Ron Shawl and Al Hetrick in the 50 yard free style; Dave Carl and Ed Nickel, 100 yard breast stroke; Tom Hite and Gordon Tod, 200 yard free style; Bill Gwinup, Jim Streeter and Nate Danziger, 100 yard back stroke; John Baxter and Dick Gwinup, 100 yard free style;

Bill Myers, Bruce Weaver and Jim Mooney, diving; Tom Hite, Tom Long and John Roush, 150 yard individual medley; Bill Gwinup, Dave Carl, Ed Nickel and Gordon Tod, 200-yard medley relay, and John Baxter, Ron Shawl, Jim Streeter and Al Hetrick, 200 yard free style relay.

Following Saturday's meet, the Little Giants will be idle until after the new year, breaking into competition again with Sandusky's Blue Streaks as the lid-lifter on January 10, 7:30 p. m. in the Sandusky pool.

First home meet is scheduled January 19 when a triangular brings Upper Arlington and Columbus Academy to Fremont for a 2 p. m. event.

Ross Swimmers Defeat Oberlin Freshmen, 49-28

Meeting the Oberlin College freshmen in the Oberlin pool Saturday afternoon, Ross high's Little Giant swimming team opened the season with a 49-28 victory. Coach George Gruse's team moved out to an 8-1 lead in the first event and stayed ahead the entire meet.

Dave Carl turned in a fine showing as he won the 100 yard breast stroke event in 1:11.2 minutes. Jim Streeter, winning the 100 yard back stroke in 1:11.6, exhibited another top effort for the Little Giants. Earlier in the year Streeter started the back stroke with a time of 1:15.9, but shaved off the seconds in Saturday's win.

Billy Myers won out in the diving event with Bruce Weaver coming up in second. Both teams split the relay events, Ross taking the 200 yard relay and Oberlin copping the 200 yard medley relay.

Three Swimming Marks Established

Three school records were established by Ross high swimmers Thursday afternoon at Lima high as the Little Giants went out to a one-sided 67-9 victory over the host team, the latter getting its first taste of interscholastic competition in the initial year of operations.

It was the third straight win for Coach George Gruse's swimmers and gave the team a final interscholastic meet leading up to Saturday's event at 2 p. m. in Ross high's pool. Upper Arlington will provide the opposition.

Jim Streeter, sophomore back stroke specialist and a reserve letterman, clicked off one of the new Lima pool records with a time of 1:10.5 in the 100 yard back stroke.

Two Other Marks

Ross set the other two records with a time of 1:37.8 in the 160 yards medley relay. Members were William Gwinup, Mike Cochran, David Carl, and Ed Nickel. In the 160 yard relay the record time was 1:21.1 with John Baxter, Ron Shawl, Streeter and Al Hetrick manning the squad.

Performing in the diving events, Bruce Weaver, junior, injured his foot on the bottom of the pool and will be out of action for several weeks, possibly longer, Gruse said.

An examination at Lima disclosed no bone breaks. Billy Myers, who won the diving event, hit his nose on a grain at the bottom of the pool and brought back a "battle scar" plus first place for Ross.

Because of the size and depth of the Lima pool, it is regarded as a slow pool, Gruse said. Water was about five feet deep.

Reserves should have been taken along to work in the meet for experience, Gruse said, but in leaving for another school, one never knows that opposition will be waiting.

Ross high's swimmers scored their fourth dual victory in four starts when they turned back Marion's YMCA tankers by a 60-17 margin Thursday night in the Little Giants' pool.

Bill Gwinup, Mike Cochran, Dave Carl and Ed Nickel manned the 200 yard medley relay team while Tod, Neal Keckler, Dick Gwinup and John Roush were on the winning 200 yd. relay team.

Tom Trout, freshman diver, gained a first for Ross to add a new punch in the scoring power of the Little Giants.

Ross placed one-two in four of the events.

Western Reserve Academy Trounced

Ross high's swimmers put on an excellent team effort Saturday afternoon in the local natatorium, gaining a measure of revenge over Western Reserve Academy of Hudson, O., for a defeat suffered a year ago, by copping a 50-27 decision. Last year, meeting at Hudson, Academy scored a 52-25 victory.

