Lemanczyk baffles Tribe

CLEVELAND (AP) — Toronto right-hander Dave Lemanczyk went almost nine months without recording a victory, but he broke the fast impressively in the Blue Jays' 5-3 defeat of Cleveland on Sunday.

"It's hard to win ballgames when you don't hit in the first six innings," said Cleveland Manager Dave Garcia, after Lemanczyk held the Indians to three harmless hits through the sixth stanza.

Ron Hassey finally put Cleveland on the scoreboard with a three-run homer in the seventh, but Blue Jays' relievers took charge thereafter, allowing only one Cleveland baserunner the rest of the way.

"He (Lemanczyk) got the ball up to Hassey," said Toronto Manager Bob Mattick, "but overall he did a good job."

The outing was encouraging for the 29-year-old Lemanczyk, whose last victory had come July 26, 1979, when he three-hit the Detroit Tigers. An inflamed nerve kept him on the disabled list much of the second half of 1979, and he carried this season with a pair of losses. He started a 7.1 ERA into Sunday's game.

"I felt real strong out there today," said Lemanczyk. "Our catcher, Bob Davis, called a real good game for me. We were working zones, pitching their hitters in and out. We were getting lots of outs on balls hit to the opposite field."

After Hassey's blast knocked Lemanczyk from the box in the seventh, Toronto reliever Jerry Garvin came on to retire four men in a row. Joey McLaughlin, obtained in an offseason trade with Atlanta, replaced Garvin after he walked Mike Hargrove with one out in the eighth, and McLaughlin proceeded to retire the five men he faced to earn his first save of the year.

"McLaughlin came in and did the kind of job we knew he would do for us when we traded for him," Mattick said.

Ross girls win, boys second

The Port Clinton Redskins took the boys title and the Ross Little Giant squad was the girls winner of the 20th Fremont Invitational Relays Saturday at Ross High School.

Port Clinton won four events and grabbed two seconds and three thirds to outdistance second-place Ross by 17 points, 82-65. Tiffin Columbian was third with 58 while Maumee was fourth with 56. Rounding out the field were Bowling Green 43, Elyria West 40 and Perkins 37.

The Redskins won three of the five field events in the meet. Greg and Dave Gresh along with Rick Cuffala won the high jump with a combined jump of 17'4".

The team of Brad Berry, Tracy Winke and Jerry Johnson took the discus with a 385-2 total distance and Al Garza, Mark Apple and Donald Johnson were the pole vault winners, totaling an even 35 with their jumps.

Port Clinton's only other first was in the 3200-meter relay. Jake Perry, Dave Day, Dave Bradshaw and Brad Meek won that with a time of 8:20.4.

The Redskins had second place finishes in the long jump and the sprint medley and finished third in the sprint hurdles, the distance medley and the 800-meter medley.

Willie Gentry, Tom Pendrey and Tony Gant set a record for Ross in the long jump, winning the event with a combined distance of 64-3 and smashing the old record by more than three feet.

Gentry and Pendrey were also on the winning 800-meter medley team along with Sam Lindsey and Curtis Lee. That quartet won the event in 1:33.9.

Greg Brown, Hank Davis, Gregg Hedden and Pendrey captured the shuttle hurdles for

Ross with a time of 58.86 and Mike Martin, Todd Johnson, Hedden and Gant were on the 1600-meter relay team that won in 3:32.57.

The Little Giants recorded a second in the 400-meter relay and thirds in the discus and the sprint medley.

In the girls portion of the meet, Ross finished first in five events and second in three more to win with 58 points. Perkins was second with 70 while Maumee had 54 and Bowling Green 52. Tiffin Columbian finished with 36, Port Clinton 26 and Elyria West 15 to round out the field.

Amy Lindstrom, Johanna Hawk and Margaret Van Gilder combined for a toss of 90-2 to win the shot put event for Ross while Judy Shetzer, Judy Krock, Jan Smith and Tammy Haas took the hurdles with a time of 1:10.10.