Coach George Gruse's lads held a 36-27 margin going into the last two relay events—the 150 yard individual medley and the 200 yard relay—and had to take only one of the two to clinch the victory. The Ross boys took both with comparative ease to win the meet.

Ross has not lost a dual meet this season.

Four first places, in addition to the relays went to the Little Giants. John Baxter in the 50-yard free style, Dave Carl in the 100-yard breast stroke, Jim Streeter in the 100-yard back stroke, and Billy Myers in the diving. The winning relay teams were comprised of Bill Gwinup, Carl, Eddie Nickel and Albie Hetrick in the 150-yard individual medley, and Baxter, Ron Shawl, Streeter and Tom Hite in the 220 event.

Academy's firsts went to Ken Hoose in the 200-yard free style, Sheldon Rieley in the 100-yard free style, and Ken Kimball in the 150-yard individual medley.

Gruse expects to concentrate practices this week on the relay and diving events, next competition being at Bowling Green State university Saturday in the annual BG relays. Only relay teams and divers compete.

While the lineup of schools entering the relays has not been announced yet by Sam Cooper, of the BG faculty, in charge of the meet, Gruse says reports have it that a number of Michigan and Cincinnati schools will be entered in addition to the perennial competitors, Ross, Sandusky and Canton McKinley.

BGSU Relays Attract Best

Gruse Names Youths For Saturday Classic

Ross high's mermen will have to be in top form Saturday when they enter the 11th annual Bowling Green State University relays, because the event has grown so much in recent years that the best tank squads in two states are now competing.

The relays are run on a team basis, individual effort counting only as it affects overall team performance. Diving events will be conducted also, but the results will not figure in the final outcome of the meet, no points being given.

Coach George Gruse said he had been informed by Sam Cooper, meet manager and BG swimming mentor, that nine of the best swimming teams in Ohio and Michigan will compete. Last year Canton McKinley won it, and Ted Branum will have his boys back for another shot at the honors.

University, Too

In addition to Canton and Ross high, Cooper told Gruse the crack University School team of Cleveland will be in the relays, and so will Sandusky, Cincinnati Western Hills and Cincinnati Walnut Hills, plus Monroe, East Grand Rapids and Lincoln Park, all of Michigan. In addition, Trenton and Midland, Mich., are expected to send partial teams.

Ross high has never won the relays, McKinley taking the classic in 1949-50-52-53-56, East Grand Rapids in 1954-55 and Cleveland East Tech in 1947-48.

Ross high's mermen set a new school record Saturday in the Bowling Green State university relays, but the time of 2:02 in the 200-yard medley relay wasn't even good enough to win a point.

That's an indication of the competition in which George Gruse's boys competed when the best prep school swimmers of two states go together.

The Ross lads tied for sixth place in the meet with Western Hills of Cincinnati and Sandusky, each getting three points. Had diving helped the team total Sandusky would have finished higher, because Coach Walter Caldwell's Don Rotsinger won first place in diving. However, since the meet was for relay teams only, no diving points were counted.

Monroe, Mich., victor

The relays was won by a potent Monroe, Mich., squad, accompanied by the scene of the meet by two bus loads of fans.

Monroe, coached by Alex Sieve, former BGSU swimmer, scored 34 points. Second was University school of Cleveland, which team comes here next Friday night to meet the Little Giants in a dual event, with 24 points, while defending champion Canton McKinley was third with 22.

Four meet records were set and one tied. McKinley scored records in the 200-yard backstroke at 1:53.2 and in the 200-yard medley, 1:49; University school in the 200-yard freestyle at 1:36.3; Monroe in the 200-yard butterfly at 1:53.1, and University school tied the mark in the 400-yard free style at 1:42.2.

Ross fifth, fourth

Ross won its points with a fifth in the 200-yard free style doing it in 1:44 with John Baxter, Ron Shavi, Tom Hite and Al Herick doing the swimming, and in the 200-yard backstroke, winning fourth place in time of 2:02.4 with Jim Streeter, Charles Montgomery, Bill Gwinup and Jack Talbot swimming.

The team which set the school mark of 2:02 in the medley relay included Streeter in the backstroke, Mike Cochran in the orthodox breast stroke, Dave Carl in the butterfly breast stroke, and Ed Nickel in the Free style. The previous school mark was 2:02.4.

Coach Gruse was pleased with his divers, freshman Tom Trout scoring 119.05 points for sixth place. First place winner, Rotsinger of Sandusky, tallied 135 points, while third place was only three points more than Trout had. Bruce Weaver, a junior, scored 107.09 points for eighth place.

Billy Myers, senior diver, did not compete, having left school during the last week.

Ross swimmers have a busy week ahead of them. They host Sandusky Thursday at 7:30 here, the lake front school's team seeking revenge for a 38-38 defeat suffered some time ago.

On Friday the crack Cleveland University school team comes here at 7 o'clock. University school gave Sandusky and Canton McKinley shellacksings.

Unbeaten in Duals

Ross hasn't lost a dual meet this year, going after Nos. 6 and 7 in the Sandusky and University school contests.

The reserve squad goes to Sandusky Tuesday evening, and on Saturday at 10 a. m. the Columbus Swim Club, coached by Bill Taylor and comprised of promising Columbus area seventh, eighth and ninth graders invade the local pool. The Swim Club lads will be at Sandusky Friday, come here to

stay Friday night at the Hotel Jackson, then meet Ross high's seventh, eighth and ninth graders Saturday.

Sixth Dual Win In Row Chalked Up By Rossmen

New Record Scored By Medley Relay Crew; Trout Takes Diving

Victory No. 6 in dual competition is in the record books—a 41.56 margin over Sandusky's Blue Streaks—and the big one of the season to date comes up tonight for Coach George Gruse's Ross high tank crew. Cleveland university school's team is due here for a 7 p. m. match.

The local swimmers turned in a brilliant performance Thursday evening in Ross high's pool, the 200 yard medley relay team setting a new school record, clipping one-tenth second off the 2:02.3 of a year ago.

The team did the distance in 2:02.2, Mike Cochran doing the orthodox breast stroke lap in 35.6 seconds, Jack Talbott the back stroke in 32; Dave Carl, the butterfly, in 29.4, and Eddie Nickel, the free style lap in 25.8.

Quick Start Noted

Ross actually won the meet by even a larger margin since Referee Jack Decker ruled that Sandusky's anchorman dove too quickly in starting his lap. That would have taken seven points from Sandusky, giving it 29, and adding seven to Ross making its total 48. However, since the result of the match was determined on the previous race, the 200 yard medley relay, the ruling was passed over.

Ross edged Sandusky earlier, 38-37, at Sandusky.

A little of the edge was taken off the meet when Don Rotsinger, Sandusky's diver who won the Bowling Green relays last Saturday, was not able to compete because of a broken hand. Actually he broke the hand while practicing at Bowling Green last Saturday, but went on with his dives, winning the event.

Trout Takes Diving

Tom Trout, Ross high freshman, took the diving event with 98.7 points, Sandusky's Don Frohman just edging Ross' Bruce Weaver for second place with 91.9 points against 90.6.

Ross took four firsts in individual competition, the 200 yard medley relay, and the 200 yard relay, if you want to count the quick-start ruling in the latter event.

The Little Giants have not yet lost a dual event this season.

University school's tank squad has whipped Canton McKinley and Sandusky in dual meets, and promises to be a real test for the Ross paddlers.

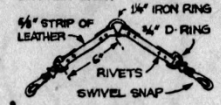

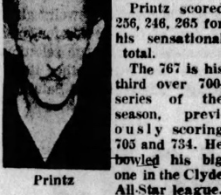

A great Cleveland University school swimming squad came to Fremont Friday evening and after Coach Don Molten's boys got through churning the water of the Ross high natatorium into a torrid temperature the score was 59 to 18. The Little Giants' dual meet record ended abruptly at six in a row.

Despite the fact that the score was so lopsided Coach George

Gruse was not at all downhearted, praising his boys for an all-out effort despite the undeniable class of the University school boys. The teams will meet again next year, and seven first-place winners for University school will be graduated.

Ross failed to win a first place in the seven individual events and two relays.

New Record Set

A new pool record was scored in the final event of the competition. University School paddling to a one minute 34.9 seconds recording to nip Canton McKinley's old mark, set just last year, of 1:37. University school's swimmers in the record-breaker were Tom Hoffman, Jim Loofbourrow, the team captain; Bill Weber and Steve Smith.
